Cuba atribuye a ley de EEUU la muerte de migrantes

LA HABANA (AP): Cuba, al ratificar su acusación de que una ley de Estados Unidos es la responsable de la muerte de emigrantes cubanos en alta mar, reportó este miércoles que al menos 20 personas fallecieron el mes pasado al intentar llegar en un bote a costas norteamericanas.

El caso, descrito por las autoridades de la isla como el segundo más grave en tiempos recientes, eleva a por lo menos 68 personas, incluyendo a 16 menores de edad, las víctimas desde noviembre pasado y hasta ahora en distintos intentos de salir de Cuba y llegar a costas de la Florida.

«Nos sabemos cuántos mas» podrían haber muerto desde noviembre a esta parte, dijo Randy Alonso, moderador del diario foro vespertino de la televisora estatal cubana, y dedicado este miércoles a la reciente tragedia de la veintena de emigrantes.

El gobierno de La Habana responsabiliza a la llamada Ley de Ajuste, promulgada por Washington en 1966 y por la cual cualquier cubano que alcance territorio de Estados Unidos puede solicitar su

residencia en ese país, de estimular salidas arriesgadas e ilegales de la isla.

De acuerdo con los datos ofrecidos en el foro televisivo. en el mas reciente suceso murieron al menos 20 personas, entre ellas cuatro menores de edad, como una niña de dos años y otra de cinco.

El grupo fue dado por desaparecido en el mar a fines de agosto, según reportes de la Guardia Costera de Estados Unidos, tras recibir llamadas de parientes de los emigrantes en Miami.

La televisora indicó que entre las víctimas estaba un hombre llamado Enrique Fabelo, piloto de la lancha, y quien vino a la isla a recoger a su esposa y a sus dos hijas, una pequeña de dos años y otra de ocho. Todos murieron, dijo la televisora.

La veintena de cubanos salió el 18 de agosto en una lancha desde un sector de Bahía Honda, a unos 80 kilómetros al oeste de La Habana, según han dicho familiares en Miami y en Cuba. El servicio de guardacostas norteamericano solo ha reportado el hallazgo de cuatro cadáveres.

La Guardia Costera ha indicado además que recibió los primeros reportes de parientes en Miami cuatro días después de que el grupo saliera de Cuba. Hasta ahora

Hermano Juan Enriquez remarked, "Our family is very proud of Manny, whose works are unique. Part of my brother's genius comes from our mother, who raised four college graduates and other talented children.'

Jim Vandenberg, a long time friend of Manny and president of OhioMedia, said that Manny "is truly an inspiration for all aspiring Latino artists. His creations are truly remarkable.

Connie Eason has a mission-she wants to make sure that people do not forget the many Latinos who were affected by the horrific events of Sept. 11.

Concepción "Connie" Treviño Eason will be honored Sept. 28 as one of the four recipients of the Latino community's coveted Diamante Award. Most people are aware of her outstanding work as special services coordinator for the Toledo-Lucas County Victim Witness Assistance Program under the Prosecutor's Office.

But it was her unheralded work as a member of the National Organization for Victim's Assistance and the Ohio Community Crisis Response Team that brought her to the New York area twice in the wake of the terrible tragedy.

"I was there only six days after the attack,' Eason told *La Prensa* last week in a telephone interview from Brownsville. Texas where she is visiting her mother.

"I arrived on Sept. 17 to aid in setting up a Family Crisis Resource Center at Liberty State Park in Hoboken, New Jersey next to Ellis Island.

"Ellis Island is where the Statue of Liberty is located. It was right across from Manhattan and the still-burning ruins of the World Trade Center. My job consisted of helping assist the families who had members missing at that time through crisis counseling and connecting them with services " said Eason

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Latinos fall behind in graduating college

U.S.-born children of Latino immigrants are nearly as likely as whites to enroll in college, but less than half as likely to earn bachelor's degrees, according to a report released Thursday.

"There are large numbers of Latinos who are enrolled in college," said Roberto Suro, director of the Pew Hispanic Center, which issued the report, "but who for a variety of reasons don't reach a degree."

For policymakers who want to increase the number of Latinos with college degrees, those students should be the targets, Suro said.

"They're already on campus and enrolled. The problems that are keeping them from graduation are not overwhelming."

The report by the nonpartisan research group suggested several possible reasons for the disparity: Latinos are more likely than non-Latino whites to be enrolled part time or at two-

first in their families to attend college and may have been more likely to attend underperforming high schools.

Using data from the U.S. Census Bureau's Current Population Survey from 1997 to 2000, the report found that about 42 percent of secondgeneration Hispanic high school graduates ages 18 to 24 attended college, compared to 46 percent of whites in that age range.

Second-generation Latinos were more likely to go to college than foreignborn Latinos, who had a 26 percent enrollment rate, or third-generation or later Latinos, who had a 36 percent enrollment rate.

But only about 16 percent of second-generation Latino high school graduates ages 25 to 29 received a bachelor's degree, compared to about 37 percent of whites in that age range, the report said.

The report "underscores that Latinos very much want to go to college, and that we are enrolling in college," said Sarita Brown, president

Fund Institute in Washington. "It heightens the attention on the potential for success in college."

Brown, who is Latino and was the first in her family to attend college, said Latino students are failing to graduate because they lack adequate financial aid.

Among the study's findings:

About 75 percent of 18to 24-year-old Latino college students were enrolled in college full time, compared to 85 percent of whites. About 40 percent attended two-year institutions, compared to about 25 percent of whites.

Fewer Latinos pursued graduate and professional degrees. Among 25- to 34year-old high school graduates, about 1.9 percent of Latinos were enrolled in graduate school, compared to 3.8 percent of whites.

Gregory Staff, a recent Latino graduate of the University of Virginia, said he hoped to go to law school, but finances make it tough.

"I would like to attend law school in the near future," he said, but "heavy debt I have acquired, as well



as the desire to assist my family financially, makes it difficult to attend.'

College enrollment among Latinos also varied by ethnicity and generation. Cuban high school graduates 18 to 24 had the highest rate, 45 percent, while Puerto Ricans had the lowest, 30

Latino educational progress will affect the nation's economic health, the report predicted. Over the next 25 years, the white working age population is expected to decrease by about 5 million, but the number of working-age Latinos is projected to rise by 18 million, the report said, citing Census Bureau data.

"This is where our extra workers are going to come from," said Richard Fry, author of the report. "It's vitally important for our nation's workforce that young Latinos" improve their graduation rates.

The Ohio State University will use a \$1.5 million dollar grant from the U.S. Department of Education to recruit and to retain students who are children of migrant, agricultural or seasonal workers.

The five-year grant, which will fund Ohio State's residential College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP), will help students from migrant working families pursue a higher education.

Jose Villa, interim director of CAMP and assistant vice provost for the Office of Minority Affairs, says the program gives aspiring students a better opportunity for earning a college degree. He said Ohio State is the only institution in the state to have this

type of program.

"The program improves the opportunity for migrant students to be successful," Villa said. "These are bright students in spite of all the inhibitors associated with migrating.

Villa said the program will help fund 30 students the first year followed by an increase of five students each year thereafter for a total of 200 students. Currently, he said about 10 students from migrant families attend Ohio State each year.

Mac Stewart, vice provost for the Office of Minority Affairs, said Ohio State has the resources and dedication to make this program a suc-

"This grant shows that the U.S. Department of Educa-

tion has faith in the leadership of Ohio State to address the needs of this population," Stewart said, "The department also realizes that Ohio State has a track record of assisting many minority students in pursuing their education."

The program will help students with educational and residential expenses and provide support for their other needs, including academic counseling and tutoring. Funds will be set aside to make sure personal, leadership and cultural opportunities are available and to provide health, vision and dental care.

Villa, the son of migrant workers who earned his Ph.D. at Ohio State, understands how difficult it is to pursue a higher education. He said he plans to use his experiences



to help the students.

"I want the students to know that someone who can serve as a role model for them is here at Ohio State and can help," he said. "I am where I am now because of the opportunity given to me. These students are in need of opportunity the understanding.

Since the students in the program are mostly first-generation, Villa plans to form a relationship with the students' parents to ease any concerns.

(Continued from Page 1) range of emergency and long term services provided by the United States Attorney General's office, Victims Compensation program, Social Security, FEMA, the Red Cross, Salvation Army, the U.S. Department of Labor and services and foundations covering insurance, mental health, and banking. The survivors had to think about such things as mortgages and income," explained Eason.

She said her Ohio team worked 14-hour days and assisted in providing the U.S. Department of Justice and the FBI with identification and DNA information for the missing loved ones.

Eason's first stint ran from Sept. 17-24. She returned to New York again after Thanksgiving from Nov. 24-Dec.2.

She assisted in the setting up of memorial boards and viewing of the remains of the World Trade Center. "With the aid of the National Guard and the Red Cross, we accompanied families by ferry across the Hudson to Ground Zero where we silently mourned and reflected upon the tremendous loss," recalled

That's when Eason realized that a large number of jobs had been lost as a result of the disaster. "Security people lost their jobs, as did those in airline-related industries and in the hospitality field. These included cooks, maids, porters, maintenance workers, shuttle and limo drivers, and others who held low paying jobs with companies associated with the airlines. And many of these were Latinos.

"Although many of them were out of food, behind on their rent and had their utilities cut off, assistance for them was limited-especially if they were in the US illegally, which some were. Those in that category were not entitled to benefits because they did not have Social Security numbers. This became a source of great frustration for me be $cause\,I\,could\,see\,the\,trauma$ and desperation in these people's eyes, and I too was limited in what I could offer

Because she is fluent in



Spanish, Eason was assigned to assist Latino families, Eason said she met with families from Mexico, Ecuador, Honduras, Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic, Columbia, El Salvador, Peru and Nicaragua. All had another bond in common—they had lost a loved one on

"They all were in shock too. We were all affected by Sept. 11. People were just in complete shock. They all were in crisis. It was just very heartbreaking," said Eason.

Volunteerism is second nature to Eason. She has volunteered with the Lucas County Mental Health Board, Latins United, and the Latina Democratic Caucus of the Democratic Party. She has served as a member of the American Civil Liberties Board and the advisory committee to Adelante's Ayuda program, and is an HIV and AIDS counselor at the Medical College of Obio.

This past April, she shared her vast knowledge of Latinos in Toledo with the WGTE-TV crew filming local Hispanics and their family recollections at the Sofia Quintero Center.

"I brought some things with me to show people, a lot of it being political stuff about local Latinos in politics. It is important that people remember the other people who ran for office before them." Eason said.

Eason will receive her 2002 Diamante Award, along with Louis Escobar, Cecilia M. Rivera, and Keith J. Treviño, at the 13th annual Diamante Award Gala at the University of Toledo Student Union.

México parece ser el único país latinoamericano en crecimiento por TRACI CARL

MEXICO (AP): En un hemisferio de recesión económica, México da indicios de crecimiento, mantiene disciplinadamente su estabilidad monetaria y ha reducido el gasto público para evitar que su economía se vea arrastrada por el caos regional.

No hay devaluación, y el público no retira en masa su dinero de los bancos, por el contrario, abrenuevas cuentas.

Tras un año de recesión principalmente debida a su relación con Estados Unidos, México registró un crecimiento del 2,1% anual en el segundo trimestre del año. Si bien las buenas noticias se debieron en parte al hecho de que la Pascua tocó este año en el primer trimestre, no en el segundo como el año pasado, muchos analistas pronostican que la nación va hacia una recuperación.

El principal economista de Merrill Lynch para Latinoamérica, Miguel Palomino, dice que es probable crecimiento sólido en futuros trimestres.

Sinembargo la mayor parte de ese éxito aún no ha llegado a la población en general. Según cálculos del presidente Vicente Fox, la mitad de las familias mexicanas carecen de vivienda, ropa o transporte adecuados.

Incluso con un presidente que apoya la libre empresa, México ha sufrido por la recesión. La industria maquiladora—plantas de montaje para exportación, principalmente a Estados Unidos—ha perdido más de 100.000 empleos, la mayoría en la frontera con su vecino norteño, donde los salarios son mayores

Aunque los funcionarios gubernamentales admitten que la economía en general vuelve cobrar vida, pasarán meses antes de que la recuperación llegue a las maquiladoras. La tasa de empleo en estas plantas descendió un 15% durante los primeros seis meses del año, frente al mismo periodo en el 2001.

Muchos fabricantes, ante la disyuntiva de pagar 200 pesos (20 dólares) por día a un trabajador mexicano ó 2 dólares diarios a uno chino, se han mudado a Asia.

Pero México sigue diferenciándose de muchos países de Latinoamérica que están inmersas en desordenes políticos y económicos.

Parte de la estabilidad de México se debe a sus lazos económicos con Estados Unidos, destino del 80% de las exportaciones mexicanas, y una economía que muestra indicios de mejoría.

Para muchos analistas, la mayor amenaza contra la estabilidad en México es la imposibilidad de Fox de lograr que el Congreso apruebe las reformas propuestas, como la que permitiría a los inversionistas privados competir en el sector eléctrico estatal.

Aunque Fox insiste en que su prioridad es una nueva relación con el Congreso, los analistas lo dudan.

Palomino dijo que por ahora no parece que ese deseo vaya a materializarse.

Tras larga espera se estrena «Frida» con Salma Hayek en Venecia Por TOM RACHMAN

VENECIA, Italia (AP): Aficionados y cineastas por igual se congregaron jueves en la playa del Lido a fin de presenciar la llegada de la estrella mexicana Salma Hayek, que vino aquí para presentar su cinta «Frida» en la función inaugural del Festival de Cine de Venecia.

En declaraciones formuladas poco antes de la

proyección, Hayek dijo que durante varios años había deseado hacer una película acercade Frida Kahlo, pero al parecer la biografía de la pintora mexicana parecía tener demasiados elementos poco atractivos para la nantalla.

«Es una historia de amor acerca de una mujer hirsuta y un hombre gordo», dijo Hayek el jueves acerca del argumento de su cinta. «Ambos eran comunistas. Ella era bisexual. Tenía que ser una película histórica. No eran conceptos atractivos para la mayoría de la gente».

Es cierto que la historia de la pintora había sido ya llevada al cine en México, en una película protagonizada en 1983 por Ofelia Medina y titulada «Frida. Naturaleza Viva». Esa cinta fue dirigida por Paul Leduc.

Pero para interesar a productores de Hollywooden un proyecto similar había que esperar a una coyuntura favorable. Y esa coyuntura se presentó cuando se puso de moda el arte plástico de Kahlo en Estados Unidos, y el público comenzó a interesarse por su vida y sus relaciones con su esposo, el muralista Diego Rivera.

Madonna quería hacer la vida de Frida Kahlo, y otro tanto deseaba Jennifer López. Pero en definitiva fue Hayek la que se llevó el papel.

«Hoy me siento muy feliz de estar aquí», dijo la estrella mexicana en rueda de prensa. «Pero hoy no es el día más emocionante de mi vida. El día más emocionante fue el día en que llegué al foro» para comenzar el rodaje de la cinta.

«Creo que no hay nada que pueda superar esa sensación».

La película de dos horas de duración, dirigida por la teatrista norteamericana Julie Taymor, cuenta la vida de la pintora en México a principios del siglo XX e incluye una constelación de estrellas, entre ellas Antonio Banderas, Alfred Molina, Ashley Judd, Geoffrey Rush y Edward Norton.

Acerca de su trabajo en la cinta, Taymor dijo que la vida de Kahlo era «una de las historias románticas más apasionantes que he conocido». Y agregó que fue ses romanticismo lo que la atrajo al proyecto filmico.

Pero «Frida» no hace sino inaugurar la fiesta filmica de la playadel Lido. El programa pendiente incluye más de 75 largometrajes, y varias docenas de cortos y retrospectivas.

Ese programa incluye «Road to Perdition», con Tom Hanks y Paul Newman; «Full Frontal», de Steven Soderbergh; «Entre extraños», con Sophia Loren, y «Ripley's Game», de Liliana Cavani, protagonizada por John Malkovich.

El festival concluye el 8 de septiembre.

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A year after Sept. 11 attacks, detainees's fate in

GUANTANAMO BAY NAVAL BASE, Cuba (AP): When the men accused of links to terrorism arrived in Cuba, some were forced to kneel, their hands and feet in shackles and their eyes covered with blackened goggles.

Photographs of their arrival prompted U.S. allies to demand explanations-and British newspapers to speak of torture. A year after the Sept. 11 attacks, criticism of the detainees' treatment has lessened, but questions are increasingly being asked about what will happen to

In a report released Thursday, Amnesty International complained the prisoners are in "legal limbo" and are routinely denied the right to see lawyers, both serious breaches of their human rights.

At least four have attempted suicide at the prison camp in eastern Cuba. The U.S. military says one tried to slash his wrists with a plastic razor and three tried to hang themselves.

Others among the 598 prisoners mark time chatting through diamond-shaped holes in their cell walls, praying in unison and sometimes ioking with their American guards.

They have no calendars or clocks to keep track of time. The United States has not announced plans for trials of the detainees and is building more cells, making room for more captives as it considers waging war in Iraq.

"This is a new kind of war," said Lt. Col. Dennis Fink, spokesman for a task force in charge of interrogations. He said investigations of the detainees, which are shrouded in secrecy, will be conducted "for as long as it takes

The U.S. military refuses to identify the captives, saying only that they come from 38 countries and are linked to the al-Qaida terrorist network or the fallen Taliban regime that ruled Afghanistan

Cuba uncertain The men haven't been charged and aren't allowed lawyers. The families of some have mounted legal challenges, but to no avail.

The detainees' letters to and from home-censored by the military and delivered by the International Committee of the Red Cross-are their only link to the outside world.

"He writes that he is comfortable, but he feels he has been wronged," said Khaled al-Oda in Kuwait, describing letters from his son, 24-yearold Fawzi al-Oda.

The Americans' silence is aggravating, he said. "They don't say how much longer they will be detained-two months, three, a year."

The U.S. government says the men could be tried by tribunals, returned home for trial. released or remain in detention.

Most American politicians back the indefinite detention. $But\,U.S.\,Representative\,Alcee$ Hastings, a Florida Democrat, is critical.

"It's too Kafkaesque to have people living in limbo," said Hastings, who in February toured Camp X-ray where the detainees were initially held. "Nobody has any sympathy for terrorists. But all of us have a responsibility to exercise ourselves in a way that gives America the high moral ground."

The prisoners have been moved from Camp X-ray's chain-link cells to a permanent prison, Camp Delta, where solid walls obscure journalists' view. Weeds are rising in the deserted camp, which some human rights activists said resembled rows of animal cages.

After the military flew one detainee, Yaser Esam Hamdi, to a Virginia jail in April upon confirming he was a U.S. citizen born in Louisiana, some critics complained the United States had a double-standard-to the disadvantage of the foreign-born detainees

Soldiers who guard detainees say desperation and loneliness are common. Thirtyseven prisoners are being treated or monitored for psychiatric problems. Some are on antidepressants or anti-psychotic drugs.

Abdulaziz Sayer Owain al-Shammari said in a letter in March that he was refusing food and water to demand freedom, a court hearing, or "to die as I cannot stand life in this place.'

Each man is led to an enclosure twice a week for 15 minutes of exercise. Some run in circles. The military says inmates have gained 14 pounds on average

The Muslim call to prayer wafts from loudspeakers five times a day. Meanwhile, five Muslim inmates have converted to Christianity.

"They just happened to need someone to talk to and saw me walking by," said Maj. Mike Merrill, a Protestant chaplain.

Sometimes the men yell at guards and spit or throw water at them. Other times, they crack jokes

Sgt. Ylaine Harris, 25, of Clinton, Mississippi, recalled one man who grinned as he told her that he would like a Pepsi and a pizza.

"I just laughed," she said. Sgt. 1st Class Wes Griffith, of Kansas City, Mo., said the inmates seem to like American music and sometimes sing to the guards.

"I've heard Eminem," he said. "Britney Spears comes out a lot. I've heard some Led Zeppelin, Van Halen."

The 204 additional cells being built exceed the 50 or so detainees held by U.S. forces in Afghanistan.

Lt. Col. Fink, a former investigator for the New York Fire Department who knew victims of the World Trade Center attack, said memories of the attacks remind investigators of their aim in the timeconsuming interrogations.

"It's a long process, but it is producing results," he said. "We're trying to prevent another 9-11.

Editor's Note: Last month, a federal district court judge in Washington, D.C. has ordered the government to release the names of these detainees. The government has appealed. Other lawsuits are pending challenging the treatment of these detainees and the behavior of the government

Firm's DNA technology to identify World Trade Center victims

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP): Thousands of human remains found at the World Trade Center may finally be identified under a DNA analysis procedure that detects tiny variations in the genetic code, officials said Thursday.

The Office of the Chief Medical Examiner of New York City has awarded a contract to Princeton-based Orchid BioSciences Inc., whose Cellmark division will perform the advanced testing

Most of the testing will be done in Dallas, although Orchid also has laboratories in Germantown, Md., Nashville, Tenn., and England, spokeswoman Tracy J. Hendrikson said.

Mark Stolorow, executive director of Cellmark, said the testing will begin within the next few days

Nearly half of the 19,858

pieces of human remains that have been recovered and preserved since Sept. 11 did not yield enough DNA for standard tests. The intense heat and pressure inside the rubble pile caused much of the genetic material to decompose.

Dr. Robert Shaler of the medical examiner's office worked with Orchid BioSciences to adapt a test that would examine pieces of DNA shorter than 100 base pairs, which form the signature double helix of human DNA.

Forensic experts generally work with DNA samples of about 400 base pairs. Billions of chemical base pairs make

Orchid's work focuses on single nucleotide polymor-phisms, or SNPs (pronounced snips"), which are minute variations in the smallest building blocks of DNA that are common among many people

Although SNP technology has been used for at least 10 years, Stolorow said the new tests can detect even smaller fragments of DNA.

According to an Associated Press database, 2,564 people are confirmed dead from the trade center, 44 are reported dead, and 25 are reported missing.

Courts have issued 1,357 death certificates at the request of victims' families because no remains have been identified said Ellen Borakove, a spokeswoman for the medical examiner's office.

As more remains are identified, new death certificates are issued. Borakove said.

Rescue workers finished combing debris at the 16-acre trade center site in June. They shifted work to buildings around the area, and remains were found in two downtown Manhattan buildings

Lansing to remember 9-11 with piece of WTC steel

LANSING, Mich. (AP): A piece of the World Trade Center has become part of downtown Lansing's land-

The 10-foot twisted, partially melted section of steel was installed in Wentworth Park on Wednesday but quickly covered with a blue tarp. It will stay under wraps until the monument is dedicated on Sept. 11, the oneyear anniversary of the terrorist attacks.

The beam was erected ver-

tically with donated labor on a base to be covered in granite. The monument will be the remodeled park's centerpiece, city Parks and Recreation Director Murdock Jemerson

said. "We wanted a reflective location," he told the Lansing State Journal for a Thursday story. "We will install benches and people can meditate here. They will be able to touch this—when they see how twisted and torn this steel is, it will help them realize what a

devastating day it was."

Andrea Johnson, sales manager of the Radisson Hotel across Grand Avenue and other employees were surprised to see how twisted the steel was

"It's reality. You see everything on TV, but that's third-hand," she said.

Latinos making gains so far this election year, governors or U.S. senators. but victories far off

Black and Latino candidates are making strong gains this election year, winning nominations for governor in New Mexico Nevada and Texas and heading toward certain victory in New York's gubernatorial primary.

Fall victories, however, may be harder to achieve. Several of the candidates are up against strong incumbents.

On Tuesday, with a primary win in Nevada and the withdrawal of an opponent in New York, two black majorparty candidates won or are assured Democratic nominations for governor. It has been 16 years since two black gubernatorial candidates ran.

And for the first time in recent memory, three Latino candidates won major-party nominations for governor. A Latino governor is assured in New Mexico, since both parties are running Latino candidates.

There has also been a black Senate nominee chosen in Texas, and a Latino Senate nominee chosen in New Mexico.

Political observers say blacks and Latinos this year could see solid if not record gains for top seats. At the same time, stronger minority candidates are seeking mid-level seats like attorney general that can lead to higher office.

"It took a goodly amount of time for there to be a growing cadre of black candidates out there, who are viable for run-ning for higher level office," said David Bositis at the Joint Center for Economic and Political Studies, a Washington think tank that studies blacks in politics. "That's starting to come together right now.

There are currently no $black\, or\, Latino\, governors, and$ there are two Asian governors-Washington state's Gary Locke and Hawaii's Ben Cayetano. Lt. Gov. Mazie Hirono, one of three candidates vying for the Democratic nomination for governor of Hawaii, is Asian.

There are no black or Latino senators. There are two Asian senators, both of whom represent Hawaii.

In Nevada, even though he faces a well-funded and popular Republican incumbent and little financial support from his own party, state Sen. Joe Neal said things are changing, though slowly, for black candidates like him.

"We hope that things are beginning to turn," Neal said Wednesday after spending nothing more on his campaign than his \$300 filing fee. 'You're out there, people are kind to you, and I haven't had any racial epithets or anything thrown at me.

There are no black or Latino

New York state Comptroller H. Carl McCall is the lone Democratic candidate for governor after Andrew Cuomo dropped out a week before Tuesday's primary, while Neal won the primary to challenge GOP Gov. Kenny Guinn.

McCall will face popular two-term Gov. George Pataki, a Republican, in the fall.

In New Mexico, voters will choose between two Latino candidates: Democrat and former Energy Secretary Bill Richardson, and Republican state Rep. John Sanchez.

Elsewhere:

"In Texas, the Democratic nominee to challenge Gov. Jeb Bush is Latino businessman Tony Sanchez: the Democratic nominee for an open Senate seat is a black man, former Dallas Mayor Ron Kirk. He faces state Attorney General John Cornyn.

In New Mexico, Gloria Tristani, granddaughter of former Sen. Dennis Chávez, won the Democratic nomination to challenge five-term GOP Sen. Pete Domenici.

House campaigns, with the help of districts drawn for minorities under the Voting Rights Act, offer more opportunities, with several sure-towin and competitive races for minority candidates this year. But Senate seats and governorships are more difficult.

The House has 38 blacks 19 Latinos, and five Asians.

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
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Argentine over U.S. team boosts spirits back

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP): Argentina's upset of the United States at the World Championships of basketball dominated headlines here Thursday, giving Argentines a joyful respite from lingering economic and political crises.

"They changed history!" blared a front-page headline in Argentina's most prominent daily, La Nación, which praised the Argentine players as "Giants!" A headline in Ole, a sports daily in Buenos Aires, read: "We humiliated the Dream Team."

Argentina defeated the United States 87-80 in the World Basketball Championships, ending the Americans' 10-year international dominance. The U.S. team had been 58-0 with NBA

The victory was a triumph for Argentines, who felt let down by their soccer team's first-round exit at the World

Basketball ranks as the second-most popular sport in Argentina, but replays from Wednesday night's game aired repeatedly on television throughout the morning Thursday, accompanied by comments like, "Argentina downs the best players of the N.B.A." Newscasters described the victory as "one of the most important victories in Argentine sports."

The win even managed to overshadow the latest news of the country's prolonged financial crisis that last December sparked food riots and widespread street protests, followed by a steep devaluation of the peso, Argentina's currency.

"After all we've been



through this year, it's nice to have something to cheer about," said Javier Solari, a 36-year-old dentist. "Now I just hope we don't have to play them again."

The tournament is down to a single-elimination format, and the United States and Argentina, which is 6-0, could meet again.

Editor's Note: Despite a home-court advantage, the U. S. was eliminated from the World Championship last Thursday when it was defeated in the quarterfinals by defending champion Yugoslavia, 81-78.


