

LULAC objects to Tejano congressional runoff date falling on Dec. 12—*El Día de La Virgen*

WASHINGTON(AP): A Latino group known as LULAC, along with other Latino organizations, is objecting to the Dec. 12 Texas congressional runoff election date set by Republican Gov. Rick Perry, saying it's a GOP attempt to suppress Latino votes by allowing too little time to mobilize and because it falls on a holy day, *El Día de La Virgen*.

A Perry spokeswoman said the governor was complying with a court order to set the earliest date possible in the race between Republican Rep. *Henry Bonilla* and Democrat *Ciro Rodríguez*.

They're seeking the U.S. House seat in a district that was redrawn after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled the congressional map violated Latinos' voting rights.

A runoff was necessary because none of the eight candidates had 50 percent of the vote in the Nov. 7 election. Bonilla won 49 percent and Rodríguez had 20 percent.

Luis Vera Jr., the national general counsel for the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) who is also serving as Rodríguez's campaign treasurer, criticized the date Perry set late Tuesday.

"This is a strategic move

to suppress the Latino vote, because they are afraid the vote will go for Mr. Rodríguez," Vera said.

Despite his ties to Rodríguez, Vera emphasized the group's goal was to protect Latino voting rights not to help either candidate. A LULAC news release opposing the date also carried the names of *Rosa Rosales*, LULAC national president, and *Roger Rocha*, LULAC's Texas state director.

Dec. 12 is the feast day of the Virgin of Guadalupe. Some Latino communities in the district that stretches over a large swath of West and southwest Texas and part of San Antonio attend processions, Mass and family gatherings to honor the day celebrating the appearance of the Virgin before Indian peasant Juan Diego in México in 1531.

The Virgin of Guadalupe is considered the patron saint of México and Latin America.

Perry announced the date after the end of the business day. Early voting would begin Dec. 4. LULAC says the election should be set no earlier than Dec. 19, with early voting beginning Dec. 11 to give ample notice to voters.

Kathy Walt, Perry's spokeswoman, said the court ordered the secretary

of state to set the runoff date as soon as possible. She said the Nov. 7 votes weren't canvassed until Tuesday because one county had not reported results.

Secretary of State Roger Williams worked with the governor to set the date and followed the state election code. A later election would run into the Christmas holidays, said Williams' spokesman Scott Haywood. He said Williams does not plan to change the date.

Rodríguez opposed Dec. 12. A Bonilla spokesman said it was fair.

The date means a shortened campaign period, which could work against Rodríguez. Bonilla had \$1.94 million cash on hand in mid-October, according to a report filed Oct. 26. He raised another \$205,500 after filing the report, according to Federal Election Commission records.

Rodríguez reported he had \$22,996 in cash by mid October and raised another \$12,000 in the days before the elections. His FEC reports show his committee owes about \$45,000 in campaign debt.

The Supreme Court ruled last summer that Texas reduced Latino voting strength in the district by redrawing its boundaries in 2003. The changes were

part of a redistricting scheme led by former Majority Leader Tom DeLay that included the goal of boosting re-election chances for Bonilla, whose popularity among Latinos was eroding.

District 23 once took in all of Webb County, home to Laredo, a city on the Texas-México border. In that configuration, Bonilla won his 2002 race with only 52 percent of the vote. Under DeLay's redistricting plan, 100,000 Latinos were removed from the district, in part by splitting Webb County, and Bonilla won with 69 percent.

A federal court redrew the district, increasing the Latino voting age population to 61 percent from 51 percent and throwing open the race for the District 23 seat.

Inmigrantes timados por falsos asesores en EEUU con EEUU-FRAUDE VISTAZO

NUEVAYORK (AP): Una mujer de Barbados desesperada por regularizar su situación migratoria en Estados Unidos escuchó que podía conseguir la anhelada "tarjeta verde" mediante una iglesia en Brooklyn. Necesitaba 1.200 dólares, más de tres veces los ahorros de su vida.

La mujer vacío su cuenta bancaria, se endeudó con parientes e ingresó a la "iglesia", cuyos servicios se llevaban los brindaba en la sala de una casa una mujer desalinhada que se describía como la dirigente del grupo.

La inmigrante empezó a asistir al servicio dominical y a dedicarse al estudio de la Biblia los sábados, porque la líderesa decía que era necesario; las autoridades de inmigración estarían observando, le advertía.

Seis meses después la mujer empezó a sospechar. Había estado pagando cuotas y pidiendo prestado más y más dinero, y no recibía el ofrecido número del Seguro Social ni el permiso para

trabajar. Se le dijo que el costo de la tarjeta verde había subido. Finalmente abandonó la "iglesia", pero el daño ya estaba hecho.

Cuando acudió a una entrevista con autoridades federales de inmigración para obtener la residencia luego de casarse, le dijeron que había cometido fraude. Los agentes gubernamentales habían rastreado por algún tiempo su búsqueda de una tarjeta verde.

"Dijeron que tenían formularios con mi firma que demostraban que yo había cometido fraude conscientemente. La verdad es que no tenía idea. Dijeron que podría ser deportada", relató a Wendy Rutherford, de la organización Proyecto de Acción Comunitaria, un conglomerado de organizaciones religiosas radicadas en Brooklyn que defiende los derechos de los inmigrantes.

Hay en Nueva York unos 3,4 millones de residentes nacidos en otros países, y una cantidad adicional de 500.000 inmigrantes indocumentados, según datos de las autoridades municipales. Pero se desconoce el número de los supuestos abogados y "consultores en inmigración" que han

Report: Operation Linebacker catches more immigrants than criminals

AUSTIN, Nov. 20, 2006 (AP): Border sheriffs are using federal dollars meant to fight drug trafficking and violent crime to enforce federal immigration laws, according to an El Paso Times analysis of state documents.

"Law enforcement is sworn to uphold laws," Walt said. "They don't pick and choose which laws to enforce."

Gov. Rick Perry and border sheriffs insist state border security operations are used to deter crime and terrorism, not to enforce federal immigration laws. The reports do not show any terrorism-related arrests in six months.

The reports show Operation Linebacker, the program one state security official called the "cornerstone" of Texas border safety efforts, caught suspected undocumented immigrants seven times more often than it apprehended violent criminals and drug traffickers.

Civil rights activists say some sheriffs are misusing federal dollars by targeting immigrants and could jeopardize millions in funding meant to fight drug-related and violent crime.

"Money the governor is allocating is clearly being misused," said Will Harrell, Texas ACLU executive director.

The Times obtained six months of Operation Linebacker reports from the 16 counties receiving federal money for the operation.

Some lawmakers said the numbers raise serious concerns about whether the sheriffs warrant the \$100 million Perry wants legislators to allocate for future border security efforts.

"We in the Legislature don't mind providing them help to fight crime and target drug smugglers, but certainly the money is not intended for them to enforce immigration laws," said state Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen.

Perry spokeswoman Kathy Walt said catching undocumented immigrants is a side effect of

increased law enforcement presence on the border, and the governor is not concerned about losing funding for his border security programs.

"Law enforcement is sworn to uphold laws," Walt said. "They don't pick and choose which laws to enforce."

Perry gave border county sheriffs about \$10 million in federal grants for Operation Linebacker. The money was to fund overtime and equipment for sheriffs' deputies to patrol rural border areas the understaffed U.S. Border Patrol often cannot.

The reports indicate sheriffs' deputies in the 16 counties requested Border Patrol assistance with 4,756 undocumented immigrants.

On average, for every one arrest the sheriffs made, they reported seven undocumented immigrants to the Border Patrol.

The sheriffs reported encounters with 85 undocumented immigrants from countries other than Mexico. Most were from El Salvador, Honduras, Guatemala, and Nicaragua. Deputies reported contact with one person from Syria, which the U.S. Department of Defense has identified as a country that sponsors terrorism. The Syrian was reported in Val Verde County but no arrest was reported.

Perry's director of state homeland security, Steve McCraw, said state border security operations are not intended to round up those who come to the U.S. simply to work or reunite with family.

Officers are obligated to contact the Border Patrol when they determine a person is in the country illegally, he said.

"No one has figured out a way to look at someone and tell if they're a terrorist, a criminal or an economic emigre," he said. "You just don't know."

Operation Linebacker money comes from a U.S. Department of Justice grant program that requires law enforcement officials to use

the money to fight drug-related and violent crime.

The ACLU's Harrell said Perry "needs to rein in" sheriffs who are using the money to track down undocumented immigrants.

"The governor needs to withdraw and reallocate the money if he's convinced, as I am, that the money is being misused," Harrell said.

The governor believes that his programs are deterring crime, his spokeswoman said.

"These figures represent activities that occur as you are reducing crime," Walt said.

Perry has said he is not concerned with the long-term ramifications of his border security operations in immigrant communities. He said he hopes the programs are short-lived and the federal government will step up border efforts so state funds can be directed elsewhere.

Until Congress acts, though, he wants legislators to approve \$100 million from the state budget to continue his border security programs.

Hinojosa said sheriffs don't have training to enforce complex federal immigration laws.

"They dilute their power when they lose focus on criminals and start doing immigration stuff," he said. "It defeats the whole purpose."

Get your flu shots as per MSMS



EAST LANSING: With more than 77 million doses of flu vaccine already delivered nationwide, now is the time to call your physician to schedule a flu shot, according to the *Michigan State Medical Society* (MSMS).

MSMS is supporting the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) declaration of National Influenza Vaccination Week from Nov. 27 to Dec. 3 to encourage all who are interested in a flu shot to get one in November or December.

"Since flu season does not usually peak until February or later, now is an ideal time to get a flu shot," said MSMS president Paul O. Farr, MD, a Grand Rapids gastroenterologist. "Many physician offices now have the vaccine on hand, so don't put it off any longer. Call and get your flu shot now."

Doctor Farr pointed out that most people who do get the flu have a complete recovery, but it does cause a week or more of misery. The flu also keeps people from work, school and leisure activities. With more people vaccinated, it will help control the spread of the flu to others.

"Getting a flu shot is not only a great way to protect yourself, but your whole family," Doctor Farr said.

Each year in the United States, between five and 20 percent of the population is infected with influenza, about 36,000 people die and more than 200,000

people are hospitalized because of influenza complications, according to the CDC. Since influenza is unpredictable, and different types and strains of influenza circulate throughout the flu season, the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends that influenza vaccine be offered throughout the influenza season, even after influenza has appeared or begun appearing in a community. Michigan's first case was reported last week.

According to the CDC, flu vaccine manufacturers have reported they expect 110 to 115 million doses of flu vaccine to be distributed this year. This is at least 27 to 32 million more doses than have been distributed in any past season and 29 to 34 million more doses than were distributed last year.



Slain Latino children remembered for loving their families

ELKHART, IN, Nov. 21 (AP): Bells tolled and passers-by stopped in their tracks Tuesday as pallbearers carried three white coffins from a northern Indiana church into the sunshine and gently loaded them into hearses.

The funeral for four slain children whose mother has been arrested in their deaths included a touching reminder of their young lives—the two smallest victims were interred in the same coffin, their feet touching.

Tuesday's 90-minute Mass at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church drew more than 300 mostly Latino mourners, including several weeping parents who clutched their own children.

The Rev. Wilson Corzo conducted the service mostly in Spanish, although mourners were led in singing both Spanish and English versions of "Amazing Grace," "How Great Thou Art," and other hymns.

Family friend Tammy Baughman addressed the gathering in English, a Spanish translator at her side, as she recalled each child's unique personality.

Baughman said 8-year-old Jennifer López was graced with a contagious smile and a love of family, 6-year-old Gonzalo López was bashful but loved to give hugs, 4-year-old Daniel Valdez was a big eater and was so obsessed by the film "The Lion King" that he watched it almost every day.

Two-year-old Jessica Valdez, meanwhile, had a hearty belly laugh, an early independent streak and reigned as the "queen of her daddy's heart."

"There is joy in my heart from knowing them,"

Baughman said, her voice cracking. "I pray that you will always remember how much they loved life and how much joy they brought to us. They will be missed."

Baughman had visited the young family the day of the children's deaths but she has said she did not see any signs they were in danger.

Autopsies showed the four siblings died of asphyxia, and investigators are treating the deaths as homicides but have released no additional details.

Their mother, 27-year-old Angelica Alvarez has been arrested in their deaths. She was found unconscious Nov. 14 among her children's bodies in the basement of their home in the city about 15 miles east of South Bend.

Gonzalo López, father of the two oldest children, has said Alvarez was depressed after losing her job and had been hospitalized for 12 days recently. Officials at Norco Industries, where Alvarez had worked as a housekeeper for three years, said she quit in mid-September.

Deacon Ramiro Reyes told mourners that the four young victims were now far beyond their earthly concerns.

"They are in God's hands now. May God embrace them now and for all eternity," said Reyes, urging those gathered to pray "for all parents who suffer over the deaths of their children."

Baughman's husband, the Rev. Brian Baughman of Osceola Grace Brethren Church, where Alvarez and her children had attended services, urged those gathered to turn to each other for comfort as they deal with the tragedy.

Baughman said he had been bothered since the four siblings were found dead whether the oldest child, 8-



year-old Jennifer López, had understood the Christian belief that Jesus Christ died for humanity's sins.

He said found his answer in a blue spiral school notebook that the child had kept, which included comments in which she thanked God for help in passing a mathematics test. He held the book aloft and said it was proof that she was a Christian and

would have an eternal life.

"Dear God, I loved it when I got a B-minus on my math test. I thank you for that. I love you a lot. I love you and my family," Baughman said, reading a passage dated Nov. 6 from the notebook. "I believe these four children—all four of them—are right now in the direct presence of God in heaven."

QUITO (AP): El izquierdista Rafael Correa aseguró que su amistad con el mandatario venezolano Hugo Chávez no significa que tendrá injerencia en su gobierno si se confirman los resultados extraoficiales que lo dan como ganador de la segunda presidencial de este domingo.

Comentó que si el presidente de Estados Unidos George W. Bush ofrece ventajas para Ecuador "por supuesto que haremos tratos con Bush para beneficio mutuo".

En declaraciones a canal 8 de televisión, Correa afirmó que "ojalá nos acerquemos muchísimo a Chávez", como también con los presidentes izquierdistas Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, de Brasil; Néstor Kirchner, de Argentina, y Michell Bachelet, de Chile.

"Por Dios, son países latinoamericanos, a quien tenemos que pedirle permiso para estrechar lazos de amistad?", expresó el candidato, considerado virtual ganador de los comicios y que se ha definido como un católico de izquierda.

"¿No tenemos que acercarnos a países como Venezuela, que nos puede ayudar muchísimo, porque hay una oligarquía a la que le cae mal Chávez?", se preguntó.

Comentó que si el presidente de Estados Unidos George W. Bush ofrece ventajas para Ecuador "por supuesto que haremos tratos con Bush para beneficio mutuo".

"Chávez es mi amigo personal, pero en mi casa no mandan mis amigos, mando yo, y aquí en Ecuador van a mandar los ecuatorianos", aseveró Correa, quien dijo que no ha recibido ninguna llamada del presidente venezolano luego de difundidos los resultados.

"Como Chávez es mi amigo ahí metieron el miedo que va a dominar el país, no hay nada de eso ... ¿o acaso porque le cae mal a cierta oligarquía de este país es que no vamos a buscar esa ayuda?", dijo.

al bien común de los ecuatorianos", manifestó y atribuyó tales temores a lo que llamó "una campaña sucia" de su rival, el magnate bananero Alvaro Noboa.

Adijo que lo que le une a Chávez el espíritu bolivariano "de buscar la integración latinoamericana y ojalá eso nos una a todos los presidentes de América Latina ¿dónde está el temor, por favor?".

En caso de ser ratificado su triunfo electoral por los resultados oficiales, ofrecidos para el martes por el Tribunal Electoral, Correa sucederá en el poder al presidente Alfredo Palacio, desde el 15 de enero del 2007, por un período de cuatro años.

DETROIT (AP): Michigan State is close to hiring Cincinnati's *Mark Dantonio* as its football coach, with an official telling The Associated Press on Sunday night that university president Lou Anna Simon will recommend the move to the board of trustees.

The official, who has knowledge of the latest developments in the coaching search, spoke on condition of anonymity because Michigan State had not yet made an announcement. The school only said that it has scheduled a special board of trustees meeting for Monday.

Dantonio, a former Spartans assistant, would succeed the fired John L. Smith.

Cincinnati athletic director Mike Thomas knew Dantonio was a candidate for the Michigan State job, Bearcats spokesman Tom Hathaway said late Sunday.

"He was aware that Dantonio was being interviewed today," Hathaway said.

Dantonio is in his third year as Cincinnati's head coach. He has an 18-17 record, including a 7-5 mark this season.

The Spartans finished 4-8 overall and 1-7 in the Big



Ten, losing eight of their last nine games. Smith had a 22-26 record in four seasons.

Meanwhile, Southern California (USC) has passed idle Michigan and is a win away from returning to the national title game. The Trojans moved into second place in the Bowl Championship Series standings Sunday, passing the Wolverines on the strength of a 44-24 victory over Notre Dame and closing in on a matchup with undefeated Ohio State in the title game in January, 2007.

Winning lottery bets came near end of Buckeyes' victory, which surpasses Cinco de Mayo payout

CLEVELAND, Nov. 20 (AP): Nearly all the winning bets in a state lottery based on Ohio State's 42-39 victory over Michigan were placed shortly before or after the game ended on Nov. 18, 2006.

Lottery customers placed 898 wagers in the Pick 4 game on the numbers 4-2-3-9, with 98 percent of them placed after 7 p.m., lottery spokeswoman Marie Kilbane said. The game ended Saturday at 7:13 p.m.; the drawing was at 7:45 p.m.

Winners claimed \$2.2 million, or more than six times the \$347,867 bet on the game. The typical payout for a Pick 4 drawing is 50 percent of sales, Kilbane said.

The prize for picking the numbers in order is \$5,000, but payouts are made on other combinations. The odds of picking a straight combination are 10,000 to 1.

The most winning tickets—37—were sold at a market in the Columbus suburb of Whitehall.

It's not unusual for

people to bet special numbers, such as 3-1-7 on St. Patrick's Day, but such payouts are rare, Kilbane said.

In 2003, the numbers 5-5-5 came up in the Pick 3

game on May 5, or *Cinco de Mayo*, the Mexican-Mexican-American holiday, she said.

Kilbane said she wasn't aware of any other payouts related to sports scores.



Inmigrantes timados por falsos asesores en EEUU con EEUU-FRAUDE VISTAZO

proliferado.

The Associated Press realizó intentos por entrar en contacto con varias víctimas, pero éstas temían ser deportadas si hablaban.

El entorno es perfecto para este tipo de delito; las leyes de inmigración están en movimiento y muchos inmigrantes están confundidos sobre el contenido de la legislación. El presidente George W. Bush promulgó la semana pasada el proyecto de ley que aprueba medidas adicionales de protección en 1.125 kilómetros de Estados Unidos en la frontera con México. Pero la Cámara de Representantes y el Senado no pudieron conciliar sus diferencias sobre un puñado de asuntos de la inmigración en sus iniciativas de ley respectivas.

La confusión significa que los rumores—y los temores—se están propagando.

“Circula por ahí mucha información falsa”, consideró el religioso Ronald Marino, que dirige la Oficina Católica de Migración en Nueva York. “Habrá amnistía el año próximo y tienes que registrarte para lograrla, y necesitas pagar una cuota, o todos van a ser deportados si no tienen documentos; la

fábrica de rumores está trabajando tiempo extra en las detenciones que han practicado así lo confirman. En los últimos cuatro meses, al menos cinco personas fueron detenidas por fraude.

Autoridades estatales y federales señalan que las víctimas de fraude pueden denunciar el delito en forma anónima.

“No preguntamos la situación migratoria de las personas cuando vienen a la oficina”, dijo José Pérez, subjefe de la dependencia que atiende los fraudes al consumidor en el estado. “No es nuestro trabajo”, explicó.

Las leyes estatales y municipales que cobraron vigencia en el 2004 endurecen las restricciones a las empresas que se presentan como oficinas de asistencia en asuntos de inmigración.

Ahora, las compañías deben colocar el aviso de que no ofrecen servicios de abogados y tienen prohibido dar asesoría legal, así como suministrar un contrato por escrito que detalle todos los servicios. Las multas por infracciones son elevadas. La primera infracción tiene una multa máxima de 2.500 dólares y las subsiguientes son castigadas con al menos 5.000 dólares.

En la ciudad de Nueva York, las víctimas de temor pueden llamar al número 311, que tiene servicio de traducción en 170 lenguas. Las autoridades aseguran

que las leyes están funcionando y dicen que las detenciones que han practicado así lo confirman.

En los últimos cuatro meses, al menos cinco personas fueron detenidas por fraude. Entre los recientes arrestados está Jimmie Ortega, un ex supervisor estadounidense de inmigración que está acusado de tener una participación mediular en una banda que entregó al menos 60 documentos falsos de ciudadanía a cambio de sobornos de entre 1.500 y 4.000 dólares.

Pero Johnny Kline, del Proyecto de Acción Comunitaria, dice que eso no es suficiente.

Propone un acercamiento mayor a los vecindarios para proporcionar información correcta, además de la colocación de avisos en el transporte público.

De cualquier manera, advierte, los temores van a empeorar cuando aumenten el debate sobre la inmigración y la preocupación por la deportación. Existe la noción generalizada de que la clave es una reforma integral a la inmigración, pero nadie acierta el sentido del cambio.

“Es un problema que se mantendrá latente hasta que sepamos lo que está en juego con la inmigración en este país”, consideró Kline.

nombramiento, el cual ocurrió luego de que los republicanos tratan de recuperarse de la pérdida de la mayoría en las dos cámaras del Congreso en las elecciones del 7 de noviembre.

“Nuestra filosofía no tiene nada malo, ni nuestros principios”, dijo Martínez a los miembros del Partido Republicano de la Florida en su encuentro trimestral. “Debemos de recuperar la fe de la gente”.

Martínez dijo que el continuo éxito de los republicanos en su estado de la Florida era una señal de que los miembros del partido en la entidad deben de ser los líderes de un esfuerzo por convertirlo nuevamente en el “partido de las ideas”.

Los republicanos de la

Florida conservaron el puesto de gobernador y varios cargos a nivel estatal. Martínez dijo que las derrotas a nivel nacional se debieron a la incapacidad del partido de hablar “con una sola voz”.

Este es probablemente el principal reto de Martínez como presidente general, cargo que asume en enero en medio de su primer mandato como senador, mientras el presidente George W. Bush inicia la segunda parte de su segundo y último mandato con una fuerte división en el partido en torno a temas como la inmigración.

Muchos republicanos están preocupados por las políticas respecto a la guerra en Irak y han criticado el incremento en los gastos públicos desde que Bush asumió la presidencia.

“Creo que la lección que aprendimos es que muchas veces no nos expresamos con una sola voz y hemos

permitido que otros elaboren nuestra agenda política”, dijo Martínez.

Agregó que los republicanos reunirán sus fuerzas con miras a las elecciones presidenciales del 2008, y atacó a los demócratas.

“Debo decirles que lo mejor del mundo es ver a los demócratas tropezarse entre sí en los primeros días (después de las elecciones)”, dijo Martínez, refiriéndose a la dificultad de ese partido para establecer un equipo de líderes.

El vocero del Partido Demócrata de la Florida, Mark Bubriski, dijo que ese comentario era “tonto”.

“Es decepcionante que mientras que el senador Martínez reconoce los fracasos de su partido, continúe realizando tonterías partidistas con fines políticos”, dijo Bubriski.



TIPS ON TRIPS: Dreams Cancún Resort and Spa, at Cancún, México

Ann Arbor: Sitting in front of my computer one frosty autumn morning, while watching the leaves trying to change on my trees, an intense thought sparked into my brain...I need a vacation, and I want it warm!

GOP fundraiser's silence leaves lasting impression with judge and may have cost Noe additional years in prison

TOLEDO, Nov. 20 (AP): Given one last chance to talk, Tom Noe stayed silent.

The former GOP fundraiser, who befriended President George W. Bush and once celebrated his birthday with Gov. Bob Taft, stood in a courtroom Monday, wearing a blue jail jumpsuit and a stubby goatee.

Lucas County Judge Thomas Osowik, who was elected to the Ohio Court of Appeals (6th District) on Nov. 7, 2006, asked Noe if he wanted to say anything.

But there was no apology or admission just before he was sentenced to 18 years in prison for embezzling millions from the state's fund for injured workers, triggering a scandal that toppled Ohio's ruling Republican Party. Noe's defense also chose not to present any witnesses at trial.

Osowik noted Noe's silence, saying the politically connected coin dealer never "expressed genuine remorse."

The sentence marked the end of a remarkable fall for Noe, 52.

He was a rising star in the GOP—a go-to-guy who knew everybody and helped raise campaign cash for Republicans across the state.

His rise to prominence coincided with a deal he struck with the state in 1998 to manage a \$25 million investment in rare coins.

But instead of investing the money, prosecutors say Noe spent it on his business and a lavish lifestyle.

Prosecutors revealed for the first time Monday they calculated that Noe stole \$13.7 million from the fund he managed for the Bureau of Workers' Compensation.

He spent \$3 million in the first three months after getting the state's money, Lucas County Assistant Prosecutor John Weglian said.

Prosecutors have not said whether he used the money to make campaign contributions to Republicans, including Bush and Gov. Bob Taft. But after the sentencing, Franklin County Prosecutor

Ron O'Brien, who helped in the investigation, said it would be easy to draw the conclusion. "You can make those inferences," he said.

Noe acted as though he had "a bottomless cup of wealth and luxury at your disposal, when in fact it was at the state's expense," Osowik said.

The judge described the crime as an "elaborate scheme of theft on a large scale." He expressed disbelief that Noe continued to steal even after a bureau auditor raised questions about the investment.

"You continued to spend the bureau's money at what I thought was a shockingly large rate," Osowik said.

Noe was the key figure in the scandal that dogged the state GOP for more than a year, culminating with Democrats winning a U.S. Senate seat and four of five key statewide offices earlier this month after 12 years of Republican rule.

He was convicted last week of theft, corruption, money laundering, forgery and tampering with records. He faced a minimum sentence of 10 years on the corrupt activity charge, the most serious one.

The judge fined Noe \$139,000 and will determine later whether he has to give up any more money or property.

In addition, Noe must serve two years and three months—federally—for pleading guilty earlier this year to funneling \$45,000 to President Bush's re-election campaign.

Subsequently, Judge Osowik ordered Noe to pay \$213,000 in fines and court costs, including \$3 million for the costs of prosecution.

He is currently lodged (as *Thomas William Noe, inmate #26157-018*) at Milan Detention Center in Michigan and will be assigned to a fenced-in facility somewhere in the BOP (*Bureau of Prisons*, www.bop.gov) system.

Noe stared blankly with

his head tilted as the penalty was imposed. His upper lip twitched briefly.

He appeared in good spirits when he was escorted into courtroom by two sheriff's deputies. He even flashed a broad smile at his family and joked with his attorneys about a favorite restaurant.

He was somber as he was led out of court in handcuffs, when his wife mouthed "bye" to him and his sister gave him a wave.

Defense attorney John Mitchell had asked the judge for the minimum 10-year sentence, saying that other high-profile convicted felons had received less time for taking more money.

Before the investigation began, Noe was a member of state boards that oversee the Ohio Turnpike and Ohio's public universities. He was a top GOP fundraiser who gave more than \$105,000 to Republicans including Bush and Taft in 2004.

From all walks of life, 32 college students selected as Rhodes Scholars, including two from Washington University in St. Louis

St. Louis (AP): Washington University student Leana S. Wen's childhood asthma was so severe that part of her lung was removed. Her frequent hospitalizations led her to pursue a career in medicine while she was still a teenager.

"I wanted to help the world," Wen said.

Her work toward that goal helped her become one of the 32 men and women across the United States selected Sunday as Rhodes Scholars for 2007. The students will enter Oxford University in England next October.

Wen, 23, was born in Shanghai, China, and her family sought political asylum in the United States when she was 8. She started college at 13 and will finish medical school in May.

She has served as the national president of the 65,000-member American Medical Student Association and as a global health fellow for the World Health Organization in Geneva.

In January, she will travel to Rwanda to develop treatment programs for women who contracted HIV as a result of genocide-related rapes.

Wen envisions a career that combines developing health care policy and working as an emergency room physician. "I would

be able to see patients that often society neglects," she said.

Accompanying her will be Aaron F. Mertz, 22, who graduated in May from Washington University, where he played the cello and studied physics.

He is pursuing a doctorate in physics at Yale University and plans to take a leave from the program to study the history of science, medicine and technology at Oxford. Eventually, he plans to work as a research physicist and use his Oxford training to engage the public in debate about scientific issues, such as research priorities and the training of the next generation of scientists.

"Science functions differently in many different cultures," he said in a telephone interview. "For example, China and India are

producing more scientists than the United States at this moment. So what is it about their culture and society that makes them prosper scientifically, and what could American scientists learn from them?"

He has conducted astrophysics research at the Max Planck Institute in Munich and nuclear physics research at the Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico.

The scholars were selected from 896 applicants endorsed by 340 colleges and universities, and will join scholars selected from 13 other jurisdictions around the world. Approximately 85 are selected each year. The scholarships provide two or three years of study, with the total value averaging about \$45,000 per year.

Rhodes Scholarships were created in 1902 by the will of British philanthropist Cecil Rhodes. Winners

are selected on the basis of high academic achievement, personal integrity, leadership potential and physical vigor, among other attributes.

Many of the recipients have already spent time overseas.

Maria Repnikova arrived in America from Latvia at 14 without knowing English but immersed herself in language classes and graduated this year from Georgetown University.

She has blended an interest in China, after studying in Beijing, with her curiosity about Russia—a subject she was prevented from studying while in Latvia—to produce her current research focus on Chinese immigrant labor in northeast Russia.

"I feel personally connected to the field of migration because I experienced it myself," Repnikova, 22, said in a telephone interview Sunday from her parents' home in Burlington, Vt.

Whitney Haring-Smith spent the summer working for a U.N.-funded disarmament program in Afghanistan and also spent time with the U.N.'s refugee agency in Sri Lanka.

"It was really good to see the nitty-gritty of international relations," said Haring-Smith, 21, a Providence, R.I., native and senior at Yale University.

Zachary Manfredi, a senior at Atlanta's Emory University, interned in the democracy program of The Carter Center, working on civil society building programs and election monitoring in the Congo, Ivory Coast and Haiti.

"As a Rhodes Scholar I'll get to work on important political causes and also to keep asking important philosophical questions. It's a syn-

thesis of my two greatest loves: justice and knowledge," said Manfredi, 21, of Rochester, Mich.

Kevin Shenderov emigrated with his family from Ukraine in 1990; he and his brother suffered health problems as a result of the Chernobyl nuclear power plant disaster.

Now a 19-year-old senior at New York University, Shenderov has already been involved in conducting cancer research and was an organizer of a conference that dealt with problems affecting health services in developing nations. Like his older brother, Eugene, also a Rhodes Scholar, Shenderov plans to study for a doctorate in immunology at Oxford.

"I want to be able to help create a more effective cancer vaccine," he said.

Harvard senior Parvinder Thiara's grandfather died of infectious diarrhea from drinking tainted water in India while Thiara prepared to begin his second year in college.

Thiara, 21, of Rochelle, Ill., co-founded an organization dedicated to improving water sanitation technologies, particularly in impoverished regions.

"We're trying to develop natural products that can be grown and easily processed," said Thiara, who plans to study theoretical chemistry and water science policy and management at Oxford. "We're just trying to develop the means to make it effective on a rural, local scale."
