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AG says schools can admit undocumented immigrants

LITTLEROCK, Ark., Sept. 10, 2008 (AP): Arkansas' colleges and universities can admit undocumented immigrants and aren't required to verify that potential students are in the country with documentation, the Arkansas attorney general's office said in an opinion Wednesday.

Arkansas Attorney General Dustin McDaniel said in an advisory opinion that schools don't have a duty to verify the citizenship status of potential students they admit. The state's higher education director earlier this year ordered schools to check the immigration status of potential students.

"It is my opinion in re-sponse to your specific ques-tions that undocumented individuals may enroll in Arkansas' public colleges and universities and that such schools are not obliged to verify citizenship as a condi-tion of enrollment," McDaniel said in the opinion, answering questions sub-mitted by state Rep. Rick Green, R-Van Buren.

McDaniel's opinion, however, noted that there was nothing barring schools from making citizenship a requirement of admission to a school or from checking immigration status on their own

The state's higher education chief earlier this year sent out a letter warning schools not to offer undocumented immigrants instate tuition, unless they wanted to give the same benefits to an out-of-state student. The department began polling the state's two- and four-year colleges and universities after that to find out their admissions practices.

Higher Education Director Jim Purcell in May said after checking a statewide database of student information that about 2,000 people enrolled at state colleges and universities attended class under dummy Social Secu-rity numbers. Some of those could have been undocumented immigrants, while others could be international students or legal U.S. residents who haven't registered with the Social Security Administration.

The opinion was requested by Green, who has been pushing for more statelevel laws targeting undocumented immigration. Green said Wednesday he had not yet read the opinion and did not know if he would introduce legislation requiring schools to not admit undocumented immigrants

Green said he thought Purcell's letter to colleges requiring verification of citizenship addressed at least one of the concerns he had in requesting the opinion from the state's top attorney.

"For us to be providing any type of benefits to people who are not citizens ... does not serve the state well," Green said.

The opinion from McDaniel's office, prepared by Assistant Attorney General Elisabeth Walker, avoids interpreting any federal law on the admission of undocumented immigrants. Instead, it says that the federal Homeland Security Department has said it's up to states to decide whether to allow undocumented immigrants to attend public colleges and universities

Gov. Mike Beebe's office said he believed the opinion validated the state's actions by ordering schools to check the immigration status of potential students.

"This does not change our opinion that the actions of the Department of Higher Education have helped ensure that our colleges and universities are acting properly," Beebe spokesman Matt DeCample said.

Hispanic Heritage Month opens with Puerto Rico Senate President McClintock

CLEVELAND - Puerto Rico Senate President Ken-McClintockneth D. Hernández opened the 2008 Hispanic Heritage Month celebrations in Cleveland, Monday, in an almost-filled-to-capacity hall within the City Hall Rotunda.

Keynote speaker McClintock stressed the need for unity among the various ethnic groups within the Latino community, in order to become an empowered group. "If we Hispanics can

stand together, then the sky is the limit. This 21st Century can truly be el siglo hispano in the United States of America," McClintock said, referring

to the Census Bureau's projection that by the year 2050, Latinos will form 30 percent of the total national population

Hispanic Heritage Month, running from Sept. 15 to Oct.15, is a national recognition of the Latino contributions to the United States. The observance, authorized by U.S. Congress, dates back to 1968. The observance dates were chosen because the period covers the anniversary of independence for several Latino countries.

"What makes us a great city is our diversity. Cleveland would not be as strong as it is today if it weren't for the Puerto Rican and Hispanic community," said Cleveland Mayor Frank G

deputy press secretary under the Jackson administration, said she has attended the city's Hispanic Heritage Month events for three consecutive years. Saldaña, of Dominican and Puerto Rican descent, said these events give Latinos "an opportunity to share with the rest of the United States what it is to be Hispanic, who we are and the contributions we have

made." Latinos are the largest ethnic or race minority group and the fastest-growing minority in the country. McClintock said Latinos are a powerful force but must unite and work with other U.S. citizens from every background to "become a totally constructive force."

McClintock, who also came to Ohio to campaign for Sen. Barack Obama on Sept. 14, stressed the importance of voting and urged the crowd to vote.

"I've been in politics long enough to know that when you don't vote, you don't matter," McClintock said. "Your concerns are ignored, your needs go unaddressed, and even your fundamental rights may be endangered if you fail to exercise the power of the ballot," said McClintock, of the New Progressive Party in Puerto Rico.

After the speech, McClintock spoke about plans for helping those in the path of destruction of Hurricane Gustav and Ike.

"I spoke to the vice president of the Puerto Rico Farmers Association, and we are entering into a partnership, and the senators are entering into a partnership. to collect food and clothing that can be sent to Haiti, Cuba, and to Texas, to help out in their time of need," McClintock said.





Previously, Toobin served as an assistant U.S. attorney in Brooklyn and as an associate counsel in the Office of Independent Counsel Lawrence E. Walsh. He has written several books including A Vast Conspiracy: The Real Story of the Sex Scandal that Nearly Brought Down a President; The Run of His Life: The People v. O.J. Simpson; and Too Close to Call: The 36-Day Battle to Decide the 2000 Election.



Prensa Correspondent The Cleveland Foundation awarded Pakistani au-thor Mohsin Hamid with the

Anisfield Wolf Book Award for his fiction novel The Reluctant Fundamentalist-a tale of a Pakistani immigrant living the U.S.-American dream, caught in the whirlwinds of post 9/11. The award recognizes books that challenge, open minds, and pro-mote understanding between races and cultures. "We are suffering from a

crisis of empathy... a failure to put ourselves in the shoes of other people," said Hamid at the City Club of Cleve-land on Friday, Sept. 12, 2008. He said fiction allows the reader to shed personal biases and imagine life from another person's perspec-tive, encourages understanding and communication.

graduate of Princeton and Harvard Law, Hamid is a trained lawyer and has worked as a freelance jour-nalist in Pakistan. His works have been published in the Times, New York Times, Washington Post, and many others. Though born in Lahore, Pakistan, Hamid has lived abroad for more than

half his life and currently resides in London, UK. He talked about the U.S.-American/Pakistani alliance in the War on Terror by pro-viding a brief account of the states 61 year political his-tory and the three dictators

allied with the United States, their demise, and a period of democracy in the 1990s. "When Pakistan was in this democratic state, they were also subject to sanc-tions by the United States," he said. Hamid said the two countries have repeatedly been allies against the Sovi-ets in the Cold War, Afghan

ets in the Cold War, Afghan invasion, only to sour. Following September 11, 2001, as the need arose to attack Afghanistan, the U.S. rekindled its alliance with Palvictor under the military Pakistan under the military rule of General Pervaiz Musharraf and exchanged \$2 billion a year in aid for mili-

tary assistance in Pakistan among Pakistanis who are along the North Western Fron-suspicious of U.S.tier Province-a hot bed for Taliban activities.

In Feb. 2008, Pakistan held elections, granting power to Democratic parties and reject-ing religious parties by 97 percent, General Musharaf resigned handing over rule to civilian law under Asif Zardari, the widower of assassinated leader Benazir Bhutto.

Hamid credited Mushraf for liberalization of the media, which offers a platform for Pakistanis to debate and express opinions and to ac-cess global information rang-ing from news, ideas, and U.S.-American popular culture. "Suddenly there's a very powerful and fiercely indepen-dent media that is very criti-cal of the government when it needs to be," Hamid said. He said in the wake of

the said in the wake of these changing conditions U.S.-American policy and at-titude needs to shift and respect the sentiments and feelspect the sentiments and feel-ings of the U.S.-American people. "It is no longer pos-sible to be an ally of a General in charge of the country, it is only possible to be an ally to the people of the country," Hamid said. He said Pakistanis share

He said Pakistanis share the concern of U.S.-Ameri-cans regarding terrorism and the rising death tolls of inno-cent Pakistani civilians creates a desire to solve the problem of terrorism.

U.S. President George W. Bush recently authorized ground troops to pursue mili-tary raids in Pakistan without prior approval from the democratic government. Hamid said this undermines the U.S.-American/Pakistani alliance and hardens anti-U.S.-American sentiment

suspicious of U.S.-America's motives. "U.S. is insisting that the potential threat to its citizens from activities in the border region trumps the immediate and lethal threat faced by Pakistanis," he said. Hamid said the two na-

tions have the common inter-est in building a stable region but it will require mutual re-spect, caution, and slow progress. "As opposed to the U.S. saying this is what we want, this is what you must do, and if you don't, here are the consequences...," Hamid said, the U.S. will benefit by lowering its expectations a little and working with the Pakistan government to set a long-term, shared vision. He described the border region as a complex situation that nas taken centuries to de-velop and warned there is no quick fix. has taken centuries to de-

Hamid said the conflicts raging along the border can not be seen as problems be-tween two sovereign states because the tribes consider themselves to be one people who are Afghan by race and Pakistani by default of be-ing born within a fictitious border sketched by then-im-perial Great Britain.

He said Afghanistan and Pakistan need to work to-ward bringing the benefits of government rule to the tribal belt which will neu-tralize the extremists. "We have people here are of both places and we need to jointly think of a solution," Hamid concluded.


