Isabel Framer is the founder and principal partner of Language Access Consultants, LLC. Since 1998, Ms. Framer has worked as a consultant to defense attorneys, prosecutors, lawenforcement, state and fedlaw enforcement, state and ted-eral government agencies, in-cluding the U.S. Department of Justice, and advocacy firms on language access for Limited English Proficient persons in the court-system. She is a state court-certified judiciary inter-preter and has been qualified as an expert witness in court proan expert witness in court pro-ceedings regarding language access and interpreter standards. Ms. Framer is well known for heradvocacyonbehalf of people who have been denied their civil rights under Title VI, possibly the least known but most pow erful section of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 that states, "A person with limited or no ability to speak or understand English is guaranteed free, "meaningful" access to language assistance wherever medical outlets and law enforcement receive fed-eral funding." This was par-ticularly visible when she filed a discrimination complaint with the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice against the Lake Worth Police and Sheriff's departments, and the Palm Beach Circuit court in the case of Petrona Tomas, a Gua-temalan underage teenager wrongly charged, due entirely

to interpreter errors, with the first degree murder of the 2.8 pound premature infant child she delivered on a bathroom floor. Petrona ered on a bathroom Hoor. Petrona was imprisoned in a jail for adults for a year and a half while awaiting trial and faced life imprisonment although it was clear she received neither medical nor legal commu-nication in a language she spoke or understeed. understood.

In 2010, President Barack Obama appointed Ms. Framer, also confirmed by the Senate, to the State Justice Institute (SJI) Board, which was established by Federal Law in 1984 to improve the quality of justice in State courts, facilitate better coordination between State and Federal courts, and foster in-novative, efficient solutions to common issues faced by all common issues faced by all courts. She has served on several boards and advisory committees, including the Supreme Court of Ohio's Advisory Committee on Interpreter Services, the Ohio Judicial Appointments Recommendation Panel, and the Racial Fairness Project in Cleveland. Ms. Framer was also a board member Framer was also a board member of the National Association of Judiciary Interpreters and Translators and served as its chair from 2007 to 2009. From 2004 to 2006, she co-chaired the Summit/Lorain Law Enforcement project, the first national project of its kind to create interpretation and translation models and best practices for law enforcement, public officials, judiciary interpreters, and national deciary interpreters, and national deciary interpreters, and national de-



fense advocates. She is also a lead consultant for the Asian and Pacific Islander Institute on Domestic Violence, helping to train attorneys and advocates on interpretation issues for do-

on interpretation issues for do-mestic violence victims. Among articles published in the Proteus and legal jour-nals, she authored Through the Eyes of an Interpreter, Inter-preters and Their Impact on the Criminal Justice System: The Alejandro Ramirez Case, In-Alejandro Ramirez Case, Interpreters as Officers of the Court: Scope and Limitations of Practice and Interpreting, & The Interpreter: What Every LAV Attorney & Advocate Needs To Know About Legal Interpretation. 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Obama woos Latino vote on education

WASHINGTON. DC, March 31, 2011 (AP): President BarackObama, aware of news that the U.S. Latino population has hit 50 million, is turning his attention on issues key to Latinos, including education.

Early this week, Obama held a town hall meeting at a D.C. high school, roughly three miles from the White House, where two-thirds of the students are Latino. The town hall, broadcast by the Spanish-language TV network Spanish-language 1 V network Univision, overlapped with the president's live address to the nation on Libya, but reportedly drew 2.7 million viewers. "This is an issue that is criti-

cal for the success of America generally," Obama said. "We already have a situation where one out of five students are Latino in our schools, and when you look at those who are 10 years old or younger, it's actually one in four.
"So what this means is, is

that our workforce is going to be more diverse; it is going to be into large percentage, Latino.
And if our young people are not getting the kind of education they need, we won't succeed as a nation," the president said.

It was the type of center-

stage treatment that, when it comes to issues of concern to Latinos, is usually reserved for immigration.

It comes from a White House keenly aware of its failure to move any significant immigra-tion legislation, and of tough immigration enforcement that has led to a record number of deportations. These factors could seriously affect Obama's credibility within the Latino community just as he needs to hang onto that critical voting bloc for his 2012 re-election bid.

Obama's approval rating among Latinos stood at about 64 percent in late February, according to the *Pew Hispanic Center*. And he has his work cut out for him keeping Latino

support.
Gallup's weekly tracking average has his approval rating at 51 percent among Latinos for the week of March 21-27, although that is based on a smaller sample. At the same time last year, Gallup's weekly average among Latinos was 66 percent. According to AP-Univision

polling last year, Latinos gave Obama low marks on handling immigration, but still trusted Democrats more than Republicans to handle the issue by more than 2 to 1.

National exit polls showed that 67 percent of Latinos voted for Obama in 2008, compared with 31 percent for Arizona Sen. John McCain. Latinos accounted for more

than half of the U.S. population increase over the last decade and now 1 in 6 Americans is Hispanic, according to the latest Census numbers. Latinos accounted for all the growth in the youth population in the last decade and make up between 22 percent and 25 percent of the U.S. population under 20.

The administration has tried to court Latinos through other non-immigration issues before. There was an effort to draw attention to how Obama's health olan helps Latinos, who are more likely to be uninsured, and how his push for increased spending on Pell grants ben-efits Latino students who can't afford college.

But much of that work was drowned out by protests last year his administration's immigration en-forcement poli-

cies, and a clamor for him to put more political capital behind comprehensive immigration reform.

Heading into last year's midterm elections, respon-dents to a Pew Hispanic Center poll ranked education as a top issue, while immigration lagged behind the cost of living, jobs, health care and crime s major concerns.

'Ithink(Obama's townhall

is) very significant for the politics of 2012 when you talk about an issue that clearly drives voters," said Demo-cratic consultant and lobbyist Larry González.

In a conference call with reporters last week, Education Secretary Arne Duncan noted there are nearly 12 million Latino children in public el-ementary and secondary schools, making up 22 per-cent of all pre-kindergarten to

12th-grade students.
Census figures reported in
2009 showed 53 percent of
Latino 4-year-olds were enrolled in preschool. Only one in eight Hispanics, about 13 percent, has a bachelor's de-

Republicans have long aid Latinos are more compatible with the GOP's ideology because the culture values family, religion and education, issues the GOP has campaigned on. Former President George W. Bush reached out to Latinos and other minorities on education.

Given that history. Obama has little choice but to broaden the scope of the issues he uses to court Latino voters "be-cause he simply does not have a good story to tell" on immi-gration, said *Ana Nayarro*, a Republican strategist who advised McCain in his presi-

dential campaign.
"Republicans should see this as an opening to compete for the hearts and souls of Hispanics by also appealing to them on wider array of issues, including education, social values, economy and national

security," she said. But Navarro also warned that Republicans could squan-der the opportunity if they allow the tone of the immigra-tion debate to escalate as it did in 2010. "Hispanics are just as law-and-order and pro-enforcing the border as other groups, we just don't want to feel un-

welcome," she said. At the town hall, Obama praised students who could speak more than one language, encouraged parental involve-ment even if the parent does not speak English, and called for continued funding for programs to help children be-come proficient in English. He pointed out that his budget plan puts additional resources into early childhood education, "something that will pay big dividends for the entire society down the road."

Gobierno de EEUU busca reducir diferencias en salud para minorías

WASHINGTON, DC, 8 de abril de 2011 (AP): De la cuna a la tumba, las poblaciones minoritarias tienden a tener una salud más precaria y recibir una atención médica menos esmerada que los e s t a d o u n i d e n s e s caucásicos. En un informe precedente, gobierno de Barack Obama recomienda reducir tales disparidades.

El plan difundido el viernes abarca desde la mejora de la atención odontológica para los niños pobres hasta la movilización de promotoras". trabajadoras comunitarias que puedan ayudar a orientar a sus vecinos de habla hispana a buscar tratamiento.

"Es también producto de donde la gente vive, trabaja, aprende, juega y reza", dijo a The Associated Press el doctor Howard Koh, secretario asistente de la Secretaría de Salud y Servicios Sociales (HHS). "Realmente necesitamos un compromiso pleno de la nación para conseguir dichos objetivos".

El HHS no dio cifras sobre los proyectos pendientes, pero dijo que planea financiarlos con fondos ya existentes y no sujetarlos a la actual batalla en el Congreso por el presupuesto nacional

La frágil situación económica plantea dudas acerca de lo que muchos estados y otros grupos podrán aportar, dijo el doc-tor Paul Jarris, director ejecutivo de la Asociación de Funcionarios Estatales y Territoriales de Salud.

Pero "nunca seremos una

nación saludable a menos que encaremos estas desigualdades", agregó Jarris

En los últimos años ha habido algunas mejoras para subsanar tales disparidades en el terreno de la salud, aunque las minorías raciales y étnicas siguen rezagadas en muchas áreas: desde mayores tasas de mortalidad infantil hasta una menor esperanza de Tienen mayor vida probabilidad de padecer una serie de dolencias como diabetes, cardiopatías, enfermedades renales y

Parte del problema es el acceso a la atención médica: las minorías son más de la mitad de los 50 millones de personas sin seguro, dice el informe de la HHS. La reforma al sistema de salud del gobierno de Obama aprobada hace un año soluciona algunos de los resquicios en el terreno de los seguros.

Dr. Celia Williamson is President and co-founder of the National Research Consortium on Commercial Sexual Exploitation. The purpose of the consortium, made up of scholars from around the country, is to collaborate in order to answer critical research questions in the area of commercial sexual exploitation and to move the knowledge base forward. Dr. Williamson received her BA in Social Work from the University of Toledo, her Masters in Social Work from Case Western Reserve University and her Ph.D. from Indiana University. After learning about the abuses suffered by those who were victims of human trafficking, Dr. Williamson devoted the next 18 years toward learning, researching, and developing responses to appropriately address it. Since receiving her degrees, Dr. Williamson has published over 25 research articles on the subject of prostitution and human trafficking. Because of her work in this area, she was awarded federal research grants and other funds to support the Second Chance program, a program she founded in 1993 in Toledo that works with victims of sex trafficking. This year Second Chance was recog-nized by the National FBI for their contributions in working to identify victims and reduce human traffick-

As an activist and com-

munity organizer, in 2009 Dr. Williamson developed the Lucas County Human Trafficking Coalition. She facilitates these meetings with the goal of bringing systems together to understand, communicate and build protocols that will reduce the victimization of women and vouth in Lucas County. Currently, the coalition meets with representation from over 25 agencies including criminal justice, social service, and health care agencies, along with businesses, university members, churches, citizens, and adult survivors. She was an active force in securing an FBI Innocence Lost Task Force in Lucas County to address the issue of rescuing children from the sex trade in Toledo. She has become a nationally known expert on the subject of prostitution and domestic trafficking and conducts pre-sentations nationally and internationally. She organized and co-chaired seven National and International Conferences on Human Trafficking that brought together presenters from around the nation and world. Dr. Williamson has extensive experience building human trafficking coalitions, conducting research in the area of human trafficking, and has developed policies and pro-tocols for safe houses for domestic minor victims. She regularly consults with interested others in various cities who want to address sex



trafficking by building coalitions, conducting research, or developing safe houses. Additionally, she participates on the Attorney General's Trafficking In Persons Study Commission and Chairs the Research and Analysis Subcommittee for the State of Ohio.

Dr. Williamson has appeared in several news articles and broadcast news segments speaking on the topic of human trafficking including an hour long spe-cial on ABC Primetime. She has worked with the FBI and been invited to a national roundtable hosted by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children. She has also given information regarding Ohio to the U.S. Review on Commercially Exploited Children in America in preparation for the Third World Congress.

Dr. Williamson will deliver a workshop on the Victims of Human Trafficking informing her audience on what they must know, and can do, to stop this devastating criminal enterprise.

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Feds investigate immigrant harassment claims

DETROIT, April 7, 2011 (AP): U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement says it's investigating claims that its agents tracked Latino immigrants on Detroit's southwest side who were taking children to school.

Democratic State Rep. Rashida Tlaib, who represents southwest Detroit, says agents last week took undocumented immigrants off the streets after they dropped their children off at school. A news conference Wednesday outside the Hope of Detroit Academy was held to voice concerns.

Agency spokesman Brian Hale tells The Detroit News that a preliminary review suggests "elements of the operation" appear to have been inconsistent with ICE.





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

Orozco confided in friends who encouraged her to press charges and seek medical help. She found little comfort in the justice system - which released Ruiz after three weeks under house arrest.

Worst part was that I had to find out through rumors in high school," Orozco, 22, told a

room full of women and some men at the *Community Care* Network on April 9, 2011 at the 8th Annual Empowering Women Conference, organized by Ohio Hispanic Social Ser-

vice Workers Association. While on house arrest Ruiz stalked and harassed Orozco and to her surprise she could not get a protection order against him because he was under 18 years of age. "I gave up on the police and told myself I would handle it on my own as best as I can.'

"Why didn't I leave sooner? Because I was terrified," she said for herself her family and friends. That is the same reason most don't leave. For others the nightmare only gets worst when they do; "Because you don't know how they will react or what they will do."

For her, it did get worst.

One night Ruiz appeared behind her in drive way as she was about to leave - dressed all in black with a mask over his face. "I froze, all I could do was look into those beautiful eyes," and the barrel of his gun point-ing in the face. Before she could react he fired, blowing off the bottom right part of her jaw.

Orozco has made miraculous recovery, after multiple surgeries surgeons reconstructed her face. She completed her GED and was nominated prom queen and now devotes much of her time as a speaker with the Do-mestic Violence Center educating the public.
"Wake up – this is happen-

ing," she urges listeners who turn a blind eye to the escalating teen dating violence. She holds nothing back, and shares her experience in vivid detail and her audience listens. Orozco has made it her mission to edu-cate the public about resources available, to encourage teens suffering in silence to speak up, and said 3 out 10 teenagers are either in an abusive relationship or know someone who is. "If someone had talked to

me about this and what to do I would have spoken up sooner,

Her tragedy has changed the landscape of the justice system; due to her efforts, Ohio passed the Shynerra's Law which protects teenagers in abusive relationships. But Orozco is still vigilant; she is writing a book, and plans to reach many more to highlight the realities of domestic violence.

Commonwealth Fund 1998 Survey of Women's Health, 1999 found one-third of US-American women, nearly 31 percent report being physically or sexually abused by a husband or boyfriend at some point in their lives.

The statics among Latinos and African-Americans are more sobering and violence in on the

rise says OHSSWA President Nereida Díaz. She attributes this increase to cultural taboos, lack of education and access to resources; all of which the conference sought to counter. She emphasized there is no one type of physical appearance that gives away an abuser.

Ismael J. Flores, vice presi-

dent of OHSSWA, said Latino men need to take a prominent role in curbing domestic vio-lence by being aware of the symptoms and standing against it. "Just because we are for empowerment of women does not mean we will not include you –

educate yourself," he said.

The conference featured workshops and speakers from various organizations with a common goal to shed light on domestic violence issues especially those that severely impact families in Latino families.

Orozco said more needs to be done to dispel myths about violence against men. "Men too are victims," she said – but the resources available to them are rarely available. She said for men the stigma and embarrass-ment of being abused keeps them quiet. "It is hardly ever reported," she said.

Natalia Rodas, of Nueva Luz Urban Resource Center, said what frustrates her most is the notion that women in abusive relationships deserve it and popular culture does not ostracize icons like Chris Brown for engaging in violent behavior.

Orozco agreed, and said par-ents need to pay attention and engage their children in conversations and teach them they have a choice to break the cycle of

"We forget abusers often start out as victims themselves.

Flores said some symptoms to look out for are withdrawal, sudden isolation, and drop of grades.

Unusual bruising and state of fear are other symptoms to look out for. Orozco said she would lie, blame sports or other activities and covered herself up. She said her best friends were a saving grace for her; "They never gave me any negativity but built up my confidence." This is crucial advice she gives to teens - support your friend when they confide in you. "They are already getting negativity from their boyfriends they don't need it from you too.

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Older and stronger: Progressive resistance training can build muscle, increase strength as we age

Researchers at the University of Michigan say older adults don't have to accept strength muscle loss as they

age
Getting older doesn't mean giving up muscle strength.

Not only can adults fight the battle of strength and muscle loss that comes with age, but the Golden Years can be a time to get stronger, say experts at the University of Michigan Health System.

"Resistance exercise is a great way to increase lean muscle tissue and strength capacity so that people can function more readily in daily life," says Mark Peterson, Ph.D., a research fellow in the U-M Physical Activity and Exercise Intervention Re-search Laboratory, at the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

Through resistance train-ing adults can improve their ability to stand up out of a chair walk across the floor, climb a flight of stairs — any-thing that requires manipulating their own body mass through a full range of mo-

Normally, adults who are sedentary beyond age 50 can expect muscle loss of up to 0.4 pounds a year.
"That only worsens as

people age. But even earlier in adulthood - the 30s, 40s and 50s - you can begin to see declines if you do not engage

in any strengthening activi-ties," Peterson says.
"Our analyses of current research show that the most important factor somebody's function is their strength capacity. No matter what age an individual is, they can experience significant strength improvement with progressive resistance exercise even into the eighth and ninth decades of life," he says.

Progressive resistance training means that the amount of weight used, and the frequency and duration of training sessions is altered over time to accommodate an individual's improvements. A review article by U-M

researchers, published in The American Journal of Medicine, shows that after an average of 18-20 weeks of progressive resistance training, an adult can add 2.42 pounds of lean muscle to their body mass and increases their over-all strength by 25-30 percent. Recommendations for

those over age 50
Peterson says that anyone over age 50 should strongly consider participating in resistance exercise

A good way for people to start on a resistance training program, especially for people who are relatively sedentaryand after getting permission from their doctor to do so - is to use their body mass as a load for various exercises.

Exercises you can do us ing your own body weight include squats, standing up out of a chair, modified pushups, lying hip bridges, as well as non-traditional exercises that progress through a full range of motion, such as Thai Chi or Pilates and Yoga.

Transition to the gym

After getting accustomed to these activities, older adults can move on to more advanced resistance training in an exercise and fitness fa-cility. A certified trainer or fitness professional that has experience with special populations can help with the transition.

Peterson says you should feel comfortable asking a trainer whether they have ex-perience working with aging adults before you begin any fitness routine.

"Working out at age 20 is not the same as at age 70. A fitness professional who understands those differences is important for your safety. In addition, current recommendations suggest that an older individual participate in strengthening exercise two days per week," Peterson says. Based on the results of our studies, I would suggest that be thought of as the mini-

Don't forget to progress

As resistance training progresses and weights and machines are introduced, Peterson recommends incorporating full body exercises and exercises that use more than one joint and muscle group at a time, such as the leg press, chest press, and rows. These are safer and more effective in building muscle

"You should also keep in mind the need for increased resistance and intensity of your training to continue building muscle mass and strength," he

A good fitness professional can help plan an appropriate training regimen, and make adjustments based on how you

respond as you progress.
"We firmly believe based on this research that progressive resistance training should be encouraged among healthy older adults to help minimize the loss of muscle mass and strength as they age," Peterson

"Eiercicios de resistencia

son una excelente fórmula para aumentar el teiido muscular y la capacidad para que la gente funcione más eficientemente en la vida diaria" dice Mark Peterson, Ph.D., un investigador del Laboratorio de Actividad Física e Intervención de Ejercicios de la Universidad de Michigan, en el Departamento de Medicina Física y Rehabilitación.

A través de entrenamiento de resistencia los adultos pueden mejorar su habilidad para levantarse de una silla, caminar, subir un piso por escaleras, todo lo que sea manipular la propia masa corporalatravés de una amplia gama de movimientos.

hasta 0.4 libras al año.

"Esto sólo empeora mientras la gente envejece.

Recomendaciones para
personas mayores de 50 años
Peterson dice que todas las personas mayores de 50 años deben considerar seriamente de participar en ejercicios de resistencia.

Una buena manera de empezar un programa de entrenamiento resistencia, especialmente para personas relativamente sedentarias- y después de tener un permiso medico para hacerlo- es usar su propia masa corporal como peso para varios ejercicios.

Los ejercicios que puede hacer utilizando el propio peso de su cuerpo incluyen ponerse en cuclillas, pararse de una silla, levantamiento de caderas, así como eiercicios no tradicionales que progresan a través de una gama completa de movimiento, tales como Tai Chi y Yoga o Pilates.

Transición al Gimnasio Después de acostumbrarse estas actividades, los adultos mayores pueden hacer un entrenamiento de resistencia más avanzado en un gimnasio. Un entrenador profesional con experiencia con grupos especiales le puede ayudar en la transición.

actuales sugieren que un individuo mayor que participa participe en ejercicios de fuerza dos días a la semana" dice Peterson.
"Basado en los resultados de nuestros estudios yo sugiero que esto sea el mínimo".

No se olvide de progresar

Mientras que el entrenamiento de resistencia progresa y se introducen pesas y máquinas, Peterson recomienda incorporar ejercicios del cuerpo completo que utilizan más de una articulación y grupo músculos

simultáneamente, tales como ejercicios con las piernas, pecho y de remo. Estos son más seguros y efectivos en el desarrollo de una masa muscular.

"También debe de mantener en mente la necesidad de aumentar la resistencia e intensidad de su entrenamiento para continuar desarrollando musculatura y fuerza", dice.

Cleveland Clinic and Case Medical School students held a benefit for the Lamay Clinic Project on April 9, 2011 at the Cleveland Clinic's Lerner Research Institute. More than 150 guests enjoyed the complete experience of Perú through food, cultural music, and folkloric dance performances and bid on 100 silent auction items.

'We wanted people to experience Perú with the ambiance, because who ever visits does not want to leave," said Isabel Galvez. A Perúvian Clevelander, she offered to help students organizing the benefit to bring cultural performances to the benefit.

Marcía Salas Dance Group, performed a series of traditional dances from Cusco, Perú. Teresa's Kitchen tantalized taste buds with delicious cuisine and guest also sampled Perú's flag liquor -Pisco Sour, a cocktail mixed with imported Pisco (Perúvian brandy-like clear liquor distillate from grapes),

Nine year old Isabella Moner stole the hearts of the audience members with songs sung in Portuguese, and English and profusely thanked her father Patrick for accompanying her on the guitar. Moner's mother Katrerina was a member of team of 48 that visited Cusco to help with the Lamay Clinic last year and will return this year with Isabella by her side. "She will be singing to orphans and assisting with the pharmacy," she said.

Isabella said singing "Over the Rainbow" is one of her most beloved songs that she enjoys sharing with others and is eager to return to Perú to perform and also visit her grandparents.

T h e Lamay Clinic Project is in its third year and interest has continued to grow. This

year more than 74 students, healthcare professionals including physicians, pediatricians, nurses and dentists from Cleveland and around the country will spend six weeks; between May 28 - June 24, 2011, providing critical medical care to remote villages around Cusco.

"Last year we helped more than 1500 patients," said Satoko Kanahara, a fourthvear medical student at the Cleveland Clinic Lerner College of Medicine. She said this year students will focus on training local health care providers in CPR techniques especially for pediatrics. The project is also donating a portable ultrasound machine to the Lamay Clinic.

The project is funded by donations and assisted by the Perúvian Hearts foundation devoted to improving lives of impoverished children in Perú.

Brian J. Smith, Director of Strategic Project Development, Division of Operations at the Cleveland Clinic Foundation predicts the Lamay Project will continue to be a favorite among students as



well as staff because it mirrors the core values of the Clinic.

He likened participation in the Project to riding roller coaster with three possible reactions:

never again, fine but what else, or the eager who cannot wait to return again. He said the Clinic's commitment does not stop at the boundaries of Cleveland, Ohio or event the United States but extends to the global community seeking better health.

"The question you have to ask is – what if this was my family?"

Dr. James B. Young, Executive Dean, Cleveland Clinic Lerner College of Medicine, Case Western Reserve University said the project prepares the medical students for a life of service and he is intrigued by the innovative sprit of participants who sought help from physicians in Cleveland to diagnose an ailment via email.

Kanahara said the Project raised \$5,000 last year and hopes to surpass that at their year's benefit. Galvez said medical community in Cleveland has shown tremendous support for the project by donating supplies, and equipment that touch the lives of thousands.
