Costa Rica: Chinchilla reparte agradecimientos por su triunfo

SAN JOSE, el 8 de febrero del 2010 (AP): Laura Chinchilla decidió dedicar el día posterior a su triunfo electoral a agradecer a su equipo de campaña y a la Virgen de los Angeles, y posteriormente colocó una ofrenda en la tumba de sus abuelos.

Chinchilla debutó como presidenta electa otorgando el lunes temprano varias entrevistas a medios locales e internacionales,

posteriormente visitó la sede de su comando de campaña, donde agradeció a sus más estrechos colaboradores el esfuerzo y sacrificio que hicieron, según comentó.

Por la tarde la presidenta electa viajó a Cartago, población a 22 kilómetros al este de la capital, en donde visitó la basílica para agradecer a la Virgen de los Angeles por su triunfo, v luego fue a un cementerio al sur de la capital

para depositar una ofrenda en la tumba de sus abuelos paternos

En Cartago la gente se volcó a las calles para recibir a Chinchilla, que repartió abrazos y besos y luego participó en una solemne misa presidida por el primer obispo, monseñor Francisco Ulloa.

"Usted se ha convertido en la primer ciudadana, por eso yo la quiero declarar a usted como hija predilecta de la Virgen María", afirmó el prelado católico.

Más tarde la mandataria electa dijo que "es un honor que mehizo (Ulloa), la verdad es que me emocionó. Yo creo que después de ayer (domingo) que el pueblo de Costa Rica me declaró la presidenta electa de este país, (las palabras del obispo han) sido lo más emocionante que me ha ocurrido".

"En honor a nuestras raíces espirituales es que hemos venido a visitar a la virgen y ahora en honor a nuestras raíces familiares vamos a visitar donde reposan nuestros antepasados", explicó.

Costa Rica elects 1st woman president in landslide Guevara, quickly conceded

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica, Feb. 8, 2010 (AP): Costa Ricans have elected their first woman president as the ruling party candidate won in a landslide after campaigning to continue free market policies in Central America's most stable nation

With most of the votes from Sunday's election counted, Laura Chinchilla held a 22-point lead over her closest rival. Her 47 percent share of the vote was well beyond the 40 percent needed to avoid a run-off.

The 50-year-old protege of the current president, Nobel Peace Prize laureate Oscar Arias, promised to pursue the same economic policies that recently brought the country into a trade pact with the U.S. and opened commerce with

"Today we are making history," said Chinchilla, who will be the fifth Latin American woman to serve as president when she takes office in May. "The Costa Rican people have given me their confidence, and I will not betrav it."

The closest contender, Otton Solis of the Citizens Action Party, got 25 percent of the votes. He and the other main rival. Libertarian Otto defeat. It was unclear, however, whether Chinchilla's National

Liberation Party would gain a majority in congress.

Analyst Heather Berkman of the Eurasia Group said coalition building without a maiority would likely delay or derail controversial fiscal reforms to shore up government finances and energy deregula-

The third-place candidate. Guevara, congratulated Chinchilla as "our president," but he also pointed out the new political muscle of his taxbashing Libertarian Movement Party. He won 21 percent of the vote.

Arias' economic policies helped insulate Costa Rica from the world economic crisis as he kept a high profile on the world stage as a negotiator in Honduras' political crisis after coup deposed President Manuel Zelaya in June.

Critics of the Arias government, in which Chinchilla served as vice president, contended its policies catered to big developers to boost the economy at the cost of the nation's fragile ecosystems.

But most Costa Ricans were reluctant to shake up the status quo in a country with relatively high salaries, the longest life expectancy in Latin America, a thriving ecotourism industry and near-universal literacy

Chinchilla, the mother of a teenage son, is a social conservative who opposes abortion and gay marriage. She appealed both to Costa Ricans seeking a fresh face and those reluctant to risk the unknown.

As a female president, she would follow an increasingly common trend in many Latin American countries: Nicaragua, Panama, Chile and Argentina have all elected women as presidents.

Alfredo Fernandez, 77. said he has always voted for the National Liberation Party, but this time his ballot was special.

"It is an honor to be able to have a woman president." he said

Even Costa Ricans on the margins of society backed Chinchilla.

Heizel Arias, a 24-yearold single mother voted at a prison where she is serving an eight-year drug smuggling sentence.

"I voted for Laura Chinchilla because she has promised to fight for women,"Arias said. "She was the only one who visited us and told us her plans and I believe in her.'

Inmigración aumenta salarios de estadounidenses, según estudio

NUEVA YORK, el 4 de febrero del 2010 (AP): Los trabajadores estadounidenses gozan de aumentos de sueldo modestos en comparación con los inmigrantes, pero estos últimos sufren importantes reducciones en sus salarios en comparación con los estadounidenses, según reportó un nuevo estudio.

El informe del Instituto de Política Económica (Economic Policy Institute, EPI por sus siglas en inglés) asegura que los nacidos en Estados Unidos no suelen sufrir los efectos negativos de las nuevas olas de inmigración porque no compiten con los inmigrantes por un empleo. Además, la nueva inmigración ha impulsado ligeramente sus salarios en los últimos años.

Los inmigrantes en Estados Unidos, sin embargo, tienen más posibilidades de competir directamente por un puesto de trabajo con inmigrantes

recién llegados.

"Los estadounidenses tienen razón en preocuparse por el declive en la calidad de los empleos durante las últimas décadas, pero este informe señala que, para los trabajadores estadounidenses, en todos los niveles educativos, la inmigración tiene muy poco que ver con eso", explicó Heidi Shierholz, autora del informe y economista del EPI.

El reporte señala que la llegada de 9,6 millones de inmigrantes entre 1994 y 2007 impulsó el salario semanal de los trabajadores estadounidenses en un 0,4%, o por 3,68 dólares, en comparación con el de los trabajadores extranjeros.

Esa ola de inmigración redujo en cambio los sueldos semanales de los inmigrantes en Estados Unidos por 4,6%, o 33,11 dólares, al compararse con los de los estadounidenses. Los autores del estudio

obtuvieron los datos del Departamento de Trabajo.

El estudio indicó además de los inmigrantes en Estados Unidos sufrieron recortes en sus salarios independientemente de su género o nivel educativo. oscilando en una reducción del sueldos del 2,5% para mujeres sin diplomas de bachillerato, a una del 7,1% para mujeres con un título universitario.

Shierholz insistió en que la inmigración podría tener un impacto mucho más beneficioso para la economía estadounidense si se reformara el sistema migratorio del país.

"Este informe indica que tenemos poco que temer, y mucho que ganar, si desarrollamos un sistema de inmigración más justo y más racional", dijo Shierholz.





New Puerto Rico Birth Certificate law passed

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Feb. 11, 2010: As reported in the Central Florida News, Puerto Rican-born citizens living in the United States will now have to request a new copy of their birth certifi-

The country's Gov. Luis Fortuño signed a law making all old birth certificates processed prior to December 2009 not valid in any federal agency.

A transition period will be in effect until July 1, 2010. The new law is an effort to reduce all fraud cases reported by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement in the past

Puerto Ricans born in the island receive a U.S. Social Security number and are eligible for a United States passport from birth.

Relatives in eastern Cuba say woman has turned 125

HAVANA, Feb. 9, 2010 (AP): Relatives in eastern Cuba claim to have held a 125th birthday party for a woman named Juana Bautista de la Candelaria Rodriguez, but it is not clear if she is really that old.

The state-run news agency Prensa Latina reported on the party last weekend in the city of Bayamo in Granma province, attended by Rodriguez's family, including 15 great-grand children and four greatgreat-grandchildren.

Prensa Latina said Rodriguez, known affectionately as "Candulia," is "presumably the oldest person on the planet, although that has not been

confirmed."

In a phone interview with Cuban media, Rodriguez said she was happy and looking forward to many great years ahead.

The agency added that civil registry documents confirm she was born on Feb. 2, 1885, in the village of Santa Rosa, where she continues to live.

The Guinness Book of World Records says it has never heard of the case.

"We currently have not received a claim relating to the individual," spokesman Philip Robertson told The Associated Press on Tues-

Robertson said Guinness gets claims via its Web site about once a week involv-

ing people who say they or someone they know have broken age records. After an especially old person's age is verified, or death is reported, the number of claims usually spikes.

He said the company only sends genealogists and other experts to trace family histories for the most promising reports, however, and few are authenticated.

Guinness is currently reviewing claims for the oldest living person after Georgia-native Gertrude Baines died last year at 115.

The highest fully authenticated age was 122 years, 164 days by Jeanne Louise Calment, who died in 1997 in Arles, France.

Obama to give Michigan spring commencement

DETROIT, Feb. 11, 2010 (AP): President Barack Obama is scheduled to deliver the spring commencement at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

The university says in a statement Thursday that Obama also will receive an honorary Doctor of Laws degree. The May 1 ceremony starts at 10 a.m. in Michigan Stadium. Degrees will be awarded to about 3,500 undergraduate students.

University president Dr. Mary Sue Coleman says Obama has "captured the imagination and enthusiasm of many students with his inspiring words of hope and change.'

The university says Obama will be the fourth sitting president to visit the Ann Arbor campus. Former President George H.W. Bush made the trip



in May 1991.

Former President Bill Clinton delivered the spring commencement speech in 2007.



UT expands HIV testing service to Main Campus

The University of Toledo's Ryan White Program will mark its 25th year of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) testing by expanding services to its Main Campus.

As of Monday, Feb. 15, community HIV testing will be offered one day each month on both campuses: the first Monday from 6 to 8 p.m. at the Ruppert Health Center, Health Science Campus, and the third Monday from 4 to 6 p.m. in the Student Medical Center, Main Campus.

All testing services are free and confidential. No appointments are necessary.

"The expansion to Main Campus is a modification of our services," said Ann Wayson Locher, RN, Ryan White Program coordinator. "For 25 years, we offered weekly testing on the Health Science Campus. As fundamental as this service has been, we felt the community's

need for an additional testing site is vital to our goal of providing early detection to as many people as we can."

UT's program was the first in northwest Ohio to offer free HIV testing at a time when public education was

"When we first began testing for HIV, we didn't know nearly as much as we do now," Locher said. "With early diagnosis and proper treatment, the majority of people who have HIV can manage it much in the way other chronic illnesses, such as diabetes, are managed. It isn't the death sentence it was in the early 1980s."

Early diagnosis is key. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 20 percent of the 1.1 million people who have HIV in the United States is unaware of infection. New infection is most common in people ages 13 to 29, followed closely by those ages and 40 to

formed using an oral swab, with results available in approximately 30 minutes. Onsite counselors provide education regarding treatment options, community ser-

vices and financial support.

UT's Rvan White Program is partially funded through a federal grant named after an Indiana teenager who died of acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS), the disease caused by HIV. The program's goal, according to Locher, has been to provide optimum care for HIV-infected individuals, regardless of financial status.

Bajo Obama, más músicos cubanos están entrando a EEUU

MIAMI, el 4 de febrero del 2010 (AP): Uno por uno, los integrantes de Los Van Van pasaron por la taquilla de inmigración en el aeropuerto de Miami para serrecibidos por las brillantes luces de las cámaras de televisión.

Un reportero les ofreció pastelitos, otro les preguntó qué significaba para ellos tocaren Miami. Unareportera les confesó que se crió escuchando sus canciones mientras otro periodista les acusó de ser entregados al gobierno cubano. En medio del tumulto, entusiastas obreros del aeropuerto les tomaban fotos.

El bajista *Juan Formell*, sin embargo, aseguró que la banda no vino a hacer política sino a tocar música.

Los Van Van son la más reciente de una serie de bandas o artistas cubanos que han entrado a Estados Unidos bajo el gobierno de Barack Obama, y quizás la más controversial, pues muchos exiliados los consideran demasiado cercanos al gobierno de los hermanos Castro.

Aparte de Los Van Van han venido La Charanga Habanera y Buena Fe, que han deleitado a multitudes en conciertos en Miami para los que se agotaron las entradas. El Septeto Nacional vino en noviembre y el cantautor Carlos Varela se reunió con dirigentes políticos en Washington. Para marzo se espera un concierto aquí de la legendaria Omara Portuondo.

Según cifras del Departamento de Estado, el número de visas otorgadas a artistas y deportistas cubanos ha aumentado con respecto a las otorgadas durante el gobierno de George W. Bush. En el 2001 se otorgaron 860 visas; cuatro años más tarde la cifra bajó a 16 y el año pasado aumentó de 41 a 57.

"Creo que bajo Obama esa tendencia se ha revertido un poco", dijo Sujatha Fernandes, una profesora de sociología del Queens College en Nueva York y autora de "Cuba Represent! Cuban Arts, State Power, and the Making of New Revolutionary Cultures".

"No hay nada por escrito, pero hemos visto poco a poco que más grupos están entrando al país", añadió.

En medio de la visita de Los Van Van, se hace evidente que la comunidad cubano-estadounidense del sur de la Florida está cambiando.

A fines de 1999, la agrupación vino y se topó con una protesta de más de

4.000 personas que les gritaban y lanzaban basura. Un periodista resultó herido y varias personas fueron detenidas.

Esta vez, el ambiente fue muy diferente.

En una valla adyacente a unas de carreteras que serpentean por Miami se veía un retrato de Los Van Van en concierto. La música de la banda _ una mezcla de son, jazz y pop cubano _ fue transmitida por las radioemisoras cubanas de Miami, algo impensable hace pocos años.

Aunque sí hubo una protesta a las puertas del concierto, los manifestantes fueron una fracción de la multitudque fue a escuchar la música. Nadie tiró nada y nadie fue detenido.

Para los cubanos que nacieron en la isla, la música de Los Van Van es la música de su juventud.

"Ellos quieren seguir apegados a su patria", dijo Hugo Cancio, presidente de Fuego Entertainment, una compañía productora de Miami, en referencia a los cubanos que han venido e nos últimos 15 años. "Saben que su cultura y su música es intocable y se niegan a heredareldolor, el sufrimiento y el odio de los exiliados históricos".



Participating in this pageant has become a family tradition for these girls.

Jasmine Candelario, 7, Vanessa's sister, has competed in the same pageant. "I won Duchess," Jasmine said "I wish I would have been Queen or Princess," she said. When asked what her little sister should do to win, Jasmine agreed with her mother and said "sell a lot of tickets."

The Detroit Red Wings and The University of Toledo are partnering to help motivate young students to prepare for a college education by spreading the word about UT's new Scholarly Savings Account Program, which is available to all students across the

The partnership was announced at a press conference Friday, Feb. 12, 2010, at Joe Louis Arena in the Olympia Club. Leaders and guidance counselors from high schools across Michigan have been invited to attend and learn more about the program and how their students can participate.

The Scholarly Savings Account Program is an innovative new effort that, beginning in 2010, UT will make as many as five annual deposits of \$2,000 into individual student scholarship accounts with the successful completion of the eighth grade and for completion of each year of high school if they meet pre-established academic. attendance and behavioral goals.

"A love of Red Wings hockey is instilled in fans at a young age and children grow up with that passion.

We're trying to develop that same passion in education for students early in their lives so students and their parents know college is a realistic goal academically and financially," said Lawrence J. Burns, UT vice president for external affairs.

"Higher education continues to be one of the most important ways for our children to personally develop and succeed in life," said Ken Holland, Red Wings executive vice president and general manager. "This program from The University of Toledo is an excellent way to motivate high school students and ease the financial demands of college. We're very happy to help promote this scholarship plan."

For students to be eligible, they must graduate with a minimum grade point average of 3.0 and meet core curriculum criteria for regular admission to UT. At the same time, their school districts must sign a participation agreement with UT: that includes the development of their own requirements and an annual tracking process.

Upon graduation from high school, a student may have accumulated a maximum of \$10,000 through the Scholarly Savings Program

that can be used toward tuition at UT. The scholarship funds the will be disbursed in annual increments of \$2,500 for four years of attendance at the University

"I believe this provides a road map for students,' said Burns, who also serves as interim vice president for equity and diversity. "It's a powerful message to be able to say, 'Here is money on the table; if you work hard in school, it's yours.'

Besides providing scholarship dollars, the Scholarly Savings Account Program aims to give school districts leverage to require students to do things such as take the necessary college prep courses, participate in activities and meet attendance requirements.

UT officials believe that this will result in improved high school graduation rates and better prepare students for the rigor of a college education.

Retired chief could take death penalty stand

30, 2010 (AP): Ohio prisons director Terry Collins retired January 31, 2010, after 32 years at the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction, almost four as director.

Collins, 56, isn't saying what stand he might take on capital punishment. But he noted growing national concern over the issue, citing cases where condemned prisoners were exonerated by DNA evidence and the cost of trials and lengthy appeals.

Prisons officials around the nation have declared their opposition to the death penalty after retiring.

"My change of heart was gradual and painful," former Florida warden Jim McAndrew wrote last May in the Orlando Sentinel, "At night I would awaken to visions of executed inmates sitting on the edge of my bed.

In 2008, California's former prison director. Jeanne Woodford, made public her opposition in an op-ed column in the Los Angeles Times. The state's death row at San Quentin is the country's largest with more than 600.

"To say that I have regrets about my involvement in the death penalty is to let myself

COLUMBUS, January off the hook too easily," she wrote. "To take a life in order to prove how much we value another life does not strengthen our society. It is a public policy that devalues our very being and detracts crucial resources from programs that could truly make our communities safe."

In Texas, with the busiest death chamber in the nation, a former governor, death row spiritual adviser and warden are among those who have spoken out.

Collins' predecessor in Ohio, Reginald Wilkinson, also revealed his opposition to capital punishment after his retirement in 2006.

Collins made history last year when he implemented the country's first single-drug lethal injection process. Ohio has used the system twice with no problems, injecting one dose of thiopental sodium instead of the traditional threedrug combination.

The number of death sentences in the country last year fell to 106, including just one in Ohio, the fewest since capital punishment was reinstated in the U.S. in 1976. The national figure last year was about half what it was a decade earlier.

Prisons directors who speak out against the death penalty after retirement make news because they're unique, said Richard Dieter, executive director of the Death Penalty Information Center, an advocacy group opposed to capital punishment.

It's less easy to tell how many prison officials retain their support for the death penalty after helping carry out executions.

"We tend not to hear from the ones who are pretty much fine with it," Dieter said.

Collins recognizes that changing Ohio's execution protocol may be his most significant legacy as director, making his name synonymous with the death penalty. He views the decision as an inevitable response to a series of lawsuits that faced the state.

He also knows he has a unique perspective as the former warden over Ohio's death row and a witness to all but one of the 34 executions carried out since the state resumed capital punishment in 1981.

But he has no illusions that speaking out one way or the other would sway the public, "I'm not sure anyone really cares what I think," he said

La Prensa Corespondent Cleveland: Death of three legendary tango icons in Argentina left a void for many passionate about the dance; and Sherrie Pallotta and Guillermo Pimentel-DeNovais, dance instructors at TANGOrush honored their contributions at Cleveland State University's Mather Mansion on Feb. 13, 2009.

The program was sponsored by Cafe Bellas Artes, a collaborative program by Cleveland State University and Cleveland Museum of Art, which promotes Latino art, culture, and language. A crowd of 50 filled the ballroom to learn basic moves, discover the influence Pedro (Tete) Rusconi, Pascual Contursi, and Osvaldo Zotto had on the dance.

Pallotta introduced the life of each enigmatic man and Pimentel-DeNovais extinguished a candle in their horror. "Tango is the statement of the soul, not just statement of skill," said Pallotta as she emphasized the oft contradiction between melodramatic lyrics and soothing music distinct to tango.

Pimentel-DeNovais said as students of tango begin to master the movements they cannot resist the temptation to learn Spanish and truly immerse themselves in the stories of passion, tragedy, and betraval. Evolution of tango he added has mirrored changes within Argentina's social fabric and served as more than entertainment but also form of political opposition. He had the distinct pleasure of training with Rusconi and said as a milonguero his movements defied the natural laws of kinesis.

"Let me tell you, he was wild," said Pimentel-DeNovais, and also notorious for whacking students on the back of their heads if they failed to mimic the complexity of style. "He seemed to fly across the floor," said Primentel-DeNovias.

Pallotta and Pimentel-DeNovais have been performing at CMA for six years and offer instruction in genuine tango. Together they founded TANGOrush; an organization devoted to fostering Argentine Tango as a social dance in the Cleveland area. Ohio lands stimulus money for passenger train

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 27, 2010 (AP): Ohio will get about \$400 million in federal stimulus money to establish a passenger train service linking its major cities, putting the state at the center of a

developing national rail system, Gov. Ted Strickland said Wednesday.

The money is part of \$8 billion in stimulus grants that President Barack Obama has set aside for high-speed trains and other passenger rail projects.

Ohio is planning a 79mph startup service that will run on existing freight tracks connecting Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, and Cincinnati beginning in 2012.

It figures to be a marquee stimulus project, billed as a jobs creator in an important swing state where Strickland, a Democrat, is facing re-election.

Obama planned to be in Florida on Thursday to announce additional stimulus awards for rail projects.

"Competition for this was stiff, and I'm very appreciative," Strickland said. U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood called him with the news, he said.

About 6 million people live along the 255-mile Ohio train route, making it one of the most heavily populated corridors without rail service in the Midwest-a major selling point that state transportation officials made in their October stimulus application.

Private passenger train service on the route ended 40 years ago.

Ohio had asked for \$564 million in stimulus money. considerably more than it ended up getting. The state could scale back its plan by purchasing refurbished rail cars instead of new ones. said Ken Prendergast, executive director of All Aboard Ohio, a rail advocacy group.

Amtrak released a study in September predicting that a restored service in Ohio would draw 478,000 riders in its first year and has the demographics needed for successful operations, including population density and a concentration of colleges and universities.

The state aims to build up ridership and gradually make infrastructure improvements so that tracks can handle 110 mph trains, with branches connecting to a Chicago-based Midwest corridor and East Coast



Ohio hasn't picked a company to operate the service, though Amtrak is interested.

Norfolk Southern Corp. and CSX Corp., two companies that own most of the rail lines on the route, have said they support the project as long as passenger and freight operations don't conflict.

Amtrak hasn't estimated fares for Ohio, but the state estimates an average ticket price for a one-way trip from Columbus to Cleveland would be \$20, and \$18 from Columbus to Cincinnati. Annual ticket sales are estimated at \$12 million, with the state responsible for an additional \$17 million operating subsidy.

That has drawn criticism from highway construction lobbyists, who worry that Ohio would divert money from road projects to pay for the train subsidy. Republican state lawmakers also have raised questions about where the money will come

Strickland said \$17 million is a modest amount compared with the hundreds of millions that the state spends on highways every year.

Ohio transportation officials plan to use a mix of funding sources to cover the subsidy, including train advertising, federal grants and fees that restaurants, hotels and gas stations pay to advertise on blue highway exit

Amtrak's study also didn't address the costs that cities on the route would have to pay to build train stations, which, depending on their size and features. can cost as low as \$2 million or as much as the \$26.4 million transportation hub that opened two years ago in St. Louis.

Total travel time on the route would be 6 hours and 30 minutes. That's about what it would take to drive the same corridor, but longer than a more direct route between Cleveland and Cincinnati on Interstate 71 that takes 4 1/2 hours by car.

Time isn't the only factor that determines ridership. state transportation officials have said. Cost, safety, reliability and passenger convenience are other important factors. Ohio anticipates that the trains would be equipped with Wi-Fi service.

Centeno-Gómez has been employed at NASA Glenn Research Center since 1983 as a NASA Subsystem Engineer, Her main responsibility is to be NASA's expert/steward of the Shuttle's Purge, Vent and Drain (PV&D) subsystem's functions, hardware, and analysis. In addition, she also works on the Biofuels program or which she conducts fundamental research and modeling in the area of alternative fuels for aviation.

She has held various positions including work at NASA Headquarters in

the Office of Aeronautics in Washington, D.C. While in Washington, she worked for the Department of Education for the White House Initiative for Hispanic Excellence in Education.

Other previous positions include: Computer Engineer for the Principal Center for Work group Hardware and Software;

Project Engineer for the Noise Reduction Program; and Project Manager for the Space Station Electrical Power System Power Management Controller Application.

Her dedication and exemplary work ethic are no surprise for longtime friend *Patty Quiñónez*, who describes her as extremely organized, detailed and a brilliant woman who continuously amazes her. "She is pride for the Latino community," said Quiñónez.

Beyond her demanding career, Centeno-Gómez is committed to service; is a leader at the Hispanic Roundtable, Vice President of LATINA, and board member of the Domestic Violence Center. She is also pursuing a Ph.D. in mathematics at *Kent State University*.

Ms. Centeno-Gómez has received several awards for her community involvement: Women of Achievement by the National Conference of Puerto Rican Women (NACOPRW), Hispanic Women of the Year by NACOPRW, and the Community Service Award by Region IV of the Society of Hispanic Profes-



sional Engineers.

Despite remarkable contributions and achievements her most endearing quality is humility. "Thank you for all you do, you are one of a kind and make us proud," said Quiñónez. It is a sentiment her husband, Luis Gómez echoes: "We are very proud of your accomplishments and grateful for your continuous support," he said.

Centeno-Gómez said she is honored by the award and recognition and said her passion for her career reflects in her performance. "I was surprised by the nomination ... you do the best job you can and not just so someone will you an award," she said.

She always had an interest in math, which helped her excel in her bachelor's and master's in the subject. Math, she said, opens up endless career possibilities and encourages students to explore the basics.

"There is a lot of learning potential in our community, and I have confidence the talents we have will be realized in the near future." she said.

Ruth García-González (María del Refugio González) 1920-2009

Born December 27, 1920 in Omaha, Nebraska and was a resident of Toledo, Ohio area since 1932, passed away on February 6, 2010, surrounded by her loving family.

With the support base of two hundred Latino families, she directly impacted South-End city projects ending in the actualization of the Aurora González Community Center, providing an array of health services for children to seniors.

A Toledo street was named Ruth González García Way (from Anthony Wayne Trail to Broadway). In 1997, Ruth was awarded The Lifetime Achievement Award from the Hispanic Leadership Institute.

As recent as 2008, Ruth received the César Chávez Humanitarian Award from Adelante, Inc., for lifetime contributions to the community. In September of 2009, she was inducted into Ohio's Civil Rights Hall of Fame and the end of 2009 received the award: Glass Key to The City of Toledo, honoring the González family. She was also a proud member of The Catholic War Veterans Auxiliary.

Ruth retired from the Toledo Board of Education in 1988 from food service management after twenty-six years. She worked for various restaurants and bakeries as well as Willy's Overland and the Toledo Box Lunch program in the late thirties and during WWII years.

Ruth married Tech-Sergeant, Fred S. García Sr. (U.S. Army) at Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission. Ruth was widowed after forty-three years of marriage in 1986.

Ruth García was a long time member of Immaculate Conception Parish where she raised her seven children, and Saint Charles Parish until residing at the Sacred Heart Home for the last decade.

Ruth was preceded in death by son Richard, brother Frank, Manuel, Fritz, Sylvester Jr., Sisters Aurora, Maria Sue, Josephine, and Eleanor.

She is survived by her children Frederick (Linda), Alice Sutton (James Pemberton), Ruth Ann (Terry) Mohler, Raymond (Cheryl), Ron and John García; and niece, Isabel Rojas Dailey; brothers, Peter (Jessie) and Anthony (Irene) González; sisters, Sr María José, OSU, and Salud Cortez; fifteen grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren, nieces, nephews; she was Madrina to many.


