



Cuyahoga County hurriedly switching to new voting system

Associated Press Writer CLEVELAND, Jan. 3, 2008 (AP): Cuyahoga County will be one of two counties in Ohio and possibly the largest one in the country to use a voting system for its 2008 primary in which all of the paper ballots are counted at

one location. The county is hurriedly switching from electronic touch-screen machines to an optical-scan system for the March 4 primary after prod-ding from Secretary of State Jennifer Brunner, who con-siders the optical-scan machines to be more secure. Ballots also would be counted in a central location, rather

than at the precinct level.

Van Wert County on the state's western edge also is state's western edge also imoving to an optical-scan system for March, and Brunner wants all 55 other counties that use touch screens to switch by Novem-ber—at an estimated cost of \$31 million.

With more than 1 million registered voters, Cuyahoga County, which includes Cleveland, dwarfs many oth-ers that use a system in which paper ballots are filled out by voters then returned to a cen-tral location—the Board of Election's warehouse on East 40th Street-to be scanned

40th Street—to be scanned and counted.

"Some people are kind of scratching their heads and wondering. Why the central count?" said Merle King, executive director of the Center for Election Systems at Kennesaw State University in Georgia.

Most of the counties that use a central count optical-scan system tend to be smaller, said Kim Brace of Election Data Services, a consulting firm that tracks voting statistics.

In a precinct count system, ballots are scanned at the polling location and vot-ers are be notified if they overvoted or undervoted in any race—so-called "secondchance voting."

Brunner said there wasn't

enough time for Cuyahoga to use a precinct-based system in March, but that it will be considered for the Novem-

ber election.

Many voting problems were reported in Ohio in the 2004 race between President Bush, a Republican, and Democrat John Kerry, including the accuracy of vote to-tals in precincts using elec-tronic machines. Kerry con-ceded the election after narrowly losing Ohio's 20 elecvotes.

In Nebraska, about 30 percent of the 93 counties use a central count optical-scan system, said David Phipps, election commissioner for Douglas County, which is home to Election Systems & Software, the company that Cuyahoga County plans to purchase its new system from.

Phipps believes that counting the ballots at one location allows elections officials to control the process and make sure it's done accurately.

He acknowledged that a central count system doesn't allow for second-chance vot-ing, but he doesn't believe that

undermines voters' rights.
"It's just a matter of voter education," Phipps said. "We make steps to make sure voters pay attention and ask for a new ballot if you vote incorrectly."
The American Civil Liber-

ties Union of Ohio has threat-ened to sue Cuyahoga County over the lack of sec-ond-chance voting in the new system. But Brunner says that Cuyahoga will follow the Help American Vote Act of 2002, which requires that



"If the ACLU says that's not good enough, they're essentially saying HAVA is unconstitutional," Brunner said. "If they decide to make Cuyahoga County a test case, I think they're doing a huge disservice to Cuyahoga County

With about 300,000 reg-istered voters, Douglas County in Nebraska has less than one-third the voters of Cuyahoga County. During the 2004 presidential elec-tion, it had about 99 percent of the ballots counted by 1 a.m., Phipps said. Douglas County does a midday pickup of ballots and begins scanning them before polls close, something Brunner, a Democrat, wants the Republican-controlled Ohio Legislature to approve.

Cuyahoga County's results will likely come much later, and officials have alwarned that voters won't know the outcome be-fore they go to bed on election night.

Commissioner Tim Hagan believes the optical-scan sys-tem is more transparent and has a paper trail, qualities that are more important than speedy results.

Commissioners still must approve the purchase of the new system, which will be \$1 million to \$3 million for the March primary and \$10 million by the November elec-

tion.
"All of these systems are flawed," Hagan said. "All of these new technologies are questionable, as is the one we are going to adopt. There's no question about that. I think it's less questionable. It's not

a perfect system."

Obama y Huckabee ganan internas en Iowa

DES MOINES, Iowa, el 3 de enero de 2008 (AP): El senador *Barack Obama* ganó las asambleas partidarias de Iowa el jueves por la noche, desplazando a *Hillary* despiazando a Hillary Rodham Clinton al tercer lugar en la primera etapa de la contienda por la candidatura demócrata en el 2008. Mike Huckabee, montado en una ola de apoyo de cristianos evangélicos, ganó las asambleas ganó las republicanas.

Obama, que intenta ser el primer presidente negro de Estados Unidos y que se presentó como un apóstol del cambio en Washington, tenía el 37% de los votos demócratas. El ex senador John Edwards, candidato a parecía encaminado al segundo lugar, relegando a la ex primera dama Clinton a un cercano tercer sitio.

Obama, de 46 años y senador por el estado de Illinois, dijo ante un ruidoso mitin que su triunfo muestra que en "las grandes ciudades y los poblados pequeños, ustedes salieron juntos para decir: 'Somos una nación, somos un pueblo y ha llegado nuestro momento para el cambio"

Dos senadores demócratas, Chris Dodd y Joe Bidden, se retiraron el jueves de la lucha debido a los pobres resultados que obtuvieron. "Esta noche me retiro de

la campaña presidencia, pero quiero garantizarles que no estamos terminando esta competencia con la cabeza gacha, sino con la frente en alto", dijo Dodd el jueves por la noche, a un centenar de simpatizantes.



Se esperaba que Biden anunciara su decisión de retirarse de la contienda en su mitin de campaña en Des Moines, de acuerdo con asesores que hablaron a condición de guardar el

anonimato.

El margen de victoria de Huckabee era mayor al 34% contra el 25% de Romney, en tanto el ex senador Fred Thompson y el senador John McCain disputaban el tercer

puesto.

"Se requiere un nuevo día en la política estadounidense, así como se requiere un nuevo día en el gobierno estadounidense", dijo Huckabee, ex gobernador de Arkansas, ante sus seguidores que lo vitoreaban. 

DALLAS, Dec. 29, 2007 the country has ex-(AP): Because everybody in ceeded all previous Texas "has felt the tidal wave of his presence," the undocumented immigrant has been named the Texan of the Year

by The Dallas Morning News. "We can't seem to live with him and his family, and if we can live without him, nobody's figured out how," the story posted on The Dallas Morning News Web site on Saturday said.

The newspaper identified undocumented immigration as perhaps the largest story in the nation and in the state in 2007. Texas' immigrant population has increased nearly 33 percent since 2000, according to an analysis of government data by the Washington-based Center for Immigration Studies.

In that period, the number of total immigrants entering



As ICE agents continued their work, Arkansas legislators held a series of hearings looking over the costs of undocumented immigration. The hearings came after legislative session that saw one bill become law that mentioned undocumented immigration, targeting state contractors.

An August report to Arkansas lawmakers found the state paid about \$170 million a year to educate, imprison, or provide services to immigrants. The majority of that-about \$154 million-went toward education programs, many of them federally mandated.

That countered an April study by the Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation that found state manufacturers and other companies would lose about \$1.4 billion in production a year and pay \$95 million more



documented immigrants left Arkansas' work force.

As Arkansas looked over statistics, harsher laws against undocumented immigration in Tennessee and Oklahoma took effect. Arizona's harsher anti-undocumented immigrant law took effect January 1, 2008. In short, for migrants, Oklahoma is not OK, it is arid in Arizona. and there is no tenure in Tennessee.

A group called the Arkansas Friendship Coalition, including representatives from Alltel Corp., Tyson Foods Inc. and Stephens Inc., as well as the American Civil Liberties Union, announced in October it would try to stop any state or local legislation targeting undocumented immigration.



Businesses that cater to Latinos say profits are dropping due to Raids

OKLAHOMA CITY, trying to sell the Dec. 29, 2007 (AP): Some south Oklahoma City businesses with a connection to the Latino community have seen a drop in profits since a sweeping anti-undocumented immigration law took effect.

Grider Food Stores, which is a major distributor of Latino foods, had a reported sales decline of more than \$500,000 during the last three months. Business at Carnicería El Torito, a meat purveyor, has been off about 30 percent since House Bill 1804 took effect on Nov. 1,

2007 "It's been real low for three months now, and it's getting worse," said El Torito's co-owner, Javier Ramierez. "Everybody said business is low everywhere. It's because there's not too much work right now and people are leaving the state."

He said the owners are

Cornejo, the owner of El Mana Panadería bakery, said that because sales have dropped 50 percent during the last two months, he has had to let go of three employees, keeping only two. To make up the slack, he is working

Among other things, the new law makes it illegal to knowingly transport undocumented immigrants, creates barriers to hiring undocumented immigrants and requires proof of citizenship to receive certain government benefits. It was considered the most stringent anti-undocumented immigration law in the United States until Arizona passed a harsher law, becoming effective on January 1, 2008.

A federal judge in Tulsa twice has dismissed a challenge to the law filed by the



National Coalition of Latino Clergy, and now

states are discussing implementing measures similar to the Oklahoma

"We are definitely being affected by this law," said Felix Perretti, a board member of the Greater Oklahoma City Hispanic Chamber of Commerce and the owner of Mueblería La Popular Furniture. "We are struggling."

He said his business declined by 10 percent in November

Mike Means, the executive vice president of the Oklahoma State Home Builders Association, said state homebuilders have lost about 10 percent of their work force since the law took effect.

Granholm signs bill creating task force to develop recommendations on transportation needs, funding

LANSING: Governor Jennifer M. Granholm has signed into law legislation that establishes a task force and a citizen's advisory committee to make recommendations on alternatives for funding transportation in Michigan. The task force is expected to complete a preliminary report by the end of October, which may include an implementation plan to test alternatives to the fuel tax. A final report is due by April 1, 2009.

"Transportation and infrastructure are critical to our ability to transform Michigan's economy and create jobs," Granholm said. "We are going to work through all of the issues surrounding our transportation system, including the issues of funding, so we can move Michigan forward."

Under Public Act 221 of 2007, the 13-member task force will include nine citizens representing the manufacturing, labor, commerce, transportation, agriculture, public transit, tourism, and aviation sectors. The task force will also include the majority and minority leaders of the Senate, and the Speaker and minority leader of the House of Representatives, or their designees. The task force will study the state's transportation needs and finances, including an examination of alternatives to the fuel tax, an analysis of the feasibility of those alternatives, and a recommendation on alternative user fees or non-user taxes.

The task force is likely to offer recommendations on changes to fees and taxes, as well as the distribution of transportation revenues for road, public transit, and aviation.



When the task force offers its report in October, the report may include recommendations for pilot programs to test feasible alternatives to the fuel tax. The task force will evaluate the potential of alternative strategies to replace or supplement the 19-cent state gas tax and will focus on technical strategies to put in place user or non-user payfunding methods.

Granholm will also appoint an 18-member citizens advisory committee to comment on the information submitted to the task force



Head-on collision kills 5, including infant

TOLEDO, Dec. 31, children from the minivan 2007 (AP): A head-on collision between a pickup truck going the wrong way on an interstate and a minivan killed five people in the minivan, including an infant, a fire department spokesman said Monday.

The accident occurred late Sunday night when the minivan, traveling in the southbound lanes on Interstate 280 near the I-75 interchange, collided with the truck, going north in the southbound lanes, assistant fire chief Luis Santiago said.

Bits of gift wrap and toys were strewn about the highway, suggesting the minivan was carrying a family heading home from the holidays, Santiago said.

"It was among the worst I've seen," he said of the crash scene.

The infant killed in the crash was about 6 months old, Santiago said. A woman and three children were pronounced dead at the scene: Bethany Griffin, 36, Jordan Griffin, 10, Lacie Burkman, 7, and Haley Burkman, 10.

A man and two other

were taken to St. Vincent Mercy Medical Center with life-threatening injuries, Santiago said.

Danny Griffin, Jr., 36, of Parkville, Md., was listed in serious condition: Sidney Griffin, 8, also of Parkville, was in critical condition; and Beu Burkman, 8, was evaluated and then released, a hospital spokeswoman said.

All eight had been visiting family in Michigan and were returning to Maryland.

The driver of the pickup-Michael Gagnon of Adrian, Michigan-was also taken to an area hospital, but his injuries did not appear to be serious, Santiago said.

The 24-year-old Adrian man - whose records showed he had a blood alcohol level of 0.254 percent, more than three times the Ohio legal limit of 0.08 percent - was charged with five counts of aggravated vehicular homicide and he was lodged in the Lucas County Correction Center upon his release from the hospital.

Bodies of 4 slain Mexican workers are being returned to México

CINCINNATI, Dec. 28, 2007 (AP): The bodies of four Mexican construction workers who were beaten and stabbed in the heart in their suburban apartment have been released to be returned to México.

About 100 people attended a funeral service Thursday night at St. Charles Hispanic Minis-try for the men, who had been dead more than a week when their bodies were found Dec. 13.

It was several days later when the men were identified by Hamilton County coro-ner as brothers Manuel

Davila Dueñas, 31, and José de Jesús Davila Dueñas, 21: Lino Guardado Davila, 45; and Manuel López Guardado, 21.
All were from the town of

Zacatón in the northern Mexican state of San Luis

When you have not one but four men killed with such brutality, it shakes your faith in humanity," said Rodney Galloway, a funeral director with Walker Funeral Home. "You wonder what's going on in our world."

Police in Sharonville, where the men lived in the Timber Ridge Apartments, have not released a motive for the slayings. Relatives in México said the men had withdrawn a large amount of money to take with them when they returned to México to be with their families for Christmas.

No identification was found in the sparsely furnished apartment the men shared, police said, and there was only one wallet

containing \$1,300. "We're still working on it," Sharonville police spokesman Lt. John Cook said of the investigation Friday. "We're making progress."

Latin Colors

Latin Jazz Review for 2007

Latin Jazz is, if possible, more vibrant, more fertile than ever. During 2007, some great new releases joined the permanent canon of this rich branch of the diverse music

we call jazz.
1. Bobby Sanabria - Big Band Urban Folktales (Jazzheads Records). For many, Sanabria's is the disc of the year. The grammyGrammy-nominated date is a completely new thing, even for the veteran leader. Whether showing off a pair of virtuoso trumpeters, showcasing Peter Brainin's soprano horn, or creating a lush setting for Charenee Wade's vocals, musical director Sanabria is relentless in his innovations. And for good measure, he shows his own instrumental chops with a masterful variation on the blues on "Blues for Booty Shakers.'

If you were fortunate to attend last year's 12th Annual Leadership Conference in Elyria, Ohio, you would have met and savored Sanabria. See La Prensa's "Bobby Sanabria to join Navarrette in CHIP's conference," which can be viewed online at: http:// www.laprensatoledo.com/ Stories/2007/042707/ CHIPS.htm

2. Marlon Simon and the Nagual Spirits - In Case You Missed It (Jazzheads Records). This release establishes the Simon brothers pianist Edward, trumpeter Michael, and percussionist Marlon – as brilliantly gifted siblings the equal of the famed Marsalis clan. The opening track, "Overture," features Marlon's brilliant arrange-ment for vocals and a string quartet, and it lets us know right away that we are in the presence of something special. This track establishes a mood of sweeping brilliance that pervades the recording.

The next cut, the title track, proves establishes that the band can also swing as hard as necessary, blazing through

the Afro-Cuban rhythms at the core of Marlon's inventive arrangement. There are virtuoso performances throughout, on tunes of any tempo and coloration, from the funky line of "Home Cooking" (written by the late pianist Hilton Ruiz) to the gentle "Huele a Peligro (with a gorgeous solo by saxophonist Peter Brainin), to the intricate, snaking lines of "Manicero." This is a great recording.

3. Mark Weinstein, Con Alma (Jazzheads Records) The trombonist and arranger Mark Weinstein has been drawn to Latin jazz since the 1960s. After forty years, it seems he wanted to explore the form without the familiar staples of strong brass and layered percussion.

In this striking recording, Weinstein even abandons his trombone, opting for flutes soprano, alto, and bass. And to aid his journey, he recruits the great Latin bassist Santi Debriano, the drummer Maurcio Herrera, the conga master Pedrito Martínez, and the pianist Mark Levine. The opening track, "Santi's Africaleidescope," is a stunner, weaving Debriano's bass, the leader's nearly atonal flute work, and Levine's powerful piano. Herrera and Martínez bring amazing rhythmic skill and diversity to Wayne Shorter's "Fee Fi Fo Fum." The whole band gives Coltrane's late masterpiece, "Crescent," a marvelous facelift.

4. John Santos Quintet, Papa Mambo (Machete Records). The percussionist Santos led the great Machete Ensemble for twenty years. When it dissolved last year, Santos chose to replace his big band with a quintet. And what a band this is: Santos is joined in percussion duties by the great Orestes Vilato, who focuses on timables and bongos. John Calloway is on flute, Marco Díaz on piano, and Saul Sierra on bass. Trumpeter Ray Vega guests

on a couple of tunes, including the title track, a tribute to the late Cuban bassist Cachao. A variety of guest vocalists and musicians enrich the proceedings

5. Pacquito D'Rivera Quintet?, Funk Tango (Sunnyside Records) Nearly thirty years ago, D'Rivera won one his first Ggrammy, for "Irakere." Ever since, the Cuban multi-reed great has been working on the forefront of music, unconstrained by genre. His newest release is characteristically eclectic, full of international flavors, shifting poly-rhythms, and brilliant soloists. Notable here is the Latin-inflected version of Coltrane's classic "Giant Steps," Hector Del Curto's bandoneon on "Revirado," and the leader's jaw-dropping work on the

6. Roswell Rudd and Yomo Toro, El Espiritu Jibaro (Soundscape). The trombonist Roswell Rudd has been on the front line of the jazz avant-garde for his en-tire career, and he has displayed a life-long fascination with ethnology and world music. In this far-out recording, Rudd brings his vast skill and his penchant for free playing atonality to Latin music, in the company of the Puerto Rican guitarist Yomo Toro (known here and there as "the Puerto Rican Jimi Hendrix," a moniker that, if nothing else, conveys his astonishing facility on all manner of string instruments, including the various types of the *cuatro*, the national instrument of Puerto Rico) This recording brings these two whirlwinds together, and places them in a wide variety of diverse settings. The highlight of this exceptional date is "Preludio," in which the pair displays a supernatural empathy.

Author's Note: We are strong and resilient. We en-dure difficult times of war, poverty, and loss, and we emerge from these times with our spirits intact - older, possibly wiser, and hopeful. When we reach the end of a trying year, we take a longing look backwards to find the things that helped us

through. Always for me these things include the soundtrack of the year, a blend of familiar old favorites and the new releases that have joined the list of indispensable music that I'll take to the New Year. ¡Prospero Año Nuevo, 2008!

The notion of jazz history, in any formal sense, is problematic, since the best recordings are timeless, tied not so much to time and place as to personal and collective inspiration, which, like all thunderclaps of genius, defy tidy explanation. Jazz is marked, at once, both by limitless innovation and enormous discipline, and it is this tension-between the individual and the group, between form and inventionthat makes jazz such a source of boundless fascination. And joy."



Coach who won 310 games, three state championships dies at age 91

CLEVELAND, Jan. 1, 2008 (AP): Augie Bossu, who won three state football championships at Benedictine High School and was once the winningest high school coach in state history, has

Bossu died Tuesday morning at his home in suburban Maple Heights, according to St. John Fu-neral Home. He was 91. No cause of death was available.

Bossu coached Benedictine from 1955 until 1994, winning state champi-onships in 1973, 1980 and 1981 when the Bengals posted a 13-0 record, one of three teams coached by Bossu that was unbeaten and untied. The Bengals also were voted The Associated Press state champions in 1957 before the state's play-

off system was put in place. When he stepped down in 1994, he had a record of 310-130-20 that included a

33-18-3 mark at Cathedral Latin and 2-3-2 at Mineola (N.Y.) Chaminade. The 310 wins now ranks fifth in state

history.

He also had a record of 681-300 as the school's baseball coach.

He was inducted into the National High School Sports Hall of Fame in Kansas City, Mo., in 1988.

Quinceañera tradition gets a modern twist

HOUSTON (AP): In June of 2007, looking every bit the Cinderella in a glittering tiara and an ivory sparkled gown, Samantha Marie Lynch entered center stage in a pale blue carriage pulled by four groomsmen.

As the music swelled, lyrics to a popular ballad filled the air: "Some people wait a lifetime for a moment like this."

Samantha glided across the dance floor. One arm was outstretched, and her head tilted gracefully to one side. "I can't believe it's happening to me."

It seemed like the perfect start to a traditional quinceañera—the coming-of-age ritual for Latinas that is equal parts 15th birthday party and debutante ball.

But this was tradition with a twist: The father-daughter dance would abruptly morph into a laugh-filled parody of "Saturday Night Fever." And the baile sorpresa (the surprise dance) would be an enthusiastic, fleet-footed rendition from the musical "Grease."

Samantha is part of a growing number of girls who are helping to create a modern brand of quinceañera s that reflect a new generation of Latina teenagers who are fusing U.S.-American style with Latino roots.

The updated parties keep many of the formal rituals-the presentation of high heels symbolizing entrance into womanhood, the honoring of the birthday girl's last doll and the crowning of quinceañera girl. But the centerpiece of the night is now a musical extravaganza performed by the girl and her "court" - ushers, or chambelanes, and maids of honor called damas. Once friends, the court now often includes teenage boys who are rented for the evening for their dancing skills.

The musical numbers, crafted by professional choreographers and requiring weeks of rehearsal, range from dance routines set to pop music such as Michael Jackson's "Thriller" or more risque spectacles with hip-hop and reggaeton soundtracks and moves cribbed from music videos.

There are costume changes, light shows and sometimes fireworks. The entire event can cost from \$5,000 to \$100,000.

And at the center of the production is the quince girl, a teenager starring in a show created just for her.

"The movements have gotten more commercial, more like what's on MTV. They want lifts. They want turns. Everything. They want smoke, lights," said Erika "Chucke" Peña, owner of Chucke's Choreography and one of the most sought-after quinceañera choreographers in Houston. "The clients that come here want a show. If not, they would have an aunt choreograph it."

Alexandria Macias's quinceañera cost \$14,000 and featured a combination musical theme of "Thriller," "Zoot Suit Riot" and a salsa remix of Carlos Santana's "Oye Como Va."

"I wanted something different, something unique where people would go 'wow!" Macias said.

The quinceañera tradition goes back hundreds of years, most likely rooted in Mayan and Aztec rites of passage which were blended with the pomp of Spanish court formalities, said Michaela Murphy, an editor at Quince Girl magazine. Each ritual _ the last doll, the waltz, the crown

and a special Mass _ represents an aspect of the transiton from childhood to adulthood.

"I'm always struck by how struck the girls are by this, how potent the experience is for them to have this ceremony that's so ritualized and in honor of them," said Murphy, who is based in Seattle. "You are the featured performer. You get to wear the prettiest dress. It really is a dream come true."

Over the years, quinceañeras in the United States adopted some aspects from their Anglo counterparts at 16. Some girls celebrate their quinceañera's on their 16th birthday, instead of the 15th. Others opt for a new car or a birthday cruise rather than the party.

But the trend of stylized choreography and specially trained dancers popped up only within the last two years, and can be traced to the influence of hip-hop and reggaeton music. Since then, the number of choreographers specializing in quinceañera s has quadrupled, Murphy said.

"The girls really want to put their own fingerprints on this quintessential cultural event," Murphy said. "They think the rituals are cool, but they want to marry it with who they are as contemporary American teenagers."

One of Peña's clients wanted to perform her traditional father-daughter waltz to the rap song, "This is Why I'm Hot." She got her wish, but only after Peña found a remix version of the song with a slower, more waltz-like rhythm—and without raunchy lyrics.

"It was very smooth, very nice. You've got to be careful because you've got grandmas there. You've got tias (aunts) there," said Peña. "They can get very offended if you do some-

thing wrong.

Another Houston choreographer, Erin Flores, noted that many girls want instrumental versions of R&B songs for their waltz or their entrance theme. An R. Kelly song called "I'm a Rinti' is especially popular these days, Flores said.

Flores and Peña both rent out chambelanes who are trained dancers. His dancers and choreographers specialize in flips, leaps and lifts.

"People are always looking for something different," said Flores, who began by choreographing quinceañera s for his cousins. "Girls are girls. They always want to outdo their friends' quinceañeras."

Alexandria's mother, Terry Macias, welcomed the addition of modern elements to the Latino tradition

"It's Mex-Tex—a Latino tradition, with a bit born here. It's wonderful to incorporate both sides," said Macias, whose parents couldn't afford a quinceañera for her. "But some of these youngsters are a little disrespectful, wearing little short skirts. I said we wouldn't do that. It's a special event, definitely a formal affair."

Both Flores and Peña say they try not to let glitz

edge out tradition.

"A quinceañera is only once," Peña said. "It's very important, especially to our culture. I try to keep that tradition alive without it being boring."

Most of the quince girls want the same thing. They may want to perform like J.Lo, but they dream of being presented like a princess.

"You only get a few moments in life that are all about you," Alexandria said. "I wanted everyone to realize that I'm growing up. I wanted that moment to be about me. And it was."

Samantha Lynch had long dreamed of being Cinderella. So, when it was time for her 15th birthday, she wanted to bring that fantasy to life—and add dancing that would make her guests stand up and applaud.

Her solution: a dualthemed quinceañera, where she would enter as Cinderella, then shed the gown to kick up her heels as the lead character from "Grease."

"I'm always a clown and I always like being the center of attention, so this is my chance to get out there and act the fool," Samantha joked a few days before her May 26th party.

The night, which cost about \$13,000, would be a fitting blend of the two sides of Samantha's heritage. Her father, who died when she was four, was Anglo. Her mother, Alma Lynch, is of Mexican descent.

During the formal presentations, Samantha was dressed in her ethereal ballgown and her tiara. Her chambelan fitted her with a glass slipper. She received a sash laden with 15 red flowers. Then, she was given her last doll—a teddy bear she has cherished since her toddler days.

A quick costume change later, Samantha and her court of eight couples reappeared dressed as the characters from "Grease." With a quick backwards flip and a wave, Samantha led her entourage in a rousing dance routine that included lots of twisting, hip-shaking and good-humored overacting.

"You're the one that I want ... ooo...ooo," Samantha lip-synched, as she pranced the dance floor in black leotard and shirt.

"It was fun," she said, a few breathless moments later. "I think it turned out exactly the way I wanted."

GuateMéxicoestadounidenses: as immigrants marry, new Latino identities emerge

Dec. 18, 2007 (AP): Santiago Chávez spotted Bibiana Arzeta at a Latin nightclub in Phoenix and asked her to dance.

Where are you from? Arzeta asked. México, Chávez replied.

Chávez gave Arzeta his phone number, and later, the two began talking regularly. That's when Arzeta, who is originally from Acapulco, noticed Chávez didn't speak Spanish with an accent like hers.

Where are you really from? Arzeta asked. This time, Chávez told the truth. Guatemala.

The couple now have a 1-month-old son, Leo. Their union represents an emerging demographic trend taking shape throughout the Southwest: Growing numbers of Guatemalan and Mexican immigrants are marrying and having U.S.-born children, creating mixed Latino families with ties to three countries at once.

These new inter-Latin American families are also less likely to return to their home countries, their children tend to integrate into U.S. society faster and more are converting from Catholicism to evangelical Christianity, immigration experts and community leaders say.

The mixture has become so common in Phoenix, for example, that some community members have even coined a name "GuateMéxicoestadounidenses;" or Guatemexiamericans, to describe the families.

The trend is being driven by an influx of immigrants from Central America, mainly Guatemala, who are settling in communities long dominated by Mexican immigrants, experts say. Although no specific data exists about the number of mixed Latino marriages, the trend is undeniable. As more Central Americans arrive, the more they meet and marry Mexicans.

"There is a great mixing taking place," said Nestor Rodríguez, a sociologist at the University of Houston who studies immigration trends. Latinos, he said, are becoming like other Americans with European ancestry, with ties not to a single nationality but many.

"If you ask an Anglo, where is your family from, they'll say something like, my mother is Irish, my father is German and my grandfather was Norwegian. The same thing is hap-

By DANIEL GONZALEZ pening to Latinos. One parent may be Mexican, the other Guatemalan, or Salvadoran or Honduran," Rodríguez added.

Newly arrived Guatemalan immigrants tend to settle in the same neighborhoods as Mexican immigrants. They also share the same language and similar cultures, so it's not surprising that more Guatemalans and Mexicans are marrying, said James Loucky, an anthropologist at Western Washington University, who studies Guatemalan migration.

Guatemalans, however, often pass themselves off as Mexicans in order to blend in, Loucky said.

'Guatemalans know that often times Mexicans look down on them," Loucky

Chávez, 24, said he fibbed about being Mexican when he met Arzeta because he thought it would make it easier to ask her out. Chávez speaks Spanish, but his first language is Mam, a language spoken by Mayan people from the highlands of western Guatemala. where he is from.

Chávez came to the United States in 2000 and works in the housing-construction industry building roof tresses.

Arzeta, 20, is from Acapulco. She has lived in the U.S. since she was 5 and grew up in a Mexican neighborhood in south Phoenix. After she became pregnant, Arzeta moved in with Chávez in a Phoenix neighborhood known for its high concentration of Guatemalan immigrants. Now, Arzeta is learning to say words like "ear" in Mam and cook Gua-

temalan food. In Arizona, a surge of Guatemalan immigrants have made them the secondlargest Latino immigrant group behind Mexicans, according to the Census Bureau. In 2006, there were about 14.100 Guatemalan immigrants living in Arizona, the bureau estimated. Guatemalan government officials, however, believe the number is at least double that.

There are 30,000 to 35,000 Guatemalan immigrants in Arizona, and about two-thirds live in the Phoenix area, said Oscar Padilla Lam, who runs the Guatemalan consulate in Phoenix. In contrast, there are more than 608,000 Mexican immigrants living in Arizona, according to 2006 estimates by the bureau.

Many of the Guatemalans coming to the U.S. are young single men looking for work. Many end up marrying Mexicans because there aren't as many Guatemalans, Padilla Lam

Many Latino immigrants come to the U.S. for work with the intention of returning someday to their home countries. But mixed Latino immigrant families are less likely to return home because it becomes difficult to pick one country over another, said Cecilia Meniivar, a sociologist at Arizona State University and an expert on Central American migration. She pointed out that little research has been done about mixed Latino families.

But she said it's possible that children of mixed Latino families may adopt American culture faster. Children from families where both parents share the same nationality tend to develop a "hyphenated" identity, for example, Mexican-American or Guatemalan-American, she said. But children of mixed Latino families have a harder time choosing, so they become more oriented toward American culture, making them more likely to be involved politically and civically down the road.

A higher proportion of Guatemalans also have converted from Catholicism to Evangelical Christianity than Mexicans. As more Guatemalan and Mexican immigrants intermarry, the number of Mexican evangelicals could go up, she said.

Joel Lugo coined the multicultural moniker GuateMéxicoestadounidenses about five years ago when he started meeting more families like his. Lugo, 44, a native of México, and his wife, Mayra, 38, a native of Guatemala, have been married for 20 years. They met when there were relatively few Guatemalans living in metro Phoenix. The couple now have four children ranging in age from 6 to 20.

Lugo, who owns a landscaping business, said he is raising his children to be American, but they maintain ties to both México and Guatemala.

Both Joel and Mayra were raised Catholic. They now attend an Evangelical Christian church with a mixture of Mexican and Guatemalan families.

"I see this mixture of Guatemalans and Mexicans more and more," Lugo said. "It's a nice mixture."

Googling and planning a wedding entirely online

(AP): My wedding felt like

a blind date.

Not with my groom, of course—that part looked familiar. But the rest—the village church with the bright orange walls, the better-than-the-pictures flowers, the 1960s-era organ—they were all nearly as new to me as they were to the 50 U.S.-Ameri-cans I had persuaded to come to Scotland for the event. I planned my wedding en-tirely online and lived to tell about it.

In fact, I'd recommend it. Not that it was perfect. Had I known about the orange walls, I might not have gone for purple kilts. But planning online, with a mix of shrewd, targeted research and aimless Googling, forced me to ac-cept something many brides don't realize until crunch

time: Perfection is overrated.
Couples spent nearly \$10
billion on "destination weddings" last year, according to Mintel, a market research firm in Chicago. No doubt much of this expense was justified with phrases like "you only do it once" and "most impor-

tant day of my life."

Still, these same people, like me, take sizable risks with the day and the cash. Many don't see the venue beforehand, and depend on online brochures for information. Forty-three percent rated wedding Web sites as influential in helping them pick a destination, Mintel found. More than 20 percent used social networking sites, like MySpace, and blogs.

Theresa DiMasi, editor-inchief of Conde Nast's Brides.com, says many of the 1 million visitors who come to that online site each month brochures for information.

to that online site each month are looking for inspiration and stay for research and community.
"I think the Internet gives

you much more opportunity and accessibility to information. You're a savvier shop-per. You can hear what other people have said about a ven-dor, or see people who have negotiated deals and learn from awful experiences other brides have had," DiMasi said, adding that most people leave the virtual world before

cutting a real check.

My fiancé and I would have if we could have. There are 5,000 miles and a wallet-busting 2-to-1 exchange rate between us in Las Vegas and his childhood home, Glasgow, our destination of choice. A planning expedition would have blown the budget

So my mother in Minnesota, my partner in planning, and I turned immediately to the Internet.

We started with long sessions on the phone, each at our respective computers, emailing links back and forth. A search for "Scotland wedding venue" would lead to a link to "Inverness castles." We stopped only when we wandered onto sites with tures of men dressed as William Wallace.

Her neck started to hurt

My cell phone bill skyrock-eted. I taught her how to use Instant Messenger. (Eventually, I taught her to use the space bar.)

It was slow. If something looked promising we would e-mail the venue, and often not hear back for days. We could discuss a site for hours, without having any idea about fees or availability.

There is another way, though I'm not convinced it's

a better one.
Online wedding clearinghouses such as TheKnot.com and Brides.com, offer a mix of planning tools, articles, and lists of ideas, registry help and vendor directories. Both sites have budget trackers that are far easier than an Excel spreadsheet and are accessible to anyone who knows your password, making it easy to share with, say, your mom. The scores of photos of dresses, flowers and place settings on these sites

can be habit-forming.

shows.php But the vendor directories are filled largely with paid advertisers in the United States—an obvious limitation for the bride wanting to go to an overseas or out-ofthe-mainstream location.

Lacey Collins, a 24-year-

old new bride from Sawyer, N.D., says she scanned Web sites for photographs and tips for traveling brides, but relied on a friend's recommendation when picking a hotel for her wedding in Puerto Vallarta, México.

"I really trust this friend," she said less than two weeks before the day. Still, she found herself combing the hotel review site Tripadvisor.com "probably weekly" for possible bad re-views or horror stories.

"I keep thinking, is it really that perfect? Or are these any that perfect? Of are these people just coming off this great time and writing great things?" Collins said. "How can it be this perfect?"

I know the feeling. When

we found our venue—a country estate with just enough

rooms to hold the Americans and within easy driving dis-tance of the Scottish relatives-I ramped into reporter

Trust, but verify.

I asked for more photos of the grounds, and got 37 back, with names and phone numbers of references. A good sign. I trolled a British wed-ding Web site— Confetti.co.uk—for reviews of my potential venue. Nothing. I happily discovered Indiebride.com, a site for anyone vaguely uncomfortable with the wedding indus-try. I was amused by the advice on how to tell your family you're eloping, and relieved to see that no one mentioned my Scottish estate on the site's chat page, "Kyetch."

Feeling 70 percent assured that I knew all I was going to know, and 30 percent desperate to make the decision and move on, we booked it.

And so went my planning. We relied heavily on the staff at the venue for recommen-dations, and then followed up with our own research.

A recommended wedding singer sounded lovely on the mp3 on her Web site, but we still asked her to sing a few selections a cappella into the telephone before we sent a check.

The florist and I landed on my bouquet through exchanges of photos by e-mail. (So that's what a thistle is!) We chose the wine from a list sent by the distributor, much of which I couldn't find in our local store. Sans tasting, we took a leap.

There were times, and that was one of them, when we felt we were missing out on some of the fun.

And there were times when the curiosity nearly killed me.

I would have paid too much for a photo of the inte-rior of the church that generously opened its doors to American strangers on a busy Saturday. The only one online was black and white. The Internet had its limits.

But had I found one. it might only have allowed me to believe that the church decor really mattered. Or-ange paint, it turns out, looks pretty good as a backdrop for photos.

Aside from the night I met my husband, it was the l blind date I've ever had.

Bilingual officers sue Houston over compensation

HOUSTON, Dec. 25, 2007 (AP): A group of 23 Latino police officers has filed a lawsuit, contending the officers are required to handle a disparate and increasing caseload because the department has failed to hire enough Spanishspeaking officers.

The officers are suing the city of Houston and Police Chief Harold Hurtt in federal court, seeking damages for unpaid over-time, lost wages and other compensation. They also want the city to hire more bilingual officers and add policies that will help the department tackle the volume of work requiring

Spanish-speaking officers. Officer *Gabe Ortiz*, a police spokesman, referred questions about the lawsuit to the city's legal de-partment, the *Houston* Chronicle reported.

The plaintiffs say there is a need for Spanishspeaking officers to investigate and handle crimes in which victims, witnesses or suspects speak only Spanish. Census figures indicate about 40 percent of Houston residents are Latino, including foreign and native

However, there isn't an adequate number of Latino and Spanish-speaking police officers on the force and only 2½ percent of Houston police captains are Latino, the lawsuit filed Friday alleges.

The shortage of bilingual officers leaves many Latino officers to handle far more work than their non-Spanish speaking counterparts but without compensation for the disparity, they allege. In some cases, Latino officer are paid even less then their other counterparts, the suit alleges.

For example, Houston established a police "Chicano Squad" as a support unit for crimes involving Spanish-speaking vic-tims, witnesses and suspects. Members of the unit are frequently asked to handle cases for other divisions, departments, and agencies and not paid for the additional work the lawsuit said.

Bilingual officers also are expected to provide special services such as Spanish interpreting and translation of notes and statements for a modest stipend that hasn't increased in decades. the plaintiffs say.

Houston police also have a longstanding policy of assigning Latino officers on-call duty during part of their time off, requiring them to work more than 40 hours a week without overtime pay, according to the lawsuit.
