### Officials issue "Welcoming" community declara $tion\, and\, capture\, the\, spirit\, of$ CIFF41 and TIFF3

Cities, such as Toledo and Cleveland, are caught in the crossfire of Donald Trump's stance on refugees and undocumented immigrants. But it appears that leaders across

the nation are trying to stake a position somewhere between a "sanctuary city" and Trump's rhetoric that's fueling recent hate crimes in Ohio, Michigan, and others parts of the country.

While not declaring Toledo a 'sanctuary city' on Feb. 7th, there is an effort to reaffirm the Glass City as a "welcoming" community to refugees and immigrants. Toledo City Council passed a resolution Tuesday declaring the city a "welcoming, inclusive and safe community.

City councilman Peter Ujvagi sponsored the resolution approved by his col-leagues he hopes serves as a symbol counter to recent rhetoric and racist graffiti. Ujvagi thanked his colleagues for the unanimous public declaration.

"For that reaffirmation of what Toledo is all about is very important, particularly these days, to make that declaration and have our families and citizens understand what is going said Ujvagi.

The Hungarian councilman is also one of the founders of Toledo-Lucas Welcome County (TLC), an organized effort to help immigrants and refugees assimilate to Northwest Ohio life and celebrate the region's diversity.

"Hopefully, Welcome-TLC

will be sending this along to Oregon, to Maumee, to Sylvania, so that all of our communities have an opportunity to declare us not just a welcoming, not just a compassionate community, but in today's day and age a safe community," said Ujvagi.

Supporters say the resolution is a direct response to recent racist graffiti in Sylvania Township, where someone sprayed-painted a swastika on a Muslim family's garage door and bomb threats phoned in to the Jewish Community Center, based in Sylvania.

"What you may not know is that these incidents of hate and intimidation have been increasing in our community, starting during the presidential election and escalating since then," said Guisselle Mendoza-McDonald, Adelante, Inc. executive director, during comments to city council. "Incidents include children having nightmares—one having a nightmare that all Latinos would be rounded up into a confined area and a bomb would be dropped on them.

Ms. Mendoza-McDonald also serves as co-chair of Welcome TLC. She told council of her Nicaraguan (Continued on Page 7)

### Corte mantiene suspensión de restricciones migratorias

17 (AP): Una corte federal de apelaciones se rehusó el jueves a reinstaurar la restricción migratoria decretada por el presidente Donald Trump para los viaiantes de siete naciones predominantemente musulmanas, rechazando de manera unánime los alegatos del gobierno sobre autoridad presidencial y cuestionando sus motivos

El panel de tres jueces de la Corte Federal de Apelaciones del 9no Circuito, con sede en San Francisco, rechazó la moción de bloquear el fallo de un tribunal menor que suspendió la restricción y permitió que viajantes que anteriormente tenían prohibido el paso, ingresaran a Estados Unidos.

La disputa legal está lejos determinar. El tribunal menor aún debe debatir los méritos de la prohibición, y es posible que se presente una apelación ante la Corte Suprema. Eso podría dejar la decisión en manos de una corte dividida que tiene una vacante. El nominado de Trump para ocupar esa vacante, *Neil Gorsuch*, no podría ser confirmado a tiempo para participar en la consideración

Momentos después de darse a conocerel fallo, Trump tuiteó: "Nos vemos en la corte" y agregó que "la seguridad de nuestra nación está en juego"

En respuesta, el gobernador de Washington Jay Inslee, un demócrata al frente de uno de los estados que impugnaron la restricción, declaró: "Señor presidente, lo acabamos de ver en la corte, v lo vencimos'

El panel de apelaciones dijo que el gobierno no presentó evidencia para explicar la necesidad urgente de que el decreto entrara en vigor de inmediato. Los eces resaltaron el amplio interés público para ambas

partes.
"Por un lado, el público tiene un poderoso interés en

SAN FRANCISCO, 9 II la seguridad nacional y en la capacidad de un presidente para promulgar políticas. Por elotro, el público también tiene interés en la libertad para viajar, evitar la separación de familias y en estar libre de discriminación".

La corte rechazó las afirmaciones del gobierno de que no contaba con autoridad para revisar un decreto presidencial.

"No existe precedente para respaldar esta supuesta inmunidad de revisión, que va en contra de la estructura funde damental democracia constitucional", declaró la corte.

Aunque no emitieron un fallo sobre los méritos del argumento de los estados de que la restricción de viaje tenía como intención singularizar a los musulmanes, los jueces rechazaron las afirmaciones del gobierno de que la corte no debía tomar en consideración las declaraciones de Trump o sus asesores de querer promulgar dicha restricción. Los jueces indicaron que tomar en cuenta esas declaraciones encaja dentro de precedentes s bien establecidos.

El Departamento de Justicia indicó que "revisa la decisión y sopesa sus opciones". Es el primer día en el cargo para el nuevo secretario de Justicia, Jeff Sessions, quien horas antes había rendido juramento en la Casa Blanca ante la presencia del vicepresidente Mike Pence

La semana pasada, el juez federal de distrito James Robart, en Seattle, suspendió temporalmente el decreto luego de que los estados de Washington y Minnesota interpusieran demandas. La orden presidencial suspendía de manera temporal el programa migratorio y de refugiados desde países que han generado preocupaciones sobre terrorismo.

Los abogados del Departamento de Justicia apelaron ante el 9no Circuito, alegando que el presidente tiene el poder constitucional para restringir el acceso a Estados Unidos y que las cortes

no pueden cuestionar su determinación de que esas medidas eran necesarias para prevenir actos terroristas.

Los estados indicaron que la restricción migratoria de Trump perjudicó a individuos, empresas y universidades. Señalando la promesa de campaña de Trump de impedir que los musulmanes ingresaran a Unidos, Estados argumentaron que prohibición bloqueaba el ingreso a las personas basándose en su religión.

La corte de apelaciones estuvo a favor de los estados en todos los temas con una excepción: el argumento de que la suspensión emitida por el tribunal menor no podía ser apelada. Aunque bajo el precedente del 9no circuito esas órdenes típicamente no son revisables, el panel dictaminó que debido al intenso interés público en el caso y la incertidumbre de cuánto tiempo tomaría obtener otro fallo del tribunal menor, era apropiado considerar la apelación del gobierno federal.

Josh Blackman, profesor de leyes en el South Texas College of Law en Houston, dijo que "la pregunta del millón" es si el gobierno federal presentará una apelación ante la Corte Suprema.

Eso podría implicar el riesgo de tener solo ocho jueces para escuchar el caso, lo que podría derivar en un empate y mantener vigente el fallo del tribunal menor.

"Existe un riesgo distintivo en avanzar demasiado rápido en este caso", comentó Blackman. "No estamos en tiempos normales y Donald Trumpes

muy precipitado".

Jessica Levinson, profesora en la Facultad de Leves Lovola, dijo que el fallo fue reflexivo y respaldado por una gran cantidad de precedentes legales. Lo más importante, sin embargo, es que fue unánime pese a tener jueces que fueron designados por presidentes republicanos y demócratas.

### 9th Circuit Federal appeals court refuses to reinstate Trump travel ban

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9, 2017 (AP): A federal appeals court refused Thursday to reinstate *Donald Trump's* ban on travelers from seven predominantly Muslim nations, dealing another legal setback to the new administration's immigra-

tion policy.

In a unanimous decision, the panel of three judges from the San Francisco-based 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals declined to block a lowercourt ruling that suspended the ban and allowed previously barred travelers to enter

An appeal to the U.S. Su-preme Court seems likely and would put the decision in the hands of a divided court that has a vacancy. Trump's nominee, Neil Gorsuch, could not be confirmed in time to take part in any consideration of the ban.

Moments after the ruling was released, Trumptweeted, "SEEYOUINCOURT," adding that "THE SECURITY OF OUR NATION IS AT STAKE!"

The appeals panel said the government presented no evidence to explain the urgent need for the executive order to take effect immediately. The judges noted compelling pub-

lic interests on both sides.
"On the one hand, the public has a powerful interest in national security and in the ability of an elected president to enact policies. And on the other, the public also has an interest in free flow of travel, in avoiding separation of families, and in freedom from discrimination."
The court rejected the

administration's claim that it did not have the authority to review the president's executive order.

"There is no precedent to support this claimed unreviewability, which runs contrary to the fundamental structure of our constitu-tional democracy," the court

While they did not rule on the actual merits of the states' argument that the travel ban was intended to target Muslims, the judges rejected the government's claim that the court should not consider statements by Trump or his advisers about wishing to enact such a ban. Considering those remarks, the judges said, falls within well-established legal

precedent. Last week, U.S. District Judge *James Robart* in Seattle issued a temporary restraining order halting the ban after Washington state and Minne-sota sued. The ban temporarily suspended the nation's refugee program and immigration from countries that have raised terrorism concerns.

Justice Department lawyers appealed to the 9th Circuit, arguing that the president has the constitutional power to restrict entry to the United States and that the courts cannot second-guess his determi-nation that such a step was

needed to prevent terrorism.

The states said Trump's travel ban harmed individuals, businesses and universities. Citing Trump's campaign promise to stop Muslims from entering the U.S., they said the ban unconstitutionally blocked entry to people based on religion.

The appeals court sided with the states on every issue save one: the argument that the lower court's temporary restraining order could not be appealed. While under 9th Circuit precedent such orders are not typically reviewable, the panel ruled that due to the intense public interest at stake and the uncertainty of how long it would take to obtain a further ruling from the lower court, it was appropriate to consider the federal

government's appeal. Josh Blackman, a professor at South Texas College of Law in Houston, said the "milliondollar question" is whether the Trump administration would appeal to the Supreme Court.

That could run the risk of having only eight justices to hear the case, which could produce a tie and leave the lower-court ruling in place.

"There's a distinct risk in moving this too quickly," Blackman said. "But we're not in a normal time, and Donald Trump is very rash. He may trump, pardon the figure of speech, the normal rule."

Both sides faced tough questioning during an hour of rguments Tuesday. The judges hammered away at the administration's claim that the ban was motivated by terror ism fears, but they also chal-lenged the states' argument that it targeted Muslims.
"I have trouble under-

standing why we're supposed to infer religious animus when, in fact, the vast majority of Muslims would not be affected," Judge Richard Clifton, a George W. Bush nominee, asked an attorney representing Washington state and Minnesota.

Only 15 percent of the world's Muslims are affected by the executive order, the judge said, citing his own calculations.

"Has the government pointed to any evidence connecting these countries to ter-rorism?" Judge Michelle T. Friedland, who was appointed by President Barack Obama, asked the Justice

Department attorney.

After the ban was put on hold, the State Department quickly said people from the seven countries—Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, and Yemen—with valid visas could travel to the U.S. The decision led to tearful reunions at airports round the

country.

The ban was set to expire in 90 days, meaning it could run its course before the Supreme Court would take up the issue. The administration also could change the order, including changing its scope or duration.

### Latina governor rejects 'racist' claim

SANTAFE N.M. Feb 7 2017 (AP): The nation's only Latina governor is denouncing a charge by a white former mayor of Santa Fe that she is a racist.

A spokesman for New Mexico Gov. Susana Martínez says comments made by former Santa Fe Mayor David Coss at an immigrant rights rally Monday were "are sad and ignorant." Coss told a crowd of immigrant advocates outside the New Mexico Statehouse that New Mexico voters in November showed it was a state "that rejected the racism of Donald Trump, that rejected the racism of Susana Martínez." Coss then said the Republican Latina's effort to revamp New Mexico's law that allowed immigrants in the country without documentation to obtain driver's licenses was "racist and that

was wrong."

Martínez spokesman Chris Sánchez says "the overwhelming majority of Hispanics in New Mexico supported her effort to revamp the law.'



### California lawmakers introduce bills to help refugees

lif., Feb. 8, 2017 (AP): Amid nationwide legal battles over the president's temporary refugee ban, California lawmakers are taking steps to make their state more welcoming to people fleeing war, persecution or disasters in their home countries.

Assembly Democrats announced bills Wednesday to grant refugees instate tuition at public colleges and provide money to school districts with large child refugee populations. The bills would also give refugees with Special Immigrant Visas who served the U.S. Armed Forces or State Department in Iraq or Afghanistan priority enrollment in public colleges and help them apply foreign work experience toward a professional license.

"These SIV individuals pretty much are veterans," said Assemblyman Kevin McCarty, D-Sacramento. "They served

President Donald Trump signed the executive order on immigration and refugees Jan. 27. A week later, a federal judge in Seattle ordered a halt to enforcement of the ban. which the federal government is appealing. That filing is currently playing out in a San Francisco federal appeals court.

A refugee himself, Assemblyman Adrin Nazarian, D-Los Angeles, immigrated to the U.S. from Iran as a child.

"That's who we're closing our doors on right now," Nazarian said. "I'm not going to stand for that, and I'm glad to see that my colleagues also will not

### Dos republicanos proponen reducir inmigración legal

WASHINGTON, DC, 7 II 17 (AP): Dos senadores republicanos presentaron el martes un proyecto de lev que busca reducir la inmigración legal a Estados Unidos con la meta de incrementar el salario devengado por los trabajadores estadounidenses.

El proyecto de ley redactado por los senadores David Perdue y Tom Cotton aspira reducir a la mitad al cabo de una década la cantidad de 1.051.031 inmigrantes que ingresaron legalmente a Estados Unidos en 2015.

La iniciativa legislativa reduciría la inmigración legal impidiendo a ciudadanos estadounidenses y residentes permanentes que gestionen visas para parientes adultos que no sean cónyuges, eliminando la lotería que adjudica 50.000 residencias permanentes cada año para destinarlas a refugiados.

"Volver a nuestros niveles normales de inmigración legal ayudará a mejorar la calidad de los empleos y sueldos estadounidenses", dijo Perdue en un comunicado.

### Ann Arbor moves to consider stronger immigrant protections

### Nurses: Climate change a direct threat to health of Michiganders

### New report links climate change to health problems in Michigan, throughout nation

LANSING, Feb. 1, 2017: A new report from the Alliance of Nurses for Healthy Environments (ANHE) warns climate change poses preventable health risks to families in Michigan and throughout the United States. The report, "Climate Change, Health and Nursing: A Call to Action," compiles research from leading, nonpartisan experts on climate change.

"This new report demonstrates how climate change impacts are already causing major health problems across our nation, leading to premature deaths that could be prevented with a stronger commitment to act on climate," said Katie Huffling, RN, executive director of ANHE. "It's no surprise that healthcare professionals are worried about climate change, since virtually all aspects of climate change pose major challenges to maintaining public health. The human toll is truly alarming and deserves our attention, and our action.'

The report cites a multitude of ways climate change is already threatening families' health and correlating with premature death. Air pollution from coal-fired power plants, an increase in airborne allergens, extreme weather events like flooding and heat waves, and favorable conditions for pests and disease all put human health at risk.

It also highlights how vulnerable populations, such as the poor, the elderly, young people and rural Americans are particularly vulnerable to health complications caused by exposure to polluted air, extreme weather events, and beyond.

Joyce Stein, RN, an Ann Arbor-based retired nurse and ANHE board member, said Michigan is already seeing an increase in health risks resulting from climate change.

"Asthma rates in Michigan are 25 percent above the average, due in large part to our reliance on dirty, coal-fired power plants - a clear signal we need to take steps today that mitigate the impact of climate change," said Stein. "At a time when Michiganders are getting sick, and even dying, from preventable illness related to climate change, we need to ask what more can be done, because lives are at stake.'

The speakers called on policymakers to support ongoing climate change mitigation efforts, including the federal Clean Power Plan that cuts carbon emissions in states like Michigan.

## Fallece Mike Ilitch, dueño de los Tigres de Detroit

DETROIT, 10 II 17 (AP): Mike Ilitch, el fundador de Little Caesars Pizza y dueño de las franquicias de los Tigres y los Red Wings de Detroit, ha fallecido. Tenía 87 años

Ilitch, elogiado por mantener los equipos profesionales de béisbol y hockey en Detroit mientras otras franquicias se mudaban a los suburbios, murió el viernes en un hospital de Detroit, según el portavoz de la familia, Doug Kuiper.

Ilitch y su esposa wife, Marian, fundaron Little Caesars en los afueras de Detroit en 1959. El negocio se convirtió en la cadena de pizza a domicilio más grande del mundo. Bajo su batuta y dando rienda suelta a su chequera, los Red Wings ganaron cuatro veces la Copa Stanley y los Tigres con quienes jugó en la década de los 40avanzaron a la Serie Mundial.

Más allá del deporte, siempre fue solidario para ayudar a una ciudad sumida en un severo declive económico. En 2009, Ilitch aceptó patrocinar el Motor City Bowl en Detroit, un partido de fútbol americano universitario, pese a la mala situación. El partido pasó a conocerse como el Little Caesars Pizza.

"Es un evento deportivo, necesitamos eventos deportivos", dijo Ilitch en su momento. "Beneficia inmensamente a nuestra comunidad".

Hijo de inmigrantes macedonios, Ilitch nació el 20 de julio de 1929. Jugó béisbol en la escuela secundaria Cooley de Detroit y firmó con los Tigres tras un servicio de cuatro con los infantes de marina. Pasó tres años en el sistema de ligas menores del equipo hasta que una lesión en la rodilla le obligó a renunciar a su carrera como beisbolista.

Pero se destacó como empresario. Los negocios de su familia acumularon ingresos de 2.400 millones de dólares en 2011.

Todo comenzó con el primer restaurante de Little Caesars en Garden City, un suburbio de clase obrera al oeste de Detroit, Ilitch Holdings Inc. fue establecido en 1999 para administrar los negocios de la familia en restaurantes, deportes y entretenimiento.

Ilitch se involucró como dueño de franquicias deportivas en 1982, cuando pagó unos 8 millones de dólares por los Red Wings. De ser una de las potencias de la NHL, el equipo era el hazmerreír al momento de la compra, pero reverdeció laureles con Illitch. Los Red Wings ganaron la Stanley Cup en 1997, 1998, 2002 y 2008.

icónico Teatro Fox en el centro de la ciudad, invirtiendo 12 millones en su restauración. Reabrió al siguiente, convirtiéndose en un lucrativo escenario para conciertos, obras de teatro y otras producciones. La sede principal de Little Caesars también se mudó al centro de Detroit.

Luego, en 1992, el hombre que alguna vez soñó en jugar con los Tigres, compró la franquicia por 85 millones de dólares. Hizo construir un nuevo estadio, el Comerica Park, que fue inaugurado en 2000 frente al Teatro Fox.

A diferencia de los previos propietarios de ambas franquicias, a Ilitch no le temblaba la mano para poder con el meior talento. Sus Tigres pactaron tres de los 20 contratos más jugosos para contar con Miguel Cabrera, Justin Verlander y Prince Fielder.

En el béisbol, su suerte fue dispar. Los Tigres fijaron un récord en la Liga Americana al perder 119 juegos en 2003. Tres años después, sin embargo, alcanzaron la Serie Mundial que perdieron en cinco juegos ante los Cardenales de San Luis.

heritage, coming to the U.S. as an undocumented immigrant who gained her U.S. citizenship last year. She told Toledo City Council of other reported incidents of hate that have not made recent head-

"Bullying in schools—including Latinos who are American citizens—and being told they'll be sent back to Mexico, Chinese students being told they'll be sent back to China, and an Iraqi Muslim woman waiting for her husband in a Costco parking lot when several gentlemen began pounding on her van, yelling anti-Muslim lan-guage about how she'll be sent back," she said.

"A Latino family hadeggs thrown at their house and racist words velled at their house at one in the morning. These are real incidents that we've heard about, which means there are probably plenty of others out there."

"[This resolution] rejects these acts of intimidation, discrimination, hate, and bias," said Ms. Mendoza-McDonald. "This is important, because now more than ever, our community must come together to protect civil rights and to strengthen the efforts of so many that are building a welcoming and compassionate, inclusive and safe community."

"Given the circumstances, the times, the days, that we need to resend the message of who we are in Toledo and Lucas County,"echoed Lucas

County Commissioner Pete Gerken. "What you're doing today sends that message loud and clear. This is an initiative of the people of the county, of people of faith, of diversity. We all are *Welcome-TLC*."

### Are you a sanctuary city?

'Are you a sanctuary city? Are you a sanctuary county? I don't care what label you put on what we do, that's not what we're about," said Gerken. "We're not about a label or a thing. Faith without works is dead. Do not judge us by our name. Judge us by our actions. You can call us a sanctuary. You can call us a corporation. You can call us a movement. You can call us the *Toledo Zoo*. Idon'tcare. We are here to make sure the message gets spread-we are here, we are velcoming you here. We will stand with you in tough times. We'll stand with you, in front of you, and behind you—just keep coming and continuing to make our city and county

strong."
Other speakers on Feb. 7<sup>th</sup> included representatives of the United Muslim Association of Toledo (UMAT); US Together Toledo chapter, a nonprofit group helping to resettle over 200 Syrian refugees and others in the Sylvania area with an 85 percent employment rate; the Islamic Center of Greater Toledo; and Black Lives Mat-

"I'm a refugee. I'm an immigrant. I'm a green card holder. I can't tell you after 60 years when I heard two weeks

ago on the news that green card holders were being prohibited from returning to America, how that struck me,"

said Councilman Ujvagi. "It was unbelievable." "We want families who are feeling endangered and coming from other areas to feel comfortable, to feel safe, to feel wanted and welcomed and loved," said Corine Dehabey, resettlement coordinator of US Together-Toledo, who grew up as a U.S. citizen born in Syria.

"In order for us to do better in Toledo, we must continue to stand up to *Islamaphobia*, we must continue to stand up against homophobia, we must continue to stand up against ableism, and we must continue to stand up against white supremacy, said Julian Mack. "I hope to say in these chambers as well someday. that Toledo is a sanctuary city as well."

The resolution also is be-

ing backed or supported by numerous entities including: Art Corner Toledo, Advocates for Basic Legal Equal-ity (ABLE), Multifaith Council of Northwest Ohio, Is-lamic Council of Ohio, Toledo Sister Cities International, City of Toledo Board of Community Relations, and La Prensa. Several of those organizations are in early stages of submitting a grant to do local anti-hate work in the coming months



### CMSD and CTU reach tentative agreement

CLEVELAND, Feb. 13. 2017: The Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CMSD) has reached a Tentative Agreement with the Teachers Cleveland Union(CTU) on a Collective Bargaining Agreement that, for the second time this school year, will be sent to the members of the Union and the school board for ratification.

An earlier agreement reached on August 30, 2016, was rejected by union members in September, requiring a return to the table in to resume bargaining for a contract both sides could accept.

CMSDandCTUhavemaintained throughout the negotiations process that they were both committed to settling on a contract that is fair to educators and good for kids. CEO Eric Gordon remained optimistic throughout negotiations that began in November, 2015, that their thoughtful efforts would lead to a fair agreement without eroding reforms vital to continuing the District's progress under The Cleveland Plan.

"We are pleased to return to the Board with a contract that both sides of the bargaining table see as fair," said Gordon. "I know all of us are anxious to move beyond the bargaining table and at last ratify a con-tract that has, at its heart, what's best for kids and the dedicated educators that serve them."

CTU had issued notice of its intent to go on strike last September, before the first Tentative Agreement averted a strike to give members a chance to review the language and to give CTU time to return to the table to continue negotiations.

If the members of the CTU and school board both ratify this contract, the new deal will go into effect immediately. Details are being shared with CTU members and the School Board before releasing the agreement to the public.

### Llegan a EEUU los últimos médicos cubanos **desertores** Por ADRIANA GÓMEZ LICÓN, Associated Press

MIAMI, 9 II 17 (AP): Yoandri Pavot pidió justo a tiempo su visa para viajar a Estados Unidos, antes de que se revocara la política estadounidense de recibir a los médicos cubanos que desertaran cuando estaban destinados en un tercer país.

Él v otros médicos cubanos aterrizaron esta semana a Miami amparados por la Cuban Medical Professionals Parole y dijeron sentirse aliviados de llegar a territorio estadounidense, aunque son tiempos de incertidumbre para los inmigrantes durante el gobiernodel presidente Donald Trump. También les preocupan sus colegas que no hicieron sus solicitudes a tiempo.

"Todavía no lo creo. Pellízcame. Pellízcame. No puedo creer que estoy aquí", expresó Pavos, de 35 años, a su arribo el lunes al aeropuerto de Miami con una pequeña bandera de Estados Unidos en Tengo la esperanza de que los hermanos que aún no están aquí tengan la misma oportunidad, porque están luchando por la libertad".

El programa, que comenzó a funcionar en el 2006 bajo el gobierno de George W. ### Repeal of health law could mean women pay more for less

2017(AP): From a return to higher premiums based on gender, to gaps in coverage for birth con-trol and breast pumps, experts say women could end up paying more for less if the Obama-era health care law is repealed.

The 2010 law ended a common industry practice of charging women more than men for policies purchased directly from an insurer. It made maternity and newborn care a required benefit for individual health plans. And it set a list of preventive services to be provided at no extra cost to women, including birth control and breast pumps used by nursing mothers. That preventive care requirement also applies to most employer plans.

Nearly half of pregnancies

are unplanned, and prior to "Obamacare" some women would get pregnant only to learn that their insurance did not cover maternity and delivery, said Dr. John Meigs, a longtime family practitioner in the small town of Centerville, Alabama.

"A lot of women were delaying their prenatal care until they could figure out what to do," said Meigs, president of the American Academy of Family Physicians. Pregnancy "is one of those things that ought to be covered, because it happens.

Democrats are keying in on the issue as they try to block or blunt the GOP drive to repeal the Affordable Care Act. "We don't want our country going backward when it comes to women's health," said Sen. Patty Murray, ranking Democrat on the Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee.

Women are widely seen as having benefited from the health law. In a recent AP-NORC poll, 44 percent said they thought women were better off as a result of the law, while only 24 percent

said women were worse off. "The ACA set minimum levels of benefits that health plans have to cover and many are highly used, or exclusively used by women," said *Usha Ranji*, a health policy expert with the nonpartisan *Kaiser Family Foundation*. "Repeal and replace could take away that minimum level of benefits, which includes really commonly used services like contraception and mater-

nity care."

Nashville-based singer Rachel Potter worries about what it could mean for her. She says she was lucky to be covered under the ACA when she unexpectedly became pregnant last

Bleeding early on and other complications sent her to the doctor's office frequently.
"We were able to monitor the

pregnancy really closely," said Potter. "I was able to go to an amazing OB-GYN and I wouldn't have had access to that care if I had not been on this insurance." Her son Jude was born in December and is already on the road with her.

Potter's medical bill came to more than \$40,000, but she only paid about \$2,000 of that.

She's now thinking about getting a long-lasting form of birth control while her insurer is still required to cover it at no charge to her. "I don't know the future of the health insurance situation," said Potter.

Fivedoctor groups represent-ing about 500,000 clinicians on Thursday called for main-taining the ACA's women's benefits, along with other pro-tections. The groups include family physicians, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Congress of Obste-tricians and Gynecologists, the American College of Physicians, and the American Osteo-

pathic Association.
A Trump administration spokesman says speculation about components of an "Obamacare" replacement is premature.

Recently introduced legis lation that seeks a middle path on health care would keep some of the Obama-era requirements, but make others a state option

The bill co-authored by Sen. Susan Collins, R-Maine would allow states to keep the ACA or substitute an alternative with fewer federal require-

Under that approach, insurance plans in states that pick the alternative would not be required to cover maternity and newborn care. However, plans in all states would have to cover the ACA's preventive benefits, including birth control. Collins staff said the draft bill is a start-

ing point. Some "Obamacare" critics argue that required benefits for women have driven up costs for others, for example young men who don't need maternity care. Other experts say the impact on premiums is modest compared to provisions of the law such as guaranteed coverage for people with medical problems and tighter limits on how much older adults can be charged.

"Relative to other market changes, there is no indication that required coverage for women's health benefits was a primary driver of premium increases," said Caroline Pearson of the consulting firm Avalere Health.

Ranji, of the Kaiser Foundation, says the ACA made significant improvements for women. Before the law:

 Pregnancy, a prior cesar-ean-section, a history of domestic violence, or problems with depression could be deemed a pre-existing condi-tion, triggering restrictions on

coverage or higher premiums.

• About one-third of plans on the individual insurance market charged women between the age of 25 and 40 premiums at least 30 percent higher than men of the same age.
• Only about 12 percent of

plans available directly to in-dividuals included maternity

care.

• About 20 percent of women of childbearing age covered by large employers spent some of their own money on birth control pills. Currently it's fewer than 4 percent.



## 'Sanctuary cities' ban may let Texas oust elected officials

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 8, 2017 (AP): Republican Texas Gov. Greg Abbott has warned local elected officials the state would "hammer" them if they resist federal efforts to deport immigrants in the country illegally. Republican lawmakers seem ready to provide the legal tool to do just that.

A provision in a proposed ban on so-called sanctuary cities that passed the Republican-controlled state Senate on Wednesday would allow for criminal charges against city or county officials who intentionally don't comply. Any county elected official, such as a sheriff, would face immediate removal from office if convicted of official misconduct.

The measure now goes to the Texas House, which also has a large Republican majority.

Abbott, a Republican, pledged to sign an anti-sanctuary cities bill into law and threatened to boot from office elected officials who refuse to comply with it.

The threat raised legal questions about the governor's power to void local elections, but the new provision would put it in the hands of a jury.

Abbott first issued his warning in a running dispute with Travis County Sheriff Sally Hernández, an Austin Democrat who has publicly refused to hold jail inmates for possible deportation except in cases of certain violent crimes

The governor supports the bill that "hammers down and imposes criminal penalties on those who put themselves above the law to the detriment of Texans," Abbott spokesman John Wittman said Wednesday.

The term "sanctuary cities" has no legal definition, but Republicans want local police to help enforce federal immigration law as part of a larger effort to crack down on criminal suspects who are in the United States illegally. The issue has become con-

tentious in states across the country, especially with Donald Trump promising to withhold federal funds from sanctuary cities, wall off the entire U.S.-Mexico border and impose new immigration policies.

The Senate bill applies to local police forces and law enforcement on college campuses, and seeks to strip authorities of state-controlled grant funding from local jurisdictions that don't hand over immigrants already in custody awaiting possible deportation.

Abbott has already ordered the state to withhold \$1.5 million from Travis County, money that also supported projects such as family violence education and a special court for veterans. But the governor told lawmakers he wanted to go further in punishing local officials who refuse to comply with federal immigration requests.

The criminal provision wasn't part of the original proposal, but came in a series of amendments tacked on Tuesday night by bill author Sen. Charles Perry, a Lubbock Republican.

If the sanctuary cities ban is signed into law, it would make refusing a federal immigration detainer a misdemeanor punishable by up to a year in a jail.

Other provisions include fines on local agencies, starting at \$1,000 for a first offense and reaching \$25,000 for recurring violation.

Texas can't have "independent kings" picking and choosing which laws to enforce, Perry said Wednesday. "If we elect people that don't have the integrity to do what they say they're going to do, apply the law, the system collapses on itself."

Although some law enforcement groups support the proposal, many individual sheriffs and police chiefs in heavily Democratic areas warn that it will make their jobs harder if immigrant communities—including crime victims and witnesses—become afraid of police.

Senate Democrats, who fiercely oppose the bill but don't have the votes to stop it, questioned how far the punishments would go.

"Take their first born next?" asked Sen. Sylvia García, a Houston Democrat, who said the bill may infringe on the free speech of sheriffs and other officials and would likely draw lawsuits that would tie Texas up in court for years.

## Texas: panel del senado aprueba medida contra santuarios

AUSTIN, Texas, 3 II 17 (AP): Una comisión del Senado de Texas aprobó el viernes una propuesta de ley sobre las llamadas ciudades santuario, que busca negar fondos estatales a aquellas jurisdicciones locales que no entreguen a los agentes federales a aquellos inmigrantes que tengan detenidos para su posible deportación.

La comisión de asuntos estatales aprobó la iniciativa luego de más de 16 horas de testimonios a menudo emotivos marcadas por las protestas de los espectadores. La propuesta pasa ahora al pleno del Senado estatal, donde se espera una votación la semana próxima.

Centenares de personas se registraron para declarar ante el panel el jueves y la audiencia fue interrumpida reiteradamente, lo que hizo que los guardias de seguridad sacaran a algunas personas. La presidenta de la comisión, *Joan Huffman*, advirtió que la cámara sería cerrada si continuaban las protestas.

El término "ciudades

santuario" no tiene definición oficial, pero a menudo significa que una ciudad coopera poco—onolo hace—con las autoridades federales de inmigración en algunos asuntos relacionados con personas que viven en Estados Unidos sin autorización.

El gobernador Greg Abbott ha promovido el proyecto de legislación como una forma de deportar adelincuentes que además residen ilegalmente en Estados Unidos.

Individualmente, varios alguaciles y jefes policiales—particularmente en áreas mayormente demócratas del estado—se han opuesto a hacer cumplir las leyes federales de inmigración.

Abbott ya ha ordenado la retención de 1,5 millones de dólares destinados al alguacil del condado de Travis, quien ha dicho que las cárceles en Austin, la capital del estado, no acceden ya a la mayoría de los pedidos de detención de las autoridades de inmigración. Esos fondos son para educación sobre violencia doméstica y una corte especial para veteranos. Abbott advirtió que puede retener más fondos.




