

Group says progress made for Latinos now at risk

August 10, 2011 (AP): A coalition of Latino advocacy groups said President Barack Obama and Congress have made progress in the past two years on the needs of the nation's largest minority group, but it also warned that proposals for deep spending cuts could put that forward movement at risk.

The National Hispanic Leadership Agenda gave good marks Wednesday to the administration and Congress on early childhood education, health care reform, programs for veterans and Latino businesses, and appointments of record numbers of Latinos to the administra-

On immigration reform and enforcement, the coalition of 30 Latino groups said in a progress report that Obama and lawmak-

WASHINGTON, DC, under delivered."

Several of those gains have required increased spending, such as those included in 2010 appropriations bills to expand Head Start and Early Start by 70,000 in 2010. One in five children under 5 is Latino.

Lillian Rodríguez-López, the coalition's chairwoman, said the groups fear losing ground in upcoming budget debates and spending cuts proposed by a bipartisan supercommittee tasked with slashing the federal budget deficit by more than \$1 tril-

"Deep cuts to programs that have kept families working and in their homes cannot be sacrificed during their negotiations," Rodríguez-López said.

The coalition includes some of the heavyweights among Latino advocacy groups, such as the League of United Latin American ers "over promised and Citizens, National Council of La Raza and the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund.

Political parties already have been sparring over whether the achievements the Obama's administration cites as benefiting Latinos, such as health care reform, will outweigh Latinos' disappointment over immigration failures and unemployment when it comes time to cast votes in

The progress report is based on a list of recommendations the coalition made in 2008.

"We said these are our priorities and we will look at these issues to see whether or not you are valuing this community and taking seriously the community's needs and challenges,' Rodríguez-López said.

Derechistas cuestionan a Perry sobre inmigración

McALLEN, Texas, 11 de agosto de 2011(AP): Pese a sus robustas credenciales conservadoras, gobernador de Texas Rick Perry podría tener un talón de Aquiles: el tema de la inmigración.

Perry indudablemente

enfocará su campaña por la nominación presidencial republicana en la relativamente saludable economía de Texas, en sus impuestos bajos y en su creación de empleos durante los 11 años que ha estado en el cargo. Pero tendría dificultades para explicar cómo es que los inmigrantes que se encuentran sin autorización en Estados Unidos han contribuido a tal éxito, agregando tanto como 17.700 millones anuales al producto bruto estatal y gozando de beneficios tales como tarifas privilegiadas en universidades públicas, las cuales se ofrecen normalmente sólo a residentes del estado.

"El gobernador Perry está muy ansioso por parecer severo sobre la inmigración ilegal, pero en una inspección más cercana, él es parte del

problema", se quejó William Gheen, quien maneja el comité de acción política Estadounidense por una Inmigración Legal, con sede en Carolina del Norte El grupo intenta instruir a grupos conservadores sobre las posturas de los candidatos en esa materia.

La crítica de la extrema sobre los derecha antecedentes de Perry en materia de inmigración está apareciendo ahora en bitácoras de activistas a través de internet en Arizona y Nueva Hampshire.

Un reporte estatal del 2006 señaló que los inmigrantes sin autorización para estar en el estado-1,4 millones entonces, 1,65 millones ahora_ agregaron 17.700 millones de dólares al producto bruto de Texas. Además, el estado tuvo más impuestos recaudados que lo gastado en servicios que proporcionó. Pero gobiernos locales y hospitales de condado cargaron con el peso de atender a esa población.


La Asociación de Negocios de Texas (TAB, por sus siglas en inglés), la cual ha respaldado a Perry en todas sus campañas por el gobierno estatal v tiene miembros que en lo individual le han proporcionado cientos de

miles de dólares en efectivo para sus actividades proselitistas, pregonaron ese reporte en su apoyo firme por una reforma de inmigración integral. La TAB, la cámara de comercio del estado, ha ejercido presión a favor de la reforma de inmigración y contra una legislación estatal que regule esa materia.

"La economía sufriría sin trabajadores indocumentados", dijo Bill Hammond, presidente y director ejecutivo de la TAB. "Los necesitamos", subrayó.

Texas continúa dando la bienvenida a los inmigrantes de maneras que algunos otros estados no lo hacen.

Los inmigrantes sin documentos pueden obtener colegiaturas rebajadas en universidades de Texas. Ningún empleador ninguna agencia estatal está obligada a verificar en una base de datos federal los datos aportados por solicitantes de empleos para determinar su estatus legal. Los inmigrantes sin permiso para estar en el país tienen acceso a servicios para tratamiento médico, de salud mental y de atención a niños con necesidades especiales de atención.



AARP opposing Michigan pension tax in court filing

LANSING, August 10, ciation and the National Ac-2011 (AP): The AARP and other retiree groups on Wednesday said they will argue before the Michigan Supreme Court that parts of the state's new tax on pensions are unconstitutional. particularly related to public employees.

The retiree groups filed a friend of the court brief on the matter this week. Republican Gov. Rick Snyder's administration says the tax is constitutional and has asked the high court to review it. Oral arguments are scheduled for Sept. 7.

Snyder signed the sweeping tax law in May. The new law will end income tax exemptions for some types of retiree income, including pensions, starting in 2012. Eligibility to continue existing exemptions will be based on when a taxpayer was born and other factors.

The AARP, State Employees Retirement Assotive and Retired Federal Employees Association say the Michigan constitution prohibits taxes on public pensions as outlined in the new state law. The groups said the measure is unfair to those who would be forced to pay the income tax on retirement income, saying it takes away money from people who already had planned their re-

"Most of those people retire without ever dreaming they would be subject to a pension tax," said Eric Schneidewind, president of Michigan's AARP chapter. "All of a sudden the state is presenting them with a tax

cific income level.

Michigan currently exempts all Social Security and public pension benefits from income taxes, as well as private retirement and pension benefits up to certain levels. The exemption on Social Security continues under the new law but

other retirement will be subject to income taxes in some cases

Residents born before 1946 will continue to get the same tax breaks they do now. But vounger retirees would have some retirement income taxed. depending on when they were born.

The Snyder administration has said the new tax plan is fairer than the current system. Snyder has argued that it's not fair that a retired couple making about \$100,000 a year pays no income tax while other Michigan residents pay the tax on virtually all their income if they're still in the workforce. He says the system has pushed too much of the tax burden onto younger taxpayers.

The Snyder administration has said it asked for the Supreme Court review in an effort to speed up the legal challenge process and prevent it from being tied up in court for years.

Obama visits SW Michigan advanced battery plant

HOLLAND, August 11, 2011 (AP): President Barack Obama used his visit Thursday to an advanced battery plant in southwestern Michigan to promote his program to create jobs through clean energy.

Obama toured a Johnson Controls Inc. plant in Holland that makes batteries for alternative-fuel vehicles such as hybrid or electric cars and trucks, then spoke to employees and others.

Johnson Controls has received a \$300 million federal grant and expects to create 150 jobs at facilities in Michigan and Wisconsin, White House energy adviser Heather Zichal said.

As the president looked on, company employee John Park demonstrated an "automatic storage and retrieval frame" used to assemble the advanced batteries.

"Very cool," Obama

"At a time when Americans are rightly focused on our economy, when Americans are asking about what's our path forward, all of you here at Johnson Controls are providing a powerful answer," Obama said. "This is one of the most advanced factories in the world. You're helping America lead in a growing new industry."

Obama press secretary Jay Carney told reporters that the batteries are among the innovative technologies crucial in "helping automakers achieve the historic fuel economy standards, establishing U.S. leadership in advanced vehicle manufacturing, spurring economic growth and creating highquality domestic jobs in cutting-edge industries across America.

Obama has announced fuel-efficiency standards of 54.5 miles-per-gallon by 2025

The Michigan Economic Development Corp. said in a statement that Obama's second visit to Holland in 13



months "brings national attention to Michigan's leadership in advanced battery production and green vehicle manufacturing and the new jobs these plants will bring here."

Some Boy Scouts were on hand, and they said they were impressed by the hightech theme.

"It's an investment in the future," said Armaan Dandavati, 17, of Holland. The building itself helps provide jobs, which is immediate. But the products that they are building and that the facility here develops will continue to aid the economy.'

"You have to start somewhere," said Zach Rolinski, 18, who had a summer job with Johnson Controls. "A building like this with so much attention from leaders, it will allow a good start and allow it to get on the right track. It will offer more growth from there."



Report: Chrysler may add space to Toledo plant

August 12, 2011 (AP): New documents obtained by a newspaper indicate possible expansion at an Ohio Chrysler plant could mean much more space, not just jobs.

The Blade newspaper reports Toledo city officials have released an April letter from Chrysler Group LLC that says the

automaker might add another 530,000 square feet to its 4-million-square-foot Toledo assembly complex.

The Blade reported earlier that a Chrysler application for a local tax break suggested the company wanted to add a second shift at the plant and more than 1,100 workers.

A Chrysler spokesman

says the company will make no announcement about its plans for the factory until it learns about incentives from the state. A deal will be considered Aug. 29 by the Ohio Tax Credit Authority.



Hundreds of laid-off Cleveland teachers recalled

CLEVELAND, August 11 2011 Cleveland's school district is bringing back hundreds of laid-off teachers, at least temporarily to help start off the new school year.

The school board agreed Wednesday night to have 365 teachers return to work on Aug. 22, two days before the start of school. In April, the district cut 643 teachers to head off a \$47.5 million deficit.

The Plain Dealer newspaper reports (http://bit.ly/ amkUv7) some or all of the called-back teachers could lose their jobs again by the end of September once officials have had a better look at enrollment and the school system's budget picture.

Schools CEO Eric Gordon says in a statement that recalling the educators will help the district keep promises made to students, parents and the community. The Cleveland Teachers Union calls it "a positive step.

"Cantinflas", un comediante del pueblo, para el pueblo y más

2011 (AP): "íPásele joven!" México se ha volcado a celebrar el centenario del nacimiento de Mario Moreno Cantinflas, el gran actor que hizo del hablar sin sentido una nueva forma de comedia.

Su imagen traspasó fronteras. Sus películas hicieron reír y marcaron a varias generaciones latinoamericanos

Su personaje, surgido de los teatros populares de la primera mitad del siglo XX, se ha convertido en objeto de estudio académico en un intento por explicar el carácter de los mexicanos.

Durante su carrera de hizo 51 películas y cortometrajes y encarnó a diversos personajes vinculados con los sectores populares: barrendero, policía, bombero, sacerdote, doctor, y maestro.

Una breve incursión en Hollywood, donde hizo dos películas, le bastó para ingresar al imaginario anglosajón. Una de las cintas, "La vuelta al mundo en 80 días", le valió un Globo de Oro en 1957 como mejor actor de comedia.

El personaje de Cantinflas vestía un pantalón por debajo de la cadera, camisa blanca sobre la que caía un pedazo de trapo al que llamaba "gabardina", un pequeño sombrero y un cigarro que llevaba a su rostro marcado por un bigotito ralo y la barba a medio

al mundo del espectáculo. Mario Arturo Moreno Ivanova, hijo del actor, dijo a la AP que la oposición de sus abuelos provenía de creer que ese mundo estaba plagado de "mucha prostitución, mucha drogadicción, muchos vicios".

Don Pedro quería que sus hijos siguieran sus pasos en el servicio postal. En busca de un lugar en la

actuación y sin un nombre que lo identificara, Mario Moreno comenzó en la década de 1920 a actuar en las "carpas", una especie de teatro itinerante muy frecuentado en los sectores populares. En una de ellas conoció a quien se convertiría años después en su esposa. Valentina Ivanova, de origen ruso.

Antes de dedicarse de lleno a la actuación, estudió un tiempo en la Escuela Nacional de Agricultura. Fue boxeador con el sobrenombre de "El Chato" e incluso se enroló en el ejército. Fue dado de baja tras descubrirse que era menor de edad.

A final de esa década usaba el nombre de "Polito" en las "carpas", que cambió después a "Cantinflitas", un personaje con el rostro maquillado como payaso, algo que también tenía el propósito de ocultarlo de sus padres.

Algunos entrevistados, como su sobrino Eduardo Moreno Laparade, dicen que el nombre fue una invención propia. Pero su hijo asegura que el origen del nombre de

Cantinflas surgió en las "carpas". Dice que su padre le contó que en una ocasión el dueño de una de ellas le pidió anunciar la cartelera del siguiente día. Al estar frente al público, se puso nervioso, se enredó al hablar y la gente se soltó a reír.

"Y uno del público le grita ahí: 'oye, pa' hablar así, en la cantina cuántas te inflas'. En México, inflar significa tomar, beber... y de ahí, él jugando con esas palabras, salió el nombre de Cantinflas", dijo.

"Una anécdota que me platicó él es que cuando ya era conocido en la carpa... mi abuela un día le dijo: 'oye, dicen que ahí hay un comediante muy chistoso, que tiene mucho éxito y yo lo quiero ir a ver, es un tal 'Cantinflitas''', dijo el hijo de Cantinflas. "Mi abuelo se mandó a hacer unas tarjetas personales, ya se sentía tan orgulloso, que decían: 'Pedro Moreno Esquivel, papá de Cantinflas", dijo a la APMoreno Laparade, quien encabeza una fundación que lleva el nombre del actor.

Tras unos años en la carpa y ya como Cantinflas, el actor salta al teatro formal, de la mano de un empresario que veía cómo crecía la fama del comediante.

Su debut teatral se dio en 1936, el mismo año que marca su incursión en el cine con la película "No te engañes corazón". Casi a la par se estrena también como torero bufo (comediante), lo que también le dio mucho reconocimiento

popular. Cantinflas solía enredar a sus interlocutores, que al final se mostraban no sólo pasmados,

sino superados. En la cinta diputado" (1951), Cantinflas platica con un aspirante a diputado, "don Próculo", a quien le reprocha que busque ser legislador sin saber lo que es democracia.

"¿Y apoco usté sí lo sabe?", le revira el hombre. "Pos me lo imagino", responde Cantinflas y de inmediato le da cátedra: "Democracia, mire usté, según la lengua española traducida al castellano quiere decir demos, como quien dice dimos y si dimos con qué nos quedamos y cracia viene siendo igual, porque no es lo mismo don Próculo se va a las democracias que demos cracias que se va don Próculo".

Rendido, el candidato no tiene más que reconocerle: "ya veo que usté sabe mucho".

"Mario tuvo esa genialidad de captar al mexicano que siente que no está lo s u f i c i e n t e m e n t e documentado ni tiene una cultura muv vasta, sin embargo, su forma de hablar lo lleva a querer dar la apariencia de que sabe, cuando realmente no sabe nada", dice a la AP Xavier López, un comediante mexicano que desde hace décadas interpreta a un niño de pantaloncillos cortos llamado "Chabelo" y que compartió una escena con Cantinflas en la cinta "El extra" (1962).

En un reciente ensayo, el ex canciller mexicano, Jorge G. Castañeda, señaló que un rasgo que define el carácter de los mexicanos es su aversión al conflicto y pone de ejemplo a propio Cantinflas, cuya forma de hablar incluso ha sido incluida en el diccionario de la Real Academia Española

bajo el título "cantinflear".

Para muchos, la cinta "Ahí está el detalle" (1940) marca la cumbre de su éxito, entre otras cosas porque en ella aflora su

lenguaje en todo su esplendor. El hijo del comediante recuerda que en una reunión con el rey Juan Carlos de España, el monarca le dijo que era "un gran placer conocer a Cantinflas en persona, porque nada más lo conocía en la pantalla".

Hubo un silencio que fue roto por Moreno: "Caray, si viera que para mí es mayor el placer de conocer un rey en persona, porque nomás los conocía en la baraja".

Moreno Ivanova dice que la fama de Cantinflas era reconocida por el mismo Chaplin, considerado el más grande comediante del cine mundial. Cuenta que en 1972, Mario Moreno fue a Suiza a una reunión con el actor inglés.

Ahí, según el relato que su padre hizo a Moreno Ivanova, Chaplin le dijo a su colega mexicano: "En el mundo nada más usted y yo". Aunque hizo una precisión: "tú eres el mejor comediante, pero yo sigo siendo el rey".

Cantinflas llegó hasta el Paseo de la Fama de Hollywood, donde en 1980 se le develó una estrella.

La placa conmemorativa za: "Dentro del mundo de habla hispana, él es conocido como el comediante más grande del mundo, comparable en Estados Unidos sólo con el gran Charlie Chaplin". Para el experto de la

Weld-Ed receives \$2.9 million award from National Science Foundation

2011): The National Center for Welding Education and Training has been awarded a \$2.9 million funding grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF). The Center - known as Weld-Ed and housed on the campus of Lorain County Community College in Elyria, Ohio will use the three-year continuing grant to strengthen its efforts to advance educational curricula and instructor professional development in an ongoing effort to increase the number of certified welding technicians to around the country.

According to the "National State of the Welding Industry Report," published by Weld-Ed, the welding industry is currently scrambling to meet the hiring needs of at least 30,000 additional welding professionals annually, in an effort to produce 238,000 new and replacement workers through 2019.

To do that, the industry must acclimate to changing technology and increasingly specialized fields, according to Duncan Estep, center director and co-PI of Weldas Principal Investigator on the grant.

"As the welding and materials joining industries continue to evolve and become progressively technical, so too must the caliber of trained welding technicians," commented Estep. "This award will enable Weld-Ed to expand its curriculum, professional development, research and recruitment activities -and fortify our role as a vital resource and partner to the community colleges, universities, workforce agencies and busi-





Port Authority dedicates rail line at Ironville Terminal

ledo-Lucas County Port region. Authority President and CEO Paul Toth and Midwest Terminals of Toledo were joined today by area officials to dedicate the Port Authority-owned rail line currently under construction at Ironville Terminal.

This phase of construction was made possible by \$5 million in Jobs Ready Sites Grant Funding. Commemorative rail spikes were pounded into the rail line by the officials in honor of the dedication. The total public/private investment into Ironville Terminal will be more than \$18 million when the infrastructure projects are complete in 2014.

The Port Authority and Midwest Terminals also shared their joint future plans for Ironville which include three phases of development focused on using the 71 acres of waterfront property for material delivery and handling to support a new manufacturing base located on the 110 acre balance of the property. The flexible waterfront property at Ironville will also have the ability to receive bulk materials and will support

Since 2008, the Port Authority has sought funding for the redevelopment of Ironville. In addition to the \$5 million Jobs Ready Sites Grant (JRS) Funding, Ironville Terminal also benefits from \$7.4 million in grant funding via a State of Ohio Logistics and Distribution Stimulus (LDS) grant and a \$3.1 million award from the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA) is currently pending. The awards are unique as several local entities partnered on each application to ensure our region had the best chance in receiving each award. "The development of

Ironville Terminal has received a tremendous amount of support - due mostly to the incredible potential this property has for commerce and job development," says Paul Toth, President and CEO of the Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority. "This public/private partnership is possible not only due to the vast amounts of grant funding, but specifically to our private partners, Midwest Terminals of Toledo, who will invest nearly \$5 million into the development of this property when complete. Without this strong partnership, we would not be able to and receive goods for create these future jobs for other manufacturing our community or this new

for our region.'

Phase One utilizes the JRS funding for the rail installation. Phase Two will involve improvements to the dock face, dredging and associated site work and is funded through both the EDA and LDS sources. The final phase, Phase Three, is focused on the installation of bulk material handling and conveyor infrastructure and will utilize the remaining LDS funds. It is anticipated that the implementation of all three grants will be complete by 2014.

Ironville Terminal is currently in Phase One -Rail Installation. The JRS grant funding reduced the planned development window by seven years and this was the first time that Lucas County received a JRS award. Approximately 7.200 linear feet of rail and eight switches will be installed when Phase One is complete later this year or early 2012. The Port Authority owned rail line connects with the nearby Norfolk Southern rail line.

Phase Two includes improvements of the river channel and shoreline to prepare a deep water marine dock to accommodate barges and lake trading and ocean vessels. Underwater structures, thought to be wood and concrete piers will be removed to provide riverfront access. These structures are located along

development opportunity the dock face just off the million in the form of a existing shoreline. Approximately 65,000 cubic vards of sediment will be dredged to provide access the dock face and 520 feet of the existing dock face will be improved. Nineteen acres of the site will be paved for lay down areas associated with dock and rail.

Phase Three plans in-

clude the installation of a multi-modal delivery system. The conveyor and material transfer systems creates efficiencies through rapid freight loading and unloading and is capable of handling any dry bulk material. The material handling by conveyor system includes the components required to load and off load vessels. Self unloading ships will discharge into a 500 cubic yard hopper which will feed the conveying system. The hopper discharge will also be capable of loading rail cars on the outer loop track.

The 2008 \$5 million JRS grant application was a partnership with Lucas County, the Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority, the Lucas County Improvement Corporation (LCIC), the City of Toledo and Midwest Terminals of Toledo, Inc. with the county being the official applicant and recipient of the funds. In 2009, the Lucas County Improvement Corporation (LCIC) applied for and was awarded \$7.5

Logistics and Distribution Stimulus (LDS) loan, which can be forgiven upon attainment of specific terms, from the Ohio Department of Development. Finally, the Port Authority has applied for and completed the majority of the process to receive a \$3.1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration. All of these grants required significant matches, which came in the form of privately invested funds from Midwest Ter- the Toledo-Lucas minals of Toledo.

DGL & Associates is providing architectural and engineering services to implement the grant awards and the consultants and contractors for Phase One include AME Technologies, Bowser Morner, Deitering Landscaping, Hull & Associates, Mannik & Smith, MDA Engineering, Miller Brothers Inc., Construction. Northwest Consultants, Timiny Railroad Construction, Toledo Fence and Viking Trucking.

The Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority purchased the former Chevron property for \$3.4 million in 2008. The Port Authority formed a private-public partnership with Midwest Terminals of Toledo through a long term lease for the property. That acquisition made the ToledoLucas County Port Authority the largest land mass seaport on the Great Lakes.

The 181 acres of land was used as an oil refinery from 1890 to 1987 and successfully completed the State of Ohio's Voluntary Action Program (VAP) when Gulf Oil Company spent \$19 million on site remediation, approximately \$13 million more than the VAP required.

Ohio State-Michigan to play in Indians' ballpark

CLEVELAND, August you also have a unique event 11, 2011 (AP): The bitter Ohio State-Michigan rivalry is about to get really

The two schools, sworn enemies in just about everything, will play the first outdoor college hockey game in Ohio at Progressive Field-home of the Cleveland Indians-on Sunday, Jan. 15, 2012. The matchup, dubbed "The Frozen Diamond Faceoff" will be the marquee event as part of the Indians' second "Snow Days" promotion at the ballpark, a twomonth winter-themed experience that drew over 50,000 fans in its first year.

The Buckeyes and Wolverines will play on a regulation-sized rink situated on the Indians' infield, stretching from the area around home plate down the first-base line.

The AP first reported the event in June.

Indians president Mark Shapiro is hoping the 43,000-seat ballpark will be packed.

"We think it's going to be sold out," Indians president Mark Shapiro said. You have avid fans from Michigan and Ohio State, and you've got a rivalry that's meaningful. And,

just coming into the ballpark and seeing something for the first time in the state of Ohio. You combine all those things, and it's our hope that there aren't any empty seats."

The teams will meet in Columbus on Jan. 13 before traveling to Cleveland in what will be a Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) home game for Ohio State

The Wolverines have already played in a wildly successful outdoor game. Last December, they hosted crossstate rival Michigan State in "The Big Chill at the Big House," a game that drew over 100,000 fans to Michigan's mammoth football stadium.

"It's a great way to promote college hockey," said Josh Richelew, Michigan's director of hockey operations. "There's no better way than taking the Michigan-Ohio State rivalry and bringing it to a wonderful facility. This is one of the premier ballparks in the country. We're very excited about it."

Both schools will sell tickets on campus, and they each get a share of the gate.

CCHA commissioner Fred Pletsch said the game made sense to all parties.

"Any time you can play in front of this many people potentially, it's a win for everyone," he said. "The sight lines are unbelievable for fans and it's a great student-athlete experience. Who wouldn't want to play in front of nearly 50,000 fans? The coaches are into it. It's a conference game, three points are on the line, and the exposure for the sport and college hockey in general is just great."

But there is already bad blood between the Buckeyes and Wolverines, and with so many fans in attendance, the atmosphere will be super charged.


Pletsch laughed when asked if he was worried the teams could set a conference record for penalty minutes.

"We've been pretty tame that way the past few years," he said. "I'm hoping not."

As for "Snow Days," which will begin with "Snopening Day" on Nov. 25 and run through Jan. 16, the Indians decide to bring it back after getting a strong response from fans. who enjoyed the chance to ice skate and ride tubes down a 10-lane hill inside the downtown ballpark.







5 win Free Tuition to Owens Community College

Alyssa Davis of Toledo and Phil Carlen of Findlay each will attend Owens Community College for free in 2011-12 after winning the "Tuition is Right" free tuition contest hosted by Owens and Clear Channel Radio's 92.5 Kiss FM, 104.7 WIOT, 101.5 The River and 103.7 CKY.

Three individuals each won a semester of tuition as contest runners-up: Keri Lutz of Maumee, Alisha Shepherd of Portage, and Sarah Villarreal of Oregon.

"I was really nervous," Davis said of her time standing in front of the crowd of 400 as one of the final two. "I thought we were going to lose again. Then, I wanted to cry. I thought, 'Oh my Gosh! I won!"

Lutz, a 2010 Bowling Green High School graduate, won the first runner-up prize. She is majoring in commercial art technology.

A former Post-Secondary Enrollment Options Student at Owens, Lutz said she has enjoyed her Owens experience, which includes working in the College's Library.

"There are a lot of good people on campus," she said.

Shepherd grew up in the Bowling Green area, but graduated high school from Providence Christian School in Riverview, Fla., in 2001. She returned to Northwest Ohio and started attending Owens later that year.

She said she's completed many of her general education classes. Now the tuition prize will help her pursue a culinary arts degree and dietetics certificate. Her goal is to complete a bachelor's degree in nutrition.

"I'vetried to win the 'Tuition is Right' for three years. I've gone to both finals each year," said Shepherd, who's employed as a waitress at Olive Garden in Findlay. Chilean folk musicians sing to raise funds to rebuild a church in Chile

Local singer Emily Pinkerton and Chilean singer Marcia Moreno will offer a concert of Chilean Folk music on Saturday, September 10, 2011, at 6pm, at the Saint Angela Merici Church, located at 20970 Lorain Rd. Fairview Park, OH 44126. Funds raised will go to help rebuild a Catholic Church in the city of Santa Cruz, which is still recovering from the earthquake that rocked Chile last year.

Most of the Chilean wine you find in Cleveland comes from this regionthe Colchagua Valley in Chile. Its main city, Santa Cruz, was hit hard by earthquake last year, but the community has been working tirelessly to rebuild a city that has become an important tourist attraction not only because of its good but also because of its cultural heritage.

One of the city's most beautiful buildings was the city church, built almost 200 years ago. The church of the Holy Cross(Santa Cruz) was located on the main street by the public square and every Sunday brought hundreds of people together in hope, faith and prayer. The church is now gone. It was so seriously damaged by the earthquake it could not be repaired and since the remaining structure was a public safety risk it was demolished soon after.

Originally from Santa Cruz, Chile, and now living in Cleveland, Marcia Moreno and her fiancé Joe Amschlinger, an active member of the Saint Angela Merici Parish, in Fairview Park, decided to do something to help this community of thirty-two thousand people rebuild the church that played an important part in

Marcia's early life but is now also part of her new family's present and future.

Together with Emily Pinkerton, a local folk singer. they invite the community to support their cause by attending this concert and making a minimum suggested donation of \$10. Attendees are promised an enjoyable performance which will include a variety of tra-ditional Chilean songs as well as Emily's creations, a mix of North and South American folk music.


