Vicente Fox says racism holding up immigration accord in U.S.

NEW YORK (AP): Former Mexican President Vicente Fox said Oct. 8, 2007 that the United States is letting racism dictate its policies, especially when it comes to immigration.

"The xenophobics, the racists, those who feel they are a superior race ... they are deciding the future of this nation," he said, without naming names, in an interview with The Associated Press.

In his first interview to promote his new book, "Revolution of Hope," Fox applauded President Bush's desire to pass an immigration accord that would allow more Mexicans to work legally in the U.S.


But he criticized Bush for failing to pass the promised reform.

"There was always a reason for why it couldn't be done. It is not possible because of the elections. He couldn't touch the topic because this election is very important, or because security was more important," Fox said.

"So, when are they going to finally address it? It needs to be resolved."

Fox said he hopes his new book, written in English, helps Americans understand the Mexican point of view on immigration.

"To be so repressive isn't democratic or free ... to be putting up fences, chasing Mexicans, that isn't right," Fox said. "The U.S. needs better answers

than repression, weapons and violence."

Fox also talked about his sometimes rocky relationship with Bush, a man he calls a "windshield cowboy" in his book.

Both men had worked together as governors of influential agricultural states in Mexico and the U.S. They began their presidential terms in office nearly eight years ago with close relations, and Bush even made a visit to Fox's central Mexican ranch his first foreign trip as president in early 2001.

But they split ways on Iraq, after Fox refused to back the impending war.

"There are important differences between myself and President Bush, including the case of Iraq and other topics where we think and act differently," Fox said.

Fox also denied media and opposition allegations of illicit wealth that have arisen in México, after a celebrity magazine published photos of his newly renovated ranch. He said the accusations were made "without any evidence."

"It's just yellow journalism," he said.

Fox said he hopes his new book, written in English, helps Americans understand the Mexican point of view on immigration.

"To be so repressive isn't democratic or free ... to be putting up fences, chasing Mexicans, that isn't right," Fox said. "The U.S. needs better answers

Missouri lawmakers disturbed by racial inequity in earmarks

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8, 2007 (AP): Two Missouri lawmakers are concerned about new data that show white lawmakers seem to have an advantage over their black and Latino colleagues in U.S. Congress when it comes to funding for pet projects, or "earmarks."

Of more than \$4.2 billion in earmarks included in bills passed by the House and Senate this year, a recent analysis found the average white Democrat got \$12 million in special projects. That's about twice as much as the \$6.1 million for black Democrats and \$5.7 million for Latino Democrats.

Democratic Rep. William Lacy Clay, of St. Louis, calls the 2-to-1 difference unacceptable and is asking the Congressional Black Caucus to look at ways to close the gap.

"How did we get to a point where a sizable percentage of Democrats gets half of what everybody else gets?" Clay said Monday. "There's something wrong with this process. I don't know what it is."

Even with Democrats in the majority in Congress, Republican lawmakers still received more in earmarks—an average of \$8.7 million per lawmaker—than black and Latino Democrats, according to the analysis by *Congressional Quarterly* using data compiled by the watchdog group *Taxpayers for Common Sense*.

Rep. Emanuel Cleaver, a Kansas City Democrat who also is a member of the Congressional Black Caucus, says the current system favors the most powerful members of the House.

"Double and triple the money goes to those who sit on the appropriations committees," Cleaver said. "Members of the CBC get less than most members and often we represent urban districts in the most need of federal dollars."

The House Appropriations Committee currently has 37

licans in either the House or Senate.

Information about which lawmakers requested specific earmarks is now easier to locate under new disclosure rules that Congress passed earlier this year. The change requires every earmark in a bill to identify who requested it.

Clay suggested one way to fix the disparity is adding more black lawmakers to the powerful House Appropriations Committee, which oversees federal spending requests. He called the idea "a starting point" rather than a formal proposal.

"I put all options on the table," Clay said. "I'm not dead set on any one solution, I'm looking for fairness and equity in this process."

He said the CBC would discuss the matter, decide what the options are and take it up with Democratic leadership.

LA police report faults training, tactics in immigration rally

LOS ANGELES (AP): A pro-immigration rally in Los Angeles that led to police swinging batons and firing non-lethal weapons at protesters and journalists was the result of problems in planning, training and policy, a police report released Oct. 9, 2007 said.

During the May 1, 2007 confrontation, police had several chances to stop the violence, the report said.

"Instead, the failing leadership, breakdown in supervision and breakdown in personal discipline caused those without full situational awareness to take action without understanding how their decisions might affect the final outcome," the report to the city's civilian Police Commission concluded.

"The larger issue was the fact that not a single supervisor or member of the command staff involved attempted to intervene," the

report said.

The clash broke out after officers reported being targeted by people throwing rocks and bottles. No one was seriously hurt, but the city is facing hundreds of lawsuits.

Chief William J. Bratton has expressed concerns over the actions and demoted two commanders who oversaw the incident.

The report did not address how officers involved should be disciplined. That is being handled in a separate police process.

The report recommended that the police department improve communication between commanders and officers during public events. It also suggested putting officers' names or serial numbers on their helmets and vests to make them more easily identifiable.

All of the recommendations will be implemented by the department within a year, the report said.





In all, members of the Appropriations Committee currently won

45 percent of earmarked money in spending bills passed this year.

Democratic leaders in the House have not yet commented on the study. A spokesman for House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., did not immediately return a request for comment.

Bush aboga por TLC y prisioneros en Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP): El presidente George W. Bush pidió el miércoles (el 10 de oct. de 2007) al Congreso la aprobación de los tratados bilaterales de libre comercio con Perú, Colombia y Panamá y le demandó al gobierno cubano "la libertad de todos los prisioneros políticos".

Bush abogó particularmente por José Luis García Peneque, un médico cubano que cumple 24 años de prisión por su oposición al régimen comunista, y con cuya esposa, Yamile Llanes, se entrevistó poco antes en su despacho de la Casa Blanca.

"El no representa ninguna amenaza para ustedes", dijo Bush hablando en el Jardín de las Rosas en una actividad como parte de las celebraciones por el mes de la herencia hispana en Estados Unidos.

Israel "Cachao" López, de 89 años, el famoso músico y compositor cubano, ganador de varios premios Grammy, tuvo a su cargo el espectáculo musical desarrollado ante más de 100 personas, entre las que estuvieron la señora Llanes, el secretario de Justicia Alberto González

y la representante comercial estadounidense Susan Schwab.

Bush aprovechó la presencia de Schwab para recordar que en los últimos 30 meses se ha dado un crecimiento sostenido del empleo en Estados Unidos debido a un florecimiento del comercio exterior y que era necesario mantener ese crecimiento con "una economía abierta".

"Muchas empresas de origen hispano en nuestro país dependen del comercio con Latinoamérica", dijo. "El libre comercio fortalece no sólo la relación comercial sino la amistad".

Recordó que con ese propósito, durante su gobierno Estados Unidos ha negociado varios tratados con países latinoamericanos y mencionó especialmente al de los países centroamericanos que también incluye a República Dominicana como "un acuerdo que está dando buenos resultados".

Dijo que ese acuerdo, conocido como CAFTA-RD y que Costa Rica acaba de aprobar en un referéndum, ha sido favorable para los trabajadores estadounidenses y para acentuar la presencia de Estados Unidos "en su propio vecindario".

"Por eso hemos negociado

nuevos acuerdos con Perú, Colombia y Panamá en aras de nuestras empresas, nuestra prosperidad y nuestros vecinos", dijo. "El Congreso de Estados Unidos necesita aprobar esos acuerdos muy importantes".

Esta es la segunda vez en dos días que el gobierno pide al Congreso aprobar estos tratados. El martes lo hizo la secretaría de Estado Condoleezza Rice hablando en la Organización de los Estados Americanos (OEA) sobre la política regional de Bush.

El tratado con Perú tiene gestión más avanzada y fuentes legislativas esperan su aprobación antes de concluir el año. Luego, dijeron, seguiría Panamá y al final Colombia, aun cuando el debate de este último era por ahora incierto en cuanto a fechas.

Chile: fortuna de Pinochet proviene de armas y gastos reservados

SANTIAGO DE CHILE (AP): El Consejo de Defensa del Estado (CDE) afirmó el jueves que el ex dictador Augusto Pinochet acumuló su fortuna con dineros provenientes de gastos reservados del gobierno y con comisiones por la compra y venta de armas.

El juez Carlos Cerda estableció que a lo largo de los años Pinochet acumuló 28 millones de dólares, de los cuales no pudo acreditar el origen de 20 millones de dólares, los que fueron aprovechados por él, su viuda y sus cinco hijos, a quienes el magistrado procesó hace una semana por malversación.

La muerte de Pinochet el 10 de diciembre, a los 91 años, causó el cierre del juicio por malversación que pesaba en su contra, pero el proceso siguió adelante para el resto de los involucrados.

El origen de la riqueza "son los fondos reservados, que son fondos

del Estado de Chile y el otro origen son comisiones por contratos del ejército relacionados con compra o venta de armas, pero allí también hay perjuicio fiscal", aseveró la procuradora del CDE, María Teresa Muñoz.

Pinochet tuvo acceso a los dineros de gastos reservados del gobierno entre 1973 y 1990, años en los que actuó como Presidente, y conoció en detalle las compraventas de armas del ejército desde 1973 a 1998, año en que dejó la comandancia en jefe de la institución.

La funcionaria alegó contra los recursos de amparo de la familia de Pinochet y de otros 17 allegados al ex dictador que buscan anular los procesamientos, entre los que se encuentran seis generales retirados y dos coroneles activos.

Muñoz dijo que el albacea de Pinochet, Oscar Aitken, y el hijo menor del militar, Marco Antonio Pinochet Hiriart, fueron los principales administradores

de las cuentas y las empresas de papel que el dictador mantuvo ocultas en Estados Unidos y en paraísos fiscales.

Según la investigación del Senado estadounidense, Pinochet mantuvo 125 cuentas bancarias secretas por las que pasaron millones de dólares y que sólo fueron descubiertas el 2004.

El abogado Pablo Rodríguez, defensor de la viuda Lucía Hiriart, pidió al juez Cerda que renuncie al caso, que tenga "un gesto de grandeza moral". También lo acusó de ser parcial.

Un premio que Cerda recibió el miércoles en Washington por su labor judicial reavivó las iras de los procesados y sus abogados, que han multiplicado las peticiones de renuncia.

Se estima que el pronunciamiento de la Corte de Apelaciones sobre los recursos de amparo se conocerá la próxima semana.

Toledo-Lucas County Public Library places 2-mill replacement levy on November ballot

The Toledo-Lucas County Public Library Board of Trustees will ask voters to approve a 5-year, 2-mill replacement levy on November 6, 2007. The levy will help the Library better cope with its current financial situation. Library finances have been impacted substantially by a state funding freeze at 2002 levels and steadily increasing costs.

The Board of Trustees approved this action at its special meeting today (July 6, 2007).

The Library's two existing one mil property tax levies (one from 1997 and the other from 2003) expire at the end of 2007. The Library will combine the two existing levies into a 2-mill replacement levy.

"State funding has been frozen for our public library, so without the

additional funds generated by this levy, our system will be dismantled," said *Clyde Scoles*, Library Director.

"Our public library is a true community resource, and the proposed replacement levy will fund existing services at a more realistic level. The reality is certain. For our system to continue as the community's gift to itself, we must compensate for the losses of the past six years, while maintaining growth today and support for the future. Unfortunately, the alternative to the levy will be drastic cuts from which we may never recover," said Scoles.

This replacement levy will provide \$18.3 million annually, costing the owner of a \$100,000 home a total of \$61.25 a year.

The levy will take effect in January 2008 and expire in December 2012.

With passage of the levy,

the library plans to:

- Increase the book budget
 - Continue staffing levels
 - Maintain upkeep of facilities and buildings (i.e. carpet, paint, utilities)
 - Replace and increase computer technology
 - Maintain Sunday hours at five locations (Main Library, Sanger, Heatherdowns, Sylvania and Oregon).
- "We would not come to our loyal patrons for assistance in passing this 2-mill replacement levy, unless it was absolutely necessary to continue the library service the residents of Lucas County have long enjoyed," said Scoles. *For more details, please call 419.259.5267 or 419.259.5381.*



Ohio: Estudiante advirtió sobre el ataque

CLEVELAND (AP): Un estudiante dijo el jueves (el 11 de oct. de 2007) que tanto él como sus compañeros le habían advertido a la rectora de la escuela sobre amenazas hechas por el estudiante que le disparó e hirió a otros cuatro antes de suicidarse, y cree que el ataque pudo haber sido evitado.

El estudiante, Rasheen Smith, de 15 años, dijo en el programa informativo de la mañana "Early Show" de la cadena de televisión CBS, que a pesar de sus advertencias sobre el estudiante Asa H. Coon que abrió fuego contra otros estudiantes el miércoles, la rectora de la escuela SuccessTech Academy, Johnneita Durant, les dijo que ella estaba muy ocupada para atenderlos.

"Le dije a mis amigos de la clase que él estaba armado y todo eso", dijo Smith. "Hablabla de hacerlo la semana pasada. No sé por qué no dijeron nada", anotó.

"Hablamos con la rectora. Trataba de reunirnos a todos en la oficina, pero siempre decía que estaba muy ocupada para hacerlo", dijo Smith.

En el programa de televisión también estuvo el director ejecutivo del distrito escolar, Eugene Sanders, quien dijo que el distrito estará investigando el caso. "Durante el curso del día de hoy mañana vamos a estudiar toda la situación, tomaremos una determinación sobre lo que con seguridad sucedió, y después veremos cuáles deben ser las debidas recomendaciones para poder seguir adelante el lunes", sostuvo Sanders.

Un mensaje dejado en la

oficina de Durant no ha sido respondido. Una llamada telefónica a su casa tampoco fue respondida.

Coon, armado con dos revólveres calibre 38, abrió fuego hiriendo a dos estudiantes y dos profesores. El estudiante tenía un historial de problemas mentales y se le conocía por ser grosero con los profesores y ser pendenciero con los estudiantes.

La policía encontró un bolso deportivo con municiones y tres cuchillos en un baño, pero no hallaron una nota de suicidio, dijo el jefe de la policía Michael McGrath.

Coon quien era blanco en una escuela que en su mayoría son negros, y se vestía estilo gótico con abrigo negro y cadenas al cuello, había sido suspendido el lunes por pelear, le advirtió a sus compañeros sobre el ataque pero nadie lo tomó en serio.

La estudiante Frances Henderson no creyó que el ataque haya sido motivado por diferencias raciales. "Cuando los suspendieron, decía cosas como 'les tengo algo para todos ustedes'", anotó.

"Es un loco. Amenazó con volar nuestra escuela. Amenazaba a todos con apuñalarlos", dijo Doneisha LeVert, de 14 años. "Ni le paramos", anotó.

Cuando Coon tenía 12 años lo acusaron de violencia doméstica en un juicio para menores. Su madre, Lori, llamó a la policía y le dijo que su hijo la había abofeteado y la había llamado de una forma vulgar. Ella estaba tratando de intervenir en una pelea entre Coon y su hermana gemela, según reporta el diario The Plain Dealer.



El año pasado fue suspendido por intentar de hacerle daño a otro estudiante, dice el diario.

Al primero que le disparó fue al estudiante de 14 años Michael Peek que había golpeado a Coon en la cara antes de que comenzara la balacera, dijo Smith.

Darnell Rodgers, de 18 años, dijo que se había dado cuenta que estaba herido cuando sintió que su brazo le hervía.

El profesor de historia Michael Grassie, de 42 años, tuvo que ser hospitalizado y se encontraba en condición delicada el miércoles después de haber sido sometido a una cirugía que duró casi 90 minutos.

El profesor de matemáticas David Kachadourian, fue atendido por una herida menor en el hombro, dijo no sabía que razón pudiera tener Coon para atacarlo.

"Jamás me sentí amenazado o personalmente en riesgo. Si me preocupaba él, sí", dijo Kachadourian. "Parecía ser un joven mal humorado. Yo no temía por mi propia seguridad", anotó.

La escuela SuccessTech Academy se encuentra frente a las oficinas del FBI en el centro de Cleveland, y tiene unos 240 estudiantes de raza negra en su mayoría, y un pequeño número de alumnos blancos e hispanos.

La escuela, que abrió sus puertas hace 5 años, es una de secundaria alternativa en el distrito escolar de Cleveland, especializada en la enseñanza de tecnología y materias empresariales.



Lhasa, Tibet

The price we pay when we ignore the meaning of ‘Free Tibet!’

At the end of the summer of 2007, in México City, a weeklong celebration took place between México and China for their 35 years of diplomatic relations. There were Chinese cultural shows organized by the embassy to celebrate the on-going relationship between México and China since 1972.

China's President Hu Jintao and México's President Felipe Calderón marked the anniversary of partnership in trade and co-operative political and economic exchanges. On the last day of the celebration, a small cluster of México's Tibetan Support Group protested the square yelling “Free Tibet!”

The United States and México have presently been engaging in close trade, cultural, and economic relations with China. Every once in a while, somewhere in the distant background or on a passing bumper sticker we see the phrase “Free Tibet!”

Do we know what this phrase means and the ongoing struggle of Tibet's freedom from China? To get a

better idea of the role China has played in the control of religious and cultural freedom, I visited Tibet to see for myself what lies behind this phrase that we hear occasionally but have little idea of what the people, land, and culture of Tibet actually looks like and why it is at stake.

The location of the *Tibetan Autonomous Region* is a mountainous land that borders China, India, and Nepal. China claims that Tibet is part of their country but it has a history of people, who live very different lives, speak their own language, and identify themselves as their own people.

As China undergoes a rapid development in becoming one of world's largest manufacturers in exported goods ranging from clothing, electronics, plastics, and steel, its identity as a newly capitalist country is having an extreme effect on the culture of the local Tibetans.

As published on the *Government of Tibet in Exile's* website [www.tibet.com],

the Chinese government has increased its authority in Tibet, “the manifest objective, however, is to strengthen political control and to make rural Tibet look modern and therefore more presentable to the outside world.”

Even the government's website is entitled “The Government of Tibet in Exile,” since the *Dalai Lama* is currently in exile and has relocated to India. Along with the Dalai Lama, over 250,000 Tibetans, one-tenth of the population, has been relocated into new government housing at “their own expense and without their consent.”

What “Free Tibet!” means is to give Tibet the support in regaining their freedom of religion, cultural practices, nomadic life, and the ability to identify their region as autonomous from China. Tibet and their challenge to regain control of their land and culture from China are ongoing struggles. Many Tibetans walk on foot to India, where the Dalai Lama now resides in exile.

I came to visit this location at a very critical time because the Chinese government has gained a lot of control of this region and is developing within it very quickly. The changes are not just ones a person can see visually, such as new buildings, structures, and huge Chinese government buildings within the region, but this drastically changes the culture too.

The Chinese government has built roads and housing for the Tibetan locals, which has made a big change on their lifestyle. Many Tibetans are nomads who follow the animals and the seasons through the mountains and terrain. Living in government housing is something very new to them. The Chinese government's perspective

is that they are doing something beneficial for the Tibetans; however the Tibetans believe that the Chinese government is trying to control their region and their culture.


The presence of the Chinese government is very visible here and the main city of Tibet, Lhasa, is looking more and more like an ordinary Chinese city. The blue sky is a contrast to most coal-dust and smog-ridden cities that lie under heavy clouds of pollution. The Himalayas give a holy-presence that is now being crowded by buildings and Chinese shopping centers below. Besides the numerous amounts of Chinese stores, restaurants, and hotels, which are transforming Tibet into what looks like another Chinese city, the presence of walls around government buildings and property convey the attendance of the Chinese government in Tibet.

As I drove past some new houses along the side of the road, I said to my local friend, Darje, “those houses look nice, are they new?” He told me that the Chinese government paid for about 80% of these houses for people to live in and although the thought of it seems pleasant, most of the Tibetan farmers who are occupying the houses are actually nomads.

The change from being a nomad to having to live in a house is a way in which the government can gain control of them and also the education of their children since now their children must go to school rather than follow the nomadic paths of their parents and ancestors. Darje expressed how this change of the residence affects their whole sub-culture because these nomads are used to following the animals and the seasons, and not having to live in one place throughout all seasons.

When I observed the struggles of the Tibetan people, I realize the superpowers of the world make it more difficult for local people of every land to continue on with their ways of life and maintain their culture. As the world becomes more modern, the walls to keep out immigrants seem to grow taller, wider, and more numerous, though in contrast, currency, products, and foreign labor for large corporations between countries seems to permeate with no problem.

In comparison to México, the U.S. plays an even larger role in the economic growth of China. It is easy to point the finger and single-out a country or a politician without realizing, collectively,

many of us are a part of the globalization that results in the trade of some of the diminishment of our world's most beautiful land and people, in exchange for cheaper products, electronics, clothing, and more consumer wants.

With the support of the consumers in our nations and other nations who continue to express the demand for products, which contributes to the growth of super power countries, we must keep in mind the value of what's at stake for our material wants.

Iglesias is speaker at TBA's Kiroff Seminar

David C. Iglesias, former United States Attorney for the District of New Mexico, was a speaker on Oct. 12, 2007 at the Toledo Bar Association's annual Bench Bar Conference and Kiroff Seminar at the Toledo Riverfront Hotel.

His topic was "What Happens When Discovery Goes Wrong?" but the theme of his delivery was the political firings of eight U.S. Attorneys by former Attorney General Alberto González, who subsequently resigned.

Iglesias was one of numerous U.S. attorneys at the center of the Justice Department's (DOJ's) controversial "forced resignations," which eventually led to the resignation of González.

Iglesias left the DOJ on March 1, 2007, and subsequently testified before the U.S. Senate and House concerning the US Attorney General scandal. He has appeared on CNN, Fox News, MSNBC, *Hardball with Chris Matthews*, *CBS Evening News with Katie Couric*, *Meet the Press with Tim Russert*, NPR radio, and other venues.

Iglesias was born in Panama in a tri-cultural and tri-lingual missionary family. He was raised in Oklahoma and served as a state assistant attorney general (special prosecutions), and leading legal offices in the Albuquerque City Attorney's office, New Mexico Risk Management, and the Taxation and Revenue Department.

Iglesias was selected as a White House Fellow for the 1994-1995 year. Iglesias was one of the 17 fellows selected from more than 1,250 applications. He was a special assistant to the US Secretary of Transportation. In 1998, Iglesias was the Republican

nominee for New Mexico Attorney General.

Iglesias returned to active duty in late 1999 for two months where he served on staff at Fifth Fleet Headquarters in Bahrain, and onboard the aircraft carrier, USS John F. Kennedy in the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Southern Watch. Iglesias is a reserve captain in the US Navy where he serves as Staff Judge Advocate for Readiness Command Southwest in San Diego. He was selected as "Reserve Officer of the Year, US Special Operations Command, 2001."

In 2001, George W. Bush nominated Iglesias and the U.S. Senate confirmed him to become United States Attorney for the District of New Mexico. Iglesias is married and the father of four children.

ALBERT ARMENDARIZ SR

EL PASO, Texas (AP): Judge Albert Armendariz Sr., a leader of the Latino civil rights movement who helped found the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund, has died. He was 88. Armendariz died of natural causes Oct. 4, 2007 at a hospital in Brownsville TX where he had been vacationing, his family said. Armendariz started his activism in 1951 with the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) and served as the advocacy group's national president in 1954. In the late 1960s, Armendariz and other attorneys helped found MALDEF to address education and civil rights issues. He was chairman of the board of trustees from 1968 to 1971. Armendariz worked to defend the rights of Latino and immigrants until his death, MALDEF said. Born in El Paso, Armendariz was drafted at the start of World War II and spent four years at Fort Bliss' motor pool. Like many other Latinos in the military at the time, Armendariz focused on fighting discrimination at home after finishing his service. He attended what is now the University of Texas-El Paso before graduating from the University of Southern California law school. He worked as an immigration judge from 1976 to 1985, and later was appointed to the Texas Court of Appeals.

RICHARD D. HERNÁNDEZ

Richard D. Hernández, 46, of Lorain, OH, died Saturday, Oct. 13, 2007, at his sister's residence in Lorain, under the care of New Life Hospice, following a brief illness. He was born on March 31, 1961, in Lorain and had been a lifelong resident. Hernández was employed as pipefitter at Standard Pipe and did roofing work as well. He attended the St. Mary's Church in Lorain. He enjoyed swimming, fishing, football and wrestling. Survivors include his son, Richard A. Hernández; sister, Lila Rice of Lorain; one grandchild; two nieces; one nephew; two great-nephews and two great-nieces. reached goals such as playing violin in Carnegie Hall.

"This is the first time the university has marketed in any kind of large-scale way," said spokeswoman Gina Calcamuggio.

Kent State University is marketing through the Internet site *YouTube*. Videos for the site feature Frank Squirrel, a male student dressed as a giant squirrel that has become Kent State's unofficial mascot.

"It's all about making a connection," Kent State spokesman Tom Neumann said.

Bowling Green State University relies mostly on TV ads and draws most of its students from northeast and northwest Ohio and from Columbus, said spokeswoman Kim McBroom.

The University of Cincinnati is into its second year of marketing di-

rectly to students with signs and public announcements at 100 Ohio high schools, including 25 in Columbus and its suburbs.

"We know we have statewide appeal, but we want students and their parents to know that we're one of the top 25 research universities in the country with more than 500 majors or paths to choose from," spokeswoman Greg Vehr said.

LaToya Johnson, whose 16-year-old grandson, Michael, attends Brookhaven High School in Columbus, said one of the school's ads caught her attention.

"It's one more college my grandson can consider when he's browsing college Web sites and planning college visits this year," she said.


Lethal Weapon star Danny Glover to speak at Lourdes College
