U.S. House changes rules to put off vote on Colombia trade agreement

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON April 10, 2008(AP): The Democratic-led House of Repre-

cranci-led House of Repticsentatives, in an electionyear showdown with the White House, effectively denied President George W. Bush a vote on a free trade agreement with Colombia.

The House voted 224-195 Thursday to eliminate a rule that would force it to vote on the trade agreement within 60 legislative days of the president's submission of the legislation to Congress. Bush sent the agreement to the House on Tuesday, starting a 90-day clock for the House and then the Senate either to approve or reject the pact.

The House action in all likelihood kills consideration of the Colombia agreement this year, and will leave it for the administration that succeeds him in January. Both Democratic presidential nominees Barack Obama and Hillary Rodham Clinton oppose the free trade agreements.

House Speaker *Nancy Pelosi*, a Democrat who initiated the rules change, blamed Bush for submit-

ting the agreement to Congress before a consensus was reached with congressional leaders on outstanding differences

She said she warned Bush in a phone conversation Monday that the agreement would be defeated if a vote were to be taken now, and the priority should instead be on measures to revive the U.S. economy.

Bush, she said, "abandoned the traditions of consultations that have governed past agreements."

"You forgot to consult with us," House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Charles Rangel, also a Democrat, said, referring to Bush. "You did not deal with some of the issues we have."

Republicans angrily condemned the rules change. "This action today is nothing short of political blackmail," said Republican leader John Boehner, contending that Pelosi was using it to force the president to deal with her agenda.

The Democratic Congress approved a free trade agreement last year with Peru but has balked at moving ahead with Colombia, partly because of continued violence against organized labor in Colombia and partly because of differences with the administration over how to extend a program that helps American workers displaced by foreign competition.

Democratic Rep. James McGovern cited figures that in the first 12 weeks of this year that show 17 trade unionists were assassinated in Colombia. "When it comes to issues like human rights, I refuse to be a cheap date," McGovern said.

U.S. organized labor and human rights groups generally have opposed the Colombia deal because of the problems of labor leaders in the South American country. Business groups such as the U.S. Chamber of Commerce have actively lobbied for the deal, saying it would remove tariffs that impede American exports to the country.

Almost all Colombian goods already enjoy dutyfree status when sold in the United States. Trade between the two countries reached about \$18 billion last year.

La decisión del presidente había sido anticipada por dos días de testimonio ante un Congreso escéptico por Petraeus y Ryan Crocker, el embajador estadounidense en Irak. Ahora en su sexto año, la guerra ha cobrado la vida de más de 4.000 soldados norteamericanos y ha costado más de 500.000 millones de dólares.





Democrats spending more on Spanish-language presidential ads

April 9, 2008 (AP): This year's presidential candidates have already spent more than \$4 million on television advertising. Among the other findings of a report released Wednesday from the Hispanic Voter Project at Johns Hopkins University:

 Democrats Hillary Rodham Clinton and Barack Obama spent more than \$1.8 million in Texas on TV ads before its March 4 primary.

• Former candidate Bill Richardson, whose mother was Mexican, had the first Spanish-language advertising in summer 2007 in Nevada, the first state with a large Hispanic population to have a contest. Obama and Clinton followed.

• In 2004, Democrats spent about \$320,000 for Spanish-language ads, including \$150,160 by former Vermont Gov. Howard Dean, before Sen. John Kerry won the nomination. Already, Democrats have spent more than \$4 million.

• Sen. John McCain aired the first ad aimed at the November general election. His campaign translated a biographical introduction that aired in New Mexico, a swing state.

Pay ban for undocumented immigrants is unconstitutional

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 9, 2008 (AP): A legislative proposal to make it a crime for undocumented

immigrants to accept pay for work done in Tennessee is unconstitutional, the state's attorney general said in a legal opinion released Wednesday.

Attorney General Bob Cooper wrote in the opinion that the proposal would conflict with the Federal Labor Standards Act, which protects workers' rights to receive minimum and overtime wages.

Federal courts have said those protections "apply regardless of immigration status and that all workers are entitled to be paid for work that they have performed," Cooper said in the opinion.

The proposal sponsored by Sen. Joe Haynes, D-Goodlettsville, and Rep. Mike Turner, D-Old Hickory, has been awaiting floor votes in both chambers of the General Assembly pending questions over whether it would be constitutional.

The bill proposed requirements for undocumented immigrants caught working in the state to forfeit earnings and property, face up to six months in jail and be fined up to \$500.

Cooper said the property seizure provision would violate constitutional protections for due process.

"It is conceivable that government officials might

attempt to seize all real

or personal property of an undocumented alien, including property that is not in any way related to that person's compensation for illegally working in the state," Cooper

Senate Democratic Caucus spokesman Mark Brown said Haynes will abandon the proposal following the attorney general's opinion.

"We have no intention of saddling the state with costly and time consuming litigation over this,' said Brown.

Menos centroamericanos logran cruzar México rumbo a EEUU

ARRIAGA, México, el 12 de abril del 2008 (AP): Para miles de centroamericanos que quieren ingresar ilegalmente a Estados Unidos el largo recorrido comienza aquí, en los vagones de un ruidoso tren de carga que llaman "La Bestia". Con creciente frecuencia, el recorrido se corta pronto.

Los indocumentados centroamericanos tropiezan con nuevos controles dentro de territorio mexicano, incluidos inspectores que buscan polizones en los trenes. Los daños causados por los huracanes en las vías férreas complican aún más las cosas.

Como consecuencia de ello, la cantidad de indocumentados no mexicanos detenidos en la frontera por las autoridades migratorias estadounidenses se redujo en un 60% desde el 2005, a pesar de una intensa campaña en busca de extranjeros sin papeles. El año pasado fueron arrestados unos 68.000 extranjeros que no eran oriundos de México, la mayoría de ellos centroamericanos, comparado con los 165.000 del 2005.

Desde que Felipe Calderón asumió la presidencia hace dos años, aumentó la cantidad de efectivos de las fuerzas de eguridad que custodian la frontera sur.

Isaac Castillo, dueño del Hotel La Posada en Arriaga, dice que los centroamericanos con frecuencia terminan radicados en México, donde ganan el doble de lo que pueden

ganiar trobne de roque pueden percibir en sus países. "El problema no radica solo en Estados Unidos, sino también en México, porque muchos centroamericanos quieren quedarse aquí y competir con los mexicanos por los puestos de trabajo", manifestó Castillo.

La campaña del gobierno a hecho que los ha hecho que los centroamericanos busquen nuevas rutas. Algunos pagan hasta 7.000 dólares para ingresar a México por mar y luego esconderse en camiones que van al norte.

Estas embarcaciones y camiones intentan evitar los puestos de control que abundan en la frontera sur y en las carreteras de esa región.

Los centroamericanos que

no pueden o no quieren hacer la travesía marina apuestan a La Bestia, el tren en el que hacen un recorrido de 3.600 kilómetros (2.000 millas) hasta Estados Unidos.

El trayecto comienza en el río Suchiate, en la frontera con

Guatemala, que cruzan en precarias balsas, pagando un dólar. Luego caminan nueve días a lo largo de las vías del tren en una región selvática, bajo un sol ardiente, hasta llegar a Arriaga, a 360 kilómetros (200 millas) de la frontera. Ese es el sitio más cercano donde pueden abordar un tren desde que Stan destruyó la línea Chiapas-Mayab.

Durante el viaje deben pagar coimas a ladrones, funcionarios de inmigración, agentes de la policía y empleados del ferrocarril. Juan Gabriel Ramos, un

Juan Gabriel Ramos, un guatemalteco de 17 años que quiere reunirse con su madre en California, dijo que antes de llegar siquiera a Arriaga y ale había tenido que pagar a un agente de la policía federal y a otro de inmigración.

"Los dos me dijeron que si no les pagaba, me mandaban de vuelta a Guatemala", expresó Ramos.


Los centroamericanos afirman que, si son detenidos, las autoridades mexicanas los someten a abusos. En un publicitado caso el año pasado en la ciudad norteña de Saltillo, denunciaron ante la Comisión Nacional de Derechos Humanos que les habían hecho exámenes de recto con el pretexto de que querían determinar si portaban cólera. "El maltrato al migrante aquí es brutal y nadie hace

nada al respecto porque todo mundo los ve como un botín", expresó el sacerdote católico Heyman Vásquez, quien calcula que el 80% de los centroamericanos que llegan a su refugio en Arriaga han sido robados. La merma en el tránsito de

indocumentados indocumentados es particularmente notable en Arriaga, una localidad agrícola, en la que se produce maíz y sorgo. En la dilapidada estación de trenes hay unos pocos centroamericanos que

esperan poder abordar algún tren. Algunos van a un refugio para extranjeros, televisión y relatan los abusos que padecieron.

Sentado afuera del refugio, un nicarag Juense cuenta que una vez vio a cómo un grupo de hombres violaba a una mujer y le disparaba a su novio. Una pareja hondureña dijo que huyó de su país cuando unos pandilleros mataron a su hija adolescente. Dejaron atrás a siete hijos, de entre uno y 18 años, escondidos.



Abordar un tren no es nada fácil. A menudo deben sobornar a guardias y a la policía. Algunos polizones están tan cansados que no pueden aferrarse al tren por mucho tiempo y terminan cayendo a las vías, sufriendo esiones graves.

El viaje puede resultar

mortal.

Jorge Guevara, un salvadoreño de 21 años, declaró que la primera vez que hizo el recorrido, en el 2001, nizo el recorrido, en el 2001, el tren se descarriló y unas 20 personas fueron aplastadas y seguramente murieron. El escapó y no sabe bien lo que sucedió.

"Ese accidente me dejó en shock pero yo seguí", contó Guevara a un grupo de indocumentados que hacía el viaje por primera vez. "Uno no piensa en el peligro, solo en llegar a los Estados Unidos. Ya cuando esté allá pensaré

Guevara dijo que trabajó perando una carretilla operando una elevadora en Dallas hasta que fue deportado el año pasado

fue deportado el año pasado luego de que la policía lo detuvo porque no le funcionaba una de las luces traseras de su automóvil.

A Milagros Rivera y su familia le tomó un mes llegar a Lixtepec, localidad a 136 kilómetros (85 millas) al norte de Arriaga. Para entonces, esta salvadoreña de 36 años había salvadoreña de 36 años había sido robada tres veces: por

sido robada tres veces: por soldados, por ladrones y por un policía.

En el peor de esos tres incidentes, ella, su novio, su hijo de 20 años y su nuera, de 18, fueron abordados por individuos armados junto a las vías. Los hicieron desnudarse y se llevaron 1.500 dólares que tenían, dijo

"Fue un trago muy amargo proque apartaron a mi nuera y pensamos que la iban a violar", expresó la mujer. Los asaltantes finalmente

deiaron ir a la muchacha, ilesa,

Rivera dijo que se dirigen a Virginia, donde tienen amigos que les han dicho los ayudarán a conseguir trabajo.

"Se sufre mucho, pero la esperanza de llegar te ayuda a seguir adelante", manifestó.

Missouri is one of five states targeted by supporters as part of a broader ef-

fort to strike down affirmative action laws. Supporters have until May 4. 2008 to collect roughly 150,000 signatures from registered voters across the state.



Vatican Art Exhibit showcases in Cleveland

CLEVELAND, April 10, 2008: One of the largest collections of art, documents and historically significant objects from the Vatican ever to tour North America is coming to the Western Reserve Historical Society in Cleveland beginning May 31, 2008, for a limited, exclusive regional engagement.

Vatican Splendors from Saint Peter's Basilica, the Vatican Museums and the Swiss Guard will present unique objects illustrating the Vatican's impact on history and culture through 2,000 years. The timing of the exhibition commemorates the 500th anniversary of Saint Peter's Basilica, the founding of the Vatican Museums, Michelangelo's painting of the Sistine Chapel ceiling and the establishment of the Papal Swiss Guard.

"Vatican Splendors is visiting only three U.S. cities, so we feel very fortunate to have it come here to Cleveland," said Dr. Gainor Davis, president of the Western Reserve Historical Society. "Since such a large percentage of Northeastern Ohio's population has Catholic roots, the Society felt that this exhibition meshed perfectly with its ongoing mission to educate our residents about the origins of their history, culture and traditions. People will be able to see some of the world's greatest treasures without having to travel to the Vatican."

Approximately 200 rare objects will be presented in contextual environments, such as the recreated tomb of Saint Peter. Items in the collection – which includes tiaras; mosaics; paintings; works by well-known sculprors; papal rings and jewels; intricately embroidered silk vestments; precious objects from the Papal Mass; armor, swords and vestments of the Papal Swiss Guard; and gifts to the popes from notables such as Napoleon and the Dalai Lama – are on loan from the Vatican Museums, the Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples, the Office of the Liturgical Celebrations of the Supreme Pontiff, the Reverenda Fabbrica of Saint Peter, the Apostolic Floreria, private collections and the Papal Swiss Guard.

The exhibition features actual objects relating to the

election of Pope Benedict XVI, such as election ballots, patens and ums used in voting, a ceremonial vestment and an actual white smoke cartridge announcing the election.

"Indeed, this exhibition is in itself significant, as it represents one of the largest collections of art and objects from the Vatican ever to tour North America," stated Monsignor Roberto Zagnoli, curator of the Vatican Museums. "Many of these works have never before been outside Vatican City."

After the three-city tour of St. Petersburg, Fla., Cleveland and St. Paul, Minn., the items featured in *Vatican Splendors* will return to Rome where they cannot be absent for more than a year.

"It is a great privilege for Cleveland to host this won-derful collection," said the Most Rev. Richard G. Lennon, bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Cleveland. "This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for all – not just Catholics – to see these awe-inspiring treasures and significant pieces of art and beauty here in Northeast Ohio."

"This exhibition is about

art, history, culture and the Church's legacy over the last 2,000 years," said Mark Greenberg, president of Evergreen Exhibitions, producers of the exhibition. "The Vatican has had a profound impact on culture through the centuries by commissioning,



"Leatherheads" takes years to move from writer's idea to screen

RALEIGH, N.C., 4-9-08 (AP): In 1986, Duncan Brantley fell in love with Johnny Blood, mesmerized by the tales of the Duluth Eskimos star from the early days of professional football: "He was a drunk, a womanizer and a poet."

It was a love to be tested for more than two decades, as the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill graduate's retelling of Blood's tales—written with former Sports Illustrated columnist Rick Reilly—attracted one leading man after another. Alec Baldwin, Michael Keaton, Ray Liotta, and Mel Gibson all took a look after Universal bought the script in 1991. None would commit.

"We had this beautiful relationship and we made this great baby," Reilly said. "And right away, the baby was adopted. And for 16 years, we had no idea what happened to this baby. ... We figured many, many times the baby was dead.

"So we go years without hearing anything about it, only to hear not only the baby is alive, but it's running toward you with a big, fat check. And the baby looks just like George Clooney."

The baby's name: "Leatherheads." Johnny Blood, whose real name was John McNally, became Dodge Connolly. He plays for the Duluth Bulldogs, instead of the Duluth Eskimos. Set in Minnesota, it was

filmed in North Carolina and South Carolina. A film with high expectations, it opened last Friday to mixed reviews and a disappointing \$13.5 million in ticket sales.

But it opened.

"He never stopped believing in it," Reilly said. "I stopped believing in it two years after I wrote it."

Brantley met Reilly in the 1980s when working as a researcher at Sports Illustrated, where Reilly wrote the back page column before leaving recently for ESPN. Brantley stumbled on Blood's story while at the magazine and convinced Reilly they could write a screenplay, even though neither had done it before.

"I just fell in love with this guy," Brantley, a native of Rutherfordton, said of Blood. "I thought, 'Wow, this would be a fun movie."

Brantley left SI before the script was done, taking a job as a caretaker at Steven Spielberg's home in East Hampton, N.Y. When he and Reilly finished "Leatherheads," Reilly wanted Brantley to leave the script where Spielberg would happen across it _ on a desk, near a toilet, by the

In writing the story, set in the 1920s, Reilly and Brantley said they studied the fast-talking movies from the 30s and 40s, including "The Thin Man" series and "His Girl Friday." Brantley took another stab at freshening the script about three years ago before Clooney got a hold of "Leatherheads" and added his own touch.

script to make it more of a screwball comedy.

When asked, Brantley coyly said he couldn't tell where one writer's work blended into another's.

"It's such an impossible question to answer because what you're trying do is divvy up a totally subjective document," Brantley said. "It's just an impossible thing to do."

Reilly said while Clooney added a plot device and changed some of the dialogue, "most of it was still what we wrote." Still, he recalled sitting in an audience with Brantley at the premiere, wondering who wrote which joke.

"That's pretty funny. Did we write that? I don't think we did," he said, describing their conversation. "It's been so long, we don't even recognize the baby."

But 16 years after giving birth, Reilly said, that's OK: "If somebody raised your baby, fed it, clothed it and made it rich, you're not going to complain about the underwear."

Ohio anti-tobacco group to keep funds from lawmakers, gov

COLUMBUS, April 5, 2008 (AP): The board of an anti-tobacco group formed by the General Assembly voted Friday to transfer \$190 million into separate non-profit accounts, an attempt to keep the funds out of the reach of Gov. Ted Strickland and legislative leaders who want to instead use them for an economic stimulus plan.

The Ohio Tobacco Prevention Foundation board also voted to ask Attorney General Marc Dann to appoint special counsel to represent the

"The board felt like it was given no choice, but to do whatever it had to do to protect and save Ohio lives," Dr. David Rummel, board chairman, said in a statement. "Any reduction in funding jeopardizes the pocketbooks and lives of Ohioans in every part of the state.

"The foundation supports job creation in Ohio," he said. "We don't believe people have to give their lives to do it."

The jobs program would create more college internships and co-op programs at businesses in Ohio. It's part of a \$1.57 billion economic recovery unveiled by plan Strickland, a Democrat, and Republican legislative leaders earlier this week.

Strickland had planned to take \$230 million from the foundation to fund the jobs package, leaving \$40 million for anti-tobacco programs.

Strickland, Senate President Bill Harris and House Speaker Jon Husted released a joint statement calling the Friday foundation's actions troubling.

"We will take every step necessary to prevent the foundation from circumventing a bipartisan decision that has been made for the good of all Ohioans," the statement said.

The foundation, which seeks to reduce tobacco use by Ohioans by distributing grant money and implementing intervention programs, is governed

by a 19member board арpointed by the governor and legislative leaders and four nonvoting legislators. It is funded by money from a settlement between tobacco companies and 46


The board's vote divided \$190 million among the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, the American Legacy Foundation and the Ohio Hospital Association for Healthy Communities Foundation.

Prevention efforts have helped reduce smoking by more than 40 percent among youths and by about 15 percent among adults, the foundation said.

Ohio's smoking ban, which took effect last year following a statewide vote, prohibits smoking in most public places, including restaurants, bars and of-

WASHINGTON, DC, April 10, 2008: The United States Senate passed legislation that includes provisions which could lead to the creation of a National Museum of the American Latino, and also paves the way for the designation of various historic sites around the country after the legendary César

The Consolidated Natural Resources Act of 2008 (S. 2739), which the Senate passed, includes both the Commission to Study the Potential Creation of the Na-tional Museum of American Latino Act of 2007 (S.500/ H.R. 512), as well as the César Estrada Chávez Study Act (S.

"I am proud that Senate Democrats led the way to approve legislation today that honors the countless contributions of Hispanic Ameri-cans to our country," Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said. "By approving a bill that would eventually honor Latinos with a national museum in Wasington, DC, and that would pave the way for honoring historical sites renonoring instorical sites re-lated to civil rights icon César Chávez, the Senate helped bring recognition to the vital place that Latinos have in our national mosaic."

The Latino museum legislation would establish a Commission to study the potential

creation of a national museum in Washington, DC dedicated to the art, culture, and history of Latino-Americans. The bill passed by voice vote in the House of Representatives on February 6, 2007. It will now head back to the House for final action as part of a larger package of bills.

El Super Mex, Benito Lucio Jr., continues his community involvement in Columbus

Om April 11, 2008, we published an article in *La* Prensa concerning Benito Lucio and his involvement in Latino radio program-ming at WBGU 88.1FM, Bowling Green State University, commencing in 1978.

You may remember him as El Super Mex. He was born in San Benito, Texas to parents who were migrant farmworkers in Montana. Colorado, Texas, Illinois, Michigan, Pennsylvania, and Ohio. As a child, he and his family lived for eight years in a migrant camp. He has never forgotten his

In 1984, Lucio moved to Columbus to work for the state of Ohio, but he continued to drive up to BGSU to do the radio show. "I did it for 11 more years. I never got paid. It was my way of putting back into the com-munity," Lucio told this re-

But that wasn't his only legacy at BGSU. Lucio es-tablished a Hispanic Scholarship Fund and hosted the first Hispanic Issues Con-ference in 1978 that brought the top Latino leadership in the country (José Angel Gutiérrez and Reyes López Tijerina) to the cam-

That same year, Lucio was instrumental in estab-lishing residency rules for migrant workers in Ohio. BGSU recognized his efforts along with support from Advocates for Basic Legal

Advocates for Basic Legal Equality (ABLE), and estab-lished residency rules under the Ohio Board of Regents. Today, in Columbus, El Super Mex is host of a talk and Latino music show on 1550 AM in Columbus. The show features interviews with representatives of government agencies and others who serve the community. He provides valuable information to the community on such vital issues as how to apply for child support, the importance of voting, income taxes, gov-ernment laws and regulations, employment opportu-nities, dealing with domestic violence and other topics of concern.

Just this month, he began hosting a weekly community TV show, *Punto de Contacto* (Point of Contact) on Channel 48, Azteca America, which is televised in Columbus at 9 AM every Sunday. The sta-tion hopes to syndicate the show throughout the state. Like Lucio's radio show, Punto de Contacto is a primetime approach to advo-

But there is much more to Lucio than just his radio and

television persona.

He began his public service career in 1981 when he was elected Chairman of the Board of the Ohio Hispanic Institute of Opportunities, Inc. This was a non-profit multi-million dollar support-ive services agency for migrant farm workers and the Latino community.

Lucio's work came to the attention of the state of Ohio, and in 1984 he was hired as the first State Migrant Agri-cultural Ombudsman. In 1995 he was promoted to Monitor Advocate/Ombudsman for the Ohio Department of Jobs and Family Services, a pro-gram designed to meet the needs of migrant and seasonal farmworkers and their employers. Lucio was the first in the nation to create an ag-ricultural Web site for migrant farm workers, and established a migrant housing program to improve the hous ing of migrant workers in Ohio.

He helped in the promotion of ITIN's for immigrants, and was the first to host the Mexican Consulate in Columbus in 2000.

Lucio is the former Board President and Secretary of the Board of Directors for Mate-Board of Directors for Material Assistance Providers, Inc., the state's only free furniture bank. He is president of the Hispanic Society of Central Ohio, Inc., a local non-profit Latino organization that has provided more than \$50,000 in scholarships to Hispanic college students

nic Coalition.

He is a member and acre is a memoer and active participant in Shaddai Pentacostal Church, St. Stephen Catholic Church, and Christ the King Catho-lic Church, Lucio still finds time to volunteer one day a week teaching ESL to the Hispanic community. He also hopes to complete his degree at Ohio State Uni-

Israeli-Palestinian Peace remains elusive 60 years into the conflict

Author reflects on U.S. policies and failures By Arooj Ashraf, La Prensa Cleveland Correspondent

April 11, 2008: Aaron David Miller discussed his book "The Much Too Promised Land: America's Elusive Search for Arab-Israeli Peace," at The City Club of Cleveland, as part of its Friday series.

Miller spent 25 years at the Department of State as an adviser to six Secretaries of State, where he helped formulate U.S. policy on the Middle East and the Arab-Israel peace process. "The book is meant for a reading pub-lic, normal people who may not have enormous expertise in the region but enjoy a good story, Miller said.

He claims the book as his story, complete with antidotes, "bad" baseball metaphors and interviews with former presidents, secretary of states, key Israeli and Arab negotiators—basically anyone who played a role in the

Middle East Peace Process. As Israel prepares to celebrate its 60th birthday on May 14, 2008 Miller's book is a timely overview of why the United States, the world's super power, has been unable to broker peace between the Arabs and Israelis. He said the book is an effort to honestly and candidly analyze the complex conflict and identify key reasons why peace has been so elusive in the Middle East and how the turmoil shapes current affairs of the world and threatens U.S. national se-

"The Israeli-Palestinian conflict is a conflict between an occupied nation and a threatened nation," he said and reconciliation, while possible, will require elimination of dices and the willingness of the Arabs and Israelis. America wants this-unless the political will and

urgency exists on the part of Arabs and Israelis, it's not going to happen,' he said.

For the U.S. government, he suggests a little self reflection and a revision course in thousands of years of

Middle East history. Miller said the United States ignored the history of the region, misread the present circumstances and by invading Iraq has made itself and its key ally, Israel, unsafe. "If you want to blame the (George W. Bush) administration for anything, blame them for putting the nation in a position where it can not possibly succeed," he said. Miller said the Iraq and Afghan wars leveled the plain for Iran which has the most potential for developing weapons of mass destruc-

The book is meticulously divided into subjective chapters and begins with full disclosure of who he is and the transition in thought of a young Jewish man growing up in Cleveland to a Senior Adviser for Arab-Israeli Negotiations.

"Support for Israel was part of my political and eth-nic DNA and it remains there but it shows the evolution of my views and how they expand to understand the Arab-Israeli conflict is more than meeting the needs and requirement of one side," he

He concluded that there is no objectivity in the conflict and every person brings with them their preconceived biases, cling to them as the singular truth and hinder the possibility of a lasting peaceful solution.

"All you can do is put aside your prejudices...and try to understand the needs and views of the other side," he said. Which is exactly the mission of Seeds for Peace which brings together Israeli and Palestinian youth to

share their views for three weeks. "At the end they may not love each other but they do a better job of understanding the narra-tive of the other side," Miller said, who served as president of Seeds of Peace for three years after leaving the State Department.

"America will remain committed to Israel and our special relationship," he said, but stressed it can not be exclusive and allow Israel to act as it pleases and jeopardize U.S.-American interests in the region. Miller remains cautiously optimistic that peace is an achievable goal. "Never, ever give up on the possibility the world can be changed and made into a better place," he said.

Peace will require understanding of history, laying aside personal, ethnic, cultural, religious, and political bias, an effort to understand the other's side needs. "For that, we need leaders who are masters of their politics, not prisoners, and we do not have that today," Miller concluded.

Miller received his Ph.D. in American Diplomatic and Middle East His-Michigan in 1977. During 1982 and 1983, he was a Council on Foreign Relations fellow and a resident scholar at the Georgetown Center for Strategic and International Studies. In 1984 he served a temporary tour at the American Embassy in Amman, Jordan. He also served on the United States Holocaust Memorial Council between 1998 and 2000.
