Vulnerable feel the pinch of Minn. gov't shutdown By MARTIGA LOHN and AMY FORLITI, Associated Press

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 2, 2011 (AP): Minnesota lawmak-ers headed home for a long holiday weekend, bracing for likely public anger as some of them meet constituents for the first time since a failure to reach a budget agreement forced a gov-ernment shutdown.

The reception they get start-ing Saturday, and during 4th of July parades around the state, could go a long way toward determining how long the shut-down lasts. Democratic Gov. Mark Dayton and GOP leaders had no plans for new talks be-fore Tuesday, five full days after the shutdown started.

Minnesota's second shut-Minnesota s second snut-down in six years was striking much deeper than a partial 2005 shutdown. It took state parks and rest stops off line, closed horse tracks and made it impos-cible to are if fiching licence. But sible to get a fishing license. But it also was hitting the state' most vulnerable, ending reading services for the blind, si-lencing a help line for the elderly and stopping child care sub-sidies for the poor.

The shutdown was rippling into the lives of people like Sonya Mills, a 39-year-old mother of eight facing the loss of about \$3,600 a month in state child care subsidies. Until the government closure, Mills had been focused on recovering from a May 22 tornado that displaced her from a rented home in Minneapolis. Now she's adding a new problem to her list.

"It just starts to have a snow-ball effect. It's like you are still in the wind of the tornado," said Mills, who works at a temp agency and was allowed to take time off as she gets back on her feet-but after the shutdown also has to care for her six youngest children, ages 3 through 14, be-cause she lost state funding for theirdaycare and other programs. Minnesota is the only state

to have its government shut down this year, even though nearly all states have severe budget problems and some have divided governments. Dayton was determined to raise taxes on the top earners to help erase a \$5 billion deficit, while the Re-publican Legislature refused to go along with that—or any new spending above the amount the state is projected to collect. Here, as in 21 other states,

there's no way to keep government operating past the end of a budget period without legislative action. Even so, only four other states-Michigan, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Tennessee—have had shutdowns in the past decade, some lasting

mere hours The shutdown halted nonemergency road construction and closed the state zoo and Capitol. More than 40 state boards and agencies went dark, though critical functions such as state troopers, prison guards, the courts and disaster esponses will continue. On Friday, former state Su-

preme Court Chief Justice Kathleen Blatz started the court-appointed job of sifting through appeals from groups arguing in favor of continued overnment funding for particular programs.

Nonprofit groups helping the state's poor have already been hit hard. Some closed their doors immediately, while others continued services, at least for now. Some were looking at layoffs, said Sarah Caruso, president and CEO of Greater Twin Cities United Way, which funds 400 programs serving poor people. She said the impact will depend on how long the shutdown lasts.

"If we go well beyond that two-week window, I think then we will start seeing much more significant closure of programs to support the vul-nerable, and the long-term financial viability of some of these agencies will really be

called into question," she said. So far, 30 agencies had accepted United Way's offer of advances on their grants, seeking cash to stay up and run-

The stoppage suspended some programs for the blind and visually impaired, in-cluding a radio reading service run by volunteers and training for blind people who are learning to walk with a cane. Bonnie Elsey, director of the state's Workforce De-velopment Division, said a vocational rehabilitation program that places people with disabilities in jobs or school as halted.

Minnesota food pantries scurried to make sure they would still get 700,000 pounds of food—about 30 percent of their total volume—in the next two months through a federal program. Nearly a million pounds al-ready in warehouses were also put on hold by the shutdown. Colleen Moriarty, executive director of Hunger Solutions Minnesota, said the federal program's operation de-pended on a single state employee working in a data management system. Later Friday.

Moriarty said the employee had been called back to work.

The shutdown also idled a state hotline set up to help seniors and their caregivers find services, housing options, help with Medicaid and Medicare insurance and more. A call to the 800 number Friday got a recording saying callers could leave a message. The political stalemate

meant instant layoffs for 22,000 state workers, including Paul Bissen, a road and bridge inspector for more than 26 years. Bissen said he cut back on spending last month. He figured he could go a couple of months without worrying, but on the first day of the shut-down, he said it looked like his washing machine had died-adding another expense.

"I want to work. I've got road construction projects to build, to try to make them safe and make them smooth so people can get back to forth to their work," Bissen said.

Fearful of voter anger, both parties blasted each other for Minnesota's second shut-down in six years.

GOP Chairman Tony Sutton called Dayton a "piece of work" and accused him of inflicting "maximum pain" for political reasons.

Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party Chairman Ken Martin laid the blame on Republicans, saying they drove the state to a shutdown to protect millionaires from tax increases sought by Dayton.

The Alliance for a Better Minnesota, a left-leaning group supportive of Dayton, plans to run weekend radio ads in three popular vacation areas blaming Republicans for the impact of the shutdown,

slow-motion disaster, with a new Democratic governor and new Republican legislative majorities at odds for months by cuts to state spending. Even after the shutdown

looked like a certainty, Day-ton and Republicans did not soften their conflicting prin-ciples. Dayton said he campaigned and was elected on a promise not to make spending cuts to a level he called "dra conian

Lawmakers seek new immigration museum BRETT ZONGKER, Associated Press

WASHINGTON, DC, July 7, 2011 (AP): Several nembers of Congress called Thursday for a presidential commission to study the formation of a "melting pot museum" in Washington to tell the history of immigration and migration that formed the nation.

Democratic Virginia Rep. Jim Moran introduced legislation Thursday that calls for studying the creation of a National Museum of the American People without any federal taxpayer funds. The bill had 11 other co-sponsors.

"The people of the United States do not have a comprehensive and accurate picture of all the peoples who created and continue to build the nation," the bill

Moran has been a critic of the trend toward buildng individual ethnic museums on the National Mall. Another presidential comnission this year called for a Latino history museum to be added to the Smithsonian Institution.

"There's almost an infi-

nite number of museums vou could have to represent a near infinite number of peoples that have come together to form one nation," he said.

Still, calling for an immigration museum wasn't intended to impede any others, Moran said.

A New York-based coalition pushing the idea said more than 140 ethnic and minority groups support the museum's creation. They include people of Chinese, Arab, German, Jewish, and Irish descent, among others. Sam Eskenazi, the group's

director, said he envisions a museum that weaves together a story beginning with the first humans in the Western Hemisphere and continuing through the development of the United States. It could include a genealogy center for visitors to trace their heritage

"This is a dramatic story, the making of the American people," he said.

American University history professor Alan Kraut, who has written on immigration and chairs an advisory committee for the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, is among more than 50 scholars supporting the idea.

"It's a dream to have some discussion of the American people in a city that is filled with monuments mostly to great white men." Kraut said

The museum concept wouldn't necessarily replace any other museum proposed for the National Mall, Kraut said. The Smithsonian is developing an African-American history museum that is scheduled to open in 2015. Other groups have proposed museums devoted to the history of women, gays and other groups.

Any well-done museum can draw a broad audience of those interested in history, he said, but cautioned against any museum that simply celebrates different groups

Jeep Parkway Master Plan Unveiled

By Kevin Milliken, Special to La Prensa Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority leaders joined local and state development officials Thursday afternoon to announce a master plan to guide the future of the former Jeep plant that was demol-

ished in recent years. The port authority obtained the 110-acre site sev-eral months ago, then applied for and received two Clean Ohio Revitalization Fund grants totaling \$4.5 million to remediate the property, which sets the stage for turning the brownfield into a developable real estate parcel again. The port authority also has reeived a \$1.3 million federal HUD grant to cover some of the expenses associated with the purchase and remediation of the site.

Paul Toth, port authority president/CEO told the gathering that federal officials are interested in the plan as a "sig-nature project" for auto communities, of which Toledo is onsidered, to help them "redevelop and redefine" them-selves. The Obama administration has set aside stimulus grants to assist those auto communities, which could mean Toledo will be in line for further federal grants in the future to help build some of the seven warehouse/manufacturing buildings planned for the Jeep Parkway site. The federal departments of energy, transportation, and Economic Development Administration have sent officials to the site to speak with local leaders.

We believe this property will ultimately fill a much-neededhole in our community," Toth said. "This is really the signature piece of property we have here in Northwest Ohio for industrial development."

Economic development leaders tout the property's central location and proximity to I-75/I-475 and two major rail lines. Their efforts will be primarily focused on attracting manufacturing opera-tions to the site, but the master plan also leaves the possibility of warehousing and logistics facilities. Construction on the first building could start

"It is actually a true ex-ample of how we're starting to come together and work together toward the same pro-cess," said Mayor Mike Bell, who also told the crowd local leaders are beginning to see success because they've learned how to "take the politics out of things." The mayor also called the

Jeep Parkway property a "shovel-ready site" and ex-plained his view of "how critical this piece of property is to the turnaround of Toledo."

Toth echoed the mayor's sentiment, touting the prop-erty as "worth taking the risk."

Matt Sapara, port author-ity real estate manager, re-counted the historical significance of the former Jeep prop-erty, telling the crowd of 50 local officials that, at one time,

the property was • Responsible for 40 per-cent of all the income earned by city of Toledo residents;
The second-largest auto-

motive manufacturing facil-

ity in the world; and • The longest-serving automotive manufacturing fa-

cility in the U.S. All of that manufacturing activity left plenty of hazard-ous materials on site, some of it buried underground. An environmental hazard survey revealed the damage was not as extensive as first feared. The Bell administration provided a \$340,000 revolving loan to clean up the most serious chemical contamination on site. It was also discovered that some of the plant's former buildings had foundations five feet thick. That concrete will be crushed and reused on site during the redevelopment process

The Overland Park development, as it is likely to become known, already has its first tenant. State Paper and Metal, a Central Ave.-based recycling company, has agreed to purchase 10-15 acres at the southwest corner of the site for an expansion project expected to create 22 jobs.

The master plan was cre-ated by the Toledo Regional Architects, Contractors, and Engineers, an industry cluster of 24 local firms formed two years ago and designed to foster partnership and collaboration among companies that were once competitors. TRACE donated its services for the redevelopment plan.

TRACE representative Don Warner called the master redevelopment plan "a true re-gional design and construction community effort." Five large and two smaller

buildings in the plan would create nearly one million square feet of manufacturing space. The roof of each building would include solar panels to help power the operations within them. Each building faces east-west, with loading unloading facilities that could accommodate trucks and rail lines that run alongside. Port authority officials stated those rail lines will be connected to the Airline Junction intermodal yard in South To-ledo that is currently being

Immigrant tuition begins in another state

HARTFORD, Connecticut, July 7, 2011 (AP): For the first time, undocumented immigrant María Praeli can consider going to college full-time.

The 18-year-old high school student can qualify for in-state tuition at Connecticut's public universities under a new law: Connecticut is now among 12 states, including New York and Illinois, that grant in-state tuition to undocumented immigrants who are

Thousands rally against Georgia immigration law By ERRIN HAINES, Associated Press

2011 (AP): Thousands of marchers gathered outside the Georgia Capitol on Saturday to protest the state's new immigration law, which they say creates an unwelcome environment for people of color and those in search of a better life.

Men, women, and children of all ages converged on downtown Atlanta for the march and rally, cheering speakers while shading themselves with umbrellas and posters. Capitol police and organizers estimated the crowd at between 8,000 and 14,000. They filled the blocks around the Capitol, holding signs decrying anti-illegal immigration House Bill 87 and reading "Immigration Reform Now!"

Friends Jessica Bamaca and Melany Cordero held a poster that read: "How would you feel if your family got broken apart?'

Bamaca was born in the U.S., but her mother and sister are from Guatemala. She said she fears they will be deported.

"I would be here by myself," said Bamaca, 13. "I have a feeling (the governor) doesn't know the pain affecting families. If he were to be in our position, how would he react?"

Adelina Nicholls, executive director of the Georgia Latino Alliance for Human Rights, said the crowd was sending a message

"They are ready to fight," Nicholls said. "We need immigration reform, and no HB87 is going to stop us. We have earned the right to be here.'

Azadeh Shahshahani of the American Civil Liberties Union of Georgia called the rally inspiring and said she hoped lawmakers would recognize the bill's potential to damage the state.

"I think it's going to have an impact," she said. "Unfortunately, the damage has already been done as far as people of color having second thoughts about moving to Georgia."

Several different groups stood with the largely Latino crowd, including representatives from the civil rights movement. The Rev. Timothy McDonald, an activist who has been supportive of immigration protesters, was among the speakers showing his solidarity.

"You are my brothers and my sisters,' McDonald told the crowd. "Some years ago, they told

ATLANTA, July 2, people like me we couldn't vote. We did what you are doing today. We are going to send a message to the powers that be ... that when the people get united, there is no government that can stop them. Don't let them turn you around.'

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MiLi Lai, a Chinese student at Emory University, also attended the rally because the immigration law doesn't just apply to Latinos, but "all non-American people.'

"We are the same community," Lai said. "We have to fight for our rights.

Bellanira Avoytes came to the rally with her husband and three children. Although she is a legal resident and her children were born in Georgia, she does not see herself as separate from undocumented Latinos.

"I have family who are not residents," she said. "I am together with the Latin people. I love Georgia. I have stayed here for 18 years. I want to buy a house here."

Saturday's rally follows a "day without immigrants" organized Friday, when some parts of the law took effect. It was organized by the Georgia Latino Alliance for Human Rights. The organization asked businesses to close and community members not to work or shop to protest the law.

On Monday, a judge temporarily blocked key parts of the law until a legal challenge is resolved. One provision that was blocked authorizes police to check the immigration status of suspects without proper identification. Other blocked sections authorize authorities to detain undocumented immigrants and penalizes people who knowingly and willingly transport or harbor undocumented immigrants while committing another crime.

Parts of similar measures in Arizona, Utah, and Indiana also have been blocked by the courts

Provisions that took effect Friday include one that makes it a felony to use false information or documentation when applying for a job. Another provision creates an immigration review board to investigate complaints about government officials not complying with state laws related to undocumented immigration.

Ring-tailed lemurs Fanta and Fresca are fantastic

July 15, 2011: The Toledo Zoo welcomes Fanta and Fresca, two female ringtailed lemurs (Lemur catta), from the Duke Lemur Center in North Carolina. Fanta and Fresca are four-year-old sisters.

Lemurs are members of the primate family, related to monkeys and apes. Their bodies are about 18 inches long-about the size of large domestic cats - with distinctive ringed tails that are another 24 inches long. Known for their piercing stare, that wide-eyed appearance has a biological basis; limited movement within their eye sockets forces them to turn their heads to better see objects.

These social, intelligent animals like to sunbathe and huddle together in "lemur balls" to stay warm or main-

bonds. They are also agile athletes and spend their time on the ground or in trees, easily moving from one to the other. In their na-

Je'von Terance Fashion Show comes to Lorain Arts Council

Glamour and fashion will arrive in downtown Lorain this summer.

Two Lorainites have partnered with the Lorain Arts Council to bring the city fairly new experience – a fash-ion show, July 29, 2011.

The fashion line is Je'von Terance and its creator Aaron Simmons, 25, of Lorain, said he's excited to bring back his line to Lorain for the second consecutive summer.

Roughly 15 to 20 models are expected to walk the run-way showcasing exclusively his line of work behind the Lorain Arts Council, 737 Broadway Avenue. The fashion show titled

"From Broadway to the Run-way," will feature a summer and Fall collection that will include ensembles for everyday wear and high fashion. In fact, Simmons said he has

organized the fashion show this year to begin with a more play-ful, summer, daytime and ev-eryday wear theme, and finish with a more elegant, nighttime and even Autumn theme.

"This year will be more structured with one set collection, a tropical flight," Simmons said "The pieces will go from daytime beach party to flow into nighttime yacht party. You'll see the transition," he said

Expect a more elegant feel this year as he adds more satin and sequin fabric to his cre-

"The show is more upscale this year," Simmons said 'You'll see more elegant fabric. I have my own fabric. I will bring in fabric from New York. I have a good eye for fabric," he said.

Arredondo, of Lorain, has also helped to organize his fashion show that will include his new collection. Simmons has showcased his work in Cleveland and Elyria but wanted to bring his line to his hometown, she said. Arredondo said by hosting it this year at the art gallery, the fashion show will have a more elegant feel

- the mood they wanted. "We want to bring some-thing new to Lorain," Arredondo said "These types

of events are not common in Lorain. They are more normal in Cleveland. It's important to help your community. We want to get that support from our community and work with models from Lorain County. This is a great way to do something new in Lorain," she said.

Inspired by Dolce and Gabbana, Betsey Johnson's fun, playful style, and John Galliano's "pushing the limit" style at fashion shows, and the H&M store, Simmons is constantly trying to reinvent him-self. He said he's always challenging himself to do something new for every fashion show. 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SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, July 7, 2011 (AP): Ricardo Alegria, a Puerto Rican scholar known for his pioneering studies of the island's native Taino culture and who is credited with preserving the capital's colonial district, died Thursday. He was 90.

Alegria died at the Cardiovascular Center of Puerto Rico and the Caribbean from complications of heart disease, said his son, Ricardo Alegria Pons. The elder Alegria had been treated for two weeks at the hospital in June and then was hospitalized again Sunday with chest pains, his son said.

"Thanks to his long life of 90 years, he has had a major impact on all aspects of the culture of all Puerto

Ricans " his son told reporters, "That work and dedication and love of his country does not disappear with his death.'

Goy. Luis Fortuno declared five days of mourning in the U.S. territory, ordering U.S. and Puerto Rican flags to be lowered to half-staff in honor of one of the island's leading cultural figures.

Alegria in 1955 helped found and later served as executive director of the Institute of Puerto Rican Culture, where he was long a passionate advocate of preserving the island's artistic and archaeological heritage. He went on to launch the Graduate Center for Advanced Studies on Puerto Rico and the Caribbean in 1976 and received the United Nations Educational, Scienand Cultural tific

Organization's Picasso Medal in 1993.

Born April 14, 1921, Alegria studied at the University of Puerto Rico before earning a master's degree in anthropology and history at the University of Chicago and a doctorate in anthropology at Harvard University, according to a biography from the Institute of Puerto Rican Culture.

He returned to Puerto Rico and focused on the island's indigenous cultures. He also fought to preserve historic buildings and walls of the capital's historic Old San Juan, where he was born and lived for most of his life, and of other parts of Puerto Rico.

In addition to his son, Alegria is survived by his wife, Mela Pons

Asesinan en Guatemala cantautor argentino

Facundo Cabral

GUATEMALA,9dejulio del 2011 (AP): El cantautor argentino Facundo Cabral murió el sábado tras ser blanco de un atentado a tiros cuando se trasladaba hacia el aeropuerto para abandonar Guatemala, en donde había ofrecido varios conciertos la última semana.

El vicepresidente Rafael Espada declaró a la radio Emisoras Unidas "estamos bien preocupados, es una situación muv seria" refiriéndose al asesinato del artista.

"Las instituciones de inteligencia y seguridad ya están trabajando" en busca de esclarecer el atentado, dijo Espada.

El vocero de la policía. Donald González, declaró que se encontró uno vehículo abandonado en una salida de la carretera a El Salvador que aparentemente participó en el ataque porque mostraba varios disparos en su carrocería v dentro había casquillos de municiones de fusil.

Indicó que fueron designados tres equipos de investigadores, que se están registrando vehículos en retenes en toda la ciudad v viendo las grabaciones de varias cámaras colocadas cerca del lugar en donde ocurrió el atentado.

El noticiero Notisiete mostró imágenes del cuerpo de Cabral en el vehículo en que se transportaba, una camioneta agrícola blanca que intentó resguardarse de los atacantes dentro de una estación de bomberos. El vehículo con el cantante iba además resguardado por otro en el que viajaban guardaespaldas. El músico estaba en el asiento del copiloto, vestía pantalones vaqueros, una chaqueta de piel y una pequeña maleta en sus manos.

El vocero de los bomberos municipales. José Rodríguez, declaró que el músico argentino recibió al menos ocho disparos en el cuerpo

También el empresario Henry Fariña, quien contrató al artista, resultó herido y fue trasladado a un hospital en estado delicado, dijo Rodríguez.

El ataque se produjo en un sector conocido como El Trébol.

El asesinato desató una ola de indignación en el país y a nivel internacional. La premio Nobel de la Paz 1992 candidata presidencial Rigoberta Menchú, quien dijo haber tenido una amistad con el trovador, acudió a la escena del crimen.

Entre llanto, Menchú expresó que "para mi Facundo Cabral es un maestro... amó mucho a Guatemala, me dedicó frases maravillosas en su música".

"Hoy estamos repudiando un crimen más que enlutece a Guatemala ... un crimen más que está causando horror y miedo, no dejo de pensar que fue asesinado por sus ideales, no hay ninguna razón por la que tuviera que ser asesinado aquí en Guatemala", añadió la Nobel, que calificó el asesinato como una expresión del "odio del fascismo"

Las redes sociales se llenaron de mensajes de repudio, las fotos de los perfiles en Facebook de docenas de guatemaltecos fueron sustituidas por listones negros y se podían leer mensajes como el que publicó el ex director de la Oficina de Derechos Humanos del Ronatlh Arzobispado "siento una Ochaeta: inconmensurable vergüenza!! una profunda rabia por mi país... asesinaron a Facundo Cabral a pocas cuadras de llegar al aeropuerto".

El cantante y compositor Alberto Cortez, entrevistado por la radio colombiana Caracol, expresó su tristeza "ante la noticia tan terrorífica que hemos recibido'

suceden esas cosas, pero suceden y entonces no encuentra consuelo", agregó Cortez, quien grabó junto a su colega y amigo el disco "Lo Cortez no quita lo Cabral" que promocionaron juntos en una larga y exitosa gira internacional.

La agencia de noticias argentina DyN reportó desde Buenos Aires que el presidente guatemalteco Alvaro Colom se comunicó con su colega argentina Cristina Fernández para informarle del asesinato, que "fue todo a su parecer planificado".

Cabral tenía 74 años y ofreció su último concierto el jueves en la ciudad de Quetzaltenango, a 200 kilómetros al oeste de la capital

El artista se consideraba a sí mismo "un contador de historias que además canta' y fue autor de temas como "No soy de aquí ni soy de allá", el cual cantaron figuras como Vicente Fernández. Julio Iglesias y Lola Flores y del que, según el autor, existen cerca de 700 versiones en 27 lenguas.

Hizo dúos con compositores como Pedro Vargas y Neil Diamond.

Folk singer Facundo Cabral killed in Guatemala

July 9, 2011 (AP): Gunmen with rifles shot and killed one of Latin America's most famous folk singers, Facundo Cabral, on Satur-

day The Argentine singer and novelist was on his way to Guatemala's main airport when gunmen attacked his vehicle, hitting him with at least eight bullets, said city fire department spokesman José Rodríguez. He said Cabral's concert promoter Henry Farina also was wounded. The motive was not clear.

Cabral rose to fame in the early 1970s, one of a generation of singers who mixed political protest with literary lyrics and created deep bonds with an audience struggling through an era of revolution and repression across Latin America.

Guatemalan President Alvaro Colom said he had called his Argentine counterpart Cristina Fernández to tell her of the slaving.

"It seemed to hit her hard and she asked me to keep her informed about how the investigation is developing, he told Argentina's Radio 10. Colom said officials were interviewing survivors and witnesses and analyzing images from video monitors in the area. "Adios, amigo," tweeted

Argentina's foreign minister, Hector Timerman, in a message that expressed "profound sadness" at the murder.

Some evidence suggested that the killing was

GUATEMALA CITY, not a simple robbery. Cabral was riding in a truck that tried to flee the attackers by driving into a fire station. He was accompanied by a second vehicle carrying bodyguards, according to Guatemalan television station

Notisiete. Police spokesman Donald González said agents apparently found one of the vehicles used in the attack, abandoned along the highway to El Salvador. It said it was pocked with bullet holes and spent cartridges were found inside

Cabral, who walked with aid of a cane and had trouble with his vision in later years, lost his wife and a 1-year-old daughter in a plane crash in 1978

"I love life so much because it cost me so much to enjoy it," he told The Associated Press in an interview in 2008.

"From the cradle to the grave is a school, so if what we call problems are lessons, we see life differently," he said.

His most famous song, "No soy de aqui ni alla" ("I'm Not From Here or There) was recorded about 700 times in 27 languages.

A proud vagabond since his impoverished childhood doing odd jobs in the Argentine streets, Cabral said he would like to die while on a concert tour. "The song is very secondary," he said. "It's like recreation.

Cabral gave his last concert Thursday in the city of Quetzaltenango, 120 miles (200 kilometers) west of Guatemala City.

HAVANA, July 8, 2011 (AP): Manuel Galbán, a Grammy-winning Cuban guitarist who rose to international fame as a member of the Buena Vista Social Club, has died of a heart attack in Havana. He was 80.

An article in Communist Party newspaper *Gramma* on Friday noted Galbán's passing the previous day and called him a "master of the guitar." "It is a very sad day for

"It is a very sad day for Cuban music and fans of Cuban Music," said *Daniel Florestano*, longtime manager of both Galbán and the Buena Vista Social Club, in a statement issued by Galbán's publicist. "Galbán's enormous impact worldwide with his unique guitar sound and warmsmile will be missed by many." Born in 1931 in Gibara, in the eastern province of Holguin, Galbán madehis professional debut in 1944, according to the statement. In 1963 he joined Los Zafiros, Spanish for "Sapphires," which fused styles as varied as bolero, calypso, and rock with Cuban "filin" music, which comes from the word

"feeling." The group became one of the island's most popular until it disbanded in 1972.

Galbán spent the next three years as head of Cuba's national music ensemble.

He then formed a group known as *Batey*, which performed throughout the world "representing Cuba in numerous acts of solidarity," Granma said.

In the 1990s he became



ANN ARBOR, July 7, 2011: Physicists and astronomers have long believed that the universe has mirror symmetry, like a basketball, but recent findings fromthe University of Michigan dispute this. The findings suggest that the shape of the Big Bang might be more complicated than previously thought, and that the early universe spun about an axis. To test for the assumed

a team of five undergraduateam of five undergraduateam of five undergraduates catalogued the rotation direction of tens of thousands of spiral galaxies photographed in the Sloan Digital Sky Survey.

The mirror image of a counter-clockwise rotating galaxy would have clockwise rotation. More of one type than the other would be evidence for a breakdown of symmetry, or, in physics speak, a 'parity violation' on cosmic scales, Longo said.

The researchers found evidence that galaxies tend to rotate in a preferred direction. They uncovered an excess of left-handed, or counter-clockwise rotating, spirals in the part of the sky toward the north pole of the Milky Way. The effect extended beyond 600 million light years away.

"The excess is small, about 7 percent, but the chance that it could be a cosmic accident is something like one in a million," Longo said. "These results are extremely important because they appear to contradict the almost universally accepted notion that on sufficiently large scales the universe is *isotropic*, with no special direction."

The work provides new insights about the shape of the *Big Bang*. A symmetric and isotropic universe would have begun with a spherically symmetric explosion shaped like a basketball. If the universe was born rotating, like a spinning basketball, Longo said, it would have a preferred axis, and galaxies would have retained that initial motion. Is the universe still spin-

ning? "It could be," Longo said. "I think this result suggests that it is."

Because the Sloan telescope is in New Mexico, the data the researchers analyzed for theirrecent paper came mostly from the northernhemisphere of the sky. An important test of the findings will be to see if there is an excess of right-handed spiral

excess of right-handed spiral galaxies in the southern hemisphere. This research is currently underway.

A paper on the findings, Detection of a Dipole in the Handedness of Spiral Galaxies with Redshifts z~0.04 is published in Physics Letters B.

El universo puede haber nacido girando según nuevas conclusiones sobre la simetría del cosmos

ANN ARBOR, julio 2011: Los físicos y astrónomos han creído por mucho tiempo que el universo tiene una simetría de espejo, como una pelota de básquetbol, pero las conclusiones a las que se ha llegado recientemente en la Universidad de Michigan lo cuestionan. Esas conclusiones indican que la forma de la Gran Explosión puede haber sido más complicada que lo que se creía, v que el universo naciente giraba sobre un eje.

Para probar la presunta simetría de espejo, el profesor de física *Michael Longo* y un equipo de cinco estudiantes de pregrado catalogaron la dirección de rotación de decenas de miles de espirales galácticas fotografiadas en la Encuesta Digital Sloan del Cíelo.

La imagen de espejo de una galaxia que rote en sentido opuesto a las agujas del reloj debería tener una rotación en sentido de las agujas del reloj. La existencia de más galaxias de un tipo que del otro hubiese sido prueba de un rompimiento de la simetría o, como dicen los físicos, una "violación de la paridad" en escals cósmicas, dijo Longo.

Los investigadores encontraron pruebas de que las galaxias tienden a rotar en una dirección preferida. Descubrieron un exceso de espirales que rotan hacia la izquierda, es decir en sentido opuesto a las agujas del reloj en la región del cielo hacia el



polo norte de la Vía Láctea. El efecto se extiende hasta más allá de 600 millones de años luz.

"El exceso es pequeño, un 7 por ciento, pero la probabilidade de que esto pueda ser solo un accidente cósmico es de alrededor de una en un millón", dijo Longo. "Los resultados son e x t r e m a d a m e n t e importantes porque parecen contradecir la noción, aceptada casi universalmente, de que en una escala suficientemente grande el universo es isotróplico, es decir no tiene una dirección especial".

Este trabajo proporciona nuevos conocimientos acerca de la forma de la Gran Explosión. Un universo simétrico e isotrópico habría comenzado con una explosión esféricamente simétrica, con la forma de una pelota de básquetbol. Si el universo hubiese nacido como una pelota de básquetbol girando, dijo Longo, tendría un eje preferido y las galaxias hubiesen retenido el movimiento inicial.

¿Sigue girando el universo?

"Podría ser", dijo Longo. "Yo creo que estas conclusiones sugieren que sigue girando".

Dado que el telescopio Sloane se encuentra en Nuevo México los datos los científicos que analizaron para su estudio reciente provienen, principalmente, del hemisferio norte del cielo. Una prueba importante de estas conclusiones será ver si existe un exceso de espirales galácticas en el hemisferio sur que giran hacia la izquierda. Esta investigación está en curso. 

Jacinto Velasquezhas been drawing and painting for as long as he can remember, he writes on his web site. The exhibit will include his new work, all inspired by light.

His "Layers of Light" series is based on "light, color and the effects of shape. The world around us is shaped by light: color is the result of the light and air; Shape is the result of that light. Applying paint to a canvas allows me to combine the three elements together, and hold them within the shape of the canvas for your eyes to wander about in that light. Abstract shapes and ideas, with content, form," he wrote on his web site.

For Jacinto Velasquez, like many artists could agree, a painting is intended to provoke a feeling.

"The roads and direction I have taken and the mediums I have utilized to create with, over my lifetime, have never been motivated by money, but by the desire to gain an understanding as to how color, light, and movement work together," Jacinto Velasquez writes on his web site "I have always felt moved

by color, inside. To provoke a smile, to raise an eyebrow. To make one feel-how is paint transformed into feeling.'

Jacinto Velasquez works with Home Run Pictures, a Pittsburgh-based 3D animation studio.

Along with Jacinto Velasquez's art work, attendees will be entertained by Youngstown singing talent Karen Labra, of Mexican descent, and who has appeared on the Latino show Sábado Gigante.

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
