El mandatario panameño llegó el miércoles a la capital cubana acompañado por varios miembros de su gabinete y por un grupo de empresarios para una visita de cuatro días. El jueves sostuvo una reunión con su homólogo cubano Raúl

El director del Servicio Nacional de Migración, Javier Carrillo, integra la delegación que acompañó a Varela pero el mandatario no se refirió al flujo de cubanos que llegan a países como Ecuador o Brasil para después seguir viaje hacia Estados Unidos vía Panamá, y muchas veces no tienen documentos.

"Panamá y Cuba tienen una historia de hermandad cooperación... También se establecerá celebramos también un acuerdo marítimo, uno para la ampliación del comercio bilateral y la cooperación en la esfera de la salud" señaló Varela. A single-day workshop on a United States citizen, inhow to apply for citizenship, presented by Advocates for Basic Legal Equality, Inc. (ABLE), Adelante, Inc., Waterfor Ishmael, and Welcome Toledo-Lucas County, is scheduled for Saturday, September 19, 2015 at the downtown Toledo offices of ABLE (525 Jefferson Ave.) from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Attorneys and advocates from these organizations are participating in Citizenship Day 2015, sponsored nationally by the American Immigration Lawyers Association (AILA).

All lawful permanent residents are encouraged to attend this informational workshop. Those who attend will learn what it takes to become cluding what is required as part of the naturalization process, what fees and waivers are involved in becoming a citizen, and what resources are available for assistance with citizenship and civics test.

Presentations will be made at 9:30 a m, and 11:00 a.m. and will follow with opportunities to speak directly with an attorney or BIA-accredited paralegal. No documents or other paperwork is required for this workshop.

The Citizenship Day workshop, one of many held around the country, is FREE and includes breakfast and lunch, English, Spanish, and Arabic interpreters will be available, as well as information on English proficiency classes.

A second workshop designed to assist participants with the naturalization application is scheduled for Saturday, October 24, 2015, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at ABLE.

According to Cities for Citizenship, naturalization provides access to better jobs with up to an 11 percent increase to personal earnings. increased homeownership rates, and increased civic participation rates. Of 13.1 million lawful permanent residents (LPR's) in the U.S., 8.5 million are currently eligible to naturalize. If these eligible lawful permanent residents naturalized, the economic impact to the national economy is projected at \$52 billion over the next decade.

Reunión de cancilleres de Colombia y Venezuela en Ecuador

QUITO, Ecuador, 10 IX 15 (AP): Las cancilleres de Colombia, María Ángela Holguín, y de Venezuela, Rodríguez, Delcv mantendrán una reunión en la capital ecuatoriana el sábado para dialogar acerca de la situación fronteriza, que ha provocado una escalada de tensiones en las relaciones bilaterales.

El canciller ecuatoriano Ricardo Patiño en rueda de prensa dijo que el encuentro está orientado a iniciar un diálogo "con el objeto de tratar los temas sensibles entre ambos países como un paso previo a una reunión presidencial".

Missouri lawmakers to consider banning a state scholarship from going to immigrants, to override veto by Democratic governor

JEFFERSCON CITY, Mo., Sept. 10, 2015 (AP): When Missouri lawmakers meet later this month to consider banning a state scholarship from going to immigrants brought to the country without documentation by their parents, there could be more legislators in favor of the ban than there are students that would be directly affected.

The legislation, which would require that students be citizens or permanent residents in order to receive the A+ Scholarship, was vetoed by Democratic Gov. Jay Nixon. Legislators would need a twothirds vote in each chamber to override him.

Immigrant advocates and state education officials have struggled to pinpoint the exact number of immigrant students that would lose access to the scholarship if Nixon's veto is overturned. The scholarship provides two years of free tuition at a community college.

Not all schools have requested reimbursement from the state for students who received A+ Scholarships this summer, so it's still unknown how many immigrants without permanent resident status received the scholarship, Department of Higher Education spokeswoman Liz Coleman said. The summer semester was the first since the department created a rule that took effect. in March that meant immigrant students legally present in the U.S. could receive the scholarship. That applies to immigrants brought to the U.S. without documentation by their parents as children but deemed lawfully present under the federal

Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program.

Coleman said the agency estimates that 200 to 300 of those immigrants might have enrolled in college courses this fall. Of that pool, only students who met attendance, grade-point average and community service requirements would be eligible. But it's unlikely that all of them would go to a public community college instead of a fouryear university, private school or out-of-state insti-

While lawmakers and advocates dispute how many, if any, students would suddenly lose access to the scholarship if the bill becomes law, there appears to be consensus that it would only be a

Lawmakers are to convene Sept. 16 to consider overriding the veto. Earlier this year, the Republican-led House passed the measure 108-38, which would be only one vote short of the twothirds majority needed for an override. More than a dozen representatives were absent. Senators originally passed the bill 25-8. It takes 23 votes to override a veto in that chamber.

Although the bill's potential impact is limited, it has fueled hours of debate among lawmakers and stoked tension with Nixon, who has publicly called on the Legislature to let his veto stand

Supporters of the bill say it's unfair for students without legal status to receive the scholarship when money for the program already is tight. The Higher Education Department announced students receiving the A+Scholarship had to chip in for some of the cost of their spring classes because there wasn't enough to pay all recipients in full, although the agency

later said there was enough money for those students.

Rep. Scott Fitzpatrick, a Shell Knob Republican who handled the Senate bill in the House, said enacting the legislation now will prevent potentially steeper costs for certain immigrant students later. He said he expects additional students would apply for the scholarship once more colleges and immigrants are made aware of the department's new

"This is not just a temporary reprieve to allow one class of students this exemption," Fitzpatrick said. "This is a perpetual, ongoing thing that's going to cost more and more and more money.

Opponents of the legislation say the ban makes it even more challenging to afford college for such immigrants, who can't access federal financial aid or scholarships. Faith Sandler, executive director of the Scholarship Foundation of St. Louis, said it's difficult to know how many students would benefit from the scholarship, but she agreed that the number likely would increase as more colleges and students realize it's an option.

Sandler said that some immigrant students now might not even bother applying for the scholarship because of the uncertainty of whether lawmakers will ban it. Some likely are moving to other states that offer more expansive financial aid options for them.

"From the standpoint of the health of our state our economy and our students. to say only that many people will be affected is misleading," Sandler said.

Corte Suprema de Utah falla en predicamento de inmigración

SALT LAKE CITY. Utah. 9 IX 15 (AP): El Tribunal Superior de Utah permitirá que un inmigrante se retire de un acuerdo judicial que hubiera limpiado sus antecedentes pero dejado a cambio un riesgo de deportación.

La opinión de la Corte Suprema estatal pondrá remedio а una complicación jurídica que afecta a miles de inmigrantes en Utah, dijo el miércoles un abogado de Sergio Meza.

"Hay miles de inmigrantes que ahora tienen un camino para obtener la promesa de antecedentes limpios después de haber cumplido el final del convenio", dijo el abogado de inmigración Aaron Tarin.

Tarin señaló que su cliente de 23 años de edad hizo todo lo que se le pidió que hiciera después de que fue detenido con menos de una onza (35 gramos) de marihuana. Pero tres años después, a Meza se le seguía prohibiendo solicitar una tarjeta verde para obtener

residencia permanente en Estados Unidos.

Las cortes de Utah tienen un sistema de desistimiento de cargos delincuentes contra reformados de nivel bajo conocido como declaración en suspensión, pero esos cargos pueden aún aparecer durante procedimientos federales de inmigración.

La ley estatal permite que las declaratorias de culpabilidad sean borradas de registros de tribunales, pero Meza no era considerado culpable de los cargos porque el caso fue desestimado, lo que lo dejó atrapado en un callejón jurídico sin salida

Meza apeló el caso ante

el máximo tribunal de Utah, el cual escuchó argumentos noviembre. En una opinión publicada el 14 de agosto, la corte suprema determinó que Meza puede presentar una moción para retirar la declaratoria utilizando una cláusula jurídica no limitada que no se pensó previamente que aplicara a casos como el suyo, dijo

Tarin está planeando presentar aproximadamente tres semanas una moción para retirar la declaratoria de su cliente, dando tiempo para revisiones porque es la primera de su tipo. La opinión además clarifica que el actual sistema de declaración en suspenso no funciona para inmigrantes como Meza.

Meza, cuyo nombre completo es Sergio Meza Ramos, fue traído a Estados Unidos por sus padres cuando tenía 8 años de edad. Cuando fue arrestado en 2010. su abogado defensor le dijo que el presentar una declaratoria de no disputa de los cargos no afectaría su estatus de inmigración. El caso fue anulado después de que Meza pagó una multa de 1.000 dólares y se mantuvo fuera problemas jurídicos el siguiente año, según registros de la corte.

Pero cuando Meza se casó con una ciudadana estadounidense solicitó residencia permanente, le dijeron que el cargo impedía otorgársela.

\$5.7M seeks to help identify early signs of Alzheimer's

EASTLANSING, Sept. 10, 2015 (AP): A five-year, \$5.7 million grant will support a new *Michigan State University* study aimed at identifying early signs of *Alzheimer's disease* among Latinos.

The funding announced Thursday by the East Lansing school is from the National Institute on Aging.

Hector M. González is the principal investigator of the "Study of Latinos—Investigation of Neurocognitive Aging." The associate professor of epidemiology and biostatistics in the College of Human Medicine and his colleagues will gather health date from nearly 7,000 middle-aged and older adults.

The research will include Hispanics and Latinos between the ages of 50 and 80 years old who may show signs of a possible early form of Alzheimer's disease.

Blue Moon's Dennis Greene, founding member of *Sha Na Na*, dies at 66

DAYTON, Sept. 10, 2015 (AP): A founding member of the retrorock/doo-wop group Sha Na Na who later became a movie studio executive and law professor, has died. Dennis Greene was 66.

Greene's nephew, Ed-

ward Robinson, says his uncle died Saturday in Columbus after a brief illness.

Greene performed with Sha Na Na at Woodstock in 1969 and with the group in the 1978 movie "Grease."

Robinson said Thursday the New York City native left the group in 1984 to

study law and later worked as a Columbia Pictures vice president. He said Greene appreciated opportunities from his music career, but law was his passion.

Greene began teaching law at the University of Dayton in 2001.

\$17,425,000 awarded to five former female employees of *Moreno Farms*, *Inc.*, for sexual harassment and abuse

MIAMI, Sept. 10, 2015: A federal jury has returned a unanimous verdict awarding a total of \$17,425,000 to five former female employees of Moreno Farms, Inc., a produce growing and packing operation in Felda, Fla., who suffered sexual harassment and retaliation, the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) announced today.

According to EEOC's suit and press release, two sons of the owner of Moreno Farms and a third male supervisor engaged in graphic acts of sexual harassment against female workers in Moreno Farms' packaging house, including regular groping and propositioning, threatening female employees with termination if they refused the supervisors' sexual advances, and attempting to rape, and raping, multiple female employees. All five women were ultimately fired for opposing the three men's sexual harassment.

Sexual harassment and retaliation for complaining about it violate Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. EEOC filed suit in U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida after first attempting to reach a pre-litigation settlement through its conciliation process. The case was tried by EEOC Trial Attornevs Beatriz André and Daniel Seltzer.

"EEOC has been at the forefront of combating employment discrimination on behalf of farmworkers,"

 $\operatorname{said} \operatorname{\it EEOC}\operatorname{\it General}\operatorname{\it Counsel}$ David López. "We are committed to ensuring that all immigrant and vulnerable populations are protected by the anti-discrimination laws, and this is the latest in a number of successful cases that we have litigated to stop these discriminatory practices."

This case was filed on Aug 29, 2014 along with another, separate lawsuit charging an agricultural nursery with sexual harassment of a female worker at the hands of her supervisors. These lawsuits sought to raise awareness of, and underscore EEOC's longstanding nationwide commitment to, addressing the plight of this vulnerable segment of workers, who are often reluctant or unable to exercise their rights under equal employment laws.

On Sept. 10, the jury returned a unanimous verdict in the Moreno Farms case, awarding \$2,425,000 in compensatory damages and \$15 million in punitive damages to the five female farmworkers, who intervened in EEOC's suit and were represented by Victoria Mesa-Estrada of Mesa and Coe Law, P.A., and Gregory S. Schell, managing attorney for Florida Legal Services' Migrant Farmworker Justice

Beatriz André, EEOC's lead attorney in the case, said, "Having long been silenced by shame and fear, this trial offered these five women the opportunity to give voice publicly to their experiences and their desire for justice."

The trial was limited to

defendant defaulted and did not participate in the trial. The court has also reserved jurisdiction to hear requests for injunctive relief from EEOC as well as whether those damages awarded for violations of Title VII should be reduced to statutory damage caps.

Robert E. Weisberg, regional attorney for EEOC's Miami District Office, said. "The jury's verdict today should serve as a clear message to the agricultural industry that the law will not tolerate subjecting female farm workers to sexual harassment and that there are severe consequences when a sex-based hostile work environment is permitted to exist.

Preventing workplace harassment through systemic litigation and investigation is one of the six national priorities identified by the Commission's Strategic Enforcement Plan (SEP). Eliminating practices that prohibit individuals from exercising their rights under employment discrimination statutes is another one of EEOC's six national priorities.

Diamante student scholarship and award recipients celebrated

The Latino community honored its own with the 26th annual Diamante Awards celebration held Thursday evening, Sept. 10, 2015 at the University of Toledo's Driscoll Alumni Center.

This year's community service awards event honored three men and the Spanish American Organization (SAO) for their commitment to the advancement of Toledo's Latinos community. About 200 people attended the \$75-per-person affair.

Carlos Ruiz, assistant chief deputy auditor for the Lucas County auditor's office and a former recipient of the Diamante Youth Leadership Award, served as the master of ceremonies.

BenjaminQuintanilla, a student at Owens Community College, received a spirited ovation from the crowd when he went to the podium to accept Diamante Award for Youth Leadership.



"I never in my wildest dreams thought that I would receive an award for simply serving my community and helping wherever help needs to be done," Quintanilla said. "I do mentor students and serve my community every day. This is a huge honor to see my name among all the names of the many great people who have served our community."

Quintanilla received the award for his long-time involvement with the Sofia Quintero Artand Cultural Center, the Toledo Area Metroparks, Youth to Youth, and as a Civic Ambassador at Owens in the Office of Service Learning, Civic Engagement and Leadership. He sheepishly admitted he was late for the awards ceremony because he was mentoring other Owens stu-

dents while working in the community garden there, picking fresh fruits and vegetables for fellow students in need.

Other 2015 Diamante Award recipients included Waite High School teacher Josh Flores for Adult Leadership and insurance agency owner Mark Urrutia for Adult Professional.

Josh Flores is a 1999 graduate of The University of Toledo and a long-time Spanish teacher at Waite

High School, where he also serves as the adult mentor to the school's student-based *Razas Unidas* club, which puts on a Cinco de Mayo celebration each year for staff and students.

He is a founding member of Sigma Lambda Beta International Fraternity Inc., Epsilon Alpha Chapter, a Latino-based fraternity at UT and serves as president of the university's Latino Alumni Affiliate. Flores also earned a Master's degree from Bowling Green State University in Education-Curriculum and Teaching with a focus on Urban Education Reform.

Flores serves on the Toledo mayor's Hispanic Affairs Commission and was one of four alliance members to recently meet with UT's new president, hoping to improve the student experience and mentoring capabilities at the university for Latino college students.

Flores has mentored several at-risk youth through the

YWCA Incentives for Excellence Program and was recognized as the YWCA-IFE Volunteer of the Year in 1996. He is the recipient of the 2009 T o 1 e d o Board of Community

Relations Youth Empowerment Award, and a 2013 recipient of the Toledo 20 under 40 Community Leadership Award.

Mark Urrutia is the general agent for the Catholic Order of Foresters and Skyway Financial Group's principal agent. He has led both two insurance agencies since 2008. He has earned the professional designations of FICF (Fraternal Insurance Counselor Fellow) and LUTCF (Life Underwriter Training Council Fellow).

Urrutia has played an active role in the Latino community fordecades. Urrutiahelped organize the Midwest Hispanic Unity Conference when it was held in Toledo. He is a member of Latinos United, the Latino Alliance, the Spanish American Organization (SAO), and Hispanic Chamber of



Commerce. In 2008, Mark received the Ohio Latino Businessman of the Year award.

Urrutia is a University of Toledo graduate and remains active with the university, serving on its Alumni Association board, the UTPresident's Council for Diversity and the UT Foundation Development Committee. Mark is past president and the current treasurer for the UT Latino Alumni Affiliate, which won "Affiliate of the Year" earlier this year.

Mentoring has been important to Mark throughout his career. Working with leaders in his fraternity, Pi Kappa Phi, he has received alumni of the year on the local level twice. In 2014, he was named the "Regional Governor of the Year" by Pi Kappa Phi National. Mark helped initiate UT's Latino Alumni Affiliate TIOS Mentoring program, which helps guide upperclassman to graduation and beyond. He also finds time to mentor insurance agents in northwestern Ohio.

Within the larger Toledo community, Urrutia's involved with Rotary, Junior Achievement, and Leadership Toledo. He also serves on the board of directors for the Boy Scouts, working with young people in Toledo's central city. Urrutia and his wife Lisa have been married for more than two decades and have a son and daughter.

The Spanish American Organization (SAO) received a Diamante Award for Commu-

nity Agency in recognition of its role in providing scholarships for Latino students and its many projects in the community, including: Latino Heritage Day with the Toledo Mud Hens, the MidWest Latino Fest—which it cohosts with La Prensa—, and Thanks

Prensa—, and Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets for needy families. SAO officers Carmen Barbosa and Mary Morales accepted the award on behalf of SAO.

In 2003, the Diamante Latino Scholars Campaign began as a one-of-a-kind collaboration between Bowling Green State University, Lourdes University, Owens Community College, and the University of Toledo, and then later joined by Herzing University. The five instittions have agreed to collaborate on raising funds through a coordinated campaign and grant-writing effort to meet the primary reason Latino students do not attend or finish college: a lack of finances.

This year, 28 students were the recipients of 30 Diamante scholarships:

Keynote: Ursula Barrera-Richards

1994 Diamante Award recipient for youth leadership Ursula Barrera-Richards addressed the audience as the keynote speaker. She is an attorney who is a former Congressional aide to Marcy Kaptur, worked in labor relations at the Lucas County auditor's office, and served in a handful of state government capacities.

"People in this area know what it means to have a Diamante scholarship. It shows achievement," said Ms. Barrera-Richards. "It shows you care about your community, because it shows you identify with your Latino culture."

She encouraged student leadersto always work on building their resumes and making contacts. Ms. Barrera-Richards emphasized running for office within student groups, volunteering, planning fundraisers, and "never losing passion." She also actively encouraged the students to go to graduate school.

"All of this is about build-



ing your profile, building your résumé," said Ms. Barrera-Richards, as she held up a fistful of résumés. "This is what gets you in the door. There's a lot of competition out there."

"We need you. Every Latino leader in this room has stepped up and, in some way, has volunteered and contributed to our community," added Margarita De León, Diamante Awards cofounder and current committee member.

"That's why we have a presence. That's why we have a voice. All of you need to do the same. Find your niche. Find what you like. Find what you can support and go back and do it, because that's what's going to make us stronger, she added."

has work to do in terms of recruitment and the retention of Latino students, faculty, and staff,"shesaid. "Yetwhat I know is that we are willing and we will continue to make progress in that area."

Dr. Gaber noted the number of Latino students at UT increased by 40, now numbering just over 900, which drew heavy applause from the audience. She cited the *Primos* program as one effort to do a better job of mentoring Latino students, where a first-year Latino studentis paired with "trained peer mentors who are already experiencing success." Those peermentors act as tutors, mentors, and role models.

Shealsopointed out the Ohio Commission on Hispanic-Latino Affairs (OCHLA) will host in March 2016 a statewide Latino education summit at UT "to bring information and awareness on Latino issues to various communities throughout the state." Lilleana Cavanaugh—director of OCHLA—was present for the ceremony.

"This is one more way that Latino lives are transformed and that is through the Diamante awards," Dr. Gaber concluded. "Across our country we all know that the Latino population is surging, while the same is true in Northwest Ohio—and with that growth comes social and political power and the ability to improve the world for those around

us. So through the scholarships awarded today, we're continuing a pipeline of leadership for the future."

"Despite the great work we do, there's always more work to be done," echoed Dr. Mary EllenMazey, president of Bowling Green State University. "That's what we' reall her totalk about—how we need to develop more leadership skills, more scholarships, and especially to support the Latino community."

Dr. Mazey noted a four percent increase in Latino students on the BGSU campus for a total of 783, which also drew a round of applause. She stated that represented a 30 percent increase since 2010. There was a 35 percent increase in the number of Latino freshman students this fall.

Dr. David Livingston, president of Lourdes University, acknowledged that society and politics are not making it easy for Latino students to succeed, noting one Lourdes student who recently faced immigration issues as an educational obstacle.

"By 2050, a third of the students that are going to be in the higher [educational] system are going to come out of the Latin American community," said Dr. Livingston. "Soit's very important that we support you and provide you the opportunity to move ahead and give the generational excellence that moves from generation to generation. We need to stand up against what I think are some significantly unjust policies that exist in this country."


Jack Witt, Owens Community College, vice president for human resources and administration, emphasized the "Community" as in "Owens Community" as being an important factor of a college or university. Bill Cassidy, campus president of Herzing University-Toledo, also addressed the crowd.







Study: Caffeine trade thrived in pre-Columbian America

ALBUOUEROUE. N.M., Sept. 10, 2015 (AP): More than 1,000 years before Starbucks, caffeine was an international market mover, with ancient civilizations trading holly and cacao-based chocolate beverages between what is now modern-day Mexico, the Southwest, and the South, according to a new study.

Led by University of New Mexico anthropology professor Patricia Crown, the study says the trade lasted for around 700 years, likely driven by a pre-Hispanic caffeine addiction.

Previous studies found traces of cacao-based chocolate beverages in parts of the Southwest but this new study confirms their popularity and adds the holly drink that before the study was not known to be consumed in the Southwest, Crown said.

Holly, which was used to make a caffeinated tea, was grown in what is now the South.

Researchers found caffeine on shards from jars, bowls, and pitchers located at archaeological sites throughout present-day New Mexico, Arizona, and Colorado, where neither holly nor cacao grows.

"The fact we have found traces of caffeine that are 1,000 years old is exciting," Crown said, "As new technology develops, we can discover things about the past like this using objects we already have in museums."

Crown said the caffeine likely was used in rituals and political events. Scientists believe the drinks were largely consumed by the elite or a noble class because the plant for the drinks had to go through an intricate trade

"For people who had a diet consisting of corn, bean

and squash, the drinks provided a kick," Crown said.

Dave DeWitt, author of The Food Lover's Handbook to the Southwest," said he was surprised to learn the study found holly was so popular in the Southwest. He believes it may have been consumed for the caffeine.

The chocolate, however, was likely popular for other reasons

"I don't think it had to do with the caffeine since cacao has so very little of it," DeWitt said, "It had to do with the rituals that go back to the Aztecs and the Maya," he said.

It's unclear if people in the Southwest traveled down to Mexico or if the plants were obtained through village-to-village trade routes.

The study is published in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sci-






