Mich. Democrats fill 1st round of national convention spots

LANSING, April 19, 2008 (AP): Michigan Democrats met Saturday to choose their first round of national convention del-egates, even though the state has been stripped of its delegates by the Demo-

cratic National Committee. Party members were selecting 83 delegates and 15 alternates at 15 district conventions around the state. Delegates were allocated according to the results of the Jan. 15 primary, which New York Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton won. An official list of del-egates and alternates was to be released early in the week by the Michigan

Democratic Party.
"It appears that there's been good turnout at all the conventions around the state," Michigan Democratic Party Chairman Mark Brewer said Satur-day afternoon. "Nobody has called with anything

But 40 percent of Michigan voters in the Democratic primary backed "uncom-mitted" after candidates Barack Obama, John



registered to run for them.
In Lansing, Griffin Rivers beat 17 others for the male uncommitted spot, while Irene McDonnell Cahill of Howell, a teamster, bested 21 others for the female uncommitted spot. Both back the Illinois senator, as was evidenced by Riv-ers' black T-shirt emblazoned with the words: "No drama with Obama."

They said Obama is energizing the party in a new

way.
"I think he'll be a tremendous asset in building the Democratic Party back to the status it once was," said Riv-ers, of Lansing, chairman of

China objeta origen de problema con heparina en EEUU

WASHINGTON (AP): Autoridades de China cuestionaron el lunes la posibilidad de que un contaminante encontrado en el anticoagulante heparina fuera la causa original de las diversas reacciones desarrolladas alérgicas por centenares estadounidenses.

En una conferencia de rensa en la embajada de China, las autoridades chinas insinuaron que el problema pudo surgir en Estados Unidos. Tienen programada una visita a la planta de Baxter International en Nueva Jersey para tener un mejor conocimiento de la forma en que es finalizado el

"Cuando se ve, entonces se cree", dijo Jin Shaohong, el subdirector general del Instituto Nacional para el Control de Productos Farmacéuticos y Biológicos de China.

La heparina procedente de China es preparada a partir de una mucosidad de intestinos de cerdo y tejidos de otros animales, y procesada por lo general en fábricas pequeñas sin registro oficial. La empresa Scientific Protein Laboratories posee una de esas fábricas chinas Changzhou SPL_ y adquiere cantidades adicionales de heparina cruda a otros proveedores chinos

Los funcionarios chinos dijeron que Changzhou SPL fue dirigida y supervisada por un gerente de las instalaciones de Scientific Protein Laboratories en Wisconsin, y que el proceso de la manufactura el control de calidad fueron suministrados por la casa matriz de SPL.

La Administración de Alimentos y Fármacos de Estados Unidos afirma que hay 62 muertes por posibles reacciones de tipo alérgico asociadas con lotes contaminados de heparina. La entidad gubernamental no ha determinado las causas precisas de reacciones, sospecha principalmente de un contaminante que encontró en heparina en bruto procedente de

Detroit mayor says God is punishing him for disobedience

DETROIT, April 19, 2008 (AP): Detroit Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick says God is punishing him for his "disobedience."

The mayor addressed a crowd Saturday at Fellowship Chapel Church in Detroit. He and his former chief of staff face perjury and other charges stemming from their testimony during a whistle-blower trial last year.

Kilpatrick told the crowd: "I'm not being whupped by the devil; I am being punished by my God. I know that my disobedience put me in the situation I am in."

His address was part of a Detroit Manpower Movement event aimed at getting more black men involved in volunteer efforts.

Kilpatrick and Christine Beatty denied having a romantic relationship, but excerpts of text messages contradict their testimonythey are under indictment for perjury and other charges.

Flamboyant Puerto Rican astrologer seeks crossover success

MIAMI, April 12, 2008 (AP): If the late Texas Gov. Ann Richards and the musician Liberace ever had a Span-ish-speaking love child, it would be Puerto Rican astrologer Walter Mercado.

The platinum blond who favors brocade jackets, satin capes and kumquat-sized gemstone rings has built a commercial empire across the hemisphere with his dra-matic daily horoscope predictions in Spanish-language papers, TV and radio.

Then there's his psychic network, perfume company and other promotions. On the go? Walter will send a horoscope directly to your cell

Now, Mercado, 76, is looking to conquer the market that is still beyond his grasp: the English-language one, where his exposure has mostly been "What the heck was that?" what the neck was that? pauses during channel surfing. On Sunday, Mercado debuts on a new VHI reality show entitled, "Viva Hollywood," in which bilingual actors compete to star in a Telaward at leasured. There actors compete to star in a *Telemundo* telenovela. Those who are voted off must act out a death scene before they go. The show is as over the top as Mercado, but if his strange success is any sign, it

might just be a hit.
"They asked for comedy
on the show, so I did it as
comedy, but in my work I'm very serious," Mercado said as he played with the feather plumes hanging from his cape during a recent horoscope

Diana Taylor, a New York University Tisch School of Performing Arts professor, has studied Mercado's rise, and even she is somewhat

baffled at his popularity in a culture that coined the term "macho." She attributes it in part to the history of "curanderos" or healers who serve as alternative authority figures in Latin America, and to a greater acceptance in gen-eral in Latin cultures of dramatic flair.

"He endows the drag queen with papal authority," she wrote in a 2003 critique. "He reads politics through astrology and comments on the bru-tality of conquest, slavery, sexism and other social ills through the movement of the stars.

Mercado's view of his suc-cess is simpler.

The divine, he maintains, combines the feminine and the masculine, a sort of yin-

yang.
"My message is positive, and I am honest about who I

he said. Mercado didn't start out as a gender-bending soothsayer. As a child in San Juan, he was often sick and was drawn to alternative healing arts, including astrology. But Mercado garnered initial success as an actor in telenovelas and on stage.

All that changed one after-noon in the late 1960s when he took a break from a local play and did a TV interview still dressed in his outlandish stage costume, according to legend. The topic was astrology, and the segment was such a success Mercado was immediately asked back.

A producer told him to stick with the theater getup because it added gravitas to his predictions.

Although he maintains publicly that he is celibate thanks to meditation and other

spiritual pursuits, Mercado quickly became an icon in the gay community. And then celebrity took

over.
"There are certain people

in any culture that sort of transcend gender, transcend to a scend gender, transcend to a certain degree common sense. Walter Mercado is one of those iconic figures, "said Randy Barbato, executive di-rector of "Viva Hollywood."
"Even the very macho guys screamed when he came on," he said. "For the contes-tants in the house he is not

tants in the house, he is not only this icon, he's also very familiar. Having Walter is like having your family."

Despite his flamboyant

presence, Mercado speaks seriously when it comes to politics. He says he is an avid supporter of Hillary Clinton, a Scorpio, for president. He chalks up Democratic rival Barack Obama's speaking prowess to being a Leo, and he couldn't remember Republican John McCain's sign, muttering that no one predicted he would win the nomination. But he demurs at pre-dicting who will win the 2008 election, or answering one of the most common questions in Miami: When will Fidel astro die?

"He's in the last stages, but anyone can see that," he shrugs at the obvious.

Although he is called a psychic, Mercado says he is more interested in spreading his messages of love and tolerance as he reels off the week's horoscope. A more personalized 60-minute consultation by one of his trained psychics starts at \$117 on his



Web site.

Mercado tapes days' worth of horoscopes at a time,

using almost no notes.
"What you say that is written has the taste of the written word," he said. "The spoken

word," he said. "The spoken word is more alive, even if you trip up."

His own words have tripped him up. Mercado was named in a 1998 lawsuit after he promoted the healing properties of hematite neck-laces for a jewelry company that was running a Ponzi scheme. The company president went to prison. Mercado settled with the victims.

But even the attorney who sued him now says he be-lieves Mercado was an unwitting player in the scheme and never meant to defraud anyone.

Mercado is now suing

former business manager Guillermo Bakula in Puerto Rico for \$5 million over a breach of contract in a separate case.

Legal troubles aside, Pro-ducer Barbato believes the VH1 show is just the begin-ning of a new stage in Mercado's career

"Walter Mercado is about to make a huge crossover," he predicted. "He's ready for his close-up."

Human rights group submits a report of missing Falun Gong practitioners to the United Nations

April, 2008: Falun Gong Human Rights Working Group (www.falunhr.org) has submitted a report to United Nation's human right related bureau, documenting the twenty missing cases of Falun Gong practitioners since Communist China started the persecution of Falun Gong in July 1999.

The missing practitioners are from Jilin, Heilongjiang, Liaoning, Hebei, Shandong and Hunan Provinces, Chongqing City and Beijing City. Their ages are from 27 to 50s, among them 14 are known females.

According to the group, since the exposure of the Communist Chinese Party's live organ harvesting of detained Falun Gong practitioners in Sujiatun area, subsequent reports reveal "cooperation among Chinese hospitals, army, and police."

Summary of missing practitioners in the reports include:

- 1. Ms. Wu Jing, about 30 years of age, is from Baishanshi in Jilin Provaince. She was employed at the Baishanshi Tourism Office. The last time she was seen was 8 years ago, around the end of October 1999 at a Beijing railway station.
- 2. Ms. Lu Jing, 33 years of age, is from Zhang Sheng Village, Xuan Hua County, Zhao Dong City, Heilongjiang Province. She has been missing since the autumn of 2000.
- 3. Ms. Li Youhua, is from Liaoning Province and was an employee of the 2nd Drilling Company at Liaohe Oil Field. She was arrested about 3 years ago, her whereabouts are unknown.
- 4. Ms. Fu Guiqin, tall and about 40 years of age, lived in the Second Group of Laoshantou, Tangfang Township in Bin County, Heilongjiang Province. She has been missing since 2004. There is no further information about her.

5. Ms. Zhong Shuying and Ms. Zhong Shujun are sisters from Chongqing City. On July 20, 1999 they went to Beijing to appeal for an end to the persecution of Falun Gong and never returned.

6. Ms. Zhang Chunyan, born on August 16, 1970 is now 37 years old. She is from Yutian County in Tangshan City, Hebei Province. On January 16, 2000, Ms. Zhang Cunyan went to Beijing to appeal for an end to the persecution of Falun Gong, and went missing since then.

- 7. Mr. Li Ruixiang lived in the 10th Block of the Shengou Temple Area in Lishan District, Anshan City, Liaoning Province. He left home to avoid being harassed and lost contact with his family since the year 2000.
- 8. Ms. Bing Lianfen, was born on September 16, 1981. In 2003, Ms. Bing Lianfen went to Shouguang City to work. She disappeared in August 2003.
- 9. Mr. Sun Yu, 27 years of age, was a student from the Dalian Aquatic Products College of Liaoning Province. He was arrested by local policemen when he was passing out materials to expose the persecution of Falun Gong on the campus 5 to 6 years ago. His whereabouts are unknown.
- 10. Ms. Li Yuping, 53 years of age and about 1.65m (5ft 5in) in height, lived in Taihe Village, Mashan District, Jixi City, Heilongjiang Province. Ms. Li Yuping was forcet to leave her home and became homeless about 4 years ago when the police mass-arrested Falun Gong practitioners. She has not been heard from since.
- 11. Ms. Bao Cuiyuan, in her sixties, worked for the Science Institute of China, Beijing. She was arrested three times before. She disappeared in Novem-

ber 2005

- 12. Mr. Tang Jian, 28 years of age, of Manchurian ethnicity, is from Shanchengzi (a.k.a. Dadianzi) of Fushun County, Fushun City of Liaoning Province. He disappeared 3 to 4 years ago. His mother, Fengmei, 53 years of age, disappeared 2 to 3 years ago.
- 13. Ms. Tan Siyin, in her early thirties, is from the No. 3 Section of Changxin Village, Gaolong Township, Chalin County of Hunan Province. She disappeared on January 16, 2002.
- 14. Ms. Li Weiming, about 34 years of age, is from Jiangjun Village, Tengbie Township of Anshan City, Liaoning Province. She left home in 2001 and has not been heard of since.
- 15. Mr. Cao Xianlu from Chongqing City is about 50 years of age. He lived in Dapeng Town of Bishan County. His whereabouts have not been known since he was arrested in May 2004.
- 16. Mr. Tan is from Chongqing City. He was an employee of the Bishan Concrete Factory. His whereabouts have not been known since he was arrested.
- 17. Mr. Liu Xianchun is over 40 years of age. He is from Luojiapuo, Taolin Village, Yunxi Town, Yunxi District, Yueyang City, Hunan Province. In 2000 he went to Beijing to appeal for Falun Gong human rights, he never returned. His whereabouts remain unknown.
- 18. Ms. Wang Xiuxiang is in her forties. She lived with her husband in Shijiazhuang City. Since the persecution of Falun Gong began in 1999, her relatives have lost contact with her.

Communist China is hosting the 2008 Summer Olympics and has been plagued by numerous protests by Tibetans and human rights groups.

The Death Penalty in Ohio: Fair or Unjust?

CLEVELAND: Phyllis L. Crocker, professor of law and associate dean for academic affairs at the Cleveland-Marshall College of Law, will talk about issues of fairness and the death penalty in Ohio and share information from the recently published Assessment of Ohio's Death Penalty at noon on Friday, May 2, 2008, at The City Club of Cleveland. A recognized author-

ity on the death penalty, Crocker chaired the American Bar Association's Ohio Death Penalty Assessment Team that published the report EVALUATING FAIRNESS AND ACCURACY IN STATE DEATH PENALTY SYSTEMS: THE OHIO DEATH PENALTY AS-

SESSMENT REPORT (2007). She is the author of several articles that analyze the constitutional and cultural underpinnings of the death penalty.

Crocker received her undergraduate degree from Yale University and her law degree from Northeastern University School of Law. After graduation from law school, she clerked for the Hon. Warren J. Ferguson of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. She was then an associate in a small Chicago firm specializing in complex federal civil litigation.

From 1989 to 1994, Crocker was a staff attorney at the Texas Resource Center in Austin, a federally funded community defender organization representing death-sentenced inmates in state and federal



post-conviction litigation. She served as co-counsel in Herrera v. Collins, 506 U.S. 390 (1993). She joined the Cleveland-Marshall faculty in 1994, and has taught Civil Procedure, Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure I and II, and Capital Punishment and the Law.

Residents of Ohio and Michigan celebrate Arbor Day 2008 on April 25. While some states chose to celebrate Arbor Day on a different date that coincides better with their growing season, National Arbor Day is celebrated on the last Friday in April by many states.

The first Arbor Day was celebrated in Nebraska on April 10, 1872, thanks to a resolution proposed by Nebraska City, Neb., resident J. Sterling Morton. Morton, a civic leader, agriculturist, and former newspaper editor, urged Nebraskans to "set aside one day to plant trees, both forest and fruit."

The tree-planting holiday was so popular that by 1920, more than 45 states and U.S. territories annually celebrated Arbor Day. Today, Arbor Day is observed in all 50 states and in many countries around the world.

The state tree of Ohio is the Ohio buckeye, Aesculus glabra. This native Ohio tree was adopted as the official state tree in 1953. Not to be confused with the Horse chestnut tree, the Ohio buckeye was named a 'buckeye' tree because the tree's large brown seeds closely resemble the eyes of a white-tailed deer. This tree inspired the Ohio nickname, the Buckeyes, a nickname that has been around since the presidential elections of 1840 where William Harrison, an Ohio resident, won the presidency.



The state tree Michigan is the Eastern white pine and it was chosen in 1955. It lives an average of 200 years and can live as long as 400 years. This pine was known Haudenosaunee Native Americans as the tree of great peace, and its needles contain five times the amount of calcium than that of a lemon. Eastern white pines are among the tallest trees east of the Rocky Mountains, and are the state trees of both Michigan and Maine.

The Arbor Day Foundation is a nonprofit conservation organization of nearly one million members, with a mission to inspire people to plant, nurture, and celebrate trees. More information on the Foundation and its programs or ways to celebrate Arbor Day can be found at www.arborday.org.

UMd. approves Latino studies minor

COLLEGE PARK, Md., April 18, 2008 (AP): The University of Maryland at College Park has decided to create a minor in U.S. Latino studies—the first such program at a major university in the Washington area.

A University Senate committee approved the creation of the minor on Friday. The program will become official in the fall, though two graduating seniors who have fulfilled the requirements will graduate this spring with the minor.

The decision prompted applause from activists who have been working to establish a formal program for a decade.

No school in the mid-Atlantic region has a full Latino studies program. There is a similar minor at Loyola College in Baltimore.

El abuso de alcohol se incrementa después del huracán Katrina

ANN ARBOR: Dos estudios divulgados esta semana confirmaron una vez más que la respuesta al desastre impacta enormemente la salud pública de los supervivientes. La nueva investigación muestra por primera vez que hubo más abuso o dependencia del alcohol después del huracán Katrina, en particular en algunos grupos.

algunos grupos.

Los investigadores de la Universidad de Michigan presentaron los dos estudios en la reunión anual de la Asociación de Población de Estados Unidos, que se realiza en Nueva Orleáns del 16 al 19 de abril.

Ambos estudios describen la forma en que los ssupervivientes del huracán Katrina lidiaron con el estrés del desastre. En el primer estudio, titulado "El impacto del huracán Katrina en las diferencias socioeconómicas del uso de alcohol", los investigadores encontraron que en general los supervivientes del Katrina tuvieron tres veces más probabilidades de exhibir abuso del alcohol después de una experiencia estresante. Si el superviviente experimentó un trauma, mostró cinco veces más probabilidades de convertirse en dependiente del alcohol

del alcohol.

La diferencia entre un estrés y un trauma es de grado, dijo Sandro Galea, profesor asociado de la Escuela de Salud Pública de la Universidad de Michigan y coautor de ambos estudios. Galea es asimismo investigador afiliado en el Centro de Estudios de Población del Instituto de Investigación Social de la UM. Un ejemplo de factor estresante, dijo, puede ser el trato con las compañías de seguros o los contratistas: un trauma es la pérdida de un ser querido.

Los investigadores observaron la contribución de la exposición al Katrina en el abuso del alcohol, y las diferencias socioeconómicas en la asociación entre las exposiciones al Katrina y el recurso del alcohol. Para ello usaron datos del Estudio de Panel de Dinámicas de Ingreso recolectados en Mississippi,

recolectados en Mississippi, Louisiana y Alabama.

En el segundo estudio, "Circunstancias financieras y sociales e Incidencia y curso del Trastorno de estrés postraumático (PSTD por su sigla en inglés) durante los dos primeros años después del huracán Katrina", los investigadores entrevistaron a 810 personas en los 23 condados del sur de Mississippi. La prevalencia del trastorno de estrés prostraumático después del Katrina fue del 22,5 por ciento.

En el segundo estudio, los investigadores mostaron tres observaciones novedosas: hubo una carga más alta de PTSD entre los sobrevivientes del Katrina en Mississippi que la que es típica en las áreas de desastre; los factores estresantes continuos y los acontecimientos traumáticos estuvieron vinculados primordialmente con el riesgo de PTSD; y los factores estresantes y acontecimientos traumáticos estuvieron asociados tanto con la incidencia como con el curso

del PTSD después del desastre.
"Este trabajo sugiere firmemente que la reducción de los factores estresantes que encaran los sobrevivientes de desastres puede reducir la carga de salud pública de estos acontecimientos. Los esfuerzos de reconstrucción después del desastre se convierten en gran medida e esfuerzos de salud pública y esfuerzos de salud pública y

para la promoción de la salud", dijo Galea.

Los resultados muestran, otra vez, que cómo responda el gobierno a un desastre y la ayuda para que las víctimas reconstruyan sus vidas deben considerarse como una respuesta de salud pública. La respuesta apropiada puede reducir el impacto de la enfermedad mental después de un desastre, dijo Galea.

Alcoholabuseincreases after Hurricane Katrina; large burden of post-traumatic stress in population

matic stress in population ANN ARBOR: Two papers released last week confirmed that disaster response greatly impacts the public health of survivors. New work shows for the first time that there was more alcohol abuse or dependency after Katrina, particularly in some groups.

University of Michigan researchers presented the two papers at the *Population Association of America's* annual meeting in New Orleans April 16-19, 2008.

Both of the papers relate to how survivors of Hurricane Katrina dealt with the stress of the disaster. In the first paper, "The Impact of Hurricane Katrina on Socioeconomic Disparities in Alcohol Use," researchers found that overall, Katrina survivors were over three times more likely to exhibit alcohol abuse after a stress experience. If the survivor experienced a trauma, they were five times more likely to become alcohol dependent.

The difference between a stress and a trauma is one of degree, said Sandro Galea, associate professor in the University of Michigan School of Public Health and co-author on both papers. Galea is also a research affiliate at the Population Studies Center of the U-M Institute of Social Research. An example of a stressor, he said, might be dealing with insurance companies or contractors; a

panies or contractors; a trauma is losing a loved one. Researchers looked at the contribution of exposure to Katrina to alcohol bingeing, and socioeconomic differences in the association between exposures to Katrina and bingeing. They used data from the Panel Study of Income Dynamics collected in Mississippi, Louisiana and Alabama.

Alabama.

In the second paper, "Financial and Social Circumstances and the Incidence and Course of PTSD in Mississippi during the First Two Years after Hurricane Katrina," researchers interviewed 810 people in 23 southernmost counties of Mississippi. The prevalence of post traumatic stress disorder after Katrina was 22.5 percent.

In the second study, researchers showed three novel observations: there was a 50

Inherited cancer mutation is widespread

COLUMBUS: A gene mutation responsible for the most common form of inherited colon cancer is older and more common than formerly believed, according to a recent study.

to a recent study.

The findings provide a better understanding of the spread and prevalence of the American Founder Mutation, a common cause in North America of a hereditary cancer syndrome called Lynch syndrome. People with the syndrome have a high risk of developing cancers of the colon, uterus, and ovaries.

The same investigators discovered the mutation in 2003. That research identified nine families with the mutation and concluded that a German immigrant couple brought the mutation to North America in 1727.

The latest study includes an additional 32 families and indicates that the mutation is actually about 500 years old, suggesting that it arose several generations earlier in Europeans or perhaps in Native Americans.

Of the 41 families overall, most are clustered in Kentucky, Ohio, and Texas. Scientists at the *Ohio*

Scientists at the Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center and Creighton University conducted the study, published April 1, 2008, in the journal Cancer Research.

"The increased age of the American Founder Mutation means that it is significantly more prevalent in the United States than previously thought," says principal investigator Albert de la Chapelle, a researcher with Ohio State's Human Cancer Genetics program.

cer Genetics program.

"Of interest is that this
mutation has not been found
in Europe, which is tentative evidence, along with
hints from family histories,
that it may have arisen in a
Native American."

The new study estimates that the mutation is present in 32,150 Americans as compared with the earlier figure of 18,981. "But these numbers are theoretical and need to be substantiated by further work," de la Chapelle notes.

"This is an important public health concern," de la Chapelle says, "because individuals with a Lynch syndrome mutation can benefit from earlier and more frequent cancer surveillance."

In addition, he says, a simple, cheap genetic test can detect the mutation.

Lynch syndrome, also known as hereditary nonpolyposis colon cancer, is responsible for about one third of hereditary colon cancers, and almost 3 per-

percent or more higher burden of PTSD among Mississippi Katrina survivors than is typical in disaster areas; ongoing stressors and traumatic events were primarily associated with the risk of PTSD; and stressors and traumatic events were associated with both the incidence and the course of PTSD post-disaster.

"This work strongly suggests that reducing the stressors that disaster survivors face can reduce the public



cent of colon cancer generally, or about 4,500 cases annually in the United States.

The initial study of nine families showed that the American Founder Mutation results in the loss of a very specific piece of a gene called MSH2 (although many other mutations also cause Lynch syndrome).

The new study linked 27 of the 41 families into seven groups through genealogic studies.

The age of the mutation was estimated using certain markers along the DNA located at either end of the mutation. Such patterns of markers are called haplotypes.

haplotypes.

When a new person was identified for the study, the DNA on each side of the individual's mutation was tested for the markers, producing a shared haplotype. The shorter the shared haplotype, the older the mutation. This information led to the estimated age of 500 years.

"This data pushed the original founder mutation back to around 1500, plus or minus a number of years," says coauthor Heather Hampel, a genetics counselor and researcher with Ohio State's Human Cancer Genetics Program.

netics Program.
"The Pilgrims began arriving in the 1600s, so the
mutation could have arisen
first in very early settlers from
Europe, or in Native Ameri-

cans."

"It's unclear whether we'll ever learn who the first person was to have this mutation," Hampel says, "but it is clear that the mutation is much older than we thought and probably more widespread. For that reason, we feel it is potentially a serious public health issue, particularly in states such as Kentucky, Ohio and Texas where it is very prevalent."

Funding from the National Cancer Institute and the National Science Foundation supported this research

health burden of these events. Post-disaster reconstruction efforts become very much public health efforts and need to be recognized as essential to promote health" Galea said?

The results show again that how the government responds to a disaster and to helping victims rebuild their lives should be considered a public health response. Proper response could reduce the burden of mental illness after a disaster. Galea said.

Ten Ways Latinos Can Prevent Type 2 Diabetes

By the National Diabetes Education Program

The National Diabetes Education Program (NDEP) is urging people at high risk for type 2 diabetes to take small steps to lower their risk for the disease and serious complications such as heart disease, stroke, kidney disease, blindness, nerve damage, and other health problems. Take the first step today.

Ask your health care team if you are at risk for type 2 diabetes. Before a person develops type 2 diabetes, they usually have "pre-diabetes," which means their blood glucose (blood sugar) levels are higher than normal, but not yet high enough to be called diabetes. People with pre-diabetes are more likely to develop type 2 diabetes within 10 years and to have a heart attack or stroke.

Although Latinos are at high risk for type 2 diabetes, there is good news. You can prevent or delay type 2 diabetes by making small lifestyle changes in diet and physical activity. Follow these tips to help you prevent or delay type 2 diabetes:

• Set goals you can meet and start by making small changes. First, set a goal you can achieve. Add one or two healthy changes every week. Use NDEP's Your GAME PLAN to Prevent Type 2 Diabetes booklet to help you stick to your goals and succeed.

• Aim to lose at least 5 to 7 percent of your current weight – that's 10 to 14 pounds for a 200-pound person. The key to preventing type 2 diabetes is to lose weight by making healthy food choices and being physically active. Lose a small amount of weight by getting at least 30 minutes of physical activity a day, five days a week and eating foods lower in calories and fat.

• For support, team up with friends and family to help you lower your risk for type 2 diabetes. Ask your family and friends to help you stick to your program. Involve them in your activities. You can help each other move more, eat less, and live a healthier life. Be active with your family by going on a walk together after dinner or playing a pick-up game of basketball. Replace watching TV with an activity that gets everyone moving.

· Make healthy food choices every day. Start with small changes, like eating brown rice instead of white rice or drinking low-fat or fat-free milk. Choose carbs that have lots of fiber such as fresh fruits and vegetables from every color of the rainbow-red, orange, yellow. white, green, blue, and purple A southwestern salad topped with tomatoes, low-fat cheese, black beans, corn, and low-fat or fat-free sour cream can be a good choice

for a side dish.

• Make time to prepare and cook healthy foods.



Freeze portions so you have healthy meals ready for days when you're too tired or don't have time to cook. Cook with less oil and butter. Broil or bake with non-stick spray or low-sodium broth instead. Use herbs and seasonings to add flavor to low-fat dishes. Instead of salt, give foods a little kick by adding hot sauce or red pepper flakes.

• Cut down on food portion sizes. The portion size that you are used to eating may be equal to two or three standard servings — which equals double or triple the calories and fat! Portion sizes are often smaller than you think. Compare serving sizes to everyday objects. For example, one serving of cereal is about the size of a closed fist. One-half cup of cooked rice or pasta is about the size of an ice cream scoop.

• Choose water to drink instead of sweetened fruit drinks and soda. Find a water bottle you really like, such as one that represents your favorite sports team, and drink water from it wherever and whenever you can. Drink a glass of water 10 minutes before your meal to take the edge off your hunger.

• Increase your activity level by walking more often. Schedule "walking dates" with friends or family members throughout the week. Organize a walking group with your neighbors or coworkers. Take your dog – or a friend's dog – for a brisk walk.

• Build physical activity into your day. Pick an activity into your day. Pick an activity you enjoy that will keep you moving, such as soccer, bike riding, or swimming. Dance to the beat of NDEP's Movimiento Por Su Vida CD/DVD or your favorite music. Take the stairs instead of the elevator to your office. Deliver a message in person to a co-worker instead of send-ing on armine on amiliar on a miner.






