Brazil's Silva says free trade zone "off the agenda" for South America's largest economy

SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP): Clinching a deal for a 34-nation free trade zone that would stretch from Alaska to Argentina is "off the agenda" for Brazil, President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva said Wednesday.

Silva made the comments about the proposed Free Trade Area of the Americas to a gathering of labor leaders in the capital of Brasilia just days before Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice was to visit Brazil, the largest economy in South America and largest country in Latin America.

"For two years, FTAA has not been discussed in Brazil, because we took it off the agenda," Silva said, according to a text of his remarks released by the presidential press office.

Instead, Brazil has focused on strengthening trade ties among its Latin American neighbors and with the Mercosur trade bloc made up of Brazil, Argentina, Paraguay and Uruguay.

The FTAA zone was expected to be among the topics to be discussed during Rice's visit to Brazil. Negotiators from the United States and Brazil are leading the talks to create the zone, which would be the world's largest.

But Silva on Wednesday suggested for the first time in his two and a half years in office that the FTAA is a low priority for Brazil and that Latin America's largest country is more interested in boosting trade with its neighbors than it is with the United States.

"How did we take it off the agenda?" Silva asked. "Bv strengthening Mercosur, creating the South American community of nations and trying to establish a new standard of relations between South American countries."

The effort to create an FTAA involving every country in the Western Hemisphere except Cuba has been stalled for years, with Brazil and the United States far apart on a number of issues-including U.S. protections for American farmers and Brazil's laws covering the protection of $intellectual \ property \ rights.$

Negotiators missed an original January 2005 deadline for wrapping up the talks even under a scaled-down two-tier approach that has been dubbed "FTAA lite" by critics.

Under that approach, developed at a ministerial meeting in Miami in November 2003, all countries would agree to basic trade liberalization. Those wanting full abolition of trade

But in November then-U.S. Trade Representative Robert Zoellick said Brazil and the Mercosur countries were putting up stiff resistance on key issues needed to break a deadlock over the formation of the zone.

He warned that the Mercosur countries risked being isolated as a group while the United States signs one-on-one and regional free trade agreements with a host of other Latin American countries.

In March, acting U.S. Trade Representative Peter Allgeier and Brazilian negotiator Adhemar Bahadian said some progress had been made and that they hoped to schedule a meeting of deputy trade negotiators from all 34 countries involved in the discussions in late April or early

Kaptur against expanding NAFTA to include **Central America**

Congresswoman Marcy Kaptur (OH-9) spoke out last Wednesday against the Central America Free Trade Agreement(CAFTA)calling it "a clone of NAFTA." CAFTA would expand the North America Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) trade model to Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua.

"American workers. small businesses and families can't afford any more of these job killing trade agreements if we hope to hold on to our industrial economy," said Kaptur. "Why expand anything when NAFTA isn't work-

ing—why not fix it?
"The labor provisions of CAFTA keep workers hostage to low wages. CAFTA will ship out more middle class jobs. And no one knows better than the people of Ohio that NAFTA and agreements like it are job kill-

Kaptur joined members of both parties and business and labor organizations in Washington, D.C. opposing the pact, which was scheduled for a hearing on Thursday in the House Ways and Means Committee.

Kaptur, a leader for good iobs through fair trade in the U.S. Congress, has consistently fought against unfair trade agreements such as NAFTA and Permanent Normal Trade Relations (PNTR) with China.

"Our country is shipping out more and more jobs, not products," remarked Kaptur. NAFTA and related economic policies have been a disaster for Ohio and America as job washout continues. We

have to stop this 'free-fall' in iobs and trade. With our half trillion dollar trade deficit. America has to pause and ask: 'Why more of the same?"

Trade agreements like NAFTA and PNTR with China have been amassing huge job losses and trade deficits. International trade has been a net destroyer of millions of jobs in the United States over the last 2 decades. Ohio alone has lost over 60,000 jobs to China and even more to Mexico.

"Just like the fight over NAFTA and China trade, great promises are being made about jobs and new markets for our goods," concluded Kaptur. "But that obviously has not happened with NAFTA, not with China and won't happen in Central

Terminator apologizes for border misspeak—is it "Hasta la vista, Baby?"

(AP): Blaming his faulty English, California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger (R) saidhe misspoke when he suggested that California's border with México should be closed to help solve the nation's illegal immigration problem.

Schwarzenegger made the remark while speaking to newspaper editors and publishers Tuesday. He said he intended to say the border should be secured.

"Yesterday was a total screw-up in the words I used," the Republican said at a news conference Wednesday. "Because instead of closing, I meant securing. Ithink maybe my English, I need to go back to school and study a little bit.'

An immigrant himself, the Austrian-born governor's contrition wanted to quell the issue at the Capitol, where a key Latino lawmaker accepted the apology a day after criticizing the remark.

"I don't think the gover-

nor identifies himself with that kind of rhetoric," said Assembly Speaker Fabian Nuñez, a Democrat. "I don't know why he said it, but I'm very pleased he has totally removed himself from those folks who espouse that kind of hatred?

In his remarks Tuesday, Schwarzenegger told journalists: "Close the borders in California and all across México and in the United States because I think it is just unfairto have all those people coming across, have the borders open the way it is, and have this kind of lax situation.'

Although a big bloc of Latino voters supported Schwarzenegger in the 2003 recall election, the governor's relationship with California's largest minority group has been uneasy since he took office. Latino leaders have criticized Schwarzenegger's unsuccessful efforts to cut public health and so-



cial services that would have hurt low-income families.

Most notably, however, the governor forced the Legislature to repeal a bill that granted driver's licenses to illegal immigrants. Although Schwarzenegger since said several times he would accept some form of the legislation if security issues could be resolved, no compromise has been reached.

His remark about the border was taken as a slight by some Latinos, putting the Terminator in his lowest poll position since elected.

"That's not what we expected given the fact that the governor himself is an immigrant," said Francisco Estrada, a spokesman for the Mexican-American Legal Defense and Educational Fund.

U.S. Senate rejects competing farmworker bills

WASHINGTON (AP): The U.S. Senate balked April 19 at using an Iraq-Afghanistan aid bill to make it possible for immigrant farmworkers to win permanent or temporary legal status, but it didn't object to changing a visa program to provide migrant crab pickers and oyster shuckers for the Maryland seafood season.

The lawmakers quickly dispensed with two competing agricultural worker mea-

A 53-45 vote indicated support for a measure offered by Sens. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, and Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., offering permanent residency to certain immigrant workers. Craig and Kennedy, however, needed 60 votes to prevent opponents from blocking their measure.

A counterproposal to provide temporary legal status to illegal immigrants as long as U.S. employers have use for them won the support of only 21 senators; 77 opposed

Sen. Barbara Mikulski, D-Md., won a 94-6 vote to attach to the bill her measure to exempt from the annual 66,000 ceiling on H2B visas workers needed this spring and summer by seafood wholesalers. Workers who had held such visas in previous seasons wouldn't be subject to the ceiling for the this year and next.

The immigration measures had wormed their way into debate on the spending bill over protests from the White House and Majority Leader Bill Frist

Sponsors of the measures said the House raised the immigration issue first in the Iraq-Afghanistan bill it passed in March. On the House bill is language to deny driver's licenses to illegal immigrants, make it harder for foreigners to stay in the United States on asylum claims and allow a fence along the California-Mexico border.

Lawmakers in both parties said the Senate action Tuesday set the path for future immigration proposals, including President Bush's proposal that would give illegal immigrants already in the country temporary legal status while they hold jobs. Several Republicans oppose the

Whether the final Iraq-Afghanistan bill contains any immigration measures is problematic. The House measures are almost universally opposed by Senate Democrats, some Republicans and religious groups who say people fleeing persecution would be harmed.

The bill is HR 1268.

McCain, Kennedy to propose fining illegal immigrants, but letting them stay

WASHINGTON (AP): Senators John McCain and Edward M. Kennedy are putting together an immigration bill that would subject illegal immigrants to fines, but allow them to remain in the United States and earn a chance to apply for permanent residency

The measure is an alternative to President Bush's guestworker proposal sought by employers but opposed by many conservatives.

Speaking Thursday at the Naval Academy, McCain, R-Ariz., said he and Kennedy, D-Mass., hoped to introduce their legislation next week.

Under their proposal, illegal immigrants would get

renewed once. After completing six years of work, the immigrants would be eligible to "get in the back of the line" to apply for permanent legal residency, McCain said.

Deporting the 10 million to 12 million illegal immigrants in the country is not practical, McCain told midshipmen during a guest lec-

"There are some who say send them back to their countries," McCain said. "It's not possible. It's not going to hap-

Last year, Bush urged a program that would be open to illegal immigrants and other foreigners. Bush supports giving workers legal status for three-year renewable periods, but wants them to return to

their job is done. The White House never submitted a written proposal to Congress.

Other groups support allowing the immigrants to earn legal permanent residency after a period of work.

A spokesman for Sen. John Cornyn, chairman of the Senate Judiciary subcommittee on immigration subcommittee, said the McCain-Kennedy plan amounts to a "work and stay" program.

Cornyn "prefers a work and return program, as does the president," said his spokesman, Don Stewart.

Cornyn and Sen. John Kyl, R-Ariz., hope to have a draft of their immigration proposal in about two months. Stewart said.

"Eran muchos los nombres cardenales latinoamericanos que estaban en la lista de candidatos en la prensa, pero en la votación ni se les vio", dijo a The Associated Press el cardenal Francisco Errázuriz Ossa, arzobispo de Santiago de Chile.

Otros que votaron en el cónclave dijeron que las cualidades del cardenal alemán, ahora papa Benedicto XVI, eran espléndidas, con lo que no hubo nunca mucha competencia. Ratzinger ha aparecido durante muchos años como el celoso guardián de la doctrina ortodoxa del Vaticano y protector acérrimo de las políticas del difunto Juan Pablo II.

Ratzinger resultó elegido apenas dos días después de iniciado el cónclave, tras la cuartarondade votaciones. Fue uno de los cónclaves más breves de la historia.

"El que hayamos escogido a Benedicto XVI tan rápidamente significa que todo salió muy bien, que su nombre tiene gran importancia", dijo a la APel cardenal polaco Zenon Grocholewski.

"Todo el mundo sabe que Ratzinger era un importante colaborador de Juan Pablo II. que era muy leal, y que era un colaborador entusiasta", agregó Grocholewski, quien ha trabajado varios años en importantes cargos de la Santa Sede. "El deseo es continuar por este camino".

Ratzinger era "uno de los cardenales más preparados, si esque no era el más preparado", dijo el cardenal brasileño Claudio Hummes en una conferencia de prensa.

"Es un hombre santo, un hombre humilde...quien, si uno lo analiza bien, quiere hacer el trabajo de Dios en servicio de la humanidad", dijo Hummes, quien apareció como uno de latinoamericanos "papábiles".

cardenales Muchos destacaron ante la prensa que no darían detalles sobre lo sucedido en el cónclave, ya que anteriormente juraron que iban a mantener un secreto total. Sin embargo, hablaron para expresar su entusiasmo por el esor de Juan Pablo II.

'Sin revelar mucho, puedo decir que había preocupaciones acerca del tercer mundo, de Latinoamérica, más que candidatos había preocupaciones, como la pobreza, la iglesia", dijo el cardenal británico Cormac Murphy-O'Connor.

La televisión estatal italiana dijo que había señales que el cardenal argentino Ĵorge Bergoglio, un jesuita conservador, acaparó "una buena serie de votos" en la primera ronda, pero a partir de ahí, Ratzinger fue la estrella.

Según un diario belga, el cardenal belga Godfried Danneels dijo: "La elección del cardenal Ratzinger mostró que no es el momento para un papa latinoamericano'

Danneels no quiso entrar en detalles. "Si lo dijera, violaría el secreto del cónclave y no quiero que me expulsen de la iglesia", dijo según el diario. Romper el juramento del cónclave deriva en la excomunión.

El cardenal de Nueva York, Edward Egan, quien durante años trabajó en Roma y el Vaticano, dijo que Benedicto XVI "obviamente debió contar con el apoyo del tercer mundo", en referencia a los cardenales de América Latina y Africa.

Hummes y otros cardenales han indicado que la votación estuvo guiada por paradigmas nacionales o regionales.

"La pregunta de dónde proviene el papa no es importante", dijo el brasileño, quien señaló que las grandes expectativas de un Papa del tercer mundo habían surgido por los medios.

América Latina contó con 20 cardenales en el cónclave, Africa con 11. Europa acumuló 58 votos.

Los cardenales no dijeron cuántos votos Ratzinger, pero por lo menos se necesitan de 78 de los 115 posibles. Sin embargo, según se ha dejado entrever, Benedicto XVI obtuvo muchos más de los requeridos.

Spanish classes for native Spanish speakers grow in popularity

(AP): Rosa Pérez chats easily in Spanish, but the 15-yearold-having arrived in the United States more than a decade ago-never learned to write in her native tongue.

That's a skill she and a growing number of Latino students in public schools and colleges are working on in classes often called Spanish for Native Speakers, which aim to make students biliterate as well as bilingual.

For Pérez, who attends Emporia High School in Kansas, the early results have led to writing letters to her aunts and cousins in México. Her parents, both workers at a Tyson Foods Inc. meat packing plant, were thinking ahead to a potential career for their daughter when they encouraged her to take the class.

"They said, since other people get good money trans-lating, maybe I could do that," said Pérez, who wants to become an elementary school teacher and work with Spanish-speaking youngsters.

Hospitals, schools, police departments and many corporations are clamoring for bilingual workers, and language experts believe classes like the one Pérez takes could help fill the need. By 2050, studies suggest, Latinos will constitute 25 percent of the nation's work

The classes have been offered since the 1980s by many schools in the southern border states such as Texas and California. They have grown increasingly popular, however, as more and more immigrants moved north, to the Midwest and even the Northeast.

Ohio student Soto

Carla Soto-Cruz, 18, who writes for La Prensa newspaper, which is widely distributed in hardcopy throughout the Midwest and internation-ally on line at www.laprensatoledo.com, agrees that one must maintain bilingualism.

"I moved to the United States from Tlaquepaque, Jalisco, México some five years ago, not knowing any English. I have since mastered English but I soon realized that maintaining my Spanish ties and language is a top priority.
"I am a freshman at Owens

Community College and have enrolled in Spanish classes in addition to English."

Soto also co-hosts La Prensa Radio Show that airs every Sunday on WCWA 1230AM, commencing at 8:00PM. She speaks in both English and Spanish, in this multicultural market that surrounds the Toledo, Ohio metro

María E. Ruvalcaba, who

owns Nuevo Bilingual Service Center in Monroe, Michigan, has seen an increase in her student enrollment, both among Latino and non-Latino students, because of this need and direction. Ruvalcabahails from Nuevo Laredo, México and teaches both English and Span-

Ruvalcaba did not know any English when she moved to the U.S. in 1996, but mastered inglés after hours of study over several years

When working for Mon-roe Public Schools as a teacher's aide she decided to open the language school.

She encourages everyone to learn a second language. "I still maintain my Span-ish-speaking abilities," said Ruvalcaba.

Bloomfield Hills student starts Spanish-tutoring program

With a twist, a Bloomfield Hills MI high school student frustrated by the slow pace of her Spanish language studies has helped inaugurate a pro-gram in which older students studying Spanish tutor Span-ish-speaking elementary school children.

Kirsten McAlister, a 17year-old junior at Bloomfield Hills Lahser High School, had studied Spanish for years but said she wished she had acquired more fluency in the lan-

guage.
"I took Spanish through fifthgrade, but in middle school we ended up learning the same things we'd done in fifth grade, which was really disappoint-ing because I wanted to learn more" she told The Detroit

News for a story Monday.

"This year, it happened again," she said. "We weren't really learning new things, and I just decided I wanted to learn Spanish in more of a realistic

In the fall, McAlister pro posed a program in which high school students tutor Spanishspeaking elementary children, who face problems in school because they cannot speak

English. In January, her proposal became a reality with an afterschool, three-times-a-week tu-toring program at Alcott El-ementary School in Pontiac. About 40 Alcott children

get one-on-one help with their reading, writing and mathemat-

ics homework.
"A lot of them lived very different lives in their home country," said *Luz Telleria*, director of the *Pontiac Urban* League Hispanic Outreach, which worked with McAlister to create the program. "Here, they get help, and they also get self-esteem from the kids, because the kids are interested in Spanish and in their home country. That means a great deal to

This month, some students from Auburn Hills Avondale High School joined the pro-

gram. McAlister said she hopes itspreads to all Oakland County high schools so that hundreds of Latino children in Pontiac

or Latino Children in Pontiac can get help.
"I used to really not like school because I would try to read a book, and it was hard," said Luis Castillo, 10, who immigrated from Puerto Rico two years ago. "Now I can read, and they ask me to do more

and they ask me to do more because they think I speak English very good."

Ana Roca, who teaches Spanish and linguistics at Florida International University in Minute recently of feared. sity in Miami, recently offered advice to a college professor in Maine about teaching native Spanish speakers.

"Now, a few years ago, if you had told me someone from Maine would want to meet to talk to me about issues regardtalk to me about issues regarding starting a Spanish-for-na-tive-speakers section, I would have said, 'Maine. That doesn't sound likely.' But it is," said Roca, who co-edited a book, "Mi lengua: Spanish as a Heritara Li tage Language in the United

The American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Lan-guages estimates about 141,000 middle- and high-schoolers in 2000 were enrolled year and expects a significant

At the high school level, the courses often resemble traditional language arts classes with an emphasis on grammar, vocabulary and writing instruc-tion in Spanish. At the elemen-tary level, the classes often include English and Spanish speakers learning one portion of the curriculum in one language and the rest in the other language, said Marty Abbott, the council's education direc-

When done well, she said, the classes can help Spanish speakers—a group with tradi-tionally lower-than-average test scores and above-average dropout rates—connect with their schools. She said there their schools. She said there has been a rise in native Spanish speakers taking Advanced Placement Spanish courses—and succeeding.

"I think that helps students

see an academic vision for themselves, that there's a rea-son to stay in school," she said. The classes aren't without theirchallenges. Students come

in Spanish classes designed specifically for native Spanish speakers. The group is con-ducting another survey this

from different Spanish-speak-ing countries and different reing countries and different re-gions, each with its own dia-lect. Some children arrive in class just days after arriving in the United States, while others were born in the United States and grew up speaking mostly English. In Emporia, teacher Daniel Sánchez's class includes five or six newcomers. Some don't have an academic backeround

have an academic background in English or Spanish, leaving them struggling to write in either language. Sánchez switches back and forth be-tween English and Spanish to reach both newcomers and the students who grew up in

Sánchez talks with his stu-dents about his own struggles learning English. He immigrated to the United States from México when he was in high school so his parents could work at a meatpacking plant in Garden City in western Kansas. He also worked at the pack-ing plant during his last semester of high school and summers

in college.
"If a few students can benefit from learning a more academic Spanish that can be used in the work force, it's always a benefit," he said, "not just to a certain group but to everyone." Editor's Note: Rico de La

Javier "JV" Villanueva, CEO of the Tejano ROOTS Hall of Fame, told the crowd in Spanish that Canales would always be their queen.


Canales won numerous Tejano Music Awards and was awarded the Yellow Rose of Texas Award, the state's highest honor for artists, in 1983.





Growing up in a section of "Da Bronx" that used to hold the title "Baby Beirut," little Alba Sánchez, lived with her singing papi, which according to Alba was a cross between Ricky Ricardo and Bill Cosby; her mother was a light-skinned Latina nurse-Alba is a darkskinned Latina, so now everyone thinks she's adopted, and sister (whom, everyone keeps mistaking her for Alba's mother). Growing Up

She grew up watching her father tell stories and from him, gained the crafts of pacing, punch line and story telling, of course. "He really should have been a comedian because I spent so many hours laughing with that man," exclaimed Alba.

On top of him being a great singer in New York in the 1940s-1960s, he was a lone shark as well. In Alba's words, "I think that is a great premise for the start of a comedian's life. God is smart.'

No Alba, the man upstairs is hilarious! Convincing her parents that comedy was a great career move wasn't so easy. Let's just say it was her first professional performance, in front of a negative audience. Persuading old school Boricua parents that being a comedian was a sensible career choice for a darkskinned Latina was pretty difficult for Alba.

"Hey the pay is better than being a nurse and it's steady. Yeah right, I should've won an Oscar!" exclaimed Alba. Even after appearing on HBO Latino, her mother still brings home applications to apply for numerous jobs such as the Post Office and Con Edison!

It is with deep regret that

Alba has not had any Latina comedians to look up to for inspiration. Why is that? Because they're none. Alba explains, "I don't think Latinas where given permission to be "ballsy" and funny until recently. I find that a lot of Latinas shy away from being funny professionally cause they're afraid of looking ugly.'

She was however inspired by Latinos such as Paul Rodríguez and Cantínflas. One of her true inspirations is Sandra Bernhard, even though she is not Latina.

The way Sánchez concocts her material may sound cliché, pero basically she gets her ideas from everywhere!

"I have a hundred napkins all over the place with funny lines that I hear during the day. I eventually incorporate them into a story. I use to make up a lot of things; now I find that just living is enough for material. Life is really funny!" said Alba.

Most comics work from inspiration. If nothing is tickling Alba at the time, she will sit until something comes to her. "I admit most people don't have the patience, but most people's livelihood doesn't depend on it either," said Alba.

Americano scene

Alba has been more popular in the all out americano scene, but the Latinos that know about her, support her as well, especially locally. She is pushing toward a lot of Latina/os in colleges this spring and next fall.

"I really want to get to MI GENTE! There is nothing like saying, "Wakala!" or "Aye fo!" and having the audience know what it means literally. I love to hear big laughs when people identify with what I am saying. I love to look out and see people doubled over and in pain from laughing so hard. I love to hear delayed response. I could go on and on, but I already went over my quota of one example! I love that. So I look forward to meeting lots more Latinas nationally in the next year," continued Alba.

Latina/os need to laugh in these times of government warnings and wacky colored terror levels and financial calamities.

"I think Latinos are too serious. We are not too serious as a people. Actually, we are downright hilarious. but I feel that a lot of Latinos still have a lot of insecurities. We are still trying to prove ourselves in a lot of ways, so we are really not open to laughing at our-

selves. I feel that being a comic is a blessing because we are great healers. If we can laugh at ourselves, we become less "serious" and "happier!" said Alba.

Sánchez is doing "big thangs" this coming year. First she is reinventing herself and is getting more and more excited as she morphs into her new being. She is working on a new show in New York City, opening this March called, "Latinas Don't PMS."

The show is about a couple of Latinas talking about how it is. The whole show is in her words; no one is writing for her. Alba is also working on a new play entitled, "Spic & Spam." Spic & Spam is a two-person comedy about Alba's white, gay male friend from Appalachia and herself.

She will also be touring and doing some radio work as well as possibly more television. You can check out the latest news on Alba by visiting her website, www.albaSánchez.tv. (Oh, and sign the guestbook please!).

And now for the two golden questions: Let us learn from your mistakes. Tell all the Mijas one "uh oh" you made that you wish for no one else to make. "JUST BE WHO YOU ARE AND LET THAT BE OK. There is a place for every body. If you have one eve. two left feet and can't seem to get a good walking eve dog than I feel sorry for you; there's not hope. But otherwise, try to meet your authentic self and never leave its side. It's all we have. I spent too much of my youth not feeling OK like I just was not good enough. Thank God I am over that! It's a lot more fun now! JUST BE WHO YOU ARE AND LET THAT BE OK.

Tell us some words of wisdom for anyone that would like to get into your field.

"If comedy is your purpose in life, follow it and allow no one to talk you out of it. Just jump in and do it. That is the only way. It is a baptism by fire. Listen, no one put you here. And realize it is its own prize. Comedians are truly blessed. Comedy as a life path can be challenging, but remember it is its own prize and at its core there is nirvana.'

To sum it all up, Alba Sánchez is THE Mija to look out for. Despite her lack of Latina inspirations while adapting into the entertainment biz. Alba shows no sign of struggle or lack of momentum.

Determination and sacrifice are all what makes her "la loca" that she is today. I am overjoyed knowing that she will be the mold, the prototype for future Miias that would want to get into her profession.

"Hopefully when I am a long, gone female, comedians can say, wow, when I first saw Alba Sánchez, I knew I wanted to do comedy. She really inspired me!'

Mija, you won't have any problem with that. Many will utter those words from their mouths, but just don't make that happen quite yet. You still gotta whole lot of living to do!
