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Lorain's Boricua Festival celebrates Puerto Rican traditions

A taste of Puerto Rico's rich traditions - its music, food and culture - were all celebrated in South Lorain this past weekend when the local Puerto Rican Home Club hosted its 14th annual Boricua Festival and 4th annual Puerto Rican Parade, Sept. 16-17, 2011.

The festival featured a Latino Art show and silent auction, folkloric music and dance by Julia de Burgos' dance group Isla del Encanto,

domino games and a Talent Show Saturday



Roughly 100 people attended the club Friday, said Julie Ortiz, the club's secretary.

Dozens of people lined up to watch the parade Saturday afternoon, many carrying Puerto Rican flags or displaying their Puerto Rican pride on T-shirts, hats and banners. The parade welcomed floats filled with artists performing the cherished music of the island

Grupo Los Maximos, a reggaeton group from Lorain, performed their original song "Puerto Rico" atop El BoriMex club's float. One group marched and chanted "Stop deportations. Keep families together." Like any Puerto Rican parade, there were no shortage of a variety of cars, trucks and motorcycles.

Some spectators wondered why there was a Puerto Rican parade and not a Mexican parade in South Lorain on Sept. 16 – Mexico's Independence Day. But for the Santiago family watching the parade, the day was a double special treat. that is the festival's exact purpose: to teach and reacquaint both the young and old with their Puerto Rican culture, in addition to serving as the home's main fundraiser. Evelyn Vásquez, one organizer for this year's pageant for the Puerto Rican home, said she wants the young to learn their culture.

Eight girls are competing in the 2011 pageant. Running for Miss Chiquitita are Nahivelys Marrero and Ajaysha Quiñones; Running for Princesa are Nadia García and María Pedraza; and Running for Reina are Quirena Olivencia, Rose Sánchez, Jaileene Sánchez, and Bianca Cruz. The 5th annual pageant will take place Oct. 8, 2011 at the home, and will feature a talent portion.

"The girls are doing so well. They are learning about their culture, learning dances of Plena and Bomba, learning how to speak Spanish," Vásquez said.

She added that she wanted to thank the previous organizer of the pageant, Nidia Silva. "She did a wonderful job for the last four years.

Nidia Silva and her husband, Juan Silva, former President of the Puerto Rican Home, had organized the Boricua Festival for many years. This year, the Puerto Rican Home welcomed a change in leadership. Its new officers include President Mon Rivera, Vice President Million Medina, Treasurer Rosie García, and Secretary Julie Ortiz. Juan Silva previously said it was time for him to step aside from his leadership position but that he would continue to help the Latino community in other

Richard Romero, magazine editor and writer, joined the Puerto Rican Home's leaders and helped provide funds for the festival's entertainment this year. Romero said he wants to help the ethnic clubs. "Many ethnic clubs are closing up because they can't survive in this economy," Romero said "A lot of people don't have the opportunity to go to Puerto Rico, so let's bring the culture to them," he said.

Obama pushes jobs plan as help for Latinos at CHCI Gala

WASHINGTON, DC, Sept. 15, 2011 (AP): President Barack Obama, courting Latinos while promoting his new jobs plan, told a black-tie Latino audience on Wednesday that his \$447 billion package of tax cuts and public works spending would put more money in the pockets of Latino workers and business owners and increase opportunities for

The president made his pitch to the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute's 34th Annual Awards Gala. The event is part of Hispanic Heritage Month.

Addressing an important constituency both in the voting population and in Congress, the president kept up his vigorous public relations campaign for his economic measures while also beseeching the crowd to help him pass his education and immigration agenda.

"Lift up your voices," he told an audience that included Princess Cristina of Spain and Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor. 'Make yourselves heard."

Obama's economic plan, the administration's top priority, received polite applause from the crowd People saved their loudest approval for the president's assurance that he remained determined to pass a rewrite U.S. immigration laws to offer a pathway to citizenship for 11 million undocumented immigrants.

Blaming Republican resistance, he said: "It's been a long and frustrating road for all of us".

In advance of his remarks, the White House said the jobs proposal would lower payroll taxes for about 25 million Latino workers and

about 250,000 Latinoowned businesses, statistics cited by the president to argue his case. Moreover, the White House said the legislation could help the 344,000 Latinos no longer working as carpenters or as construction laborers because of the re-

"You know how hard this recession has hit families, especially Latino families," Obama said.

Obama said changes in immigration law are key to economic growth and would fulfill what he called "the idea of America."

"No matter what you may hear, in this country there is no 'us' or 'them.' There is only 'us.' One nation, under God, indivisible," he said. "And immigrants are part of that American family and a source of our strength."

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City of Cleveland celebrates Hispanic Heritage Month

City of Cleveland Community Relations Board hosted acelebration for Hispanic Heritage Month at the City Hall Rotunda on Sept. 15, 2011. Two hundred and fifty guests joined Mayor Frank G. Jackson to honor the 'Many backgrounds, Many Stories... One American Sprit'.

Mayor Jackson thanked the Latino community for its contributions to the city and presented Deputy Chief of Police Hector Luis Cuevas with recognition for outstanding service in the Cleveland Police Department. Jackson in the past six years as mayor said he could always turn to Cuevas for stability: "I believe Cleveland is a better city, safer city and that the command staff in the police decision is a better and more respected division for the work that DC Cuevas did.

Cuevas began his association with Cleveland Division of Police in 1986 and became in charge of Police Division's Internal Affairs Unit in 1999. Commander Harold Pretel praised Deputy Cuevas for his leadership and eye for detail, and said the department and officers serving under him are better for it. Pretel said Cuevas best demonstrated his leader-

ship after the September 11, 2001 attacks and helped the department improve and move forward through challenging transitions.

FLOCiscallingtheevent a "Solidarity Holiday" – as Toledo City Council votes on the fact-finding report for public employees. "All freshmarket tomato operations will be halted until after 6:00 pm on September 20," says Baldemar Velásquez, president of the union. "We stand with Toledo City workers who would be economically marginalized and with police and firefighters whose ability to protect us and our homes will be deteriorated."

Whether their employer is a private company or a government organization, FLOC understands that attacking working people is never the answer. "Just like farmworkers, public employees need a voice at the table and their concerns must be

Ohio picks up the beat on Latino celebrations

CINCINNATI, Sept. 14,2011 (AP): Ohio's celebrations and observances of Hispanic Heritage Month are growing along with its Latino population.

Organizers say more major events have been scheduled in the state for national heritage month that begins Sept. 15 than ever before. They range from a mass salsa dance on Cincinnati's Fountain Square on Thursday to a statewide Hispanic Business Summit in Columbus

next month.

Ohio State University and
Miami University are

Miami University are among state schools hosting major events, and Middletown's annual international festival will focus on Peru this year. The Cincinnati Reds baseball team will highlight Hispanic players and culture at Thursday night's game.

Cleveland's Hopkins International Airport planned to salute Hispanic heritage Wednesday afternoon with a program including music, art and ethnic food and a talk by Puerto Rico Secretary of State Kenneth McClintock-Hernández.

Small but fast-growing, Ohio's Latino population increased in the 2010 Census to 3.1 percent of statewide population, up from 1.9 percent in 2000.

The salsa dance Thursday night will aim to get into the Guinness Book of World Records with 600 or more dancing couples at once, organizers say. There will also be education, arts and business



Musical Composer, Author Dr. David Cutler to speak at Owens, Sept. 26

Interested in gaining insight into how to become a successful professional musician? If so, you are invited to attend a free lecture presentation featuring noted musical composer and author Dr. David Cutler at Owens Community College on Monday, Sept. 26, 2011.

Presented by the Owens' Department of Fine and Performing Arts, Cutler's lecture presentation is titled "Building Your Portfolio Career: Imagining the Mix" and will take place at 12:30 p.m. in the Center for Fine and Performing Arts Studio Theatre Room 111 on the Toledo-area Campus in Perrysburg Township.

The lecture presentation will examine critical elements to a professional career as a musician, such as entrepreneurship, product development, branding, marketing, networking, the recording paradigm, personal finance, funding, relevance and legacy.

Cutler balances a varied career as a jazz and classical composer, pianist, educator, arranger, author, speaker and entrepreneur. In all these pursuits, he is well-known for pushing the musical and performance boundaries while aiming to connect with new audiences.

His musical interest began at the age of six when he started playing jazz and classical piano. Cutler studied piano at the University of Miami, composition at the Hochschule fur Musik, jazz arranging and composition at the Eastman School of Music and composition at Indiana University.

He was Chair of the Composition Program at the Brevard Summer Music Festival from 2000-04 and currently serves on the faculty at Duquesne University, where he teaches musicianship, composition and jazz.

Cutler's concert compositions have thrilled audiences throughout North America, Europe and Asia and have been commissioned and performed by ensembles and artists such

as the Alabama Symphony Orchestra, Classical Orchestra of Milan, Korean Chamber Ensemble, harpist Jung and saxophonists Joe Lulloff and Jim Houlik.

His jazz compositions and arrangements have been presented by Nancy Wilson, Benny Golson, the Airmen of Note Air Force Big Band and the Eastman Studio Orchestra, as well as among many college jazz ensembles.

Recent accolades include the Sammy Nestico Award, the Millennium Arts Society's International Competition for Composers and awards from Friends and Enemies of New Music and the National Association of Teachers of Singing. In 2006, he served composition residencies at the Visby International Centre for Composition in Gotland, Sweden and the Asian Pacific Performance Exchange in Los Angeles. His music has often interfaced with dance, film, actors, costumes, stage design and visual artists

In addition to composing



and arranging, Cutler is active as a pianist, conductor, writer and educator. His style of jazz piano playing is as wide ranging as his compositions, spanning such styles as stride and bebop to elements far beyond the traditional jazz vocabulary.

As a classical pianist he has focused his efforts on the music of contemporary and American composers. Always an advocate of new music, he has conducted many large and chamber ensembles, including over 20 premiers. In 2002, he became a contributing author to "Jazz Styles", the top selling jazz history textbook in the country. Cutler's most recent book "The Savvv Musician" was created to help musicians in their pursuit of a successful career.


Venezuela-born Reds player Miguel Cairo said he has enjoyed a warm reception in his two years in Ohio.

NWOSF awards \$693,568 in need-based scholarships to 729 students

Sept. 19, 2011: The Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund, Inc. (NWOSF) has awarded \$693,000 in need-based scholarships to 729 students for the 2011-2012 school year so that students can attend a private school or be homeschooled.

Since 1999, the Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund has awarded a total of \$8.97 million in scholarships to 10,998 students.

Deb O'Shea, principal at St. Patrick's of Heatherdowns School, said of the scholarship program: "The value of a well-rounded Catholic education in the south Toledo area is priceless. At St. Patrick of Heatherdowns, I'm learning how well it is appreciated by our stakeholders. We are so blessed to be a viable alternative in the elementary school realm and we realize how fortunate we are to have our recipients of the Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund. This scholarship helps so many families afford this Catholic education that we

are so proud to provide."

The Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund is the only needbased scholarship program in northwest Ohio that awards scholarships to children who otherwise could not afford to attend private schools for kindergarten through eighth grade. Families must reside in Lucas, Fulton, or Wood County and are required to pay a minimum of \$500 towards their tuition. Eligible families are required to demonstrate their financial need as measured by standards similarto the Federal School Lunch program.




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Quest for gas mileage may make spare tires extinct

DETROIT, Sept. 13, 2011 (AP): Say you just bought a new car, and the right front tire goes flat as you're driving down the freeway.

Don't be surprised if there's no spare when you look in the trunk.

This year, more than 14 percent of new models on sale in the United States came with liquid tire sealant and a portable electric air pump instead of a spare, a trend that is growing as automakers try to shed pounds and boost gas mileage.

But there can be problems. While the sealant works well in most cases. you could be stuck on the shoulder if the hole that caused the flat is larger than a quarter of an inch, or if the puncture is on the side of the tire. In those cases, the only option is to have your car towed, and you may have to wait for a repair shop to track down a new tire

"The last thing you want to do is find out the hard way that you don't have a spare tire if you're stranded on the side of the road," said Gene Petersen, tire program leader for Consumer Reports maga-

However, General Motors Co., Hyundai Motor Co. and other automakers that use the pump-and-sealant kits say they have many advantages, mainly the weight savings. The kits are about 20 pounds lighter than a temporary spare and the jack and other tools needed to put on the tire. Also, the inflator kits don't take up as much room in the trunk, leaving more space for luggage or other cargo.

GM, which has made inflators and sealant standard on all but five of its 22 U.S. car and crossover models, said the kits can fix 85 percent of tire punctures. They're easy to use, even for someone who might be afraid of changing a tire, and they're safer because tires can be quickly refilled, getting the driver off the roadside and back in traffic faster than putting on a spare, said Dave Cowger, GM's tire engineering group manager.

Hyundai says the inflator kits help avoid another problem: getting dirty while changing a tire yourself. All you do is attach some tubes and fill the tire with sealant and air.

GM's market research. Cowger said, shows that half of consumers would call for roadside assistance rather than using a spare.

Also, new cars now come with electronic tire pressure monitors, so a slow leak in a tire is likely to be detected and fixed before it causes problems on the road,

GM, like many automakers, offers car buyers the option of getting a spare tire, charging \$100 to \$150 more for them. Cowger wouldn't say if GM saves money by swapping inflator kits for spares.

But many new car buyers assume that they're getting a spare and don't ask about it, said Ronald Montoya, consumer advice associate with the Edmunds.com automotive website.

"Unfortunately, this is something that many of us don't think of when shopping for a car," he said.

Plus, new cars are often $equipped\,with\, larger\, wheels$ and performance tires with smaller sidewalls than regular tires. That helps a car handle better, but the sides of those tires take more punishment from potholes and are more prone to sidewall punctures, said Petersen.

Still, for the 85 percent of flats that the sealant can fix, there are 15 percent that

That's why Honda Motor Co. uses spares on all its 2011 models, spokes-Chuck Schifsky said.

"An actual spare tire is the best backup

system should a customer have a flat tire," he said. "This is especially true in cases where the tire is damaged beyond what the tire sealant and pump systems can repair."

Nick Romito, an auto finance underwriter from Antioch, Ill., not far from Milwaukee, said he wouldn't buy a car without a spare tire. "I don't have a lot of confidence in those sealant products," he said. His family recently bought two used Ford Fusion sedans, both of which have spares, because Romito fears that the sealant could fail after it's squirted into the tire and under pressure from compressed air.

Automakers, however, say the sealant is reliable, but they recommend checking a few miles after fixing a flat to see if the tire needs a little more air.

GM also recommends that people drive no more

than 100 miles before getting a sealed tire repaired Cowger said drivers can travel at normal highway speeds after sealing a leak.

Like it or not, automakers increasingly are getting rid of spares as they face pressure to meet stricter government fuel economy regulations. By 2025, the U.S. car and truck fleet will have to average 54.5 miles per gallon under the standards, which are being phased in gradually. That's about double what cars and trucks now get.

According Edmunds, just over 6 percent of all new car models had only the inflator kits in 2009, but that more than doubled by 2011.

"They need to find any way they can to reduce the weight of the vehicle, which will in turn make it more fuel efficient. Montoya said.

Lorain opens Hispanic Heritage Month celebrations at Lakeview Park

LORAIN: National Hispanic Heritage Month has begun. Lorain opened its celebrations near Lake Erie with the 3rd annual Lorain County National Hispanic Heritage Month Fest Celebration, Sunday, Sept. 18, 2011.

Organized by Richard Romero, magazine publisher, editor and writer, and his team, the festival paid tribute to all Latino cultures with a great variety of ethnic cuisine, music, dance, art and all culture. Romero said roughly 1,500 people attended the festival Sunday at Lorain's Lakeview Park.

"Everybody knows when it's Black History Month," Romero said "But many Latinos do not know when it's Hispanic Heritage Month. That's the reason I do this every year. It's our month to highlight the great contributions of our community and remember the great leaders who made a difference in this country. From folks in the Military to education to entertain-

ment."

Romero added "It's tough to do but it's real important. We try to do it on one day, a Sunday and we try to start at a time after most people have gone to church."

National Hispanic Heritage Month begins Sept. 15 and runs until Oct. 15 every year, and celebrates contributions by Latinos whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, Central and South America.

The dates were selected because they coincide with a number of Latin American countries' dates of independence. The observation began in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson. It was expanded into that 30-day period by President Ronald Reagan in 1988, and was enacted into law on August 17, 1988.

September 15 was chosen as the start date because it is the anniversary of independence for Latin American countries Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guaemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. Plus, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16 and September18, respectively. Also, Columbus Day or *Día* de la Raza, on October 12, also falls within this 30 day period.

The festival featured an art gallery displaying artwork for sale by Mexican and Puerto Rican artists.

Romero said the festival is funded by sponsorships and art sales.

Food was provided by the Puerto Rican Home and the Mexican Mutual Society.

Romero said because he wants to help ethnic clubs survive in the area, the ethnic clubs are not charged, and they are able to collect 100 percent of the proceeds of their sales for their own fundraisers.

This year, Romero joined forces with the Puerto Rican Club's leaders, and he provided the cost for his event and their event's entertainment

Romero said a hit with the crowd was the song "Puerto Rico," by Grupo Los Maximos, their original song inspired by the island's people and struggles.

"They wrote it after they

"They wrote it after they talked about what's going on in Puerto Rico, what the island needs, and that those on the mainland should not forget about the island. The song says don't forget the people and don't forget your culture," Romero said.

The Latino Heritage Festival in Lorain mostly spotlighted the Mexican and Puerto Rican communities, but Romero said he is looking to further include the other Latino cultures in the future. Romero asks anyone representing other Latino cultures to contact him to plan for next year, he said.

"A lot of people don't have the opportunity to go to Puerto Rico or Mexico, so let's bring the culture to them," Romero said.

He said he is grateful for the MetroParks, overseeing Lakeview Park, and allowing him to use their venue for the Hispanic Heritage month celebrations.
