### Lorain Latino activist Michael Ferrer launches breakthrough collaborative

### Summer of Innovation Youth Camps program June 22-August 6

By Al Abrams, Special to La Prensa Lorain, June 5, 2015: Latino community activist well-known for his longtime co-directorship with his wife. Dina, of the prestigious annual Hispanic Leadership Conference, has undertaken a new challenge.

Ferrer, who received his degree from Bowling Green State University, left the Lorain County Urban League last October after a ten-year stint first as Special Projects Director and later as the agency's Director of Programs. He earlier served as Youth Services Director for El Centro Social Services in Lorain from 1991 until 2005.

Since March, Ferrer has been the Vice President of Youth Development ProgramsforthePACE(Performing Arts & Community Education)Foundation, working with area churches, non-profits, funders and youth services organizations.

The Lorain-based foundation is headed by Mark Ballard, president of Commerce Group of America.

whose head office is in Avon Michael Ferrer, the longtime Lake. Ballard has a long résumé in public service, having served as an aide to United States Representative Betty Sutton and as the former Director of Public Service of the City of Lorain.

Ballard is also president of gospel music giants Blackberry Records and Marxan Records, and owner of radio station WNZN, 89.1 FM.

"When I left the Urban League, I started looking at Mark Ballard's PACE programs, I saw that they were dedicated to working collaboratives with other agencies, and I liked what I saw. I especially liked the concept of PACE also as Promoting Achievement through Community Education," recalls Ferrer.

He has been hard at work planning the launch of PACE's breakthrough Summer of Innovation Youth Camps collaborative program this month in conjunction with the Lorain Cooperative Ministry of seven area churches, along with the



Greater Victory Christian Ministries and the Harrison Cultural Center.

The program offers free scholarships to as many as 200 children, and is designed to bring a Summer of Innovation to Lorain County youth in grades two to seven from June 22 through August 6, 2015.

The project will be presented four days per week for seven weeks with STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Focused Journeys with a music and/or arts

day each Thursday The first week-long journey is on Rocketry, and will enable attendees to explore Isaac Newton's Laws by learning how to design, test and launch a series of propulsion units and rockets.

### Afirman que exlegislador Hastert pagó por silencio Por MICHAEL TARM, Associated Press

CHICAGO, 29 V 15 (AP): El expresidente de la Cámara de Representantes, Dennis Hastert, había acordado pagar 3.5 millones de dólares a una persona de la ciudad de la que fue maestro de secundaria por mucho tiempo para comprarle su silencio a fin de que no hablara sobre la "conducta inapropiada previa" del republicano de Illinois, de acuerdo con el auto de nstrucción federal presentado el jueves

En el documento, que no describe la conducta indebida de Hastert, se acusa al político de 73 años de un cargo de incumplir normativas bancarias al retirar 952.000 dólares en cantidades menores de 10.000 dólares para evitar las disposiciones que lo obligaban a informar de esas operaciones. Enfrenta además un cargo por mentir al FBI sobre las razones por las que efectuó esos retiros inusuales. Cada cargo del auto de instrucción conlleva una sentencia máxima de cinco años de prisión y una multa de 250.000 dólares.

Hastert no respondió mensajes electrónicos ni telefónicos de la Associated Press en los que se le solicitaba que hiciera declaraciones sobre el particular. Hastert, que ha trabajado como cabildero en Washington desde poco después que dejó el Congreso en el 2007, renunció a su posición en Dickstein Shapiro LLC, dijo el jueves un portavoz de esa firma de

#### Senador EEUU en Cuba: Normalización en "semanas"

LA HABANA, 27 V 15 (AP): La restauración de las relaciones diplomáticas entre Cuba y Estados Unidos que comenzó el 17 de diciembre tendrá un destino exitoso en cuestión de unas cuantas semanas, dijo el miércoles un senador estadounidense que encabeza una delegación que visita la isla.

El periodo de 45 días para que el Congreso impugne la decisión del presidente Barack Obama de borrar a Cuba de la lista de países patrocinadores del terrorismo. un obstáculo para mejorar las relaciones. concluirá el viernes, y los temas restantes entonces se resolverán rápidamente, dijo el senador *Tom Udall* a reporteros en La Habana.

'Estamos a solo dos días. No ha habido un voto en el Congreso, así que seguirá en pie", dijo.

Funcionarios de Cuba y Estados Unidos dijeron que ambas partes están cerca de resolver los temas finales que permitirían que ambos países reabran embajadas e intercambien embajadores por primera vez desde que Estados Unidos rompió relaciones diplomáticas en enero de 1961. El senador por Nuevo éxico encabezó una México delegación de cuatro

legisladores demócratas, que incluye al senador *Al Franken*, de Minnesota; el representante *Raúl Grijalva*, de Arizona, y el representante John Larson, de Connecticut.

Añadió que "está creciendo el apoyo bipartidista" en el Congreso para eliminar al menosparcialmente el embargo que impide el comercio con Cubadesde hace cinco décadas. Esto podría acabar con la prohibición de viajes, permitir el comercio de productos agrícolas y que compañías estadounidenses de telecomunicaciones e internet

### Southern Arizona residents protest Border Patrol checkpoints

2015 (AP): Protesters have begun demonstrations against the U.S. Border Patrol checkpoints that dot southern Arizona, saying the stops amount to the unwanted militarization of their communities.

Federal authorities say the checkpoints on highways and small roads north of the U.S.-Mexico line are vital to catching immigration violations, drug smugglers and human traffickers, but many area resi-dents say they're fed up with answering citizenship ques-tions each time they drive to

work or the grocery store. "Every time I have to pull out an I.D. out of my purse," Carlota Wray, an Arivaca ac-tivist, said Wednesday. "I darate i the abort " don't like that." Wray is among those who

the checks are intrusive and invite racial profiling. She and several dozen oth-

ers gathered around a checkpoint along a two-lane road in

AMADO, Ariz., May 27, Amado, where agents under a metal tent ask all who drive through about their citizenship status For over a year, a group of

Arivaca residents have been monitoring the stop, jotting down the type of car, driver and interaction they can see from a distance. Two of the activists involved in a lawsuit against the Border Patrol have asked a federal judge to grant them closer access to agents at the checkpoint.

In a handful of other communities, residents gathered Wednesday at small rallies and events such as art shows to call attention to their frustration.

BorderPatrol official Manny Padilla said at the Amado protest that stopping people inside the U.S. remains a crucial component of the agency's strategy "It's very difficult to stop all

traffic at the immediate border." said Padilla, who runs the Tuc-son Sector, which comprises much of Arizona

He said the checkpoints are strategically located in routes coming from the border as a "defense in depth, if you will, to the bottom-line operations." TheBorderPatroltrackshow

many arrests and seizures agents make at checkpoints but it doesn't release the infor-

mation publicly. The Tucson Sector has 11 such stops, and the Border Patrol has dozens of others around the Southwest and in northern states near the U.S.-Canada boundary. The Border Patrol is allowed to monitor and have checkpoints within 100 miles of the border.

The checkpoint opposition has been far from unanimous. John Beaver, a local rancher, slowed down his car while driving past the Amado protest to vell from his window that the

### Orden de no deportar inmigrantes sigue suspendida Por KEVIN McGILL, Associated Press

Louisiana, 26 V 15 (AP): Una corte federal se negó el a levantar martes temporalmente la suspensión que pesa sobre programas del gobierno para proteger de la deportación a cerca de cinco millones de inmigrantes que viven ilegalmente en el país, lo que provocó decepción entre activistas y satisfacción entre algunos legisladores republicanos.

"Las consecuencias de este retraso, de esta decisión, son devastadoras", dijo Marielena Hincapié, del National Immigration Law Center, una organización que informa sobre los derechos de los inmigrantes.

Hincapié señaló durante una conferencia telefónica con periodistas que el fallo del martes causará confusión y miedo entre las comunidades inmigrantes. La decisión judicial, sin

embargo, no representa el final de los programas, ya que el caso seguirá siendo discutido en la Corte Federal de Apelaciones del Quinto Circuito en julio.

El Departamento de Justicia había solicitado a esta corte que revirtiera la decisión de un juez de Texas, quien había

El juez de Texas, Andrew Hanen, había estado de acuerdo con gobernadores de 26 estados que entablaron una demanda alegando que la acción de Obama era anticonstitucional. El martes, dos de los tres jueces en un panel de la corte del Quinto Circuito votaron en contra de la solicitud gubernamental.

No quedó esclarecido de inmediato si el gobierno apelaría ya sea ante el pleno de la Corte de Apelaciones en Nueva Orleans o ante la Corte Suprema federal.

La portavoz de la Casa Blanca Brandi Hoffine dijo que los jueces de la corte del Quinto Circuito "escogieron interpretar mal los hechos y la ley".

Por su parte, la legisladora republicana Diane Black, representante de Tennessee en la cámara baja, celebró el fallo de la corte de apelaciones.

"Esta decisión es una importante victoria para un sistema en el que se cumplen las leyes y para cada inmigrante legal al que se le ha faltado al respeto por la amnistía inconstitucional del presidente", dijo Black en un comunicado.

Un programa que ha sido paralizado temporalmente y que hubiera entrado en vigor el 19 de mayo hubiera protegido de la deportación y otorgado permisos de trabajo a padres de ciudadanos estadounidenses o residentes permanentes. El otro es una ampliación de un programa existente que protege de la deportación a jóvenes inmigrantes traídos ilegalmente a Estados Unidos cuando eran niños. La ampliación de este último hubiera entrado en vigor el 18 de febrero.

A pesar de expresar decepción, activistas y abogados de inmigración dijeron que confían en que los programas serán aprobados en los próximos meses y quedarán activados eventualmente.

Los estados que demandaron para bloquear los programas, liderados por Texas, argumentaron que Obama actuó fuera de su autoridad y que los cambios los obligarían a invertir más en actividades policiales, servicios de salud y educación. La Casa Blanca alega que el mandatario actuó dentro de su autoridad para arreglar "un sistema migratorio descompuesto".

Hanen, desde su corte en Brownsville, Texas, emitió una suspensión temporal el

los jueces del Quinto Circuito Jerry Smith y Jennifer Walker Elrod denegaron levantar la suspensión, y señalaron en una opinión escrita por Smith, que los abogados del gobierno tenían pocas posibilidades de tener éxito en sus solicitudes por medio de esa apelación, que se debatirá en julio. El juez Stephen Higginson no estuvo de acuerdo.

Obama dijo en noviembre que la falta de acción del Congreso lo obligó a realizar por sí mismo cambios radicales a las normas de inmigración. Los republicanos acusan a Obama de exceder su autoridad presidencial.

WASHINGTON, DC, May 27, 2015 (AP): The government will not ask the Supreme Court to review a judge's decision that put on hold President Barack Obama's executive action on immigration, the Justice Department said Wednesdow

day. The decision came one day after a federal appeals court panel refused to lift a Texas judge's injunction that kept the sweeping immigration plan from taking effect. U.S. District Court Judge

U.S. District Court Judge Andrew Hanen issued a preliminary injunction on Feb. 16 that halted Obama's executive action, which could spare from deportation as many as 5 million people who are in the U.S. without documentation. More than two dozen states sought the injunction, arguing that Obama's executive action was unconstitutional.

The U.S. government on Feb. 23 asked Hanen to lift his injunction while it appealed his ruling against the executive action to the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of AppealsinNewOrleans. Hanen denied the request, and the U.S. government appealed. That appeal was denied on Tuesday.

Tuesday. Spokesman Patrick Rodenbush said the Justice Department would not seek astay of Tuesday's decision. Instead, he said, the Justice Department will now focus on defending the merits of the executive action itself in an appeal that will be argued the week of July 6 before the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

"The Department of Justice is committed to taking steps that will resolve the immigration litigation as quickly as possible in order to bring greater accountability to our immigration system by prioritizing deporting the worst offenders, not people who have long ties to the United States and who are raising American children," Rodenbush said in a statement. "The department believes the best way to achieve this goal is to focus on the ongoing appeal on the merits of the preliminary injunction itself."

The Obama administration plan has been denounced by Republicans as an example of executive overreach. Obamahas argued that the action was necessary because of inaction by Congress.

The executive action announced in November remains on hold after the appeals court panel on Tuesday refused to allow it to take effect immediately.

Along with Texas, the states seeking to block Obama's action are: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Michigan, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Utah, West Virginia, and Wisconsin.

DETROIT, 30 V 15 (AP): Carlos Muñoz logró su primera victoria en la IndyCar, con ayuda de la lluvia. Pero eso no impedirá que el colombiano disfrute su logro.

Muñoz se impuso el sábado en la primera carrera del fin de semana en Detroit, que se abrevió a 47 vueltas debido a las condiciones meteorológicas. El piloto de 23 años tenía una ventaja considerable cuando se izó la bandera amarilla.

Faltaban unos 30 minutos de la competencia, que debió durar un par de horas. Pero la intensa lluvia y la falta de iluminación suficiente dificultaban la visibilidad, así que se levantó la bandera roja v quedó sentenciada la primera victoria de Muñoz en la serie, tras 28 participaciones.

"No era la forma en que yo hubiera querido ganar", reconoció el bogotano. "Quería ganar al 100%, completando todas las vueltas. Pero un triunfo es un triunfo".

### Believe Center to Hold Third Annual Fund-raising Carnival

Aurora González Dr., in Toledo, will hold its third annual Keeping Sports Alive Carni-val June 12 through June 14, 2015 on the community center grounds.

The carnival, which was moved from its original Sep-temberdatebecause of past poor weather, will be one of the first festivals this summer. One week earlier, there will be a Tejano festival in Saginaw, hosted by www.midwesttejanoradio.com Tonya Durán, Believe Cen-

ter executive director, stated the calendar was clear that weekend, which may be a blessing for attendance because the carnival occurs right after the school year ends. Past carnivals have only turned a small profit because of poor atten-dance and a lack of sponsors. "The carrival is to help pay

participation fees, equipment, and league fees for kids who cannot afford to pay for it them-selves," she said. "It's always been rainy and cold in Septem-ber, so hopefully the move to June will bring us warmer weather and help attendance."

The carnival also will serve as an opportunity for various sports teams to sign up kids interested in playing in sum-mer and fall leagues. The Be-lieve Center sponsors a number of those teams to ensure Latino kids can play. It is also held in conjunction with the 50-50 raffle of the same name, which raises about \$3,000 each summer for sports teams. The raffle is now in its fifth year.

"This year we added a three-on-three basketball tournament and a father-daughter basketball shootout so we can generate more sports-oriented activities," said Ms. Durán. "We've had a lot of AAU girls

We hope the shootout will encour-age more girls to come out and play basketball." Participation in organized

youth team sports is down by nearly ten percent just in the past few years, according to one study. That's prompting some local recreation departments to encourage more "free play" team sports, organized in neighbor-hoods. It's a new twist on the old-school way of playing pick-up basketball or spur-of-the-moment neighborhood baseball games. There's even a national movement devoted to the prac-tice with its own website: www.projectplay.com. There's a combination of fac-

tors involved. More kids are play-ing video games rather than go outside. The expense of team sports is beyond the reach of many sports is beyond the reaching many sports is beyond the reaching that the families, especially in a areas with deep pockets of poverty. Some city budgets just don't allow the funding for such programs. So the work of groups such as The Believe Center become in-

creasingly important, as the name of the Keeping Sports Alive Car-nival suggests. The community centersits within or near two of the poorest zip codes in Toledo. Soc-cer, football, and cheerleading will have sign-up tables.

"We're trying to recruit more players," said Ms. Durán, who added the biggest expense for the nonprofit group is for equip-ment. But much of that need was met through some unexpected generosity from another nonprofit organization.

Sylvania Area Family Ser-vices (SAFS) also recently donated team sports equipment to The Believe Center. The donations were part of a sports equip-

project at St. Joseph Catholic Church in Sylvania. He and some of his baseball teammates spent a Saturday in April collecting the donations from the greater community.

SAFS Executive Director Anita Sánchez-Serda received the donations, which were to be divided between the Sylvaniabased nonprofit organization and the children of migrant farm

workers. "St. Joe's kicked in some older equipment they had that wasn't being used by kids in the parish," said Ms. Sánchez-Serda. "Since SAFS doesn't have any team sports yet, we were seeking a way to distribute that team sports gear to an agency in need that we knew would put it to good use."

Since the donations far ex-ceeded expectations, it was decided to help central-city Latino sports teams with the extra football uniforms, pads, jerseys, cleats and other team-oriented equipment given by the church. So staff from The Believe Center drove a trailer to Sylvania to pick up large boxes containing equipment for several sports-tennis, soccer, football, basketball, and

baseball, among others. "The kids used a lot of the cleats already. We passed them outfora MudHensbaseball camp held this past weekend at the rec center," said Ms. Durán, who estimated there were 120 sets of football and baseball cleats that will be given to central-city youth sports participants. "It did work out pretty well. I would say 40 kids got cleats.

The remainder will be passed out in July, in time for the start of youth football practices. The extra jerseys will be used for practices, while the football uniforms and pads can do doubleduty for practices and games. "Equipment is always our biggest need. We have to keep updated equipment because of concussions and just the potential of injury to keep kids safe," said Ms. Durán. "Foot-ball always tends to have the shortest life span because of injuries. Having safe equipment is a big issue. Having equipment for the kids to use is always a challenge for us." The Believe Center spon-

sors two football teams in the Toledo STARS league and backs three baseball teams-the Mets, the Braves, and the White Sox—in the Police Athletic League (PAL).

The carnival will feature games, festival food such as funnel cakes and cotton candy, and several rides. Wristbands can be purchased for \$12 for an unlimited number of rides during two time periods: noon to 8 p.m. or 8 p.m.to midnight, both Friday and Saturday. Wristbands will only cost \$8 on Sunday, which is Kids Day at the carnival.

The carnival also will feature plenty of entertainment. El Corazón de México dancers will perform at 4 p.m. both Saturday and Sunday. DJ A Durán will spin tunes Friday

The singing group Four Ladies will perform Saturday at 6 p.m. Just Four Voices will take the stage Sunday at 1 p.m., followed by a Zumba everyies accience po bour later exercise session an hour later.

The Toledor Youth Choir will perform at 5 p.m. Sunday. Overflow parking will be available nearby at Lido Lanes, 865 South Ave. More informa-tion can be found at the nonprofit group's website: www.believecenter.com or by calling 419.214.0028.

### Wash. prosecutor expects police report on fatal shooting

PASCO, Wash., May 27, 2015 (AP): A special investigative unit's report on the Feb. 10 shooting death of an unarmed Latino man in the central Washington city of Pasco is expected Thursday, the Franklin County prosecutor said. The unit, including of-

ficers from area police agencies, was asked to investigate the death of Antonio Zambrano-Montes, 35, who was fatally shot by Pasco police nearly four months ago.

Franklin County Prosecutor Shawn Sant said he hopes to outline Thursday what comes next in the review process.

Zambrano-Montes was fired upon 17 times by Pasco police officers Ryan Flanagan, Adam Wright and Adrian Alaniz after he reportedly threw at least one rock at them at a Pasco intersection. The orchard worker was not carrying a gun or knife. A rock was found near his body, which

was struck by at least five bullets. The shooting, captured on video, led to weeks of

protests. Also upcoming is a coroner's inquest that will allow a jury of six civilians to determine the cause and manner of Zambrano-Montes' death. The jury also will decide if the shooting was justifiable.

Sant ultimately will decide whether criminal charges should be filed against the officers. They have been placed on leave pending the outcome of the investigation.

Also on Wednesday, the U.S. Office of Community Oriented Policing Services said it will offer technical assistance and training to the Pasco Police Department. The decision follows a request from U.S. Attorney Michael C. Ormsby and Pasco Police Chief Robert Metzger. COPS, an arm of the De-

partment of Justice, said the decision was prompted by the shooting

The COPS office will work with Pasco officers over the next year, providing training in community policing and problemsolving, fair and impartial policing, and procedural justice

The office has recently worked with police in cities such as Ferguson, Missouri; Detroit; Seattle; New Orleans; and San Diego.

Ronald Davis, director of COPS, said a lack of trust between a community and the police is at the core of much tension in the United States.

"The recent tragic shooting of Antonio Zambrano-Montes Pasco has brought that fact to light," Davis said. "It is absolutely critical that the police department do all it can to strengthen police and community relations community's trust."

Pasco is an agricultural city of 68,000 that is mostly Latino

### Indianapolis mobile home operator accused of discrimination

INDIANAPOLIS, May 27, 2015 (AP): The operator of an Indianapolis mobile home park is facing a discrimination lawsuit alleging it discouraged minorities and people with disabilities from renting homes.

The Fair Housing Center of Central Indiana this month filed the federal lawsuit against Shiloh Estates and owner

Colorado-based FR Community. The lawsuit alleges that since 2011, the management at Shiloh Estates discriminated against African-Americans, Latinos, families with children and people with disabilities.

The Indiana Civil Rights Commission ruled earlier this year it did not find reasonable cause for a possible violation of nondiscrimination laws.

The Indianapolis Star reports (http://indy.st/ 1HMZNph ) Fair Housing Center of Central Indiana Executive Director Amy Nelson said the organization believes the state's decision was "made in error."

Messages left for the Indiana Civil Rights Commission and FR Community were not immediately returned.

(AP): La FIFA fue sacudida el miércoles por una investigación criminal del gobierno estadounidense, que acusó de crimen organizado a jerarcas varios latinoamericanos del fútbol, pidió la extradición de ex dirigentes en Paraguay y Trinidad v allanó las oficinas de la CONCACAF en Miami.

La fiscalía estadounidense dijo que pedirá la confiscación de más de 151 millones de dólares que supuestamente fueron obtenidos por medios ilegales. Señalaron que estas acusaciones son apenas la punta del iceberg.

Richard Weber, jefe de la división criminal de Rentas Internas, catalogó el caso como "la Copa del Mundo del fraude".

El séptimo arrestado en Zúrich es Costas Takkas, un británico que es asesor de la de presidencia la CONCACAF. Los siete encaran hasta 20 años de prisión de ser hallados culpables.

Tras el anuncio de las autoridades, la FIFA suspendió a 11 personas, incluyendo a Webb y Figueredo.

El Ministerio de Justicia suizo indicó que seis de los siete arrestados se oponen a ser extraditados a Estados Unidos, y agregó que ahora autoridades las estadounidenses tienen 40 días para presentar una solicitud oficial de extradición.

Uno aceptó un "proceso de extradición simplificado", lo que significa que puede ser enviado a Estados Unidos en los próximos días. Cuatro de los acusados



### Latino Profile: Latino Magistrate presides in Domestic Relations Court

really thought of law as a career when he was a younger man, let alone a position on the bench in Lucas County Domestic Relations Court.

But five months after being sworn in as a magistrate. González is finding he's comfortable helping families navigate their way through crisis situations.

"He brings a wealth of experience. He's worked for the judge, he's worked in private practice. He's been a guardian ad litem, so he's covered every facet of the law," longtime Magistrate Alan Mutchler said of his new Latino colleague. "He brings a different perspective to the bench and the public likes to see diversity, which should be happening.

"It's been busy. It's going to get busier," said Magistrate González, explaining springtime as the court's largest docket. He's facing five

Alfonso González never trials in a five-week period, cases. The other time he spent even though most divorce cases never get that far, resolved with quiet, back-andforth negotiations outside the courtroom.

"At this time of year, cases tend to be filed because people have tax refunds in hand and can afford attorneys," he said. "It slows down during the holidays, so it's cyclical.

But Magistrate González, 46, also inherited a number of custody cases and pending divorces from other magistrates, adding to the immediate workload.

"Some of these cases I'm jumping in at the eleventhand-a-half hour," he admitted. "That comes with the territory."

González had to leave private practice as an attorney when he was sworn in as a magistrate. He spent 12 of his 15-year law career as a lawyer, much of that handling family law and juvenile court



as a staff attorney for Judge David Lewandowski, He also spent a year as an attorney at Sandusky County Job and Family Services.

The Findlay native is one of five siblings, the son of Mexican-American migrant farmworkers who met in Laredo, Texas and relocated to Northwest Ohio. His father later worked at Cooper Tire as a millwright for more than 30 years. His mom worked as a surgical assistant for a time, but spent most of her life as a homemaker. He stated his education is mostly self-motivated.

"I was a math-science background, not a social science background. I got steered away from the science background during my first year as an undergraduate," he said. "My parents were pretty hands-off academically."

González earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and a Master's degree in public administration. both from Bowling Green State University. He enrolled at the University of Toledo College of Law after working for two years as a planner for the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council and completed his juris doctorate.

### School Choice Ohio reaching out to Latino Families

directly to Latino families about five state-funded scholarship opportunities that allow eligible families to send their children to the participating private or public school of their choice.

"We have a bilingual parent call center that dedicates itself to answering parent questions and equipping families on how to access these great options," said Cvnthia Valencia De Mava. outreach director at School Choice Ohio. "We offer parents support in both English and Spanish and help parents through every step of the way when applying to any of the scholarships or school choice options.'

School Choice Ohio has developed a School Voucher Eligibility Tool that can help families determine their eligibility fairly quickly. The tool prompts families through a series of questions to help determine if their child might be eligible for one of five school voucher programs administered by the Ohio Department of Education. The eligibility tool can be accessed at http://www.scohio.org/ home/eligibility.html.

We find that most parents across the state, not just Latino families, are concerned about the same issues," said Ms. Valencia de Maya. "These can range from school safety to class size, academics, and the general sense that their children's needs are not being meet at the local school."

Ohio's school voucher program began in 2000, but was aimed solely at children attending Cleveland Public Schools. The program now includes five scholarship programs and has grown from under 5,000 vouchers used that first year to just under 40,000 accessed by Ohio families during the 2014-15 academic year.

#### Those five programs include:

The Cleveland Scholarsip and Tutoring Program provides scholarships to students who live in the Cleveland Metropolitan School District to be used toward tuition at any participating school within the Cleveland Metropolitan School District boundaries. Any student in grades K-12 residing within the Cleveland Metropolitan School District boundaries is eligible. Scholarships are worth \$4,250 for students in grades K-8 and \$5,700 for high school students The *EdChoice* 

June 2, 2015: School Scholarship Program provides Choice Ohio is reaching out scholarships at designated schools to students who attend statewide to spread the word the state's lowest-rated public schools to be used toward tuition at the participating private school of their choice. Any student in grades K-12 assigned to or attending one of the state's low-rated public schools found on the EdChoice-designated list is eligible. The scholarships are worth up to \$4,250 per year for students in grades K-8 and up to \$5,000 for high school students and can be used toward tuition at the participating private school of their choice through high school graduation. There

> are 60,000 scholarships available for eligible students. Note: current private school students are not eligible.

The Income-Based Scholarship Program is an expansion of EdChoice which provides scholarships to students from working class families across the state to be used toward tuition at the participating private school of their choice. Any student entering Kindergarten, 1st or 2nd grade for the first time this coming school year, whose family's gross income falls below 200 percent of the 2015 Federal Poverty Guidelines is eligible. There are roughly 6,000 of these scholarships available.

The Autism Scholarship Program provides scholarships to students who have an Individualized Education Program (IEP) with an Autism diagnosis that can be used at the participating school and/or private service provider(s) of their choice. Any student ages 3-21 with a current IEP that states Autism is eligible.

The Jon Peterson Special Needs Scholarship Program provides scholarships to students with special needs who have an IEP that can be used at the participating school and/or private service provider(s) of their choice. Any student in grades K-12 with a current IEP is eligible. Ohio's Special Needs scholarships are worth \$7,000 to \$20,000, depending on the child's special needs. The scholarships can be used toward tuition at a participating school as well as services at private service providers, such as therapists. There are roughly 11,000 scholarships available.

"Each scholarship has its eligibility criteria. If a student meets those established requirements, then they are eligible for the scholarship," explained Ms. Valencia de Maya. "All they have to do is apply to a participating private school or provider, who will then apply to the scholarship program on their behalf."

School Choice Ohio can provide families flyers, brochures. and other information in Spanish if and when needed. The Ohio students, you can visit agency's outreach director www.scohio.org.

pointed out that eligibility for these programs is based on the student meeting the program requirements, not their parents' immigration status

"We have made great strides in reaching Spanishspeaking families by providing both our information and services in Spanish, but even while we continue to grow in our efforts to inform all parents of these options, regardless of language, we can only do so much." said Ms.Valencia de Maya. "Ultimately, it is up to the parents to choose to apply and take advantage of these opportunities.

Since 2005, School Choice Ohio has been reaching out to Ohio families by mail, phone, email, social media and community events to inform them about the education options that are available for their children. Yet School Choice Ohio officials admit that, despite thousands of available scholarships, many of them go unused because many families remain unaware of the education options available for their children

"Do not let fear of the unknown keep you from pursuing these great educational opportunities," said Ms. Valencia de Maya. "Your children deserve a quality education, and there are plenty of resources available to help you get informed and access these quality options.' If a northern Ohio Latino

family wants to consider a school voucher option, the deadlines are approaching quickly. For EdChoice EdChoice Income-Based, and Cleveland scholarships, all paperwork must be submitted to the participating private school by July.

"Ican't stress how impor tant it is to be aware of deadlines. Once you have verified your child's eligibility and know you are interested in one of these scholarship programs, be sure to submit all paperwork to the participating private school or provider before the deadline dates," warned Ms. Valencia de Maya. "No exceptions are made.

### Lorain Latino activist Michael Ferrer launches breakthrough collaborative

### (Continued from Page 1)

"About half of my youth are Hispanic, They joined me when I moved to PACE, and more joined when I allowed new entries in March," says Ferrer.

The target population for the program is within the West Side of Lorain, which Ferrer calls "one of the Lorain's underserved high crime areas.'

Ferrer explains that the program also includes camps on "Earth System Science, Building a Satellite and understanding its parts, Heliophysics, Global Precipitation Measurement Missions (GPM) and the effects of water on our planet, the Solar System, Mars Exploration, and the Engineering Design Process utilizing the BEST System (Beginning Engineering, Science and Technology) to design a Crew Exploration Vehicle.

"All lessons taught during the weeklong programs will consist of hands-on activities that are done largely outdoors and which include data collection and analysis based on protocols from the GLOBE (Global Learning and Observations to Benefit the Environment) Program," says Ferrer.

"All lessons taught will also connect with both the Next Generation Science Standards as well as the Common Core curriculum involving STEM topics.

"Participants in the

a

weekly camps will also be taught how to utilize Student Capture Sheets for data documentation and drawing out their ideas prior to constructing projects in teams," adds Ferrer.

As the lead organization, PACE is responsible for program coordination/ facilitation and will deliver STEM focused activities with training and support from NASA. The government's space agency will provide handson training to all instructional staff as well as ten "student teachers" from the WDA (Workforce Development Agency) Summer Youth Employment Program.

The camp location is at the Greater Victory Christian Ministries at 559 Reid Avenue in Lorain. Lunch is provided to the participants by the Boys & Girls Clubs.

Ferrer says \$10,000 in funding to start the program was provided by the Westlake-based Nordson Corporation Foundation through its executive director, Cecilia Render.

Other funders of the project include the Lorain Police Department, United Way and area banks, says Ferrer, adding that many parishioners of the churches "have donated money for the project out of their own pockets.

"My goal was not to

in which you rely upon oneyear grants and then the effort disappears when the grant expires. I wanted to start something that would be in place for the next ten years," says Ferrer.


He also credits Tim Williams, pastor of Greater Victory Christian Ministries, for recognizing and supporting this important initiative for youth.




