Las Mariposas reflect human rights, opportunities, and struggles

It takes one man's courage to define history. It took the brutal murder of three defenseless *hermanas* to topple a horrific regime and change the course of life in the Dominican Republic.

March 8, 2007 marked the 98th observance of International Women's Day, devoted to gender equality, human rights, and women's struggles.

In honor of International Women's Day, the *Julia De Burgos Cultural Arts Center* presented a lecture and a movie—in the Time of the Butterflies, starring Selma Hayek and Marc Anthony, is adapted from Julia Alvarez's book that fictionalizes the lives of three national heroines.

Code named *Las Mariposas*, or *The Butterflies*, three sisters—Minerva, María Teresa, and Patria Mirabal—proved monumental in the underground movement to overthrow Rafael Leónidas

Trujillo (dictator of the Dominican Republic from 1930 to 1961). Their assassination on November 25, 1960 started the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women that is widely celebrated in Latin America on the same date.

For some, the movie is a moving masterpiece that sparks eerie parallels to the current affairs of the world. "It's just a different

Arrests of immigrants in U.S. leaves children stranded by U.S. authorities

NEW BEDFORD, Massachusetts (AP): Dozens of young children were stranded at schools and with baby sitters after their parents were rounded up by U.S. authorities, who raided a leather goods maker suspected of hiring undocumented immigrants, authorities said.

Gov. Deval Patrick said March 7, 2007, that the children of the detainees—most of whom are from Guatemala and El Salvador—might not be receiving proper care.

"We are particularly concerned about the Guatemalan community and the risk that they may be fearful about disclosing the existence or whereabouts of their children given their history with government agencies," Patrick wrote in a letter asking U.S. Congressman William Delahunt to ensure federal authorities allow social workers access to the detainees.

Delahunt said federal officials told him state workers would be allowed to interview two dozen people in custody.

Immigration officials said 327 of the 500 employees of Michael Bianco Inc., mostly women, were detained Tuesday for possible deportation as undocumented immigrants.

About 100 children were stuck with baby sitters, caretakers and others, said Corinn Williams, director of the Community Economic Development Center of Southeastern Massachusetts.

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement said that no children were stranded and that authorities released 60 detainees for reasons mostly related to child care issues.

Social service officials said they were working with local authorities and community activists to help families.

Company owner



Francesco Insolia, 50, and three top managers were arrested. A fifth person was arrested on charges of helping workers obtain fake identification.

Authorities allege Insolia oversaw sweatshop conditions so he could meet the demands of \$91 million in U.S. military contracts to make products including safety vests and lightweight backpacks.

Investigators said the workers toiled in dingy conditions and faced onerous fines, such as a \$20 charge for talking while working and spending more than two minutes in the bathroom.

An Army spokesman did not return a call seeking comment about the status of the company's contracts.

Bill Gates insta a legisladores a mejorar inmigración y educación

(AP): El presidente de la firma Microsoft, Bill Gates, dijo ante el Congreso de Estados Unidos el miércoles que se necesitaban reformas urgentes a las escuelas y a las leyes de inmigración del país para evitar que los empleos se trasladen a otros países.

"Estados Unidos no podrá mantener su liderazgo económico a menos que nuestra fuerza laboral esté formada por personas que tengan el conocimiento y las habilidades necesarias para impulsar la innovación", señaló Gates ante una comisión del Senado que revisa los temas laborales y de educación.

"Como país, debemos comenzar con esta meta: todos los niños en Estados Unidos deben terminar la educación secundaria", agregó.

Gates explicó que la economía del país depende en mantener las fronteras del país abiertas a los trabajadores muy especializados, particular-

a ampliar el límite de visas que se conceden al año.

Gates, quien según la revista Forbes es el hombre más acaudalado de Estados Unidos, también dijo ante la Comisión, al responder a una pregunta, que se opone a una eliminación del impuesto federal a las propiedades.

La ley actual eliminará ese impuesto para el año 2010, pero si el Congreso no actúa, será restaurado con una tasa del 55% para el 2011.

Hispanic Caucus chair survives confidence vote

WASHINGTON, March 6, 2007 (AP): The chairman of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus said he survived a confidence vote Tuesday night, and he pledged to unify the group in the wake of an embarrassing leadership dispute that led one of his critics to quit.

Rep. Joe Baca, D-Calif., refused to give details about the vote after an hour-and-a-half meeting broke up except to say that it happened and he won. His critics and others in the 21-member, all-Democratic caucus refused comment.

Baca critics had been pushing for a new leadership structure that would dilute his power, but he had resisted.

"We're all united," Baca told reporters. "This is basically a step in the right direction."

Baca has been accused by fellow Southern California Democratic Rep. Loretta Sanchez of calling her a "whore," which he denies. Sanchez quit the group and other women in the caucus complained that Baca's leadership fosters an atmosphere that belittles women.

Baca was supported by only one of six women in the caucus when he was elected chairman in November, and Sanchez, her sister Rep. Linda Sanchez, and two others subsequently contested the election procedure.

Baca's spokesman, Michael Levin, issued a statement after Tuesday's meeting.

"Members of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus gave CHC chair Joe Baca a vote of confidence tonight. Congressman Baca appreciates the support of his CHC colleagues and looks forward to working with them on concerns of the nation's 45 million Hispanics," the statement said.

Arrestan a 36 inmigrantes en fábrica de Indiana

MISHAWAKA, Indiana, 7 de marzo de 2007 (AP): Agentes de inmigración arrestaron a 36 trabajadores en una fábrica de productos de plástico en Indiana por sospecha de que estaban en el país ilegalmente.

Más de medio centenar de agentes de la Agencia de Inmigración y Aduanas allanaron el martes la fábrica Janco Composites con una orden judicial que les permitía interrogar a los trabajadores y verificar sus documentos.

Gail Montenero, portavoz de la agencia, dijo que 36 trabajadores—35 de nacionalidad mexicana y un salvadoreño—fueron arrestados. Fueron trasladados en autobús hasta Broadview, Illinois, un centro de aduanas donde fueron entrevistados y se les tomó fichas datiloscópicas.

Los arrestos tienen lugar más de tres

semanas después que Etzel Ortiz Partida, de 27 años, fue arrestada y acusada de usar el número de Seguro Social de otra persona para trabajar en Janco, donde fue contratada en el 2001, además de haber obtenido una licencia de conducir de Indiana y un documento de identidad.

Ortiz Partida, de nacionalidad mexicana, fue enviada a la cárcel del condado de St. Joseph.

Más de 250 personas trabajan en la fábrica, según informa la empresa en su sitio de Internet.

Horas después del allanamiento, una iglesia de South Bend realizó una vigilia de oración por los detenidos.

El ministro religioso Christopher Cox, pastor de las iglesias de St. Adalbert y St. Casimir de South Bend, dijo que sus feligreses podrían figurar entre los arrestados.

Obama desea que inmigrantes legales obtengan ciudadanía

7 de marzo de 2007 (AP): El senador Barack Obama se unió a una campaña para mantener la ciudadanía estadounidense dentro del alcance de los inmigrantes.

Aunque la inmigración ilegal presenta algunos desafíos espinosos para los demócratas, ambos partidos apoyan ampliamente la idea de promover la ciudadanía para los que entran legalmente al país.

El ser parte del esfuerzo podría redituarse políticamente a Obama, quien aspira a la candidatura demócrata a la presidencia en los comicios del 2008.

Los ciudadanos por naturalización tienden a votar, y muchos no se han afiliado con ningún partido político, de acuerdo con estudios de la Asociación Nacional de Funcionarios Latinos Electos y Designados. Aproximadamente la mitad de los millones de inmigrantes que podrían aspirar a obtener la ciudadanía son hispanos.

El gobierno del presidente George W. Bush ha propuesto casi duplicar el costo de solicitar la ciudadanía estadounidense y también elevar las cuotas para poder recibir otros beneficios si uno es inmigrante.

Un proyecto de ley presentado por Obama junio

con los representantes Luis Gutiérrez y Jan Schakowsky, también demócratas, requeriría que el gobierno congele a sus niveles actuales las cuotas que se requieren para efectuar una solicitud.

La propuesta también pide que se destinen 80 millones de dólares al año para promover que los inmigrantes obtengan la ciudadanía y para proporcionar subvenciones a grupos comunitarios que auxilian a los extranjeros radicados en el país a convertirse en ciudadanos.

El mensaje que la propuesta de ley busca dar a los inmigrantes legales es: "Si trabajas duro, si actúas con responsabilidad, si te haces cargo de tus hijos, si te apegas a nuestros valores, entonces nosotros trabajaremos igual de duro para asegurar que tengas una oportunidad justa para unirte a la familia estadounidense", dijo Obama.

Obama backs citizenship promotion bill

(AP): Presidential hopeful Barack Obama joined in an effort to keep U.S. citizenship within reach for immigrants—including some 9 million already eligible to become citizens.

Although undocumented immigration is presenting some thorny challenges for

Democrats, the idea of promoting U.S.-American citizenship for those who enter the country legally is widely supported in both parties.

Being part of the effort could have some political payoff for Obama, a Democratic senator from Illinois.

Naturalized citizens tend to be more likely to vote and many have not aligned themselves with a political party, according to studies by the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials. About half of the millions of citizenship-eligible immigrants are Latinos. "When you talk about folks that can be wooed and can be won over, there's no affiliation to any political party, it makes sense," said Larry González, a Latino political consultant with the Raben Group lobbying firm.

Attempts to provide more funding for English and civics classes for immigrants withered last year when a sweeping immigration reform bill stalled under the Republican-controlled Congress.

The Bush administration drew heavy criticism recently with plans to nearly double the cost of applying for U.S. citizenship and drastically raise fees for other immigration benefits.

"For more than a year you've heard lawmakers from every corner of this city and governors from just about every border state ... say, 'Crack down on illegal immigration. Get control of it, but

make life better for people who want to come to the country legally and want to become our newest citizens,'" Obama said Tuesday.

Legislation introduced by Obama with Reps. Luis Gutiérrez and Jan Schakowsky, also Illinois Democrats, would require the federal government to freeze application fees at current levels.

The bill also calls for \$80 million a year to promote civics classes for immigrants withered last year when a sweeping immigration reform bill stalled under the Republican-controlled Congress.

The bill's message to legal immigrants is "if you work hard, if you act responsibly, if you take care of your children, if you embrace our values, then we will work just as hard to ensure that you get a fair shot at joining the American family," Obama said.

Examples of possible effects of Michigan's Proposal 2

(AP): State government programs that the Michigan Civil Rights Commission said appear to violate or could violate Proposal 2:

- Some collective bargaining agreements involving the state of Michigan and its workers that grant preferential treatment, such as one involving a contract that says "the employer may lay off and recall out-of-line seniority because of gender."

- Programs that grant money to black and Latino college students majoring in K-12 education, and King-Chavez-Parks educator development programs.

- Adoption of children with special needs through programs that include a payment of subsidies. The law does not specify what exactly is meant by "membership in a minority or sibling group" or "ethnic or family background."

- The Commission on Spanish Speaking Affairs, which is restricted to members who are "Spanish-speaking and of Spanish-speaking origin."

- A provision that grants preferences to minority and women-owned businesses in procurements through the state's executive branch.

- A minority student grant program for those enrolled in medical schools, nursing programs or physician's assistant programs.

- Single Business Tax credits for companies that have been certified as a "minority venture capital company." These companies could still get

tax benefits they would qualify for without regard to minority status.

- A potential pilot project that involves foster parent resource centers designed to aid children with special needs. The project could have Proposal 2 problems, but there are centers in place, so there have been no violations, the report said.

Some programs the commission says do not appear to violate Proposal 2 because they do not discriminate, provide preferential treatment, are exempted under terms of the law because of federal funding requirements or other reasons, or fall outside of the scope of public employment, contracting or education:

- Chronic disease screening, referral and counseling services under the African American Male Health Initiative.
- Smoking prevention programs that give priority to pregnant women, women with young children, or adolescents.
- Maternal and child health grants to local health departments.
- Coverage of breast and cervical cancer treatment.
- Single-sex schools or classrooms, as long as equal opportunities are provided for both boys and girls.

- Equal opportunity in contracting for county road projects, as long as the programs do not discriminate.

- Division of Minority Business Enterprise programs that are not "premised exclusively" on race, sex, color, ethnicity or national origin.

Gilberto Gil of Brazil to perform in Ann Arbor

Brazilian singer-songwriter legend Gilberto Gil appears in an exclusive Midwest performance on Friday, March 16, 2007, at 8:00 pm at *Ann Arbor Hill Auditorium*, hosted by The University Musical Society.

Gilberto Gil has developed one of the most renowned careers in Brazilian music—as a singer, composer, and guitarist, spanning over 40 years, 30 albums (including 12 gold records and five platinum albums), seven Grammy awards, and more than 4 million records sold.

Gil started as a *bossa nova* musician, incorporating and blending African and North American influences into his music. With fellow musician Caetano Veloso, Gil created the *tropicalismo* movement, or *tropicalia*. Deeply critical on political and moral issues, with nothing off limits, they confronted social inequity, racism, science, religion, and other cultural concerns.

Because of the impact of his music and lyrics, *tropicalismo* was repressed by the authoritarian regime, in power in Brazil at the time. Both Gil and Veloso were imprisoned by Brazilian authorities in

1969 for their "anti-government" activities.

Upon their release, both were exiled to London, where Gil collaborated with groups like Yes, Pink Floyd, and the *Incredible String Band*.

In the early 1990s, back in Brazil, Gil was selected as a government officer in his hometown of Salvador. In 2003, new Brazilian president Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva chose Gil as his Minister of Culture. Recently, Gil has enacted a bill that treats drug addiction as a public health concern rather than a criminal matter.





time and place, but the issues are the same," said Monica Galang who attended the event Friday, March 9, 2007.

This struggle is painstakingly presented with each female character—the mother, the sister, the revolutionary. The delicate balance between femininity and courage are beautifully maintained. The women actively contribute to the movement against a tyrant while maintaining their roles as nurturing and loving mothers. "Anyone with a conscience should watch this movie," says Galang. She felt empowered by the story and heartbroken at the same time.

Dr. Daisy Diaz, a board member of the Julia De Burgos Cultural Arts Center, said the movie was chosen because it shows the courage of a woman, Minerva Mirabal, who broke the barriers of education and was the first Latina to receive a law degree, standing up for justice, human rights, and gender equality.

"It's easy for men to be heroes," said guest lecturer Dr. Antonio Medina-Rivera, Associate Professor of Spanish at Cleveland State University. "For women to become heroines, they are criticized when leaving home and have to struggle between their 'love for the country' and 'love for their children.'

In the Time of the Butterflies is an eternal masterpiece that carries numerous important messages and deserves to be seen and discussed throughout the ages. Its story will ring true throughout the ages and

throughout the world.

Nearly fifty people attended the event. Professor Medina-Rivera began by highlighting the life of revolutionary poet Julia de Burgos and reciting her poetry. He called her poems erotic and embedded with metaphors that represent the struggle of the country's fight to freedom and the women's struggle to equal opportunities.

Medina-Rivera said women are still struggling today for their rights, physical integrity, freedom of speech, and equal job opportunity. "Even if we look at the U.S. women get less money than men, the corporate are controlled by men," he said. Medina-Rivera says it important for Latinos to understand and reconnect with their history because the issues are more paramount than ever before.

"The Julia De Burgos Cultural Arts Center strives to present educational programs to educate people about Latino history, especially now," says Samira Schofield, the vice-president of the Center's Board of Trustees, who presented Professor Medina-Rivera with a logo screen to thank him for his participation in the program.



Readers speak out: Lalo's 'La Cucaracha' comic strip quickly returns to the Times, to the pleasure of wombats y cucarachas, pero out goes el gato!

LOS ANGELES, March 7, 2007 (AP): There was joy in "Roachville" on Wednesday as the edgy, Latino-themed comic strip "La Cucaracha" returned to the *Los Angeles Times* after a swift, Internet-driven protest.

The newspaper had dropped the comic strip Monday, March 5, 2007, to make room for other features.

Lalo Alcaráz, the creator of "La Cucaracha," said he was dumbfounded when he opened his hometown paper that day and saw no sign of the wisecracking, antennae Chicano hipster named *Cuco Rocha* or any of his brood friends.

"They didn't give a hint of who they were going to drop," he said. "It was kind of poor form."

The move was short-lived.

"We've had some reader reaction, which is why we brought 'La Cucaracha' back," Times spokeswoman Nancy Sullivan said. She couldn't immediately say



how many unhappy e-mails the *Times* had received but noted it was "enough that we thought we should listen and bring it back."

To make room, the *Times* gave the boot to veteran comic strip cat, *el gato*, "Heathcliff."

"*La Cucaracha*" was one of four strips the *Times* dropped to create more space for its kids reading page. Sullivan said it was unlikely the others, "Candorville," "Mr. Boffo" and "Mallard Fillmore," would return.


Alcaráz said he had been dropped from newspapers before but usually when "La

Cucaracha" managed to offend either a publisher or a large segment of a community. As far as he knew, he said, he was on good terms with the *Times*.

When his strip went missing on Monday, he quickly called his editor at Universal Press Syndicate.

"He said, 'You've got to call out your *Cucaracha* army,'" the cartoonist recalled with a laugh.

Alcaráz quickly began e-mailing friends and saw his message posted on Web logs. By Wednesday, he said, he had been copied in on some 300 unhappy e-



mails sent to the *Times*.

"I was hoping for like a dozen," he said.

Universal Press Syndicate believes "*La Cucaracha*" one of just a handful of Latino-themed strips, had particular resonance in Los Angeles, with its large Hispanic population.

"To us, this is an indication of a newspaper really taking a look at the audience that it is serving and doing a careful job of evaluating that, and in this case it was the Latino community," Universal Press Syndicate spokeswoman Kathie Kerr said.

Wednesday's strip had

Eddie, who works at the Barrio Bugle newspaper, arguing with his mother over what news is more important to the community—the killing of U.S. soldiers in Iraq or the deaths of James Brown and Anna Nicole Smith.

Alcaráz said his experience might someday find its way into "*La Cucaracha*."

"Maybe the paper will drop a strip featuring a wombat and all the wombats will come out and it will turn out wombats are half their readers," *Alcaráz* offered.

mujeres, fueron detenidas el martes por agentes de inmigración, y enfrentaban una posible deportación por trabajar siendo indocumentadas.

Como consecuencia, unos 100 niños quedaron a cargo de niñeras, cuidadores u otras personas, dijo Corinn Williams, directora del Centro de Desarrollo Económico Comunitario del Sudeste de Massachusetts.

"Seguimos recibiendo noticias sobre niños que quedaron abandonados", manifestó. "Se ha registrado una crisis humanitaria generalizada aquí en New Bedford".

El departamento de servicios sociales del estado trabajaba el miércoles para garantizar que los niños fueran atendidos de manera apropiada. La subsecretaría del departamento de Seguridad Interna Julie Myers manifestó que ocho mujeres embarazadas fueron liberadas, y que también serían liberadas las mujeres que tienen bajo su cuidado a sus hijos. Indicó, no obstante, que llevaba tiempo verificar los relatos de las personas.

Durante el allanamiento del martes, fueron arrestados también el dueño de la empresa, Francesco Insolia, de 50 años, y tres gerentes. Las autoridades alegan que se conocerá la verdadera historia, y en ese momento será una situación muy diferente".

Fundada en 1985, la empresa Michael Bianco Inc., se especializó en la fabricación de productos de cuero refinado para Coach Inc. y Timberland Co. antes de obtener un contrato de 91 millones de dólares con el ejército en el 2003.

El fiscal estadounidense Michael Sullivan acusó a Insolia de explotar a los inmigrantes ilegales para maximizar sus beneficios. Los contratos eran para

La calidad de las traducciones médicas influye en los servicios de salud

ANN ARBOR: Un número cada vez mayor de personas en Estados Unidos no habla inglés y si médicos y pacientes tienen barreras culturales y de lenguaje, la calidad de las traducciones constituye un problema, según un estudio publicado en la revista *Journal of Health Care for the Poor and Underserved*.

Dr. Michael Fetter, profesor asociado de medicina familiar de la Universidad de Michigan, UM, y *Daniela García-Castillo*, estudiante de Biología y miembro del Programa de Oportunidad de Investigación de Pregrado de la UM, evaluaron y analizaron sistemáticamente los recursos disponibles y tradujeron documentos de investigación clínica y médica y concluyeron que colocar atención en los procedimientos de traducción "puede mejorar la calidad de los cuidados de salud para los pacientes con conocimientos limitados de inglés".

"Las traducciones médicas son un proceso complejo que requiere mucho más que una conversión mecánica de un idioma al otro", advierten. "Sin la traducción de calidad de documentos médicos en el lenguaje de los pacientes, los proveedores de salud no pueden ofrecer cuidados de

salud de calidad y los pacientes sufren el riesgo de recibir servicios inferiores".

Mientras que varios estudios recientes se han concentrado en problemas de la interpretación oral en ambientes médicos, la investigación de la UM se centró en la exactitud de la traducción de materiales escritos de un lenguaje al otro.

Los investigadores anotan lo siguiente:

- Entre 40 a 45 millones de adultos en los EEUU son analfabetos funcionales, es decir no pueden llevar a cabo tareas de lectura básicas para funcionar en la sociedad y otros 50 millones de personas en EEUU son sólo marginalmente alfabetizados.

- Las personas con mayores riesgos de recibir servicios sanitarios deficientes son las que tienen pocos conocimientos de inglés. La Investigación, realizada predominantemente sobre minorías indigentes descubrió que 35.1% de los que hablaban inglés y un 67.1 % de los que hablaban español tenían una alfabetización marginal o inadecuada en salud. La misma investigación encontró el analfabetismo aún peor entre adultos mayores de 60 años: Un

81.3 % de los que hablaban inglés y un 82.6 % de los que hablaban español.

- Los formularios de consentimiento general en los hospitales son a menudo difíciles de entender para algunos pacientes a pesar de que en la actualidad el promedio del nivel de lectura en EEUU es de octavo grado para la mayor parte de los adultos y de quinto grado para la mayoría de los miembros de Medicaid.

- El Acta de Derechos Civiles de 1964 obliga a los hospitales a ofrecer interpretación oral, pero no los obliga a dar traducción médica.

"Un área que recibe muy poca atención es la precisión de las traducciones médicas", argumentan. "Errores de traducción pueden tener consecuencias clínicas críticas incluyendo malentendidos de servicios médicos, como atrasos en diagnósticos o tratamientos, y pruebas generales y de laboratorio y hospitalizaciones innecesarias. Errores en documentos de investigación puede causar comparaciones y conclusiones imprecisas".

Una manera para mejorar la calidad de las traducciones, advierten, es incluir el entrenamiento diseñado para entender el sujeto y el lenguaje y hacer

del español, el lenguaje más común en los EEUU, tras el inglés, parte obligatoria del currículo en más Escuelas de Medicina a través del país.

"Teóricamente, una mejor traducción de documentos puede disminuir los costes de hospitalización porque reduce la duración y posiblemente hay menos pruebas de diagnóstico", argumentan. "En general, se cree que invertir en traducciones precisas tiene beneficios a largo plazo y justifica los costes de traductores bien entrenados y buenas traducciones".

Quality of medical translations impacts quality of care

ANN ARBOR: An increasing number of U.S.-Americans can't speak English and when doctors and patients have language and cultural barriers, the quality of translations can be a problem, University of Michigan researchers argue in the *Journal of Health Care for the Poor and Underserved*.

Dr. Michael Fetter, UM associate professor of family medicine and *Daniela García-Castillo*, a biology student in UM's Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program, systematically reviewed and analyzed resources, translating clinical and medical research documents, and concluded, "Attention to translation procedures can improve the quality of care for limited English proficiency patients."

"Medical translation is a complex process involving more than mechanically converting one language to another," they argue. "Without quality translations of medical documents in the language of their patients, clinical providers cannot provide best quality care, and patients are at risk for receiving inferior care."

While a number of recent studies have attended to problems in medical settings with oral interpretation, the conversion of one language into the spoken language of another, the UM research focused on accurately translating written materials from one language into an equivalent written form in another language.

The researchers note:

- An estimated 40 to 45 million U.S. adults are functionally illiterate, meaning they cannot perform basic reading tasks required to function in society while another 50 million U.S.-Americans are only marginally literate.

- Limited English proficiency individuals are at special risk. Research of predominantly indigent minorities found 35.1 percent of English-speaking and 67.1 percent of Spanish-speaking patients had inadequate or marginal health literacy. The same research found health illiteracy even worse among adults 60 and over: 81.3 percent for English-speaking and 82.6 percent for Spanish speaking patients.

- Consent forms are often difficult to understand for some patients even as the average U.S. reading level is now an eighth grade level for most adults and a fifth grade level for most Medicaid enrollees.

- The Civil Rights Act of 1964 mandates that hospitals provide oral interpretation but not medical translation.

"An area receiving little attention has been the ac-



curacy of translation of medical materials," they argue. "Translation errors can have critical clinical consequences for patient-provider misunderstandings through delays in diagnosis or treatment, and unnecessary testing or hospitalization. Errors in research documents can cause inaccurate comparisons and conclusions."

A way to improve the quality of translation, they note is training designed for developing and understanding of both the subject matter and the language and making medical Spanish, the most common language besides English in the United States, a part of the curriculum at more medical schools.

"Theoretically, better translation of documents could decrease hospital costs by reducing hospitalization duration and possibly the ordering of fewer diagnostic tests," they argue. "Generally, there is a sense, but no data confirming, that investing in accurate translation has long-term benefits that justify costs of well-trained translators and accurate translations."
