Zogby analyzes 2008 U.S. presidential race

(AP) Latinos voters will play an increasingly important role in the 2008 presidential elections, where Democratic Sen. Hillary Clinton and Republican Sen. John McCain are the front runners, international pollster John Zogby said Dec. 6, 2006.

In his first-ever visit to Oklahoma, the president and CEO of Zogby International analyzed President George W. Bush's downward spiral in public opinion and handicapped the 2008 presidential race during The State Chamber's Public Affairs Forum.

With the number of Latino voters growing steadily from less than 5 million in 1996 to an estimated 13 million in 2008, Zogby said drawing a hard line on immigration could haunt Republicans in the next election.

"Immigration does not work for Republicans," Zogby said. "That looms very large.

'Republicans need to

heal that rift with Hispanic voters and heal it very, very quickly."

Zogby, who acknowledged he underestimated Clinton when she first ran for U.S. senator in his home state of New York in 2000, said he wouldn't make that mistake again. He said Clinton campaigns hard and effectively and appeals to a range of voters.

"She showed voters charm and respect," Zogby said of her first senate campaign. "If she can do that in upstate New York, she can do it in Iowa and New Hampshire.

"For those of you who say she can't win, don't go see your bookie just yet."

Letter to the Editor: Developing a Culture of Voting For Latinos

The Mexican-American community in Toledo and across the state has a great opportunity to start laying the groundwork for a major voter registration and turnout campaign for the presidential election in November of 2008.

Perry delves into immigration reform, urges guestworker program, Says "Building a wall across the entire border is a preposterous idea!"

AUSTIN (AP): Emphasizing immigration reform far more than he did before his re-election, Republican Gov. Rick Perry said Wednesday that a guestworker program is needed for Mexican immigrants employed in the United States.

Federal authorities should work toward providing identification cards for immigrant workers that allow them to freely cross the border, Perry said. Such a program should emphasize the "rule of law" and not reward those who break the

law, he said.
"I'd a whole lot rather know who it is that crosses

know who it is that crosses our border legally to work than not know who it is that crosses our border illegally to work," Perry said.

The governor also said he disagrees with new state legislation proposed by a fellow Republican, Rep. Leo Berman of Tyler, designed to challenge the automatic citizenship of babies born in the United States to un-documented immigrants.

"I think any of those

"I think any of those types of legislation that create divisions are bad. We need to look at ways to be bringing people together rather than driving wedges

between them," Perry said. Berman's proposal

would bar the babies of un-documented immigrants from receiving state benefits such as food stamps, health care or public housing. He has said he hopes any legal challenge to his bill, if it's enacted, would reach the U.S. Supreme Court so that the justices would address the issue of citizenship.

Perry's comments were

much more conciliatory and tilted toward immigration reform than were his speeches before his Nov. 7, 2006 re-election. In the cam-paign, as he worked to drum up conservative support in all regions of Texas, he mostly steered away from discussing immigration pro-posals and instead stressed the need to crack down on border crime.

He said at the time that immigration changes could only be debated after border security is accomplished. Perry did say during the campaign that he supported some type of guest worker pro-

He went a step further and offered more opinions Wednesday in an Austin speech to the Texas Border Coalition, made up of may-ors and other public officials along the Texas-Mexico bor-der. He said the sides are linked by common economies and cultures.

"Our economy is greatly impacted by migrant work-

ers. Let's create a guest worker program that takes these workers off the black market and that legitimizes their economic contributions without doing the same for their citizenship," Perry said, to applause from coalition members.

Immigrants who are already in the country illegally should be given "an expanded period of time in which to come to register" for a guest worker program, he told news reporters later.

Some Texas business leaders have said they want a federal immigration plan that will provide for the immigrant labor market their companies need. A broad immigration bill approved by the U.S. Senate and backed by President Bush called for a guest worker program that would issue ID cards. But no immigration compromise has been reached between the

two chambers of Congress. Perry has said he disagrees with those who have called for a wall or fence along the entire border, and he made that point again Wednesday. He said some "strategic fenc-ing" in urban areas along the

border makes sense.
"Building a wall across the entire border is a preposter-ous idea," he added. "The only thing a wall would pos-sibly accomplish is to really help the ladder business or the tunneling business."

DOJ approves Dec. 12 election date despite Latino religious, Guadalupe objections

forward with the Dec. 12
date for a congressional runoff after federal judges ruled early voting could be extended because the elec-tion falls on an important religious day for Catholic

The decision to hold the runoff Tuesday has angered some Latino groups who have said it is an attempt to suppress the Latino vote to boost elec-

tion chances for Republican Rep. Henry Bonilla.

Bonilla faces Democrat
Ciro Rodríguez, a former Ciro Rodríguez, a former congressman, in the runoff because no candidate got more than 50 percent of the vote in the Nov. 7 election. Dec. 12 is the Feast of the Virgin of Guadalupe, the day many Latinos mark the appearance of the Virgin of Guadalupe.

the appearance of the Virgin Mary before Indian peasant Juan Diego in México in 1531. Many Latinos attend Mass, hold processions, and gather

Perry again said the fed-eral government has been slow to act when it comes to the border.

"It is time Washington got one of the central messages of this election: when it comes to immigration and border security, get the job

with family and friends.

The Voting Rights Act requires states with a history of voting discrimination against minorities to get DOJ approval, known as preclearance, for many elec-

Texas officials had first said they didn't need the preclearance, but later decided to seek it. The law recided to seek it. The law required the state to prove it was not violating the Voting Rights Act by setting the election for Tuesday and allowed groups to file objections. In a letter sent to the state, the DOJ said the attorney general did not object to the date or the additional early voting days. The agency can change its mind should new information come to its attention in the remainder of the 60 days it had to review the issue, a DOJ spokes-woman said. "The day that was set was

But Luis Vera Jr., national attorney for the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), said the

American Citizens (LULAC), said the preclearance wouldn't have been given had the judges not required the extended early voting.
Originally, LULAC had wanted the date moved to Dec. 19. But with time dwindling and the judges' rulings allowing the extended early voting, LULAC dropped that request. The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund also objected to the vote.
Vera said his group still believes the date was picked to affect the election outcome.
"Everything that was done in this election was deliberately done to suppose the property of the contract of

deliberately done to sup-press the Latino vote and the workers' vote," said Vera, who also is serving as Rodríguez's treasurer during the runoff.

But, Perry said, rather than signaling instability the Mexican election and its aftermath represented the workings of a free society. He predicted this period will come to be seen as a time when democracy took root in México.



Arbor, Flint and Dearborn), Michigan State, and Wayne State universities filed a motion in federal court seeking a short-term delay in the implementation of Proposal 2 with respect to admissions and financial aid.

"We are requesting an injunction permitting us to complete this year's admissions and financial aid cycles using the same standards in place when the process began earlier this year. This motion was filed in response to a lawsuit against our three universities by the Coalition to Defend Affirmative Action By Any Means Necessary (BAMN) and others.

It would be extremely difficult and unfair to prospective students, to change our admissions and financial aid processes in midstream. Our admissions process, including the awarding of financial aid, is a cohesive cycle that begins in the summer when the application is distributed to prospective students and counselors and ends the following May when all offers of admission have been extended and responded to by the students, and financial aid awards have been made and accepted.

Students and counselors are now at varying stages in that cycle, and it would be nearly impossible to flip a switch on Dec. 23 and change our procedures abruptly. Students have relied on the information they were given months ago about this year's admissions process, and we have already accepted applications and notified many students of our decision regarding their application.

'We want to ensure that our process is consistent owe this to prospective students and their families.

"I have been clear in my statements over the past few weeks that the University of Michigan will obey the law. We recognize the voters' decision, and we will comply with Proposal 2.

"However, precisely what that means for our core operations is uncertain. This uncertainty is underscored by the executive order issued by Gov. Jennifer Granholm, who has instructed the Michigan Civil Rights Commission to investigate the potential impact of Proposal 2 and issue a report by February. We want to understand the outcome of that review as we consider what changes need to be made to our policies and

programs.
"We can expect these uncertainties to be clarified by the courts and by our experiences over time, as oc-curred in California after the passage of Proposition 209.

"At this time, the University of Michigan is not planning to initiate any additional legal actions. A lawsuit already has been filed against the University by BAMN, and the Pacific Legal Foundation has said it is also considering a lawsuit.

"In the meantime, we will make our best attempt to interpret the language of Proposal 2, and continue our programs in a manner that both complies with the law and protects our diversity and our academic excellence. If challenged, the University of Michigan is prepared to defend our programs and our interpretation of the law.

It is important to emphasize that the passage of Proposal 2 does not prohibit public institutions from seeking diversity in our student body, staff, and faculty.



Funding is OCHLA's biggest limitation, hampering the ability to effectively represent **Latinos in Ohio**

new Democratic governor of Ohio takes office next month the Ohio Commission on Hispanic/Latino Affairs (OCHLA) plans to make a tremendous push to increase its budget in order to better serve Latinos in Ohio.

That was the commitment made at last Friday's monthly, and year-end, meeting. OCHLA met Friday, Dec. 8, 2006, in Columbus to review their status for 2006.

The seven members who were in attendance also agreed that more funding is to implement educational needed to reach out to those they represent, and to improve the educational opportunities of Latinos in

"The budget needs to be at least doubled from when we started," said V. Anthony Simms-Howell, senior member of OCHLA, and finance chairman.

"Twenty-nine years ago, the commission had a budget close to \$300, 000," said Richard Romero, who chaired the meeting. "Here we are celebrating our 30th year and we're looking at a budget of about \$180,000."

While the budget has fallen almost 50 percent, the Latino population has more then tripled in Ohio in the past three decades.

"It's really a sad state of affairs," Romero said.

Ezra C. Escudero, Executive Director of OCHLA, is planning to meet with members of Ohio's newly elected Governor Ted Strickland's transition team within the coming months in an attempt to get more funding for OCHLA in the 2007-2008 fiscal year. The state legislature

Columbus: When the will receive a budget proposal from Strickland's team in about three months and OCHLA wants an increase of funding included in the bud-

> "We are putting forth a plan to get OCHLA properly funded," said Romero.

Escudero said funding is OCHLA's biggest limitation. "I'm half of my staff," Escudero Escudero lamented.

With more funding, a legislative liaison would be hired, as well as staff and leadership development programs.

The money would "help up-and-coming Latino community leaders acquire important leadership skills about serving on boards and leading organizations," Escudero said.

Better education for the Latino community is also a priority according to Escudero.

meeting, At the OCHLA swore in the new chairman of education. Chris Rodríguez, from Whitehall, Ohio. Rodríguez, a city council member of Whitehall, replaced Cassandra Caballero Wyssbrod, who resigned.

Rodríguez and OCHLA hope to work with the Oho Department of Education to better serve the Latino communities in Ohio. Goals are in place to help make college more realistic for Latinos,

"We're looking into community groups to take some leadership, in terms of working together to close the academic achievement gap.' Escudero said.

Raul Soto, from the Ohio Department of Education, will work with Rodríguez to make sure the needs of Latinos are met in terms of education.

"We look forward to standing shoulder to shoulder with the commission," said Soto.

As the achievement gap widened, the Ohio legislature was in the process of drafting an English-Only bill, as well as an immigration law-OCHLA lobbied hard to strike down these proposed bills.

The immigration law has been put in the backseat for now according to Escudero, and he does not see the status of that changing. The English-Only bill also does not seem to be reaching re-

The English-Only law is no longer a priority in the legislature," Escudero said, adding it could come up in the future however.

OCHLA now will concentrate on preparing its annual report. The report is used to help see what it needs to do in the future. A prepared report will help them lobby for the programs they believe Ohio Latinos need.

"The annual report for 2006 is a high priority to help lobby government for more money," Escudero said. "We want to make sure 2006 is a tool we can use, when we meet with policy makers for 2007.

Lucas County Healthy Start Healthy Families Medicaid Outreach Project to end January 2007

TOLEDO: The Neighborhood Health Association announced last week that the Covering Kids and Families (CKF) Medicaid Outreach Pilot Project it has been leading since December 2002 will come to an end January 5, 2007. This 4-year grant, made possible by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, was aimed at getting more eligible children and families enrolled onto Medicaid health insurance

- · conducting and coordinating Medicaid outreach in Lucas County, focused on the Latino community,
- simplifying the Healthy Start Healthy Families (HSHF) Medicaid application and renewal processes, and
- · coordinating existing health coverage programs.

The CKF Project acted as a liaison between the applicant, the Department of Job and Family Services which determines eligibility, and the Medicaid Man-

aged Care Plans that provide medical services, to make the application and renewal processes easier to navigate. Some of the innovative strategies used to carry out the above goals included:

- · Setting up two HSHF hotlines, 241-HEALTH (English) and 241-SALUD (Spanish) to answer applicants' questions about the program. More than 4200 people received assistance through these hotlines.
- Developing bilingual Application Tipsheets and Application Process Forms to guide the applicant through the application, approval, Managed Care selection, and renewal processes.
- · Partnering with more than 60 community agencies to make HSHF applications easily available. Another outreach effort included placing all bilingual program information at WTOL.com. More than 74,000 people visited this website to get more program details, to download an application, and for instructions on how to com-

All of these outreach activities helped thousands of uninsured people complete the application process more easily, get the health care they need and deserve, and get connected to other social service programs. As a result, the CKF Project generated approximately 20% of Job and Family Services' monthly Healthy Start Healthy Families caseload.

Although the CKF Project will end January 5, 2007, the Medicaid program administered by Job and Family Services will continue. However, "the absence of CKF will leave large gaps in the community and many eligible children and families may not get enrolled," according to the organization's press release.

Dr. Tejada is part of UT research team that uncovers potential antipsychotic treatment

Tejada, a postdoctoral fellow in the Department of Pharmacology at The University of Toledo recently published a paper in the Journal of Medicinal Chemistry describing the synthesis of small molecules that show promising antipsychotic activity.

Dr. Tejada works in the laboratory of Dr. William S. Messer, Jr., Professor and Chair of Pharmacology. The work was supported by research grants from the National Institutes of Health and

Dr. Frederick R. by a contract from Cognitive Pharmaceuticals Ltd.

> Dr. Messer's research group is focused on the development of new compounds for the treatment of neurological disorders such as Alzheimer's disease and schizophrenia. He is one of the cofounders of Cognitive Pharmaceuticals, which discovers and develops new drug treatments for neurological and psychiatric disorders including Alzheimer's disease and schizophrenia.

> Patients with schizophrenia experience significantly impaired cognitive and memory function. The identification of new treatments for the cognitive aspects of schizophrenia represents a high priority for the National In-



stitutes of Health.

Under the direction of Dr. Messer, Dr. Tejada and other medicinal chemists have developed a series of molecules known as muscarinic agonists, which enhance memory function in experimental animals. Several of the compounds have been patented due to their potential utility in the treatment Alzheimer's disease and

Ohio State's Smith humbled by winning Heisman

(AP): Moments after receiving the Heisman Trophy, Ohio State quarterback Troy Smith had a few words for youngsters who want to fol-

low in his footsteps.

"The first thing I would say to little kids is that anything and everything is possible with your dreams if you have humility," Smith told The Associated Press by phone in the midst of a cel-

ebration Saturday night. Smith became Ohio State's sixth Heisman winner, and he sixth Heisman winner, and he did it in record fashion. He captured 86.7 percent of the first-place votes and totaled 1,662 points. The fifth-year quarterback easily beat out Arkansas running back Arkansas running back Darren McFadden (878) and Notre Dame quarterback Brady Quinn (782). The margin of victory was

the second largest ever, exceeded only by O.J. Simpson's

1,750-point victory in 1968. Smith captured the award just two years after he was suspended from the team for two games for accepting \$500 from a booster. Three months before his suspension, he was just a backup quarterback with

little opportunity to play. Smith said the lesson he

learned was perseverance.

"Any time you get in a situation where things don't happen the way you want them to happen, you need to listen to other people and pick goals that you think are reachable," Smith said. "Then stay at it, loving and understanding and

knowing your dreams. Your

knowing your dreams. Your dreams can get you anywhere you want to go in life."

Smith joins Les Horvath (1944), Vic Janowicz (1950), Howard "Hopalong" Cassady (1955), Archie Griffin (1974, '75) and Eddie Cassad (1905), to Philos Streibe Streis. George (1995) as Ohio State's winners of the most prestigious individual award in college football.

Smith completed 67 percent of his passes for a school-record 30 touchdowns with just five interceptions while leading top-ranked Ohio State to a perfect 12-0 mark and a berth in the national champi-

onship game.

Smith's victory reverberated far beyond the Nokia Theater in Times Square in New York City, where it was announced. In his native Cleveland and in Columbus,

Cleveland and in Columbus, Ohio State fans toasted Smith's big accomplishment. Listed as a fifth-year senior on the roster, Smith already picked up a degree in communications last spring. He has continued in school while seeking a second degree in Black Studies.

Through the good times and the bad. Smith said he

and the bad, Smith said he had always made it a point to take a daily glance at the Heisman Trophy cases that sit in the atrium of the Woody Hayes Athletic Center. He said it was overwhelming to think that he would now be joining that pantheon of Buckeyes greats.

"Oh, man. It probably won't sit in until I leave the university," he said. "But

knowing that my name is on one and I've added a little bit of tradition to this great university means so much to

Griffin and Cassady, among the past winners standing behind Smith when he stepped to the podium Saturday night, were among the first to welcome their fellow Buckeye into the elite frater-

Before leaving for New York and the Heisman an-nouncement, Griffin was asked if Smith deserved to be

asked if Smith deserved to be mentioned among the elite players ever at Ohio State. "He should be in that con-versation," Griffin said. "At least in my opinion, he certainly's the best quarter-back that I've seen at Ohio State and we've had some doggone good ones. But the performances I've seen out of Troy, they've really been phenomenal.

With Smith at the controls, Ohio State has won its last 19 games, matching the secondlongest winning streak in school history. Only a 22-game streak from 1967-69 is longer.

The Buckeyes face No. 2 Florida on Jan. 8 in Glendale, Ariz., in the national champi-onship game.

Moments after receiving the bronze statue, Smith was

already thinking ahead. "It feels great to get it (the Heisman Trophy) out of the way and move on to the University of Florida and pre-pare for the national championship game," Smith said.

Movies: Mayans excited about film in Yucatec Maya tongue

MEXICO CITY (AP): cenes of enslaved Maya Indians building temples for a violent, decadent culture in Mel Gibson's new film "Apocalypto" may ring true for many of today's Mayas, who earn meager wages in construction camps, building huge tourist resorts on land they once owned.

Some Mayas are excited at the prospect of the first feature film made in their native tongue, Yucatec Maya. But others among the 800,000 surviving Mayans are worried that Gibson's hyper-violent, apocalyptic film could be just the latest misreading of their culture

by outsiders.
"There has been a lot of concern among Mayan groups from México, Guatemala, and Belize, because we don't know what his treatment or take on this is going to be," said *Amadeo Cool May* of the Indian defense group "Mayaon," or "We are

Maya."

"This could be an attempt to merchandize or sell the image of a culture, or its people, that often differs from what that people needs, or wants," Cool May said.

Gibson employed Mayas, most of whom live on México's Yucatan peninsula, in the filming of the movie, and says he wants to make the Mayan language "cool" again, and encour-

age young people "to speak it with pride."

The film has been screened for some U.S. Indians, who praised the use of Indian actors. The Mayas haven't seen it yet, but like Indians north of the border, they have seen others co-opt their culture, as in high-class Caribbean resorts like the Maya Coast and the Maya Riviera

But Indians are largely absent from those beach re-sorts, where vacationers tour mock Mayan Villages or watch culturally inaccurate mishmashes with "Mayan Dancers" performing in feather headdresses and face

"The owners are often foreigners who buy up the land at ridiculously low prices, build tourism resorts and the Mayas in reality are often just the construction workers for the hotels or, at best, are employed as cham-ber maids," said Cool May.

Apocalypto also portrays Mayan civilization at a low moment, before the Span-iards arrived, when declining, quarreling Mayan groups were focused more on war and human sacrifice than on the calendars and writing system of civilization's bloody but brilliant classical period.

Outsiders' views of the Maya have long been subject to changing intellectual fashions. Until the 1950s, academics often depicted the ancient Mayas as an idyllic, peaceful culture devoted to stronomy and mathematics. Evidence has since emerged that, even at their height, the Mayas fought bloody and sometimes apocalyptic wars among themselves, lending somewhat more credence to

Gibson's approach. Warrior-kings and priests directed periodic wars among the ancient Maya aimed at capturing slaves or prisoners for labor or human sacrifice. Entire cities were destroyed by the wars, and whole forests cut down to build the temples.

Change of Energy: 2012

The latest trendy theory is a largely Internet-based rumor that the Mayan longcount calendar predicts a global calamity on *Dec.* 22, 2012. Some have woven that together with prophecies from the Bible.

Mauricio Amuv, a non-Maya actor who participated in the filming of *Apocalypto*, says the production staff dis-

cussed the theory on the set.
"We know the Bible talks about prophecies, and that the Mayas spoke of a change of energy on Dec. 22, 2012," Amuy said. "People should perhaps take that theory and reflect, and not do these



things that are destroying humanity.

While they resisted the Spanish conquest longer than most Indians—the Mayas' last rebellion, the War of the Castes, lasted until 1901many were virtually enslaved until the early 1900s on plantations growing sisal, used for rope-making, or in the jungle, tapping gum trees. Discrimination and poverty are probably their greatest

enemies today.

Just as Gibson's use of Aramaic in "The Passion of Christ" sparked a burst of interest in that language, some Maya are hoping Apocalypto will do the same

for their tongue.

"I think it is a good chance to integrate the Mayan language ... for people to hear it in movies, on television, everywhere," said *Hilaria Maas*, a Maya who teaches the language at Yucatan's state university.

Maas, 65, recalls that children were once prohibited from speaking Maya in school. There is still little bilingual education, and many of those who speak Maya can't read it.

One sign of progress is Yucatan radio station XEPET, "The Voice of the Mayas," which began broadcasting in the Indian lan-guage in 1982. While it began with a mixed Spanish-Maya patois, it now broad-casts in 90 percent pure

Maya.
The station is trying to purge words borrowed from Spanish and revive a purer form of Maya. It broadcasts all sorts of music—from rock

rap to reggae-Mayan lyrics.


Still, the percentage of Maya speakers in Yucatan fell from 37 percent in 2000 to 33.9 percent by 2005. Paradoxically, for a state that advertises the glories of the Mayan culture for tourists, it is having a hard time keeping the present-day Maya there; many are migrating to the United States.

"For tourists that's what sells ... what catches their attention are the archaeological sites," said Diana Canto, director of the Yucatan Institute for the Development of Maya Culture. "We are trying to sell them on the living Mayas too, so that people get to know their cultural rich-

Today's Maya are known mainly for their elaborate rhyming jokes, a cuisine based on pumpkin and achiote seeds, and loose embroidered white clothing. They're largely peaceful farmers and masons who carry their goods on ubiquitous three-wheeled bicvcles over table-flat Yucatan.

Interestingly, some Mayas reach much the same conclusion as Gibson's movie, which focuses on one man's struggle to save his family as a metaphor for saving the future of a people.

"Our culture hasn't been destroyed, because the family is the base of it," says Maas. "Perhaps some material things have been destroyed, but the real basis of the culture is what a family teaches their children, and





Zogby analyzes 2008 United States presidential race

President Al Gore, former Sen. John Edwards and 2004 nominee John Kerry also are solid Democratic candidates, along with retired Gen. Wesley Clark, New Mexico Gov. Bill Richardson and Illinois Sen. Barack Obama. He said he doesn't expect Iowa Gov. Tom Vilsack or Sen. Evan Bavh of Indiana, both of whom are expected to run, to fare well in the primary run.

On the Republican side, Zogby said the early favorites are Arizona Sen. John McCain and former New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani, a pair of moderates he described as "Democrats' favorite Republicans.

Zogby said Giuliani is not popular among Christian conservatives, but he said that voting group has lost much of its power.

"Giuliani took on the mafia. I think he can handle the Christian right," Zogby said.

Other likely Republican candidates Zogby said could emerge are: Kansas Sen. Sam Brownback, Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney, former House leader Newt Gingrich and U.S. Rep. Duncan Hunter of



California.

Zogby also analyzed the 2006 midterm elections. saying Democrats were without a strong message but won primarily because of voter dissatisfaction with the war in Iraq.

'The advantage they had was that the Republicans were just so wounded, so critically wounded,' Zogby said.

He also questioned President Bush's wisdom for failing to reach across the aisle to Democrats after his narrow win in 2004, saying failure to do so caused a downward spiral in his popularity and likely will limit his ability to be effective for the rest of his term in office.

"The president, from here, is not just a lame duck, he's a paraplegic

"I've made four trips, and

I also want to go back to México. I first went to México in 2005 where I was able to work with one of the indigenous Indian tribes. I'm planning on returning in 2007,

said Balderas.

Having already estab-lished his goal for the center, we asked Balderas to name his personal goal. His reply was simple, "To have my daughter succeed in whatever she does."

Taylor Balderas, a BGSU

grad, served a brief term on the Toledo City Council this year. At 22, she was the youngest councilwoman in

Toledo history. Her father conceded he seriously thought of making his own run for a seat on the Toledo City Council after then-incumbent Bob McCloskey's decision to seek an at-large seat. "Taylor was on board with my decision," recalls Balderas. "One evening, she had a chance meeting with Mayor Carty Finkbeiner [Toledo] at function. He told her that he wanted to talk to her some more, and invited her to his office to meet with him on

the next day.
"When they met, Carty told her she should be on Council. He explained that his choosing her was related to his con-cerns about the brain drain and young people staying in Toledo. After I heard the news, I never approached Carty about my own plans. I would not interfere with my daughter's ambitions," says Balderas. He pauses, and then adds, "I guess blood is thicker

'I would like to see her make another run (for of-



fice)," says Balderas.

Imagenes Mexicanas This reporter first met Balderas through the Imagenes Mexicanas folk-loric dance troupe, in which Taylor participated for many years. Joe Balderas served as the dance group's manager for almost 11 years. During most of that time, he worked at Supreme Bumpers, now also defunct.

But it was through working with the talented kids in the dance troupe that Balderas became involved with many of the greater issues that face the Latino com-

munity.

Says Balderas, "Take our Latino kids, so many are just dripping out of school and failing. What makes that doubly tragic is that our kids now need the skills to compete in the world market. They are no longer competing for a job with the kid next door or on the next block. They're competing with kids in India or Bangladesh. The \$14-15

hour jobs that they used to be able to get here are now being filled by those kids in other countries who are

happy to get \$17 a week.
"Our education system is failing. Latinos must take re-sponsibility and say it is our fault. Any parent who lets their kid fail or not attend school is only helping to create the next generation of welfare and food stamp re-cipients. Our kids are dropping out of school, our daugh ters are getting pregnant at a young age, and the job mar-ket is shrinking. There are no fast food jobs as a last resort for our kids. They're all hiring older workers," says Balderas.

"And politically, it is time for us to say we have met the enemy and the enemy is us.

"We had the greatest opportunity. We could've had two Latinos on Council and we blew it. We have no one to blame except ourselves. I looked at the precinct sheets

Congresswoman Kaptur's Statement On the **Iraq Study Group Report**

Dec. 6, 2006: U.S. Rep. Marcy Kaptur (D-Ohio, 9), a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, last week issued the following statement about the long-awaited Iraq Study Group report. Congresswoman Kaptur is a member of the Defense Subcommittee of House Appropriations:

"The Iraq Study Group has provided a readable, working document that affirms the situation in Iraq is grave and deteriorating,' and that 'time is running out' for a U.S. success strat-

"Indeed, the report attests that 79 percent of the Iraqi people do not believe the U.S. presence there is constructive.

"As I have affirmed many times since the Abu Ghraib prison scandal, the Bush Administration policy has forfeited our moral authority in Iraq. On the very day the report was released. another 10 U.S. soldiers lost their lives in Iraq. Attacks against U.S. forces now total more than 180 per day, and this figure doubles with each passing year.

"The report also restates our nation's massive financial commitment, now more than \$400 billion dollars, sapping strength from domestic priorities such as health care, education, and energy independence, all much needed here at home.

"Unfortunately, the report begins with the sentence 'The U.S. has long term relationships and in-terests at stake,' but then fails to identify them. Obviously, one of them is oil, and the U.S. again does not commit itself in this report to a strong effort to restore America's energy independence at home.

"In addition, the report is very 'iffy' on how the oil bounty of Iraq will be handled in the future.

Though it makes suggestions on how to manage it, the prospects of that being accomplished are quite remote. The report makes many recommendations that apply to Iraq, but not to end America's own chief strategic vulnerability its dependence on imported petroleum, including from the Middle East.

"Importantly, the report places the Iraq situation in a regional context, explaining how what is happening in Iraq is op-America's three harm standing throughout the Middle

"It states how tepid international support is for the U.S. engagement in Iraq, despite the President's acclamations that there is a 'coalition of the willing.' In addition, though the report acknowledges that for the U.S. to draw down forces, Iraqi units must replace them, it then details that though 138,000 Army troops and 188,000 policy units have some state of 'readiness,' half of them are not up to the task, with many functions infiltrated by the opposition.

"The report presents somewhat confusing picture on the issue of how long the U.S. might need to maintain its presence in Iraq. It recommends unit withdrawal by 2008, but then in a different section states that 'not all U.S. combat brigades' would be needed in the future for force protection-i.e., backup of Iraqi

"In the end, it fails to address the issue of how many combat units would actually be needed and therefore leaves the door open for an extended U.S. presence.

culty it will entail, the report recommends restoring broken diplomatic relations with nations the Administration has publicly ridiculed, such as Svria and Iran, as well as factions within Iraq and throughout the region with which the Administration has no dialogue, such as Moqtada al-Sadr and his mi-

"The report properly identifies the unresolved Israeli-Palestinian conflict as paramount to reaching a regional peace settlementstating clearly that neither Democrats nor Republicans would ever abandon Israeland makes strong recommendations about restoring the peace process.

"The report also makes at least one statement that I find implausible. It says that only 5,000 civilian contractors are operating in Iraq-from hired guns to transportation specialists-when in fact that number exceeds 100,000 and represents a serious and worrisome departure from past U.S. military operations

"If that private presence morphs into a mercenary force that occupies Iraq as the U.S. military withdraws. this would be a first in American history, and a development I would not welcome.

"Finally, I was disappointed to read that at the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad, which will be the largest in the world with 1,000 employees, only 33 Americans speak Arabic. This is shocking and dangerous and another indication of the widespread mismanagement of "Admitting the diffithe U.S. mission in Iraq."

Groups urge U.S. to relax travel, aid restrictions U.S. homes receive more discounted Venezuelan

MIAMI, Dec. 4, 2006 (AP): Twenty mostly Cuban exile organizations called on the U.S. government Mon-day to relax travel restrictions for Cuban-Americans who want to visit family on the island nation and to permit Americans to send hu-manitarian aid to the communist country

The request by the coalition Cuban Consensus comes weeks after top Cuban dissidents made similar requests. It also highlights the changing political views among the exile community over how to respond to the Cuban government's restric-tions on freedom of expression and movement.

Among those demanding the changes is *The Cuba* Study Group, a nonpartisan Washington-based organization of business and community leaders, the Miami-based Cuban American National Foundation, as well as the association of Indepen-

dent Libraries of Cuba.

"I came from the hard-line position," Cuba Study Group Co-Chairman Carlos Saladrigas said. "But isolating a people has not brought us change in 47 years. Isolating a people only helps to support the dictatorship."

Saladrigas added that the opposite tactic was used to promote change in Eastern



used in any of the transition processes in the Eastern European countries would work here?" he said.

The move comes at a time of great political uncertainty in Cuba, where 80-year-old Fidel Castro temporarily ceded power to his brother Defense Minister Raul Castro more than four months ago following intestinal surgery.

It also comes two days after *Raúl Castro* reached out to the United States during a major military parade, offer-ing to discuss the two countries' differences on equal terms. Fidel Castro did not appear at the parade as many Cubans had anticipated, making it seem more likely that Raul Castro will be the Cuban leader the U.S. deals with in the future.

The coalition said the restrictions implemented by the U.S., as well as those of the Cuban government, which severely restricts the travel of its citizens, violate fundamental human rights.

U.S. Rep. Lincoln Díaz-Balart, R-Florida, a longtime supporter of the U.S. embargo on Cuba, said he was glad to see growing consensus among Cuban organizations but that the coalition

was missing the larger issue "The genuine consensus

that needs to be emphasized at this critical moment must be focused on the immediate liberation of all political pris-oners without exceptions and in the scheduling of free, multiparty elections in Cuba, not in unilateral concessions to the dictatorship," he said.

The coalition is taking aim in particular at U.S. restrictions implemented in 2004 that made it more difficult for academic and humani-tarian groups to travel to the island and limited the num-ber of times Cubans can visit their families there from once a year to once every three years.

At the same time, the coalition is calling on Fidel Castro's government to make it easier for Cubans to visit their family outside the island, as well as reducing the costs necessary to obtain permission to leave the country. They are also asking the Cuban government to cut the country's high long-distance telephone taxes and provide citizens access to he Internet.

BALTIMORE (AP): The war of words between President George W. Bush and Venezuelan president Hugo Chávez was far from Debra Henderson's mind after she received a delivery of discounted heating oil as part of an aid program begun by the leader.

"I just want to say thank you, God bless all of you,' the 58-vear-old disabled mother of two said after receiving the oil from Citgo Petroleum Corp., the U.S. subsidiary of Venezuela's state-owned oil company.

The heating oil program is part of a promise by the country's leader to aid U.S .-America's poor. Critics say Chávez is hoping to embarrass Bush.

While the United States is the top buyer of Venezuelan oil, relations between the two countries have been tense. In a speech to the United Nations in September, Chávez called Bush "el diablo/the devil." The leader, who won re-election on Dec. 3, 2006, snubbed a U.S. overture for dialogue, saying he is willing to talk but doubts Washington's

desire to improve relations. He also conditioned the talks on a U.S. departure from Iraq.

The former hotel worker and private care nurse said she pays about \$300 a month to heat her home. On disability because of HIV infection, she lives with one of her two sons, Laron Lee, 28, a sergeant in the U.S. Army Reserve who also works nights at a nearby gas station.

"Sometimes when my son works at night what I do is turn the heat off all night and then cut it back on in the morning," said Henderson.

Henderson's home was the first of 15,000 in the eastern Maryland slated to receive up to 200 gallons (757 liters) of heating oil

at a 40 percent discount. Citgo exp a n d e d the program outside the Northeast this winter

Former U.S. Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy, who drove the delivery truck up to Henderson's small two-story brick rowhouse, said he was proud to work with Citgo.

Kennedy said he approached every major oil company and every OPEC nation last year and asked that small slice of record profits go to help the poor.

"Every single one of them turned me down, every single one of them," said Kennedy, whose Citizens Energy Corporation is running the household delivery program.

"Oil companies are used to sucking money out of these neighborhoods, not putting money into these neighborhoods. So, I am very proud of the work that's going on here."

Citizens Energy, founded by Kennedy, has provided discounted oil to the poor and elderly since the oil crisis of the late 1970s.

Venezuela Ambassador Bernardo Alvarez said in a statement that the country views its petroleum reserves "not simply as a commodity, but as a treasure to use to help others.

"Our assistance to the poor of the United States is part of a broad strategy to help those in need, not only in Venezuela but throughout the hemisphere under a spirit of solidarity promoted by president Chávez," Alvarez said.

familia al experimentar una "descompensación aguda en forma brusca e inesperada", señaló un escueto comunicado leído por el vocero del Hospital Militar, doctor Juan Ignacio Vergara.

Pinochet asumió el poder en un cruento golpe de estado que derrocó el 11 de septiembre de 1973 al presidente Salvador Allende, quien lo había nombrado comandante del ejército apenas 19 días antes.

Desde el comienzo de su dictadura Pinochet hizo actuar a una policía represiva que persiguió sin piedad a las autoridades y a partidarios del gobierno de Allende. Su régimen concluyó con un saldo oficial de 3.197 disidentes muertos, entre ellos 1.200 detenidos-desaparecidos.

En su último cumpleaños, el 25 de noviembre, Pinochet asumió la responsabilidad "de los hechos" ocurridos durante su régimen, pero nunca pidió perdón ni admitió las violaciones a los derechos humanos, que para el fueron solo "excesos" de sus

subalternos.

Lorena Pizarro, presidenta de la Agrupación de Familiares de Detenidos Desaparecidos dijo que "ha muerto la peor escoria que ha parido esta Patria, el 10 de diciembre, mira que ironía más grande", en alusión al Día Internacional de los Derechos Humanos.

El ex ministro y presidente del Partido Por la Democracia, Sergio Bitar, tras expresar las condolencias a la familia de Pinochet, añadió que "hay que hacer un juicio histórico".

"Pinochet impuso la dictadura más brutal, su período de 17 años de dictadura se caracterizó por la destrucción de la vida, junto con el aplastamiento de las libertades", añadió.

Joe Balderas: Redefining community activism

Last Friday, Joe Balderas, the executive director of the Sofia Quintero Art and Cultural Center, Inc., Toledo, sat down for a wide-ranging conversation with *La Prensa*. The South Broadway landmark is celebrating its tenth anniversary this year and has created a unique 16-month pictorial 2007 calendar as a fundraiser.

The Center opened at a smaller location directly across Broadway in 1996 and moved to its current location next door to the Farm Labor Organizing Committee international headquarters in 2000.

"I remember that the move was made around the time of the celebration of Pechanga in 2000. That also marked the start of my involvement in the community," says Balderas, who eventually became the Center's fulltime director.

Under his tutelage and direction, the Center has grown at a tremendous rate, with numerous cultural functions held throughout the year, such as the annual Día de Los Muertos

Balderas' goal is to make the Center "a Balderas goal is to make the Center's at classes are already attended by a cross-section of the community, and the Center's partnerships with the Toledo Museum of Art and now the Toledo YMCA are a vote of confidence by the greater community.

But who is Joe Balderas and what makes him tick?

He was born in Toledo 55 years ago, the father was born in foledo 35 years ago, the son of José María and Cruz Balderas. "My father was kind of an orphan," recalls Balderas. "Some friends took him in and came up here for work. My father came up with them. They would come back and forth and eventually my father found a steady full-time job here. He went back to Texas, got married, and brought my mother up here. The first place that I remember we



lived at was in Stony Ridge on a farm with

my cousins.
"I was the oldest of my siblings. My sister, Teresa, who now lives in Adrian [MI], was the voungest. I have two brothers, Arthur and John/Michael. Although he has one

name, people always call him by the other.
"We moved to Perrysburg Heights when I was still very young, and after several years we moved into Perrysburg. That's where I went to school," says Balderas.
