July 10, 2008 (AP): Like eager but awkward suitors, Barack Obama and John McCain are working hard and sometimes fumbling in their efforts to court Latino voters who could swing November's presidential election. For the African-American

During the last presidential election, Latinos in key swing states such as Colorado, New Mexico, Nevada and Florida represented anywhere from 8 percent to more than 30 percent of voters, according to exit polls, and their numbers

are only expected to grow this ye The Clintonites Clara Apodaca, 73, of Las Cruces, N.M., is among the


Clinton supporters who quickly made the shift to Obama. The longtime Demo-crat was hoping to see a woman in the Oval Office, but she now believes Obama would be the best candidate to handle the economy, the war and the country's reputa-

war and the country's reputa-tion. "We're so badly thought of throughout the world," she said. "We need to shore up our relationships." Yet 64-year-old Denver resident *Paul Sandoval*, who Until recently, McCain was known by many

was also a Clinton supporter, has yet to make up his mind. "Obama has not sold me that he's the best candidate, regardless if he's a Demo-crat," the Mexican restaurant owner said as he served up eggs for the morning crowd. "T m going to wait. I'm going to to see how they perform on that stage, answering those hard questions."

And then there is Fernando Romero, a former casino executive and longtime politi-cal organizer in Las Vegas. Romero advised Democratic candidate Bill Richardson, but he calls Obama's relationship with Latinos shallow. For now, he's backing McCain.

"Unfortunately (Obama) is the one that we know nothis the one that we know holf-ing about and has made little effort to communicate with us," Romero said. "There are so many good qualities that Senator McCain has—and proven auelities"



seeing their own defections among Latinos voters, especially in Florida, where for the first time more are registered as Democrats than Republicans

McCain remains popular among Cuban-Americans in Miami, who tend to vote Republican and admire his military record and his support for U.S. policy toward Cuba. The campaign unveiled its Florida Latino steering committee last

week with names of week with names of roughly 100 active Latino supporters from throughout the state. But a crowd of nearly 1,000 people, many of them Cuban-John McCain

briefly peaked out from the wall outside Little Havana's famed Versailles restaurant last month, a traditional gath-ering point for Republican hard-liners. Jesús Mendoza, 51, owner

of the Tijerazo barber shop in Tampa, explained his change of heart as he wielded his scis-

I'm a true Republican," said the Puerto Rican native. "I believe people should work hard and get less help. But the Republicans have been in power for eight years, and I don't think things are better. Obama, he's a young candi-tare hat be's in young candidate, but he's intelligent. Even though I'm a Republican, I'm not blind.'

In Orlando, Angie Thillet, 38, who voted twice for Bush, is leaning toward Obama be-cause he proposes to get the country close to universal health care.

Thillet went without insur-ance coverage for years, de-spite white-collar jobs. She has insurance now through her employment at a funeral home yet she was afraid

to go to the doctor after she hit her head in the bathtub because her deductible is more than \$1,200. She doesn't like

the hype surround-ing Obama, espe-AcCain voting for McCain."

If talk radio is any measure, Obama is making inroads. Magda Yvette Torres, a two-time Bush supporter and host of a Spanish-language pro-gram in central Florida, fielded calls heavily in favor of the Democrat on one recent show.

"Most of my listeners sup-ported Hillary Clinton, and a

few months ago, you would have heard a lot of these same people calling in to criticize Obama, more than a few talking about his race," Torres said.

#### Texas in flux

Although Texas Latinos have tended to vote Demo-cratic, in the 2004 presidential election, Bush, the state's former governor, split their vote with Democrat John Kerry. Now their support may be up for grabs again—not enough perhaps to swing the state but enough to force McCain to spend more re-sources there.

Obama's personal appeal won over San Antonio office manager *Naomi Mathews*, 35. The Mexican-American con-siders herself a Republican but is leaning toward Obama. She was impressed that he held a town hall across the street from the coffee shop

"Maybe it's the whole change thing," said Mathews. "He made an impression on us. Maybe we can trust this person." Mathews was one of many

Latino voters, among dozens interviewed by The Associ-ated Press, who said they wanted more of a direct pitch from the candidates. Angelette Aviles, 32, an ac-

tive supporter of McCain, be-lieves he will help the economy and be tough in the international arena. But she was frustrated by a recent (Continued on Page 15)

CLEVELAND: DrJames J. Zogby, founder and president of the Arab American Institute (AAI), will speak about the importance of the United States' Middle East policy in this fall's election at noon on Friday, July 18, 2008, at The City Club of Cleveland.

The AAI serves as the political and policy re-search arm of the Arab American community, and since 1985, Zogby has led its efforts to secure political empowerment for Arab American in the U.S.

A co-founder and chairman of the Palestine Human Rights Campaign in the late 1970s, Zogby later co-founded and served as the executive director of the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee, and in 1982, co-founded Save Lebanon, Inc. In 1993, Vice President Al Gore asked Zogby to lead Builders for Peace, a private sec-tor committee to promote U.S. business investment in the West Bank and Gaza. In 1994, with former U.S. Congressman Mel Levine, Zogby led a U.S. delegation to the signing of the Israeli-Palestinian agreement in Cairo. Personally active in U.S.





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

In a press release, the Toledo-Lucas County Public Library has announced that this year marks the 135<sup>th</sup> anniversary of *Sigmond Sanger's* birth. The late Toledo attorney's legacy lives on at the branch that bears his name, Sanger Branch Library, lo-cated at 3030 W. Central

Ave., Toledo. The Toledo-Lucas County Public Library invites the public in celebrating Sanger's life and his contributions to the library with remembrances and photographs from 2-3 p.m. on Saturday, July 19, 2008, at the Sanger Branch. Birthday cake will be served at this free and open to the public event.

Sanger, (1873-1946), was born in Szeben. Hungary and was an influential law partner in the Toledo firm (Walter Folger) Brown and Sanger. He served for 28 years, beginning in 1918 until the time of his death, as a member of the Library's board of trustees. He served as trustee president for all but one year of his full tenure.

During Sanger's trustee years, many of the city's branch libraries were established, along with libraries in schools, which fostered cooperative programs. His biggest accomplishment was the establish-ment of Main Library's present-day location along Michigan Street in downtown Toledo. For 20 years Sanger campaigned for the building, which he saw completed in 1940.

When Sanger began his trustee tenure, the Toledo-Lucas County Public Library contained 118,000 volumes. At the time of his death in 1946 there were 500,000 volumes, and by comparison, today the system contains more than 2.9 million volumes (includes all materials - books, DVDs, videos, etc.).

Erin Connolly, manager of the Sanger Branch Li-brary, said she believes Sanger would be amazed by the growth of the Toledo-Lucas County Public Library system, which includes Main Library, 18 branch locations, and Outreach Services (bookmobile and book

hauler). "Mr. Sanger had a very generous spirit. The length of time he volunteered his leadership to promote the library makes this obvious. He believed in helping the working class and I think he would be especially proud of what we accom-plish in Lucas County, let alone the 265,000 people who visited the Sanger Branch last year. We help people from all walks of



life," said Connolly. Sanger married Marga-ret Heyn (Margot) Sanger (1890-1967), an entertainer. The couple adopted a daughter Mary Ruth Wotherspoon, (1924-2008) who died this month (on July 7) at the age of 84 in Sante Fe, New Mexico. Sanger Branch Library

was established in a storefront in the Colony in 1953. It moved to another location in the Kenwood Shopping Center in 1959. Over the next 40 years, the branch was enlarged twice, and finally, thanks to the generosity of Lucas County voters who sup-ported a capital improvements levy, a new facility was built. That was opened in March 2000 at its current location along West Central Avenue.

#### Puebla vence al Atlético de Madrid Por CARLOS RODRIGUEZ

PUEBLA, México, el 13 de julio del 2008 (AP): Con un gol del uruguayo Alvaro González, el Puebla derrotó el domingo 1-0 al Atlético de Madrid al comenzar la gira de pretemporada de los españoles por suelo azteca.

González metió un tanto de pierna izquierda a los cinco minutos para superar la estirada del portero Leo Franco y definió el encuentro para los Camoteros, que están en etapa de preparación para el Apertura mexicano, el cual arranca en un par de semanas.

"Es un rival de mucho nombre, de mucho prestigio v esos no se sabanean (superan) así de fácil, fue muy importante lo que hicimos hoy", dijo José Luis Sánchez, entrenador del Puebla. "Si ellos salen de buenas, de malas, cansados, descansados, no es cosa de nosotros".

Un tiro libre de Mariano Pernía en la primera mitad y un disparo potente dentro del área a los 60 minutos por parte de Diego Costa fueron las mejores ocasiones de gol para los españoles, quienes arribaron a México el viernes por la noche.

"Fue un partido que lamentablemente no pudimos empatar. Tuvimos un par de ocasiones, no mucho más, ellos fueron más acertados y son justos vencedores", dijo Aguirre.

El encuentro, que se realizó en el estadio Cuauhtémoc de esta ciudad localizada 105 kilómetros al sureste de la capital, le salió costoso al Atlético debido a que el delantero español Alex Rodríguez chocó a los 68 minutos con el portero Jorge Villalpando y se fracturó la clavícula.

"Es una pena, venía por unos minutos y ahora hay que regresarlo a España" agregó Aguirre. "Está en el hospital, esperemos que se recupere pronto; tiene buenas condiciones".



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

#### 'Journey'gains depth in 3-D form By DAVID GERMAIN

July 10, 2008 (AP): Hollywood wisdom through the ages has always been that no technological innovationthe transition from silent film to sound, black-andwhite to color, handdrawn animation to digital images-could ever make a bad movie into a good one.

Yet the three-dimensional breakthroughs employed in "Journey to the Center of the Earth" come close

In just two dimensions, Brendan Fraser's subterranean adventure to the planet's midsection probably would play as what it is at its core: A lame bit of hokum that's less a story than a themepark ride.

With crisp images and depth that make you feel you could reach out and stick your hand into the middle of the action, the movie projected in digital 3-D form actually makes that theme-park ride kind of fun.

The trouble is, there are nowhere near enough theaters yet equipped to project digital 3-D flicks in Hollywood's nationwide pattern of 3,000plus cinemas, so most of the places it'll play will be in two dimensions.

Images of carnivorous fish leaping from an underground ocean right at the camera still may look cool in 2-D. But a shot from the perspective of a sink drain as Fraser spits out his toothbrush backwash into the lens-effective and funny in 3-D-most likely will just look weird when the extra dimension is taken awav

In his directing debut, veteran visual-effects supervisor Eric Brevig makes the most of the 3-D technology that uses two sideby-side digital cameras to simulate the perspective provided by the right and left eyes. Moviegoers must wear glasses, but they're of higher caliber than the flimsy cardboard ones used for old-time 3-D flicks.

Audiences already have been treated to similar effects in recent Hannah Montana and U2 concert movies, imagery actually floating off the screen so movie fans practically felt as if they were banging elbows with the live crowds.

"Journey to the Center of the Earth" follows their lead in providing an almost tangible world that makes the eye-straining, headache-inducing 3-D movies of past decades look like the cheesy gimmick they were.

This is not Jules Verne's sci-fi classic retold, though the movie does use his book as a template for a modern

Essentially a three-character story, the movie casts Fraser as absent-minded geologist Trevor Anderson. who forgets his nephew Sean (Josh Hutcherson) is coming for a visit.

Trevor's brother, the boy's dad, mysteriously vanished years earlier on a field expedition in Iceland. Just as Sean arrives. Trevor stumbles on clues left by his brother that lead him to believe Verne's fantasy novel actually was based on a real journey to the earth's center. So he takes the boy along to Iceland to follow his brother's footsteps.

They meet up with local guide Hannah (Anita Briem), and the threesome almost instantly finds themselves tumbling and racing through the planet's interior, encountering glowing birds, ravenous sea creatures and a pastyfaced dinosaur aiming to snack on them.

While there are gimmicky shots designed to make audiences jerk in their seats as things come at them of four.

in 3-D mode, Brevig restrains the impulse to use the technology for too many cheap jolts.

Generally, the 3-D images are fashioned to make fans feel as though they're sitting inside the movie rather than being assaulted by moving objects within it.

The simple-minded screenplay credited to Michael Weiss, Jennifer Flackett and Mark Levin amounts to little more than amiable but empty patter that almost could have been dreamed up on the spot to fill the gaps between the nonstop action sequences.

This is a movie made solely as a thrill ride. But be warned: The ride may not be too thrilling if you see it in conventional 2-D cinema, so try to catch the 3-D version.

"Journey to the Center of the Earth," re-leased by the Warner Bros. unit New Line Cin-ema, runs 93 minutes. Two and a half stars out



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#### Suspects in salmonella probe include: salsa, jalapeños, and tomatoes

#### By LAURAN NEERGAARD, AP Medical Writer

July 10, 2008 (AP): Think of your favorite recipe for salsa. Three common ingredients now are suspects in the salmonella poisonings that have become the nation's largest foodborne outbreak in at least a decade. And therein lies the frus-

tration. Seven weeks into their investigation, federal health officials aren't shortening the list of potential culprits but adding to it. Now *jalapeño* pepper producers are being probed alongside tomato dis-tributors, and even fresh cilantro is under suspicion,

too. "I wish I could have a crystal ball and say it's one of those three things," Dr. David Acheson, the Food and Drug Administration's food safety chief, told AP Television on Thursday

This has gone on longer and has been more compli-cated than anything I've worked on at FDA."

Indeed, it's quite a depar-ture from the 2006 E. coli outbreak in spinach, a mystery solved in about two weeks

"We really, really got spoiled, if you will, with the spinach outbreak," Dr. Robert Tauxe, food safety chief at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, told The Associated Press.

There aren't as many spinach lovers as tomato lovers. And the spinach consumers remembered eating came in bags, often still left in their refrigerators \_ that bore bar codes that were as good a clue as a fingerprint in helping investigators race to the very field that had been contaminated.

This time around, the suspects seldom are left over in the refrigerator or bear individual bar codes. Also, the victims are having a harder

time remembering. They say, "Well, I'm not sure, I may have had guacamole, or a garnish," Tauxe said

But this outbreak is lasting an unusually long time, with a record 1,065 cases confirmed by Thursday-the

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first of whom fell sick April 10 and the latest so far June 26. That makes the toll of the

current salmonella outbreak far surpass recent large outbreaks of any foodborne disease: salmonella linked to peanut butter in 2006 and hepatitis A from green onions in 2003. It's not quite as big as one caused by cyclospora-tainted raspberries in the mid-1990s.

The scope is bad both for public health and a battered tomato industry that estimates losses at \$100 million. Yet it is giving federal investigators some apparently valuable new clues.

Early on, lots of individuals got sick, not clusters of people who all ate at the same restaurant or catered picnic. But by mid-May and continuing well into last month, those clusters of a few people sick-ened in the same spot were appearing. That's helpful for disease detectives, who find it easier to trace suppliers for a few restaurants than hundreds of stores and markets.

Plus, the CDC just finished comparing 144 people who got sick in June with 287 people who live near them but didn't fall ill.

That study of the June cases shows the sick are far more likely than the well to have eaten either raw tomatoes, raw jalapeno peppers or fresh cilantro. In one of the largest clusters, those sickened had consumed fresh to-matoes and fresh jalapenos mixed together. In two other large clusters, illnesses were linked only to a dish that con-tained fresh jalapenos but no tomatoes

What does that mean?

"We are quite sure that ther tomatoes nor neither jalapenos explain the entire outbreak at this point. ... We're presuming that both of them have caused illness," Tauxe said.

That has the FDA looking furiously for intersections between peppers and tomatoes. Perhaps there are farms that grew tomatoes earlier in the spring and then switched

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pepper harvesting, or disution centers that handled both types of produce and contaminated incoming pro-duce, Acheson said.

The government's advice for now is to continue avoiding certain raw tomatoesred round, plum and Romaunless they were grown in areas cleared of suspicion.

Plus, people at highest risk of severe illness from salmonella should not eat raw jalapeno and *serrano* pep-pers, the CDC advised. The most vulnerable are the elderly, people with weak immune systems and infants. Serranos are on the list be-cause they're hard to distinguish from *jalapeños*. Did the CDC just miss a

pepper connection early on? "It's very hard for us to

say that peppers were abso-lutely not part of the problem initially. They may have been part of the problem initially but not large enough to catch the attention of the investigations." Tauxe acknowledges But there are clusters of illness where jalapeños "simwere not on the menu," he added.

And Acheson stressed Thursday: "There was and is very compelling evidence that tomatoes were contaminated with salmonella.

The geography offers a potentially good clue too. Patients live in 42 states, Washington, D.C., and even Canada—where three people got sick while traveling to the U.S. and a fourth case is under investigation. Most of the sick are in the Southwest, while parts of the Northwest have no cases and parts of the Southeast few.

"That begs the question is there something about the distribution of the product that contributes to that," Acheson said. "We've been trying to tease that apart." On the Net: Centers for Dis-

"It's like, OK, I think the hardcore voters in Miami are going to vote for the Republi-cans no matter what," she said. "The younger generation, they're more concerned about bread and butter issues. You need to reach out to us."

Manteiga, a Democrat, said Latinos want more than Obama's stadium speeches or McCain's town-hall meetings.

No one is meeting with the 40 Latin ministries, as they would in the black commu-nity," he said. "Latins want a nity," he said. "Latins want a hug. They want a touch. If 300 or 400 people shake the candidate's hand, that translates exponentially into votes when they talk to their family and friends."

#### Matters of race

Manteiga said a personal connection is most important for Obama because he must convince Latinos who may be uncomfortable voting for a black candidate.

Many Latinos interviewed by the AP acknowledged tensions on that front, because of competition over jobs and services or because of prejudice.

Even so, Martínez plans to vote for Obama because he believes the Illinois senator would be the best at bringing jobs to the area.

July 10, 2008 (AP): Wal-Mart is pulling from its shelves a popular Mexican comic book that features a protagonist with exaggerated black features after a Houston customer complained that "Memin Pinguin" was racist.

The latest issue of the comic, "Memin para presidente" (Memin for President), was being sold in select Wal-Mart stores that have a large Latino customer base, Wal-Mart Stores Inc. spokesman Lorenzo López in Bentonville, Ark., said.

But the discount giant decided to remove the comic from stores nationwide on Wednesday. "We understand that

Memin is a popular figure in México," the company said in a statement. "However, given the sensitivity to the negative image Memin can portray to some, we felt that it was best to no longer carry the item in our stores. We apologize to those customers who may have been offended by the book's images.'

A Houston customer, Shawnedria McGinty, spotted the comic in a local store, and objected to the

caricature-like depiction of the main character, a small boy with thick lips and wide-open eyes. She complained to a community activist, Quanell X, who got the attention of local media.

A telephone listing for McGinty couldn't be immediately found. Ouanell X declined comment, but planned to make a public statement Thursday in front of the Wal-Mart store that sold the comic.

The comic, first published in the 1940s, revolves around Memin Pinguin, a small Mexican-Cuban boy whose street smarts and adventures reflect the life of a poor boy in México City. The boy, portrayed as a likeable rascal, earns money shining shoes and selling newspa-

The characters of Memin and his mother have been criticized as throwbacks to stereotypical depiction of blacks. It is not the first time Memin has sparked debate in this country.

In 2005, the Mexican postal service issued a series of stamps commemorating the Memin character. President Bush and several African-Americans. including Jesse Jackson, asked the Mexican government to recall the stamps.

Mexico's then-president Vicente Fox defended the stamps, saving Memin Pinguin was a beloved character embraced by all Mexicans.

The 750,000-stamp issue sold out within a few days of release.

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
