School Board candidate Bob Vásquez: "Education is the pathway to equality!"





Latino/as and the Clinton/Obama Vote in the primaries— What is my heart telling me?

As a U.S.-American, Latino, and Ohioan, I have been following the Clinton/Obama race with great interest. I find that I am painfully struggling on who I will vote for in the March 4, 2008 Ohio primary. Latinos/as in Texas [The Lone Star State has the same primary date] face the same dilemma.

"I'm supporting Hillary. She is experienced, and has earned it. She will

correct what is wrong with our government, and institute much needed programs for the health and education of our children."

My wife supports Hillary but I am supporting Barack Obama because to me he is real change and this will bring in the Independent voter that is sick of this WAR! I will support the Democrat that gets the nomination.

I want Hillary because I feel like she can help end the war and it's time to have a woman president. I liked when Bill Clinton was president, but I think she can do better.

• *Are Latinos/as the same?*
Latinos/os are brown, white, black, and every hue in between. We are immigrants, migrants, residents, refugees, and citizens. We are from México, Puerto Rico, Cuba, the Dominican Republic, and from every country in Central and South America.

We were born in Texas, California, Ohio, Maine, Georgia, North Dakota, and Washington.

We are Democrats, Republicans, Independents, Libertarians and Green. We are gay, straight, lesbian, and bi. We speak Spanish and English (more Latinos/as in this great country claim English as their first language). We are Christian, Jewish, Muslim, atheist as well as other religions and denominations.

We are young and old, but mostly young. We are

struggling, ~~not~~ and upper class, but mostly working class. We are urban, suburban, and rural.

In Ohio and Texas, we are all of this and more.

Systems try hard to put us in the same box; it's easier, convenient, cost effective, and makes a better story. The media, political parties, social services and government agencies all try to count us as one. With this in mind the so called "Black vs. Latino divide" makes no sense to me.

Poll: Obama, Clinton even in Texas

THE RACE: The Presidential race for Democrats in Texas

THE NUMBERS: Hillary Rodham Clinton, 48 percent

Barack Obama, 47 percent

OF INTEREST: Six in 10 Latino voters and nearly as many white women in Texas say they back Clinton, similar to her national edge so far with those groups, who have been crucial to her. Three-quarters of blacks support Obama, slightly lower than usual, and he leads by 10 percentage points among white men. He is seen as more electable, she as the stronger leader. Unlike most states, health care trumps the economy as Texas Democratic voters' top concern, and Clinton has a 17-point edge over him for handling the issue. A quarter say they still may switch their support.

The Washington Post-ABC News poll was conducted by telephone from Feb. 16-20, 2008. It involved interviews with 603 likely Democratic voters in Texas, and has a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 4 percentage points. *Complete Results:* www.washingtonpost.com; www.abcnews.go.com/PollingUnit/



Obama says immigration shouldn't be used as 'political football'

Feb. 19, 2008, SAN ANTONIO (AP): Democratic presidential candidate Barack Obama, addressing a rally in a heavily Latino neighborhood in this majority Latino city, said Tuesday that the issue of immigration should not be used as "a political football."

Security of the border has to be combined with a pathway to citizenship for people who are already here, he said to cheers at an event in advance of the hotly contested March 4 primary against Hillary Rodham Clinton.

"Let's solve it instead of trying to score cheap political points," Obama said.

The nation must secure its borders and punish employers who recruit undocumented immigrants and pay them unfair wages, he said.

"It's not going to just involve building a big fence all the way across the border. That's not going to work," said Obama, addressing an issue that has angered many border residents.

While some physical barriers will be needed, better monitoring should also be used, and those who are already in the United

States should be encouraged to come "out of the shadows," Obama said.

Undocumented immigrants should have a pathway to citizenship, provided that they register, pay fines and learn English. Rounding up and deporting all undocumented immigrants is impractical, he said.

Before he addressed the crowd, some chanted "Si, se puede!"—the Spanish equivalent of the "Yes, we can!" chant that has become a hallmark of his campaign and the cry used by the late Latino activist César Chávez.

Obama was scheduled to hold another rally at Houston's Toyota Center, a 19,000-seat sports arena, Tuesday night. His campaign said it had given out about 20,000 tickets for that event.

He began his first campaign swing through Texas with a roundtable discussion focused on his plan to address the growing number of foreclosures. He has called for the creation of a \$10 billion fund to help prevent foreclosures and legislation to require more disclosure from lenders.

A local couple with foster kids and a single nurse were asked to discuss the

problems they've had with their lenders, providing a chance for Obama to talk about his foreclosure prevention plan.


"I know both the African-American and Latino community have been disproportionately affected," he said, noting the practices of some subprime lenders.

People began lining up hours ahead of the rally, and he greeted the overflow crowd outside the amphitheater before taking questions from a young and ethnically diverse crowd.

Exit polling numbers from earlier primaries indicated that Latino voters were more likely to favor Clinton, a trend some analysts have attributed to the long relationship Clinton and her husband have with the Latino community.

Clinton has campaigned solely on the Texas-Mexico border and San Antonio, so far leaving the rest of Texas to her husband, former President Bill Clinton, to campaign in. Obama's Texas trip includes stops in Houston and Dallas before he and Hillary Clinton debate in Austin on Thursday.

Obama last made a stop in Texas for a pair of



fundraisers in November, when most political watchers assumed Super Tuesday would crown a Democratic nominee and Texas' later primary would little matter.

Texas has 228 Democratic presidential delegates, 126 of which will be apportioned based on the March 4 primary. The remaining 102 get awarded at a state convention in a caucus in June, but both candidates see the elections in Texas and Ohio on the same day as an opportunity to pull away in the closely contested race.

A CNN-Opinion Research Corp. poll conducted last week indicated that the race remains very tight. The poll of likely Texas Democratic voters found 50 percent favored Clinton while 48 percent favored Obama, easily within the margin of error of plus or minus 4.5 points. The polls concerning Ohio's March 4th primary also show a close race between Obama and Clinton.

Obama y Clinton difieren ligeramente en trato a Cuba

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 21, 2008 (AP): Barack Obama reiteró el jueves por la noche que se reuniría "sin precondiciones" con el nuevo gobernante de Cuba, pero Hillary Clinton le refutó afirmando que un encuentro de ese tipo socavaría la capacidad de Estados Unidos de evaluar primero la naturaleza del gobierno que se estaría implantando en la isla.

En otros pasajes de su debate, ambos indicaron que el muro ha creado divisiones en Estados Unidos y que bien pudo haberse estudiado la posibilidad primero de emplear recursos tecnológicos que pudieran cumplir incluso mejor papel que levantar la barrera física.

Clinton dijo que suspendería las redadas policiales de inmigrantes indocumentados en viviendas y empresas porque han creado "una gran dosis de terror y ansiedad en la comunidad hispana y dividido a las familias de unos 3 millones de niños que nacieron en Estados Unidos y que tienen por lo menos un padre indocumentado".

"Eso va contra los valores que tenemos en Estados Unidos...", dijo,

aunque aclarando que las redadas serían mantenidas para "casos especiales" mientras se lograba una amplia reforma migratoria que permita parar la explotación de trabajadores indocumentados y darles "un camino para la legalización".

Obama dijo que desde el Senado apoyó también esa reforma y que en tanto se pudiera hacer otro intento era "absolutamente crítico bajar el tono de la retórica en el debate que algunas veces ha sido dirigido contra la comunidad hispana" ya que se ha visto como consecuencia un "aumento inaceptable" de los crímenes de odio racial.

Los dos precandidatos demócratas a la presidencia expresaron en un debate sus posiciones sobre Cuba a raíz de la renuncia esta semana del presidente Fidel Castro a seguir en el cargo que ejerció durante 49 años. La asamblea nacional elegirá un reemplazante el domingo y todo parecía indicar que sería su hermano Raul, interinamente en el poder en los últimos 19 meses.

"Estoy totalmente de acuerdo con que debemos buscar negociaciones diplomáticas con todo el



School Board candidate Bob Vázquez: "Education is the pathway to equality!"

Prensa and plan to cover José Luis Castillo Treviño in a future edition of *La Prensa*. This week, the man in the middle is Bob Vázquez, former unsuccessful candidate for Toledo City Council.

Let's start with the obvious. Why, after having made a run at Toledo City Council, is Vázquez now trying for a Toledo School Board seat?

"When I was running for Toledo City Council in 2006, I looked at the things that go into a formula of why businesses want to come here. What role does economic development play in it? One of most visible factors people always look at is the school system. My concern was what can be done about the school system?" explains Vázquez.

"I pretty much developed a standard response. Although City Council does not have authority or responsibility for the school system, I promised that I would use whatever influence I had to help school board members come up with a plan to meet the challenges," adds Vázquez.

"The school system is the foundation of the community. If you try to interest businesses into relocating in Toledo, there are certain things they have to feel good about. And Toledo meets those requirements. We are a safe city and we have quality schools.

"Businesses come here, but frequently their employees will live outside the city limits for a special school experience. I want them to live in the city of Toledo. And one way to see that happen is by offering quality education by the school system," says Vázquez.

So what made him seek to be appointed to the school board? Vázquez says Torres specifically came to see him and asked if he could place his name in contention.

"Bob felt that I could best continue what he was doing on the board," says Vázquez of Torres, who left Toledo to become Director of Development in Canton, Ohio.

What was Vázquez's response? "I told him (Torres) that I have been involved in many things in this community. I know that the basis for people's dreams is education. Education is the pathway to equality and education is the great equalizer. It allows you to participate as an individual in society by giving you an understanding of issues and how they affect you.

"Education allows you to participate in a big way by preparing you to become a leader," says Vázquez.

He recalls how community activists Hernán Vázquez (the two are not related), Baldemar Velásquez, and Margarita DeLeón were involved along with educator David Ibarra, in a pioneering study on finding solutions to the alarming number of Latino high school drop-outs.

"I would like to continue with that study and to seek a commitment to implement recommendations from that report. It has been years since that study was conducted and no action has been taken. The excuse is always that the resources are not there. But they're never there. I would like to see a creative and innovative method of finding efficient resources and coming up with effective solutions. You can control your own destiny to make the changes that need to be made," explains Vázquez.

"First of all, I believe in diversity as did Bob Torres. I only happen to be Hispanic. I want to see diversity. I have volunteered on a number of projects including the Governor's initiative to stem the dropout rate. Although the focus of that effort was directed toward African-Americans, I can tell you that when you've served as I have on any of those committees, you realize that it is the same issues that face African-Americans or Hispanics. And under-performing groups of people are not always people of color.

"But we do have to start to realize that Hispanics also suffer from the high dropout rate and need financial resources that on the state level are usually given only to communities," says Vázquez.

He also feels his experi-



ence in academia as a part-time instructor gives him another advantage in the competition for the Toledo School Board seat.

"I teach two courses at college," says Vázquez. "I teach a seminar class at the University of Toledo on Management of Non-profit Organizations. I've been teaching it since fall 1998 and my students are a combination of graduate and undergraduate students.

"I also teach a class on American Government at Owens Community Campus as well as an evening college at Rogers.

"I enjoy teaching. When I am sharing information and I see students learning, I know I am helping shape and mold future leaders, people who will participate in the community," says Vázquez, who also mentors several college and high school students.

History
Born in Toledo, his grandparents came here as migrants. *La familia Vázquez* includes two pioneer educators—David Alvarado, a retired teacher who sent his numerous teaching years at the East Side's Waite High School, and Richard Cervantes, a former principal at Waite High School, which has the highest concentration of Latinos in the city of Toledo.

"My father went to Waite but he did not go further than high school," says Vázquez, who followed his father to Waite. "I am proud to be a product of the Toledo public schools," he adds.

His parents were Primo and Susan Vázquez. His mother died young and his father had to raise four boys with help from his family. Bob's youngest brother was two weeks old when his mother died.

Detroit Metro plans 10,000-foot runway

ROMULUS, Feb. 22, 2008 (AP): Detroit Metropolitan Airport officials are proposing the building of a new, 10,000-foot runway that would displace 3,500 people, 15 percent of its home city's residents.

The plan for a seventh runway also would force the closing of two elementary schools and 50 businesses in Romulus. The city of 24,000 is 15 miles southwest of Detroit.

The board that runs the nation's 11th-busiest airport say the runway is needed as part of its 20-year plan to handle a projected 2.3 percent annual increase in traffic. They say annual passengers will reach 60 million by 2027. It is about 36 million today.

But Romulus officials sharply criticized the plan, and the City Council is scheduled to consider a resolution opposing it.

"How many hits can we continue to absorb on behalf of the region and the airport? ... We don't have a choice, we have to get vocal," Romulus economic

development director Tim Keyes told The Detroit News.

Officials say the expansion would take 1,700 acres and 815 residential properties.

A plan including the runway, as well as expansion of the McNamara and North terminals and the building of a passenger monorail off Interstate 94, could go to federal regulators this spring, the newspaper said.

Northwest Airlines Corp. is the airport's dominant carrier, which also has a hub in Memphis, Tenn. The Eagan, Minn.-based carrier is in merger talks with Atlanta-based Delta Air Lines Inc.

mundo", dijo Clinton. "Las reuniones deben ser parte de ese proceso, pero no creo que debería ocurrir en un comienzo porque ello socavaría nuestra capacidad de evaluar a alguien como Raúl Castro..."

Obama había dicho anteriormente que se reuniría con Fidel Castro y los líderes de países como Irán y Corea del Norte para hablar de una nueva era de relaciones, posición que reiteró en la jornada afirmando que "debemos reunirnos no sólo con nuestros amigos sino con nuestros enemigos".

"Eso es lo que hace la gran diferencia en la diplomacia...", afirmó.

Indicó que si gana la presidencia y se instala en la Casa Blanca en enero de 2009 tendrá en cuenta que Estados Unidos "tiene una oportunidad de cambiar potencialmente sus relaciones con Cuba" después de más de medio siglo de aislamiento y ruptura diplomática que no han dado los resultados buscados.

"Yo me reuniría sin precondiciones...", dijo Obama aunque, cambiando un poco su posición, indicó luego que coincidiría con Clinton en que debería haber una preparación para el encuentro. "Es muy importante para nosotros asegurarnos de que ha habido una agenda y que esa agenda era derechos humanos, libertad de prisioneros políticos, apertura de la prensa y esa preparación debe tomar

algún tiempo". Obama, quien aventaja a Clinton con casi un centenar en la acumulación de delegados en lo que va de la campaña de elecciones primarias, recordó que ya había propuesto en el Senado un ablandamiento de las restricciones en las remesas de familiares así como de viajes para personas que desean visitar a sus familias en la isla.

El panel le hizo notar que sus comentarios parecían diferir de lo que él mismo dijo en 2003 de que la política de Estados Unidos a Cuba "era un miserable fracaso" y que apoyaba la normalización de relaciones.

"Apoyo una eventual normalización", contestó. "Y es absolutamente cierto de que pienso que nuestra política ha sido un fracaso..."

En un pasaje del debate, Clinton acusó a Obama de plagio político y dijo que representaba un "cambio que se puede fotocopiar".

Obama rechazó el cargo y dijo que "en lugar de atacarnos deberíamos estar levantando el país".

Fue un pasaje ríspido en medio de un debate generalmente amable en los días que preceden a las primarias del 4 de marzo en Texas y Ohio, y que algunos partidarios de Clinton dicen que ella debe ganar para conservar esperanzas de obtener la candidatura.



Obama se apuntó el jueves su undécima victoria consecutiva ante Clinton en las primarias demócratas al obtener el 65% de los votos emitidos en el exterior, mientras su rival republicano John McCain enfrentaba un temporal por denuncias de manejos inapropiados con una cabildera.

Obama se alzó con otro sólido triunfo entre los demócratas que viven fuera de Estados Unidos, quienes sufragaron a través de la internet, por correo, o en persona, en sitios de votación. Los resultados fueron divulgados por Demócratas en el Extranjero, una organización aprobada por el partido.

Hace ya más de dos semanas que Clinton no gana una sola primaria o caucus (asambleas vecinales). Sus últimas victorias las obtuvo el 5 de febrero, el "Super Martes", cuando triunfó en nueve estados, entre ellos algunos de los más importantes, como California, Nueva York, Nueva Jersey y Massachusetts. En esa ocasión, Obama ganó en 13 estados.

Más de 20,000 ciudadanos estadounidenses en el extranjero votaron en la "primaria mundial" entre el 5 y el 12 de febrero.

Obama cuenta ahora con 1,358,5 delegados, contra 1,264 de Clinton. Hace falta 2,025 delegados para asegurarse la postulación.



Ohio to release about 200 from crowded youth prisons

COLUMBUS, Feb. 22, 2008 (AP): About 200 juvenile offenders are expected to be released from Ohio's crowded youth prisons.

The state Department of Youth Services says the release is part of ongoing review process to sort out youth offenders who are at or near the end of their terms

but who remain incarcerated to undergo treatment and other programming.

Most of those released over the coming months would be allowed to return home under parole supervision.

A report issued in December by an independent consultant found that Ohio's

youth prisons are crowded, understaffed and fail to educate children behind bars or keep them safe.

A civil rights lawsuit over conditions at the juvenile centers is pending in federal court.

Libertadores: Chocan dos ex campeones, nada menos que en debut

BUENOS AIRES, 2-25-08 (AP): Será un debut con marco de gala el que tendrán Atlético Nacional de Colombia y Sao Paulo de Brasil en la Copa Libertadores del 2008, ya que será uno de los pocos choques de la primera fase —y el único de la semana— en que se verán la cara dos ex campeones.

Otro hecho destacado es que tan sólo dos líderes de grupos, los peruanos Universidad de San Martín y Cienciano, darán su presente en una semana de ocho partidos, en la que habrá un duelo de gigantes entre River Plate de Argentina y América de México.

Atlético Nacional de Colombia y Sao Paulo de Brasil mostrarán sus armas por primera vez, el miércoles en el estadio Atanasio Girardot de Medellín, por el Grupo 7 que comanda Sportivo Luqueño de Paraguay con tres puntos, gracias a su victoria como visitante 2-1 sobre Audax Italiano de Chile.

En Sao Paulo debutaría su flamante adquisición Eder Luis, un veloz y habilidoso atacante de 22 años que llegó del Atlético Mineiro, en lo que sería un desembarco de seis meses antes de irse a un grande del balompié europeo.

A. Nacional ganó la Libertadores de 1989 con René Higuita en el arco y Francisco Maturana como técnico, mientras Sao Paulo se consagró en 1992/93, con Cafú en la defensa y Telé Santana como timonel, y en el 2005.

San Martín recibirá el martes a Universidad Católica de Chile por el Grupo 5, mientras que Cienciano visitará un día

después a Flamengo de Brasil por el 4.

El martes, también jugarán Caracas de Venezuela-Real Potosí de Bolivia (Grupo 1) y los argentinos Estudiantes-Lanús (2); el miércoles lo harán River-América, y el jueves Maracaibo de Venezuela-Colo Colo de Chile (3) y Cúcuta Deportivo de Colombia-San José de Bolivia (6).

San Martín y América comandan el Grupo 5 con tres puntos, aunque el líder absoluto es el equipo peruano por mejor diferencia de goles, que es lo que a la larga cuenta para dirimir el orden exacto de las posiciones.

Caracas, otro humilde como San Martín, será local ante Potosí, con lo cual am-

bos habrán cumplido su segundo partido, tal como lo hicieron Cruzeiro de Brasil y San Lorenzo de Argentina cuando igualaron 0-0 el jueves pasado.

Cruzeiro tiene cuatro puntos, Caracas tres, San Lorenzo uno y Potosí cero. Caracas dio otra de las sorpresas de la Libertadores cuando venció 2-0 a un equipo considerado fuerte como San Lorenzo, aunque al igual que América está de capa caída en el campeonato de su país.

Estudiantes jugará en su domicilio de La Plata ante Lanús buscando sumar algo para su casillero en blanco. Cuenca de Ecuador encabeza el cuarteto con cuatro puntos, Lanús tiene tres y Danubio de Uruguay 1.

Maracaibo y Colo Colo van por su primer triunfo. Atlas de México comanda la serie con tres unidades, Maracaibo y Boca Juniors de Argentina tienen una y Colo Colo cierra con cero.

En su estadio Pachenchon Romero, los venezolanos le arrancaron un empate 1-1 nada menos que al actual campeón Boca, mientras que Atlas vapuleó 3-0 a Colo Colo, en Guadalajara.

Cúcuta y San José son otros que van en pos del primer triunfo dentro de la serie que comandan las Chivas de México con tres puntos. Cúcuta y Santos cosecharon uno y San José marcha en el fondo sin nada.

como para pensar que yo podría hacerlo y por poner sobre mi cabeza uno de los peinados más horribles de la historia", declaró Bardem antes de añadir: "Lo siento, pero esto lo tengo que decir esto en español. Mamá, esto para ti, para tus abuelos, esto para los cómicos como tú que han puesto la dignidad para España".

Sólo el mes pasado recibió importantes reconocimientos como el Globo de Oro y el premio del Sindicato de Actores de la Pantalla (SAG, según sus siglas en inglés), que suelen servir de anticipo a lo que ocurriría la noche del Oscar.

En el 2001 Bardem compitió en la categoría de mejor actor por su trabajo en "Antes que anochezca", dirigida por Julian Schnabel, en la que encarnó al escritor cubano Reynaldo Arenas, un poeta y novelista abiertamente gay que se reveló contra el gobierno de Cuba tras haber estado a

favor de la revolución y quien en 1990 se suicidó, enfermo de sida.

En esa ocasión la Academia favoreció a Russell Crowe por "Gladiator".

Este año disputó el galardón con Casey Affleck ("The Assassination of Jesse James by the Coward Robert Ford"), Hal Holbrook ("Into the Wild"), Tom Wilkinson ("Michael Clayton") y Philip Seymour Hoffman ("Charlie Wilson's War"), quien hace dos años se llevó el honor al mejor actor en el papel del escritor Truman Capote.

Entre otras, las cintas "Volver a empezar" de José Luis Garci (1982), "Belle Époque" de Fernando Trueba (1993), "Todo sobre mi madre" de Pedro Almodóvar (1999) y "Mar adentro" 2004 del chileno Alejandro Amenábar fueron premiadas como mejor película de lengua extranjera, en tanto que Almodóvar obtuvo el

reconocimiento al mejor guión original en el 2003 por "Hable con ella".

El año pasado Penélope Cruz fue la primera nominada a mejor actriz por su trabajo en "Volver", de Almodóvar, pero sucumbió ante Hellen Mirren, protagonista de "The Queen".

Además de "No Country for Old Men", Bardem protagonizó el año pasado la adaptación cinematográfica de la novela de Gabriel García Márquez "El amor en los tiempos del cólera", y próximamente aparecerá en la cinta de Woody Allen "Vicky Cristina Barcelona", con Scarlett Johansson y su compatriota Penélope Cruz.



Voting Instruction Guide for Optical Scan Paper Ballots

The Cuyahoga County Board of Elections Introduces a New Voting Method

Beginning with the March 4, 2008 Presidential Primary Election, voters will use optical scan paper ballots to cast their votes.

The optical scan paper ballots are easy to use. Simply fill in the oval located next to your selection for a candidate or choice of an issue.

Common ballot problems occur when people vote for too many candidates in one race or when they cast their ballots in the wrong precinct.

Make sure you are at the correct precinct table at your location.

Make sure you read your ballot carefully and understand how many candidates to vote for. If you have a question, please ask a Poll Worker.

If you make a mistake on your ballot, return it to a Poll Worker and ask for a new one. You can request up to two replacement ballots.

Be sure and double check your ballot for accuracy. Improperly marked votes will not be counted. Once you put your ballot in the ballot box, your vote is final.

If a voter has a disability that needs to be accommodated, voting devices that are compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act will be available at each location.







STUDY: Latinos most at risk for losing television service in shift to digital broadcasting

Feb. 15, 2008 (AP): Latinos are nearly twice as likely as whites to be left without television service following the nationwide transition to digital broadcasting next year, according to a new survey.

Beginning in February 2009, full-power broadcast stations will transmit digital-only signals, meaning people who get their television programming over an antenna and do not have a digital set won't get a picture without a special converter box.

The Nielsen Co. survey released Friday estimates that more than 13 million households in the U.S. receive television programming over the air on non-digital sets, meaning they will need converter boxes. Another 6 million households contain at least one television that fits that description.

Nielsen researchers found that 10.1 percent of all households would have no access to television signals if the transition occurred today. Broken down by race, 8.8 percent of whites would be unready; 11.7 percent of Asians; 12.4 percent of blacks; and 17.3 percent of

Latinos.

By age, of those 35 and younger, 12.3 percent rely solely on over-the-air broadcasts. Of those age 55 and older, 9.4 percent fall into that category.

The survey noted that 16.8 percent of all households have at least one analog television set that would not work after the switch.

The Nielsen survey was done as part of its overall television rankings forecast. The data was gathered by Nielsen staff who visited a national sample of roughly 15,000 homes. The survey took about 18 months to complete, according to the company.

By market, New York is considered the most ready for the transition. Only 3.5 percent of television sets are non-digital and get programming over the air. Portland, Ore., is at the other end of the list, with 22.4 percent of television sets in that category.

Eric Rossi, leader of Nielsen's digital transition preparedness team, said much of the data fits with existing assumptions about the transition, though the fact that seniors are more ready than the younger people is "maybe one of the slightly unexpected results."



However, Rossi cautions, the age is based on the head of household. The survey does not include group quarters like retirement homes.

Rossi said the results also track closely with cable television penetration rates. People who get cable or satellite service won't be affected by the transition.

The federal government is accepting requests for coupons to subsidize the cost of converter boxes for those who need them. Each household is eligible for two coupons worth \$40 apiece, regardless of whether they have pay-television service or not.

To request a coupon, consumers can apply online at www.dtv2009.gov or call the 24-hour hotline, 1-888-DTV-2009 (1-888-388-2009).

The coupons expire three months from issue. Boxes are expected to be available now at many retail outlets. They are expected to range in price from \$40 to \$70.

The Latino/a presence and significance in Ohio is only going to grow. We are in Ohio and here to stay.

• *It's all about relationships, relationships, relationships!* In general, Latinos/as are relationship based. It is important to come together and develop a real relationship. While relationship is the center of

all people, Latinos/as seem to embody this in a more personal way. — If the question is: "Will you vote for me? The immediate response is; let's get to know each other first! Relationship building takes time and may not actualize with the electoral primary calendar.

• *Latinos and brand loyalty.* Latinos/os have a strong sense of brand loyalty. When we are happy with a product or person, we tend to stay with it through thick and thin. But there are changing variables on this. As a child living in Texas, I remember visiting family homes where the velvet tapestry of John F. Kennedy was front and center in living rooms, not far from the Virgen de Guadalupe and family pictures. I haven't seen this in at least one generation. We have not forgotten our closeness with the Kennedy's. With time, we have moved on. So the so called "Kennedy effect" is not easily reinstated just because it's an election year.

• *What is my heart telling me?* As I am becoming older, I am relying on my heart and instinct in ways that I would not have imaged. Maybe my experience is part of this as well. Here are some questions that my heart is asking me in regards to the Clinton/Obama vote on March 4th.

- Who offers the best leverage needed for a new way of thinking for the Latino/a community?

- What is our shared mean-

ing with Obama? With Hillary?

- What is our shared vision with Hillary? With Obama?

- Who can best put ideas into practice?

- Who is offering significant, sustainable, and enduring improvements?

- Who is better prepared to bring a shift in the system, a shift in our culture, a shift for the betterment of humankind (not just change)?

- Who offers the most "freedom to" rather than "freedom from"?

- Who understands and can facilitate the process of change rather than give us "snapshots" of change?

- Who loves the people? So at the end of the day, as a Latino voter, who will I vote for on March 4th? Who will you vote for? What is your heart telling you? Let's have this conversation. Conversation is action and can lead to meaningful decisions. But don't forget to vote on March 4th (or before).

Lobbyist story could undercut McCain image, candidacy - An AP News Analysis

Feb. 21, 2008 (AP): John McCain sought to minimize damage to his man-of-character image and his presidential hopes Thursday, vigorously denying and denouncing a newspaper report suggesting an improper relationship with a female lobbyist.

"It's not true," the likely Republican nominee said of the report that implied a romantic link with telecommunications lobbyist Vicki Iseman and suggested McCain pushed legislation that would have benefited her clients.

"At no time have I ever done anything that would betray the public trust," said McCain, a four-term Arizona senator and a hero of the Vietnam War. He described the lobbyist as a friend.

McCain and his wife, standing together at a news conference, said they were disappointed that The New York Times ran its page one article, and his campaign referred to a "smear campaign" and "gutter politics" in the midst of the presidential race.

The allegations in the Thursday report in the Times, and a story in *The Washington Post*, contradict core themes of McCain's campaign—that he would bring honor and integrity to the White House as well as a record of changing business-as-usual Washington ways.

Even the suggestion of marital impropriety—though rejected by both McCain and his wife—would seem to risk further damaging his acrimonious relationship with the social conservatives whose support he desperately needs in the general election campaign against a fired-up Democratic Party.

In a twist, however, there were early signs that the brouhaha might actually help McCain solidify the GOP base.

Conservative pundits who are some of McCain's harshest critics could have jumped on the issue to question the strength of McCain's family values. Instead, they went after the Times.

"There is nothing in it here that you can say is true," Rush Limbaugh told his radio listeners. He accused the newspaper of "trying to take him out."

Another conservative voice, Laura Ingraham, contended the newspaper was trying to "contaminate" the GOP's nominee with an "absurd attack."

By Thursday afternoon, the Arizona senator had begun a fundraising appeal based on the story.

"The New York Times ... has shown once again that it cannot exercise good journalistic judgment when it comes to dealing with a conservative Republican," campaign manager Rick Davis wrote in an e-mail to supporters. "We need your help to counter-

act the liberal establishment and fight back against The New York Times by making an immediate contribution today."

"We think the story speaks for itself," Times Executive Editor Bill Keller said in a written statement. "On the timing, our policy is we publish stories when they are ready."

At the very least, the episode gives Democrats an opening to try to exploit McCain's decades-long ties to Washington even though he's known as a Republican lawmaker willing to stand up to special interests and reduce the influence of lobbyists. It's a reputation he has carefully honed in the aftermath of the Keating Five influence-peddling scandal decades ago. The Senate cited him for "poor judgment" in that matter but took no further action.

The Democratic National Committee said Thursday in a statement: "After 25 years in Washington, the real John McCain is just like the other D.C. insiders he rails against on the campaign trail. John McCain's 'do as I say, not as I do' approach to ethics and lobbying reform can be called a lot of things. 'Straight talk' isn't one of them."

Campaigning in Texas, Democrat Barack Obama declined to comment on the story.

Several Republicans unaffiliated with McCain's campaign doubted it would have a long-term effect.

"The fact that it was The New York Times and the lack of sufficient detail undermines the credibility of the story," said Christopher LaCivita, a Republican strategist in Virginia, noting that the Times is considered a liberal bogymon for the GOP rank-and-file. He added: "Barring anything coming out that's new, I don't see this having much impact on McCain because his character is so well established."

"Most Republicans will look at this is The New York Times sliming Republicans," agreed John Feehery, a Republican consultant who was an aide to former House Speaker Dennis Hastert. "If there is going to be lasting damage, it's going to be with independents."

Aware of the high stakes, McCain officials acted quickly. The campaign distributed statements deriding the story, deployed senior advisers to spread that message on TV news shows and arranged a news conference for McCain and his wife of nearly 28 years to personally address the matter as they campaigned in Toledo, Ohio.

"I'm very disappointed in the article," he told reporters. Added Cindy McCain: "My children and I not only trust my husband but know that he would never do anything to not only disappoint our family, but disappoint the people of America. He's a man of great character, and I'm very, very disappointed in *The New York Times*."

In the article, months in the making, anonymous McCain aides were quoted as

having urged McCain and Iseman to stay away from each other in the run-up to his failed presidential campaign in 2000. In a separate story in *The Washington Post*, John Weaver, a longtime aide who split with McCain last year, said he personally met with Iseman and asked her to steer clear of the senator some eight years ago.

Both stories said aides worried about the appearance of McCain having close ties to a lobbyist with business before the Commerce Committee. The stories also said McCain wrote letters and pushed legislation involving television station ownership that would have benefited Iseman's clients.

McCain said he was not aware of Weaver's meeting and no staffers had indicated to him they were concerned about his association with Iseman. "If they were, they didn't communicate that to me," McCain said Thursday.

He called Iseman a friend, and said he wasn't any closer to her than to other lobbyists. He said, "I have many friends who represent various interests, ranging from the firemen to the police to senior citizens to various interests, particularly before my committee."

Efforts to reach Iseman for comment were unsuccessful.

McCain had briefly addressed the issue—and defended his integrity—in December when questioned about reports that the Times was investigating allegations of legislative favoritism.

"I've never done any favors for anybody—lobbyist or special-interest group," he told reporters after the *Drudge Report* posted a story online that said his aides had been trying to dissuade the newspaper from publishing a story because, the aides said, it wasn't factual.

McCain aides say they were taken off guard Wednesday afternoon when they learned the paper would publish the story. They suggested the Times was prompted to publish the story after learning that The New Republic, a conservative publication, was reading an article about newsroom debate over the story at the newspaper.

Texas' complex delegate system could boost urban areas

AUSTIN (AP): Democrat Hillary Rodham Clinton is looking to Latino voters in Texas to help her wrest the nomination from Barack Obama, but Texas' complicated delegate apportioning system doesn't necessarily favor Latino regions of the state.

Of the state's 228 Democratic presidential delegates, 126 will be awarded based on voting in the March 4, 2008 primary. But most of the remaining 102 are allocated in a caucus system leading up to the state convention in June, making Texas the only state with a twin primary-caucus system.

Those delegates are allotted by a candidate's performance in each of the state's 31 state senate districts. Each district gets delegates based on Democratic turnout in past elections.

So some urban districts in Houston, Dallas and Austin with higher Democratic turnout in the 2004 and 2006 general elections could give their winning candidate more delegates than some predominantly Hispanic districts in the Rio Grande Valley and El Paso.

For example, a state Senate district in Austin, where 30 percent of residents are

Hispanic, will have eight delegates, but a state Senate district in the border city of Brownsville, where the population is 91 percent Hispanic, gets only three.

"Obviously it is a complex system, but the reason it's so complex is to ensure that everyone is properly represented," said state Democratic Party spokesman Hector Nieto. He said Democrats in low-turnout districts have themselves to blame for the number of delegates they get.

The primary-caucus system has long been used, but in presidential elections in the last 20 years the nominee had scooped up the needed delegates to win the nomination by the time the Texas contest rolled around. This year, Texas could be the deciding state.

Beyond the 126 delegates awarded based on primary voting results, 102 Texas delegates are apportioned at the state Democratic convention in June, but the process begins at precinct caucuses held as soon as the primary polls close on March 4.

Those precinct conventions determine whose supporters get to go on to higher-level conventions but do not affect how the 126 pledged delegates from primary voting are distributed.

Here's how the rest of the delegates are awarded:

- 25 delegates pledged to

particular presidential candidates are selected from party and elected officials. The breakdown is determined by the percentages of support candidates receive when convention-goers sign-in and declare their presidential preference.

• 42 at-large delegates are pledged to particular presidential candidates the same way as the party and elected officials. The at-large delegation can also be used to make sure the whole Texas delegation is divided equally between men and women and meets racial and ethnic diversity goals.

• 35 so-called super-delegates, as specified in national party rules, are immediately ratified at the state convention and can back either candidate. These include members of Congress and the Democratic national committee members and leading state party officials, plus three picked by the state Democratic chairman.

"It's not new. It's a system that's been supported by Democrats," said Ed Martin, a Texas Democratic strategist, explaining it was designed to reward those who support Democrats in the general election.

McCain swings through Midwest

COLUMBUS, Feb. 22, 2008 (AP): His nomination assured, John McCain got an early jump on the general election this week with a swing through Midwestern states likely to be pivotal in the fall and a fresh line of criticism against Barack Obama.

"I will compete very strongly here in the heartland of America," the Republican nominee-in-waiting said in Ohio, underscoring the importance of the state and the region as he embarks on an eight-month effort to cobble together the 270 electoral votes needed to win the White House.

It was fitting, then, that McCain chose this setting—a state that gave President George W. Bush the 2004 election in a swing-voting region—to step up his rhetoric against the man he considers his most likely opponent this fall.

"I will fight every moment of every day in this campaign to make sure Americans are not deceived by an eloquent but empty call for change," McCain said after winning the Wisconsin primary. It was a thinly veiled suggestion that the Illinois Democrat, who has now won 11 straight primary/caucus contests over Hillary Rodham Clinton, lacks the experience, judgment and character a president needs.

McCain stopped in Illinois on Wednesday and toured a Ford Motor Co. assembly plant in Michigan on Thursday. He rounds out the week Friday in Indiana with a town-hall style meeting.

Well into the week, however, a character controversy of his own overshadowed McCain's message.

At a news conference in Toledo on Thursday, McCain was forced to respond to published reports that alleged he showed favoritism to clients of a female telecommunica-

tions lobbyist. A New York Times report said top McCain aides became "convinced the relationship had become romantic."

With his wife, Cindy, beside him, he denied any romance or impropriety.

"It's not true," McCain said. "At no time have I ever done anything that would betray the public trust."

"We will move forward," he declared and continued his Midwest trek.

With Obama and Clinton still fighting for the Democratic nomination, the GOP's likely standard-bearer is laying groundwork now for the fall by visiting key states and trying to define his opponents, particularly Obama.

Thus, McCain took his sharper criticism of Obama to five middle U.S.-America states this week.

He began in Wisconsin, at a county GOP dinner and a get-out-the-vote rally. By Tuesday, he was in Ohio celebrating a Wisconsin victory that inched him closer to the 1,191 convention delegates he needs to clinch the nomination.

The Arizona senator was also raising cash in each state. He kept a busy fundraising schedule for someone who doesn't like the chore. "We've got a lot of work to do," McCain acknowledged.

His attention to this region is no surprise.

The Midwest has been hotly contested in recent presidential elections. Both Republicans and Democrats plan to focus on it again this fall.

Some states here have a long history of solidly backing one party or the other. Indiana, for one, is a strong Republican state, where George W. Bush won big in both campaigns. Illinois, conversely, has been a predominantly Democratic state, won comfortably by John Kerry in 2004 and Al Gore in 2000.

But most others are considered swing states.

No Republican has ever won the presidency without winning Ohio. Bush saw very narrow victories here twice.

Wisconsin, Minnesota and Michigan all sided with Kerry and Gore—but by margins of less than 5 percentage points.

One Midwestern state, Iowa, split in the last two elections. In 2004, Bush won by 1 percentage point four years after losing to Gore by the same margin.

Since 1900, Missouri has backed every presidential winner but one—it went with Adlai Stevenson from neighboring Illinois in 1956. Bush had one narrow and one comfortable win there.

Economic issues dominate campaigns here. Once laden with industry and rich with agriculture, the region is struggling: job losses and recession fears weigh heavily on voters' minds.

McCain focused on that this week.

"We're in an information technology revolution, and it has changed the world. It has changed America. But we can't leave people behind," he said in Columbus. "We have to help them through this transition."

Earlier, in Middlefield, Wis., McCain explained how he might win in Wisconsin and other Midwestern states. "I can appeal not only to our Republican base but to independent voters," he said.

For all the general election maneuvering, McCain remains mindful that Mike Huckabee is still technically competing for the GOP nomination.

So McCain continues to campaign in states with upcoming primaries even as he looks ahead.

In Yellow Springs, Ohio, on Wednesday, he declared, "I intend to win the state of Ohio, both a week from Tuesday and in the general election in November!"

"I have a big family, and like many other Latino families they all came together, my grandparents, my aunt. My father is my hero. He had to raise four boys and he did a good job. My brothers Louis, Brian and Mike are all Toledo police officers," says Vásquez proudly.

So why didn't Bob Vásquez opt for a career in law enforcement? "I was actually going to do that. I went to UT to get my bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice. But at that time, ABLE [Advocates for Basic Legal Equality] had just filed a lawsuit against the City of Toledo because of their lack of hiring African-Americans on the police force. So I realized there would be so many African-Americans applying because the lawsuit did not include Hispanics. So I went on with my career and never looked back," he explains.

Vásquez continued his education at the University of Toledo through his Master's in Public Administration in 1997.

Even prior to earning his Master's, Vásquez's work experience has been primarily in dealing with community, kids and families — which he sees as another plus in terms of what he can bring to the table as a member of the Toledo School Board.

He worked for the Ohio Youth Commission as a Youth Street Worker and for the Lucas County Children Services Board as a caseworker investigating child abuse and neglect. He later became a Supervisor of Foster Care and a Casework Supervisor.

Vásquez worked for

Boysville of Michigan as Regional Director/Executive Director of St. Anthony Villa in Toledo from 1987 through 1989. He worked with kids at risk and lived at the facility.

He served as Assistant State Director of the Ohio Youth Advocate Program from 1992 to 1996. His responsibilities and areas of expertise were much the same as they currently are at the Twelve, Inc., where he has been Director of Special Projects for the last twelve years.

Vásquez works closely with the agency's foster care program. "I work with recruiting foster families, training them, and helping them to get their licenses. I also help place kids. The Twelve Inc. is a \$4,000,000 nonprofit serving children and families with six offices in Ohio and two in Florida," he explains.

He and his wife Kathy have two sons. Stephen works in Development for United Way, and David is at BAX Global.

Both of Vásquez's sons originally went to public schools until the family made a decision that Stephen should attend Catholic school in order to get a religious education. "When we moved Stephen, we moved David too," says Vásquez. The boys graduated from

St. Joan of Arc and St. Francis de Sales High School.

Vásquez is active in the community. He serves on the Community Relations Committee of the Toledo Zoo and is a member of the board of WGTE. He has twice been appointed to the Military Academy Selection Committee for U.S. Congresswoman

Marcy Kaptur.

He was a member of the City of Toledo's Hispanic Affairs Commission from 2003 to 2007 and served on the Lucas County Tax Levy Citizens Advisory Board in 2005.

Other candidates

In addition to Latino candidates Cruz-Bridges, Vásquez, and Treviño, the other candidates seeking appointment to the open position are:

John G. Bull Dog Rust, a longtime attorney now in his 90s and the oldest candidate on the list.

Cheryl Catlin, an unsuccessful candidate for the school board in 2007.

Jim Whiteman, an educator who also made an unsuccessful bid for the board.

Chris Myers, a two-time unsuccessful candidate for the school board.

Dr. Stephen Goldman, who has also made an unsuccessful run for the board.

Theodore Jobe, who was a candidate for the school board in 2007 and is a retired Libbey High School teacher and coach.

Vince Hornik, an honored school district volunteer.

Layne Anthony Morris, a former Wood County employee.

Willie S. Oliver, a now-retired Scott High School guidance counselor and athletic coach.

Frank Scarlato, who has an extensive business management and financial expertise.

Jamilah N. Jones, coordinator of graduate student recruitment at the University of Toledo's college of graduate studies.

According to the Board's president, **Dr. Steven Steel**, the board has 30 days to fill the seat vacated by Torres but it cannot appoint a replacement before ten days have elapsed from Torres's final day of service. Medicina Multilingüe: Ohio Colegio de Medicina Osteopática entrena con intérpretes de español

Athens, OH (Feb. 21, 2008): "En México mi abuela era una partera," dijo **Anabella Sánchez**, gerente de servicios de interpretación en Nationwide Children's Hospital (el hospital de niños) en Columbus, Ohio. Cuando Sánchez se mudó a Texas desde México a la edad de 21 años, estaba embarazada.

Se preparó no con chequeos prenatales, pero bebiendo té de comino, usado por parteras hispanas para inducir parto. Cuando daba a luz—su primer visita a un hospital EE.UU.-Americano—Sánchez no entendía ni una palabra; no hablaba inglés.

Sánchez representaba una minoría en creciendo. Las figuras de censura de los Estados Unidos estiman que 21.4 millones de Americanos (8.1 por ciento de la población) no hablan inglés "muy bien". Como Sánchez, estas personas tienen diferentes métodos para mantener su salud.

Para asistir estudiantes a servir esta población, Sánchez visitó a la Universidad de Ohio Colegio de Medicina Osteopática (OU-COM) en enero de 2008 adonde dirigió un programa de interpretación. Estudiantes de medicina en su segundo año atendieron sesiones, y en mayo todos los estudiantes en su primer año serán participantes.

"El estado de Ohio no es homogéneo," dijo Pat Burnett, Ph.D., la directora de programas multiculturales de OU-COM. "Queremos entrenar estudiantes de medicina para el futuro, y el futuro incluye una población diversa."

En la esfera medical, problemas de comunicación podrían resultar en desastre. En

1984, un hombre dijo a su novia que se sentía 'intoxicado' y sufrió un colapso. Cuando ella repitió la palabra, los paramédicos la interpretaron como 'ebrio' (en inglés: 'intoxicated'), pero el significado deseado era 'maureado'. Los médicos equivocaron el diagnóstico—pensaron que fuera un sobredosis lo que en realidad fue un cóagulo cerebral.

Durante el laboratorio en OU-COM, los pacientes de simulación que son de habla español fueron asignados o presión alta o diabetes, y ellos hablaron solamente en español, ayudados por uno de los seis intérpretes del hospital.

Con cinco personas en el cuarto de examinación, la estudiante Jess Nordin tenía que permanecer en pie. Ella se sintió incomoda mirar al paciente hacia abajo, pero "el intérprete hizo una gran diferencia."

Los estudiantes aprendieron técnicas para comunicarse más eficazmente. Por ejemplo tenían que dirigir la atención siempre a los pacientes, y tratar el intérprete como una "voz flotante."

"Aunque yo no entiendo, es muy incomodo si tú no estás poniéndome atención a mí, porque yo estoy enferma", dijo Rocio Pérez, una paciente simulada, durante el rendimiento de informe seguido del laboratorio.

Sánchez después enseñó lo básico de términos médicos en español durante un taller patrocinado por la Asociación Nacional de Estudiantes de Medicina (SNMA) de OU-COM. Ella demostró una presentación de términos de las diferentes partes del cuerpo, enfermedades y salud, subrayando que el uso de palabras en español por el doctor ayuda a crear confianza con el paciente.

La regla de Oro: mientras que estemos conscientes de las diferencias culturales, "Tratemos los pacientes de la misma manera que si hablaran inglés," dijo Sánchez.

Sánchez aprendió inglés por medio de telenovelas, libros y conversación cotidiana. Llegó a dominar su segunda idioma, y después de mudarse en Ohio, Sánchez fundió el programa de interpretación en el hospital de niños. Ahora supervisa 28 intérpretes—20 de español y ocho de somalí—que facilitan más de 6,000 encuentros por mes. Sánchez tiene empleados contingentes por 12 otras idiomas, incluyendo el francés, cantonés, suajili y árabe.

Para certificar intérpretes, Sánchez requiere 60 horas de entrenamiento y un examen de habilidad verbal, pero no hay leyes firmes ni estatales ni federales acerca del entrenamiento para los intérpretes médicos.

El Acto de Derechos Civiles de 1964 y el Departamento de Salud y Servicios Humanos requieren que los médicos que aceptan asistencia financiera federal (tal como Medicaid) deberían proveer servicios de interpretación gratis. Pero la obligación puede ser realizada en muchas diferentes maneras, incluyendo los servicios de voluntarios de la comunidad.

Aunque un paciente podría sentirse más cómodo si un miembro de la familia o un amigo actúa como el intérprete, individuos sin entrenamiento están más probables a cometer errores, dijo Sánchez. El proveedor debe de informar al paciente de sus derechos a tener un traductor profesional sin ningún cargo.

De Parte del Maestro

Raza vs. Raza, a sad dilemma... Recently I received an e-mail from a reader, who upon reading *Know your roots* (2/1/08), decided to write me regarding an issue that she has seen in the Latino community for a number of years... Latinos showing intolerance towards other Latinos (*gracias Melinda*).

Specifically, the reader experienced and witnessed the mistreatment of *mexicanos* born in Mexico and recently immigrated to the U.S., by those born and/or raised here. She also cited examples in which new immigrants are faced with scrutiny from not only those outside of *nuestra comunidad* but also within it. I would like to address this issue by not only acknowledging the problem exists and bringing it to light, but also expanding beyond the issue pertaining to just *mexicanos*, but *latinos* in general. The reality is that the life of any immigrant *latinoamericano* is not any easy one.

Lets first focus on the reasons that *latinos* immigrate to this country. There is one word which encompasses the primary motive—*opportunity*. I know this may seem *cliché*, but this truly is the land of opportunity. Those of you who have had the opportunity to travel to a Spanish-speaking country should understand completely, and those of you who haven't must do so in order to gain total appreciation for what I am stating.

When I say 'travel,' I mean that you have actually ventured out of the resort or hotel to see and experience *un pueblo* or *el barrio* of the country. If upon seeing you do not appreciate the *oportunidades* that we so often take for granted then I would question your humanity. Personally, I would say that I grew up poor; I have lived in projects, been on welfare, benefitted from pro-



grams like W.I.C., and shopped a *t segundas*. However, I have never experienced struggle like what I witnessed in places like *el D.F.* (Mexico City), *Merida*, *Yucatán*, or *La Republica Dominicana*.

People come here to escape that struggle, and upon arriving the prejudice and oppression that they face here pales in comparison to what they had faced in their native *país*. Take a look at where many immigrants are employed upon entering the United States—the physical labor force and the service industry. Regardless of immigration status, whether legal or undocumented, they are often exploited in the workplace. Essentially meaning, they are overworked and underpaid, with little or no benefits. **Myths and misconceptions**

For those that claim immigrants are 'taking away' jobs from U.S. citizens, let us assess this situation. When was the last time you saw a non-Latino *migrante*? Personally I have never seen one. When I was young, *mi tía*, who worked as a nurse in migrant camps in Northwest Ohio, used to take my siblings and I to the camps with her.

We would go there to play with the other children while she was working with patients. Kids being kids, I never really noticed any real differences between us, but did note that they had really tiny shacks that they lived in.

After my first year of teaching I worked as a pre-school teacher for the *Texas Migrant Council* in Helena, Ohio. Part of my job was to make home visits. I remember visiting the camps and just feeling disbelief about the living condi-

tions. The most bothersome aspect was that I wasn't in some third-world country; I was in my own backyard. In short, most of the jobs that immigrants fill are those that no one else really wants or they are seen as stepping-stone jobs.

Believe that immigrants are a costly burden to the U.S. taxpayer? Think again. If you took out the migrant workforce you could say good-bye to the relatively low cost of produce in this country. A head of lettuce for a buck? Forget about it. Just think about that the next time you get a great deal on some grapes or cucumbers.

Moving beyond the migrant population, immigrants do not come to the U.S. to not work and collect welfare. In fact, I find this to be a complete oxymoron. In addition, while the immigrant population does not benefit from many social services, they pump billions of dollars annually into the domestic economy and social security. The economy benefits from the immigrant as a consumer.

You are no better than the next Latino

I am puzzled by the concept that one *latino* can feel he or she is somehow superior to another. First, a person is a person regardless of race, class, or gender. At the most basic level, we are all human beings; we all breathe and bleed. While it is true that some people contribute more to society than others, that doesn't mean you are 'better' than anyone else.

As the reader wrote to me in her e-mail, I too 'cringe' when I hear a *latino* say that another *latino* should 'go back to where they came from.' How can you say that? Listen, whether you and your family crossed the border or the border crossed you, the struggle and story of all *latinos* is more similar than it is different. If you are so disconnected from your *cultura* that you feel like this then I challenge you to get back in touch with your roots.

I can only speculate that the feelings that one person is more deserving of the right to live in this country than another is spawned from ignorance. Maybe that person has never known the struggle of being an immigrant. Perhaps they were never enlightened by those in their family that have.

It could be that language is the motivating factor. I agree that everyone in this country would benefit from speaking English, but believe it or not there are many places in this country where you do not need to speak *inglés*. For those that feel this way I hope you also speak Spanish or are learning to. After all, Spanish was spoken in this country before English was. Lastly, English is a very difficult language to learn; just some food for thought.

This is a time to unite
Unless you have been living under a rock, you know that *latinos* are now the largest ethnic minority in the U.S. The reason I bring this up is because if we as a *raza* continue to engage in self-hate and disunity, then we are destined to become a powerless population.

To the contrary, if we unite and mobilize in our communities, then we are a force and voice that must be accommodated. I have discussed previously the importance of voting and doing so in a well-informed manner.

The time is now *mi gente*. We can collectively cause a change for the better for *nuestra raza y más importante para nuestros jóvenes*.

My feelings and this article can be summed up by a clever sign that I saw recently on a church sign addressing the lent season: *Forget the sweets, give up the hate. ¡Hasta la próxima vez!*
