

Argentina's first lady switches jobs with husband

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Oct. 29, 2007 (AP): President Nestor Kirchner and first lady Cristina Fernández will switch jobs in December after Argentines elected a female president for the first time and launched their country's most powerful political dynasty since Juan and Evita Perón.

Fernández is a lawyer and senator who followed her husband as he rose from an obscure governorship to the presidency, drawing comparisons to Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton. She will bring a feistier and more glamorous style to the Pink House, Argentina's presidential palace, in which she has already spent the last four years.

But it is unclear how much change she will bring. Analysts say her strong win gives Fernández an opportunity to right the problems of her husband's administration, including high inflation, an energy crisis and a shrinking budget surplus. Some warned her not to see it as an endorsement of all of Kirchner's policies.

In her victory speech Sunday night on Oct. 28, Fernández, 54, pledged not to let that happen.

"We have won amply," she said. "But this, far from putting us in a position of privilege, puts us instead in a position of greater responsibilities and obligations."

With more than 96 per-

cent of polling places reporting, Fernández had 45 percent of the vote, compared with 23 percent for former lawmaker Elisa Carrio and 17 percent for former Economy Minister Roberto Lavagna. Eleven others split the rest. Fernández needed 40 percent and a margin of 10 percentage points over the runner-up to avoid a runoff.

Carrio spokesman Matías Mendez said seven parties had filed a complaint alleging missing or stolen ballots. One representative of the ruling party was arrested on suspicion of trying to vote twice, and a judge extended voting by an hour in the capital because many polling stations opened late.

But no major problems were reported as Argentina's 27.1 million registered voters, in addition to the presidency, filled dozens of House and Senate seats and nine governorships. Vice President Daniel Scioli won the race for governor of Buenos Aires province, the country's second most powerful post.

Kirchner oversaw a dramatic recovery from a crippling 2001 economic crisis, repaying Argentina's entire \$9.5 billion debt to the International Monetary Fund, although critics say Argentina would be ripe for sustainable development if he had better managed the income from soaring commodity prices.

But while his accomplishments helped Fernández win

Fernández agradece triunfo a Kirchner; desea suerte a Hillary

BUENOS AIRES, el 28 de oct. de 2007 (AP): La presidenta electa Cristina Fernández, la primera en la historia argentina elegida por el voto popular, dijo el lunes que le debe su aplastante triunfo electoral a la gestión de su esposo Néstor Kirchner y admitió que le gustaría que Hillary Clinton tenga su misma suerte en las próximas elecciones en Estados Unidos.

En materia de política exterior, dijo que es necesario ampliar el Mercosur y buscar la complementación de las economías latinoamericanas, particularmente en materia energética.

En la primera entrevista que concedió tras su victoria en los comicios del domingo, Fernández aseguró que "ha sido un reconocimiento, no a mí, nunca me la he creído".

"Kirchner ha sido la nave insignia de este proyecto político como presidente de los argentinos, con su impronta, con sus aciertos y sus errores, pero con una impronta y una convicción formidables", declaró al programa político Desde el Llano, del canal Todo Noticias.

"He sido tributaria también de eso", agregó.

Fernández, de 54 años, obtuvo el 44,9% de los votos, seguida por la ex diputada

Elisa Carrió, de la opositora Coalición Cívica, con 23%, según datos oficiales.

El próximo 10 de diciembre su esposo le colocará la banda presidencial, en un hecho inédito en la historia del país y que probablemente no registre antecedentes a nivel Unidos.

El camino de Fernández hacia la presidencia ha provocado comparaciones con Hillary Clinton, especialmente desde la prensa internacional, por los rasgos comunes de la historia personal de ambas mujeres: abogadas, senadoras, conocieron a sus futuros maridos en la universidad y los acompañaron primero como gobernadores y luego presidentes.

Fernández, quien nunca ocultó su simpatía por la hoy precandidata del partido Demócrata, aseguró que "he estado con ella. Todo parece indicar que hoy es la favorita de los (norte)americanos. ¿Por qué no? Otra mujer no estaría mal".

Con respecto a la política exterior, destacó que en su futuro gobierno "nosotros tenemos que profundizar nuestro lugar en América Latina, ampliar el Mercosur, complementar nuestras economías, fundamentalmente en el tema de la energía, que es el gran tema del futuro. La ecuación energética de América Latina es fundamental".

Sobre el futuro de su marido cuando deje la presidencia, lo que ha sido objeto de múltiples conjeturas, descartó que vaya a convertirse en su "director de protocolo", como suele bromear el propio Kirchner, porque "es horrible, tiraría el vaso de agua sobre la alfombra".

"Va a hacer lo que siempre ha hecho, es un animal político. Es un hombre que ama profundamente la política, que ama profundamente su país y siente que tiene un gran compromiso con Argentina".

La senadora volvió a criticar a la prensa argentina porque "los medios de comunicación en lugar de informar correctamente al lector se convierten en un medio de posición". El matrimonio Kirchner ha mantenido una relación distante y por momentos de confrontación con los periodistas.

Dijo que se prestará al diálogo si "vuelven a ser medios de comunicación y no de posición. Sería bueno que los medios recuperaran el equilibrio, que hicieran una autocritica".

Por otra parte, la presidenta electa se mostró disgustada porque ninguno de los candidatos opositores le llamó para felicitarla por su triunfo, algo que sí hicieron la mayoría de

Chávez recibe a nuevo embajador EEUU

CARACAS, el 29 de oct. de 2007 (AP): El nuevo embajador de Estados Unidos en Venezuela, Patrick Dennis Duddy, manifestó el lunes su interés por mejorar las relaciones bilaterales entre Washington y Caracas, incluida la lucha contra el narcotráfico, en un encuentro con el mandatario venezolano Hugo Chávez.

Chávez no formuló declaraciones luego de recibir las cartas credenciales del diplomático estadounidense en el palacio de gobierno.

"Hablamos de una amplia gama de temas y nuestra determinación en trabajar en algunas áreas, incluyendo la del narcotráfico para el bienestar de ambos países y encontramos la manera de mejorar ambas relaciones", dijo Duddy a periodistas tras el encuentro.

Chávez, ordenó a mediados del 2005 paralizar el convenio con la Agencia Antidrogas de Estados Unidos (DEA, por sus siglas en inglés), alegando que algunos de sus miembros estaban implicados en "infiltraciones de inteligencia que amenazaban la seguridad y defensa del país".

Estados Unidos, por su parte, ha denunciado que el tráfico de drogas por Venezuela se ha incrementado en los últimos años debido a la falta de cooperación entre

las autoridades de ambas naciones, señalamiento que ha sido descartado por el gobierno venezolano.

Duddy, quien era subsecretario de Estado para Brasil, el Cono Sur y el Caribe, reemplaza a William Brownfield, embajador en Venezuela en los últimos tres años, que pasó a Colombia.

La misión diplomática de Brownfield en Caracas estuvo signada por la hostilidad creciente entre ambos gobiernos. Chávez trató de expulsarlo por lo menos en dos ocasiones, aseverando que interfería en asuntos de la soberanía venezolana.

Los gobiernos de Estados Unidos y Venezuela han mantenido fuertes fricciones durante los ocho años de mandato de Chavez.

El jefe de estado venezolano repetidamente ha acusado al gobierno de George W. Bush de haber promovido el fallido golpe del 2002, y de financiar a grupos opositores para desestabilizar su gobierno. Washington ha rechazado los alegatos.

A pesar de las tensiones políticas, Venezuela y Estados Unidos mantienen estrechas relaciones comerciales. La corporación estatal Petróleos de Venezuela S.A. (PDVSA) es una de las principales proveedoras de crudo y productos del mercado estadounidense.

Niños quedan traumatizados por redadas de indocumentados en EEUU

GRAND ISLAND, Nebraska (AP): Los miles de niños cuyos padres son arrestados en las redadas migratorias en Estados Unidos desarrollan problemas mentales como estrés post-traumático y ansiedad por separación y depresión, según un estudio divulgado el miércoles.

Por cada dos adultos detenidos en las redadas en centros de trabajo, un niño se queda sin al menos un progenitor, indicó el estudio del Urban Institute, que afirmó que la mayor parte de esos menores son estadounidenses o inmigrantes legales.

El documento, encargado por el Consejo Nacional de La Raza, un grupo defensor de los derechos civiles de los hispanos, concluye que el Congreso debe regular el procedimiento de las redadas y que el Servicio de Inmigración y Aduanas debe aplicar una política consecuente para liberar a los adultos detenidos a fin de minimizar el daño a sus hijos.

"Esos niños nacieron en Estados Unidos y olvidamos sus derechos en

el curso de las redadas, pues se quedaron sin sus padres", dijo Steve Joel, director de las escuelas públicas en Grand Island, que trató de conseguir que los padres mantuvieran a sus niños en la escuela luego de una redada en diciembre en la planta frigorífica de Swift & Co.

Los investigadores del estudio visitaron dos de las seis plantas procesadoras de carne donde fueron detenidas 1.300 personas en las redadas. En su mayoría, los arrestados provenían de México y Guatemala.

Los investigadores también visitaron New Bedford, Massachusetts, donde más de 360 obreros fueron arrestados en Michael Bianco Inc., una fábrica que hace equipos y atavíos para el ejército de Estados Unidos.

En los tres sitios estudiados los agentes arrestando a 900 presuntos indocumentados y 500 niños perdieron abruptamente todo contacto con su madre, su padre, o con ambos. Eso los dejó con una combinación de supervisión inestable, estrés, trauma y necesidades materiales que puede conducir a afecciones mentales, señaló el estudio.

El Congreso debe tomar mayor control sobre la forma como los funcionarios del

Servicio de Inmigración y Naturalización manejan las redadas en sitios de trabajo y el Servicio de Inmigración debe tener una política coherente para liberar a padres arrestados a fin de minimizar el daño a sus hijos, concluyó el estudio.

Agentes de inmigración liberaron a algunos de los padres detenidos para que atendieran a sus hijos, pero la agencia no tiene normas rígidas sobre el particular, dijo Tim Counts, vocero del Servicio de Inmigración y Control de Aduanas de Estados Unidos (ICE, por sus siglas en inglés).

Counts aseguró que la agencia hace lo imposible para ayudar a los padres a que sus hijos reciban atención.

"Este informe adopta la extraña posición de que el ICE es en cierta manera responsable por la perturbación familiar causada por padres que adoptan malas decisiones", dijo el vocero de la agencia.

"Agencias encargadas de imponer el cumplimiento de la ley arrestan cotidianamente a personas que tienen hijos. Todos deben entender que los padres son responsables por sus acciones y por el impacto resultante en sus familias".

Unas 100 personas fueron

liberadas días después de las redadas de diciembre en Swift & Co., especialmente para que atendieran a sus hijos. Muchas de ellas no fueron liberadas el mismo día pues mintieron cuando se les preguntó si tenían hijos, aseguró Counts. Según explicó, algunos padres mintieron porque temían que también arrestaran a sus hijos.

Investigadores que participaron en el estudio hablaron con unos 30 padres, entre ellos algunos que fueron detenidos, así como con docenas de personas que asistieron a los niños, con líderes religiosos, funcionarios de institutos educacionales, abogados, y otras personas en cada sitio.

Según el servicio de inmigración, al menos 4.000 personas fueron detenidas en centros de trabajo de octubre del 2006 a septiembre del 2007, por encima de las 3.700 del mismo lapso anterior.

El Centro Hispano Pew calculó en el 2006 que hay 3,1 millones de niños estadounidenses que viven con al menos un progenitor indocumentado y que 1,8 millones de esos infantes tampoco tienen documentos.

University of Michigan sets new enrollment record

ANN ARBOR, Nov. 1, 2007 (AP): The University of Michigan is reporting a new enrollment record at its main Ann Arbor campus. The school says 41,042 students enrolled for fall 2007. That's a 2.5 percent increase, or 1,017 more, than last year.

Latino student enrollment was up 1 percent, while the number of white students increased 2.1 percent.

Black student enrollment is down 3.3 percent.

Graduate and professional students have increased by 3.4 percent. Undergraduate enrollment shows a 2.1 percent increase. Michigan's freshman class of 5,992 is 11 percent larger than last fall. School officials say freshman applications were up 6.5 percent to 27,474.

Exhibition features formerly incarcerated artists at Focus: HOPE Gallery

Detroit — A thought-provoking exhibition of artwork created by formerly incarcerated artists and their mentors will open in the Focus: HOPE Gallery with a reception on Nov. 9, 2007.

Presented by the *Prison Creative Arts Project (PCAP)* in partnership with *Focus: HOPE*, the exhibit is entitled *Are We Community: A Linkage Exhibition of Art II* and will run through Dec. 19, 2007. The opening reception is open to the public from 5:30 to 9:00 p.m. in the Gallery, 1400 Oakland Boulevard, Detroit.

Featured artists are participants in PCAP's Linkage Project, a program which links formerly incarcerated artists and writers with arts mentors in their community. Mentors help support returning artists as they make the transition back into the community, while working with them to develop their artistic mediums. This year's unique exhibition will include more than 75 works of art, shedding light on the talents of formerly incarcerated citizens and encouraging the public to think about the challenges facing individuals once they are released from prison.

Despite the intense challenges and limitations formerly incarcerated citizens face in Michigan, including a lack of employment opportunities, healthcare, and transportation, and limited community resources for assistance and treatment, exhibition artists continue to create work in a rich range of styles, mediums, and themes.

The Focus: HOPE Gallery is open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday — Friday

Hospital to start testing all hospital patients for drug-resistant staph germ

CHICAGO, Oct. 30, 2007 (AP): Loyola University Medical Center announced plans to start testing all incoming patients for a drug-resistant staph germ and isolating those who carry the dangerous bacteria.

The 589-bed hospital in Maywood, just west of Chicago, is among the first in Illinois to start universal screening for the superbug.

The germ in question is called MRSA, or methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus.

A new Illinois law requires hospitals to test high-risk and intensive-care patients for MRSA.

The nation's Veterans Affairs hospitals began universal MRSA testing this year. And Evanston Northwestern Healthcare has reported a substantial drop in MRSA cases at its three suburban Chicago hospitals since it began universal testing in 2005.

Loyola officials said Monday they are launching universal screening because of recent reports suggesting the germ is becoming more widespread and success with pilot programs that have reduced infections at their hospital.

Several MRSA cases have been reported recently among students at schools in Illinois and around the U.S., but health officials say intermittent cases are not unusual.

MRSA awareness has been heightened by the death of a Virginia student two weeks ago, followed by a government report estimating that more than 90,000 Americans get the most dangerous kind of MRSA infection each year.

Most MRSA cases are relatively mild skin infections, but the bug can become life-threatening if it invades the body and infects the bloodstream or vital organs.

Those at risk for this type of MRSA infection include hospitalized patients undergoing invasive procedures or with weakened immune systems.

Many people carry the bug on their skin or in their noses with no symptoms, but they can infect others if the germ makes contact with



**World Cup rotation system ends, opening bids for 2018 tournament**

ZURICH, Switzerland (AP): The World Cup will no longer be rotated among continents, a decision that throws open the race for the 2018 tournament.

South Africa already has been awarded the 2010 tournament and soccer's governing body is announced Brazil on Oct. 30, 2007—the only

candidate—as the 2014 host.

FIFA president Sepp Blatter said Monday the executive committee rejected a proposal from CONCACAF that would have ensured the 2018 event going to the region representing North and Central America and the Caribbean.

"FIFA's decision does not change our own commitment

to try to bring the World Cup back to the United States," U.S. Soccer president Sunil Gulati said. "I believe that a U.S. bid will be very competitive."

South Korea and Japan shared the 2002 World Cup and Germany was the host in 2006.

"If you go back to 2002, and look at the recent history of rotation ... it's been Asia, Europe, Africa and with 2014 going to South America,"

CONCACAF general secretary Chuck Blazer told The Associated Press. "I thought in all logic and fairness the next cycle should be CONCACAF. Regrettably, that did not carry the day."

FIFA has been under pres-

sure to open the 2018 bidding to allow nations outside CONCACAF to hold the tournament. The rotation system meant that after Colombia dropped out of the 2014 race Brazil became the sole candidate. Blatter was upset more South American countries did not bid.

"Something was missing," he said. "The competition was lacking, and football is competition."

Countries belonging to the African and South American confederations will not be eligible to host the 2018 tournament because South Africa and Brazil will have hosted the two previous tournaments.



Researchers test if what fires jalapeños might also numb surgery pain

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29, 2007 (AP): Devil's Revenge. Spontaneous Combustion. Hot sauces and the derivative chili peppers (such as jalapeños, cuaresmeños, and huachinangos) have names like that for a reason.

Scientists are testing if the stuff that makes the sauces so savage can tame the pain of surgery. Doctors are dripping the chemical that gives chili peppers their fire directly into open wounds during knee replacement and a few other highly painful operations.

But DJ Rudy "Jalapeño" Lomeli of WBGU 88.1FM has known this for years.

Do not try this at home: These experiments use an ultra-purified version of capsaicin to avoid infection—and the volunteers are under anesthesia so they don't scream at the initial burn.

How could something searing possibly soothe? Bite a hot pepper, and after the burn your tongue goes numb.

The hope is that bathing surgically exposed nerves in a high enough dose will numb them for weeks, so that patients suffer less pain and require fewer narcotic painkillers as they heal.

"We wanted to exploit this numbness," is how Dr. Eske Aasvang, a pain specialist in Denmark who is testing the substance, puts it.

Chili peppers have been part of folk remedy for centuries, and heat-inducing capsaicin creams are a drugstore staple for aching muscles.

But today the spice is hot because of research showing capsaicin targets key pain-sensing

cells in a unique way. California-based Anesiva Inc.'s operating-room experiments are not the only attempt to harness that burn for more focused pain relief.

Harvard University researchers are mixing capsaicin with another anesthetic in hopes of developing epidurals that wouldn't confine women to bed during childbirth, or dental injections that do not numb the whole mouth. And at the National Institutes of Health, scientists hope early next year to begin testing in advanced cancer patients a capsaicin cousin that is 1,000 times more potent, to see if it can zap their intractable pain.

Nerve cells that sense a type of long-term throbbing pain bear a receptor, or gate, called TRPV1. Capsaicin binds to that receptor and opens it to enter only those pain fibers—and not other nerves responsible for other kinds of pain or other functions such as movement.

These so-called C neurons also sense heat; thus capsaicin's burn. But when TRPV1 opens, it lets extra calcium inside the cells until the nerves become overloaded and shut down. That's the numbness.

"It just required a new outlook about ... stimulation of this receptor" to turn those cellular discoveries into a therapy hunt, says NIH's Dr. Michael Iadarola.

Enter Anesiva's specially purified capsaicin, called Adlea. Experiments are under way involving several hundred patients undergoing various surgeries, including knee and hip replacements. Surgeons drip either Adlea or a dummy solution into the cut muscle and tissue and wait five minutes for it to soak in before stitching up

the wound.

Among early results: In a test of 41 men undergoing open hernia repair, capsaicin recipients reported significantly less pain in the first three days after surgery, Aasvang reported this month at a meeting of the American Society of Anesthesiologists.

In a pilot U.S. study of 50 knee replacements, the half treated with capsaicin used less morphine in the 48 hours after surgery and reported less pain for two weeks.

Studies are testing larger doses in more patients to see if the effect is real.

There is a huge need for better surgical pain relief, says Dr. Eugene Viscusi, director of acute pain management at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia, one of the test sites. Morphine and its relatives, so-called opioid painkillers, are surgery's standby. While they're crucial drugs, they have serious side effects that limit their use.

Specialists are watching the capsaicin research because it promises a one-time dose that works inside the wound, not body-wide, and would not tether patients to an IV when they are starting physical therapy.

"It's in and it's done," Viscusi explains. "You can't abuse it. You can't misuse it."

"There's been an enormous effort to try and develop alternatives to opioids with the same strength but not too much success," adds Dr. Clifford Woolf of Harvard University and Massachusetts General Hospital. "We think we're moving toward it."

A new publication from Google, Inc. is directed towards its Spanish-speaking supporters

Google has been one of the better search engines to translate its products into other languages. But there was never a Spanish-language publication involved in its print ads. That has all changed with the publication *Hoy*.

Hoy's size and scope are well suited to the kind of breakthrough it is accomplishing here: according to a company statement, the daily newspaper will be part of the Chicago Tribune Media Group and the Los Angeles Times Media Group, with approximately 1.4 million be-

ing distributed each week.

It only makes sense since 72 percent of the Spanish-speaking market already uses Google, compared to just 17 percent using Yahoo's search engine. Fifty-one percent of U.S. Latino adults view the Web in Spanish.

If all goes according to the plan, advertisers who already trust Google will embrace this means of contacting the Latino population. Google will split the ad revenue with *Hoy*, which could then grow even bigger. This could help print advertising survive the technological age.

This is a good public relations move for Google. The

company's environmental efforts are all good and well, but with around 600 English-language newspapers involved in the print ads program, it might have looked odd had a Spanish-language entity not been involved.

Coupled with Google's agreement with Univision, the largest Spanish-language media company in the United States, the company could see record profits.

Javier Saralegui, Univision executive, suggested that this is an opportunity for consumer companies not yet targeting Latino online to develop Websites and advertising in Spanish.



Fernández will be Argentina's second female president; Isabel Perón, who married Juan Perón after Evita's death, was his vice president when he died in 1974, and served for 20 chaotic months before a military coup ousted her.

size of a mountain on earth. When a comet nears the sun, heat vaporizes the icy material producing a cloud of gaseous material surrounding the nucleus, called a coma. As the nucleus begins to disintegrate, it also produces a trail of dust in its orbital path and a gas or ion tail pointing away from the sun.

Comet comas can extend up to a million miles

from the nucleus and comet tails can be millions of miles long. There are thought to be literally trillions of comets in our solar system out past Neptune and Pluto, but only once a decade or so does one become near and bright enough to see easily without binoculars or a telescope.

FLOC, others march on RJ Reynolds

In a vibrant display of unity on Oct. 28, 2007, farmworkers, dozens of churches, unions, and community members came together to demand that RJ Reynolds (RJR) sit down with farmworker leaders from the Farm Labor Organizing Committee (FLOC) to discuss the deplorable conditions in the tobacco fields.

Nearly four hundred people marched to the driving beat of drums and chants around RJR headquarters in downtown Winston-Salem, North Carolina. One of the marchers carried a sign that expressed his feelings about RJR's refusal to meet with farmworkers and union representatives. "I picked your tobacco leaves in 100 degree heat this summer, now can we talk?" In front of the main entrance to company headquarters, participants laid flowers on a makeshift altar in memory of the six heat-related deaths of workers in the tobacco harvest since 2005.

Farmworker Diego Reyes

opened the rally by welcoming the show of unity from the stairs of historic Lloyd Presbyterian Church, above the sea of red and black flags and shirts. Strong messages of solidarity were delivered by the President of the National Council of Churches, Michael Livingston; Executive Director of the National Farmworker Ministry, Virginia Nesmith; AFL-CIO President John Sweeney (delivered by Will Duncan); North Carolina AFL-CIO president James Andrews; Joseph Kesecker, Executive Director Agricultural Missions, and Edith Rasell, Minister for Workplace Justice, United Church of Christ.

Union representatives were out in full force, many traveling hours from Atlanta, Ohio, and Washington DC to participate. Teamsters, Letter Carriers, Seafarers International Union, United Steel Workers, United Auto Worker, Bakery Confectionary Tobacco Grain Miller International, International Association of Machinists, American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees, and American Postal Workers all marched in solidarity with tobacco farmworkers.

Emphasizing FLOC's commitment to this campaign, FLOC President Baldemar Velásquez said, "FLOC is called upon to challenge the deplorable conditions of the tobacco workforce that remains voiceless, powerless, and invisible to mainstream America. FLOC will campaign until RJ Reynolds commits to joining us in addressing this national shame."

Legislation equalizes drug penalties between crack and powdered cocaine

Columbus, October 23, 2007: Members of the Ohio Senate unanimously approved *Senate Bill 73*, sponsored by Senator Ray Miller (D – Columbus), which eliminates penalty distinctions between crack and powdered cocaine.

A bill to eliminate these distinctions has been introduced by African-American legislators for the past ten years. Senator Miller introduced a bill similar to SB 73 in 2005 during the 126th Ohio General Assembly. The impetus for the bill stems from crack cocaine being punished more harshly than powdered cocaine.

"Ohio prisons are filled to capacity with young men who have gotten caught up in the drug culture of fast money, a quick high, and no regard for human life. But yet, those who are bursting the seams of Ohio's prison system on drug related charges do not have the financial resources to purchase and transport large quantities of cocaine from South America into the United States. They don't own planes, ships and other means to transport this cargo," Miller said.

"Ohio prisons are filled to capacity with young men who have gotten caught up in the drug culture of fast money, a quick high, and no regard for human life. But yet, those who are bursting the seams of Ohio's prison system on drug related charges do not have the financial resources to purchase and transport large quantities of cocaine from South America into the United States. They don't own planes, ships and other means to transport this cargo," Miller said.

"Those who are transporting large amounts of powdered cocaine, using and selling this drug, which could potentially produce crack, are penalized much less harshly than if they were engaged with crack. This is a flawed system," said Miller.

"By voting Senate Bill 73 out of the Senate, we are helping to put an end to a policy which creates disparities in the criminal justice system, allows similarly situated drug offenders to be punished much differently, and does not follow the spirit of equity in the law," Senator Miller concluded.

Movie review: 'American Gangster'

NEW YORK (AP): So perhaps "American Gangster," Ridley Scott's much-anticipated mobster epic, doesn't have a single original idea in its head, with its unshakable shades of "Scarface" and "Serpico" and "Superfly." And maybe it's a half-hour too long—this time of year, what film with awards ambitions isn't?

But it's exceptionally crafted and superbly acted, with the on-screen combo of Denzel Washington and Russell Crowe unsurprisingly proving impossible to resist, even though it takes about two hours for their paths to cross.

That's one of the more compelling elements of the film, written by veteran Steven Zaillian ("Schindler's List") and based on a New York magazine article by Mark Jacobson. Washington, as real-life heroin kingpin Frank Lucas, and Crowe, as detective Richie Roberts, are on a collision course with one another that's bursting with the gritty period atmosphere of 1970s Harlem.

(Cinematographer Harris Savides, who has provided dreamlike imagery in the Gus Van Sant films "Gerry," "Elephant" and "Last Days," here creates the faded, intimate look of a movie that truly could have been made 35 years ago, adding to its authenticity.)

Washington simply radiates as Frank, returning comfortably to the charismatic bad-guy territory that earned him an Academy Award in "Training Day." And Crowe, who earlier this year was the one playing the stylish villain you love to root for in the remake of "3:10 to Yuma," is just as

away with it.)

That he's made himself a millionaire through the destruction of his own people, urban blacks, doesn't seem to faze Frank. He becomes a fixture on the nightife circuit with his effortless smile. He buys a mansion for his mother (the formidable Ruby Dee), employs his brothers and marries a former Miss Puerto Rico (the luscious Lyndi Nadal). But Scott doesn't let him off the hook—he's unflinching in showing us the squalor, the decay, the death that result from Frank's business acumen.

At the same time, Richie can't seem to do anything right. He finds sacks full of money stashed in the trunk of a car—clearly another cop's ill-gotten gains—and turns them in, knowing that doing so will make him a pariah among his peers. He focuses intensely on his job as a narcotics detective and ends up driving away his ex-wife and young son.

Reveling in wretched excess is, of course, one of the main points of a film like "American Gangster"—the clothes, the homes, the naked women cutting up mounds of powder surrounded by stacks of cash—but so is the down-and-dirty thrill of the hunt. Scott steadily propels both men's stories toward one another until the tantalizing moment when they finally meet. Then all falls silent and still. It's a breathtaking scene but it's also one of the few you're likely to remember in a film that can otherwise be so derivative.

"American Gangster," a Universal Pictures release, runs 157 minutes. Three stars out of four. It took in \$46.3 million to lead the weekend (Nov. 2-Nov. 4, 2007) box office, with Jerry Seinfeld's family cartoon "Bee Movie" following with \$39.1 million.

To avoid conflicts of interest involving FIFA executive committee members and countries bidding for 2018, Blatter said track great Sebastian Coe will oversee the process. Coe is the new chairman of FIFA's ethics committee and the organizing committee chairman for the 2012 London Olympics.

British Prime Minister Gordon Brown was "delighted" FIFA opened the door for the World Cup to return to England.

"By 2018, it will be 52 years since England hosted the World Cup," he said. "The nation which gave football to the world deserves to have the greatest tournament back on these shores."

In other decisions:

- FIFA announced new regulations on third-party ownership of players' contracts.

- Goal-line technology—a soccer ball with a computer chip—will be tested in December at the FIFA Club World Cup in Japan.

- The 2007 Club World Cup winner will receive \$5 million, the runner-up \$4 million.

- FIFA suspended the Kuwait Football Association because of government interference in soccer.

- FIFA had to pay former general secretary Urs Linsi an unspecified sum because of his golden parachute.

The next FIFA Congress will be May 29-30, 2008 in Sydney, Australia.
