## Growing diversity in swing counties favors Obama

WASHINGTON, August 10, 2008 (AP): Minority U.S.-Americans have been flocking to the nation's "swing counties," hotly contested areas that could play a cru-cial role in this year's elec-

tion.
That's got to be good news for Barack Obama, bidding to become the first biracial

president.
Blacks and Latinos are moving to counties that al-ready were racially diverse, such as Osceola in central Florida and Mecklenberg in North Carolina, home to Charlotte. They also are moving to key counties that re-main predominantly non-Latino Caucasian, such as Lake in Northeast Ohio, Lehigh in eastern Pennsylvania, and Oakland outside Detroit.

If this year's election is as close as the past two, demo-graphic shifts in these coun-ties could make a big differ-

The racial changes reflect national trends: 93 percent of all counties are less white than they were at the start of the decade, according to new U.S. Census estimates. But the changes are even more profound in swing counties of potential battleground states, counties that were de-cided by razor thin margins in 2000 and 2004 and could decide statewide winners this

year.
"The key this time is there are a fair number of battle-ground states that are becoming more diverse, and maybe diverse enough to make a difference," said William

Frey, a demographer at the Brookings Institution, a Washington think tank. "The diversity used to be

mainly in pretty safe states, like Texas, California, and New York," he said.

The Census Bureau last week released 2007 data on race, age and Latino origin for all 3,141 counties in the nation. The Associated Press used the data to analyze 129 key counties in 14 states expected to be the most competitive in this year's presi-dential election. Each county was decided by no more than 5 percentage points in the past two elections, and each sits in a state that could go either way this year.
The analysis showed that

from 2000 to 2007, minorities made up a growing share of the population in all but 12 of the swing counties. The changes happened among every age group, even se-niors, though they were much more pronounced among the

young, including those too young to vote.

Obama, who had a white mother and black father, overwhelmingly won the black vote in the Democratic primaries, and he is polling more strongly than Republi-can John McCain among

Both candidates are targeting voters under 30. But while young voters have in-creased their turnout in re-cent elections, they are still less likely to vote than any

other age group.

Obama "may be generating excitement," said Vincent Hutchings, associate profes-

g e n - erating enough enthusiasm to excite people who lack a formal education and are disproportionately young, and not likely to vote?"

Hutchings said the demo-graphic changes could affect this year's election, but he expects the impact to be greater in future elections as oung minorities, particularly the booming Latino population, become older and more politically active.

The Census numbers are based on estimates, and in some counties changes in racial composition are small enough to be statistically in-significant. But the trend is clear: The nation is becoming increasingly diverse, even more so in areas that have been decisive the past

nave been decisive the past two presidential elections. The AP analysis looked at counties in Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Missouri, North Carolina, New Hamp-Shire, New Mexico, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Wisconsin. Nevada also was analyzed because it is a competitive state this year. None of the state's counties met

# Ohio voting law may be a boon for Obama supporters

COLUMBUS, August 13, 2008 (AP): Never mind the last days of the presidential campaign. The busiest days for Barack Obama's campaign in this perennial swing state are likely to be a month before Election Day.

Ohio has created a win-dow in the election calendar that would allow residents instant gratificationregister one minute, vote the next. It's also given the campaigns of Democrat Barack Obama and Republican John McCain a chance to bank thousands of first-time voters during that Sept. 30 to Oct. 6 window.

The move will benefit

Obama, who enjoys a 2-to-1 lead over McCain among 18- to 34-year-olds, according to a Washington Post-ABC News poll released last month. If Obama's campaign were able to tap into college campuses with onestop voting, it would add thousands of votes to his John Kerry lost to President George W. Bush by only about 118,000 votes, putting Bush over the top in the electoral count.

Of the more than 470,000 students enrolled in Ohio's public colleges and univer-sities in 2006, the most recent figures available, nine out of 10 were Ohio residents, the state Board of Regents said. To register to vote in Ohio, a person must be a resident of the state for at least 30 days immediately before an election.

Ohio elections officials say they are working out potential kinks, such as questions about whether a vote counts when it is cast or when it's counted. They also are trying to address potential fears of massive

voting fraud, and what effect this influx is going to mean

on vote security.

Allowing voters to cast their ballots weeks before Election Day is a growing trend. More than a dozen states permit early voting, and more than two dozen pro-vide an absentee ballot to any registered voter for any rea-son. The battleground states of Colorado, Florida, Nevada and New Mexico allow vot-

ers both options. In Ohio, Republicans are clearly not pleased with same-day registration and voting and have not ruled out a lawsuit against Demo-

cratic Secretary of State Jen-nifer Brunner's office. "You have to wonder, when they look at what they consider a loophole with such excitement," said Jason Mauk, the Ohio Republican Party's executive director.
"That would suggest manipulating the process, and I think opens the door to suspicion."

The voting window, so far, only being implemented

is only being implemented in some counties \_ typically, urban areas or those with college campuses \_ leading Republicans to cry foul.

"The prospect of someone coming in with no ID and registering and voting is contrary to every sort of protection that legislators and lawmakers have built into lawmakers have built into this system for decades," said Kevin DeWine, a Republi-can lawmaker who is poised to take over the state party after the election. "The processes and the law and the systems in our 88 counties are not equipped to handle same-day registration."

People in Ohio can regis-ter without identification, but

they have to show some sort of ID to vote.

State lawmakers acci-dentally made the window before the 2006 elections. Obama's campaign is eaer to take advantage of it

this year.
"This is one of many ways we'll be encouraging our supporters to skip the lines on Election Day and make sure their vote is cast early," said Isaac Baker, an

Obama spokesman.

The move is likely to bring Obama to Ohio for nonstop campaigning that week. Also, television ads are expected to be in heavy play as both campaigns try to take advantage of the electoral oddity. And the early push could help neutralize any last-minute attacks by one campaign on the other.

Outside, independent groups also are looking at spending a lot of time on campuses that week. Organized labor and liberal activist groups see a chance to build their numbers. Obama, 47, has been at-

tracting a strong following on campuses, something his campaign has aggressively targeted. McCain, 71, has made attempts but has struggled.

Ohio has been a must-win state for presidential candidates during past cycles, but Obama advisers had been weighing a move to skip it. He lost 83 of 88 counties during his fierce primary campaign against Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton. Some Democrats privately fear the map in the general election against McCain will

look very similar. Obama has trailed in support from rural voters and white, working-class vot-ers. He hasn't campaigned

## Arrestan a 57 inmigrantes en redada en EEUU

ASHEVILLE, Carolina del Norte, el 12 de agosto del 2008 (AP): Cincuenta y siete inmigrantes ilegales que trabajaban para un contratista militar fueron arrestados, incluyendo a varios latinoamericanos, informó el lunes la Oficina de Inmigración y Aduanas en un comunicado.

Algunos de los arrestados eran mexicanos, guatemaltecos, ecuatorianos

hondureños. El servicio de Inmigración y Control de Aduanas (ICE por sus siglas en inglés), entró en contacto con las oficinas consulares locales, organizaciones sociales y otros grupos para proporcionarles información pertinente sobre la operación realizada.

Mills Manufacturing

Corporation, una empresa contratista que colabora con el Departamento de Defensa, es responsable de fabricación paracaídas para el ejército. Los inmigrantes eran empleados suyos en departamentos con acceso a información restringida, Richburg, agente especial como bases militares, plantas nucleares, aeropuertos y otras empresas contratistas empleadas por la defensa.

"Su condición como indocumentados representa una amenaza para la seguridad interna del país",

señaló el ICE en su texto.
Una investigación
detallada reveló que los
inmigrantes habían utilizado números de seguridad falsos para ser contratados, por lo que esta irregularidad justificó los arrestos. La compañía cooperó en lo posible con la investigación y no es considerada un objetivo de la operación del ICE.

El servicio migratorio no considera que los arrestados pretendieran efectuar acciones negativas contra la nación, pero sí dijo que su estatus ilegal los convierte en blanco de extorsión de las personas con ese tipo de

objetivos.
"Proteger la integridad de nuestra infraestructura gubernamental es uno de los

del ICE", afirmó Delburt Richburg, agente especial asistente de la coordinación de la Oficina de Investigaciones del ICE en Charlotte, Carolina del Norte. "Cuando las perso-nas usan números de seguro social fraudulentos para obtener empleos, ocultan su verdadera identidad e historia. Necesitamos saber quién trabaja en los complejos de la infraestructura gubernamental".

Los arrestados fueron enviados a la oficina del jefe policial del condado de Henderson. Todos tendrán procesos legales para ser deportados por su

infracción a la ley migratoria estadounidense. El ICE identificó aproximadamente a 29 inmigrantes que requerían de una liberación por motivos humanitarios. Esas personas deberán presentarse ante un juez federal de migración determinará si serán sujetos a una deportación.

The commissioners will vote to approve or reject that request on Tuesday, Aug. 19. If the levy goes to the ballot and is approved, COSI will be able to re-open in fall 2009.

COSI Toledo is a science center delivering science-and technology-based programming to youth and their families throughout Lucas County. This independent, not-for-profit organization is located in downtown Toledo and has served more than three million visitors from its opening, March 1997, through December 2007, when it was forced to close its doors.

In the interim, COSI has continued to operate its popular outreach programs, including classroom work-shops, full-day science fes-tivals, family science nights and distance learning sessions via interactive video conferencing.

## Mich. board weighs how to summarize ballot issues

2008 (AP): Supporters and opponents of a constitutional amendment to reshape state government clashed before an elections board Tuesday over whether the measure can be explained to voters in 100 words.

A lawyer for Reform Michigan Government Now, which wants to put the sweeping proposal to a statewide vote in November, read a draft summary within the 100-word limit and said there is no requirement that every detail be included in the explanation read by voters at the polls.

The measure would cut the number of lawmakers and appellate judges, reduce their pay, alter how legislative seats are drawn and allow no-reason absentee voting. It would make other changes that would rewrite multiple parts of the state constitution, as well as adding new sections.

A lawyer for Citizens Protecting Michigan's Constitution told the Board of State Canvassers that the constitutional rewrite can't be fairly and accurately described in 100 words. The group led by the Michigan Chamber of Commerce has sued to block the issue from the ballot, saying the changes are too broad and can only be done at a constitutional convention.

Democrats and unions support the measure as a way to redraw legislative districts to favor Democrats after the 2010 census by

LANSING, August 12, lessening the influence of Republican-controlled appellate courts that typically review redistricting plans. The measure could be made more attractive to voters by including pay cuts and new ethical requirements for elected officials.

> The lawsuit will be heard next week, but the elections panel is continuing with procedural matters such as drafting a summary of the proposal to be released next week. The board also will decide next week if Reform Michigan Government Now and two other petition drives collected enough valid signatures to qualify for the

The board's staff is confident in reducing the Reform Michigan Government Now proposal to 100

Elections director Chris Thomas acknowledged it will be a "challenge" summarizing what he said is probably the most wideranging proposal he has handled, but he said it can be done.

The board also heard testimony Tuesday on how to summarize measures to lift state restrictions on stem cell research and allow the use of marijuana for medical purposes.

Only backers of the medical marijuana measure showed up to the hearing, as there appears to be no organized opposition to the proposal.

Lawyers disagreed,

however, over the stem cell measure.

The Stem Cell Research Ballot Question Committee asked that the summary include a statement that Michigan's prohibition against cloning would remain in effect under the proposal.

An opposition group, Michigan Citizens Against Unrestricted Science and Experimentation, said the measure would not keep the Legislature from allowing cloning in the future.



Kashkoush joined the Marines in 2003. He was a counterintelligence specialist.

Defiance College."





# "RACE: Are We So Different?" to open at The Cleveland **Museum of Natural History**

The Cleveland Museum of Natural History opens an exhibition that confronts the issue of United States-"RACE: Are We So Different?" encourages Museum visitors to explore the science, history and everyday impact of race.

The exhibition opens Sept. 27 and runs through Jan. 4, 2009.

(Continued from Page 2) in rural areas, despite advice from Democratic Gov. Ted Strickland, whose aggressive rural strategy helped him win his job in 2006 and was repeated for Clinton during March's primary.

But Obama advisers now look at Ohio's campuses as a possible way to offset the losses.

It has Ohio Republicans frustrated. Traditionally, young people make a lot of noise about elections and then stay home. If they don't actually have to turn up at the polls on Election Day, then they might take a greater interest. Mauk said if Brunner

doesn't apply the "loop-hole" in all counties, lawsuits are an option Republicans have to consider.

The secretary of state's spokesman acknowledged

the window exists.
"Instructions are being developed and being sent to boards of election across the state to make sure voting is consistent," Jeff Ortega, Brunner's spokesman.

Its impact is going to be felt in non-presidential races as well. For instance, Ohio State University is the largest college in the country, with

more than 52,000 students enrolled on its main campus in Columbus. Democrats are eyeing it as key to helping Mary Jo Kilroy win her House seat to re-Republican place Deborah Pryce, who is not seeking re-election.

"There is no question that the huge effort to register and turn out voters at Ohio State University is going to have a positive impact on our race," said Brad Bauman, a spokesman for Kilroy.

Ohio election law for the first time will allow voters to cast a presidential ballot by mail for any reason. In the past, there were specific provisions by which voters could cast a ballot early. But the law was changed; this is the first national general election in which it will be in play.

In 2004, more young people cast ballots than any other time since 18- to 20year-olds earned the right to vote in 1972. Turnout in 2004 was up 11 percent-

age points over 2000.

Even so, 47 percent of eligible 18- to 24-yearold voters didn't cast a ballot that year. During 2002's midterm elections, 82 percent of that group said they did not vote.

## U.S. economic woes hit Latinos especially hard

NEW YORK, August 4, 2008 (AP): After being fired by the restaurant where he worked as a cook for nine years, Ramon Pichardo does menial jobs

to get by.
"I've looked for a job in many restaurants but they all tell me they don't need help or they can't hire me at this moment because business is slow," said the Dominican immigrant, who shares an apartment with two roommates to afford the \$739 monthly rent in Manhattan's heavily Dominican neighborhood

of Washington Heights. From New York to Ohio/ Michigan to Los Angeles, the downturn in the U.S. economy is hitting Latinos especially hard, with unemployment rising faster in that community than in the overall U.S. population. And the slowdown has had a ripple effect, with a significant drop in payments being sent home to families in Latin America.

"For the last year, Hispanics have been losing jobs at a faster rate than any other group," said Agustine Martínez, presi-dent of the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce in

Washington. The U.S. Hispanic unemployment rate was 7.4 percent in July, compared to 5.7 percent for the U.S. population, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, and experts blame the slumps in construction and manufac-

Their salaries are also

stuck: Median earnings for Latinos who worked fulltime during the first quarter of 2008 were \$520 per week and \$10.77 per hour. For the overall population, the comparable figures were \$719 per week and \$12.20 per hour. And the median earnings for Hispanics were nearly the same as last year, when food and gas prices were much

Diana Rodríguez is another victim of the economic hard times.

The Dominican mother of two lost her job in February as a customer service representative and has been taking temporary jobs since then to be able to afford her \$345 monthly rent in a subsidized apartment in the Bronx.

"I am willing to do whatever kind of job they offer me," said the 36-year-old Rodríguez, who is divorced. "I did not think this would be this hard. Before it was easier

to find a job."
Now Rodríguez is thinking about moving to Okla-homa, where she has family and "maybe it's easier to

make a living."

José Ortiz, a labor spe cialist at the Department of Labor in New York City, said his Harlem office was packed last week with Latino work-

ers looking for jobs.
"The problem is that the manufacturing industry above all, the textile industry-is disappearing. Now, jobs available are more tech-nical and Latinos need training to find those jobs," Ortiz said. Workers at the center have seen a sharp jump in the number of people attending

An Inter-American Development Bank poll of 5,000 Latin Americans living in the U.S. found in April that only 50 percent regularly sends money to their families, down from 73 percent in 2006.

Mexico's Central Bank said remittances to Mexico were expected to decline by up to 2 percent for 2008 as a whole over the previ-

ous year. Catherine Singley, an analyst for the National Council of La Raza, noted that in addition to other economic woes, the mortgage crisis is taking its toll on the Hispanic commu-

nity.

"We know that 2006 was the peak in Hispanic homeownership, with 49 percent. Since then, more and more Hispanics are losing their homes," she said.

the criteria for swing counties in the previous two elections, but each has become more diverse since the decade began.

cade began.

Some states are more competitive than others, and many of the counties remained overwhelmingly white. But given the closeness of the past two presidential elections, even small changes could make a difference in competitive states.

For example, Lake County, just northeast of Cleveland, is still 92 percent white. But since the start of the decade, the number of Latinos has grown by 73 percent and the black population has increased by 47 percent. The number of non-Latino Caucasians has dropped slightly in a county that President Bush narrowly won in 2000 and 2004.

Hillsborough County, N.H., home to Manchester, is still 89 percent white. But the number of Latinos has grown by 57 percent and the number of blacks has increased by 56 percent. The non-Latino Caucasian population has increased by just 2 percent in a county that Bush barely won twice.

The nation's minority population has grown through higher birthrates and immigration. As a result, the share of minorities increased between 2000 and 2007 in every state but Hawaii and the District of Columbia.


