

U.S. plan to line Mexicali canal with concrete sparks opposition

MEXICALI, México (AP) Despite its name, the All-American Canal has been leaking water to the Mexican side of the desert border for more than 60 years, nourishing alfalfa, onion and cotton crops that might otherwise wither.

Now the U.S. government is preparing to line the earthen channel with concrete. Mexican farmers' loss will be California's gain: Scarce water that will no longer be able to seep away instead will help flush toilets and water lawns more than 100 miles west in San Diego.

And that would affect thousands of families whose fields cover thousands of acres around Mexicali, an industrial city of 800,000 that is gobbling up farmland on its outskirts. That's because the lining would prevent the replenishment of about 100 rural wells they use, according to critics of the project.

Nazario Ortiz, who farms 100 acres about three miles inside México, worries that his hardworking community won't survive.

"Everything comes from the canal, so everything is going to be ruined," said Ortiz, 46, who lives in a village where old pickup trucks and unleashed dogs share dirt roads. "How are people going to make a living?"

It will be hard, Ortiz says, to stop his sons—ages 22, 18, and 16—from illegally crossing the border to join relatives in Los Angeles.

For many of its 82 miles the canal's green waters trace the U.S.-México border, running through sand dunes and verdant fields to California's Imperial Valley, where it is the lifeblood for 500,000 acres of U.S. farmland.

The project to line 23 miles

of the canal is slated to begin this summer and be completed in 2008. Project managers expect that the refit canal will capture enough water for 135,000 new homes, mostly in San Diego and its suburbs.

The deal is not, however, ironclad. A group of Mexicali farmers and businesses has sued in federal court in Las Vegas to stop construction; a hearing is scheduled April 24.

Nearly 3,000 acres in México depend entirely on the All-American Canal, according to the Mexicali Economic Development Council. California also relies on water the canal siphons from the Colorado River as one of the West's major water sources winds from the Rocky Mountains to the Gulf of México.

Critics also say migrants may die crossing the canal because the concrete lining will deprive swimmers of tall grasses to grab.

Mexicans remember fishing on the Alamo in the 1970s. Now it's a bone-dry ditch—full of old tires, empty jugs, soda cans and carcasses of dogs, cats and cows—that winds around sleepy villages in the Mexicali Valley.

Farmers aren't the only Mexicans fretting about the concrete casing. Opponents say lost seepage threatens about a dozen hidden lagoons in Mexicali enjoyed by outdoor lovers and hunters.

Critics also say migrants may die crossing the canal because the concrete lining will deprive swimmers of tall grasses to grab. While the canal appears calm, migrants who crawl onto inflatable rafts can be swept away by a fierce undercurrent.

Nine people died in the canal last year, down from 29 in 2001, according to the Imperial County coroner's office.

The drop tracked a shift in border crossings to Arizona, and deaths could rise if more migrants return to crossing in California. To prevent such deaths, crews will build ladders 750 feet apart on both sides of the concrete lining.

While Mexican farmers protest the project most loudly, fearing that to recover lost water they'll have to dig deeper wells and pay higher electricity bills, there is surprising resistance in one California border town. The city council of Calexico, Calif., voted in January to oppose the project, echoing the opinion of some Imperial Valley farmers.


"I'm a farmer and those guys are farmers," said Tom Brundt, 49, a Calexico farmer who sends his four children to a private Catholic school in Mexicali. "I'd hate to have it happen to me."

Labor officials say guestworker bill will pass Senate

LAS VEGAS (AP): Despite resistance from Senate Republicans, the Bush administration remains optimistic about passing a temporary guestworker program, a labor department official told an industry group that supports the plan on Wednesday.

"I think there's still a significant likelihood that we'll be able to get the temporary worker program out of the Senate and therefore have a balanced proposal to take to conference (committee) this year," Deputy Labor Secretary Steven Law said at a meeting of the Associated Builders and Contractors in Las Vegas.

Senate leadership has set

a March 27 deadline for voting on a reform bill.

The Senate committee currently debating a guestworker program as part of a package of immigration reforms made little progress last Wednesday, as backers faced resistance from opponents, including Republicans on the committee, concerned that plan grants amnesty to undocumented immigrants.

Guestworker programs are popular with the construction industry, which depends heavily on immigrant labor. A temporary work program was not included in an immigration reform bill passed in the House.

Brett McMahan, a concrete contractor from Washington, D.C., attending the meeting, called the House bill's emphasis on tighter border control and law enforcement an "unmitigated disaster" for his business.

"(My employees) all get thrown out of the country and have to reapply, they're scared to death," he said, adding that 200 of his employees participated in a recent protest against the measure.

Associated Builders and Contractors, a national trade and lobbying group, says it represents 23,000 contractors and related firms.

Senate committee moves toward possible agreement on immigration

WASHINGTON (AP): Senators writing a major immigration law overhaul bill moved Thursday toward accepting an approach under which undocumented immigrants could stay in the United States while working toward permanent residence and eventual citizenship.

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., stressed that his plan moving through the Senate Judiciary Committee would not constitute an amnesty, a policy rejected by the Bush administration and most U.S.-Americans, according to polls.

Kennedy said it would not give the estimated 11 million people in the country illegally any advantage over the 3 million living overseas while waiting for a decision on green card applications.


Committee Chairman Arlen Specter said the panel would consider the proposal put forward by Kennedy and Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., when it reconvenes on March 27 after a weeklong recess.

Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, R-Tenn., has made clear that immigration reform will be on the chamber's floor that week, regardless of whether the Judiciary Committee comes up with a comprehensive bill.

U.S. Congress, at the urging of President Bush, has made comprehensive immigration reform a top priority for this election-year session, pushing forward proposals combining immigration enforcement, a guestworker program and a policy toward people living in the country illegally.

The future treatment of undocumented immigrants, Kennedy said, "really is the heart and soul of this whole undertaking."

The McCain-Kennedy plan would allow those in the United States undocu-

mented to obtain six-year nonimmigrant visas under which they could work in the country and travel outside the country. They would have to pay a \$1,000 fine and undergo background checks.

After six years, the im-

migrant who pays back taxes, is learning English, and pays an additional \$1,000 fine can

apply for a green card, or

permanent residency.

"This is a very compli-

cated bill," Specter said.

"And I think we have to get it done right."

Bush, in a State of the Union address two years ago, urged Congress to create a worker program under which participants could gain legal status for a specific time and then be required to return home. It would not provide an automatic path to citizenship.

The U.S. House on Dec. 16, 2005 passed a bill [HR 4437] that increases penalties for undocumented im-

migration activities (makes felons of over 11 million undocumented workers) and requires employers to verify the legal status of their employees. HR 4437 also makes felons out of any organization or agency that assisted undocumented immigrants. HR 4437 requires local law enforcement officers to act as immigration agents and mandates the construction of 700 miles of wall, separating the U.S. and México.

But with Democrats, and several Republicans, on the committee behind McCain-Kennedy, it appeared to have the edge.

McCain and Kennedy said they would work over the recess this week on the structure of a guestworker program, which would start out with 400,000 visas. The committee is also expected to take up a separate provision for temporary agriculture workers in preparation for debate on the floor.

Senators from both par-

ties in the committee on Wednesday objected to voting on a bill before the panel reaches a consensus on guestworkers.

Several Republicans sug-

gested that the Senate first deal with enforcement, and



Granholm: Safe, bullying-free environment critical to a world-class education

LANSING: In her weekly radio address, Governor Jennifer M. Granholm said nothing is more important to securing Michigan's future than giving all of our children a world-class education, and critical to that education is making sure every school is a safe, positive learning environment.

"Research in the Journal of the American Medical Association suggests that one out of every three students—one out of every three—in grades six through 10 is the victim of bullying," Granholm said. "While some school districts in Michigan have worked to address this issue, it's important to require that every district have policies in place to discourage bullying."

Granholm called for tough, new anti-bullying legislation in her 2006 State of the State Address and noted that legislation has been introduced by Representative Anderson and Senator Thomas to put those policies in place. She is urging the Legislature to move quickly to pass the proposals.

Granholm also cited two other necessary ingredients for a world class education: excellent teachers and necessary resources.

"Michigan is blessed with some of the best educators in America," Granholm said. "My administration has increased school funding to record levels in order to put more resources into every classroom and to ensure that every school in Michigan is a great place to learn."

The Governor also ap-

plauded the legislature's action on new rigorous curriculum standards and said she expects their work to be completed by the end of the month.

The Governor's weekly radio address is released each Friday at 10:00 a.m. and may be heard on broadcast stations across that state through an affiliation with the Michigan Association of Broadcasters. The address is available on the Governor's Website as a podcast for general distribution to personal MP3 players and home computers.

Kaptur offers amendment to monitor taxes spent for Iraq and Katrina—Republicans promptly reject Truman

WASHINGTON, DC: Congresswoman Marcy Kaptur (D, OH-9) introduced the *Truman Committee* amendment to the *War and Hurricane Supplemental Appropriations bill* (H.R. 4939) last week. This amendment would have created a select committee—based on the Truman Committee that existed from 1941 to 1948 during World War II—to investigate possible waste, fraud, and abuse in government contracts in Iraq and in the Katrina recovery and reconstruction.

The Truman Committee, or the Select Committee to Investigate the National Defense Program, held 432 public hearings and 300 executive sessions, conducted hundreds of fact-finding missions, issued 51 reports and saved the taxpayers billions of dollars.

The Republican leadership would not allow a vote on the amendment, ruling that it was not germane to the debate.

"This amendment would have allowed Congress to oversee exactly how the billions in taxpayer dollars are being spent in Iraq and in the power of the purse."

According to the Inspector General, \$8.8 billion of Iraq funds intended for reconstruction are unaccounted for and as many as fifty investigations were opened involving contractor fraud, kickbacks, bribery, and waste.

OCRC assesses voting rights progress

The Ohio Advisory Committee to the United States Commission on Civil Rights convened briefings on March 16 and 17, at the Ohio Civil Rights Commission, 1111 E. Broad St., Columbus, OH. The purpose was to find facts and assess the current state of voting access in Ohio.

In light of recent federal and state legislation, including the *Help America Vote Act* and Ohio House Bill 3, the Ohio Advisory Committee voted to hear testimony from experts about

these statutes and the manner in which they have been or will be implemented.

The Committee heard testimony regarding other aspects of voting access in Ohio. Experts included: State Sen. Jeff Jacobson, Franklin County Board of Elections Director Matthew Damroschroder, Common Cause Ohio Executive Director Sam Gresham, and Moritz College of Law Professor Daniel Tokaji.

The Chairman of the Ohio Advisory Committee, Lynwood Battle of Cincinnati, introduced the pre-

senters. Members of the Ohio Advisory Committee included: former U.S. Attorney Sharon Zealey, Ohio Civil Rights Commission Chairman Aaron Wheeler, and the University of Toledo, College of Law, Professor David Harris.

As directed by U.S. Congress, the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights has established committees in the 50 U.S states and the District of Columbia, comprised of volunteer citizens who advise the Commission on state-level civil rights issues.

Pulitzer winning author to speak for TBA, et al.

David Shipley, a Pulitzer prize-winning author, journalist, and expert on poverty in U.S.-America, will deliver the keynote address at the 2006 Access to Justice Awards dinner on Monday, April 10 at The Pinnacle in Maumee.

The event begins with a reception at 6:00 p.m., followed by dinner, presentation of the annual Access to Justice Awards and Shipley's comments (approximately 8:00 p.m.).

The Access to Justice Awards are presented annually by Advocates for Basic Legal Equality, Inc. (ABLE), Legal Aid of Western Ohio, Inc. (LAWO), and the Toledo Bar Association Pro Bono Legal Services Program. Tickets to the dinner are \$65 per person and are available by calling ABLE at 419-255-0814.

Shipley is considered an expert on poverty in the United States, following the publishing of his most recent book, "The Working Poor: Invisible in America." In it, he explores the gap between reality and the U.S.-American Dream of success by unraveling the interconnecting problems that afflict the working poor.

Shipley is also the author of "A Country of Strangers: Blacks and Whites in America," "Russia: Broken Idols, Solemn Dreams" and "Arab and Jew: Wounded Spirits in a Promised Land."

which won the Pulitzer Prize in 1987.

He worked for the *New York Times* for 20 years, reporting from New York, Saigon, Moscow, and Jerusalem before serving as chief diplomatic correspondent in Washington, D.C. Shipley has also written for *The New Yorker*, *The Washington Post*, and the *Los Angeles Times*.

The annual awards recognize outstanding service in the public interest by attorneys, organizations, and community advocates in northwest Ohio. Candidates are nominated by local organizations or individuals, and the winners are chosen by a selection committee of area leaders in the legal community.

The *Public Interest Law Award*, which recognizes a lawyer or law firm for representation of minority, low-income or otherwise disadvantaged persons, will be presented to attorney Cindy Voller.

Voller has dedicated herself to making a difference through pro bono work. Since 1993, she has distinguished herself through diligent and devoted representation of disadvantaged clients as part of the Toledo Bar Association's Pro Bono Legal Services program.

She is currently a member of the Pro Bono Advisory Board, having served as chair twice. In addition to her pro

bono work, Cindy is active in the TBA's Juvenile Court Committee, is media spokesperson for Gays/Lesbians United and is a board member for the John Domrose Foundation for Personal Rights. She has also served as a member of the Citizens Review Board since 1995.

The *Community Advocacy Award*, honoring a lay person for community service and advocacy on behalf of disadvantaged persons, will be presented to Shelley Papenfuse.

Papenfuse has made a career of advocacy for individuals with disabilities and other disadvantaged persons in the community. Her work with disability rights and education has touched the lives of thousands of people. She helped establish the first Disability Studies Program offered at the college level in the United States, capturing the attention of disability scholars and leaders nationally.

In her role as a Disability Advocate for the Ability Center of Greater Toledo, Papenfuse has made extensive outreach efforts to individuals, groups and the government regarding accessibility and visibility for persons with disabilities. Her leadership efforts have included board positions with TARTA, the City of Toledo Housing Fund, and the Ohio Governor's Olmstead

Taskforce.

She was honored in 2004 with a YWCA Milestone: A Tribute to Women award and received the Distinguished Community Leadership Award from the City of Toledo in 1996.

Special recognition will be awarded to William J. Bingle, who received a *Distinguished Service Award* for the leadership and vision he provided as a two-term President of the ABLE and LAWO boards of trustees.

During his tenure, the firms began a consolidation of legal services that resulted in a 32-county service area. Bingle oversaw the establishment and installation of Legal Aid Line of Western Ohio, a centralized intake service that helped to increase the number of low-income persons served by legal aid.

BOWLING GREEN: Actor and producer *Tim Reid*, Akron Beacon Journal managing editor *Mizell Stewart III*, and investigative journalist *Jerry Mitchell* will headline Communications Week, March 27-29, at Bowling Green State University.

Hosted by the School of Communication Studies, this year's speakers and panelists will address the subject of "Communication, Race, and Power: Challenges and Opportunities in the Digital Age."

On Monday, March 27, Tim Reid, the Emmy-nominated actor, director and producer, will address students, faculty and the community during "An Evening with Tim Reid," from 7:30-9 p.m. in 202 Bowen-Thompson Student Union.

Best known for his starring role in the popular CBS television series "WKRP in Cincinnati," Reid has also had starring roles on "The Richard Pryor Show," "Simon & Simon," "Frank's Place," "Snoops," "Save Our Streets," and the hit WB series, "Sister, Sister." He received two Emmy nominations for his work on "Frank's Place" and received the NAACP Image Award and the Viewers for Quality Television Award.

Reid has launched his own production company, Tim Reid Productions, and has produced several television movies and four independent films. He is in the process of building his own film studio.

On March 28, the School of Communication Studies will host an academic conference exploring issues of race

and digital media. "African-Americans in Film & Television: Twentieth-Century Lessons for a New Millennium" will explore both the historical struggles of African-Americans and their depictions in and by the media. The conference will address those lessons carried forward into new digital media and what challenges and opportunities lay ahead. The event will take place from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in 308 Union.

Stewart, from the Beacon Journal, will speak about news consumers during a BG News Reunion at 5 p.m. March 28, also in 308 Union. His lecture, "People Like Me," will explore the changing demographics of news consumers and the intense competition media organizations face to better reflect the lives of their readers and viewers.

Mitchell, an investigative reporter at The Clarion-Ledger in Jackson, Miss., will speak from 7-9 p.m. Wednesday, March 29, in 121 West Hall. His lecture, "Searching for Justice: A Journalist's Tale," will focus on his reporting that put four Klansmen behind bars, including Byron De La Beckwith, for the 1963 assassination of NAACP leader Medgar Evers. Mitchell's work has also been an inspiration to others. Since 1989, authorities in Mississippi and six other states have reexamined 29 killings from the civil rights era and made 27 arrests, leading to 22 convictions.

For his work, Mitchell has won 16 national awards, including the Sigma Delta Chi Award for Public Service. He received his master's degree in journalism from Ohio

State University.

Abogada latina challenges Board of Elections for removing her name from the May 2nd ballot for using her maiden name of Martínez

Cleveland: On March 13th, responding to a protest filed by Lakewood attorney Henry Hilow, attorney *Jennifer Martínez*, along with her attorney, *Santiago Feliciano*, appeared before the Board of Elections to defend her right to run for Juvenile Court Judge, using her maiden name of Martínez.

The Board found the Martínez petitions to be invalid, ordering that her name be removed from the May 2nd ballot.

The Board deemed the Hilow protest, which was filed after the protest deadline of 4:00PM, to be timely filed because "it was in the building." According to Martínez, ORC section 3513.05 makes it clear that the filing deadline was by 4:00PM. The protest was file-stamped 4:32PM.

The Board admitted that despite the fact that its own staff had given attorney Martínez incorrect instructions to file a change-of-

name voter registration card along with the filing of her petitions—her name of Martínez was deemed not valid on the petitions.

Attorney Martínez informed *La Prensa* that she has requested a writ of mandamus with Ohio's 8th District Court of Appeals, seeking to have the appellate court order the Board to put her name back on the ballot. The Board had until March 21 to respond.

Martínez, who has been a Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Juvenile Court Public Defender for 6 years, believes that the Board blatantly disregarded statutory requirements as well as applicable case law. Martínez has never legally changed her name to Atzberger, which is the last name of her husband, Craig Atzberger.

Martínez argued that she

has used both her maiden name of Martínez and her married name of Martínez Atzberger since her marriage in 1996. The Board failed to

make any ruling regarding relevant case law as it applied to Martínez and the use of the surname Martínez on her petitions.

Martínez states, "I am confident that the Court of Appeals will see past the petty politics of this protest, and require that the law be followed in this matter. I chose to use my maiden name because I believe that it is my legal name and I am proud of my heritage.

"I am a person who is qualified to run for the position that I am seeking, and I shouldn't be excluded from the democratic process because I am a married woman who chose to use her maiden name.

"The law permits me to do so, and so should the Board of Elections. Frankly,

I think this is an issue of gender discrimination," added Martinez.

Latino immigrant organizations form RIO

Ohio Latino immigrant organizations met in Columbus on March 5 to form a statewide, networking coalition of immigrant rights groups. The Ohio Immigrants Network (*Red de Inmigrantes de Ohio*, or RIO) was established by 35 delegates from four immigrant organizations.

"We have created this alliance of immigrants in Ohio to fight for our rights throughout our state," said Beatriz Maya, a staff member of the Farm Labor Organizing Committee (FLOC) and a spokesperson for RIO.

"Our purpose is to create an organization that is led by immigrants themselves and is concerned about raising immigrant voices in this debate. This is a step forward for Latino immigrants in Ohio," added Maya.

The Ohio Immigrant Network (RIO) was created by: the Farm Labor Organizing Committee (FLOC), a farm workers' union based in Toledo; the Coalition for Immigrant Rights and Dignity (Coalición por los Derechos y la Dignidad de los Inmigrantes, CODEDI), an immigrant rights organization based in Cincinnati; the Immigrant Worker Project (IWP) works for justice & dignity with 27 immigrant communities in rural Ohio; and Mayan Immigrants from Guatemala (Miguate), an organization of Guatemalan immigrants based in New Philadelphia.

The 31 Latino immigrants present came from México, Guatemala, Peru, Argentina, and other countries. The coalition will be reaching out to other Latino immigrant based groups and left open the possibility that immigrants from other regions (Asia, Africa, and Europe) might also join the coalition in the future.

According to Maya, building immigrant leadership "to sustain the struggle" will be at the core of the work of RIO.

In the short term, RIO adopted a plan of action that included: writing letters to legislators, local and statewide demonstrations, lobbying legislators, and raising the possibility of a state-wide strike by immigrant workers. RIO plans to present resolutions to local and state labor councils, to attempt to work with businesses that will also be hurt by several proposed immigration reform bills, and to reach out to colleges and university.

RIO will also work with African-American organizations and other people of color, Appalachians, and low-income workers, putting out a call to for discussion and collaboration.

RIO members participated in a March 11th rally for immigrant rights at the Cathedral in downtown Cincinnati, and plan to participate in: the March 26th statewide mobilization and rally at the Capitol building in

Columbus, and the April 12th students' March for Justice and rally for immigrant rights in Toledo.

RIO will join with organizations throughout the country to lobby in Washington, D.C. in the Spring.

"Immigrants themselves must be at the center of the fight for immigrants' rights," said Beatriz Maya. "But, we know that most Americans recognize that the laws being proposed in Congress today will unfairly penalize workers who are making a contribution to our society, and will create a permanent class of working people with no rights—and that cannot be good for any of us."

RIO plans rally on March 26

The Network is launching a state-wide mobilization for demonstration for immigration reform on Sunday March 26, 2006. They are calling upon friends and allies to join immigrants in a rally at the Capital Building in Columbus Ohio at 2:00 p.m.

"It is time to be louder than ever," said Santiago Rafael, one of the co-leaders of RIO and a member of FLOC. "Poor people and people of color all over the country are under attack. What happened to Katrina victims and what is happening to us immigrants are two faces of the same coin. We call upon all people of color to join us in Columbus."

"We are especially con-

cerned about proposed legislation [HR 4437] that would criminalize undocumented immigrants and their supporters, break up families, and build a wall between the United States and México," said Jeff Stewart, of the Immigrant Worker Project. "We intend to fight for laws to recognize immigrants' hard work, preserve their families, and build bridges between our countries and our cultures."

"We will be coming from around the state to the capital to ask our state senators to reject proposals such as the *Sensenbrenner-King bill* and to pass a just immigration reform," said Sylvia Castellanos, a member of the Coalition for Immigrants Rights and Justice (CODEDI) based in Cincinnati.

RIO calls for legalizing the status of immigrants, who have been working in the United States, and giving them a path to citizenship. Short of that, says Castellanos, they will support *McCain-Kennedy's* measures to give immigrants legal status.

Inmigrantes latinos de Ohio forman red estatal

Columbus: Organizaciones de inmigrantes Latinos de todas partes de Ohio se juntaron en Columbus para establecer una coalición estatal en defensa de los derechos de los inmigrantes. La Red de Inmigrantes de Ohio o RIO fue establecida por 35 delegados de cuatro organizaciones y varias ciudades del estado.

"Hemos establecido esta alianza de inmigrantes de Ohio para luchar en defensa de los derechos de los inmigrantes en nuestro estado," dijo Beatriz Maya, organizadora del sindicato de trabajadores del campo, el FLOC (Farm Labor Organizing Committee), y portavoz de RIO. "Nuestra meta es crear una organización bajo el liderazgo de los inmigrantes, nos interesa que la voz del inmigrante tenga presencia en estos debates. Es un gran paso adelante para los inmigrantes Latinos de Ohio," dijo Maya.

El 26 de marzo

Convocamos a toda la gente de color a juntarse con nosotros en Columbus".

"Nos preocupa la legislación que pueda criminalizar a los trabajadores sin documentos y a quienes los apoyan, que puede destruir familias, y que construirá un muro entre los Estados Unidos y México," dijo Jeff Stewart del Proyecto de los Trabajadores Inmigrantes (IWP por sus siglas en inglés). "Vamos a luchar por leyes que reconocen el trabajo de los inmigrantes, que mantienen sus familias unidas, y que construyen puentes entre países y cultura."

"Llegaremos de todas partes del estado al Capitolio en Columbus para pedir que nuestros senadores rechacen propuestas tal como Sensenbrenner y que pasen una reforma migratoria justa," dijo Sylvia Castellanos, miembro de la Coalición para los Derechos y Dignidad de los Inmigrantes (CODEDI) con sede en Cincinnati. RIO, la Red de Inmigrantes de Ohio, hace un llamamiento para la legalización de los inmigrantes que han estado trabajando en los EEUU, y insiste en darles una ruta hacia la ciudadanía si la quieren. Dominicanos convocan a protesta contra legislación federal


SAN JUAN (AP): El Comité Dominicano de Derechos Humanos hizo un llamado a los extranjeros latinoamericanos residentes en Puerto Rico a unirse a una protesta frente al tribunal federal en Hato Rey en repudio a una legislación que podría resultar en su deportación.

La protesta es en contra del proyecto conocido como "Acta de Inmigración Ilegal, Protección de la Frontera

y Terrorismo" que podría resultar en la deportación de once millones de latinos residentes en Estados Unidos, según Saúl Pérez portavoz del comité.

"Con esta ley, los que estemos legales, seremos sospechosos de ser delincuentes o terroristas, y por ende estaremos en la lista de deportación cuando se viole una ley simple", dijo Pérez en un comunicado de prensa.

La protesta también está convocada por el



Movimiento de Solidaridad Humana y el Movimiento de Unidad Obrera Dominicana.

La manifestación será el jueves 23 de marzo a las 12:30 de la tarde frente al edificio del tribunal federal en la calle Chardón de Hato Rey, informó Pérez.

Teacher suspended over CSAP Spanish translations complaints

ASPEN, CO (AP): An Aspen Middle School teacher has been "partially" suspended after refusing to administer standardized tests, saying verbally translating multiple-choice questions for Spanish-speaking students is unfair and subjective, the teacher and an officials said.

Sam Esmiol, 38, said the state and federally mandated Colorado Student Assessment Program tests "discriminate against Latino students and treat teachers unfairly."

District Superintendent Diana Sirkо on

Wednesday said Esmiol, a first-year employee, is "partially" suspended. Esmiol told the Aspen Times his suspension is for morning test periods, but he continues to teach regular classes in the afternoon.

Esmiol said translating multiple-choice questions to a group of students is unfair because some will understand and answer the question while others may need more time and explanation.

"Students test scores are influenced by the quality of the translation. These tests do not accurately represent their (student's) abilities," he said.

Sirkо said the issue is one that could be discussed, but it's a serious matter if a person refuses to take part.

Esmiol said he is considering legal action against the school district and the state, saying it's not about money but about a need for public debate on testing.

CSAP tests are being administered to students in grades three through 10 this week and next. The tests are designed to gauge achievement levels in such basic subjects as English, mathematics, reading and science.

Many Latinos still homeless after Hurricane Katrina

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP): Many Latinos are still homeless and living in dire conditions along the Gulf Coast because of a language barrier and ethnic profiling, researchers at the University of South Carolina said March 15th.

The school was awarded nearly \$400,000 in grants to fund 18 research projects on the societal and environmental impact of Hur-

cane Katrina. One of those projects was a \$25,000 study on how Latinos managed during and after the storm.

"We found that a huge percentage of the Latinos living in Louisiana and Mississippi are still homeless. They encounter a variety of problems including bugs, mold, skin problems and not getting paid for jobs," said Elaine Lacy, Director of Research Initiatives at the university's

Lorain follows Cleveland, Columbus, and Grand Rapids in opposing HR 4437

that make felons of all undocumented immigrants within the United States (estimated to be over 11 million) and those individuals that assist them, such as churches, social service agencies, priests/preachers, unions, and employers.

HR 4437, a.k.a. the *Border Protection, Anti-Terrorism & Illegal Immigration Control Act*, a.k.a. the *Sensenbrenner-King bill*, also make immigration agents out of all local law enforcement officers and mandates the construction of almost 700 miles of wall, separating the United States from its neighbor México.

This resolution was not made in a vacuum, with numerous cities and county commissions from around the United States condemning these provisions—such as Cleveland City Council on Feb. 27, Cuyahoga County Commissioners on Mar. 2, Columbus City Council on March 13, and Lorain City Council.

Lorain City Council and OCHLA condemn provisions of HR 4437

On Monday, March 20, Lorain City Council voted unanimously on an emergency resolution opposing HR 4437.

In an interview with *La*

Prensa, Councilman-at-Large Anthony Krasienko stated that "Lorain is an international city. Citizens of Lorain believe in and are rich in cultural diversity and many of the provisions [of HR 4437] are very divisive and polarizing."

"It is not wise making criminals out of undocumented workers, who are part of the system, or making criminals out of social service agencies such as churches. We are a land of immigrants—this is what America is all about."

"Many of us on council were troubled by making our police officers immigration agents, thus draining their energy from traditional, vital assignments such as local protection."

According to Krasienko, the resolution was passed 10 to 0 and it "now goes to Mayor Craig Foltin for his consideration."

The resolution becomes law if signed by the mayor or remains unsigned for more than ten days.

On March 15, the Ohio Commission of Hispanic/Latino Affairs (OCHLA) held its regular monthly meeting at Bowling Green State University.

The meeting was in conjunction with BGSU's *Latino Networking Alliance's* Open Forum that afternoon, with presentations by Dr. Rubén Villamonte-Anguiano (Assistant Professor in the School of Family and Consumer Services at BGSU), Dr. Linda Dobb (Executive Vice President of BGSU), and Dr. Neal Jesse (Associate Professor, Political Science Dept at BGSU). Dr. Jesse discussed the "English

Marches and rallies slated

In reaction to HR 4437, marches and rallies have flowered, such as the recent march in Chicago where over 350,000 demonstrated against HR 4437. Marches or rallies are also planned for Columbus on March 26 and for Toledo on April 12, according to *Baldemar Velásquez*, President of the Farm Labor Organizing Committee (FLOC).

Velásquez has been leading the charge on behalf of migrants for the past 37 years, throughout the Midwest and North Carolina, with victories over Campbell's and Mt. Olive Pickle Company.

He is now challenged by an immigration bill passed by the House, which has termed "draconian."

In a March 1st letter to the editor of *La Prensa*, Velásquez wrote, "I am speechless by the draconian Sensenbrenner H.B. 4437 passed by our U.S. Congress this past December... I am at a loss to describe the type of person who comes up with these ideas."

"It is time we speak out loudly and present some opposition to this nonsense!" added Velásquez.

All at a time when most Latinos, as well as union officials and civil rights advocates, honor the birth date of one of their great Mexican-American leaders, *César Estrada Chávez*, whose birthday is March 31.

The government of México, which has been very supportive of the United States, has condemned HR 4437 and is outraged by the suggestion that a wall be built, separating the countries at about 35 percent of their borders.

The U.S. Senate is considering its options, with several bills before it, including the McCain-Kennedy and Specter bills. The marches are focused around these proceedings and the anticipated vote, expected on March 27, or shortly thereafter.

New Ohio Direction Card (EBT)

The Ohio Department of Job and Family Services is changing the Direction Card and the way it is used. The Ohio EBT program stands for electronic Benefits Transfer. The Ohio Direction Card is a debit card which benefits are transferred automatically once a month into an account to access food benefits at almost all grocery stores. Ohio prepares to mail to more than 400,000 households to convert to the new system for distributing food stamps.

Food stamp recipients may use the new Ohio Direction Cards starting Monday, March 27. Benefits for the month of April will be available via the new cards on that same date. The existing Ohio Direction Cards will no longer be accepted on March 27. Any balances that remain on the current cards will be transferred to the new cards on Wednesday, March 29.

The new system will save taxpayers \$23 million per year and consumers will benefit because the cards will work just like credit and debit cards. Account information on the existing Ohio Direction Cards is contained in a computer chip on the front of each card; the so-called "smart cards" must be read by special readers. The new cards have a magnetic stripe on the back and can be read by the same readers already in place to accept credit and debit cards.

May 1, 2006, and every month thereafter, will automatically add benefits to the new blue and silver Ohio Direction Card every month. Customers will no longer have to visit the agency to get their EBT card. All customers must call Customer Service at 1-866-386-3071 to select a 4 digit PIN so that the card can be used immediately at the same terminal debit/credit card user's use which will not identify them as "food stamp" customers. The EBT card can be used anywhere in Ohio as well as in many other states. This makes it easy for our customers to access their food stamps benefits in the event of their moving or in emergency situations.

The lawsuit alleges that Ford Credit has a policy or practice of charging Black and Hispanics higher financing charges than similarly situated white consumers. The proposed Settlement, if approved by the Court, will settle this case. 


