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Texas, stop killing Latino niños!

While it has long been recognized that our capital punishment system is marred by racism that disproportionately affects African-Americans, often less noted is the death penalty's seemingly discriminatory use against Latinos. A closer look at pending executions of child offendersthose charged with a crime committed while they were under the age of 18—reflects a disturbing endorsement of the state-sponsored killing of Latino youth.

Four out of four juvenile offenders scheduled for execution this year, all in the state of Texas, are Latino: Edward Capetillo, Efrain Pérez, Raul Villarreal, and Mauro Barraza. Predictably, as studies consistently show that the victim's race is a considerable factor in determining which defendants receive the death penalty, all four were convicted of killing non-Latino Caucasians. Amnesty International has expressed concerned about racial bias in the case of Edward Capetillo. the only one of four defendants charged with the murder of Kimberly Williamson for whom Harris County, Texas sought the death penalty. The other three defendants were white. The extreme punishment was sought for Captetillo despite that his background is not typical of most child offenders on death row-he had no previous criminal record, was a promising high school athlete, and grew up in an unbroken home. Capetillo is scheduled to die on March 30th.

and community members that testified on behalf of Capetillo athis sentencing were undoubtedly pleased the hear the US Supreme Court announce it will revisit the constitutionality of the juvenile death penalty sometime this fall. Since then Justice Scalia has granted a stay to African-American juvenile Anzel Jones, but no stay has yet been given to any of the Latino offenders scheduled to die as early as this month. Many abolitionists remain hopeful justices will soon grant more stays, in accordance with past comments made by the court describing the execution of child offenders as "inconsistent with evolving standards of decency in a civilized

society."
Indeed, the United States is the only country in the world that regularly executes juveniles, despite its flagrant violation of international law and many international treaties protecting the rights of children. (The only other countries on recent record for sporadically executing juveniles are China, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Iran, and Pakistan.)

But Texas staunchly believes there should be no redemption for Capetillo, norany of the twenty-eight individuals on its death row for crimes committed at the age of seventeen: thirteen Latinos, eight African-Americans, six non-Latino Caucasians, and one Asian. The Lone Star State has long led the nation in the killing child offenders and is responsible for 60 percent of all such executions since the death penalty was reinstated in 1977.

Despite growing national consensus that the juvenile

death penalty is shamefully immoral, in addition to the Supreme Courts pending review, Texas is operating full steam ahead with the scheduled executions of Capetillo, Pérez, Villarreal, and Barraza. As Harris County District Attorney Charles Rosenthal told the Houston Chronicle, while scoffing recent legal developments concerning the juvenile death penalty, "Until a court tells me differently, the executions are still on."

The Texas justice system has dubbed too many children-the majority Latinounrepentant, completely irredeemable and better off dead. While there is hope that later this fall morality will ultimately prevail, justice may come too late for some. We all suffer when the rights of our children are not protected; when the young and vulnerable are punished with the ultimate denial of human rights. The killing of any more children must be stopped and the reprehensible practice of juvenile death penalty must end forever.

Spain's next leader condemns "shock and awe" anti-terrorism strategy and calls Iraq occupation "a fiasco"

MADRID, Spain (AP), Mar. 17: Prime Ministerelect José Luis Rodríguez Zapatero condemned America's "shock and awe" strategy for combatting terror and called the occupation of Iraq "a fiasco."

In a radio interview Wednesday, Zapatero also remained firm in his intent to withdraw 1,300 Spanish peacekeeping troops from Iraq, even if U.S. President George W. Bushtries to talk him out of it.

"I will listen to President Bush but my position is clear and very firm," the Socialist leader said.

Rather than defeat terrorism, U.S. military actions risk fueling it, he said, reinforcing his sharp break with the pro-U.S. policies of the defeated Spanish government of outgoing conservative Prime Minister Jose Maria Aznar.

"Combatting terrorism with bombs, with operations of shock and awe, with Tomahawk missiles, is not the way to beat terrorism. Not like that. It is a way of generating more radicalism, more people who can wind up being tempted by using violence," said Zapatero.

"Terrorism is fought by the state of law," he said. "I believe this is what Europe and the international community must debate."

The election defeat Sunday of Aznar's Popular Party marked the first time a government that backed the Iraq war has been voted out of office. The elections were shaken by train bombings that killed 202 people in the Spanish capital three days earlier.

The attacks led to accusations that Aznar's support of the Iraq war had made Spain a target for terrorism. Angry voters turned to Zapatero, who campaigned against the war and the stationing of Spanish troops in Iraq.

Zapatero's threatened troop withdrawal has worried U.S., British and some other world leaders, who say pulling out of Iraq after the bombings would amount to a victory for terrorists.

On Wednesday, the regional Catalan party Convergence and Union, which has 10 seats in the new parliament, endorsed the withdrawal.

"Spain should never have supported an illegal war," said party leader Artur Mas. He attributed Zapatero's win in part to anti-war feelings in Spain.

Some 5,000 supporters gathered outside the headquarters of Aznar's party Wednesday, accusing Zapatero of being soft on terrorism. Waving flags and banners, they protested Zapatero's upset win.

"Zapatero, president of al-Qaida!" "Zapatero with terrorism!" and "Zapatero resign!" they chanted.

The protesters left about 30 minutes after the Popular Party's defeated candidate, Mariano Rajoy, appeared and greeted the crowd from a balcony.

In his hour-long interview with Onda Cero radio, Zapatero stressed that combatting terrorism is as high a priority for him as it was for Aznar. Though he'll go about it differently, he said he will reinforce Spain's defenses, no matter the cost.

Zapatero also vowed to better coordinate Spanish police agencies and to relentlessly hunt down terrorists.

"They will not have a moment of rest," Zapatero said, adding that he would have a single director for both the Civil Guard and the National Police, which currently answer to two chiefs.

The 43-year-old lawyer is putting together a Socialist



government to take over next month. But decisions to be made already are piling up.

Environmentalists want to know whether he favors a huge plan to divert water fromthe Ebro Riverto southern Spain. They don't. He doesn't either. "It's not a good plan," he said.

Zapatero pledged to set up a new housing ministry to fulfill an electoral promise to build more low-and moderate-income dwellings. Asked if that wasn't a utopian solution, he responded, "No more utopian than (the prospect) that I would win the election."

Most pre-election polls projected the conservatives would lose their absolute majority in parliament, but nevertheless win the most seats. They wound up with 148, a drop of 35. The Socialists won 164, 12 less than an absolute majority but 39 more than they won in the 2000 election.

Politically, the Socialists would like to have a working majority in Parliament. Zapatero repeated Wednesday he intends to form a Cabinet exclusively Socialist, except for possible "independents, but near the Socialist" party on issues.

That stance may or may not win over customary allies like the United Left, which won five seats Sunday. Coalition leader Gaspar Llamazares said Wednesday he'd like to cooperate, but will not promise a "blank check" to the Socialists

Mas said his party said in the campaign it was not going to enter in any government, neither with the Popular Party nor the Socialists, but would cast votes on a case-by-case basis.

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Bush and Kerry on the issues, Part 1

WASHINGTON (AP): A look at some of the positions of presidential candidates Republican George Bush and Democrate John Kerry:

ABORTION : Support abortion rights?

Bush: Only in cases of rape or incest or when a woman's life is endangered. Signed bill to ban a procedure that opponents call partial-birth abor-

Kerry: Yes. Would nominate only Supreme Court justiceswhosupportabortionrights. Voted against partial-birth ban.

BUDGET

Bush: Record deficits in a time of recession, war, terrorism and tax cuts. Budget in surplus when Bush took office; \$521 billion deficit is projected this year. Budget plan for 2005 says annual deficits can be cut by half in five years. Bush proposes that Congress limit discretionary spending in programs outside defense and homeland security to a 0.5 percent increase next year.

Kerry: Cut deficit by half, at least, in first term, in part through repeal of Bush tax cuts for wealthier Americans. DEATH PENALTY

Bush: Supports.

Kerry: Opposes "other than in cases of real international and domestic terrorECONOMY/TAXES

Bush's record: Robust economic growth since mid-2003 but anemic employment persists, with 2.2 million jobs lost since Bush took office. Bush won \$1.35 trillion in tax cuts for all income levels in 2001, a \$96 billion stimulus in 2002 and a \$330 billion package in 2003-half of what he had sought. Latest package accelerates tax cuts scheduled for later in the decade. Bush's plans: Wants \$3,000 re-employment accounts to help the unemployed with job-search expenses. Make recently passed temporary tax cuts permanent. Ease business regulations, pursue more free-trade deals, increase domestic energy production, save costs to the economy by limiting class-action lawsuits and medical malpractice liability.

Kerry: Roll back the Bush tax cuts for the wealthiest Americans; keep parts of the package for middle- and lowincome people. Spend on highways, school construction, pollution cleanup, energy projects and more to create 3 million jobs in 500 days. Provide \$50 billion over two years to states $struggling\,with\,budget\,deficits.$

EDUCATION Bush: Championed a 2002 bipartisan overhaul of elementary and secondary education that toughened standards for

teachers, schools and student

achievement. Budget proposal would increase spending on poor school districts, children with disabilities, Pell grants to help poor students attend college, and experimental privateschool voucher programs. The plan would cut spending on vocational education, a family literacy program, arts in education, dropout prevention and more. Budget proposal, if passed, would mark 43 percent increase in federal education spending since Bush took

Kerry: Establish \$3.2 billion community service plan for high school students that would qualify them for the equivalent of their states' fouryear public college tuition if they perform two years of national service. Provide a tax credit for every year of college on the first \$4,000 paid in tuition. Credit would provide 100percent of the first \$1,000 and 50 percent on the rest. Opes private-school vouchers. Backed 2002 changes but says too much emphasis is placed on tests for measuring student achievement; additional factors, such as attendance and parental satisfac-tion, should be considered.

ENVIRONMENT/ **ENERGY**

Bush record: Withdrew from Kyoto global warming treaty. Reversed 2000 campaign pledge to regulate indioxide. Eased some rules to help older industrial plants and refineries expand without paying for added pollution controls, prompting court fights from states and cities. Ordered pollution cuts from heavy-duty diesel engines and diesel fuel used in highway trucks and buses. Sped up forest-thinning projects on public woodlands, limiting environmental reviews and public appeals. Spent \$3 billion on fix-ups in national parks but did not eliminate maintenance backlog as promised. Won approval from Congress to speed cleanup of 450,000 polluted former industrial sites and convert them to new parks and other uses.

Bush plans: Change clean air laws to use a market-based approach that would impose the first national cap on industrial emissions of mercury and reductions in smog-forming nitrogen oxides and sulfur dioxide, which causes acid rain, but not carbon dioxide. Cap power plant emissions to reduce pollution drifting across state lines. Budget plan would cut spending next year on lowinterest loans to states and communities for clean water projects and cut spending by more than 20 percent on research into long-term health and environmental consequences of energy use and development, including global warming. Develop technology for commercially viable hy-

drogen-power fuel cells to power vehicles, homes and business with no pollution or greenhouse gases.

Kerry: Re-engage "in the development of an international climate change strategy to address global warming"; no explicit endorsement of Kyoto treaty. No drilling in Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. Has supported tougher fuel efficiency standards for vehicles. Goal of 20 percent of electricity from renewable or alternative sources by 2020. Steer \$20 billion from oil and gas royalties to development of cleaner energy. Goal of independence from Middle East oil in 10 years. Tougher standards for companies operating on public lands. FARMING

Bush: Signed a nearly 80 percent expansion of farm subsidies in 2002 despite previous misgivings that the extra money would cause overproduction and depress prices. Budget plan for 2005 would reduce spending on rural development programs and conservation funds.

Kerry: Supports ban on meatpackerownershipoflivestock to help ensure markets for farmers. Unspecified increase in farm conservation programs. Supported 2002 bill that boosted farm subsidies.

San Francisco where she spent a week as the only Ohioan participating in the Gates Millenium Scholarship Read. The scholarship, established by Microsoft founder Bill Gates and his wife Melinda and administered by their foundation, offers university tuition and fee scholarship for historically underprivileged students. To become eligible, a student must have a 3.0 GPA and score at least 21 on the ACT or 1,000 on the SAT and be of African-American. Latino, or Native American descent.

"It is a very large program with billions of dollars put aside for education," said Vega of the Gates Millenium Scholarships. As one of the 35 readers, and the only one from the Buckeye State, she and her colleagues reviewed close to 1,500 applications. Among herco-workers was Aura Cazares, a Latina counselor from Holy Redeemer school on West Vernor Highway in southwestern Detroit.

"I was chosen because I have experience in evaluating applications and in working in financial aid for Hispanics," said Vega. She graduated from BGSU in 1999 with a dual degree in interpersonal communications and ethnic studies and began working for the university as an admissions counselor the following April. During her four years in the position, she has recruited more than 50 Texas Latinos for BGSU. She also travels to

California and New York for recruitment, and covers much of northwest Ohio.

Vega manages to visit her hometown of San Benito at leasttwice a year and has maintained a close relationship with high school counselors in Texas. She also does all the necessary follow-up work after the candidate visits the BGSU campus. In fact, it is not unusual to see her pick up the students at the airport when they arrive for their visit and to assist in finding them housing.

ing.
"These students are everything to me and I do all that I can do," Vega told *La Prensa* for an earlier profile.

Vega stressed that her recruitment assignments and responsibilities at BGSU are not solely restricted to Latinos.

This is the last year of Vega's three-year term as president of ECHHO (Educators in College Helping Hispanics Onward), a network of professionals founded in 1983 by Dr. Rolando Andrade of BGSU. The organization promotes higher education for Latinos by means of several college fairs each fall. The group's membership includes representatives from 50 institutions, but the local chapter is the only one in Ohio to actually offer scholarships.

Although Vega was born in Tamaulipas, México, her mother, Celsa Rodríguez, moved to San Benito, Texas, inthe Rio Grande Valley when Vega was five. Her stepfather, Andreas Rodríguez, is de-

ceased.

Her family-she is the youngest of seven siblingsworked as migrant farm workers in Texas and later in the Fremont, Ohio area. Vega told a La Prensa reporter in 2002 that her mother "encouraged me and my siblings to seek education as a means to a better end. She was a single parent striving to make ends meet but she knew the value of education. I shall never forget her for this love and focus." Indeed, five of the children have some type of college or technical training.

Vega has never forgotten those early years toiling in the fields, and she believes the experience aided her in her quest for education and selfdevelopment.

Vega's sister, Dora, stayed in Ohio to enroll at BGSU and she followed her there. Dora today works in the Toledo office of the Social Security Administration. Her brother, Ramzes, is going for his engineering degree, and Bellanira said she intends to start a Master's program in December to obtain her Ph.D.

Granholm appoints first Latino judge to 50th District Court

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP), March 20: Gov. Jennifer Granholm has appointed a deputy city attorney from this Oakland County city to serve as district judge at the 50th District Court.

Michael Martínez, 47, is the first Latino to sit on the bench of that court, and is the county's only Latino judge.

He had run for a seat during the last election, but lost to incumbent judges Christopher Brown and William Waterman. After Waterman died last year, Granholm appointed Cynthia Walker, who was the court's administrator.

For the past seven years, Martínezhasserved as a deputy city attorney for Pontiac. He replaces Brown, who retired in January.

Martínez is a graduate of the University of Michigan and Wayne State University Law School.

"The governor always strives to appoint outstanding people to the bench," Granholm spokeswoman Liz Boydtold The Daily Oakland Press.

His appointment Friday was hailed by the city's growing Latino population. "We'reelated about it," said

"We're elated about it," said Pontiac City Councilman John Bueno. "The governor's choice allows the bench to be cognizant of the city." Martínez would have to run

Ríos de basura al Mar Caribe

PONCE (AP): El secretario de Recursos Naturales, Luis Rodríguez, afirme el miércoles que la basura que es lanzada a los ríos de la Isla desemboca con «desperdicios peligrosos» en las azules aguas de las costas puertorriqueñas.

«Los ríos de Puerto Rico se están convirtiendo en focos de contaminación de nuestras playas alrededor de la Isla. No me refiero a contaminación de desperdicios sólidos pero también de contaminación con desperdicios peligrosos», señaló Rodríguez en un aparte con la AP.

Precisó que los contaminantes incluyen desperdicios biomédicos y de industrias que usan solventes, entre otros.

Las declaraciones de Rodríguez surgieron tras anunciar el inicio de la campaña de limpieza y restauración «Operativo Conciencia Ambiental» el sábado en la playa La Guancha de Ponce.

El funcionario informó que el Río Portugués, que comienza en la zona montañosa ponceña y atraviesa la ciudad, es uno de los que lleva desperdicios al Mar Caribe. «Aquí(en Ponce), a diario, se ensucia este predio, no por actividad humana en la playa. Lo que tenemos es que la desembocadura del Río Portugués trae diariamente toneladas de desperdicios sólidos desdeel mismo centro de la Isla», sostuvo Rodríguez.

Señaló que la mayoría de la basura que llega a las playas mediante ríos y quebradas es lanzada por la gente que reside cerca o en los márgenes de esos cuerpos de agua dulce.

Asimismo, apuntó que las descargas de plantas de tratamiento de la Autoridad de Acueductos y Alcantarillados (AAA) degradan la calidad de las aguas de los ríos que llegan hasta el mar.

Rodríguez también dijo que las descargas al mar que realizan las casas y negocios que no están conectados al sistema de alcantarillado sanitario de la AAA son responsables de la degradación de las aguas en las costas.

En tanto, destacó que la cantidad de desperdicios provenientes de barcos cruceros y de otro tipo de embarcación marina ha disminuido.

San Francisco's gay newlyweds came from 46 states and eight countries

SANFRANCISCO(AP): More than 4,000 same-sex couples obtained marriage licenses in San Francisco before the state Supreme Court shut down the practice, a study released Wednesday shows.

Couples from Canada, Britain, the Netherlands, France, Denmark, Germany, Switzerland and Thailand accounted for the 17 licenses requested by residents of foreign nations

Of the 4,037 same-sex couples, who obtained licenses in the city starting Feb. 12, more than 91 percent came from California. according to a nonscientific

analysis by County Assessor Mabel Teng's office.

The rest came from 45 other states and eight foreign countries, the analysis shows.

"It confirms to us that California benefited the most from the service we provided," said Teng, who personally officiated at the nuptials of more than 300 couples.

The analysis also found that more lesbians tied the knot than gay men: Of the 4,037 licenses issued,2,311,or57 percent, were granted to women, authorities concluded by reviewing the first names of the applicants.

Eighty-two of the couples either chose not to go through with their weddings or did not return to City Hall in time to register their licenses, a critical final step, Teng said. That brings the total number of known couples to complete the process to 3,955.

Couples from Washington and Oregon, which each sent 32 couples to San Francisco, were the next most-represented group behind California. Nevada, New York and Florida respectively had 24, 20 and 16.

The marriages began after Mayor Gavin Newsom directed his administration to grant licenses to gays and lesbians. The Supreme Court handed down an injunction stopping the practice last Thursday.



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






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

López has over 20 years of community involvement and work experience. She worked throughout college and law school for the Department of Youth Services, Lucas County Children Services, Ohio Civil Rights Commission, the Adelante Program and SASI

Quiñonez is a senior pursuing a bachelor's of pharmaceutical science with a major in medicinal chemistry. His GPA is 3.853 and he will be attending the University of Michigan's Medical School this fall.

During his college career, hehas been named to the dean's list five times and the president's list four times. He has been engaged in laboratory research in the area of nucleoside chemistry since 2002.

Enriquez's Mayan Madonna unveiled

Emanuel Hernández Enriquez—Bowling Green State University's premier graduate artist—was present at another unveiling of one of his most unique life stone sculptures, Mayan Madonna.

The ceremony was held last Friday, March 19th, at St. Vincent's Hospital in Toledo, where the creation was beautifully displayed in front of a long, black backdrop—appropriately, at the entrance of its obstetrics ward.

According to artist Enriquez, "Mayan Madonna is sitting in a familiar pose, depicting the love and affection a mother has for her child. I created this piece to include the Americas' Mayan mother to the long list of European and African Madonnas."

Enriquez continued, "I sculpted the mother oversized, not in a Rueben's soft, fleshy style, but in a solid, stronger frame, broadening the shoulders and accentuating the muscles. The hair is pulled back in a neat, but intricate bun that does not obstruct the shoulders.

"Continuing in the overall strength, I broadened the hips to give her a solid sitting form. The base and sculpture are one piece that roughly resembles a pyramid, creating a metaphor for strength and stability," said Enriquez.

Jeffrey Peterson, President and CEO of St. Vincent's Hospital welcomed the crowd, followed by comments by Sister June Ketterer of the V.P. Mission Service.

Sister Ketterer believed that the sculpture had a universal appeal to and for all motherhood. Interestingly enough, as she was speaking to the large crowd that had gathered between elevators on the 8th floor, a mother passed with her young infant, Leah. The audience burst into loving laughter.

The piece was donated by María L. Rodríguez-Winter and her husband Duane. Rodríguez-Winter is an All State insurance agent in the south end of Toledo and was actively involved in the creation and maintenance of the Sofia Quintero Art and Cultural Center. She was also the cofounder of a Chicano

organization at the University of Toledo in 1972, called *MEChA*.

Rodríguez-Winter was originally an LPN by trade and worked at St. Vincent's hospital for several years prior to her becoming a successful businesswoman.
