Beatles vs. Stones tribute show to settle an old score in Elyria

ELYRIA, OH, July 7, 2019: The debate between the Reatles and the Rolling Stones has been going on ever since they first crossed paths on the charts 54 years ago. The argument at the time, and one that still persists, was that the Beatles were a pop group and the Stones were a rock band: the boys next door vs. the bad boys of rock.

So, who's better?

These two legendary bands will engage in an on-stage, throw down - a musical 'showdown' if you will - on Tuesday, September 17 at the Stocker Arts Center on the campus of Lorain County Community College at 7:30 pm courtesy of tribute bands Abbey Road and Satisfaction - The International Rolling Stones Show.

Taking the side of the Fab Four is Abbey Road, one of the county's top Beatles tribute bands. With brilliant musicianship and authentic costumes and gear, Abbey Road plays beloved songs spanning the Beatles' career. They face off against renowned Stones tribute band Satisfaction - The International Rolling Stones Show, who offer a faithful rendition of the music and style of Mick Jagger, Keith Richards and the bad boys of the British Invasion.

Where did the idea for the show come from?

"Music fans never had a chance to see the Beatles and the Rolling Stones perform on the same marquee." said Chris Legrand, who plays "Mick Jagger" in the show.

"Now, music aficionados can watch this debate play out on stage.'

The Elyria show is part of a 125-stop tour of the U.S., Australia and Canada and has been touring since 2011. The show also performs long term residencies for a number of the Harrah's Casino properties. The production includes some of the more popular songs from the two rock pioneers and covers the scope of their musical careers, although the set list for Satisfaction usu-

ally includes Rolling Stones songs up to the

"They certainly have more pop songs but we're a really great live show. The fans are in for an incredible night of music!" says LeGrand.

During the two-hour show, the bands perform three sets each, trading places in quick set changes and ending the night with an all-out encore involving both bands. The band members have their outfits custommade, since avid fans know exactly what the Beatles and Stones wore onstage during different time periods in their careers. There's a lot of good-natured jabbing between the bands as well.

"Without Beatlemania. the Stones might still be a cover band in London," said Chris Overall, who plays "Paul".

"There's no question that the Beatles set the standard'

The audience naturally enjoys top shelf tributes to two legendary bands in the same evening. Like The Idaho Statesman said: "If you see only one tribute show, see this one...smart

and loads of fun "

"It's just a fun time and a cool back-and-forth nonstop show," Overall said.

'We're going to bring it all. It's going to be an evening of high-energy music," said Legrand.

Beatles vs. Stones - A Musical Showdown will perform on Tuesday, September 17, 2019, at 7:30 pm at the Stocker Arts Center on the campus of Lorain County Community College. Tickets are \$30 - \$50 and may be purchased by phone at (440) 366-4040, in person at the Stocker Box Office or online at www.stockerartscenter.com. The Stocker Arts Center is located at 1005 N. Abbe Road, Elyria, OH 44054. The show is appropriate for all ages.





UToledo Art Department alumna designs mural for inner-city beautification project

July 12, 2019: Artist Caroline Jardine, who earned aBFA with the University of Toledo Department of Art (2017), re-cently designed and completed a mural project intended to beautify abandoned homes on North Huron Street in the historic Vistula district, Toledo's first neighborhood. The houses have

good "bones" and may yet be re-habilitated. The project is intended to protect them from vandalism in hopes that a buyer may one day remodel

Ms. Jardine's mural consists of panels that cover the windows and doors of the structures. Each panel has a unique design that connects in color scheme and concept to the other panels.

The project was initiated by *Reginald Temple*, Director and Vice President of Community Development for First Federal Bank of the Midwest. Mr. Temple, a UToledo College of Arts and Letters alumnus (Communication '03), often partners with the Lucas County Land Bank on various projects. He says this mural is similar to other "board up" projects the Lucas County Land Bank and the Arts Commission have done, like the one for the former residence of Toledo's legend-

ary jazz pianist, Art Tatum. The Huron Street project was organized through the collaborative efforts of Mr. Temple's company, the Lucas County Land Bank and the Arts Commission of Greater



Toledo. First Federal Bank provided volunteers, plus lunches and restrooms for the volunteers. The LCLB provided the properties and the Arts Commission commissioned an artist and provided the paint and boards.

Ryan Bunch, Communica-tions and Outreach Coordinator for the Arts Commission, asked Ms. Jardine to design 16 murals for the North Huron Street properties. She says, "I designed the panels so that they would func-tion as individual pieces and as a whole. Lindsay Akens [Creative Placemaking Facilitator, Arts Commission] and Ryan Bunch showed the Vistula community members the designs and received their approval to move

forward with the project."

Ms. Jardine adds that her de $sign was inspired by her own work \\ and the houses themselves. \\ ``I$ chose to include abstracted. minimalist figures that look out to the viewer. The vacant houses are given character and life through these figures. The house at 1109 N. Huron was partially blue to begin with, so I brought in blue as one of the colors in this mural."

Temple arranged for nearly 60 volunteers from his company to carry out the painting. Ms Jardine says she was impressed

with the volunteers because they did so much more than paint. "The houses that the murals were installed on needed a lot of work. Volunteers cleared brush, mowed the lawns, picked up trash, pulled weeds, and cleaned the porches." "Once we finished

priming each of the 16 panels (some of which were as large as 4'x8'), I outlined the designs and color-coded them so that the volunteers could begin painting them. We had 2-3 days of painting, one and a half days of touch-ups and detail work, and one and a half days of installation. Finally, we clear-coated the panels and installed them on the first floors

of the houses. Three young girls from the neighborhood came by daily and watched with great curiosity as the project unfolded. Lindsay Akens and Liam Johnson of the Arts Commission suggested that the scope of the project be increased so that the girls could participate directly, Ms. Jardine designed several additional panels to cover the basement windows for the girls to paint. Mr. Temple noted that the girls were thrilled to be included, "The excitement on their faces was phenomenal."

Ernestine Stephanie Romero, 32, of Pojoaque, New Mexico "gained her angel wings on July 11, 2019," one day after she turned 32 years. She was born July 10, 1987 into a musical family and her passion for music blossomed at a young age when she watched her father's Tejanoband perform. She was an award-winning Tejano singer based in Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Ms. Romero began her professional career when she was eight years old and released her first album when she was eleven. She began performing and gaining a loyal following while becoming known as "La Jovencita."

Ernestine released a total of ten albums, working with a wide range of talented musicians. She had just released her latest CD earlier this year and recently had teamed up with popular Tejano singersongwriter Shelly Lares for the bouncy Ranchera song "Estupida.

She gained an international fan base which were very dear to her and she enjoyed interacting with her fans everywhere she performed or appeared. Ernestine won many awards for singing, writing, and producing her music that incorporated elements of many diverse musical styles, creating her own unique sound.

In 2016, the New Mexico Hispano Music Association awarded her their CD of the Year, Cumbia Song of the Year, and Salsa Tropical Song of the Year awards, and she was also nominated for a Tejano Music Award for Female Vocalist of the Year that same vear in San Antonio. Her professional career included employment at the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the State of New Mexico. Ernestine's amazing personality, radiant smile, and contagious laugh always made her family, friends, and fans feel special. She spread joy, happiness, and love to all those she encountered, and she touched so many lives through her music, kindness, and love for life



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

Because, that individual is RIGHT! What is happening at the southern border is not a new phenomenon, it has been going on for a very, very, long time. In fact, deaths along the southern border started during the Mexican-American war and contin-ued after the "Peace" Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo in 1848 to

our present day. This is how the U.S. acquired much of Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming, The Rio Grande becomes the U.S. southern border and most people along the border became U.S. citizens- even if they were Mexican citizens (or dual-citizen)-like it or not! So, half of the families- and I literally mean-half, would be U.S. citizens and the other half Mexican (mixedstatus) just because they lived on the others side of the river (elotro

Spanish would remain the first language in the home regardless of citizenship status; one of the many reasons so many people speak Spanish in south Texas. And, no one cared that ournew Mexican American citizens could speak, read, and or understand what was going on, have legal representation, or even have a choice or voice regarding their legal or political

In fact, people living along the U.S.-Mexico border for years have witnessed (as I have) fami-lies and individuals walking, swimming, rafting, and unfortu-nately sometimes floating (even in broad daylight) across the Rio Grande from Mexico to the U.S. Because, Mexicans cannot just come to a U.S. port of entry and ask to be granted "refugee"

So, although the Mexican may be from a state where crime, gangs, and corruption of the political system and law enforce ment are at their highest, all governments still expects people to apply for refugee sta-tus in their home country, to travel to the embassy for paper-work and interviews, and to pay large amounts of fees to the government and attorneys to pro-

cess the paperwork. While, children and families are expected to wait- and just keep waiting- for years in the same place that is a threat to their life and the life of their children and families. Regardless, they still have to wait, and wait, and wait for that letter (if you still have a house) or that call from

our attorney (if you still have one) for, in most cases over 10 years, OR they do the unthinkable and flee

They leave everything and everyone behind, taking only what they can carry in a small plas tic grocery bag or in their arms or womb such as a child or unborn baby. They will travel for days sleep outdoors in the heat and weather, pay people their "tolls" along the way for "safe" harbor or a ride to a port of entry and beyond. And, unfortu-nately, UNTOLDNUM-

BERS of children and adults have died and will continue to die- if we don't fix the (im)migration system and work with other countries toward ensuring that everyone has a meaningful opportunity for peace and economic prosper-

So, YES- it has been going on for a long time. And, YES-I am just as angry as that individual who shouted at the vigi on Friday because IT IS TOO MANYDEATHS!!!FORTOO LONG!!! And, IMMIGRANT LIVESMATTER!!!

Explains: The law criminalizing improper border crossings

CHICAGO, July 12, 2019 (AP): A federal law that Donald Trump used in justifying the separation of mi-grant parents and children at the border last year is creating waves on the 2020 campaign trail, with some Democrats vowing to do away with it completely.

During the first televised

presidential debate, Demo-cratic candidate Julian Castro promised to "terminate" the law that criminalizes unauthorized border crossings and chal-lenged others to do the same. Several candidates on the stage of the first debate night said they agreed. By Thurs-day, all but one Democratic candidate onstage said they would make illegal border crossings a civil, not, crimi-nal offense.

The debates gave promi-nence to a law that's been part of border enforcement for decades, but rarely has received this level of national attention.

Here's a closer look at the

WHATISTHELAW?

The law is called "illegal entry," and it makes unau-thorized border crossings a crime. The law specifically bars entry into the U.S. at places other than through ports of entry, like an airport or bridge on the U.S.-Mexican border. A violation of the law, also known as Section 1325 [8 USC Section 13251 is a misdemeanor with a penalty of six months in prison, though most are sentenced to time served. A second offense, or illegal re-entry, is a felony

Critics say the U.S. government doesn't have the resources to prosecute every case and the focus should be on more dangerous criminals.

Advocates say prosecuting the cases deters "illegal" immigration, though data on the topic is limited.

HOWHASITBEENUSED?

For decades the government didn't actively pursue criminal cases under Section 1325, which has been on the books since 1929. Those caught were deported by immigration en-

It wasn't until a 2005 program started by President George W. Bush, vowing to curb illegal immigration, that the number of criminal pros-

ecutions soared.

With "Operation Streamline," large groups of people were triedall at once and slapped with misdemeanors. There were just under 40,000 criminal prosecutions for immigration that year, and up to 90,000 under former President Barack Obama in 2013, according to a research organization at Syracuse University

WHAT'S HAPPENING

The law generated international headlines last year when Trump rolled out his "zero tolerancepolicy," vowing to prosecute first time offenders with six months in prison. Immigrant parents arriving at the border with their children were hauled into court and prosecuted for "illegal" entry, and children were separated from

Thousands of children were separated from their parents before Trump backtracked and signed an executive order stopping the separations amid widespread outrage over the practice. Shortly after, a judge also ruled that families could only be split in limited circumstances

Under *Trump*, the total number of immigration-related criminal prosecutions reached around 100,000 in 2018, which includes Section 1325 cases.

Repealing the law would require Congress to act. HASTHELAWGENER-ATED CONTROVERSY PREVIOUSLY?

One year ago, defense lawyers lashed out at how the Justice Department was pros ecuting illegal entry in federal courtrooms as Operation Streamline expanded to San Diego. California was a longtime holdout against the mass illegal entry prosecutions in federal court that were the norm in other border states since the Bush administration. That changed with "zero tolerance," and the prosecu-tions were brought to San

Diego.

There were no illegal entry cases in February 2018 in the Southern District of Califaction and the Southern Post of Califaction and the Southern Sou fornia but more than 800 by June as family separation

reached its peak.

Critics say the mass hearings violate the due process immigrants. Reuben Camper Cahn, executive di-rector of Federal Defenders of San Diego Inc., invoked the "separate but equal" doctrine last year in arguing that immigrants in the Operation Streamline proceedings were being treated differently from the citizen population in
