# GOP's Voinovich calls anti-tax pledge dishonest

20, 2008 (AP): Without mentioning fellow Republican senator John McCain by name, U.S. Sen. George Voinovich said anyone who tells U.S.-Americans their federal taxes aren't going up "isn't being truthful."

McCain, the presumptive Republican presidential nominee, pledged on national television in February that he would not raise taxes as president.

"No new taxes," McCain said during an interview with ABC's "This Week." He said that under no circumstances would he increase taxes, and added that he could "see an argument, if our economy continues to deteriorate, for lower interest rates, lower tax rates, and certainly decreasing corporate tax rates," as well as giving people the ability to write off depreciation and eliminating the alternative minimum tax.

Voinovich, the 71year-old party maverick who has served as Ohio governor and Cleveland mayor, said in a speech that the nation can't survive without either significant fiscal changes or a tax increase.

"We're going to have to raise more money in this country. Did you hear

COLUMBUS, March me? We're going to have to increase taxes in order to do the job," Voinovich said in a Wednesday speech before the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission. "Anyone that tells you that's not the case isn't being truthful with you. They're not being intellectually honest with you."

Democrats quickly jumped on Voinovich's statement as evidence that McCain will not be able to follow through on his plan if elected to hold taxes at current rates.

Ohio Democratic Party chairman Chris Redfern said Voinovich, Ohio's highest ranking GOP official, is effectively calling McCain a liar.

"Just a few years ago, John McCain stood with George Voinovich in supporting fundamentally sound tax policy," Redfern said. "John McCain has walked away from his grasp of reality in pursuit of the nomination and now the presidency."

Chris Paulitz, a spokesman for Voinovich, said the Ohio senator supports McCain for president and did not intend his statements to relate to anything aside from what he was at the event to talk about: Ohio's and the nation's fiscal and infrastructure challenges.

"He (Voinovich) does

not want taxes raised right now, he would not vote to raise taxes right now, and he would not propose raising taxes right now,' Paulitz said. "He is telling people what would happen if we don't right this ship."

Paulitz accused Democrats, who distributed the remarks to journalists Thursday, of trying to create infighting between two Republicans to distract from the infighting between Democratic presidential contenders Barack Obama and Hillary Rodham Clinton.

"People are going to have differences with each other," Paulitz said. "But look, the Ohio Democrats are seeing what everybody else is seeing, and that's that both their candidates are tearing each other apart and it's giving John McCain a big boost in the polls."

A message was left with the McCain campaign seeking comment.

# Empate en elección de líder del PRD

Partido de la Revolución Democrática (PRD), que acusó enérgicamente a sus rivales de fraude y corrupción durante las elecciones presidenciales del 2006, está envuelto ahora en una contienda por su liderazgo que se ha visto plagada de similares acusaciones.

El PRD, de tendencia izquierdista, lanzó protestas callejeras masivas, bloqueó largos tramos de la céntrica avenida Paseo de la Reforma y convocó infructuosamente a un recuento de votos luego que su candidato, Andrés Manuel López Obrador, perdiese ante el candidato conservador Felipe Calderón del Partido Acción Nacional por medio punto porcentual.

López Obrador dijo en aquel momento que fue despojado del triunfo por

Se reportaron problemas en 376 de los 4.976 colegios electorales.

"Mal se ve un partido que denunció un fraude presidencial en 2006 y ahora se entrega de lleno \_y de forma mas que burda\_ a esa práctica", escribió el miércoles el analista político José Antonio Crespo en el diario Excelsior.

El PRD se ha visto fracturado por severas disputas internas desde la

Obrador. La votación del domingo fue vista como un referendum sobre si el futuro del partido será dictado por el grupo de López Obrador o el ala más moderada, que ha trabajado con la rama ejecutiva para aprobar incluyendo leyes, radicales reformas electorales y judiciales.

El ex alcalde de la Ciudad de México, Alejandro Encinas, un aliado de López Obrador que favorece una línea dura contra el gobierno de Calderón, y Jesús Ortega, un ex senador moderado que es más propenso a alentar al partido a colaborar con el presidente, estaban empatados con 42% de los votos, cuando se habían contado 70% de las boletas Los resultados finales serán dados a conocer el domingo.





# Dalai Lama pide fin a marcha hacia el Tíbet

DHARMSALA, India, el 19 de marzo de 2008 (AP): El Dalai Lama pidió el miércoles a los activistas tibetanos en marcha hacia el Tíbet que detengan su desafío al gobierno chino.

En tanto, varios exiliados tibetanos continuaban con sus protestas pacíficas en puntos del norte de India y en la capital, Nueva Delhi.

Un día después de manifestar su temor por la posibilidad de un enfrentamiento sangriento con las fuerzas chinas en la frontera, el líder espiritual y político se reunió con miembros de cinco grupos que están organizando la marcha hacia Lhasa, la capital de Tíbet.

"Su santidad solicitó (a los grupos) poner fin a la marcha de protesta hacia e Tíbet", dijo Tenzin Taklha, un importante asesor del Dalai Lama. "Dejó claro que no puede ordenarlos a no hacerlo, pero les pidió que paren".

China tildó el miércoles al Dalai Lama de "lobo con hábito de monje" y afirmó estar embarcada en una lucha "a vida o muerte" con sus partidarios tras las mayores protestas callejeras en ese territorio contra el régimen comunista en casi dos décadas.

Los organizadores se negaron a comentar sobre lo sucedido en la reunión, pero señalaron que continuarán dialogando y pronto anunciarán una decisión.

La marcha comenzó días después de que más de 100 exiliados tibetanos fueran detenidos intentando marchar desde Dharmsala, donde se encuentra el gobierno tibetano en exilio, a Lhasa.

Mientras, dicho gobierno sostuvo una protesta en la



capital india el miércoles y pidieron una investigación independiente sobre la reciente violencia en el Tíbet. Pidieron también poner fin a la opresión china en la región.

Los 43 miembros del parlamento llegaron al centro de Nueva Delhi para mostrar solidaridad con los manifestantes en Lhasa, dijo el parlamentario Youdon Aukatsang.

"Es una crisis en Tíbet y creo que la comunidad mundial debe pronunciarse y condenar muy fuertemente al gobierno

chino", dijo Aukatsang.

Los medios informativos extranjeros no tienen acceso al Tíbet y la prensa oficial china sólo ha difundido la versión oficial de los hechos, según los cuales los manifestantes mataron a 16 personas. El gobierno insistió que los soldados no dispararon a los revoltosos y negó las versiones de tibetanos en el exilio de que los muertos ascienden a 80.

# Richardson, only Latino governor, endorses Obama for the speech on race

March 21, 2008 (AP): Bill Richardson, the only Latino governor in the United States, backed Barack Obama for president, moved to deliver his much-coveted endorsement by the senator's speech about race.

The New Mexico governor joined Obama at a spirited rally Friday and said the Illinois senator demonstrated his leadership abilities this week with his speech on race. "You are a once-ina-lifetime leader," the governor said from the stage. "Above all, you will be a president who brings this nation together." Richardson dropped his own bid for the nomination in January. Richardson was relentlessly courted by both candidates and his support for Obama provides him a potential counterweight to Clinton's strength among Latino voters.

It was not the first time racial concerns had helped to drive a prominent backer to Obama. Massachusetts U.S. Sen. Edward Kennedy was moved to drop his neutrality and side with Obama in part because of what he saw as Bill Clinton's racially tinged criticisms of the senator.

Richardson heaped praise on Obama's speech of March 18th, about the nation's racial This speech in its entirety can be viewed online

"As a Hispanic-American, I was particularly touched by his words," Richardson said. "Senator Obama has started a discussion in this country that is long overdue and rejects the politics of pitting race against race."

# Inmigrantes árabes recelosos de los militares

DETROIT, el 20 de marzo de 2008 (AP): Cinco años después de la invasión a Irak, el ejército dice que está cumpliendo superando los objetivos de reclutar a traductores árabes. Pero pese a la creciente aceptación del ejército entre los ejército entre los inmigrantes árabes, los reclutadores admiten que buena parte de esa comunidad se mantiene recelosa de las fuerzas ar-

madas. "Al principio, había más Al principio, naoia mas hostilidad por parte de la comunidad. Eso fue en el momento más álgido de la invasión", dijo Mona Makki, experta en idiomas y que sirve de vínculo con la comunidad árabe en Detroit. "Ahora nos observan de una manera más positiva", añadió. Hassan Jaber, director

del Centro Comunitario para Servicios Sociales y Económicos, con sede en Dearborn, dijo que el ejército ha logrado cierta credibilidad en la comunidad árabe, pero no

"Según entendido, las personas que se ofrecen como voluntarias y aceptan esos trabajos lo están haciendo en secreto", dijo. "Tal vez se sienten avergonzadas ... y si aceptan, es por el dinero que les ofrecen, no necesariamente porque piensan que la guerra está justificada".

El sargento Mario Banderas, de 39 años, oriundo del Líbano, se unió al ejército en Detroit y cumplió su período de servicio en el 2005 como traductor en Irak. Al regresar, se puso a trabajar como reclutador.
"Tenía la idea de que

podía hablar en la comunidad y probablemente conseguir que al menos dos o tres personas por día se unieran al ejército. Pero ese no es el caso", dijo Banderas (su apellido es un alias. El ejército no divulga los nombres verdaderos de los traductores por razones de seguridad y para

protegerlos).

"La idea que las personas tienen aquí es, apenas me ven con el uniforme: 'Oh, ¿usted está en el ejército norteamericano? ¿Usted está en Irak matando a su propio pueblo?'

El dice que esos comentarios lo indignan, pero no les echa la culpa a los críticos "pues ellos no saben lo que ocurre en el ejército"

Banderas, arquitecto que habla seis idiomas, trabaja con reclutadores civiles de ascendencia árabe para nuevos encontrar traductores en la zona de Detroit, donde hay unas 300.000 personas que provienen del Medio Oriente.

Los solicitantes deben tener entre 17 y 42 años edad, poseer documentos demuestren su residencia legal en Estados Unidos, saber árabe e inglés. El proceso incluye un examen físico y la búsqueda de antecedentes.

El ejército ha cumplido con sus objetivos de reclutamiento para su programa de traductores desde el 2006, luego de sufrir un déficit en los tres primeros años de la guerra. En el 2006, reclutó 277 traductores, y al año siguiente, 250.

# **Prosecutor** Worthy makes announcement on Detroit mayor's charges

DETROIT, March 24, 2008 (AP): Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy has announced numerous criminal charges for perjury, conspiracy, obstruction of justice, and miscounduct against Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick and his former top

worthy had been looking into claims that Kilpatrick and one-timeChief of Staff Christine Beatty lied under oath during a whistle-blowers' trial last summer when they denied having a romantic relationship in 2002 and 2003.

The Detroit Free Press in January reported excerpts of text messages on Beatty's city-issued pager that contradict their testimony.

A perjury conviction for lving under oath could bring up to 15 years' imprisonment and may force Kilpatrick to relinquish his hold on the mayor's office.
On Tuesday, the Detroit

City Council approved a non-



binding resolution asking

Kilpatrick to resign. The mayor repeatedly has said he won't step down and says he is pushing on with city audits, budget and other business issues.

"I'm more focused now than I've ever been in this job," Kilpatrick told reporters following Tuesday's council vote. "I think I've grown up a lot in this pro-cess, and I think we're moving forward."

Kilpatrick also said he will continue to work with the council despite the reso-

Some council members have "reached out" by voicemail on continuing to work together on city business, he said.

In response to the numerous criminal charges, the mayor has denied any wrongdoing and said he





# Cardinal Health hires Justice Department's

pany Cardinal Health Inc. Craig Morford, 49, left his position as the Justice Department's No. 2 official earlier this month. At Cardinal Health, he'll oversee compliance on regulatory, environmental health

and safety issues.
"He brings deep expertise with regulatory agen-

cies, a strong compliance background and a reputation for upholding the highest standards of ethics and in-tegrity," Cardinal chief executive officer R. Kerry Clark

said in a statement.

Morford was appointed acting deputy U.S. attorney general last year by President Bush. He left after the Senate voted on March 3 to confirm former federal judge Mark R. Filip for the post.

The suburban Columbus-based Cardinal Health said Morford will join Cardinal Health on May 5. Daniel Walsh, who created the company's ethics and compliance department, will

leave the company.

Morford is a career prosecutor who pursued or-ganized crime and public corruption in Ohio, Michigan, and Tennessee for 20

As an assistant U.S. attorney based in Cleveland, Morford led the case against Democratic U.S. Rep. Jim Traficant of Youngstown. Traficant was convicted in 2002 of accepting bribes and gifts from businessmen in exchange for intervening with government agencies.

# Payday Mayday: Protecting Ohio Consumers

CLEVELAND: Ohio State Representative William Batchelder (R-69) and Ohio State Senator Ray Miller (D-15) will speak on their efforts to change Ohio law to protect consumers from payday lenders at noon on Friday, *March* 28, 2008, at The

City Club of Cleveland.

According to a recent report by Policy Matters Ohio, the number of payday lend-ing stores has significantly increased in the State of Ohio. These stores have grown from 107 locations in 1996 to 1,638 locations in 2007. They charge the typical borrower 391% interest on a two week \$300 loop. on a two week, \$300 loan.

For the past several months, the regulation of payday lending has been hotly contested at the State House. Consumer advocates,

such as the 239-member Ohio Coalition for Responsible Lending, contend that payday lenders exploit borrowers, trap them into a cycle of debt, and are a modern day form of usury. The Payday Lending industry contends that they provide short term loans to those who have emergency needs and that their

product is in high demand.

Batchelder is the chief sponsor of H.B. 333 that, among other things, caps interest rates for payday loans at 36% APR. Miller is the Senate Minority Leader and has agreed to co-sponsor a companion bill to H.B. 333 in the Senate.

John Boyd will face in-terim Councilwoman Mamie

Mitchell in the April 22, 2008

to become the council's clerk. Mitchell won 477 votes and Boyd had 122 in Tuesday's six-candidate special primary in a ward of about 17,000 registered voters on the city's east side. About 890 ballots were cast.

Boyd was convicted of murder in 1973 and later of election to replace a councilwoman who stepped down theft and receiving stolen

property. He says he hasn't tried to conceal his criminal past and now devotes himself to working with troubled teens.

The Ohio attorney general's office says it's not clear whether he could hold the seat if elected.

CLEVELAND, March 20, 2008 (AP): A new convention center in Cleveland will be run by Chicago-based Merchandise Mart Proper-ties Inc. for at least 20 years.

Cuyahoga County's commissioners Thursday voted to approve a memorandum of understanding that sets terms of the deal, which includes development of a convention center and also a medical mart dedicated medi-

cal products and trade shows.

# Prosecutors want to garnish Traficant's state pension to pay fine

CLEVELAND, March 19, 2008 (AP): Prosecutors want to tap into former congressman

Traficant's pension to help pay about \$93,000 he still owes in fines from his bribery conviction. Richard J. French, an

assistant U.S. attorney, filed an application last month in federal court to obtain money from the Ohio Public Employee Retirement System. Traficant has a state pension from his service as Mahoning County sheriff before he was elected to U.S. men for his political help, Congress.

An attorney from Ohio Attorney General Marc Dann's office filed a response to French's application, contending the funds are exempt from garnishment.

Traficant has paid about \$57,000 of his \$150,000 fine out of his federal pension, French said Wednesday.

Traficant, 66, who served nine terms in the House representing the Youngstown area, was convicted in 2002 of charges he received gifts and free labor from business-

and took cash kickbacks and free labor from staff.

He is serving an eightyear prison term at the Federal Medical Center in Rochester, Minn. According to www.bop.gov, his release date is Sept. 2, 2009. But Traficant, Federal ID# 31213-060. is eligible for placement into a half-way house as early as March 2, 2009.

# Ruth González de García receives Adelante's Chávez Humanitarian Award on March 27

March 26, 2008: Ruth García, one of the Latino community's legendary González Girls of Toledo, is being honored by Adelante, Inc. on March 27, 2008, as the recipient of the social-service agency and Latino Resource Center's César Chávez Humanitarian Award.

If you are a newcomer to Northwest Ohio or otherwise need to know why Ruth García is receiving this award, take a minute to read this story her oldest son, Fred García, Jr., recently shared with La Prensa.

"When we lived on Knorr Street off Broadway, our house was often mistaken for a social-service agency because so many people were always there and so much activity was going on in the house

"La Raza was across the street on Broadway, and people were always at our house because my mother was involved in so many activities like voter registration, civic participation, immigration issues, and helping those who were imprisoned – all to help the Latino community.

help the Latino community.

"After World War II, as many Mexican immigrants moved into Toledo, my mother devoted herself to helping those newcomers settle in – helping them to find housing, jobs, and loans. She and her sisters helped with medical needs, legal court interpretation, income tax filing, and citizenship issues. Such assistance was vitally important because at that time few institutions in Ohio accommodated Spanish speakers. In time, she became the madrina of her community.

"When I was growing up,
I always used to wonder how
my mother got to know so
many people. The answer
was that when my father came
home from World War II, we
lived for a while in the rectory next to the church.

"Whenever the priest needed a witness for a baptism or a marriage, he would call for my mother. That's why she has so many compadres and so many comadres," says García. Now 87, and living with

Now 87, and living with the Little Sisters of the Poor in neighboring Oregon, Ohio, Ruth García is the second oldest of her famous sisters.

Sister María José is 89, and according to Fred García, she is the last Ursuline nun who still works in her habit. Salud (Sally) González de

Salud (Sally) González de Cortez, who has made working with seniors a cornerstone of her life, is several years younger than Ruth.

Two of their sisters, both also community activists, and e c e a s e d — A u r o r a (Audrey), who has been honored by the naming of both the Aurora L. González Community and Family Resource Center and Aurora L. González Way, and María Sue González de Campos, who worked for almost three decades with EOPA [Economic Opportunity Planning Association].

Sonia Troche, Executive Director of Adelante, the Latino Resource Center, says the award is designed to be a Lifetime Achievement award in memory of César Estrada Chávez.

"For more than 60 years, Ruth García, through her activism, has made sure that voices of the Latino community were heard and that there

were always opportunities for the Latino community.

"She is one of our local heroes. My generation has all but forgotten how activists like her took on the system to get where we are today. She was a leader in the struggle, and she has proven impact. We were very fortunate to have had Ruth García and her sisters in our community," says Troche. Ruth García helped orga-

Ruth García helped organize and served as president of *Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission Church* in 1943. Beginning her activism at a young age, Ruth and her sisters rallied to the support of a Catholic priest who wanted to establish a church for Spanish-speaking residents. She married *Fred S. Garcia*, *Sr.* at the church that year. A veteran of World War II who served in the Pacific, he died in 1988.

She was also a board member of the Guadalupe Family Health Clinic and the Guadalupe Recreation Cen-

In the 1970s, Ruth, who always fought against injustice, led the community against City Hall after the local government held up federal funds allocated for the barrio. The issue became a rallying point that generated exceptional political action by the community. After five years of struggle, the people of the barrio succeeded in erecting El Centro Unico, a community center

# Tigres y Cabrera acuerdan contrato de 152 millones

DETROIT, el 23 de marzo de 2008 (AP): Miguel Cabrera y los Tigres de Detroit alcanzaron un acuerdo preliminar por el cual el tercera base venezolano firmará una extensión de contrato de ocho años por 152,3 millones de dólares, informó una fuente al tanto de las negociaciones.

La fuente habló con The Associated Press bajo la condición de no ser identificada debido a que no se había completado la negociación. El antesalista debe cumplir con un examen médico para que el mismo se concrete.

Cabrera había llegado a un acuerdo el 18 de enero para un salario de 11,3 millones de dólares por esta temporada. El nuevo acuerdo agrega 141 millones para las próximas siete campañas.

Devengará 15 millones en 2009, año en el iba a ser elegible para la agencia libre. Ahora, su salario promedio anual será de 21 millones por los próximos seis años.

El salario promedio de Cabrera ascenderá a los 19.037.500 dólares y será el cuarto más elevado en las mayores detrás del antesalista Alex Rodríguez (27,5 millones), el pitcher venezolano Johan Santana (22,9) y el jardinero dominicano Manny Ramírez (20 millones).

Su acuerdo será el cuarto más rico en términos generales. Rodríguez tiene un contrato de 275 millones y 10 años. El torpedero Derek Jeter, compañero de Rodríguez en los Yanquis de Nueva York, cumplirá la octava temporada de un contrato de 10 y 189 millones. Ramírez (Boston) va para el último año de su contrato de 160 millones y ocho temporadas.

La primera versión sobre el contrato de Cabrera fue divulgada por ESPNdeportes.com.

Detroit adquirió a Cabrera mediante un canje con los Marlins de la Florida, junto al pitcher Dontrelle Willis.

# 6-foot-6 Pryor will play for the Buckeyes

COLUMBUS, March 19, 2008 (AP): Terrelle Pryor got the name of his new school wrong—he called it the University of Ohio State—but that was about the only thing that didn't go right on Wednesday for him or the Buckeyes.

Dubbed the nation's top quarterback recruit, Pryor belatedly announced that he would join an Ohio State team where he can learn a college system under established senior quarterback Todd Boeckman, with no pressure to produce immediately.

It's an ideal situation for a young player. It's also an ideal situation for Ohio State, which had only three scholarship quarterbacks but only one who has played much.

"Todd Boeckman's still there but it's a long season. I can learn from a senior," Pryor said at a news conference at his high school in Jeannette, Pa. "And whenever I can get in on some plays, I can make something happen."

Ohio State coach Jim Tressel said Pryor can earn playing time right away. Some have already envisioned Pryor being used the same way Florida utilized Tim Tebo two years ago—coming in to spell the starter on plays built around what he can do best.

"The thing that you need to do as a coaching staff is get the people on the field that can make plays," Tressel said. "He's excited about learning the offense and helping any way he can. He has great respect for Todd Boeckman and all the rest of the guys. He wants to earn every single thing that he gets."

Pryor is 6-foot-6, fast and with a good arm—attributes that make many compare him with current Tennessee Titans quarterback Vince Young. He chose Ohio State over Michigan, Penn State, and Oregon, where he might have gotten to start sooner.

Boeckman won the job a year ago after Heisman Trophy winner Troy Smith graduated. He beat out Rob Schoenhoft for the starting job in the spring and had a strong season, with Schoenhoft then transferring to the University of Delaware in January.

Heading into spring practice, Boeckman is a clear choice at No. 1, with Antonio Henton the backup. Joe Bauserman, a former minor-league baseball player, is also on the roster but has never played for the Buckeyes.

Pryor may visit a practice or two during the spring while he finishes up his high school work, but he won't be on Ohio State's campus full time until June 16 when he begins summer classes. He will work on conditioning and likely participate in unsupervised passing drills until full practices begin in early August for the season opener on Sept. 5 against TCU.

Pryor said Tressel had told him he would "work me in there" with Boeckman, who led the Buckeyes to an 11-2 record and a runner-up spot in the Bowl Championship Series title game last season for the second year in a row.

The addition of a tall and talented quarterback was a breakthrough for the Buckeyes, who were extremely thin at the position. Henton has only seen spot duty, in part because he sat out much of last year while under a legal cloud before pleading guilty to a minor misdemeanor count of loitering for prostitution.

Pryor instantly becomes one of the biggest recruits in the program's history, ranking with linebacker Chris Spielman and quarterback Art Schlichter.

"I can't recall recruits in recent history that had the type of attention and had the situation he's



had," Tressel said.


Pryor was prepared to make an announcement six weeks ago but decided it put it off until after his basketball team had finished playing. Jeannette won the state Class AA title last week.

# **Grammy winner Emilio** Navaira critically injured in Rio's bus crash

HOUSTON, March 24, 2008 (AP): Grammy-winning Tejano singer Emilio Navaira was critically injured Easter Sunday, March 23, when his band's bus crashed on a highway in the metro area.

Navaira and his band Rio had performed at a Houston nightclub on Saturday night. At about 5 a.m. Sunday, the band's bus slammed into traffic barrels on Interstate 610 northbound in Bellaire, within the city west of downtown Houston, Bellaire police Sgt. Daniel Kerr said.

Navaira was one of eight occupants on the bus who were injured, said Houston Assistant Fire Chief Omero Longoria. Navaira was listed in critical condition at Memorial Hermann Hospital, where he was being treated in the intensive care unit, said hospital administrator Lisa Lagrone.

He had surgery Sunday to remove a blood clot in his head, said Joe Casias, his agent, who was at the hospital with



the hospital.

"The next 24 hours are very critical," Casias said. ...on behalf of his family, we hope his fans will pray for Emilio."

Navaira remained in critical condition late Monday, said Casey Smith, the hospital's operations administrator.

The bus was the only vehicle involved, Kerr said. It appears that Navaira was the driver.

Navaira, 45, and Rio have released more than a dozen albums, including "Acuerdate" that won the 2003 Grammy for best Tejano album.





# Cuban bass player Israel 'Cachao' López, who developed the mambo, dies in Florida at 89

MIAMI (AP): Cuban
bassist and composer Israel "Cachao" López, who
is credited with pioneering

the mambo style of music, died Saturday, March 22, 2008. He was 89. Known simply as Cachao, the Grammy-win-ning musician had fallen illi in the past week and died surrounded by family members at Coral Gables Hospital, spokesman Nelson Albareda said. Cachao left communist

Cuba and came to the United States in the early 1960s. He continued to perform into his late 80s, including a performance after the death of trombonist Generoso Jiménez in September 2007.

Cuban-American actor Andy García, who made a 1993 documentary about the bassist's career, credited Cachao with being a major influence in Cuban musical history and said his passing marked the end of an era.

"Cachao is our musical father. He is revered by all who have come in contact with him and his music," Garcia said in a statement Saturday. "Maestro ... you have been my teacher, and you took me in like a son. So I will continue to re-joice with your music and carry our traditions wherever I go, in your honor.'
Cachao was born in Havana in 1918 to a family of

musicians. A classically trained bassist, he began performing with the Havana symphony orchestra as a teenager, working under the baton of visiting guest conductors, such as Herbert von Karajan, Igor Stravinsky and Heitor Villa-Lobos, during his nearly 30-year career with the orchestra.

He also wrote hundreds of songs in Cuba for bands and orchestras, many based on the classic Cuban music

style known as son. He and his late brother, multi-instrumentalist Orestes López, created the mambo in the late 1930s. The mambo emerged from their improvisational work with the danzon, an elegant musical style that lends itself to slow dancing.

"The origins of 'mambo' happened in 1937," Cachao said in a 2004 interview with The San Francisco Chronicle. "My brother and I were try-ing to add something new to our music and came up with a section that we called danzón mambo. It made an impact and stirred up people. At that time our music needed that type of enrich-

The mambo was embraced early on and Cuban composers and jazz musicians have tweaked it over the years. It also influenced the development of salsa music.

In the 1950s, Cachao and his friends began populariz-ing the descarga ("dis-charge" in Spanish), a rau-cous jam session incorporating elements of jazz and Afro-Cuban musical approaches.

Cachao left Cuba in 1962, relocating first to Spain and soon afterward to New York, where he was hired to perform at the Palladium nightclub with the leading Latin

In the United States, he collaborated with such Latin music stars as Tito Puente, Tito Rodrígues, Machito, Chico O'Farrill, Eddie Palmieri, and Gloria Estefan.

He fell into obscurity during the 1980s after he moved to Miami, where he ended up playing in small clubs and at weddings.

But his career enjoyed a revival in the 1990s with the help of Garcia's documentary "Cachao ... Como Su Ritmo No Hay Dos" (Like His Rhythm There Is No Other) and the release of several albums, including the Grammy-winning album "Ahora Si!" in 2004. In 2006, Cachao was

honored at two Jazz at Lincoln Center concerts with the Afro-Latin Jazz Orchestra paying tribute to the Latin bass tradition. Cachao also led a mambo all-star band at a JVC Jazz Festival program at Carnegie Hall

that year. Cuban-born reed player and composer Paquito D'Rivera said Cachao made friends everywhere he went with his affable personality and good sense of humor. D'Rivera said he was working on a piece he had written for the multiple Grammy winner when he heard about the death.

"He was what a great musician should be. He represented what true versa tility in music is all about, D'Rivera told The Associ-ated Press in a telephone interview

# Analysis: Obama tries to regain control of race debate

WASHINGTON (AP) "Race doesn't matter," the crowd chanted after Sen. Barack Obama's sweeping victory in the South Carolina Democratic primary, made possible by heavy black support and a solid showing among white vot-

But in the seven weeks since, race has mattered more and more in his presidential struggle against Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton, threatening to dent his lead. On Tuesday, Obama addressed it head-on in a speech that bluntly described a history of injustice to blacks, acknowledged the resentments of whites, and ended with the hope that his campaign can help heal racial divisions.

Like any full-blown discussion of the sensitive topic, Obama's speech carries risks. Some whites may feel he did not do enough to distance himself from a fiery Chicago preacher who has depicted the United States as a racist society. The speech also could unleash wider discussions of race in the campaign rather than reduce its role as a "distraction" from more important issues, a term Obama used several times.

But a recent series of un-

Illinois senator that a fullbore address was needed, and now. They include a trend of white Democrats voting more heavily for Clinton while blacks vote overwhelmingly for him; the resignation of a major Clinton supporter who made racially contentious remarks; and, above all, intense media focus on the most inflammatory statements of Obama's longtime minister, Rev. Jeremiah Wright.

Just six days ago, Obama suggested that overt discussions of race were a frustration and unwelcome diversion in his campaign. "We keep on thinking we've dispelled this," he said, speaking of the notion that he relies too heavily on black sup-

On Tuesday in Philadelphia, however, he said discussions of race have "taken a particularly divisive turn" recently, and it was time for a bold and frank airing.

"The comments that have been made and the issues that have surfaced over the last few weeks," he said, "reflect the complexities of race in this country that we've really worked through."

Obama, the son of a white mother and black father, then addressed both racial communities in turn. He urged blacks to embrace "the burdens of our past without becoming victims of our past."

"It means taking full responsibility for own lives," he said, "by demanding more from our fathers, and spending more time with our children.

He called on whites to stop denying the prevalence and continuing harm of racism. He said whites should acknowledge "that what ails the African-American community does not just exist in the minds of black people." The legacy of discrimination, he said, "and current incidents of discrimination, while less overt than in the past, are real and must be addressed," in part by building better schools and other facilities in black neighbor-

At the same time, Obama said whites are partly justified in fearing that good jobs or college slots, which they qualify for, might go to blacks under programs giving minorities "an advan-

"To wish away the resentments of white Americans, to label them as misguided or even racist, without recognizing they are grounded in legitimate concerns, this

Rarely has a black politician directed such remarks to a national audience. They come as one of Obama's key assets-his image as a biracial candidate who can bridge cultural differences and largely transcend racethreatens to become a liability. Comments from Clinton supporters and others have fueled discussions of race lately, and some white voters in Ohio and elsewhere seem to be turning against Obama partly because of his race, according to exit polls.

In the speech, Obama seemed eager to regain control of the debate and his image. He addressed all races and communities in calm but lightly admonishing tones, and tried to steer the conversation back to his chief themes of hope, unity and progress.

Some Democratic activists think he largely succeeded.

"No other person in this country, black or white, could have given a speech like that," said Stephanie Cutter, who was John Kerry's spokeswoman in the 2004 presidential campaign.

Perhaps the trickiest part of Obama's 37-minute speech dealt with Wright, his longtime friend and recently

retired pastor. Wright has said. among other things. "God damn America' for its racand ism "for killing innocent people.

Obama sharply condemned

such remarks Tuesday. But he defended Wright's overall ministry, and tried to put it in context for uncomprehending whites.

He said Wright has expressed views "that denigrate both the greatness and the goodness of our nation; that rightly offend white and black alike." Wright's comments "weren't simply controversial," he said. "They expressed a profoundly distorted view of this country, a view that sees white racism as endemic" and unabating.

But Wright "has been like family to me," Obama said. The minister knows all too well a "legacy of defeat" among many blacks, stemming from the days of Jim Crow and de facto segregation, he said.

The legacy "was passed on to future generations those young men and increasingly young women, who we see standing on street



languishing in our prisons, Obama said. For those in Wright's generation. he said, "the memories of humiliation and doubt fear have not gone away: nor has the


anger and the bitterness of those years.'

"And occasionally it finds voice in the church on Sunday morning," he said, even though "many people are surprised to hear that anger" from a pulpit.

Most of the speech was fairly high-minded, with few if any overt appeals for votes. Obama doubtlessly raised eyebrows in many circles, however, with a populist pivot that named a new villain in the racial divide.

"Black anger" and "white resentments," he said, have "distracted attention from the real culprits of the middle-class squeeze: a corporate culture rife with inside dealing, questionable accounting practices and short-term greed."

# Migrant farmworkers' exhibit puts human face on products most take for granted

AUGUSTA, Maine, March 16, 2008 (AP): When harvest time rolls around in Maine 10 000 to 12 000 migrant farmworkers and their families come to the state to harvest wild blueberries and cranberries, pick apples and cut broccoli. Others tend chickens, work in the forests and help grow Christmas trees.

The workers who travel from México, Central America, the Caribbean and Canada play a key role in keeping Maine-grown food on the supper tables at a reasonable cost.

Their unsung role is documented and celebrated in an exhibit of photos and comments which itself will migrate from Augusta to Boston and back to Maine in the weeks ahead. Its final tour will be in areas where migrants will toil during the next harvest season. The list of stops is being finalized.

About 85 percent of the fruits and vegetables in the United States are harvested hand, said Barbara Ginley, executive director of the Maine Migrant Health Program, one of the sponsors of the exhibit titled "Farmworkers Feed Us All.

"We really think it's important for people in Maine and the rest of our country to be aware of the human labor that contributes to our health," said Ginley, who hopes the exhibit can put a human face on products most

Americans take for granted. The lives of the migrants are dramatized by more than 150 color pictures from the fields, farms and temporary homes occupied by the part-time Maine workers. Some are also shown being treated by the migrant health program, which took on 1,219 cases in Maine in 2007.

They include a Jamaican apple picker who was treated for sinus pain, high blood pressure and diabetes, a Honduran tree planter who suffers lingering pain from an auto accident, and a broccoli cutter treated for a broken tooth. The words of the workers themselves also offer a glimpse into their lives and

"We come here to improve economically, to look for a better life, to make some money and then to return to Honduras," forestry worker Manuel Ordonez Flores says in a caption.

'Sometimes it's hot, you are sweating and then it rains. You can get a sore throat or a headache. We are always carrying medicine for headaches. You can get sick to your stomach because you get hungry, but you want to keep working so you suffer from hunger because you do not want to stop," Flores says.

Migrants confront health

problems
The leading diagnoses listed by the nonprofit health program are hypertension, upper respiratory infection, dental issues, back and joint pain and diabetes. Some of the others include rashes, dermatitis, abdominal and gastric pain, coughing, sprains and strains, and headaches.

Maine's program is no-table if not unique nationally in a couple of respects, said its medical director Mike Rowland. It's the only state that runs its program entirely with mobile centers, which include a converted box truck, two RV-type vehicles and an SUV.

Rowland said the program's team of camp health aides, who act as a liaison between the medical staff and patients, is "probably the most important secret to our success.

The program's core full-time staff of about four expands to roughly 50 doctors, nurses, medical and nursing students and others who are paid, contracted with or volunteer during the harvests, Rowland said.

More than three-quarters of those treated by the program's mobile clinics are men, mostly between 25 and 64 years old. Of those treated last year, 75 percent were Latino, 14 percent Native American and 2 percent white. Of the total, 97 percent

fall below pov erty level, according to officials for the program, which is funded through grants, donations and the federal government.

Most encounters occur in Washington County during the blueberry harvest and in Androscoggin County, between the apple and cranberry harvests. Egg farm workers also account for many of the treatments.

The photos in the exhibit were taken by Earl Dotter of Silver Spring, Md.

Tennessee Watson, a Colby graduate now at Duke University's Center for Documentary Studies, conducted interviews with the workers. Some excerpts are featured as text blocks in the photo exhibit. Watson also produced several slideshows using audio and Dotter's photos. They are temporarily housed at www.dlanderson.com/ farmworker and will be per-manently featured on www.migrantclinician.org.

Ginley sees the commitment to migrants' health as a trade-off for the service they provide to consumers who count on abundant supplies of fresh produce at the stores. She also hopes to debunk what she calls a myth that migrants are taking away local, year-round residents' jobs.

"If you talk to growers across the state," she said, "they (say they) wouldn't be able to get their crop in without migrant workers.'

# Ohio Quits programming announced

On Thursday, March 13, 2008, the Ohio Tobacco Prevention Foundation announced the new Ohio Ouits tobacco cessation program.

Ohio Quits offers to-bacco users who call 1-800-QUIT NOW expanded op-tions to help them quit in-cluding the following:

Three tobacco treatment options: 1) Quit Line tele-phonic coaching, 2) individual or group counseling at one of five hospital-based treatment centers and, beginning 7/1/08 counseling offered through Ohio Quits will include the OTPF community-based cessation pro-grams, and 3) web-based interactive cessation tool (i.e., QuitLogix).

At least two weeks of free nicotine patches if they enroll in one of the program treatment options.

# Treatment Options -How It Works

When someone calls 1-800-QUIT NOW an intake specialist will ask the caller a series of questions to gather demographic, tobacco use, and other pertinent data that will be used to match the caller with one of the treat-

ment options.

At the end of the call (which lasts between 15-20 minutes), the caller will be offered a "recommended" treatment option as well as the other options available to them. The recommenda-tion is based on such characteristics as number of cigarettes smoked, certain medical or behavioral health conditions, access to the Internet, and proximity to a treatment center or commu-nity grantee program. Call-ers can elect to enroll in the recommended option or one of the other options.

Callers who elect the Quit Line will be immediately transferred to a Ouit Line coach who will introduce the participant to the program and enroll them. This initial counseling call could take an additional twenty minutes.

Callers who elect a treat-ment center or community grant option will be told their contact information is being forwarded to the program nearest to them and that they can expect a call from the program within 24-48 hours.

The treatment center or community grant program will then contact them to schedule their first counseling session. The counseling protocols at each program vary from four to six sessions, some offer individual, group

or both, etc.

Callers who elect to enroll in QuitLogix will be emailed the web address and a link. Once they go to the website they can enroll in the program and continue through it at their own pace.

Free Two Weeks of NRT All callers to 1-800-QUIT NOW are eligible for at least two weeks of free nicotine patches. The way they re-ceive the patches or other pharmacotherapy varies by

program.

Callers who elect to enroll in the Ouit Line will be assessed by the coaches for certain medical conditions and will be asked at this time who is their employer or health

plan. If they are covered un-der our NRT Partner program they will be mailed two 4week shipments of patches the same way the Quit Line

currently does.

Those who have health insurance but their health plan is not an NRT Partner will be mailed two weeks directly to their home. They will also be given a website address they can use to order an additional six weeks supply at a sub-stantial discount from retail

Those who have no insurance will be mailed two weeks directly to their home along with a 3-part coupon redeem-able at CVS and Rite Aid pharmacies. Each part of the coutional two weeks supply for a \$10 co-pay. They can redeem one or all three parts of the coupon at the same time.

Callers who elect to enroll in a treatment center or community grantee program will be assessed for medical conditions by the treatment cen-ter or grantee counselors and may be offered a variety of pharmacotherapy options including NRT and FDA-approved prescription medications (including Chantix). All pharmacotherapy will be pro-vided free of charge to treat-

ment center participants.

Callers who elect to enroll in QuitLogix will be able to request nicotine patches online. After they have sub-mitted their request a Quit Line coach will call them to process their order. At that time they will determine whether the participant is eligible for the free two weeks

supply or for up to e i g h t weeks if they are covered

an R T Partner. Depending on this determination the process for receiving their patches is the same as described above

for Quit Line participants.

Other Ohio Quits Specifics:

FAXREFERRALS-Ohio Quits will continue to accept fax referrals from health care providers, community programs, etc. A new fax referral form can be downloaded www.ohioquits.com. Note that the new form has a new fax number that should be used for all future fax refer-rals. It should also be noted that the Ohio Quits system will no longer send an ac-knowledgment fax to the

TEEN CALLERS - Ohio Quits currently can only provide self-help materials for callers under the age of 18 years. Teen callers will be mailed materials designed for them. We are working to allow underage callers to receive treatment recom mendations with parental consent and will announce this when it is available.

COMMUNITY GRANT CESSATION PROGRAMS Community grantees that provide cessation services will be added to the Ohio Quits referral system begin-ning July 1, 2008. This will greatly expand the treatment options available to Ohio Quits callers.

(Continued from Page 8) more than 26 years as a State of Ohio employee of the Toledo Board of Education in Food Service Management. She worked for many years as a baker for various restaurants and bakeries in Toledo. She worked at Toledo Box Lunch from 1937 to 1940 and at Willys Overland from 1940 to 1943," said Fred García.

However, as often happens to a hometown hero, Ms. García was recognized nationally for her activism more than a decade before she received recognition locally. She received the U.S. Hispanic Leadership Institute Lifetime Achievement Award in October 1997 for her more than 50 years of community activism.

community activism.

She has also been honored by numerous mayoral proclamations.

# History of Ruth García and her familia

Fred García, Jr., is the oldest of the seven children of Ruth and Fred García, Sr. Like his father, he fought for his country. He is a Vietnam veteran who has won three purple hearts. After earning his undergraduate degree in México, he worked closely with his mother and his aunts on their many projects including La Voz del Barrio, the community service agency and newsletter. "While everyone always

"While everyone always heralded Toledo as an All-American city, my mother always saw it as a familyfriendly city to immigrants, regardless if they spoke English or Spanish.

"We were a tight knit family," recalls García. Three of his brothers are union reps: Ron García, formerly of the Blade and now with Lucas County; Raymond, who is at

Johns Manville; and John, who is at Chrysler/Jeep, is active in the American Red Cross and went to Ground Zero in New York in the wake of 9/11 to aid in the cleanup efforts.

Their sister, *Alice Sutton*, a registered massage therapist, is Ruth's guardian. Another sister, *Ruth Am Mohler*, is a medical transcriptionist. She lives in Waterville.

Their brother *Richard*, a Vietnam veteran, died in a motorcycle accident some years ago.

years ago.

Ruth has 20 grandchildren, one great grandchild and another on the way.

Ruth's mother, María Rojas González, was active in the SS. Peter and Paul Parish. Her father, Sylvestre González, had been a colonel in Pancho Villa's Revolutionary Army in México.

lutionary Army in México. Fred García tells a family story that may be apocryphal, but also helps explain how Sylvestre González brought 250 people up from México with him when he emigrated.

Says Gonzalez, "The city fathers in México City paid Villa \$5 million in gold and gave him a sizable land grant just to keep him in the north of México and out of their politics. Somehow, that gold was divided and part of it wound up with Sylvestre González.

"Two years later, Villa was assassinated. We know that gold payment was made because we found a branch of his family in Mexico who had used part of it to develop a highly successful trucking company."

We asked if García knew how much gold Villa had given to his grandfather. García chuckled and replied, "I know it was divided up somehow, and I also know my grandfather never went back to México.

"My grandfather had three sons from a previous marriage. He came to the U.S. with María to help her find her fiancé but kept her for himself," says García.

for himself," says García.
"My grandfather was a
medical student who delivered all his children. He was
very successful as a rancher,
which is how my mother was
born in Omaha in 1920. He
had a huge ranch and raised
horses, but he was wiped
out in the stock market crash
of 1929.

"Half of his family decided to go back to México in trucks. He knew someone in Oak Harbor and he stopped and visited with him. When he saw he could find work here, he decided to stay in Toledo with his family. That was in 1932. "He had a boarding house

"He had a boarding house on Newton Street which he rented to people who were working for the railroad. Before there were braceros, they were called Box Car Mexicans. That was because the railroad let them live in boxcars until they went back to work. A lot of them lived in shanty towns along the tracks," recalls García.

This is the fifth year that Adelante has awarded the Cesar Chavez Humanitarian Award, held near the March 31st birth date of Chávez. The previous recipients were: Rudy Lira (2007), Baldemar Velásquez (2006), María Sue Campos (2005), and Dolores Rodríguez (2004).







life as a sprint then what will eventually happen is you will get burnt out. When you are young you are able to keep a sprinter's pace for a longer period of time and you are also able to sprint more frequently, generally whenever life dictates the need to do

This is why I am bringing this message to you now; trust me, the old adage "time flies when you are having fun" is true and before you know it you won't be voung as you were and that is when the sprinting gets tougher.

Okay, okay enough with

the analogies, let me cut to the chase— young people, you need to take care of yourselves. I know the feeling of youth, feeling un-

stoppable, invulnerable, and on top of the world. It is great to have those feelings, but be warned that they can be a double-edged sword. They can truly help you accomplish great things, but they can also give you a false sense of immunity. Believe me when I say the things you do now will affect you in the future, some things more than others.


ing, exercise, or sports.
