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Study: Use of Spanish language dies quickly among generations of Latino immigrants

TRENTON, New Jersey (AP): A few generations after families move to the United States from Latin American countries, fluency in Spanish dies out and English becomes the dominant language, according to a new paper published by sociology professors from New Jersey and California.

The paper counters popular arguments that the size of Latino immigration to the United States could create a bilingual society and a fundamental change in American culture.

Such sentiments have played a role in debates over U.S. immigration law and touched off a controversy earlier this year over a Spanish-language version of "The Star-Spangled Banner."

The paper—authored by Douglas Massey at Princeton University and Ruben Rumbaut and Frank Bean at the University of California, Irvine—found Spanish giving way to English among Southern California's heavily Latino population.

The study suggests that Mexican immigrants arriving in Southern California today can expect

only five out of every 100 of their great-grandchildren to speak fluent Spanish.

"Even in the nation's largest Spanish-speaking enclave, within a border region that historically belonged to Mexico, Spanish appears to be well on the way to a natural death by the third generation of U.S. residence," the researchers said in the paper, published in the September issue of the journal "Population and Development Review."

The authors of the new paper use survey data to show that Latinos with each successive generation are becoming English speakers, just like previous immigration waves in U.S. history.

The paper draws on two studies, one conducted in 2004 and the other in 2001 to 2003, to assemble a sample of 5,703 Southern California residents. Among the group, 1,642 had Mexican roots and a total of 2,262 had Latin American ancestry.

Survival of Spanish among the descendants of Mexican and Central-American immigrants was higher than among other groups, but still followed the usual pattern of English taking over as the years passed.

Among Mexican-Americans with two U.S.-born par-

ents but three or more foreign-born grandparents, only 17 percent spoke fluent Spanish.

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"Historical and contemporary evidence indicates that English has never been seriously threatened as the dominant language of the United States," wrote the authors of the paper. "What is endangered instead is the survival of the non-English languages that immigrants bring with them to the United States."

In April, Latino performers and record producers released a Spanish-language version of the U.S. national anthem, which inspired a public backlash and led President George W. Bush to declare that "the national anthem ought to be sung in English."

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At Nonaligned summit, China seizes an opportunity missed by the United States

HAVANA (AP): China hopes to expand its growing economic and political clout at the Non-aligned Movement summit, influence that analysts say will come at the cost of the United States, which passed up a similar invitation to attend as an observer.

Led by China's Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs Yang Jiechi, the Chinese delegation plans to hold bilateral meetings with a number of Latin American countries and strengthen China's ties to the region where its trade soared. China's imports from Latin America quintupled to US\$20.3 billion and exports to the region tripled to US\$15.4 billion from 2000 to 2004, according to the International Monetary Fund.

The administration of U.S. President George W. Bush has declined to attend the summit, and a press officer at the U.S. Interests Section in Havana said they wouldn't comment on the Non-aligned Movement.

That's a mistake, according to Latin America analysts who have tracked declining U.S. influence in a region where it can no longer count on the unconditional support of po-

itical leaders, even though U.S. trade remains the most powerful engine for their economies.

"Bush likes to use the saying 'You're either with us or against us' and they are writing off the summit because they are non-aligned, which to them means they are not with the U.S.," said Mark Weisbrot, co-director of the Center for Economic and Policy Research in Washington, D.C.

The United States is wary of the region's more leftist governments, some of which have openly opposed Washington's economic prescriptions of economic growth through austerity measures, "free trade" deals and privatization. The region's economies have largely stabilized—hyperinflation and crippling debts are mostly history. But poverty and unemployment remain huge problems, and many Latin Americans feel the Washington model failed to improve their lives.

Some analysts say the U.S. is out of touch, still trying to impose trade agreements that will make life even more difficult for the poor while raising the rhetoric about the dangers of populism in Venezuela, Bolivia and other countries.

Earlier this year, U.S. Defense Secretary Donald H.

Rumsfeld compared Venezuelan President Hugo Chávez to Adolf Hitler, and Bush worried publicly about the leadership of Bolivian President Evo Morales.

Chávez's response was telling: At an event with Fidel Castro in Havana, he noted the waning U.S. influence in the region and echoed Chinese revolutionary Mao Zedong's idea that capitalist countries were "paper tigers" to be challenged.

China paid little attention to Latin America until recently, and its commerce with the region still represents less than one percent of its colossal foreign trade, according to a Harvard University study commissioned by Inter-American Dialogue, a Washington research center. But now China is booming and looking to Latin America for the raw materials it needs to support its growth, and for new markets to sell to.

And unlike the United States, which often uses trade deals as political leverage, China has avoided political meddling, said Weisbrot, who predicts that U.S. commerce may have already peaked as a share of Latin America's economies, while their

Países no alineados imaginan un Tercer Mundo sin Castro

asistirán esta semana para fijar la agenda del mundo en desarrollo también deberán aprender a luchar sin el barbudo líder rebelde.

Asamblea Nacional Cubana, Ricardo Alarcón, destacó que la mayoría de los dignatarios extranjeros no han llegado aún, y no descartaba la presencia de Castro cuando lo hagan.

Alarcón señaló que el presidente cubano no está inactivo en su cama, pues tiene un teléfono a la mano y desde allí sigue dirigiendo al país.

Sin embargo, los funcionarios del gobierno cubano reconocen que si Castro se recupera lo suficiente para volver a la presidencia de Cuba, es improbable que reanude el ritmo de trabajo agotador que presumiblemente provocó la enfermedad, que aún no ha sido divulgada.

El presidente de Venezuela, Hugo Chávez, un buen amigo de Castro, ya se ha presentado como estandarte paladín del Tercer Mundo al utilizar la retórica antiimperialista de Castro, ha fortalecido al ejército y se ha acercado a otros países en

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Governor Granholm calls on Bush to reverse “unfair decision” on Home Heating Help

LANSING: Michigan Governor Jennifer M. Granholm and Wisconsin Governor Jim Doyle last week urged President George W. Bush to reverse an “unfair, illogical decision” by his administration to release \$80 million in energy assistance funding that excluded Midwestern states in favor of eastern states – including some with much warmer climates.

“This just shows how out of touch the Bush Administration is with the concerns of hardworking families in the Midwest,” Governor Doyle said. “It doesn’t take a rocket scientist to know that Wisconsin and Michigan have

longer, colder winters than Virginia and North Carolina. While all parts of the country need help, to completely exclude the Midwest is not only unfair – it’s going to be devastating to tens of thousands of families.”

“Now that our drivers are finally getting some relief at the pump, I’m amazed that the Bush administration would choose to ignore Midwesterners’ home heating needs,” said Governor Granholm. “This decision is just one more example of how out of touch the president is.”

This week’s announcement from the Department of Health and Human Services said that the aid would flow to states “in which low-income households

make greatest use of fuel oil to heat their homes.”

Since most Midwestern states rely on natural gas, this arbitrary standard excludes many of the states with the longest and coldest winters and the highest heating costs.

Obrador en favor de los pobres.

Los delegados de la “convenCIÓN nacional democrática” convocados por López Obrador atestaron la extensa plaza central de la ciudad de México el domingo y votaron levantando la mano no sólo para elegir a su líder como presidente sino también para formar un gobierno paralelo con su gabinete. Según organizadores, asistieron 1,2 millones de personas a la plaza llamada el Zócalo.

Los presentes votaron por desconocer a Calderón como el presidente de México y decidieron juramentar a López Obrador como presidente “legítimo” el 20 de noviembre, cuando se celebra la Revolución Mexicana de 1910. El movimiento opositor considera que un fraude

impidió el triunfo de su líder en las elecciones del 2 de julio.

El llamado “gobierno” de López Obrador carece de reconocimiento en la ley mexicana. El Tribunal Electoral de México ratificó la victoria de Calderón sobre López Obrador y el ganador asumirá el primero de diciembre como sucesor de Vicente Fox.

De momento no está clara la forma en que el nuevo “gobierno” planea operar y se desconoce con precisión cuál será su impacto.

Algunos analistas estiman que López Obrador tiene posibilidades mínimas de establecer un gobierno de oposición radical, sobre todo cuando recientes encuestas muestran un menor apoyo a su movimiento.

En un informe, el banco de inversiones Goldman Sachs consideró que el gobierno paralelo “será inocuo para todo propósito práctico y legal, al

convertirse en sólo una entidad opositora organizada que opere fuera de las reglas formales del debate parlamentario”.

Otros analistas, incluido el especialista estadounidense en temas mexicanos George Grayson, esperan que Calderón “tome algo del viento de las velas de López Obrador” con la promoción de sus programas sociales contra la pobreza y la desigualdad que son el eje del movimiento opositor.

El “gobierno” de López Obrador tendrá una influencia positiva si logra que la “élite” atienda sus programas sociales, pero podría ser un “problema” si llega a sentirse frustrado y vuelve a las amplias protestas callejeras o, peor aún, ataca la infraestructura de la ciudad como los sistemas de electricidad y agua, dijo Grayson.



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Op-Ed on Michigan’s Proposal 2: Wardell Connerly—The carpet-bagging million dollar man trying to roll back progress for women, minorities in Michigan

Did you know that Wardell Connerly, leader of the campaign to eliminate Affirmative Action in Michigan, is being paid more than \$1 million a year?

Connerly is pushing Proposal 2 on this Nov. 8 ballot, a proposal to change Michigan’s constitution to ban affirmative action. In the past, Connerly has lied to the press about his finances. According to the *Ann Arbor News*, Connerly told the paper in 2003, “My pockets do not get filled with coins as a result of what I do.”

Apparently \$1 million is small change for Mr. Connerly.

According to IRS documents, charitable organizations are required to file taxable income. Recent IRS documents reveal in 2003 to 2004, Connerly earned \$1,047,998. He earned \$1,138,509 from 2002 to 2003 and \$910,442 from 2001 to 2002. Connerly’s organization made \$1,014,290 in 2001 to 2002.

Most amazing, he puts into his pocket some 60 percent of the entire budget of his organization. That is one of the reasons why Rep. Conyers, D-Detroit, has asked the Internal Revenue Service to investigate Connerly’s operation. It is clear that he is receiving what the IRS considers “excessive compensation.”

“Today, I have asked the IRS to investigate the excessive pay Ward Connerly received from his two tax-exempt nonprofits,” Rep. Conyers said on Aug. 2. “Last year, Mr. Connerly was paid a \$1 million salary for a mere 30 hours of work per week. This compensation package – that well exceeds the national average – raises more than a red flag. The IRS rules could not be

clearer that a non-profit’s purpose is not to pad the pockets of its executives.”

Even more disconcerting is that Connerly is using tax laws to hide the names of those out-of-state millionaires who are funding this massive effort to roll back progress in our state. Thanks to a lawsuit filed in California several years ago, we do know the names of several of his backers. They are who’s, who of individuals and groups who are anti-labor, oppose equal rights for women, support exploitation of immigrants and oppose government programs that attack discrimination based on race, gender, sexual orientation and income.

“Whether he makes money, or not doesn’t change my opinion, he’s a misguided brother . . . it’s unfortunate that some of us think that we have accomplished our successes by ourselves whether than by others who’ve helped us have those opportunities,” Flint native Ernest Garrison, pastor, Vernon Chapel A.M.E Church, said.

Connerly’s plan would roll back progress our state has made in leveling the playing field for minorities and women. His constitutional amendment, which is deceptively named the Michigan Civil Rights Initiative, would ban scholarships for women and minorities, end summer job programs aimed at minority youth, and endanger health-screening programs for breast and cervical cancer.

We can’t let Ward Connerly and his out-of-state millionaires shape Michigan’s own constitution. We need to reject Proposal 2, and tell these people to stay out of Michigan, now and in the future.

“I’m Mexican American . . . the language barrier is a problem. I still have a hard time with my English (and) as much as I study, I still feel that I need help. Michigan is the most segregated state in the country in terms of housing. MCRI would just add to additional segregation for us. You can’t trust people to do the right thing that’s why we need the laws that are there.”

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Kaptur urges Bush, Congress to take steps to save U.S. Automobile Industry

U.S. Representative Marcy Kaptur (D, OH-9) last Friday called on President Bush and Congress to take immediate steps to help save the U.S. automobile industry.

"The future of the American automobile industry hangs in the balance," said Kaptur, a 12-term member who represents Northwest Ohio.

"What will it take for President Bush to understand the importance of the automotive industry to the U.S. economy? This industry is the beating heart of America's heartland economy. Every day that President Bush fails to act means more families out of work in Ohio, Michigan and elsewhere."

"Without a level playing field globally, U.S. production cannot compete fairly, no matter how hard the workers work. As our trade deficit spirals out of control, and imports swamp exports, America's workers are cast away."

Congresswoman Kaptur issued her call for presidential and congressional leadership after Ford Motor Company officials announced plans to close plants and offer buyouts to its entire U.S. workforce.

The plant closings in-

clude two in Congresswoman Kaptur's district: the Maumee Stamping Plant near Toledo, which employs approximately 650 workers, and the ACH (Automotive Components Holdings) factory in Sandusky that employs approximately 1,200 workers.

Kaptur urged the president to take several steps to save the beleaguered auto industry:

- Renegotiate failed trade agreements, such as NAFTA, that have accelerated the flight of jobs to Mexico, China and other low-wage platforms.

• Begin talks immediately with leaders of the Japan, South Korea and other closed markets to open these important markets to American-made vehicles and parts.

• Create long-term financing programs to assist Ford and other American automakers in converting their production platforms, as Congress did for Chrysler in the 1980s.

• Take emergency steps to reverse the U.S. trade deficit with the rest of the world, such as imposing a currently adjustment tariff.

• Support legislation helping American companies deal with so-called legacy costs for health care and pensions for retired workers.

The Biofuels Energy Independence Act (H.R. 388) would promote production, distribution and development of biofuels to lower U.S. dependence on costly imported oil.



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Say "No" to Noe money says López to Kaczala

In a race swiftly turning contentious, last week Lucas County Recorder Anita López, running for County Auditor, assailed her opponent, Republican incumbent Larry Kaczala, on his record of having been the recipient of campaign donations from convicted coin dealer Tom Noe.

Noe was sentenced in U.S. District Court last week to a term of 27 months incarceration and a fine of \$136,200 for violations of federal campaign laws.

"I once again call on Larry Kaczala to give the over \$10,000 back immediately to eliminate both the perception and potential reality on influence," López said at a press conference last Thursday during which she handed out details of the funds the Kaczala campaign has received. "[Taxpayers] deserve to know that [Kaczala] conducts business in a manner free from the influence of criminal bribery that has been seen throughout Ohio."

Within hours, Kaczala had called his own press conference ostensibly to remind homeowners to review their assessment values and to urge those whose property had experienced flood damage to claim reductions in their assessed values.

Reappraisals have al-

ways been a problem but we encourage human input," said Kaczala as he reminded homeowners, and voters, that "values cannot be wrong because values haven't been set yet."

After iterating his call for homeowner input and recalling his conversations with the Ohio Tax Commissioner during which he reportedly urged that office to consider both the impact of flooding on property values and the fact that property values in Ohio are dipping in general, Kaczala then addressed the issues raised by his opponent earlier in the day.

"It's sad that she is so naïve," he said of López. "I have never received anything from Tom Noe, only from Bernadette Noe."

Kaczala noted that he had received contributions from Bernadette Noe for previous races and that those accounts were now closed. He compared his situation to that of the former Senator John Glenn who ran up debts during his unsuccessful campaign for president that could not be repaid from the senator's own personal fortune.

In addition, Kaczala struck out on López for having received contributions from her own party's tainted individuals.

"I understand that my opponent said I'm tainted by the Tom Noe investigation," said Kaczala. "She's bordering on slander and should be careful. If I'm tainted by Tom Noe, then she's tainted by Ray Kest, Sandy Isenberg and the roof incident, and Bob McCloskey."

Kaczala further stated that López was receiving aid from U.S. Congresswoman Marcy Kaptur in violation of federal law which prohibits federal candidates from raising money on behalf of local candidates.

Kaczala also denied that the contributions his campaigns had received from Bernadette Noe, who served as chairman of the Republican Party during Kaczala's previous two races – for reelection in 2002 and for U.S. Congress in 2004 – were anywhere near \$10,000. He estimated the amount to be in the vicinity of \$4,000.

A review of the statement of contributions for Kaczala's campaign for reelection in 2002 showed that he reported contributions in the amount of \$1,000 from Tom Noe on 8/28/01, \$250 from Tom Noe on 12/20/01, \$1,500 from Tom Noe on 03/01/02 and \$750 from Tom Noe on 08/12/02 and other services – catering – from



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

Leads run dry in Columbus apartment arson that killed 10 Latinos

COLUMBUS (AP): Two years after an apartment fire killed 10 people of Mexican descent, the investigation into the arson has stalled, authorities said last week.

Tips stopped coming in with any frequency long ago, said Patrick Berarducci, a senior special agent with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

A reward of up to \$57,000 has been offered for information leading to a conviction in the unsolved fire that reached its second anniversary Tuesday, Sept. 12.

"There were 10 people

who were brutally killed," said Shane Cartmill, spokesman for the state fire marshal. "That's something that we definitely want to solve. Unfortunately, it's getting increasingly cold."

After the fire, investigators reported having problems persuading members of the Latino community to come forward with tips on who might have set the fire. People in the country without documentation feared being deported.

Alex Goya, who owns a grocery store near the Prairie Township apartment complex, said his customers have stopped talking about the fire at what was then Lincoln

Park West. The complex has been renamed Wingate Clubs.

"We are more culturally oriented to keep going, keep going," Goya said. "You grieve, but there's no reason to think about it all the time."

Rubén Castilla Herrera, who headed a community task force, sponsored by the OCHLA, said it was "somewhat disturbing" that the blaze remains unsolved.

"I'm not giving up that maybe we'll find out who did this," he said.

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
The Restorative Power of Nature: Saving Our Children



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
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

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Demand for afterschool programs exceeds supply by more than 240,000 spaces

Columbus, September 15, 2006: Demand exists for an additional 240,357 Ohio children to attend structured, affordable and convenient afterschool programs, according to the results of the first-ever gap analysis research conducted by the Ohio Afterschool Network (OAN).

"An estimated 30 percent of Ohio's school-aged children spend at least some of their out-of-school-hours in unsupervised self-care arrangements," said *Liz Nusken*, statewide project coordinator, OAN. "This is a significantly higher percentage than the national average and it illustrates the need for more afterschool services in our state."

According to the parents and guardians surveyed by The Strategy Team, a Columbus-based research group, approximately 24 percent of school-aged children would be enrolled in afterschool programs if those services were affordable and conveniently located.

"On this dimension, too, Ohio's number ex-

ceeds the national average, indicating a high level of unmet demand for afterschool services here in our state," said Nusken. "Nearly one-third of the parents and guardians surveyed voluntarily provided their contact information so they could get more information about afterschool programs in their communities. This tells us families are searching for the solutions that supervised, structured afterschool programs offer," she added.

"*H i g h - q u a l i t y* afterschool programs provide a safe and healthy place for children while parents work. Studies show that students involved in afterschool programs get better grades, attend school more and have improved behavior," said *Becky Spencer*, chair, OAN Policy and Funding Committee and Vice President of Child Development at the YMCA/JCC of Greater Toledo. "For communities, an adequate supply of afterschool programs can help strengthen schools by raising standardized test scores, improving school attendance and increasing graduation rates."

The random-dial telephone survey was con-

ducted in June 2006 and included 600 Ohio households which included children age five to 18. Overall, respondents reported the afterschool arrangements of 1,083 Ohio youth in a typical week during the past school year. The study report is available online at www.ohioafterschool-network.org.

According to its mem-

bership, the Ohio Afterschool Network is committed to the success of all of Ohio's children and youth. Representing more than 150 afterschool advocates – parents, educators, service providers, philanthropists, child advocates and public officials – it is working to achieve sustainable investments in safe, healthy and nurturing afterschool learning experiences for all families who want them for their children.

It is committed to a statewide policy agenda that creates a supportive environment for high-quality afterschool programs, just as it generates the financial resources that are needed to sustain new and existing programs. desarrollo con programas sociales respaldados económicamente por su país, rico en petróleo.

Sin embargo, los tiempos han cambiado considerablemente desde aquellos días en los que Castro se estableció como el líder visible de los revolucionarios izquierdistas del mundo, al respaldar con soldados y armas a África y entrenar a guerrilleros izquierdistas en América Latina.

"Es necesario, urgente y posible otro mundo", pero no necesita librarse una guerra para lograrlo, señaló el vicepresidente cubano Carlos Lage a los ministros extranjeros que ya se encontraban en la Cumbre.

"Si usamos nuestra conciencia, si nos unimos, si nos disponemos a defender nuestros derechos con ideas y decisión, lo podemos lograr", agregó Lage.

Sin embargo, algunas cosas no han cambiado, pues la dominación estadounidense sigue siendo un tema favorito de la retórica tanto en la Cumbre de 1979 como en la actual, así como el bombardeo de Israel contra el Líbano, que enfureció a los líderes presentes.

Cuba dejó de fomentar las revoluciones hace más de una década, y un número creciente de países no alineados ahora son democracias jóvenes que asisten en esta ocasión a La Habana en busca de apoyo

para acuerdos comerciales y la suscripción de inversiones conjuntas, la capacitación de médicos y maestros, así como la independencia energética.

Fue el mismo Castro quien diseñó muchos de esos programas sociales, encaminados a ganarse pacíficamente los corazones y mentes de las personas.

Uno de esos ejemplos es la campaña Operación Milagro, que ofrece cirugías gratuitas en los ojos para los pobres. El programa, que también está financiado por Venezuela, ha logrado restablecerle la vista a cientos de miles de personas en 28 países en América Latina y el Caribe y será ampliado en poco tiempo a África y Asia.

Asimismo, el programa cubano de alfabetización de adultos titulado "Sí, Yo Puedo" también es mostrado en esta semana como el tipo de programa social que las naciones en desarrollo pueden compartir para beneficio mutuo.

Sin embargo, los países no alineados aparentemente no discutirán los detalles de esos programas en esta semana.

Un documento que describía un ambicioso plan cubano de expansión mundial a sus programas de alfabetización, de salud y de energía fue guardado, informaron el miércoles los organizadores, debido a que la agenda de la cumbre simplemente estaba muy llena para abordarlo.



At Nonaligned summit, China seizes an opportunity missed by the United States

trade with China will grow substantially.

China, whose domestic consumption is expected to grow by US\$1.3 trillion (\$1 trillion euros) in the next decade, is increasingly seen by the world's developing nations as both a source of investment and a mammoth emerging market.

China mainly exports machinery, televisions, computers and automobiles to Latin America. In exchange, it buys about 30 percent of its agricultural imports (mostly soy beans) from Argentina and Brazil, China's largest trading partner in the region, and is one of the top buyers of Chilean copper.

While some Chinese products have made it difficult for some Latin American industries to compete, Chinese investments have made it easier for Argentina, Brazil and other countries to buy po-

litical independence with early payoffs of their national debts.

"The U.S. is refusing to acknowledge the changes that are taking place in Latin America," Weisbrod said. "That's why they are losing influence so rapidly."

While the relationship is purely economic for most developing countries, Cuba, Bolivia and Venezuela see China as a counterweight to U.S. hegemony. Relations between the Cuba and China were tense during the Cold War, when the Caribbean island was strongly allied with the Soviet Union, but warmed after the Berlin Wall fell in 1989 and Cuba lost its preferential trade and aid deals with the Soviet bloc.

China is now Cuba's third-largest trading partner, with a trade exchange of US\$985 million in 2005. China invests primarily in Cuba's nickel industry as

well as tourism, transportation and telecommunications.

"Without a doubt these relations have developed in the framework of our shared political ideology," Cuba's Economics Minister Jose Luis Rodriguez told reporters at the Nonaligned summit this week.

But Communist Cuba has a unique relationship with China—which so far seems unwilling to raise political quarrels with the United States over Latin America, said Javier Corrales, a Latin America expert at Amherst College in Massachusetts.

"At the moment," he said, "what China is doing is not costly in its relations with the U.S."






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
