Opiniones favorables hacia Kamala Harris han aumentado este verano, según muestra encuesta AP-NORC

WASHINGTON, Aug 19, 2024 (AP): La vicepresidenta Kamala Harris llega a la Convención Nacional Demócrata con creciente entusiasmo de los demócratas y ascenso constante en las preferencias entre los estadounidenses en su conjunto.

Aproximadamente la mitad de los adultos estadounidenses —el 48%— tienen una opinión muy o algo favorable de Harris, según una nueva encuesta realizada por The Associated Press-Centro NORC de Investigación de Asuntos Públicos. Eso representa un incremento en comparación con 39% al comenzar el verano, antes de que el pobre desempeño del presidente Joe Biden en su debate frente al expresidente Donald Trump finalmente lo llevara a abandonar la contienda por la presidencia.

Eso no es sólo una mejoría para Harris, sino también con respecto a donde Biden se encontraba antes de dar un paso al costado, cuando 38% de los

encuestados dijeron que tenían una opinión favorable de él. También es un poco mejor al 41% de los adultos que dicen tener una opinión favorable de Trump.

El ascenso de Harris en las preferencias ocurre en un momento en que más estadounidenses en general se han formado una opinión acerca de ella mientras los equipos de campaña de Harris y de Trump se apresuran a definir su incipiente candidatura. El número de personas que dicen no saber lo suficiente acerca de ella para tener una opinión ha disminuido a la mitad, de 12% en junio a 6% ahora, cifra que comparten ambas campañas.

La medición más reciente coincide con la forma en que los estadounidenses veían a Harris en 2021, cuando Biden asumió la presidencia de Estados Unidos y ella la vicepresidencia. Deja entrever una renovada positividad hacia la vicepresidenta —el porcentaje de estadounidenses que tienen una opinión “muy

favorable” de ella también se ha incrementado durante el mismo período—, pero Harris corre el riesgo de alcanzar un tope a medida que se acerca a su mejor valoración previa.

Desde junio, las preferencias por Harris han aumentado ligeramente entre algunos grupos que en general ya favorecen al Partido Demócrata. Su grado de aceptación se ha incrementado ligeramente entre demócratas, independientes, mujeres y adultos jóvenes menores de 30 años. No ha habido cambios significativos entre adultos negros y adultos hispanos, otros grupos electorales de los que probablemente Harris requerirá su apoyo en noviembre.

La mitad de los adultos menores de 30 tienen una opinión muy o algo favorable de Harris en la encuesta más reciente, un incremento con respecto a 34% en junio. Eso ocurre en un momento en que más adultos jóvenes se han formado una opinión acerca de ella. La cantidad de adultos que dicen que no saben lo

suficiente para poder decir ha disminuido de aproximadamente 2 de cada 10 a cerca de 1 de cada 10. El número de adultos jóvenes que tienen una opinión desfavorable de ella no ha cambiado significativamente.

La encuesta a 1.164 adultos fue realizada del 8 al 12 de agosto de 2024 utilizando una muestra tomada del Panel AmeriSpeak de NORC, basado en la probabilidad, el cual está diseñado para ser representativo de la población de Estados Unidos. El margen de error en la muestra para todos los que respondieron es de más o menos 3,8 puntos porcentuales.

Immigrants prepare for new Biden protections with excitement and concern

MIAMI, Aug 17, 2024 (AP): Roberto Garcia crossed the border from Mexico in 2009 looking for a better life. For the past eight years, he has been married to an American woman, and they have three kids who are all American citizens. The only one in the family who is not is Garcia.

Seven years ago, he applied to legalize his status through a process that, if approved, would still require him to return to Mexico with no guarantee that he would be allowed back into the United States.

The possibility of being separated from his family or — in a worst case scenario — being unable to return home to Los Angeles has been stressful. So has the wait. It has been seven years and Garcia has not yet gotten an appointment at the U.S. Consulate in Ciudad Juarez, just across the border in Mexico.

Now, a Biden administration program launching Monday will allow some spouses of U.S. citizens without legal permission

to stay in the U.S. to legalize their status without leaving the country. That is giving Garcia, and others like him, new hope.

"Finally, there is a light that this is possible," the 37-year-old said. "I imagine I will soon have the important documents that so many people want to have."

The new program offers a rare opportunity to erase the threat of deportation and one day earn citizenship. But tempering that excitement is concern: Who will benefit from what has been described as the most expansive U.S. protections for immigrants in over a decade? Will the program face legal challenges? And most important, will it survive the presidential election?

Under the policy Democratic President Joe Biden announced in June, many spouses without legal status will be able to apply for something called "parole in place," offering permission to stay in the U.S., apply for a green card and eventually get on a path to citizenship.

To be eligible, they must have been continuously in the U.S. for at least 10 years, not pose a security threat or have a disqualifying criminal history, and have been married to a citizen by June 17 — the day before the program was announced. They must pay a \$580 fee to apply and fill out a lengthy application, including an explanation of why they deserve humanitarian parole and a long list of supporting documents proving how long they have been in the country.

They apply to the Department of Homeland Security, and if approved, have three years to seek permanent residency. During that period, they can get work authorization.

The administration estimates about 500,000 people could be eligible, plus about 50,000 of their children.

Before this program, it was complicated for people who were in the U.S. illegally to get a green card after marrying an

American citizen. They can be required to return to their home country — often for years — and they always face the risk they may not be allowed back in.

News of Biden's program set off a flurry of activity nationwide as couples checked whether they were eligible. Immigrant groups have reached out to help people understand the program and battle misinformation. Some launched radio ads.

"There's definitely a lot of interest but also a lot of concerns," said Carolina Castaneda, a staff attorney with the Immigrant Legal Resource Center in California's Central Valley.

Activists and lawyers say they and applicants are weighing whether it is a risk to apply, if the program will survive possible Republican lawsuits and what happens if Republican Donald Trump — who has vowed to deport millions of immigrants — is back in the White House.

There has been far more hesitancy compared with the excitement that greeted the launch of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, or DACA, which protected people brought to the country as children from deportation, said Karla Aguayo, director of legal services at CHIRLA, the Los Angeles-based Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights.

When DACA was announced in 2012, she said thousands of people lined up outside the

organization's office. For the new program, it has just been a few couples.

While DACA had a much bigger applicant pool, the immigrant community has seen how these policies get caught up in the courts, Aguayo said. "People are like, 'This is nice, but how long will it last?'" she said.

The organization has posted information about the new program online and held information sessions and one-on-one appointments with clients. Those likely to qualify can come back Monday to apply.

The eligible couples are excited, she said, "coming with an accordion file of documents that they want reviewed."

But, she said, her group is discovering that a majority of people it sees will not qualify. One of the biggest reasons: Many returned to their home country at some point — often for big life events like a dying family member — and reentry makes them ineligible.

For María Zambrano, the possibility that Trump wins the presidential election and ends the policy adds to the urgency.

"We have to react as soon as possible and apply as soon as possible," said the 56-year-old resident of Bal Harbour, Florida.

She came to the U.S. from Colombia in 2001 and has not gone back.

She works as a Spanish language tutor and has her own company. Seven years ago, she married a

U.S. citizen, and like Garcia, applied for legal status but still has to interview at a U.S. Consulate in Colombia.

She has been waiting for that appointment for more than two years. Now, she has a chance to avoid the risky trip out of the U.S.

Immigrants who, unlike Garcia and Zambrano, are not already on the government's radar may fear the risk of applying, especially if Trump is president. His administration would know who and where they are, said Charles Kuck, an Atlanta-based immigration attorney.

"Is there a risk associated with this? One hundred percent," Kuck said.

This type of program should have been rolled out a few years ago, not months before an election, Kuck said. He is advising clients to wait to see who wins.

Garcia and Zambrano already are thinking about how this opportunity can change their lives.

Garcia and his 44-year-old wife, María, have an appointment with their immigration attorney the day after the government begins accepting applications on Monday.

María, who had an accident a year ago and cannot work, said: "My biggest fear is that he won't be able to come back," if Garcia travels to Ciudad Juarez.

As the family's sole breadwinner and the one who does things like take the kids to school, Garcia said he cannot take that risk even if he were to finally get an appointment.

As for Zambrano, she will be able to travel home to visit her parents and brothers. She can get a driver's license, health insurance, a house and maybe even vote one day.

Garcia, who said he has paid taxes since 2010 and is studying for his contractor's license, also dreams of what he can do with a green card. On the top of his mind: going to Mexico to see his parents and seven brothers for the first time in 15 years.

"It's been many years of not seeing them, not talking to them face to face," Garcia said. "I try not to think about it."

Michigan expands healthcare access for immigrant children and pregnant people

Certain immigrant populations to become newly eligible for healthcare

DETROIT, MI, August 15, 2024: The Michigan Immigrant Rights Center (MIRC) is spreading the word to eligible foreign-born individuals that significant changes have been made to healthcare access for pregnant people and children in the state of Michigan. Since 1996, lawfully residing immigrants could not access Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) until they had been in the United States for five years. As of August 1, 2024 Michigan will end the five-year waiting period for lawfully residing children and pregnant people.

"We are so excited about this new change to Michigan health care policy," said Elly Jordan, MIRC's Training and Impact Supervising Attorney. "We know how important health care access is to all children and families, especially in the early years. This will be a meaningful improvement in the quality of life for so many Michigan families."

Michigan joins 36 states plus D.C. in making this policy change for children, and 30 states plus D.C. in making the change for pregnant people. In general, lawfully present immigrants must have a "qualified" immigration status to be eligible for Medicaid or CHIP, and most lawful permanent residents or "green card" holders must wait five years after obtaining qualified status before they may enroll, even if they meet other eligibility requirements. Since 2009, the Immigrant Children's Health Improvement Act (ICHIA) option has allowed states to waive the five-year waiting period for Medicaid and CHIP for lawfully present pregnant people and children, recognizing how critical access to healthcare is for young families. However, despite having the option for 14 years, Michigan did not adopt this policy until now.

The new policy will ensure more children

and families have healthcare coverage, setting them up for success. Immigrant Michiganders are twice as likely to be uninsured than U.S.-born residents. The new policy will bring Michigan closer to covering all children and ensure families have access to affordable, quality care at a critical life stage. Children up to 19 years of age can now register for CHIP and young people up to age 21 can register for Medicaid. Pregnant people are also covered, including a 12-month postpartum period.

The new policy comes at a time when misinformation about recent changes to the federal public charge rule has led many immigrant families to disenroll or decline public benefits programs for which they are eligible due to fear and confusion about the impact on immigration status in the future. National survey data found that one in five adults in immigrant families with children reported that they or a family member avoided a public benefit in 2019 for fear of risking future green card status. For those with lower incomes, the number increased to one-third of respondents. For most eligible individuals, these fears are misplaced and use of certain programs will not negatively impact their immigration status. Individuals with questions about how the use of public benefits may or may not impact their immigration status are encouraged to consult resources on public charge from the Protecting Immigrant Families (PIF) Michigan Campaign.

Individuals who are eligible for newly expanded healthcare access can find out more about the new policy and how it may affect their family by visiting MIRC's website: bit.ly/MIRC_ICHIA.

The following individuals are eligible for the new expanded healthcare access:

- Lawful Permanent Residents and applicants for adjustment of status

with an approved visa and their family members granted status through the family unity program

- Citizens of Micronesia, the Marshall Islands, and Palau
- People lawfully present in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands or the American Samoa
- People with nonimmigrant visas who have not violated the terms of their status (like students, tourists, and visitors on business) (note: it is especially important that people in non-immigrant statuses work with an attorney to determine whether using benefits may impact their status)
- Eligible parties hoping to enroll can start with Michigan's MIBRIDGES benefit-issuing website

- Refugees, asylees, and asylum applicants
- Applicants and people granted withholding of deportation or removal (under U.S. law or Convention Against Torture)

- Temporary Protected Status holders
- Deferred Enforced Departure holders
- People in deferred action status (including DACA recipients after Nov. 1, 2024)
- People who have or have applied to USCIS for Special Immigrant Juvenile Status
- Certain survivors of human trafficking
- People with eligibility letters from the Office on Trafficking in Persons
- Trafficking visa holders and derivative beneficiaries or those with approved prima facie case determination
- People who have been granted Continued Presence to support a prosecution
- Certain survivors of domestic violence (under VAWA)
- Approved VAWA self petition or prima facie case determination and their parents or children
- Approved application for VAWA cancellation of removal and their parents or children
- Certain victims of serious crimes
- U visa holders or those with approved bona fide determination deferred action
- Most parolees (where parole valid for at least 1 year)
- Certain longtime residents who have employment authorization, such as NACARA Cancellation applicants, and applicants for 245 adjustment, applicants for registration based on residence since 1972, and people under orders of supervision



GRCC and The Rapid team up to provide free rides for students and employees

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., August 15, 2024: Grand Rapids Community College and The Rapid have partnered to provide an all-access transit pass for active students and employees at Grand Rapids Community College, beginning August 26, 2024. This partnership provides a sustainable option to reduce transportation costs and barriers to accessing a college education.

The one-year pilot program allows GRCC students who are enrolled and attending class in a given semester, as well as all employees, to ride The Rapid at no cost to the individual. The Rapid offers 28 fixed routes, 2 BRT lines, and serves 185 square miles.

"We recognize that many of our students face challenges in accessing essentials like food, housing and transportation. Providing cost free access to The Rapid is a meaningful step toward equity, removing barriers to education," said GRCC President Charles W. Lepper. "By supporting our students and staff, we contribute to a stronger, more successful community."

Students will request a new Wave card for each semester they are enrolled in and will be able to ride from the first day of their first

class in the semester the last day of the semester. Employee Wave cards are valid for up to 12 months. This partner Wave card allows both students and employees to ride the bus with the cost of the fare being paid for by the college.

"We are proud to expand our partnership with Grand Rapids Community College - access to employment and education changes outcomes. This initiative aligns with our commitment to provide reliable, convenient, and sustainable transportation options across our community. By creating this expanded partnership, we are not only supporting education but also contributing to the overall success of our community," said The Rapid CEO Deb Prato.

To access this benefit, students and employees will submit an online form requesting a Wave card to GRCC's Office of Student Life & Conduct. They then will be notified of when they can pick up their Wave card to ride The Rapid. Students and employees will need to show identification such as a Raidercard, driver's license or passport to receive a Wave card. The GRCC's Office of Student Life & Conduct is located in the Student Center at 122 Lyon St. NE in Grand Rapids.

Tiny South American deer debuts at Bronx Zoo

NEW YORK, Aug 15, 2024 (AP) — A tiny South American deer that will weigh only as much as a watermelon when fully grown is making its debut at the Queens Zoo in New York City.

The southern pudu fawn weighed just 2 pounds (just under 1 kilo) when it was born June 21, the Wildlife Conservation Society, which runs New York City's zoos, said in a news release Thursday. It is expected to weigh 15 to 20 pounds (7 to 9 kilograms) in adulthood.

The southern pudu, one of the world's smallest deer species, is listed as near threatened by the International Union for Conservation of Nature. It is native to Chile and Argentina, where its population is decreasing

because of factors including development and invasive species.

The Queens Zoo breeds southern pudus in collaboration with other zoos in an effort to maintain genetically diverse populations, the conservation society said. Eight pudu fawns have been born there since 2005.

The newborn fawn will share a Queens Zoo habitat with its parents. There are two more pudus at the conservation society's Prospect Park Zoo in Brooklyn.

Fun Facts about Southern Pudus

1. They are often called "miniature deer" due to their tiny size.

2. They are very playful, and will run, skip, and fight playfully with one another. They scrape their teeth and rub their antlers

on trees and certain plants.

3. They are nicknamed "whistling deer" because of their high-pitched whistle used for communication.

4. They are exceptional jumpers and can leap over obstacles with ease.

5. They are excellent swimmers.

6. Southern Pudus are skilled at camouflage.

7. Due to their small size, they often have to stand on their hind legs to reach higher vegetation.

8. They are able to last for long periods without drinking, as they obtain most of the water they need from succulent plants.



DID YOU KNOW?

Ohio: Voter registration age is 18 years old by November 2024. Applications must be received or postmarked 30 days before Election Day. If the voter registration deadline falls on a day when office of the Secretary of State and county board of elections are closed, the deadline is extended to the next business day when the office is open.

Michigan: Voter registration is 16+ years . You must be 18 years old to vote. Applications must be postmarked or received by the 15th day before Election Day. In person registration at the city or township clerk’s office is available within 14 days prior to and on Election Day with proof of residency.

Your numbers can make a real difference in the outcome of elections, especially local elections. But you can’t vote if you’re not registered. Young people who aren’t on the voter rolls are politically invisible to politicians and campaigns who have no way to reach them and learn what they care about. By running a drive you increase the number of teens who will make their voices heard.

FACT FOCUS: Trump blends falsehoods and exaggerations at rambling NJ press conference

Aug 15, 2024 (AP): Former President Donald Trump on Thursday gave his second news conference in as many weeks as he adjusts to a newly energized Democratic ticket ahead of the Democratic National Convention.

At his New Jersey golf club, the Republican nominee blended falsehoods about the economy with misleading statements and deeply personal attacks about his Democratic opponent, Vice President Kamala Harris.

Here's a closer look at the facts.

Inflation did not take the toll Trump claimed. Growth surged under Biden

TRUMP: "As a result of Kamala's inflation, price hikes have cost the typical household a total of \$28,000. ... When I left office, I left Kamala and crooked Joe Biden a surging economy and no inflation. The mortgage rate was around 2%. Gasoline had reached \$1.87 a gallon. ... Harris and Biden blew it all up."

THE FACTS: Trump made numerous economic claims that were either exaggerated or misleading. Prices did

surge during the Biden-Harris administration, though \$28,000 is far higher than independent estimates. Moody's Analytics calculated last year that price increases over the previous two years were costing the typical U.S. household \$709 a month. That would equal \$8,500 a year.

Separately, the U.S. economy was growing quickly as it reopened from COVID in 2020, as Trump's term ended, and it continued to do so after Biden took office. Growth reached 5.8% in 2021, Biden's first year in the White House, as the rebound continued, faster than any year that Trump was in office. Mortgage rates were low when Trump left because of the pandemic, which caused the Federal Reserve to cut its key rate to nearly zero. Gas prices fell as the economy largely shut down and Americans cut back sharply on their driving.

'Foreign born' is not the same as 'migrants'

TRUMP: "Virtually 100% of the net job creation in the last year has gone to migrants."

THE FACTS: This is a misinterpretation of government jobs data. The

figures do show that the number of foreign-born people with jobs has increased in the past year, while the number of native-born Americans with jobs has declined. But foreign-born is not the same as "migrants" -- it would include people who arrived in the U.S. years ago and are now naturalized citizens.

In addition, the data is based on Census research that many economists argue is undercounting both foreign- and native-born workers. According to a report by Wendy Edelberg and Tara Watson at the Brookings Institution released this week, native-born employment rose by 740,000 in 2023, while foreign-born rose by 1.7 million. Much of the disparity reflects the fact that the native-born population is older than the foreign-born, and are more likely to be retired. In addition, the unemployment rate for native-born Americans is 4.5%, lower than the 4.7% for foreign-born.

A thief is not allowed to steal up to \$950

TRUMP: "You're al-



her current campaign that she is in favor of defunding law enforcement.

The Biden administration tried to overhaul policing, but the legislation stalled on Capitol Hill, and Biden ultimately settled for issuing an executive order. It also pumped more money into local departments.

Trump did not win Pennsylvania in 2020

TRUMP: "I won Pennsylvania and I did much better the second time. I won it in 2016, did much better the second time. I know Pennsylvania very well."

THE FACTS: False. Trump did win the state in 2016, when he beat Democrat Hillary Clinton to win the presidency. But he lost the state in 2020 to President Joe Biden, a Pennsylvania native. According to the official certified results, Biden and Harris received 3.46 million votes, compared to Trump and Vice President Mike Pence with 3.38 million votes, a margin of about 80,000 votes.

Oil production in U.S. hit record under Biden

Trump says he will bring energy prices down by reversing President Joe Biden's policy of encouraging renewable energy at the expense of fossil fuels.

TRUMP: "We're going to drill baby drill, we're going to get the energy prices down, almost immediately."

THE FACTS: Oil production in the U.S. hit an all-time high under Biden's administration.

The U.S. Department of Energy reported in October that U.S. oil production hit 13.2 million barrels per day, passing a previous record set in 2020 by 100,000 barrels. Department statistics also show that the U.S. has produced more crude oil per year than any other nation — for the past six years.

Economy has shown recent signs of strength, not evidence of collapse

TRUMP: "We're going to have a crash like the 1929 crash if she gets in."

not evidence that America is on the edge of economic collapse.

On Thursday the S&P 500 jumped 1.6%, its sixth gain in a row. The Dow Jones Industrial Average also increased Thursday, as did the Nasdaq composite.

Recent economic reports show that shoppers increased their retail spending last month and fewer workers sought unemployment benefits.

Fears the economy was slowing emerged last month following a sharp drop in hiring and higher unemployment rates. But those worries were assuaged earlier this month when better-than-expected jobless numbers led to Wall Street's best rally since 2022.

Harris was not named border 'czar'

TRUMP: "She was the border czar but she didn't do anything. She's the worst border czar in history. ... She was the person responsible for the border and she never went there."

THE FACTS: Biden tapped Harris in 2021 to work with Central American countries to address the root causes of migration and the challenges it creates. Illegal crossings are one aspect of those challenges, but Harris was never assigned to the border or put in charge of the Department of Homeland Security, which oversees law enforcement at the border.

Black unemployment is lower under Biden

TRUMP: "The Black population had the best numbers they've ever had on jobs, on income, on everything. The Hispanic population had the best numbers."

THE FACTS: It's true that Black and Hispanic unemployment fell to then-record lows under Trump, but that was upended by COVID. When Trump left office, Black unemployment had soared to 9.3% and Hispanic unemployment to 8.5%. Under Biden, Black unemployment fell to a new record low of 4.8% in April 2023, while Hispanic unemployment in September 2022 matched the all-time low of 3.9% it had reached under Trump.

lowed to rob a store as long as it's not more than \$950. ... If it's less than \$950 they can rob it and not get charged."

THE FACTS: Trump was referring to regulations in California that allegedly allow for theft under \$950. But his claim is not correct — a 2014 proposition modified, but did not eliminate, sentencing for many non-violent property and drug crimes.

Proposition 47 raised the minimum dollar amount necessary for theft to be prosecuted as a felony, instead of a misdemeanor, from \$400 to \$950.

Alex Bastian, then-special adviser to Los Angeles District Attorney George Gascón, who co-authored Prop 47, told The Associated Press in 2021 that the minimum was raised "to adjust for inflation and cost of living," but that most shoplifting cases were already prosecuted as misdemeanors any since they didn't exceed \$400.

Prop 47 was enacted to comply with a 2011 U.S. Supreme Court order, which upheld that the state's overcrowded prisons violated incarcerated individuals' Eighth Amendment rights against cruel and unusual punishment. It instructed California to reduce its state prison population by 33,000 individuals within two years.

Harris has not said in this campaign she wants to defund police

TRUMP, on Harris: "You know, she wants to defund the police."

THE FACTS: Harris expressed praise for the "defund the police" movement after the murder of George Floyd in 2020, questioning whether money was being effectively spent on public safety. However, she has not said during

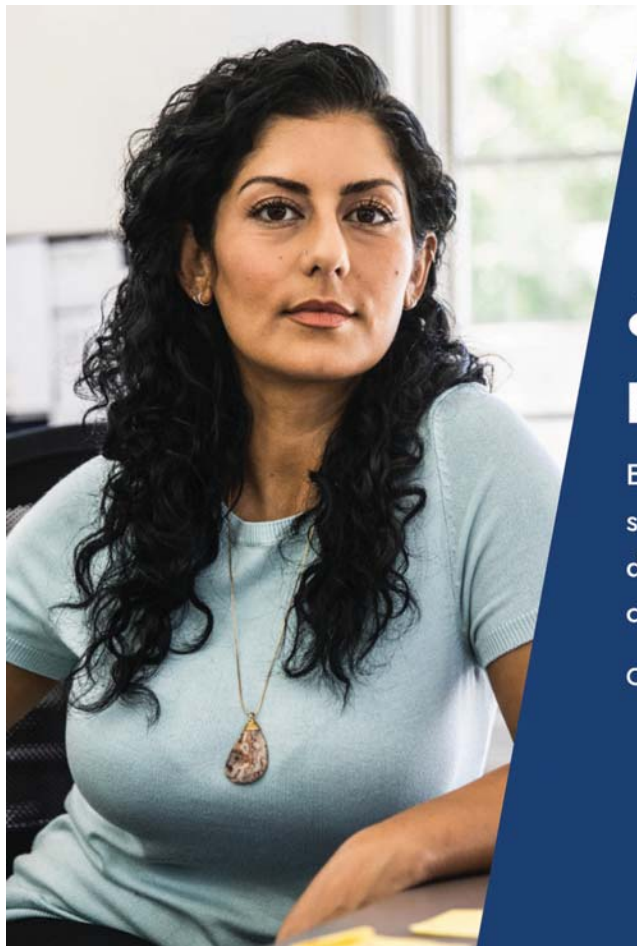
