AP Analysis: Democratic race all but over, time to focus on candidates' legacies

WASHINGTON, May 21, 2008 (AP): The Democratic presidential race is all but over.

Barring a cataclysmic change of events, Barack Obama will win enough delegates to win the party's nomination. The only real issue is whether he and rival Hillary Rodham Clinton leave the race with their futures—and their party—in tact.

For Obama, that means winning with class so he endears himself to Clinton's supporters, letting her leave the race on her own terms, without gloating or appearing to push her out with any disrespect. And Clinton has to be careful not to damage Obama and make her legacy a weakened Democratic nominee in the fall.

No matter what the New York senator and former first lady wants to do next—angle to be Obama's running mate, make another presidential run or ascend one day to Senate Democratic leader, it is in her interest to leave the 2008 race in a position of strength. She is doing a bang-up job of that.

Even as Obama is steadily climbing toward the 2,026 delegates he needs to secure the nomination—he was fewer than 70 away after Tuesday night's split decision in Kentucky and Oregon—Clinton has defeated him in five of the last seven primaries, including big states such as Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Her decisive victories in Kentucky and West Virginia showed she has a durable base of support, particularly among white, working-class voters and older women. Obama cannot just discount those voters as he moves on to the general election.

Kentucky Democratic Party Chairwoman Jennifer Moore, one of roughly 200 superdelegates yet to be claimed by either candidate, said the Clintons will always have a loyal following in her state because voters there remember the economic good times of the 1990s.

"Clinton supporters need to get to know Barack Obama, get to understand that he stands for many of the same principles as Senator Clinton," Moore said.

Obama offered his own olive branch Tuesday night, praising Clinton for her pioneering candidacy and acknowledging the millions who have voted for her.

"No matter how this primary ends, Senator Clinton has shattered myths and broken barriers and changed the America in which my daughters and your daughters will come of age, and for that we are grateful to her," the Illinois senator said. "Some may see the millions upon millions of votes cast for each of us as evidence that our party is divided, but I see it as proof that we have never been more energized and united in our desire to take this country in a new direction."

Steve Grossman, a former DNC chairman and Clinton fundraiser, said Obama is "wisely being patient," not pushy, about pursuing Clinton backers.

"The art of the appropriate is not always present in politics," he added. "It means you show respect, keep your distance, and understand what people are going through."

Still, neither candidate has moved flawlessly toward reconciliation.

Even after it was clear Obama was on a path to the nomination, Clinton has not been able to resist the occasional jab such as criticizing his health care plan. And in a newspaper interview following her West Virginia win last week, Clinton noted she was beating Obama among "working, hardworking Americans, white Americans"—a characterization that drew widespread criticism. Clinton later said she regretted the comment.

For his part, Obama has taken the risk of appearing to trivialize some of the final primaries, choosing to shadowbox with Republican John McCain in general elec-

tion swing states rather than focus solely on the remaining Democratic contests. He is already making plans to take over the Democratic National Committee.

"They want to claim victory and push Hillary aside—this is what Bush did to Gore in 2000, and we aren't going to put up with it," said Susie Buell, a top Clinton fundraiser based in San Francisco. "It's wrong and corrupt."

Buell helped launch a new organization, www.womencountpac.com, dedicated to giving Clinton's female supporters an avenue to speak out. The group placed full page ads in The New York Times and USA Today proclaiming, "Not so fast: Hillary's voice is our voice, and she is speaking for all of us."

Clinton's advisers are keenly aware that the calls for her to drop from the race are likely to intensify during the 10-day hiatus between Tuesday's primaries and the next contest in Puerto Rico on June 1. But they say there is virtually no chance the former first lady will do so.

They say that she is firmly committed to staying in the race through the last primaries in South Dakota and Montana on June 3 and the meeting of the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee May 31, where the situation involving disputed primaries in Michigan and Florida may be resolved.

Clinton expects to do well in Puerto Rico and her advisers say she will compete actively in South Dakota and Montana even though the three contests will yield just 86 delegates total.

But the numbers are not as important as the signal each primary will send to her supporters: She's a fighter, not a quitter, and she's got a future. Even after this race is over.

Obama y Clinton hacen campaña en Puerto Rico

SAN JUAN, el 23 de mayo del 2008 (AP): En un intento por ganar el apoyo de los electores puertorriqueños, los precandidatos a la presidencia de Estados Unidos por el partido Demócrata Barack Obama y Hillary Clinton harán campaña el sábado en esta isla caribeña.

Obama se reunirá con el gobernador Aníbal Acevedo Vilá y visitará la sede del Partido Popular Democrático (PPD) en donde "vamos a tener una reunión con 50 líderes del PPD", confirmó el mandatario en conferencia de prensa.

"Yo le hago un llamado al pueblo que vote por Obama. Yo estoy convencido que es la mejor alternativa para Estados Unidos para Puerto Rico y para el mundo... esta es una oportunidad única del pueblo de Puerto Rico de votar y respaldar a la persona que va a ser el candidato del Partido Demócrata", destacó Acevedo Vilá.

Según el Gobernador, Obama es mejor opción que porque es producto de "una mezcla de razas", como los puertorriqueños.

El senador por Illinois también contempla reunirse con líderes políticos del anexionista Partido Nuevo Progresista (PNP), entre

otras actividades.

Obama y Clinton se disputan 55 de los electores puertorriqueños en una elección primaria del 1 de junio.

Roberto Prats, co presidente de la campaña de Clinton, adelantó que la senadora por Nueva York llegará por el aeropuerto del pueblo costero de Aguadilla, a 130 kilómetros al oeste de San Juan.

Clinton destacó en una entrevista con la televisora local WAPA que favorecería que los residentes en la isla puedan votar por el presidente de Estados Unidos, una limitación que tienen en la actualidad por la condición de estado libre asociado que tiene la isla y les restringe ese derecho.

Los habitantes de Puerto Rico están casi divididos en partes iguales sobre la cuestión del estatus de la isla. En referendums han elegido permanecer como un territorio estadounidense, como desde 1898 y los nacidos en Puerto Rico tienen ciudadanía estadounidense desde el 1917.

El gobierno tiene un delegado en el Congreso que tiene voz, pero no voto y los puertorriqueños pueden votar en las

primarias presidenciales, pero no por el presidente estadounidense.

Richardson to campaign for Obama in Puerto Rico

SANTA FE, May 21, 2008 (AP): Gov. Bill Richardson will campaign for Democrat Barack Obama in Puerto Rico, which is the site of the next presidential primary.

Richardson will make campaign stops on Thursday and return the next day to New Mexico, according to the governor's office. Richardson is the nation's only Latino governor.

Puerto Rico holds a primary on June 1, followed two days later by South Dakota and Montana—these are the last of the Democratic primaries/caucuses.

Richardson dropped out of the Democratic presidential race in early January and endorsed Obama in March.

OCHLA endorses resolutions opposed to HB 477 and Amended SB 260

Columbus: The Ohio Commission of Hispanic/Latino Affairs has endorsed resolutions calling upon the Ohio House of Representatives to oppose *House Bill 477* and *Amended Senate Bill 260*, on the grounds that one is lacking a focus on promoting English-language learning, and the other threatens safety and security for all Ohioans.

On May 22, 2008, the House passed HB 477, by a vote of 54 to 42, and this bill now goes to the Ohio Senate.

According to *Ezra C. Escudero*, Director of OCHLA, House Bill 477 is an unnecessary bill that carries negative messages for business and education in Ohio. "All state agencies already conduct their official business in English. Furthermore, the Ohio Latino Affairs Commission conducts all its official business and maintains all official documents in English, and has done so for over 30 years," said Escudero.

"Ohio Latino Affairs opposes House Bill 477 because it does not change the status quo. Instead, the Commission supports legislation that supports English language education and programs such as ESL (English as a Second Language education) and other initiatives that can help new U.S.-Americans learn the language and integrate into our communities," continued Escudero.

Amended Senate Bill 260 was passed by the Senate and is now before the House.

OCHLA, likewise, opposes the passage of this amended bill.

"This bill cannot render our communities safer; it does not resolve the challenges of a broken immigration system, and has the potential of destroying important community relationships with the police that are in place right now. Ultimately, we must also encourage federal agencies to do their job, not volunteering state and local agencies with no guarantee of reimbursement," said Escudero. "Across Ohio, partnerships between state, local, and federal law enforcement are a reality today without the need for legislation like Senate Bill 260."

Recent accounts across the country, such as Prince William County, Virginia, show that programs like SB 260 are bankrupting local agencies, adding an unnecessary burden to local jails, and distracting law enforcement from more critical tasks like fighting violent crime.

Senator Teresa Fedor, who cosponsored Amended SB 260, informed *La Prensa* that she has since had second thoughts about bill 260 and will oppose its ultimate passage. *Gov. Ted Strickland* has expressed similar views of discontent.

On that Thursday, the Ohio House in Columbus heard testimony concerning opposition to *Amended Senate Bill 260*. According to *Richard Romero*, Chair of OCHLA, "I have taken the

opportunity to talk to Lorain County Sheriff Phil Stammitti and Lorain Police Chief Cel Rivera; they agreed that this is not something local law enforcement needs to be involved with. It is a federal responsibility and local law enforcement should not be asked to participate when they have a lack of manpower and inadequate funding—Chief Rivera testified as such.

"I have also spoken with State Representative Matt Lundy, State Representative Joe Koziura, State Senator Sue Morano, State Senator Capri Cafaro, and Joyce Beatty, Minority House Leader, and they all agree that as the bill is written now there are some concerns and they will be keeping OCHLA informed as this bill continues to move forward," said Romero.

According to Escudero, ultimately, the goal of the OCHLA's endorsed resolutions is to promote English language learning and public safety for all people in Ohio, while doing so in a fiscally responsible manner.

Midwest organizations sojourn to FLOC to counter anti-immigrant/migrant climate

May 24, 2008: Due to what is perceived to be as an anti-immigrant, racist climate, immigrant leaders from across the Midwest gathered Saturday at the Farm Labor Organizing Committee (FLOC) headquarters in Toledo to decide future courses of action aimed at the defense of their respective communities concerning

raids and deportations; they also met to discuss comprehensive immigration reform, which may become a reality after the elections in November.

Community leaders from various organizations have met several times in Indianapolis, Chicago, Madison, and Detroit and have formally united under the banner of the

Asamblea Permanente del Medio Oeste en Defensa de los Derechos de los Inmigrantes.

In attendance were organizers from Madison, Chicago, Cincinnati, Columbus, Toledo, Indianapolis, and Detroit. The various representatives summarized the current climate in their respective cities and states.

ACLU demands restoration of basic legal protections to meatpacking workers

DES MOINES, May 21, 2008: The American Civil Liberties Union sharply condemned the denial of basic legal protections to immigrant workers arrested in Postville, Iowa

meatpacking raids last week and called on the U.S. Attorney's Office and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to eliminate arbitrary and unreasonable deadlines for mass plea bargains. The U.S. Attorney's Office and DHS have implemented a troubling system that appears to be designed to undermine fairness and due process by criminally prosecuting the over 300 immigrant workers for identity theft and fraud and rushing them through criminal proceedings

with insufficient legal representation.

"The tactics of the prosecutors, the arbitrary plea deadlines, the complexity of the cases, the overwhelming number of cases per lawyer and the language barriers that make representation especially difficult suggest that the government is more interested in getting people deported without hearings than in achieving justice," said ACLU of Iowa Executive Director Ben Stone. "Instead of concocting a system that violates fundamental American values of due process and fairness, the U.S. Attorney's Office and DHS must ensure fair procedures and effective legal counsel under the bedrock principles that govern our legal system."

Groups of more than 20

meatpacking workers are typically represented by a single defense lawyer who for each group must decide complex immigration issues, assess criminal liability and counsel clients who do not speak English. The lawyers, who do not specialize in immigration law, must complete this task under the pressure of the U.S. Attorney's Office's arbitrary plea bargain deadline of seven days. Within this deadline every lawyer and client must make a potentially irrevocable decision to plead guilty and go to jail and lose any immigration rights or fight the criminal charges and face up to two or more years in prison for allegedly engaging in "identify theft" in order to work.

Michigan auto jobs continue to disappear; loss may be slowing

LANSING, May 25, 2008 (AP): Michigan still is seeing auto industry jobs disappear faster than gasoline in an oversized sport utility vehicle, and the slide is expected to continue into 2009.

But Comerica Bank economist Dana Johnson sees stronger days ahead for the domestic automakers starting in 2010, even with overall motor vehicle sales declining this year as the national economy sags and gas prices soar. "I don't think we're through with the restructuring of the domestic auto industry, but I think a year from now we will be," Johnson recently told state government economists. "I look forward to the very strong possibility that Michigan's economy will start moving forward again."

Despite that forecast, signs of trouble keep popping up. On Thursday, Ford Motor Co. said it no longer expects to return to profitability by 2009 and will cut production of trucks and sport utility vehicles through the rest of this year because high gasoline prices are hurting sales.

Johnson says the downsizing means the state is becoming less dependent on the auto industry, a move Gov.

Jennifer Granholm and economic development experts support as they try to attract more businesses tied to alternative energy, homeland security and biotechnology.

Auto assembly and parts manufacturing accounted for nearly 7 percent of total Michigan payroll jobs in 2000, but is closer to 4 percent now. About a third of the state's employment was concentrated in the motor vehicle sector eight years ago, but that dropped to 26.5 percent last year, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

And while motor vehicle and parts manufacturing in 2000 accounted for \$35.8 billion of the state's gross domestic product in current dollars—about 10.6 percent—it had dropped to around 6.8 percent or \$25.4 billion in 2005, the most recent year available from the Bureau of Economic Analysis.

But Michigan still remains more dependent on the auto industry than any other state. About 4.5 percent of Michigan's employment was related to motor vehicle production last year, nearly 2 percentage points ahead of second-place Indiana, which had 2.7 percent of its work force in that sector.

"We've lost a ton of jobs. ... But the auto industry is still a big part of our economy," said senior economist Jay Wortley of the nonpartisan Senate

Fiscal Agency.

At this point, Michigan may simply have to wait for auto employment to bottom out before the downward pull of lost auto jobs can be overcome by growth in other sectors. The last time Michigan added more auto and auto parts manufacturing jobs than it lost was in 2000, when it saw a gain of 4,000. It has lost 159,000 automotive jobs in the seven and a half years since then, Johnson said.

Those losses are the major reason Michigan has yet to climb out of the economic doldrums. Of the 72,000 payroll jobs lost since last April, more than half were related to the motor vehicle industry, according to the state Department of Labor & Economic Growth. If the employment drop continues through 2009, as expected, it will mean nine consecutive years of decline, the longest downward stretch on record.

University of Michigan economists Joan Cray and George Fulton say the lost jobs mean the state unemployment rate, which was 6.9 percent in April, will average 7.4 percent this year and 7.9 percent in 2009, likely keeping it the nation's highest. The Senate Fiscal Agency is even more pessimistic, predicting unemployment will hit 8.4 percent next year.

But Cray and Fulton also expect Michigan will

begin seeing a net increase in jobs in 2010.

"It's not as bad as it was," Cray said. "The decline is shrinking."

One bright spot is that the state has added about 1.8 million jobs since 2000 that require an above-average education, while losing about 2.4 million that require a below-average education, according to the University of Michigan.

But it also has lost about half its lucrative auto sector jobs that paid an average \$72,505 in 2006. Some of the loss has been made up with education and health services jobs, but those paid an average of only \$38,543.

Cray said the state faces a tough challenge as it tries to find ways to make up for the lost factory positions that provided a middle-class life for hundreds of thousands of Michigan residents.

"Those jobs are gone, gone" Cray said. "It's hard to imagine what you're going to bring in to replace that."

Valentine Theatre to unveil Toledo's largest mural

The Valentine Theatre in downtown Toledo has announced the unveiling ceremonies and activities for its historically significant mural which will take place during a three day celebration on June 3, 4, and 5, 2008.

The painting (68.5' x 10'), by artist Paul Geiger, features 46 performers from the Valentine's early days. *The Barrymores, Houdini, Fanny Brice, Will Rogers, W.C. Fields, Sarah Bernhardt, Douglas Fairbanks, W.C. Fields, and Bill "Bojangles" Robinson,* are just a few of the performers depicted in the painting.

Nine years ago, a group of Valentine Board Members and staff wanted to pay homage to the thousands of performers who appeared on the Valentine stage during its early years (1895-1920). Madonna to show film at Moore's festival

TRAVERSE CITY, Michigan, May 23, 2008 (AP): Madonna's new film on the impoverished nation of Malawi has wowed another maker of documentaries: Michael Moore. Moore announced Thursday that Madonna, like himself a Michigan native, will appear for a screening of "I Am Because We Are" during the Traverse City Film Festival on Aug. 2, 2008.

"She's sort of entered my realm," Moore said. "When I saw it, I thought, 'Wow, it's like she's been making these films for years.'"

Madonna produced and narrated the documentary after traveling to Malawi, where she met the toddler David Banda. She and husband Guy Ritchie are adopting the child.

"I Am Because We Are" illustrates the poverty that children of the southern African country face, how the AIDS crisis is claiming lives, and the conditions that cause disease and other misery there. But the film urges people to volunteer and tries to offset hope.

"She takes the viewer

through a very personal journey and tries to connect us, living here in the U.S., giving us a window into the way it is for other people in the world," Moore said. "You're extremely moved when you watch it. You understand very clearly why she's devoted so much of her life to the people of Malawi."

Moore said he was "outraged" by the criticism Madonna received for her efforts to adopt David. Some children's rights groups said it would be better to provide more resources so children could remain in their native countries. Others accused her of using her celebrity status to circumvent Malawian adoption laws, which she denied.

"As one who has seen what the yellow press can and does do, all of that was just one more reminder to me of just how dishonest so much of the media is in this country," Moore said.

An e-mail message seeking comment was sent to a publicist for Madonna.

Moore, who won the Academy Award in 2002 for "Bowling for Columbine," said he saw an early version of Madonna's film in London while shooting scenes



for his latest documentary, "Sicko."

After watching the finished product about a month ago, he asked Madonna for permission to screen it during the festival in Traverse City, his adopted hometown about 250 miles (402 kilometers) northwest of Detroit. Moore established the festival in 2005 with local author Doug Stanton and photographer John Robert Williams.

"She said she'd be thrilled to come here and be part of the film festival," Moore said. "We were pleasantly surprised."

Madonna, born in Bay City and raised to the south near Detroit, recently released a new album, "Hard Candy," and is preparing for a worldwide tour that begins in August. She'll take a one-day break from rehearsals to visit Traverse City.

The film will be shown in a downtown theater that seats 540. After the film is shown, Madonna will take questions from the audience, Moore said.

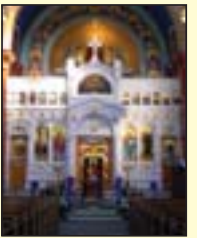

McCain goza de buena salud, según revisión

FOUNTAIN HILLS, Arizona, el 23 de mayo del 2008 (AP): John McCain, que sobrevivió tres episodios de melanoma, parece estar libre de cáncer, tiene un corazón vigoroso y está en buen estado de salud, según antecedentes médicos de ocho años revisados por la Associated Press.

Los detalles sobre la salud del candidato presidencial republicano aparecen en 1.173 páginas de documentos médicos entre el 2000 y el 2008 a los que su campaña dio acceso a la AP para demostrar que está saludable como para ser presidente y para contrarrestar la noción que es demasiado viejo para eso. El senador de Arizona cumple 72 años en agosto y sería el presidente electo de mayor edad.

McCain sigue en riesgo de contraer otras variantes de cáncer de la piel y se somete a un

exhaustivo examen con un dermatólogo de la Clínica Mayo periódicamente.

"No veo ninguna lesión preocupante", dijo la Dra. Suzanne Connolly después del más reciente examen, el 12 de mayo.

El candidato toma medicamentos para controlar el colesterol.

El internista John Eckstein, de la Clínica Mayo, su médico personal desde hace tiempo, elogió los resultados de McCain en una prueba de resistencia cardíaca.

"Creo que fisiológicamente es considerablemente más joven que su edad cronológica sobre la base de su competencia cardiovascular", dijo Eckstein en una entrevista el jueves. "Recibí un llamado del cardiólogo que dijo que desde hacía mucho tiempo no veía a nadie de esa edad ejercitándose tanto tiempo".

Los más recientes exámenes de McCain revelan una serie de



situaciones comunes en los envejecientes: con frecuencia le han removido lesiones cutáneas precancerosas, y en febrero le removieron un incipiente carcinoma, un cáncer de la piel fácilmente tratable. También en marzo le removieron algunos pólipos benignos en el colon durante una colonoscopia rutinaria.

El veterano de Vietnam tiene artritis degenerativa por las heridas de guerra que podría requerir en el futuro un reemplazo de articulaciones. Su presión sanguínea y su peso son saludables.

Soderbergh challenges Cannes with epic Che tale

CANNES, France, May 22, 2008 (AP): Unless it is one of his "Ocean's Eleven" casino romps, Steven Soderbergh never makes things easy for an audience.

With his epic film biography of Latin American revolutionary Che Guevara, which premiered at the Cannes Film Festival, Soderbergh defiantly has wanted the story he wanted to see, one that will prove a very tough sell to some audiences.

The two-part saga runs four hours, 30 minutes. It is almost entirely in Spanish, a particular challenge for U.S. viewers who dislike subtitles. It dispenses with many clichés of the biopic, offering virtually no insight into the origin of Che's brand of humanism, instead presenting impressionistic glimpses of Che's idealism in action during the Cuban revolution and his attempt to foment a similar transformation in Bolivia.

Soderbergh was prepared for reporters' skepticism on all fronts at a Cannes news conference Thursday.

On shooting in Spanish: "You can't make a film with any level of credibility in this case unless it's in Spanish," Soderbergh said. "I hope we're reaching a time where you go make a movie in another culture, that you shoot in the language of that culture. I'm hoping the days of that sort of specific brand of cultural imperialism have ended."

On the length: "Just the further you get into it, it felt like if you're going to have context, then it's just going to have to be a certain size," Soderbergh said.

On the unconventional structure:

"I find it hilarious that most of the stuff being writ-

ten about movies is how conventional they are, and then you have people ... upset that something's not conventional," Soderbergh said. "The bottom line is we're just trying to give you a sense of what it was like to hang out around this person. That's really it. And the scenes were chosen strictly on the basis of, 'Yeah, what does that tell us about his character?'"

Starring Benicio Del Toro, the Oscar-winning co-star of Soderbergh's "Traffic," as Guevara, the two films were shot as "The Argentine" and "Guerrilla." The cast includes Franka Potente, Catalina Sandino Moreno and Demian Bichir as Fidel Castro. Soderbergh buddy Matt Damon, part of the star-studded "Ocean's Eleven" ensemble, makes a brief appearance.

"The Argentine" juxtaposes Guevara and Castro's late 1950s triumph in Cuba with flashbacks to their early planning days in Mexico and Che's visit to New York City in the mid-1960s, when he was greeted with condemnation and death threats over the Castro regime's iron-fisted rule.

"Guerrilla" follows the downfall of Guevara as his grass-roots campaign in Bolivia degenerates into a handful of scraggly, starving rebels on the run from vastly superior government forces in the jungle.

Che was executed in Bolivia in 1967. Much of the world now has only a superficial grasp of Che as a symbol of revolution from T-shirts and posters depicting his boldly smiling face.

While it may be hard to persuade audiences to see it a first time, the story requires repeated viewings to really appreciate it, said Del Toro, also a producer on the project.

"It reminds me of the painter who did a portrait of

this lady, and when he gave it to the lady, the lady said, 'That portrait doesn't look anything like me.' And the painter said, 'Oh, it will,'" Del Toro said. "I really think that eventually, those people, when they see the movie for the third time, they'll start seeing things, they'll start seeing dimensions and angles, maybe a look or a smile or the use of this or a character here and there ... I know them very well, but I'm still finding stuff."

The films were presented as one entry at Cannes under the name "Che." They played without credits, the way Soderbergh would prefer to see it initially released to general audiences.

"Here's what I would like to do is, every time it opens in a town, let's say, that for a week, you can see it as one movie for the first week, and then you split it off into two films," Soderbergh said. "That's what I would like to do is have a sort of roadshow engagement, no credits ... a printed program that comes with the movie. To me, that would be an event."

How the films actually will play in the U.S. and other countries will depend on deals Soderbergh strikes as he shops it around to distributors at Cannes.

"Che" is competing for the top prize at Cannes, the Palme d'Or, which Soderbergh won with his feature debut, "sex, lies and videotape," in 1989.

While Soderbergh talked seriously and passionately about his desire to make the films, he also had a ready wisecrack for his motivation:

"It's all a very elaborate way for us to sell our own T-shirts," Soderbergh said.

Indiana Jones and the computer-generated jungle

May 22, 2008 (AP): In these hallowed halls, Indiana Jones almost seems out of place.

A banner with a two-dimensional cutout of the swashbuckling archaeologist swings through the lobby of Industrial Light and Magic, where life-size replicas of Darth Vader and Bobba Fett from "Star Wars" stand guard.

The home of George Lucas' visual effects company is a high-tech temple to everything from the dinosaurs in "Jurassic Park" to the talking robots in "Transformers." But Indy cannot take credit for the digital wizardry for which ILM has become famous over the last couple of decades.

Not yet, anyway. That is because he has not been around for 19 years, a time in which special effects has mostly migrated from sound stage to server.

The first three Indy films were gritty, sweaty and tactile affairs, largely because everything on-screen physically existed somewhere. Not so with "Indiana Jones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull"—though that was almost the case.

When first approaching the latest "Indy," director Steven Spielberg considered dusting off his old-school approach.

"He thought maybe we should just go back to the

way we did things before, like matte paintings on glass and things like that," visual effects supervisor Pablo Helman said. "We entertained that idea for a little bit, but we realized we could serve the story better by using our digital tools."

That decision ultimately led to a filmmaking innovation that brings the random reactions of a virtual world to the big screen, giving more control to ILM's computers than ever before.

To the children romping outside at ILM's in-house daycare located just past the lobby, the notion of a digital "environment" being responsible for much of what is on-screen will probably seem quaint someday.

But to the adult audiences who have glimpsed the latest Indy escapade, it is a big part of the reason this one looks so different from Jones' last crusade.

Helman, who previously worked with Spielberg on "Munich" and "War of the Worlds," was tasked with creating realistic-yet-fantastic environments and creatures for "Crystal Skull," which finds Jones traipsing from New England to New Mexico, Peru and the Amazon. Working on the "Indy" franchise for the first time was a daunting task for the low-key effects guru.

"It's horrifying to work on a movie that has this many

fans, but at the same time, it's an opportunity and a challenge," Helman told The Associated Press at the ILM offices less than a week before its release. "I think we were all very, very respectful of the other three movies but also to the fans. All the effects work that we're doing are completely reality-based."

That is if your reality includes a blooming atomic mushroom cloud, seemingly endless Area 51 warehouse, vicious monkey army, the City of Gold, thousands of man-eating ants and sundry otherworldly things.

All those locales and critters were created by Helman and his ILM team for "Crystal Skull," making up the film's 450 effects shots—not quite as many as the 600-plus in "Transformers," but more than you might expect from a flesh-and-blood character from the 1950s.

About 300 artists and editors worked for eight months in post-production on a high-tech computer network at ILM's offices inside the Presidio of San Francisco, a long way from the "Raiders of the Lost Ark" and "Temple of Doom" days, when "Indiana Jones" special effects mostly consisted of miniature sets and a few blue-screen mash-ups.

"The only reason why they weren't using computer-generated effects back then

is because they weren't invented yet, but they were using the most up-to-date technology at the time," said Helman, who finished his work on "Crystal Skull" in mid-April. "So it only follows that we would do the same thing now."

In the film's biggest action sequence, Jones and company battle Russian soldiers and play hot potato with the "Crystal Skull," all while careening through a fertile Amazonian jungle riding atop military vehicles. When not dodging trees and palm fronds, the jeeps plow through enough vegetation to give an arborist heart palpitations.

"The script calls for a virgin jungle, but there's not one we could safely run four vehicles through," said Helman. "We could've approached it in a more modern way on a big stage with a blue screen, but that's not the way we did it. We basically shot it the same way we would've shot it 20 years ago."

Spielberg filmed the pursuit scene on dirt roads in a more sparse jungle in Hawaii. Helman traveled to Argentina, where he was born, and Brazil to capture images that would be used to craft the jungle landscape, including a looming cliff where part of the chase takes place.

At the ILM offices, Helman and his team meshed

the Hawaiian footage with the Brazilian and Argentine imagery, adding huge swathes of flora using a new digital-effects technique. The result is a fictitious jungle, one with its own look, layout and laws of physics, that only exists inside the computers at ILM.

"The whole film for us has been really big on particle simulation, which is creating an environment inside of a computer and telling the computer the rules of the world," said Helman, who also worked on two of the "Star Wars" films. "You give the computer this gravity, this mass, this amount of wind and see what happens."

That means instead of crafting movement for every vine and leaf that Indy & Co. hammer through, visual effects artists were able to drag and drop virtual vegetation programmed to react to the vehicles' presence and actors' movements. It is an application that has long become de rigueur for video games, and come full circle to the big screen.

Even though they were going for something organic, Helman said the filmmakers




took some liberties with the laws of physics—more gravity, more mass, more wind—to "make it more cinematic." The result is a highly detailed chase scene that is far different from Indy's landmark escape from a giant rolling ball of a boulder in "Raiders of the Lost Ark." And it is just one of the many effects Helman and his crew created for the film.

However, there is one thing that he insists did not receive a computer-generated makeover this time around: Indy's signature accessories.




"We did not generate whips or hats," he said, cracking a smile. "Let me tell you that."

Chávez: Ojalá se establezcan precios del petróleo

BRASILIA, el 23 de mayo del 2008 (AP): El presidente de Venezuela Hugo Chávez expresó el viernes su deseo de que se establezcan los precios internacionales del petróleo, que han superado niveles récord de 135 dólares el barril.

“El precio ha llegado a un nivel en el que nosotros nunca planificamos que llegara. Ahora no es culpa nuestra. Tampoco debe volver nunca a caer” a los niveles de hace 10 años por debajo de los 20 dólares, dijo Chávez en un acto en el suroeste de Brasilia, donde temprano participó en la cumbre de la Unión Suramericana de Naciones (Unasur).

“Ojalá el precio se estabilizara. Ya (a) estas alturas el precio pudiera estabilizarse a 100 dólares”, aseguró el presidente venezolano, cuyo país es miembro de la Organización de Países Exportadores de Petróleo (OPEP) y uno de los principales proveedores de crudo al mercado estadounidense.

Chávez expresó además que naciones como Brasil, que en los últimos meses han realizado nuevos hallazgos de reservas hidrocarburíferas, se unan a la OPEP.

Dijo que el gobierno venezolano está ayudando a países de Centroamérica y el Caribe a cubrir costos energéticos al enviar a esas dos regiones 300.000 barriles diarios de crudo, pagados a largo plazo a Caracas.

El valor del barril de crudo rompió el jueves la barrera de los 135 dólares.

La cesta petrolera venezolana tiene un precio ligeramente menor, pero representa grandes ingresos extraordinarios para Caracas, que obtiene más de 80% de sus divisas de las exportaciones petroleras.

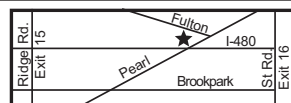
