### Court: Lawyer may be sued for emotional pain By DAVID PITT, Associated Press

July 19, 2013 (AP): The Iowa Supreme Court on Friday said a couple from Ecuador may sue their attorney for emotional distress because his advice caused them to be separated from their children and grandchildren for a decade.

It's the first time the state's high court has allowed an attorney to be sued for emotional distress and punitive damages in a malpractice case.

Klever Miranda and Nancy Campoverde can sue Des Moines attorney Michael Said for emotional damages for being separated long-term from their family, the court said. The couple had lived undocumented in the United States for 15 years when Said told them in 2005 that they might become citizens if they returned to Ecuador and filed certain visa documents. He told them they could apply to have their son, who had gained citizenship, sponsor them as a qualifying relative under immigration laws.

Miranda returned to Ecuador in 2005 and Campoverde joined him in 2007. Once there, their visa requests were denied and they learned U.S. immigration rules prohibited them from returning for 10 years. They left behind two sons and grandchildren, and sued Said for legal malpractice in 2010.

Before the case went to

DES MOINES, Iowa, a jury in November 2010, a judge dismissed the emotional distress and punitive damages portion of the lawsuit. A jury awarded the couple \$12,500 for their attorney fees after finding malpractice had occurred.

The couple appealed and the Iowa Court of Appeals last year said the judge should have allowed the jury to decide on the emotional distress and punitive portion of the case and ordered a new trial. Said appealed that decision to the Iowa Supreme Court.

Chief Justice Mark Cady wrote Friday that Iowa law generally does not allow emotional stress damages in lawsuits claiming wrongful action unless there has been physical injury or proof of intentional conduct. However, he said, over time emotional distress damages have been allowed in cases, even though the high court hadn't applied these exceptions to an attorney malpractice case.

The court determined Said knew the consequences of separating the couple from their children and grandchildren were highly emotional, and by only pursuing an option that experts have testified had no chance of success, Said was negligent.

"The negligent conduct was doomed to directly result in a separation of the family for a decade. In this light, it was the type of relationship in which negligent conduct was especially likely to cause severe emotional distress, supporting a duty of care to protect against such harm," the court wrote. The court stressed that its

ruling is limited in scope, and that such damages are appropriate when an attorney's acts are "illegitimate and, if pursued, are especially likely to produce serious emotional harm."

Miranda and Campoverde are eligible for a new trial on emotional distress and punitive damages claims.

Justice Thomas Waterman dissented, saving the ruling could have a "chilling effect on the willingness of attorney to practice immigration law in Iowa.

"Allowing emotional distress claims in legal malpractice actions will result in fewer lawyers practicing in the field and higher rates charged by those who do," he wrote.

He said it also will be hard to draw the line in the next malpractice case against a criminal defense attorney who fails to keep a client out of prison.

Said's attorney, Erich Hoch, said he was disappointed with the ruling. Angela Campbell,

Miranda and Campoverde's attorney, said the U.S. immigration system failed the family.

"They did the right thing in seeking legal advice to become American citizens and ended up being separated from their children for 10 years," she said. "This case demonstrates the need for serious immigration reform.

### Latino candidates file for city-wide offices

Toledo, July 26, 2013: Lucas County Auditor *Anita López* may be the most high-profile among Latino candidates filing for city-wide office as she runs for mayor, but at least two incumbents quietly decided to seek re-election.

Ms. López rallied outside One Government Center with about 40 supporters on Wed., July 10, just before filing the signatures needed to run for mayor at the board of elections. She thanked more than 50

volunteers who went door-todoor circulating petitions and gathering signatures "so we can turn Toledo around and get it moving in the right direction." "We look forward to mak-

ing things happen," Ms. López told the crowd, many of them union members from Teamsters Local #20. "I'm a daughter of this community. Ilove this city. I look forward to a new vision for this city. A community with-out a future of employment is not a future."

The Lucas County auditor, who previously served on the Toledo Public Schools (TPS) board of education and as Lucas County recorder, stated "working-wage jobs" would be her primary focus and plans to unveil an economic plan over the next nine weeks leading up to the Sept. 10 city-wide pri-

"We want jobs that a family can live on, jobs that a family can buy a home on, jobs that lift people up—much like a job that lifted me up when my father was working with union wages before he became disabled," she said.

Ms. López also touted safer neighborhoods and responsive city government as two other major parts of her election platform.

"I will be the mayor that goes to block-watch meetings. I will be the mayor that meets with business and community leaders," she said. "You will not hear from a director. You will hear directly from me on a city that will be in touch with you and responsive to you." While Ms. López has se-

cured several union endorse-ments, she still will face a crowded ballot heading into the primary. At least six other mayoral candidates filed by last Friday's deadline-includ-ing incumbent independent Mayor Mike Bell, Democratic Toledo City Council member Joe McNamara, independent Councilman Mike Collins, and other lesser-known political hopefuls. The top two vote-get-ters in the Sept. primary will then square off in the Nov. general election.

### Toledo City Council vs. TPS

Two other Latino incumbent candidates quietly filed petitions to seek re-election. Democrat *Bob Vásquez* ad-

mitted he considered a run for Toledo City Council before deciding education is still his true passion. He filed petitions to seek another term on the TPS board of education "because there are some things that remain undone" and others he wants "to see through to comple-

"I think a quality school systimic aquarty school sys-tem is really the key to eco-nomic success," said Vásquez. The former school board president stated current board

members need to stay in office in order to see the district's transformation plan continue for-ward. However, current board of education member Larry Sykes has filed to run for Toledo City Council instead.

"I want to have some direct impact on what happens in Toledo, in our community, even nationally, in education. It's so important to me," he said. "I've been working with families and children for many years and this is just a continuation of that."

Vásquez explained he can make a bigger impact on the school board rather than city council, because the board only has five members, as opposed to a dozen on council. He also wants to lend his expertise to more of an administrative body

than a group of what he called "legislators." "That's a big difference. I think you can have much more of an impact when you're in more of an administrative position," he said. "Even though there have been challenges, I constantly dream of an excel-lent school system that is part of an excellent city—and I think we can accomplish that." Current at-large councilman



Adam Martínez also will seek another term. 17 other people also filed to run for Toledo City Council. "I have helped to foster

almost \$5 million in small business micro-lending," he said of an economic develop-ment program he championed two years ago. "We are about to unleash \$60 million in job creation incentives in the next month or two. I just didn't feel like we were done. We're try-ing to bring jobs back into the

neighborhoods." Martínez, council's neighborhoods and community development committee chairman, stated there is plenty of unfinished business. citing it as the major reason he decided to run again. But he also emphasized he has no intention of "becoming a ca-reer politician."

But the incumbent Democratalso wants the Latino community to continue to have representation on city council. He is the lone councilman of Latino descent, but at least two others are seeking at-large

"I think having Latino rep-resentation is definitely im-portant," he said. "I think we all come from different walks of life and political ideologies. I try to represent as many of us in our community as I can. I try to be sure that every opportunity that comes our way, we at least have a seat at the table or a voice in the conversation. I've nevershied away from hard decisions or getting involved in controversial issues. For too long,



CLEVELAND, July 19, 2013: Today the ACLU of Ohio called on the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) to put an end to their practice of shutting down the electricity at Ohio correctional institutions in exchange for money from KOREnergy Ltd. a private energy contractor.

"Times are difficult and government agencies are looking for revenue anywhere they can find it," said ACLUDirector of Communications and Public Policy Mike Brickner. "However,

this plan is dangerous. It compromises safety and security, not only for the incarcerated. but for the people who staff these facilities.

In the midst of a heat wave, media reports indicate that up to 24 of Ohio's correctional institutions have made agreements to restrict electricity during peak hours, cutting power to lights and fans and raising the temperature to nearly 90 degrees in some areas

The reports come on the heels of yet another incident at the privately run Lake Erie Correctional Institution (LaECD). The incident reportedly involved dozens of inmates in multiple fights in the prison yard. Prison officials have reportedly brought in emergency staff to regain control of the facility and are conducting a prison-wide shakedown of inmates.

"These problems at the Lake Erie Correctional Institution and other prisons have shown that these facilities are unpredictable even under normal circum-stances," added Brickner. "Cutting the power during a heat wave to make money is very short-sighted. Long term, it is a recipe for trouble.





Nearly 250 guests attended the movie and post discussion at MetroHealth Medical Center on July 16, 2013

"Global Cleveland wants to welcome everyone regard-

less of skill level," said Joy Roller, president of the organization, indicating a dramatic shift in the organization's previous approach to immigration, which focused primarily on high skill talent attraction. "Everything
