

### Colombia cesa a firma cabildeo de principal asesor de Clinton

BOGOTA, el 5 de abril del 2008 (AP): El gobierno colombiano consideró "irrespetuosa" una declaración del presidente de Burson-Marsteller por lo que decidió terminar un contrato con esa firma, a la que tenía contratada para cabildear en el congreso de Estados Unidos a favor de un acuerdo comercial binacional.

El anuncio fue hecho el sábado en un comunicado de la Presidencia publicado en la internet, según el cual "ante reclamos de representantes sindicales estadouni-denses, el presidente de Burson-Marsteller, Sr. Mark Penn, se declaró 'arrepentido' de haberse reunido con la embajadora (colombiana) Carolina Barco, el 31 de marzo".

"Esta declaración (de Penn) es una falta de respeto hacia los colombianos, lo cual es inaceptable", sostuvo la Presidencia.

Burson-Marsteller fue contratada por la embajada colombiana en marzo de

Penn es también el prin-cipal asesor de la campaña electoral de la senadora demócrata Hillary Clinton, quien ha expresado su oposición al tratado de libre comercio con Colombia, razón por la cual los sindicatos estadounidenses criticaron las relaciones de su consejero con el gobierno colombiano para impulsar

esa iniciativa comercial. En respuesta a las críticas recibidas, Penn emitió un comunicado en el cual consideró que "la reunión fue un error de juicio que no

se repetirá y lo siento".

"La bien conocida oposición de la senadora a este acuerdo comercial es

clara y no fue discutida", agregó.

5.000 millones de dólares. Clinton y Barack Obama,

### Reporte: Ocho muertos por violencia en zona tibetana de China Con Fotos XHG101-114

BEIJING, el 5 de abril del 2008 (AP): La policía disparó contra centenares de manifestantes en una zona tibetana de China occidental, matando a ocho personas, dijeron varios grupos extranjeros de activistas.

Los medios de comunicación estatales informaron que un funcionario del gobierno resultó herido de gravedad durante lo que calificó

como un disturbio.
Adicionalmente, otro grupo activista tibetano dijo el sábado que dos monjes se suicidaron el mes pasado debido a la represión gubernamental. Los reportes indican



health: mind, body, and soul. It is essential that none of these areas are neglected if one truly hopes to be holisti-cally healthy. The reason being—if one area is not ad-dressed, it will often cause harm to other areas and lead to imbalance in your being. This column will focus on the importance of physical

The dilemma
In U.S. society, Latinos and young people are facing a health crisis. The obesity rate among children and adolescents in the U.S. has hovered around 20 percent in recent years. Essentially, that means that 1 out of every five children in our country is considered obese.

There are a number of factors that contribute to this problem including: eating habits, lack of exercise, family history, medical illness, stress, depression, and low self-esteem. Of all the factors, only family history and medical illness are things that cannot be changed by the person who is suffering from obesity. Furthermore, only one percent of obesity is caused by medical problems.

What this means is that if you are that person and/or you do not want to become that person, you have the ability to change and/or prevent it.

The solution
According to the Cleveland Clinic, the average youth in the U.S. spends 24 hours a week being physically inactive—mi gente that is an entire day! Being physically inactive would include watching T.V., playing video games, and using the com-

With the growing popularity of video games and the personal computer this stapersonal computer this says tistic is sure to increase un-less the change is made by young people. I know that video games can be fun. I too enjoy a game of *Madden*, *Call of Duty*, or *NBA Live*, but the reality is...too much of anything is a bad thing.

growing up, that being in the

phasize that being physi-cally active does not guarantee that you will develop the body of a Greek god or goddess. While it is ok to want to be 'in good shape' the more important thing is that you feel good about yourself. Another key element that should be under-stood about exercise is it is only one part of being physically healthy.

Diet is important too Equally important is diet

mean starving yourself—it simply means what you eat. You can be very active and if you are eating the wrong things then all of your efforts can be nullified. I know that it can be difficult to eat right and I also know that as a young person vou may not have a great deal of control over what is in your home to eat. What you should know is that many healthy foods are the same

price or cheaper than un-healthy ones. One of the worst things that many young people con-sume is soda or pop. It is packed with sugars and calories and does nothing for you health wise. I never drank a lot of soda but about three years ago I stopped drinking

that algo I suppletely.

The greatest solution is water. I know it's not exciting and maybe doesn't taste as good as soda pop but it is great for you and more importantly your body needs it. If that is not a good enough reason for you to ease up on your soda consumption then consider this, a recent Harvard study indicated that by drink-

study indicated that by drinking an average of one soda a day can increase your risk of developing Type 2 Diabetes by 85 percent.

Diabetes is another great health risk facing our community. Some 2.5 million Latinos in the U.S. have diabetes. The scary thing about that number is the fact that diabetes rates among Mexican Americans are 110 percent and among Puerto Ricans 120 percent higher than among non-Latino whites.

More than 10% of Mexican Americans 20 years or older have diabetes. The bottom line is aunque la comida es muy sabrosa la realidad es que no es muy sana. Just because it tastes good does not mean it's good for you.

want to discuss about being healthy is perhaps the most simple—sleep.

I recently polled some of my students (at Waite High School in East Toledo) about how much they slept. The result was that only about 20 percent of them indicated that they slept at least 8 hours a night. This is not good and I know it is generally reflective of young people every-where. You are in one of the most important growth periods in your life right now...you need your sleep

and sleeping in class does not count.

Getting adequate sleep has numerous benefits. Besides just feeling rested and energized, it also helps keep your mind stay alert. In fact, a recent study aired on 60 Minutes a few weeks back actually linked adequate sleep with the ability to re-member something better the next day. In addition, lack of sleep may increase the physical signs of aging as well as accelerate mental aging. Some studies have even

Some studies have even found that lack of sleep can increase the risk of developing type 2 diabetes.

### Mexican-American singing sensation Lila Downs makes UMS debut

ANN ARBOR: The University Musical Society (UMS) presents Mexican-American singing sensation Lila Downs at Ann Arbor's Michigan Theater (603 East Liberty Street) on Saturday, April 12, 2008, at 8 p.m.

Downs's music is an ex-pression of her Mexican and American roots, and a "reflection of a 21st century world culture where ethnicity and national boundaries blur" (Los Angeles Times). She creates strongly layered sounds in which blues and jazz cohabitate with rap and ranchera, and honkytonks swings alongside romantic

boleros.

Her songs delve deep into minds of common people, invoking struggles, losses, and legends. "Imagine Edith Piaf singing in Spanish and you have the idea of the soulful sound of Lila Downs." (Los Angeles Times)

As the daughter of a Scot-tish-American cinematographer/painter and a Mixtec-Indian singer, Lila Downs grew up in both the Mexican valleys of Oaxaca and in the United States. She began sing-ing mariachi songs at age eight, and soon after began singing at fiestas in the towns of her mountain region. When she turned 14, she

started voice lessons in Los Angeles, and continued to take lessons in Oaxaca at Bellas Artes. Later, with the intent of becoming an opera singer, Downs studied voice and anthropology at the University of Minnesota. However, she became disenchanted with music and dropped out of school, following the Grateful Dead, while making her living selling jewelry on the streets.

Later, she moved back to Oaxaca, where she worked closely with *Triqui* women, learning to weave cloth and ultimately completing a col-lege thesis on the symbolism created through their weav-ing. At the same time, Downs returned to music, performing with local folk musicians and making appearances in the Oaxaca and Philadelphia club scenes where she met American saxophonist Paul Cohen. The two began collaborating, creating compositions and re-cordings that came to define Downs's unique and power-

ful musical style.
Since then, Downs has toured throughout México, South America, the U.S., and Europe. She also appeared in the 2002 film, *Frida* (starring Selma Hayek), as a tango inger, and recorded "Burn It Blue" with Brazil's Caetano Veloso for the Grammy-nomi-

nated soundtrack. Her recent recordings have invigorated a new wave of crossover Latino music. Downs's 2004 album, *Una* Sangre (One Blood) earned critical raves and won a Latin Grammy. Her latest release, La Cantina (The Saloon), is a tribute to México's beloved canciones rancheras, the deeply soulful, often lamenting, and always emotional ballads heard throughout Mexico's cantinas. Downs currently resides in currently resides in Coyoacán, México, and col-laborates with musicians from México, Canada, Cuba, Peru, Argentina, and Paraguay. In her UMS debut, Downs

performs her own composi-tions and also taps into the vast reservoir of native Mesoamerican music, singing songs in Spanish and English, and in the native Indian languages of México, including Mixtec, Zapotec, Maya, and Nahuatl.

ANN ARBOR: Lila Downs, la cantante mexicana-estadounidense se presenta por primera vez por la Sociedad Musical de la Universidad de Michigan (UMS, por sus siglas en Inglés) en el Teatro Michigan de Ann Arbor (603 East Liberty Street), el Sábado 12 de abril en un concierto único a las 8:00 PM.

Downs, caracterizada por Downs, caracterizada por Los Angeles Times como "un reflejo de la cultura mundial del Siglo XXI en la que los límites de la etnicidad y la nacionalidad se diluyen", crea sonidos de intensidad compleja en los que se mezclan los blues y jazz, con el rapp y rancheras, los honkytonk swings con los boleros románticos. Su música apela a las emociones de personas comunes con lírica que invoca las luchas diarias, las pérdidas, y las

leyendas.

She founded the Washington Research Project, a public interest law firm

### Ohio's use of Lethal **Injection** is unconstitutional, savs ACLU

Elyria: The ACLU of Ohio is challenging Ohio's administration of lethal injection as unconstitutional in the Lorain County Court of Common Pleas in Elyria, OH. An evidentiary hearing in the cases was scheduled for Monday, April 7, 2008 and Tuesday, April 8, 2008, with testimony before Judge James Burge.

The cases are State v. Rivera and State v. McCloud. The ACLU of Ohio represents the defendants in their argument that Ohio's method of carrying out lethal injections is unconstitutional because it is likely to result in inmates being, in effect, tortured to death.

Lethal injection procedures do not always run smoothly. Ohio has a demonstrated record of incompetence in the administration of lethal injection. It is likely that many Ohio death row inmates suffer excruciating. torturous pain during executions. That likely pain violates the federal and state constitutions, which forbid cruel and unusual punishment and violate Ohio's statutory requirement that death be administered 'quickly and painlessly.'

Lethal injection is Ohio's only method of execution, and if it cannot be performed lawfully, then the judge cannot impose the death penalty. These are the first cases in the nation to address these questions before trial and to have the possibility of precluding the death penalty completely.

This is also the first time an Ohio court will consider expert testimony on how executions are performed in

### Sutton, Kaptur, most Democrats oppose Bush's plea for the U.S.-Colombian FTA

April 7, 2008: Congresswomen Betty Sutton (OH-13) and Marcy Kaptur (OH-9) issued the following statements on the decision by George W. Bush to force action on the U.S.-Colombia Free Trade Agreement (FTA):

Sutton: "I strongly oppose the U.S.-Colombia FTA and will fight this harmful deal. Not only is it a continuation of bad trade policy, but it ignores the gruesome human rights and labor rights violations which have plagued Colombia.

Kaptur: "It is unconscionable that the president wants to force a trade agreement with a country rife with corruption, violence, discrimination, and civil war."

On a national level, both Barack Obama and Hillary Clinton-Democratic presidential candidates-oppose this FTA,

Washington, D.C., while presumptive Republican candidate John McCain supports Bush's plea for passage.

Both Sutton and Sutton are also opposed to NAFTA and CAFTA, which have drained many jobs from the Midwest.

In a press release, Sutton stated: "Colombia remains the most dangerous country in the world for union and labor organizers, who are simply fighting to improve the lives of working families and communities in the country. Since [Co-Iombianl President Uribe came to office in 2000, over 400 trade unionists have been killed. In 2007 alone. 72 union members were assassinated.

"It makes no sense to push a FTA with a country that seems to ignore the continued blatant violations of basic human rights. How can a trade agreement be beneficial when the thousands are brought to workers in one of the coun-





tries involved lack basic labor rights and are punished and often killed for their involvement in union activities? We should not even be considering a trade agreement with Colombia until this horrific violence ends and those responsible for the murder of iustice.

### Affirmative Action debates continue at the City Club

Affirmative Action has sparked endless debates since the civil rights era and The City Club of Cleveland hosted another debate on April 1, 2008 between Ward Connerly, Chairman American Civil Rights Institute,

and Marvin Krislov, President of Oberlin College. Connerly is a strong op-ponent of affirmative action

and said using race as criteria is in fact discrimination. He is a prominent advocate working diligently to repeal affirmative action, espe-

cially in universities.

Connerly's efforts swayed the state of California to pass Proposition 209, in 1996, to end preferential treatment based on race, gender, or national origin. "We are in a critical stage of refashioning a new approach to affirmative action, the old one hasn't worked, we have had it for forty years," Connerly

Krislov passionately supports affirmative action, saying it is a modest tool to insure equal opportunity is provided those underrepresented, and is not an issue of race but also of gender. "The greatest ben-eficiaries of affirmative action have been white



women," he said. Krislov said affirmative action provided a blue print for universities and college to recruit a diverse popula tion and therefore provide a dynamic education and better opportunities.
"Frankly I wish the City
Club should be talking
about what is perhaps most important, the pipeline issue," he said.

Krislov cited recent studies that attest Cleve-land has the third largest graduation gap between Metropolitan school districts and suburban schools in the country. The average graduation rate in Metropolitan districts is 43 percent compared to 78 percent of suburban school.

He said the real issues that should be debated are the educational inequities between districts and the segregated communities where people do not have access to opportunities or interaction with diverse

"In 24 hours I've probably watched 10 or 12 games they played," Minutemen coach Travis Ford said, "and I never saw them shoot like that."


Ricky Harris scored 27 for UMass (25-11), hitting three 3-pointers in the closing minutes to help the Minutemen stay close.

### 1978: When BGSU met Latino music, at **WBGU 88.1FM**

Bowling Green, OH: Thirty years ago, Benito Lucio, Jr. was a student at Bowling Green State University, majoring in physical education, with Spanish as his minor. That year—1978—he was not only elected president of BGSU's Latino Student Union, but he started the first Latino FM radio program in Northwest Ohio on WBGU 88 1FM His first co-host was his thenclassmate, future community activist Margarita De León.

You may remember him as El Super Mex. He was born in San Benito, Texas to parents who were migrant farmworkers in Montana, Colorado, Texas, Illinois, Michigan, Pennsylvania, and Ohio. As a child, he and his family lived for eight years

in a migrant camp.

And he has never forgotten his roots. This is further illustrated in part two of this series.

"In 1978, when I was president of the Latino Stu-dent Union," recalls Lucio, "the Black Student Union asked if we would support them in their campaign to get airtime. I said we would, and after it was successful, I was told that there was a bloc of 30 hours a week airtime that we could have as well. So we went on the air.

"Margarita was our second DJ. I remember once we both were on the air together. We noticed there was a switch on the control panel. Margie accidentally hit the switch, and it knocked us off the air. We were sitting there talking on the air, but all our listeners heard was dead silence.

"I always remembered the importance of music to the workers in the fields. When I was working in the fields with my family, I remember all cars that were parked by the fields with their radios on. I had this connection.

"I thought I'll be able to do this show on the radio, and it is pretty cool. But I also knew what it was like out there in the fields. I started to think of how the workers could be getting information from my show. So all of my interests came together.

So how did Tejano music come to BGSU?

"But the big problem was that I knew nothing about Latino music. When I was in college, I was into rock and roll, like Santana and Black Sabbath. My dad knew Tejano Freddie Fender from back in Texas. But I didn't know crap.

"So I started reaching out to people. I went to dances to get connected to the musicians. I went to Texas and saw Carlos Guzmán, the Tejano music legend. I came back with 700 albums. My little Camaro was so weighted down, that I had to drive slowly all the way back to BG," remembers Lucio, who still has that music in his collection.

"Thanks to Carlos Guzmán, I began to talk with the record companies and develop ongoing connections. I also got to meet many of the artists such as Lisa López and Little Joe, who gave me an interview. And I got to meet Selena in 1993."

Remember these names at WBGU 88.1FM?

"During the formative

years, they were all on the show at various times: Isabel Sánchez (La Babé), Ofelia Ibarra (Juana Pelona), Johnny Sánchez, Israel Zamarripa (Mr. IZ), Ramiro Zamarripa (Ram), Angie Rios, her sister and Nora Bautista (the Super Mex Angels), Richard Romero, Robert Torres, Bobbie Rios, La Tigresa, David García, Fred Gutiérrez, and Valley Girl.

"Diana Almanaza, La Estrellita, was la más bonita and the youngest Latina DJ that we had on the radio...and the one I remember the most...for her smile. She was a great young lady.

"These are the DJs from WBGU...what a great group of people that volunteered their time to bring Tejano/ Latino music and Latino pride to the community. I was blessed to have worked with all these folks," says Lucio.

Co-host De León, being of Puerto Rican descent, loved salsa, merengue, and bachata. Their respective music was blended into a variety of formats, to honor these musical traditions

Richard Romero chuckles when he remembers those days. "I was the disco instructor (for LSU dances). That's how I met my wife. I was pretty smooth," says Romero, now Deputy Safety Director for the City of Lorain and also Chair of the Ohio Commission of Hispanic/Latino Affairs.

"I was the events coordinator for the Latino Student Union at BGSU, so I used to go on the station mainly to promote our events. I was also a student publisher - I published the first LSU student

magazine," recalls Romero, who graduated in 1983.

Like Romero, Margarita De León also came to BGSU from Lorain, OH. She met her future husband, Toledoan Sylvestre Durán, Jr. at BGSU. His father, Sylvestre Durán Sr., is a longtime baile promoter who still has a DJ show in Fostoria, OH.

Lucio, who moved to Columbus, OH in 1984, says he left the show and the station in 1995 because "I was taking on more responsibility in Columbus. And I had a daughter, so I scaled back.

"I was honored to be a part of Tejano history. I was also a DJ in Fostoria and I taught Celso Rodríguez all about Tejano music. In the 1980s, I got to meet every-body." Rodríguez later developed a very successful formatting of Tejano music on WRED 95.7FM.

Today, the show is called "La Unica," broadcasting on WBGU 88.1FM every Sunday for four hours, from 8:00AM to noon. The DJs include Freddy Gutiérrez, his son-in-law Geraldo Rosales, Rudy "Jalapeño" Lomeli, Joe Cardenas, Maribel, and Daniel.

Editor's Note: Thanks to the research of BGSU's Gloria Enriquez Pizana, on "July 1978 Lo Meior de Bowling Green Radio Program, WBGU 88.1, South Hall, BGSU, commenced its Latino radio programming. In short, Spanish program was given air time by WBGU FM.

La Union de Estudiantes Latino (LSU) contributed \$300 toward Mexican and Puerto Rican music for the radio library.
