"Immigration is not a foreign subject to me. I'm not Hispanic, but I am Irish, Collins said, pointing out that he and mayoral opponent, Lucas County Auditor Anita López, grew up in the same Old South End neighborhood near South and Broadway. "Neither one of us had silver spoons in our mouth. But I would lead the city with far more experience.

Collins also drew parallels between the family-centered traditions of Latino families and his own Irish upbringing as a youth. While he and his wife attend Gesu parish, they attended a weekend Mass delivered by Father Molina as part of the Ss. Peter and Paul Festival and noted "he was received very warmly" and admired the closeness of that parish community.

Collins first joined Toledo's police force in 1973 after a stint in the Marines. He

"In doing so, it would be difficult. This is not Mary Poppins. This is not a fantasy novel. It would be a challenge, he admitted. "But if you've built a trust through communication and respect, exigent circumstances would have never been necessary. We wouldn't be embroiled in the litigation that we are today."

But Collins pointed to his past as TPPA president as what makes him most qualified to be mayor, because a group of people who save lives and keep citizens safe "trusted me with their livelihoods." He explained that police officers, as a group, are not the most trust-



ing of anyone.

"That trust transfers when I am mayor, because every citizen will be given the same level of energy, the same level and capacity of empathy that I gave there," he said. "I'm really not changing positions. I'm just expanding whom I represent."

Collins, 69, is among seven political hopefuls for Toledo mayor that will appear on the Sept. 10, 2013 primary ballot. He ran unsuccessfully for the same office in 2009, failing to get past the primary. The top two vote-getters will go on to face each other in the November general election.

#### Detroit Zoo halts bottled water sale, citing waste

ROYALOAK, August 8, 2013 (AP): The Detroit Zoo says it's giving up a \$240,000-annual revenue stream when it stops selling bottled water to visitors.

Operators of the 125-acre zoo in suburban Royal Oak say they're acting to cut back on what is the "largest contributor to plastic waste."

"This phase-out will cost us revenue, but it's important to walk our talk and do what's good for the environment," zoo Executive Director Ron Kagan said

in a statement. The zoo says it will sell reusable water bottles that can be filled with filtered water at seven locations.

"We understand that this will be an adjustment for some visitors, but we hope it will help in a simple but significant way to make a difference for the planet," said Kagan.

In its announcement, the zoo described bottled water as a major waste disposal problem nationwide.

"According to the Earth Policy Institute, more than

30 billion water bottles each year end up as garbage or litter in the United States," he zoo said. "Additionally, it takes 5 liters of water to make 1 liter of bottled water, and it requires about a quarter of a water bottle of oil to produce, transport and dispose of a single bottle of water.' #### Latin 'queen of radio' dies in Miami

MIAMI, August 8, 2013 (AP): A Latino radio personality known as the "queen of radio" has died in Miami.

Betty Pino was one of the voices on Univision Radio's Amor 107.5 FM. The station announced the death on its website Wednesday, saying they had lost a great person and wanted to end it by saying "goodbye with applause and all our admiration."

She died Tuesday at a hospital from a bacterial infection. Pino was 65.

The Ecuadorian disc jockev was a well-known personality in Miami's Latin music radio. Music producer Emilio Estefan told the Miami Herald (http://hrld.us/1cxUFb0) that Pino's death was "a great loss for Latin music." Estefan says Pino was also the first DJ to play songs

Agostini murió la madrugada del jueves en el Hospital Cavalry del Bronx, al que ingresó el miércoles tras haber pasado dos semanas bajo cuidados intensivos en la clínica para pacientes con cáncer Albert Einstein del Hospital Montefiore, indicó Campos en un comunicado.

Campos no supo especificar el tipo de cáncer que la artista padecía. Dijo a la AP que el deceso fue confirmado por la amiga y vecina de Agostini Sonia Meléndez, quien junto a los hijos de la artista. #### US film 'Latino Americans' aims for wide audience

BEVERLY HILLS, August 7, 2013 (AP): An ambitious documentary by U.S. public TV broadcaster PBS on the 500-year history of Latinos in America is aimed at a broad audience, its pro-ducer said Wednesday.

"These stories are not that distant from anyone. I think in some ways we share similar experiences no matter where we come from," and whether people are immigrants or not, "American Latinos" pro-ducer Adriana Bosch told a meeting of the Television Critics Association. Featuring familiar faces

such as Oscar-winning ac-tress Rita Moreno and journalist *Ray Suárez* was part of enhancing the film's ap-peal, Bosch said. Actor *Ben-jamin Bratt* is the narrator. The three-part, six-hour documentary debuting in

September includes interviews with Dolores Huerta, co-founder of a group that

was the forerunner to the United Farm Workers of America; writer and commentator and Linda Chávez; and musician Gloria *Estefan*.

Bratt, whose mother emigrated from Perú as a teenager, said Latinos have not historically been seen as part of the

American story. "American history always is from a Eurocentric point of view, and the real American history is so much richer than that," Bratt said during a panel discussion. "Even in 2013, we are still seen as the mysterious, exotic 'other,' even though we are as American as anyone else."

Asked about the rarity of Latinos on U.S. television despite Latino population growth and the "browning" of US-America, Suárez said commerce is part of the solution.

Businesses want to reach consumers without regard to ethnicity or language, he said, suggesting it's a trend US-Americans in general should get used to. "I can't tell you how

many times I've heard, 'I hate hearing press2 for Span-ish,''' Suárez said. "Why do you hate that?... If you don't want to speak Spanish, don't press 2."

"Latinos" includes the 16th century arrival of the Spanish to America; the wave of Latino immigration to the United States in the 19th and 20th centuries; Latinos during World War II; the 1960s start of social action movements, and the contemporary debate over undocumented immigration.

PBS is billing the documentary as TV's first com-prehensive look at Latino American history. In 2007, Latino organizations criti-cized PBS and filmmaker Ken Burns for inadequately representing the contributions of Latinos in his 15hour documentary on World War II.

#### Guatemala: Descubrimiento revela historia maya

descubrimiento de un friso arqueológico Holmul en el departamento de Petén al norte de Guatemala, que investigadores catalogan como extraordinario, revelaría información sobre qué pasó con la civilización maya de Tikal, según su descubridor el antropólogo Francisco Estrada-Belli.

"Yo espero que este descubrimiento deje más claro que los mayas no eran tan extraños, ni se los llevaron los extraterrestres, eran como otra cultura, tenían entre ellos reyes poderosos que intentaron dominar toda la región y que llegaron a ser un imperio", dijo Estrada-Belli, profesor en el departamento de antropología de la Universidad Tulane, a The Associated Press.

El friso de 8 metros de largo por 2 metros de alto, se encuentra en la parte superior de un edificio o pirámide rectangular de unos 10 metros. Está ricamente decorado con imágenes de dioses y gobernantes y una larga inscripción dedicatoria. Su composición incluye tres personajes principales vistiendo ricos atavíos de plumas de quetzal y jade, sentados sobre cabezas de monstruos llamados witz.

El personaje central del friso se identifica como Och Chan Yopaat, que significa "el rayo entró al cielo", según los signos jeroglíficos en su tocado y en el texto debajo de su imagen. En el centro hay un monstruo v desde su boca se desprenden serpientes emplumadas de las cuales emergen los ancestros v cerros laterales. Entre ellos están las figuras

GUATEMALA, 8 de de dos dioses ancianos, agosto del 2013 (AP): El otorgándole al personaje central un objeto identificado maya en el sitio por un signo jeroglífico como 'primer tamal'. Arriba de los personajes corre una banda de símbolos astrales conocida como 'banda celestial' que indica que las figuras representadas se encuentran en el mundo celestial de dioses y ancestros. Según el antropólogo, el

friso es de la época clásica y es de los pocos lugares que se han encontrado que mencionan al reino de Tikal.

"Para el año 600, dc, se consideró una época oscura del reino de Tikal, porque entonces estos dejaron de erigir estelas presuntamente porque habían sido derrotados y su pueblo había sido casi conquistado", explicó el antropólogo.

Estrada-Belli agregó que "aquí se cierra un círculo sobre los enemigos del reino de Tikal. Esto nos explica la relación que hubo entre el rey de Holmul, el rey de Naranjo y el rey de Kan, este último era el que dominaba, estaban ubicados alrededor de Tikal, junto a otros que eran enemigos del reino lo estaban sofocando", dice el arqueólogo, en los últimos momentos del reinado de Tikal.

"Del edificio donde está el friso, solo se ha descubierto en la parte exterior, falta la parte interior donde hay cuartos, creemos que puede haber decoración pintada, algún entierro o tumba", explicó.

El arqueólogo aún no deja de asombrarse del descubrimiento que hizo, el cual considera una gran responsabilidad. "Sentí mucha emoción

cuando lo vi, primero entusiasmo, luego mucho miedo, porque si algo le pasa va a caer sobre mí, si no se preserva bien, si van v lo destruyen, incluso pensé en





que mejor lo hubiera dejado tapado otros mil años", dijo el arqueólogo.

Para el experto en epigrafía maya de la Universidad de Texas en Austin, David Stuart, la lectura del texto maya es excelente. Pero a pesar de que las autoridades han calificado de extraordinario el descubrimiento, Stuart dice que hay otros que le puede hace competencia.

"Es muy impresionante" dijo Stuart y agregó que "yo ciertamente no diría que es "la más espectacular" fachada de un templo. "Hay otros edificios mayas que son igual de magníficos, si no posiblemente más" dijo Stuart.

Una de las cosas que llamó la atención de los arqueólogos que trabajaron en el lugar fue la forma en la que estaba preservado el friso.

"El edificio los mayas lo enterraron, le pusieron piedras muy grandes encima, lo hicieron con mucho cuidado hasta se ven las huellas digitales de ellos impregnadas en el lodo, se ve que lo pintaron varias veces", dijo Estrada-Belli que explicó que será hasta abril del 2014 cuando vuelvan al lugar a continuar con los trabajos de investigación, debido a la temporada de invierno en el país.

#### Guatemala: 'Extraordinary' Mayan frieze found

GUATEMALA CITY, August 8, 2013 (AP): Ar-chaeologists have found an "extraordinary" Mayan frieze richly decorated with images of deities and rulers and a long dedicatory inscription, the Gua-

temalan government said Wednesday. The frieze was discovered by Guatemalan archaeologist Francisco Estrada-Belli, a professor at Tulane University's Anthropology Department, and his team in the northern Province of Peten, the government said in a

joint statement with Estrada-Belli. "This is an extraordinary finding that occurs only once in the life of an archaeologist," Estrada-Belli said.

The archaeologists were exploring a Mayan pyramid that dates to A.D. 600 in an area that is home to other classic ruin sites when they came upon the frieze.

"It's a great work of art that also gives us a lot of information on the role and significance of the building, which was the focus of our research," Estrada-Belli said.

The high-relief stucco sculpture, which measures 26 feet by 6 feet (8 meters by 2 meters), includes three

main characters wearing rich ornaments of *quetzal* feathers and jade sitting on the heads of monsters.

The frieze, which was found in July, depicts the image of gods and godlike rulers and gives their names. The dedicatory inscription "opens a window on a very important phase in the history of the classical pe-riod," Estrada-Belli said.

The inscription is composed of some 30 glyphs in a band that runs at the base of the structure.

The text, which was difficult to read, was deciphered by Alex Tokovinine, an epigraphist at Harvard University and contributor to the research project at Holmul, the site where the frieze was found.

Tokovinine said the building was commissioned by Ajwosaj, king of the neighboring city-state of Naranjo, and vassal of the powerful Kaanul dynasty, the statement said.

David Stuart, an expert in Mayan epigraphy at the University of Texas at Austin. called Tokovinine's reading of the text "excellent." But while the govern-

ment statement called it "the most spectacular frieze seen to date," Stuart was cautious about using superlatives.

"It's really impressive," Stuart said in an email to The

Associated Press. But he added, "I certainly wouldn't say this is the most spectacular' temple facade.


"There are other buildings in Maya archaeology that are just as magnificent, if not more so," Stuart wrote, pointing out the temple called "Rosalila" at Copán, Honduras, and a building excavated starting last year at the ruins of Xultun, Guatemala, which has not vet been uncovered in full.

Also Wednesday, Guatemalan President Otto Pérez Molina presented the National Geographic Societv with the Order of the Quetzal, Guatemala's highest award, for their research on the Mayan civilization. Pérez Molina thanked

National Geographic for its support and said the society has "put on high the cultural heritage of the Mayan civilization.'

Estrada-Belli is a National Geographic Explorer. His excavations at Holmul were supported by the Ministry of Culture and Sports of Guatemala and funded by the National Geographic Society and other Guatemalan and foreign institutions.



#### NAACP hosts first Toledo Mayor debate

Indiana Missionary Baptist Church served as the backdrop for the first debate among the four elected officials vying to be Toledo mayor, as well as four lesser-known candidates who stand little chance of advancing beyond the September primary. The Aug. 5 debate was sponsored by the Toledo chapter of the NAACP. Toledo City Council mem-

Toledo City Council members Joe McNamara and Mike Collins squared off against Lucas County Auditor Anita López and incumbent Mayor Mike Bell for nearly two hours before a standing-room-only crowd of better than 150 supporters and city residents.

The mayoral candidates spent the first hour introducing themselves to the audience and answering questions from apair of moderators. Then the candidates took turns giving responses to concerns submitted by the audience, ranging from sinkholes to crime.

Three main themes emerged during the opening hour of the debate: job creation, racial profiling, and what to do about the dormant Marina District development. Some tense and fiery moments erupted, especially between Mayor Bell and Ms. López, who called herself a "daughter of this community" who was "able to lift me up" when her family faced troubled times in her youth.

"I m not sure if the children in this community can overcome those obstacles right now," she said in her opening statement. "I think the level of poverty...the lack of goodpaying jobs, the safety concerns we have, and most importantly, the way the city is run. It is not in touch with the citizens and businesses of this community."

"When we started, our budget was in worse stress in some ways that the city of Detroit and we have turned this city around. I realize that some of my tactics have made people mad," said Mayor Bell in discussing his first term in office. "I understand that. But if we hadn't, we wouldn't be here today—balanced as it is." cause of political connections or to work on political cam-

The mayor stated he looked forward to his opponents "say exactly what they're going to do" about the city's problems, "because sometimes I listen to them and I'm thinking there's a money tree somewhere that I haven't seen."

Ms. López attacked the mayor's pursuit of Chinese investment in the city, particularly the \$3.8 million sale of the Marina District property to the *Dashing Pacific Group*.

"It was practically given away with no plan, no benchmarks, and no accountability. That is a pattern and practice that has happened at the city of Toledo for too long," she said. "I would have tried to identify investors with a solid plan before allowing foreign investors to come here. I would have given local businesses, first, an opportunity."

The county auditor criticized the incumbent mayor directly, stating "that before we can court any investors, including foreign investors, we need to get a mayor who can getour house in order. Ms. López also blamed Bell for "being out of touch" and that "we already treat our citizens and businesses poorly."

"I think we've spent way too much time chasing international investments abroad with no results," she said. "At some point, you have to sit and say maybe this is not the right approach."

The incumbent mayor bristled at her remarks, openly admitting "they ticked me off a little bit."

"Everybody that has come here, has come on a boat from somewhere," Bell said, drawing loud applause.

Councilman McNamara stated his job creation policy would start with "hiring a qualified economic development director."

"Sometimes people getjobs in local government for the wrong reasons—either be-

cause of political connections or to work on political campaigns or who they know," he said. "In my opinion, that is cheating the taxpayer."

Mayor Bell stated his focus in a second term will be on retraining Toledo's workforce for jobs where no one is qualified to fill them, citing a recent program where 27 people graduated from a program that taught them environmental cleanup so they can go to work for companies that focus on brownfield remediation.

"They have to be retooled to what's needed. I have people right now that have jobs, but we don'thave people that meet that educational requirement," he said. "We have to be able to realign people for the positions to be able to get that job."

Mayor Bell also explained his support for the controversial SB 5, which would have curtailed the power of public unions in Ohio. The mayor focused on the city's budget crunch at the time the legislation surfaced at the statehouse, but was later defeated at the polls. He used "exigent circumstances" to force contract concessions from several municipal unions. "We needed to have lever-

"We needed to have leverage just to negotiate, to be able to take care of the citizens. I am not anti-union. I am very procitizen," he said. "We had to work inside the framework that people told me we had to work inside of. That framework was to continue the services we currently have, but do not raise taxes. That meant I had to look on the inside to be able to fix it."

Councilman Collins, a retired police officer, was asked about racial profiling in Toledo. His answer sparked boos and grunts from the audience, which was mainly African-American.

"I do reject the thought that there is profiling going on," he said, calling the city's police force both "professional" and "diverse."

Collins later softened his

stance a bit. "If we have, within our organization, individuals, because of bigotry, because of prejudice, we have a means to handle them," he said. "I am quite sure if that diversity was negatively impacted, they would be raising their voices, too."

Councilman McNamara countered the remark by stating "to say there is no tension between police and the minority community is wrong."

"My administration is not just about black and Hispanic, it's about every citizen inside the city of Toledo," said Bell, while pointing out his administration has invested \$28 million in the central city. He also stated the city will have added 180 new police officers and 192 new firefighters by the end of the year, all

without raising taxes. The other four candidates for mayor include Opal Covey, a self-proclaimed prophetess who's running as a Republican; city employee and union president Alan Cox, who is running as an independent; Libertarian candidate Michael Konwinski, who recently retired as a municipal employee; and write-in can-didate Don Gozdowski, an ordained minister who also is a student at Owens Community College.

At least the four elected officials will debate each other two more times before the primary. The *Fair Housing Center* is sponsoring a *Neighborhoods of Opportunity* debate at the University of Toledo College of Law on Wed., Aug. 22, 7 p.m.

A debate without an audience is scheduled Sept. 4 atthe WTVG-TV 13-abc studios. A panel of TV and newspaper journalists will ask questions during the televised event, which is scheduled to last one hour.


WASHINGTON, DC, August 6, 2013 (AP): The HomelandSecurity Department tentatively approved asylum requests for nine Mexicanimmigrants. Christopher Bentley, a spokesman forU.S. Citizenshipand Immigration Services, said DHS ruled that the immigrantshavea"credible fear of being persecuted if they are sent back to Mexico.

"The legal threshold for credible fear is broad and low, in order to ensure that individuals who may face a 'significant possibility' of persecutionifremoved have the opportunity to have their case heard before an immigration judge," Bentley said.

The immigrants were trying to call attention to hundreds of thousands who have been deported during President Barack Obama's administration. They had cited a credible fear of persecution should they return to Mexico. An immigration judge will have the final say whether they can remain permanently in the United States. According to the Executive Office for Immigration Review, the Justice Department agency that runs immigration courts, new cases for immigrants not being held in detention are being scheduled for 2014. The immigrants were

The immigrants were pushing for legislation being considered in Congress to offer eventual citizenship to some immigrants brought without documentation to the U.S. as children. House Republicans recently took a tentative step toward offering citizenship to some immigrants who fit into this category, but Democrats said it wasn't enough.

The dismissive reaction to the Republican proposal underscored the difficulties of finding an immigration reform compromise in the Republican-led House.

#### **Chicago US** court begins changes picking jury pools so as to increase minority representation

CHICAGO, August 8, 2013 (AP): Federal courts in northern Illinois are implementing changes in how jury pools are selected to make sure they accurately reflect the region's ethnic and racial diversity.

The U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Illinois put out a statement on Thursday. It says it will draw names of potential jurors at random from drivers' license and voter-reg-istration lists.

Until now, authorities relied only on voter registrations. Critics argued that meant minorities were underrepresented.

The district's first Latino chiefjudge, Rubén Castillo, is implementing changes approved last year. He will send a new mailing of 34,000 qualifying questionnaires to would-be jurors.

Castillo became chief judge last month. He has said the makeup of juries was a legitimate sore point for defense lawyers and he would make the issue a priority

Post-Romney, some in GOP reject advice to moderate By CHARLES BABINGTON, Associated Press WASHINGTON, DC, August 6, 2013 (AP): After Mitt Romney's 2012 loss, many senior Republicans concluded the party must moderate its image on issues such as immigration and reproductive rights. But some GOP lawmak-

ers have done the opposite.

They imposed new re-strictions on abortion in several states. They are strongly resisting a broad immigration bill in the U.S. House. They're waging a steady assault on "Obamacare," with some on House and Senate Republicans vowing to shut down the government if that's what it takes to choke off the health care law Congress enacted in 2010.

These trends worry establishment Republicans. And they expose a grow-ing split in the GOP, which is driven more by campaign strategy than ideology.

One side focuses chiefly on presidential elections, saying that Republicans must change course to com-pete in 2016 and beyond after having lost the popular vote in five of the last six contests.

The other side is a congressional wing, driven largely by House conservatives focused on their own elections, and deter-mined to avoid primary challenges from the right. To an extent not mir-rored among Democrats,

these two GOP wings sometimes work against each other. For instance, a Republican Party-sanctioned study of Romney's loss concluded the party must embrace "comprehensive immigration reform" to stem losses among Hispanic voters nationwide.

The Senate has passed such a bill, which would create a pathway to citizenship for millions of immigrants living here without documentation. But dozens of House Republicans oppose it, because their conservative supporters dislike what they consider "amnesty" for law breakers.

In tone, if not always in substance, a number of elected Republicans seem to be edging farther right ---and toward greater combat-iveness with President Barack Obama--on numerous issues.

For nearly two decades, Republicans shunned the idea of shutting down the federal government in budget disputes with Demo-cratic presidents. They recalled the two partial shutdowns in the mid-1990s that angered many Americans, who in turn blamed Republicans more than President Bill Clinton and his fellow Democrats.

Now, however, prominent Republicans are urging colleagues to close the government temporarily this fall — by refusing to fund federal

operations beyond Sept. 30 — if that's the only way to cut off money for Obama's

health care law. Ted Cruz of Texas, one of the dozen Republican senators who signed a letter to that effect, says the mid-1990s experience wasn't so bad. The predicted "parade of horribles," Cruz said in a recent Senate speech, "did not occur. Social Security checks continued to flow. The military continued to be funded....Planes didn't fall out of the sky." Cruz taunted fellow Re-

publicans who denounce Obama's health care law but refuse to shutter the government to block it. "If you fund it, you're for it," he said.

Some senior House and Senate Republicans call Cruz's plan political suicide. They say it could cost the GOP control of the House in next year's elections.

Democratic activist Brad Woodhouse said of Cruz's efforts: "Please, Lord, bring it on!' Abortion is another issue that has tripped up some high-

profile Republican candi-dates. Two Senate nominees lost competitive races last year after making explosive comments about pregnan-cies resulting from rape. Establishment Republi-

cans said the two men did not speak for the party. But Democrats used the incidents to argue the GOP is insensitive to women's rights

in areas that include access to abortion.

This year, several Republican-controlled state governments have tightened abortion regulations. Some have outlawed abortions 20 weeks after conception. Wisconsin, which tilts Democratic in presidential elections, now requires women to get an ultrasound before having an abortion.

The party's official study of Romney's loss — irreverently called an "autopsy" report — cited Republican activists "frustrated by the party's negative image among women." On messag ing in general, the report said, "we must change our tone, especially on certain social issues that are turning off young voters."

Few issues worry presidential-oriented Republicans more than *immigration*. A Who's Who of Republican donors and former officials sent a letter to lawmakers urging them to enact a law giving "legal status" to the roughly 11 million immigrants living in the country without documentation. The more than 100 signers included past cabinet members. former Vice President Dan Quayle, and prominent campaign adviser Karl Rove.

Such efforts seem to have modest impact in the House, where Republicans intensely track sentiments of conservative activists who domi-nate GOP primaries back

"Immigration is proving as big a challenge as people feared it would be," said Washington-based Repub-lican adviser Sara Taylor Fagen


Campaign consultants say people who focus on presidential or gubernatorial elections view politics differently from those elected to the U.S. House or to state legislatures from districts, which often are drawn with strong partisan slants.

"The nature of how House members get elected is fundamentally different from presidential cam-paigns," said veteran con-sultant Terry Holt. But he said he's not worried that the party is not "making progress where we're not making progress," because the next presidential elec-tion is more than three years away

He's not alone. Still, if congressional Republicans spearhead a government shutdown this fall, some party insiders say, they'll be moving the party in the wrong direction

"Republican leadership is courting disaster here. said GOP campaign veteran Steve Lombardo. "Voters are in no mood for this at a time when the country is politically fractured and teetering on economic re-covery. This is very dangerous politics.
