A Pura Trompada

debiera sorprendernos, porque así se eligió ahora busca su reelección, pero de alguna manera la andanada de ataques contra la comunidad inmigrante de parte de Donald El Trompas Trump nos ha agarrado medio desprevenidos.

Empezó hace un par de meses, con el famoso tuit de que "la próxima semana la Migra va a deportar dos millones de ilegales". Era tan absurdo que hasta la Migra misma lo desmintió, pero causó pánico entre las comunidades que no se enteraron de la desmentida sino solamente del mensaie original. difundido a pasto por los medios comerciales de comunicación. Pocos de esos medios publicaron el desmentís de la Migra, porque los ratings dependen del pánico, y los precios de los anuncios dependen de los ratings, así que mientras más espantada la gente mejor para los medios.

Siguió, dos semanas después, con una supuesta mega-operación sobre "mil 600 familias", personas con órdenes de arresto pendientes y órdenes de deportación incumplidas, personas que perdieron sus casos de inmigración o firmaron "salidas voluntarias" aparentemente nunca se fueron. Al final de dos semanas de "operativos" a domicilio, arrestaron a un gran total de unas 160 personas, un escaso diez por ciento de lo anunciado.

Pero atemorizaron a decenas de miles. Los barrios latinos se vieron desiertos, sin gente en las calles, pocas ventas en las zonas comerciales, e incluso en algunos centros de trabajo hubo alto ausentismo.

Después vino la masacre de El Paso, cuando un blanco radical confesó haber manejado más de mil kilómetros para "ir a matar mexicanos" para "detener la invasión a Estados Unidos". Quiso quitarle culpas a El Trompas, diciendo que desde antes de que fuera presidente ya era tan imbécil y racista, pero sin duda el ambiente creado por el fulano de la Casa Blanca se presta para un acto barbárico de ese tamaño. El hecho sucedió bajo El Trompas en la Casa Blanca.

A los pocos días, vino la redada de las procesadoras de carne en Mississippi, con 680 detenidos en un solo día, la mayor en más de una década. Las dos acciones volvieron a sumir a la comunidad en la incertidumbre, en el pánico.

Hemos insistido en que 680 es apenitas el 0.006 por ciento de los indocumentados, equivalente a seis de cada cien mil, digamos 30 personas del total de mexicanos en Chicago, quinta ciudad del mundo con más paisanos de este país.

Y Muchos Golpes Bajos

💊 ero el punto de las trompadas no es su eficiencia o la estadística, sino causar el miedo y golpetear constantemente a los inmigrantes.

Estos días, El Trompas parece no llevar la batuta de las acciones, sino sus méndigos colaboradores, tal vez un poquito menos idiotas y más eficientes. Los últimos ataques son velados, casi discretos, pero más efectivos.

Por ejemplo, acaban de emitir una regla administrativa para mantener bajo detención indefinida a las familias migrantes mientras se tramitan sus

casos en las cortes de migración. eliminando el llamado "Acuerdo Flores". que establece los derechos de los menores de edad bajo custodia. Lograr ese acuerdo fue una batalla de 22 años en las cortes, y establece que los niños no pueden pasar más de 20 días detenidos y deben ser puestos a disposición de agencias gubernamentales de Servicios Humanos.

Afortunadamente Peter Schey, el abogado que ganó el acuerdo, está tratando de bloquear esta política administrativa.

Hay otras, como la decisión de que para obtener un certificado de nacionalidad habrá que comprobar la "residencia legal" en Estados Unidos, y que podría eliminarla para los hijos de ciudadanos que nazcan en otro país, lo cual incluye a diplomáticos y soldados.

Pero para mí el peor de todos los golpes bajos son las Cartas No Match del Seguro Social. El Trompas o sus corifeos administrativos le ordenaron a la SSA que mandara cartas a 577 mil patrones, advirtiéndoles que "algunos de sus trabajadores" tienen "discrepancias" en su información en la base de datos del Seguro Social.

A pesar de que las cartas dicen claramente que no están relacionadas con el estatus migratorio y que no debe tomarse ninguna acción laboral en contra de quienes tengan discrepancias, el pánico (esta vez de los patrones), los lleva a despedir gente por todos lados. La consecuencia es la pérdida de estabilidad, antigüedad laboral y beneficios, y que mucha gente termine sobre-explotada en agencias temporales. Es una forma de bajarle el precio a nuestra mano de obra.

Lo peor del caso es que es simple pelear contra las Cartas No Match, pero mucha gente no lo sabe, y la ignorancia está ayudando a El Trompas.

La bronca no está en si El Trompas se reelige o nó. La bronca está en si nos informamos y nos organizamos para devolverle las trompadas que deje para el futuro.

La mayoría de los migrantes en este país ya conocen y han vivido las ceremonias de Independencia en las plazas públicas de México, pero muchos de los niños nacidos en este país no han tenido la oportunidad de vivir esa experiencia. "Es todo un ejercicio el llegar a la plaza, comer antojitos mexicanos, participar en un juego de lotería, escuchar las bandas populares tocando y que salga la autoridad a dar el grito. Es algo muy placentero. El año pasado nos dimos cuenta cómo los papás explicaban a sus hijos lo que estaba pasando y nunca habían vivido. Se crea una interacción muy bonita entre la familia y todos terminan muy emocionados", destacó el entrevistado.

Es importante señalar que se eligió la iglesia Holy Redeemer porque está en el corazón del barrio mexicano a donde asiste mucha gente y el objetivo del Consulado es acercarse a la comunidad. "Anteriormente se realizaba una recepción oficial a donde

SPLC and ACLU win Preliminary Injunction to restore Access to Parole to Asylum

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept.5, 2019: The U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia has granted a preliminary injunction in a lawsuit challenging the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) illegal practice of denying parole to detained asylum-seekers who lawfully present themselves at official ports of entry.

In a blow to the Trump administration's sustained effort to criminalize asylum, U.S. District Judge James Boasberg granted a preliminary injunction in the case first filed on May 30, 2019, by the Southern Poverty Law Center (SPLC) and ACLU of Louisiana. Boasberg also granted the plaintiffs' motion for class certification and denied DHS' motion to dismiss.

The injunction requires DHS and the ICE New Orleans Field Office to imme diately restore the procedures of parole and access to parole, as mandated by DHS' own 2009 Parole Directive and the due process clause of the Fifth Amendment.

"Today's ruling is a decisive victory for the asylum-seekers our country has cruelly locked away and forgotten about," said SPLC Senior Supervising Attorney Luz López. "Since as early as 2017, our clients have been left to wither away in abhorrent detention centers hidden from the public eye, with no legal recourse. The district court today upheld the law and declared that DHS and ICE must comply with our nation's immigration laws and the Consti-

tution.'

Under the Trump administration, parole approvals for asylum-seekers have dropped sharply, despite a still-applicable 2009 policy directing ICE to release asylum-seekers who satisfy the legal requirements for asylum. The stark drop in parole is most apparent at the ICE New Orleans Field Office, where in 2016, it granted parole in 75.5 percent of cases. By 2018, however, the office granted parole in just two of 130 cases in 2018 - a rate of 1.5 percent. Currently, the number of paroles granted in 2019 is down to zero.

"The denial of parole to lawful asylum-seekers underscores the brutality of our immigration system," said ACLU of Louisiana Staff Attorney Bruce Hamilton. "Our clients have endured dehumanizing treatment – from excessive solitary confinement to inadequate health care – all the while with virtually no hope of release."

The plaintiffs have been confined to remote prisons in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama. As the Trump administration weaponizes DHS and ICE to new extremes in its war on immigrants, these Southern states have played a critical role in ICE's rapid expansion and detention of a record number of migrants.

"The court confirmed today that asylum-seekers who follow the law have the right to seek parole before an immigration judge," said SPLC Southeast Immigrant Freedom Initiative Director Laura Rivera. "Now, we look forward to working with community members to provide the knowledge about how to submit parole applications. ICE must be held to its burden of giving meaningful consideration for detained people's request for parole.


Wallace had a very inquiring mind about science and the universe; he also loved to ride his Harley.

Go Red por tu Corazón is an American Heart Association initiative that celebrates the energy, passion and power of Latinas to unite and end heart disease, the leading cause of death among Latinas.

The Luncheon held on Sept. 5, 2019 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Sofia **Ouintero Art and Cultural** Center, educated Latinas about the risk factors and symptoms of heart disease and stroke and empower them to make small but significant lifestyle changes in their own lives and in the lives of their families.

Cardiovascular diseases are the leading cause of death for Latinas; on average, Latinas are likely to develop heart disease 10 years earlier than non-Latinas. Despite their risk, only 1 in 3 are aware that heart disease is their No. 1 killer.



Bringing 'The Voting Experience' to Tri-C

CLEVELAND: A student-led initiative to register voters and encourage participation in the political process swings into full campaign mode this month at *Cuyahoga Community College (Tri-C[®])*.

Se busca al mexicano Wilberth R. de León, desaparecido en Michigan Por: Isabel Flores, corresponsal La Prensa

DETROIT, MI, 12 IX 19: El mexicano Wilberth R. de León de 37 años de edad, se encuentra desparecido desde el pasado 5 de septiembre porlamañana. Vivíaen Rochester Hills, Michigan y trabajaba como ingeniero de software para la compañía automotriz alemana, Continental. Mide 5'9", ojos azules, no tiene tatuajes, vestía con pantalón de mezclilla y tenis negros.

Su esposa Cecilia Carrillo Preciado reportó de inmediato la desaparición de su marido a través del grupo de facebook Mexicanas en Michigan: "Mi esposo Wilberth R de Leon está desaparecido. A mi Wil, le gusta salir a caminar mientras se fuma un cigarro, pensando en la nada. Salió sin su cartera, con todas la tarjetas, sin identificaciones, sin efectivo, Sin sus cigarros ni encendedor, dejó la computadora del trabajo suspendida para volver a trabajar, el iba a volver a su casa. Esto fue en Rochester Hills, Michigan, entre 11:30am y 1:00pm. tiempo que vo salí a casa. Estamos viviendo aquí desde hace más de un año, pues la compañía para la que él trabaja en Guadalajara lo requirió en esta área, estamos aquí legalmente.

Ya estoy en un punto de no saber que más hacer, el día de ayer la búsqueda por parte de la policía inició, con el uso de helicópteros. Ya no se que más hacer, lo único que le pido a Dios con toda mi alma, es que mi amor, mi Wil ya regrese a mi lado".

De inmediato la comunidad hispana se solidarizó con Cecilia y comenzaron a compartir la publicación de la desaparición de Wil; asimismo contactaron a todos los medios de comunicación posibles para dífundir la noticia.

Para el día lunes 9 de septiembre la noticia va se encontraba en la mavoría de los medios de comunicación de México. Por su parte, el Consulado de México en Detroit emitió un comunicado en donde se une a la solidaridad de la comunidad mexicana en Michigan ante el lamentable caso del señor Wilberth R. de León, ciudadano mexicano reportado como desaparecido en la ciudad de Rochester Hills, Michigan.

"Desde el momento en que el Consulado tuvo conocimiento del caso se ha mantenido en constante comunicación con los familiares y se notificó de inmediato al *Alcalde Bryan K. Barnett*, quien facilitó todos los recursos a su

alcance para las tareas de búsqueda y localización vía terrestre y aérea en las á r e a s reportadas. Asimismo,

n u e s t r o departamento de Protección el apoyoen los esfuerzos de búsqueda en hospitales y centros de detención, así como en g e sti o n e s particulares solicitadaspor

los familiares

del desaparecido. Esperamos que las tareas de búsqueda permitan el pronto regreso de Wilberth a su hogar", destaca el comunicado.

Wilberth Ricardo de León Anaya se encontraba ese día realizando trabajo desde casa y su esposa Ceci había salido, cuando regresó noto la ausencia de su marido e imaginó que se había ido a recorrer el sendero para despejarseunpoco, como suele hacerlo; sin embargo, pronto comenzó a preocuparse y aque tardaba demasiado.

"Comencé a preocuparme mucho, cuando no daba tono su teléfono ya que nunca apaga su celular desde que estamos casados (hace dos años) y observé que en la mesa había dejado su cartera con el dinero, las tarjetas bancarias y sus identificaciones", contó Cece en entrevista a un medio de comunicación de México.

Luego de más de tres horas sin saber de su paradero, Cecilia llamó a sus familiares y amigos para ver si alguien había tenido contacto con Wil, al enterarse de la negativa, de inmediato solicitó los videos de la calle en donde vive a los administradores del fraccionamiento, sin embargo, no había cámaras activas. Luego de que llegó la policía de Rochester Hills buscaron por el sendero donde Wil hace sus caminatas, llamado Clinton River Trail, sin éxito.

Hasta su casa también llegaron detectives, entre ellos, *David Schrader*, enviados por la policía local para revisar si había algo inusual en la casa, como cerraduras forcejeadas, pero todo estaba normal.

Cecilia solicitó el apoyo de las autoridades en México y de la compañía telefónica para lograr obtener más pistas sobre el posible paradero de su esposo, ya que se enteró que hubo actividad de datos en el celular de AT&T México, que usaba la última vez que se vio,

> > y desde el que entraron tres llamadas 60 horas después de su desaparición y hubo actividad en Facebook, sin embargo la empresa telefónica continúa sin liberar geolocalización del aparato, debido a las restricciones judiciales que se tienen en el país de otorgar este tipo de información.

Los operadores de la empresa telefónica le comentaron que para obtener la geolocalización era necesario presentar una denuncia en México, sobre la desaparición de su marido. Es por ello que Ceci acudió con el Cónsul de México en Detroit, Fernando González Saiffe, para solicitar una carta consular, en la que se informara a la empresa telefónica sobre la situación. Documento que se entregó el mismo día. Sin embargo, AT&T México le explicó a Cecilia que era insuficiente la carta consular y la única forma en la que estaba autorizado para liberar la geolocalización del móvil era con la orden judicial. Entonces, el hermano de Wil, Ignacio de León Anaya, tuvo que acudir a un Ministerio Público en León. Guanajuato, de donde son originarios, para conseguir un acta de denuncia por parte de la FGR, con la finalidad de tener algunas pistas que ayuden a localizarlo.

Al cierre de esta edición, nos fue imposible localizar a Cecilia pero en su última publicación realizada a las 5:02pm comentó: "Vinieron los detectives y me dijeron que Wil está en este punto a una milla a la redonda (la publicación muestra un mapa con un punto de ubicación cerca de Rochester Hills Fire Department), ya voy en camino a buscarlo, las necesito mis mexicanas!!!!" por lo que de inmediato se formo un grupo de búsqueda. Estaremos pendientes para informar oportunamente.

US to use fake social media to check people entering country

August 30, 2019 (AP): U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services officers can now create fictitious social media accounts to monitor social media information on foreigners seeking visas, green cards and citizenship.

An updated Homeland Security Department review of potential privacy issues dated July 2019 that was posted online on Friday essentially reversed a prior ban on officers creating fake profiles.

A USCIS statement explaining the change says fake accounts and identities will make it easier for investigators to search for potential evidence of fraud or security concerns as they decide whether to allow someone entry into the U.S.

The change in policy was preceded by other steps taken by the State Department, which began requiring applicants for U.S. visas to submit their social media usernames this past June, a vast expansion of the Trump administration's enhanced screening of potential immigrants and visitors.

It's unclear exactly how the creation of fake social media accounts would work given policies of platforms like Facebook and Twitter, which both specifically state that impersonation $_$ pretending to be someone other than yourself-violates their terms of use.

Twitter and Facebook recently shut down numerous accounts believed to be operated by the Chinese government using their platforms under false identities for information operations.

"It is against our policies to use fake personae

WASHINGTON, DC, and to use Twitter data for persistent surveillance of individuals. We look forward to understanding USCIS's proposed practices to determine whether they are consistent with our terms of service," according to a Twitter statement. Facebook did not immediately provide comment

> Such a review of social media would be conducted by officers in the agency's Fraud Detection and National Security Directorate on cases flagged as requiring more investigation. The privacy assessment notes that officers can only review publicly available social media available to all users on the platform—they can-not "friend" or "follow" an individual-and must undergo annual training.

> The officers are also not allowed to interact with users on the social media sites and can only passively review information, according to the DHS document.

While lots of social media activity can be viewed without an account, many platforms limit access without one.

Dave Maass, senior investigative researcher for the civil liberties advocacy group Electronic Frontier Foundation, said such use of fake accounts "undermines our trust in social media companies and our ability to communicate and organize and stay in touch with people.'

He added: "It can't be this double standard where police can do it, but members of the general public can't."

Mike German, a retired FBI agent and a fellow in the Brennan Center for Justice's Liberty and National Security program said it's important for strong guidelines to be in place and for lawmakers to ask lots of questions to

ensure there are no abuses.

"It's easy to conjure up a use where the use is appropriate and entirely necessary, but also where it could be abused," German said. "It should only be used in cases where absolutely necessary.

In January 2017, former Homeland Security Department Secretary Jeh Johnson issued a privacy impact update giving authority to USCIS to "conduct law enforcement activities including but not limited to accessing internet and publicly available social media content using a fictitious account or identity.

But a privacy impact assessment was required to be completed first.

Reached by phone on Friday, Johnson declined to comment.

Bipartisan support for additional background checks involving social media was initially spurred by the fallout of the 2015 San Bernardino attack, which resulted in 14 people's deaths.

In that case, the shooter Syed Rizwan Farook's wife Tashfeen Malik gained entry to the U.S. on a fiancée visa-a process that did not involve a social media check.

The day after the attack. Facebook found a post on a page maintained by Malik pledging her and Farook's allegiance to the leader of the Islamic State group. The page was under an alias. Authorities have said Malik and Farook exchanged messages about jihad and martyrdom online before they were married and while she was living in Pakistan.

The two ultimately died in a gun battle with police. AP Writer Elliot Spagat in San Diego contributed to this report.

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
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
